AN ACT Relating to aligning standards for high school graduation, college readiness, and college admission; amending 2006 c 263 s 405 (uncodified); and creating new sections.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that too many students graduate from high school unprepared for college or entrance into the 6 7 workforce. There is no clear relation between the coursework required 8 for a high school diploma and the skills and knowledge needed to succeed in college, whether the college program is academic 9 or 10 technical in nature. There is also no common standard among the state's two and four-year institutions of higher education as to what 11 12 constitutes readiness for college-level work as opposed to placement in 13 remedial courses. Therefore the legislature intends to direct the responsible state agencies to work together to define and align 14 15 standards for high school graduation, college readiness, and college 16 admission.

17 **Sec. 2.** 2006 c 263 s 405 (uncodified) is amended to read as 18 follows:

(1) The state board of education shall develop and propose a 1 2 revised definition of the ((purpose and)) expectations for high school diplomas issued by public schools in Washington state. 3 The revised definition shall ((address whether attainment of a high school diploma 4 is intended to)) signify that a student is ready for success in 5 $college((\tau))$ as well as ready for successful and gainful employment in б 7 the workplace((, or some combination of these and other objectives)). In addition to identifying necessary courses and course content, the 8 revised definition shall ((focus on)) address the knowledge, skills, 9 10 and abilities that students are expected to ((demonstrate)) achieve to receive a high school diploma, as well as the various methods to be 11 12 used to measure student performance((, rather than focusing on courses, 13 credits, seat time, and test scores)). The board shall recommend 14 college preparatory and career and technical pathways of equal rigor for students to obtain a diploma. The board shall also recommend 15 enhancements to the college preparatory and career and technical 16 17 pathways for highly capable students.

18 (2) ((In developing the revised definition of the high school diploma,)) The state board of education shall examine options for 20 creating endorsements on the standard diploma or creating honors 21 diplomas for students who successfully complete an advanced college 22 preparatory pathway or an advanced career and technical education 23 pathway.

24 (3) The state board of education shall consult with educators, 25 parents, institutions of higher education, employers, and community 26 leaders. The board shall also work with the state board for community 27 and technical colleges, the higher education coordinating board, and 28 the workforce training and education coordinating board.

(((3))) (4) The state board of education shall submit the proposed revised definition of the high school diploma, recommended pathways for students to obtain the diploma, and recommendations regarding endorsements or honors diplomas, along with any necessary revisions to state statutes and rules, to the education committees of the legislature by December 1, 2007.

35 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** The higher education coordinating board and 36 the state board for community and technical colleges, in consultation 37 with the public four-year institutions of higher education, shall

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develop common college placement tests, one each in the areas of 1 2 mathematics and English. The boards shall also set common cutoff scores for determining student qualifications for college-level 3 coursework in mathematics and English. All public two and four-year 4 institutions of higher education shall use the common college placement 5 and the common cutoff scores when determining 6 tests student qualifications for college-level coursework in mathematics and English. 7 The tests and scores shall be developed and implemented by the 8 beginning of the 2008-09 academic year. 9

10 NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. The higher education coordinating board, in 11 consultation with the state board of education, the state board for 12 community and technical colleges, and the public four-year institutions of higher education, shall examine and revise minimum admissions 13 14 standards for four-year institutions of higher education so that the standards are aligned with state minimum high school graduation 15 16 requirements and aligned with the standards and expectations for 17 college readiness, particularly in core academic subjects such as math, science, and English. Revised minimum admissions standards shall be 18 implemented no later than September 1, 2008. 19

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
