1 AN ACT Relating to spirits, beer, and wine restaurant licenses; and 2 reenacting and amending RCW 66.24.420 and 66.24.320.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 Sec. 1. RCW 66.24.420 and 2006 c 101 s 3 and 2006 c 85 s 1 are 5 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

6 (1) The spirits, beer, and wine restaurant license shall be issued 7 in accordance with the following schedule of annual fees:

8 (a) The annual fee for a spirits, beer, and wine restaurant license 9 shall be graduated according to the dedicated dining area and type of 10 service provided as follows:

11	Less than 50% dedicated dining area	\$2,000
12	50% or more dedicated dining area	\$1,600
13	Service bar only	\$1,000

(b) The annual fee for the license when issued to any other spirits, beer, and wine restaurant licensee outside of incorporated cities and towns shall be prorated according to the calendar quarters, or portion thereof, during which the licensee is open for business, except in case of suspension or revocation of the license.

(c) Where the license shall be issued to any corporation, 1 2 association or person operating a bona fide restaurant in an airport terminal facility providing service to transient passengers with more 3 than one place where liquor is to be dispensed and sold, such license 4 5 shall be issued upon the payment of the annual fee, which shall be a master license and shall permit such sale within and from one such 6 7 place. Such license may be extended to additional places on the premises at the discretion of the board and a duplicate license may be 8 issued for each such additional place. The holder of a master license 9 10 for a restaurant in an airport terminal facility must maintain in a substantial manner at least one place on the premises for preparing, 11 12 cooking, and serving of complete meals, and such food service shall be 13 available on request in other licensed places on the premises. An 14 additional license fee of twenty-five percent of the annual master license fee shall be required for such duplicate licenses. 15

(d) Where the license shall be issued to any corporation, 16 17 association, or person operating dining places at a publicly or privately owned civic or convention center with facilities for sports, 18 entertainment, or conventions, or a combination thereof, with more than 19 one place where liquor is to be dispensed and sold, such license shall 20 21 be issued upon the payment of the annual fee, which shall be a master 22 license and shall permit such sale within and from one such place. Such license may be extended to additional places on the premises at 23 24 the discretion of the board and a duplicate license may be issued for 25 each such additional place. The holder of a master license for a dining place at such a publicly or privately owned civic or convention 26 27 center must maintain in a substantial manner at least one place on the premises for preparing, cooking, and serving of complete meals, and 28 food service shall be available on request in other licensed places on 29 An additional license fee of ten dollars shall be 30 the premises. required for such duplicate licenses. 31

32 (e) Where the license shall be issued to any corporation, 33 association or person operating more than one building containing 34 dining places at privately owned facilities which are open to the 35 public and where there is a continuity of ownership of all adjacent 36 property, such license shall be issued upon the payment of an annual 37 fee which shall be a master license and shall permit such sale within 38 and from one such place. Such license may be extended to the

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additional dining places on the property or, in the case of a spirits, 1 2 beer, and wine restaurant licensed hotel, property owned or controlled by leasehold interest by that hotel for use as a conference or 3 convention center or banquet facility open to the general public for 4 5 special events in the same metropolitan area, at the discretion of the board and a duplicate license may be issued for each additional place. б 7 The holder of the master license for the dining place shall not offer alcoholic beverages for sale, service, and consumption at 8 the 9 additional place unless food service is available at both the location of the master license and the duplicate license. An additional license 10 fee of twenty dollars shall be required for such duplicate licenses. 11

12 (2) The board, so far as in its judgment is reasonably possible, 13 shall confine spirits, beer, and wine restaurant licenses to the 14 business districts of cities and towns and other communities, and not 15 grant such licenses in residential districts, nor within the immediate 16 vicinity of schools, without being limited in the administration of 17 this subsection to any specific distance requirements.

(3) The board shall have discretion to issue spirits, beer, and 18 wine restaurant licenses outside of cities and towns in the state of 19 Washington. The purpose of this subsection is to enable the board, in 20 21 its discretion, to license in areas outside of cities and towns and 22 other communities, establishments which are operated and maintained primarily for the benefit of tourists, vacationers and travelers, and 23 24 also golf and country clubs, and common carriers operating dining, club 25 and buffet cars, or boats.

(4) The total number of spirits, beer, and wine restaurant licenses issued in the state of Washington by the board, not including spirits, beer, and wine private club licenses, shall not in the aggregate at any time exceed one license for each one thousand four hundred fifty of population in the state, determined according to the yearly population determination developed by the office of financial management pursuant to RCW 43.62.030.

(5) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (4) of this section, the board shall refuse a spirits, beer, and wine restaurant license to any applicant if in the opinion of the board the spirits, beer, and wine restaurant licenses already granted for the particular locality are adequate for the reasonable needs of the community.

