AN ACT Relating to providing incentives to industry and consumers to promote renewable energy; adding a new section to chapter 82.16 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 82.08 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 82.12 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 82.04 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 84.36 RCW; providing an effective date; providing an expiration date; and declaring an emergency.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 82.16 RCW 9 to read as follows:

10 (1) Any individual, business, or local governmental entity, not in 11 the light and power business or in the gas distribution business, may 12 apply to the light and power business serving the situs of the system, 13 each fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2005, for an investment cost recovery incentive for each kilowatt-hour from a customer-generated 14 15 electricity renewable energy system installed on its property. No incentive may be paid for kilowatt-hours generated before July 1, 2005, 16 or after June 30, 2015. 17

(2)(a) Before submitting for the first time the application for theincentive allowed under this section, the applicant shall submit to the

department of revenue and to the climate and rural energy development center at the Washington State University, established under RCW 3 28B.30.642, a certification in a form and manner prescribed by the 4 department that includes, but is not limited to, the following 5 information:

6 (i) The name and address of the applicant and location of the 7 renewable energy system;

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(ii) The applicant's tax registration number;

9 (iii) That the electricity produced by the applicant meets the 10 definition of "customer-generated electricity" and that the renewable 11 energy system produces electricity with:

12 (A) Any solar inverters and solar modules manufactured in13 Washington state;

(B) A wind generator powered by blades manufactured in Washingtonstate;

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(C) A solar inverter manufactured in Washington state;

(D) A solar module manufactured in Washington state; or

18 (E) Solar or wind equipment manufactured outside of Washington19 state;

20 (iv) That the electricity can be transformed or transmitted for 21 entry into or operation in parallel with electricity transmission and 22 distribution systems;

(v) The date that the renewable energy system received its finalelectrical permit from the applicable local jurisdiction.

(b) Within thirty days of receipt of the certification the department of revenue shall advise the applicant in writing whether the renewable energy system qualifies for an incentive under this section. The department may consult with the climate and rural energy development center to determine eligibility for the incentive. System certifications and the information contained therein are subject to disclosure under RCW 82.32.330(3)(m).

32 (3)(a) By August 1st of each year application for the incentive 33 shall be made to the light and power business serving the situs of the 34 system by certification in a form and manner prescribed by the 35 department that includes, but is not limited to, the following 36 information:

37 (i) The name and address of the applicant and location of the 38 renewable energy system;

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(ii) The applicant's tax registration number;

2 (iii) The date of the letter from the department of revenue stating 3 that the renewable energy system is eligible for the incentives under 4 this section;

5 (iv) A statement of the amount of kilowatt-hours generated by the 6 renewable energy system in the prior fiscal year.

7 (b) Within sixty days of receipt of the incentive certification the light and power business serving the situs of the system shall notify 8 the applicant in writing whether the incentive payment will be 9 authorized or denied. The business may consult with the climate and 10 rural energy development center to determine eligibility for the 11 12 incentive payment. Incentive certifications and the information 13 contained therein are subject to disclosure under RCW 82.32.330(3)(m). 14 (c)(i) Persons receiving incentive payments shall keep and preserve, for a period of five years, suitable records as may be 15 necessary to determine the amount of incentive applied for and 16 received. Such records shall be open for examination at any time upon 17 notice by the light and power business that made the payment or by the 18 If upon examination of any records or from other 19 department. information obtained by the business or department it appears that an 20 21 incentive has been paid in an amount that exceeds the correct amount of 22 incentive payable, the business may assess against the person for the amount found to have been paid in excess of the correct amount of 23 24 incentive payable and shall add thereto interest on the amount. 25 Interest shall be assessed in the manner that the department assesses interest upon delinquent tax under RCW 82.32.050. 26

(ii) If it appears that the amount of incentive paid is less than the correct amount of incentive payable the business may authorize additional payment.

30 (4) The investment cost recovery incentive may be paid fifteen 31 cents per economic development kilowatt-hour unless requests exceed the 32 amount authorized for credit to the participating light and power 33 business. For the purposes of this section, the rate paid for the 34 investment cost recovery incentive may be multiplied by the following 35 factors:

36 (a) For customer-generated electricity produced using solar modules37 manufactured in Washington state, two and four-tenths;

1 (b) For customer-generated electricity produced using a solar or a 2 wind generator equipped with an inverter manufactured in Washington 3 state, one and two-tenths;

4 (c) For customer-generated electricity produced using an anaerobic
5 digester, or by other solar equipment or using a wind generator
6 equipped with blades manufactured in Washington state, one; and

7 (d) For all other customer-generated electricity produced by wind,8 eight-tenths.

