1 AN ACT Relating to contracts with associate development 2 organizations for economic development services; amending RCW 3 43.330.080; adding new sections to chapter 43.330 RCW; and creating new sections. 4

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. The legislature finds that economic 7 development success requires coordinated state and local efforts. The 8 legislature further finds that economic development happens at the 9 local level. County-designated associate development organizations 10 serve as a networking tool and resource hub for business retention, expansion, and relocation in Washington. Economic development success 11 requires an adequately funded and coordinated state effort and an 12 13 adequately funded and coordinated local effort. The legislature intends to bolster the partnership between state and local economic 14 15 development efforts, provide increased funding for local economic 16 development services, and increase local economic development service 17 effectiveness, efficiency, and outcomes.

1 Sec. 2. RCW 43.330.080 and 1997 c 60 s 1 are each amended to read
2 as follows:

3 (((1))) The department shall contract with county-designated 4 associate development organizations ((or other local organizations)) to increase the support for and coordination of community and economic 5 б development services in communities or regional areas. The organizations contracted with in each community or regional area shall 7 8 be broadly representative of community and economic interests. The organization shall be capable of identifying key economic and community 9 development problems, developing appropriate solutions, and mobilizing 10 support for recommended initiatives. 11 broad The contracting 12 organization shall work with and include local governments, local 13 chambers of commerce, ((private industry councils,)) workforce development councils, port districts, labor groups, institutions of 14 higher education, community action programs, and other appropriate 15 private, public, or nonprofit community and economic development 16 17 groups. The ((department shall be responsible for determining the)) 18 scope of services delivered under these contracts((-

19 (2) Associate development organizations or other local development 20 organizations contracted with shall promote and coordinate, through 21 local service agreements with local governments, small business 22 development centers, port districts, community and technical colleges, 23 private industry councils, and other development organizations, for the 24 efficient delivery of community and economic development services in 25 their areas.

26 (3) The department shall consult with associate development 27 organizations, port districts, local governments, and other local development organizations in the establishment of service delivery 28 regions throughout the state. The legislature encourages local 29 30 associate development organizations to form partnerships with other associate development organizations in their region to combine 31 resources for better access to available services, to encourage 32 33 regional delivery of state services, and to build the local capacity of communities in the region more effectively. 34

35 (4) The department shall contract on a regional basis for surveys 36 of key sectors of the regional economy and the coordination of 37 technical assistance to businesses and employees within the key 38 sectors. The department's selection of contracting organizations or

consortiums shall be based on the sufficiency of the organization's or 1 2 consortium's proposal to examine key sectors of the local economy within its region adequately and its ability to coordinate the delivery 3 of services required by businesses within the targeted sectors. 4 Organizations contracting with the department shall work closely with 5 6 the department to examine the local economy and to develop strategies 7 to focus on developing key sectors that show potential for long-term sustainable growth. The contracting organization shall survey 8 businesses and employees in targeted sectors on a periodic basis to 9 gather information on the sector's business needs, expansion plans, 10 relocation decisions, training needs, potential layoffs, financing 11 needs, availability of financing, and other appropriate information 12 13 about economic trends and specific employer and employee needs in the 14 region.

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<del>(5)</del>)) <u>shall include two broad areas of work:</u>

16 (1) Direct assistance, including business planning, to companies 17 who need support to stay in business, expand, or relocate to Washington 18 from out of state or other countries. Assistance includes:

(a) Working with the appropriate partners, including but not 19 20 limited to, local governments, workforce development organizations, 21 port districts, community colleges and higher education institutions, export assistance providers, the Washington manufacturing services, the 2.2 Washington state quality award, council, small business assistance 23 programs, and other federal, state, and local programs to facilitate 24 the alignment of planning efforts and the seamless delivery of business 25 26 support services in the county;

(b) Providing information on state and local permitting processes,
 tax issues, and other essential information for operating, expanding,
 or locating a business in Washington;

30 (c) Marketing Washington and local areas as excellent locations to 31 expand or relocate a business and positioning Washington as a globally 32 competitive place to grow business, which may include developing and 33 executing regional plans to attract companies from out of state;

34 (d) Working with businesses on site location and selection 35 <u>assistance;</u>