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(6)(a) The board may issue a caterer's endorsement to this license 1 2 to allow the licensee to remove the liquor stocks at the licensed premises, for use as liquor for sale and service at event locations at 3 a specified date and, except as provided in subsection (7) of this 4 5 section, place not currently licensed by the board. If the event is open to the public, it must be sponsored by a society or organization 6 7 as defined by RCW 66.24.375. If attendance at the event is limited to members or invited guests of the sponsoring individual, society, or 8 9 organization, the requirement that the sponsor must be a society or organization as defined by RCW 66.24.375 is waived. Cost of the 10 endorsement is three hundred fifty dollars. 11

(b) The holder of this license with <u>a</u> catering endorsement shall, if requested by the board, notify the board or its designee of the date, time, place, and location of any catered event. Upon request, the licensee shall provide to the board all necessary or requested information concerning the society or organization that will be holding the function at which the endorsed license will be utilized.

18 (c) The holder of this license with a catering endorsement may, 19 under conditions established by the board, store liquor on the premises 20 of another so long as there is a written agreement between the licensee 21 and the other party to provide for ongoing catering services, the 22 agreement contains no exclusivity clauses regarding the alcoholic 23 beverages to be served, and the agreement is filed with the board.

(d) The holder of this license with a catering endorsement may, under conditions established by the board, store liquor on other premises so long as the premises is owned or controlled by a leasehold interest by that licensee. A duplicate license may be issued for each additional premises. A license fee of twenty dollars shall be required for such duplicate licenses.

30 (7) Licensees under this section that hold a caterer's endorsement 31 are allowed to use this endorsement on a domestic winery premises or on 32 the premises of a passenger vessel <u>and may store liquor at such</u> 33 <u>premises under conditions established by the board</u> under the following 34 conditions:

35 (a) Agreements between the domestic winery or passenger vessel, as 36 the case may be, and the retail licensee shall be in writing, contain 37 no exclusivity clauses regarding the ((alcohol)) alcoholic beverages to 38 be served, and be filed with the board; and

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(b) The domestic winery or passenger vessel, as the case may be,
 and the retail licensee shall be separately contracted and compensated
 by the persons sponsoring the event for their respective services.

4 **Sec. 2.** RCW 66.24.320 and 2006 c 362 s 1 and 2006 c 101 s 2 are 5 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

6 There shall be a beer and/or wine restaurant license to sell beer, 7 including strong beer, or wine, or both, at retail, for consumption on 8 the premises. A patron of the licensee may remove from the premises, 9 recorked or recapped in its original container, any portion of wine 10 that was purchased for consumption with a meal.

(1) The annual fee shall be two hundred dollars for the beer license, two hundred dollars for the wine license, or four hundred dollars for a combination beer and wine license.

(2)(a) The board may issue a caterer's endorsement to this license 14 15 to allow the licensee to remove from the liquor stocks at the licensed 16 premises, only those types of liquor that are authorized under the on-17 premises license privileges for sale and service at event locations at a specified date and, except as provided in subsection (3) of this 18 section, place not currently licensed by the board. If the event is 19 20 open to the public, it must be sponsored by a society or organization 21 as defined by RCW 66.24.375. If attendance at the event is limited to members or invited guests of the sponsoring individual, society, or 22 23 organization, the requirement that the sponsor must be a society or 24 organization as defined by RCW 66.24.375 is waived. Cost of the endorsement is three hundred fifty dollars. 25

(b) The holder of this license with catering endorsement shall, if requested by the board, notify the board or its designee of the date, time, place, and location of any catered event. Upon request, the licensee shall provide to the board all necessary or requested information concerning the society or organization that will be holding the function at which the endorsed license will be utilized.

32 (c) The holder of this license with a catering endorsement may 33 store liquor on the premises of another licensee so long as there is a 34 written agreement between the licensee and the other party to provide 35 for ongoing catering services, the agreement contains no exclusivity 36 clauses regarding the alcoholic beverages to be served, and the 37 agreement is filed with the board. 1 (3) Licensees under this section that hold a caterer's endorsement 2 are allowed to use this endorsement on a domestic winery premises or on 3 the premises of a passenger vessel <u>and may store liquor at such</u> 4 <u>premises under conditions established by the board</u> under the following 5 conditions:

(a) Agreements between the domestic winery or the passenger vessel,
as the case may be, and the retail licensee shall be in writing,
contain no exclusivity clauses regarding the ((alcohol)) alcoholic
beverages to be served, and be filed with the board; and

(b) The domestic winery or passenger vessel, as the case may be,
and the retail licensee shall be separately contracted and compensated
by the persons sponsoring the event for their respective services.

13 (4) The holder of this license or its manager may furnish beer or wine to the licensee's employees free of charge as may be required for 14 use in connection with instruction on beer and wine. The instruction 15 may include the history, nature, values, and characteristics of beer or 16 17 wine, the use of wine lists, and the methods of presenting, serving, storing, and handling beer or wine. The beer and/or wine licensee must 18 use the beer or wine it obtains under its license for the sampling as 19 part of the instruction. The instruction must be given on the premises 20 21 of the beer and/or wine licensee.

(5) If the license is issued to a person who contracts with the Washington state ferry system to provide food and alcohol service on a designated ferry route, the license shall cover any vessel assigned to the designated route. A separate license is required for each designated ferry route.

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
