AN ACT Relating to evaluating selected child welfare practices to determine their impact on remediating racial disproportionality in Washington's child welfare system; adding a new section to chapter 13.34 RCW; and creating a new section.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

(1) The legislature finds that research 6 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. 7 conducted by the Washington state institute for public policy released in June 2008, demonstrates that racial disproportionality exists in 8 9 Washington's child welfare system and that the greatest 10 disproportionality occurs when the initial referral to child protective 11 services is made and when the decision is made to place a child in outof-home care. The institute's research also demonstrates that children 12 13 of African-American, Native American, and Latino families have disproportionately longer lengths of stay in foster care. 14

15 (2) The legislature finds further that the department of social and health services, in a December 2008 report issued pursuant to 16 Bill No. 1472 2007, identified 17 Substitute House of initial 18 recommendations for remediation of racial diproportionality, including 19 examining specific current child welfare practices, structured

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decision-making and family team decision-making, to determine whether and how these practices might result in reducing or eliminating racial disproportionality.

4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 13.34 RCW 5 to read as follows:

б (1) Within amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, or 7 within funding made available by private grant or contribution, the Washington state institute for public policy shall evaluate the 8 department of social and health services' use of structured decision-9 10 making practices and implementation of the family team decision-making 11 model to determine whether and how those child protection and child 12 welfare efforts result in reducing disproportionate representation of African-American, Native American, and Latino children in the state's 13 14 child welfare system. The institute shall analyze the points in the system at which current data reflect the greatest 15 levels of disproportionality. The institute shall report its findings to the 16 legislature and the department of social and health services by 17 18 September 1, 2010.

19 (2) If adequate funding is not made available through state 20 appropriation or through private grant or contribution to 21 simultaneously study the impact on racial disproportionality of both 22 the structured decision-making process and family team decision-making 23 model, the institute shall first study and report on the family team decision-making model. The department of social and health services 24 25 and the Washington state institute for public policy jointly, shall:

(a) Promptly complete and execute a data sharing agreement to
comply with the department's confidential or records requirements and
to provide the institute with data and other information necessary to
conduct its evaluation; and

30 (b) Identify potential sources of private funding to supplement any31 state appropriated amounts.

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