36 (e) Providing business retention and expansion services, including 37 business outreach and monitoring efforts to identify and address 38 challenges and opportunities faced by businesses; and

(f) Participate in economic development system-wide discussions 1

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regarding gaps in business start-up assistance in Washington; and (2) Support for regional economic research and regional planning 3

efforts to implement target industry strategies and other economic 4 development strategies that support increased living standards and 5 increase foreign direct investment throughout Washington. Activities 6 7 include:

(a) Participation in regional planning efforts involving combined 8 strategies around workforce development and economic development 9 policies and programs. The contracting organization shall participate 10 with the ((workforce training and education coordinating board as 11 12 created in chapter 28C.18 RCW, and any regional entities designated by 13 that board,)) state board for community and technical colleges as created in RCW 28B.50.050, and any community and technical colleges in 14 providing for the coordination of job skills training within its 15 16 region;

17 (b) Collecting and reporting data as specified by the contract with the department for statewide systemic analysis. The department shall 18 consult with the Washington state economic development commission in 19 20 the establishment of such uniform data as is needed to conduct a 21 statewide systemic analysis of the state's economic development programs and expenditures. In cooperation with other local, regional, 22 and state planning efforts, contracting organizations may provide 23 24 insight into the needs of target industry clusters, business expansion plans, early detection of potential relocations or layoffs, training 25 26 needs, and other appropriate economic information;

27 (c) In conjunction with other governmental jurisdictions and institutions, participate in the development of a countywide economic 28 development plan, consistent with the state comprehensive plan for 29 economic development developed by the Washington state economic 30 31 development commission.

32 NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. (1) Contracting associate development organizations shall provide the department with measures of their 33 34 performance. Annual reports shall include information on the impact of 35 the contracting organization on employment, wages, tax revenue, and 36 capital investment. Specific measures shall be developed in the

contracting process between the department and the contracting
 organization every two years. Performance measures should be
 consistent across regions to allow for statewide evaluation.

4 (2)(a) The department and contracting organizations shall agree
5 upon specific target levels for the performance measures in subsection
6 (1) of this section. Comparison of agreed thresholds and actual
7 performance shall occur annually.

8 (b) Contracting organizations that fail to achieve the agreed 9 performance targets in more than one-half of the agreed measures shall 10 develop remediation plans to address performance gaps. The remediation 11 plans shall include revised performance thresholds specifically chosen 12 to provide evidence of progress in making the identified service 13 changes.

14 (c) Contracts and state funding shall be terminated for one year for organizations that fail to achieve the agreed upon progress toward 15 improved performance defined under (b) of this subsection. During the 16 17 year in which termination for nonperformance is in effect, organizations shall review alternative delivery strategies to include 18 reorganization of the contracting organization, merging of previous 19 efforts with existing regional partners, and other specific steps 20 21 toward improved performance. At the end of the period of termination, 22 the department may contract with the associate development organization 23 or its successor as it deems appropriate.

(3) The department shall report to the legislature and the
Washington economic development commission by December 31st of each
year on the performance results of the contracts with associate
development organizations.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. Up to five associate development organizations per year contracting with the department under this act that apply for the Washington state quality award or its equivalent shall receive reimbursement for the award application fee, but may not be reimbursed more than once every three years.

33 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. To the extent that funds are specifically 34 appropriated therefor, contracts with associate development 35 organizations for the provision of services under RCW 43.330.080(1) 36 shall be awarded according to the following annual schedule:

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1 (1) For associate development associations serving urban counties, 2 which are counties other than rural counties as defined in RCW 3 43.160.020, a locally matched allocation of up to ninety cents per 4 capita, totaling no more than three hundred thousand dollars per 5 organization; and

6 (2) For associate development associations in rural counties, as 7 defined in RCW 43.160.020, a per county base allocation of up to forty 8 thousand dollars and a locally matched allocation of up to ninety cents 9 per capita.

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 6. Sections 3 through 5 of this act are each 11 added to chapter 43.330 RCW.

12 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7. If specific funding for the purposes of this 13 act, referencing this act by bill or chapter number, is not provided by 14 June 30, 2007, in the omnibus appropriations act, this act is null and 15 void.