9 (5) No individual, household, business, or local governmental 10 entity is eligible for incentives for more than two thousand dollars 11 per year.

12 (6) If requests for the investment cost recovery incentive exceed 13 the amount of funds available for credit to the participating light and 14 power business, the incentive payments shall be reduced 15 proportionately.

16 (7) The climate and rural energy development center at Washington 17 State University energy program may establish guidelines and standards 18 for technologies that are identified as Washington manufactured and 19 therefore most beneficial to the state's environment.

20 (8) The environmental attributes of the renewable energy system 21 belong to the applicant, and do not transfer to the state or the light 22 and power business upon receipt of the investment cost recovery 23 incentive.

24 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 82.08 RCW 25 to read as follows:

26 (1) The tax levied by RCW 82.08.020 shall not apply to charges made 27 for labor and services rendered in respect to the constructing of investment projects, and tangible personal property that will be 28 incorporated as an ingredient or component of investment projects 29 during the course of constructing, either of which is used for the 30 31 manufacture of solar energy systems using photovoltaic modules into a solar energy system or for the manufacture of silicon components of 32 such systems, located in a rural county. The exemption is available 33 only when the buyer provides the seller with an exemption certificate 34 35 in a form and manner prescribed by the department. The seller shall 36 retain a copy of the certificate for the seller's files.

1 (2) To be eligible under this section the person must use the 2 investment project for the manufacturing of solar energy systems using 3 photovoltaic modules into a solar energy system or silicon components 4 of such systems for an eight-year period, such period beginning the day 5 the investment project commences commercial production, or a portion of 6 tax otherwise due shall be immediately due and payable pursuant to 7 subsection (3) of this section:

8 (a) Before commencing commercial production at the investment 9 project, the person must meet with the department to determine the date 10 on which commercial production commences. This date shall be used 11 throughout the eight-year period to determine whether any tax is to be 12 repaid. This information is not subject to the confidentiality 13 provisions of RCW 82.32.330.

(b) No application is necessary for the tax exemption. The person
is subject to all the requirements of chapter 82.32 RCW. A person
taking the exemption under this section must report as required under
RCW 82.32.--- (section 4, Engrossed Second Substitute Senate Bill No.
5111).

(3) If the investment project is not used for manufacturing solar 19 energy systems using photovoltaic modules or silicon components of such 20 21 systems for any one calendar year, one-eighth of the exempt sales and 22 use taxes shall be due and payable by April 1st of the following year. The department shall assess interest, but not penalties, on the taxes 23 24 for which the person is not eligible. The interest shall be assessed 25 at the rate provided for delinquent excise taxes under this chapter, retroactively to the date the exemption was claimed, and shall accrue 26 27 until the taxes for which the exemption was claimed are repaid.

(4) The definitions in this subsection apply throughout thissection.

30 (a) "Commencement of commercial production" is deemed to have 31 occurred when the equipment and process qualifications in the 32 investment project are completed and production for sale has begun.

33 (b) "Investment project" means an investment in qualified buildings 34 or qualified machinery and equipment, including labor and services 35 rendered in the planning, installation, and construction of the 36 project. An investment project does not include any portion of an 37 investment project undertaken by a light and power business as defined

in RCW 82.16.010(5), other than that portion of a cogeneration project that is used to generate power for consumption within the manufacturing site of which the cogeneration project is an integral part.

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(c) "Manufacturing" means the same as defined in RCW 82.04.120.

5 (d) "Qualified buildings" means construction of new structures including parking facilities, and expansion or renovation of existing 6 structures, for the purpose of increasing floor space or production 7 capacity used for manufacturing, including plant offices and warehouses 8 9 or other facilities for the storage of raw material or finished goods if such facilities are an essential or an integral part of a factory, 10 mill, or plant, used for manufacturing. If a building is used partly 11 for manufacturing and partly for other purposes, the applicable tax 12 13 exemption shall be determined by apportionment of the costs of 14 construction under rules adopted by the department.

(e) "Qualified machinery and equipment" means all new industrial fixtures, equipment, and support facilities that are an integral and necessary part of a manufacturing operation. "Qualified machinery and equipment" includes manufacturing components such as belts, pulleys, shafts, and moving parts; molds, tools, and dies; operating structures; and all equipment used to control or operate the machinery.

(f) "Rural county" means a county with a population density of fewer than four persons per square mile.

