1 AN ACT Relating to monitoring and addressing achievement of groups 2 of students; and amending RCW 28A.300.130, 43.06B.020, and 28A.655.090.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 **Sec. 1.** RCW 28A.300.130 and 2006 c 116 s 2 are each amended to 5 read as follows:

(1)То facilitate access to information and 6 materials on 7 educational improvement and research, the superintendent of public 8 instruction, to the extent funds are appropriated, shall establish the 9 center for the improvement of student learning. The center shall work 10 conjunction with parents, educational service districts, in institutions of higher education, and education, parent, community, and 11 12 business organizations.

13 (2) The center, in conjunction with other staff in the office of14 the superintendent of public instruction, shall:

(a) Serve as a clearinghouse for information regarding successful educational improvement and parental involvement programs in schools and districts, and information about efforts within institutions of higher education in the state to support educational improvement initiatives in Washington schools and districts;

(b) Provide best practices research that can be used to help 1 2 schools develop and implement: Programs and practices to improve instruction; systems to analyze student assessment data, with an 3 emphasis on systems that will combine the use of state and local data 4 5 to monitor the academic progress of each and every student in the school district; comprehensive, school-wide improvement plans; school-6 7 based shared decision-making models; programs to promote lifelong learning and community involvement in education; school-to-work 8 transition programs; programs to meet the needs of highly capable 9 10 students; programs and practices to meet the needs of students with disabilities; programs and practices to meet the diverse needs of 11 12 students based on gender, racial, ethnic, economic, and special needs 13 status; research, information, and technology systems; and other 14 programs and practices that will assist educators in helping students learn the essential academic learning requirements; 15

16 (c) Develop and maintain an internet web site to increase the 17 availability of information, research, and other materials;

18 (d) Work with appropriate organizations to inform teachers, 19 district and school administrators, and school directors about the 20 waivers available and the broadened school board powers under RCW 21 28A.320.015;

(e) Provide training and consultation services, includingconducting regional summer institutes;

(f) Identify strategies for improving the success rates of ethnic and racial student groups <u>and students with disabilities</u>, with disproportionate academic achievement;

(g) Work with parents, teachers, and school districts 27 in establishing a model absentee notification procedure that will properly 28 notify parents when their student has not attended a class or has 29 The office of the superintendent of public 30 missed a school day. instruction shall consider various types of communication with parents 31 32 including, but not limited to, electronic mail, phone, and postal mail; and 33

(h) Perform other functions consistent with the purpose of thecenter as prescribed in subsection (1) of this section.

36 (3) The superintendent of public instruction shall select and 37 employ a director for the center.

1 (4) The superintendent may enter into contracts with individuals or 2 organizations including but not limited to: School districts; educational service districts; educational organizations; teachers; 3 higher education faculty; institutions of higher education; state 4 agencies; business or community-based organizations; 5 and other individuals and organizations to accomplish the duties 6 and 7 responsibilities of the center. In carrying out the duties and responsibilities of the center, the superintendent, whenever possible, 8 shall use practitioners to assist agency staff as well as assist 9 educators and others in schools and districts. 10

11 (5) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall 12 report to the legislature by September 1, 2007, and thereafter 13 biennially, regarding the effectiveness of the center for (({the})) the 14 improvement of student learning, how the services provided by the center for (([the])) the improvement of student learning have been used 15 and by whom, and recommendations to improve the accessibility and 16 17 application of knowledge and information that leads to improved student 18 learning and greater family and community involvement in the public education system. 19

20 **Sec. 2.** RCW 43.06B.020 and 2006 c 116 s 4 are each amended to read 21 as follows:

22 The education ombudsman shall have the following powers and duties: 23 develop parental involvement materials, (1)То including instructional quides developed to inform parents of the essential 24 25 academic learning requirements required by the superintendent of public 26 instruction. The instructional guides also shall contain actions 27 parents may take to assist their children in meeting the requirements, and should focus on reaching parents who have not previously been 28 29 involved with their children's education;

30 (2) To provide information to students, parents, and interested 31 members of the public regarding this state's public elementary and 32 secondary education system;

33 (3) To identify obstacles to greater parent and community 34 involvement in school shared decision-making processes and recommend 35 strategies for helping parents and community members to participate 36 effectively in school shared decision-making processes, including

understanding and respecting the roles of school building
 administrators and staff;

3 (4) To identify and recommend strategies for improving the success
4 rates of ethnic and racial student groups <u>and students with</u>
5 <u>disabilities</u>, with disproportionate academic achievement;

6 (5) To refer complainants and others to appropriate resources,
7 agencies, or departments;

8 (6) To facilitate the resolution of complaints made by parents and 9 students with regard to the state's public elementary and secondary 10 education system;

11 (7) To perform such other functions consistent with the purpose of 12 the education ombudsman; and

(8) To consult with representatives of the following organizations
and groups regarding the work of the office of the education ombudsman,
including but not limited to:

16 (a) The state parent teacher association;

17 (b) Certificated and classified school employees;

18 (c) School and school district administrators;

19 (d) Parents of special education students;

20 (e) Parents of English language learners;

21 (f) The Washington state commission on Hispanic affairs;

22 (g) The Washington state commission on African-American affairs;

23 (h) The Washington state commission on Asian Pacific American 24 affairs; and

25 (i) The governor's office of Indian affairs.

26 **Sec. 3.** RCW 28A.655.090 and 1999 c 388 s 301 are each amended to 27 read as follows:

(1) By September 10, 1998, and by September 10th each year thereafter, the superintendent of public instruction shall report to schools, school districts, and the legislature on the results of the Washington assessment of student learning and state-mandated normreferenced standardized tests.

(2) The reports shall include the assessment results by school and
 school district, and include changes over time. For the Washington
 assessment of student learning, results shall be reported as follows:
 (a) The percentage of students meeting the standards;

1 (b) The percentage of students performing at each level of the 2 assessment; ((and))

3 (c) Disaggregation of results by at least the following subgroups 4 of students: White, Black, Hispanic, American Indian/Alaskan Native, 5 Asian, Pacific Islander/Hawaiian Native, low income, transitional 6 bilingual, migrant, special education, and, beginning with the 2009-10 7 school year, students covered by section 504 of the federal 8 rehabilitation act of 1973, as amended (29 U.S.C. Sec. 794); and

9 <u>(d)</u> A learning improvement index that shows changes in student 10 performance within the different levels of student learning reported on 11 the Washington assessment of student learning.

12 (3) The reports shall contain data regarding the different 13 characteristics of schools, such as poverty levels, percent of English 14 as a second language students, dropout rates, attendance, percent of 15 students in special education, and student mobility so that districts 16 and schools can learn from the improvement efforts of other schools and 17 districts with similar characteristics.

(4) The reports shall contain student scores on mandated tests bycomparable Washington schools of similar characteristics.

(5) The reports shall contain information on public school choiceoptions available to students, including vocational education.

(6) The reports shall be posted on the superintendent of public instruction's internet web site.

(7) To protect the privacy of students, the results of schools and districts that test fewer than ten students in a grade level shall not be reported. In addition, in order to ensure that results are reported accurately, the superintendent of public instruction shall maintain the confidentiality of statewide data files until the superintendent determines that the data are complete and accurate.

30 (8) The superintendent of public instruction shall monitor the 31 percentage and number of special education and limited English-32 proficient students exempted from taking the assessments by schools and 33 school districts to ensure the exemptions are in compliance with 34 exemption guidelines.