(g) "Solar energy system" has the same meaning as provided in RCW
82.04.--- (section 2, Engrossed Second Substitute Senate Bill No.
5111).

(5) No exemption may be taken after June 30, 2014, however all of
 the eligibility criteria and limitations are applicable to any
 exemptions claimed before that date.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 82.12 RCW 30 to read as follows:

(1) The provisions of this chapter do not apply with respect to the use of tangible personal property that will be incorporated as an ingredient or component of investment projects, either of which is used for the manufacture of solar energy systems using photovoltaic modules into a solar energy system or for the manufacture of silicon components of such systems, located in a rural county, as defined in section 2 of this act, during the course of constructing such investment projects or 1 to labor and services rendered in respect to installing, during the 2 course of constructing, building fixtures not otherwise eligible for 3 the exemption under RCW 82.08.02565(2)(b).

4 (2) The eligibility requirements, conditions, and definitions in 5 section 2 of this act apply to this section.

6 (3) No exemption may be taken after June 30, 2014, however all of 7 the eligibility criteria and limitations are applicable to any 8 exemptions claimed before that date.

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(4) This section expires June 30, 2014.

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. A new section is added to chapter 82.04 RCW 11 to read as follows:

12 (1) Subject to the limits and provisions of this section, a credit is authorized against the tax otherwise due under RCW 82.04.---13 (section 2, Engrossed Second Substitute Senate Bill No. 5111) for each 14 full-time employment position created by persons engaged in the 15 16 business of manufacturing solar energy systems using photovoltaic 17 modules into a solar energy system or the manufacturing of silicon components of such systems. For the purposes of this section "solar 18 energy system" has the same meaning as provided in RCW 82.04.---19 20 (section 2, Engrossed Second Substitute Senate Bill No. 5111).

21 (2)(a) The credit under this section shall equal three thousand dollars for each full-time employment position used in manufacturing 22 23 process that takes place in investment projects exempt from sales and 24 use tax under sections 2 and 3 of this act. A credit is earned for the calendar year a person fills a position. Additionally a credit is 25 26 earned for each year the position is maintained over the subsequent consecutive years, up to eight years. Those positions that are not 27 filled for the entire year are eligible for fifty percent of the credit 28 if filled less than six months, and the entire credit if filled six 29 30 months or more.

31 (b) To qualify for the credit, the manufacturing activity of the 32 person must be conducted at an investment project that qualifies for 33 the exemption from sales and use tax under sections 2 and 3 of this 34 act.

35 (3) No application is necessary for the tax credit. The person is
 36 subject to all of the requirements of chapter 82.32 RCW. In no case

1 may a credit earned during one calendar year be carried over to be 2 credited against taxes incurred in a subsequent calendar year. No 3 refunds may be granted for credits under this section.

(4) If at any time the department finds that a person is not 4 5 eligible for tax credit under this section, the amount of taxes for which a credit has been claimed shall be immediately due. 6 The 7 department shall assess interest, but not penalties, on the taxes for which the person is not eligible. The interest shall be assessed at 8 the rate provided for delinquent excise taxes under chapter 82.32 RCW, 9 shall be retroactive to the date the tax credit was taken, and shall 10 accrue until the taxes for which a credit has been used are repaid. 11

(5) A person taking the credit under this section must report under
 RCW 82.32.--- (section 4, Engrossed Second Substitute Senate Bill No.
 5111).

(6) Credits may be taken after July 1, 2005, for those investment projects at which commercial production began before June 30, 2014, subject to all of the eligibility criteria and limitations of this section.

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(7) This section expires June 30, 2014.

20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. A new section is added to chapter 84.36 RCW 21 to read as follows:

(1) Machinery and equipment exempt under RCW 82.08.02565 or 22 23 82.12.02565 used exclusively in the manufacture of solar energy systems 24 using photovoltaic modules into a solar energy system or the manufacture of silicon components of such systems, at an investment 25 26 project exempt from sales and use tax under sections 2 and 3 of this act are exempt from property taxation. "Solar energy system" has the 27 same meaning as provided in RCW 82.04.--- (section 2, Engrossed Second 28 Substitute Senate Bill No. 5111). 29

30 (2) A person seeking this exemption must make application to the31 county assessor, on forms prescribed by the department.

32 (3) This section is effective for taxes levied for collection one33 year after the effective date of this section and thereafter.

34 (4) This section expires December 31, 2014, for taxes levied for35 collection in the following year.

1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 6. This act is necessary for the immediate 2 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the 3 state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect 4 July 1, 2005.

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
