SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 2655

State of Washington 61st Legislature 2010 Regular Session

By House Higher Education (originally sponsored by Representatives Wallace, Seaquist, Anderson, Maxwell, and Kessler)

AN ACT Relating to expanding the higher education system upon proven demand; amending RCW 28B.50.020, 28B.50.810, 28B.76.020, 28B.76.230, 28B.120.005, 28B.120.010, and 28B.120.020; and creating a new section.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

The legislature finds that the state б NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. 7 institutions of higher education are providing a high quality education to the citizens of the state. The legislature further finds that to 8 9 meet goals of the strategic master plan for higher education the state 10 needs a higher education system that is capable of delivering many more 11 The legislature also finds that expansion of the system degrees. should be based on the proven demands of the citizens and the 12 13 marketplace, a concept called "expand on demand." The legislature finds that the higher education coordinating board, 14 further in 15 collaboration with the state board for community and technical 16 colleges, the two-year and four-year institutions of higher education, 17 and other stakeholders developed a system design plan that contains 18 seven guiding principles for system expansion, focuses near-term 19 enrollment growth at university branch campuses, comprehensive

universities, and university centers where existing capacity is 1 2 available without new state capital investment, establishes a process for evaluating major new capital expansion, and creates a fund for 3 4 innovation to foster change and innovation in higher education The legislature finds that the strategies in the plan 5 delivery. support the concept of expand on demand and would increase degree 6 7 production by first reinvesting in higher education to use existing 8 capacity while also providing long-term strategies to guide decisions on when and where to build new campuses, significantly expand existing 9 10 sites, and change missions of existing institutions.

11 The legislature endorses the system design plan, approved by the 12 higher education coordinating board in November 2009, and adopts the 13 recommendations and strategies in the plan.

14 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28B.50.020 and 2009 c 64 s 2 are each amended to read 15 as follows:

16 The purpose of this chapter is to provide for the dramatically 17 increasing number of students requiring high standards of education 18 either as a part of the continuing higher education program or for 19 occupational education and training, or for adult basic skills and 20 literacy education, by creating a new, independent system of community 21 and technical colleges which will:

(1) Offer an open door to every citizen, regardless of his or her academic background or experience, at a cost normally within his or her economic means;

25 (2) Ensure that each college district shall offer thoroughly 26 comprehensive educational, training, and service programs to meet the 27 needs of both the communities and students served by combining high 28 standards of excellence in academic transfer courses; realistic and 29 practical courses in occupational education, both graded and ungraded; 30 community services of an educational, cultural, and recreational 31 nature; and adult education, including basic skills and general, 32 family, and workforce literacy programs and services;

(3) Provide for basic skills and literacy education, and
 occupational education and technical training at technical colleges in
 order to prepare students for careers in a competitive workforce;

36 (4) Provide or coordinate related and supplemental instruction for37 apprentices at community and technical colleges;

1 (5) Provide administration by state and local boards which will 2 avoid unnecessary duplication of facilities or programs; and which will 3 encourage efficiency in operation and creativity and imagination in 4 education, training, and service to meet the needs of the community and 5 students;

6 (6) Allow for the growth, improvement, flexibility and modification
7 of the community colleges and their education, training, and service
8 programs as future needs occur; and

9 (7) Establish firmly that((, except on a pilot basis)) as provided 10 under RCW 28B.50.810, community colleges are, for purposes of academic 11 training, two year institutions, and are an independent, unique, and 12 vital section of our state's higher education system, separate from 13 both the common school system and other institutions of higher 14 learning((, and never to be considered for conversion into four-year 15 liberal arts colleges)).

16 **Sec. 3.** RCW 28B.50.810 and 2008 c 166 s 2 are each amended to read 17 as follows:

18 (1) ((By April 2006,)) The college board ((shall)) may select ((four)) community or technical colleges to develop and offer programs 19 20 of study leading to ((an)) applied baccalaureate degrees. ((At least 21 one of the four pilot programs chosen must lead to a baccalaureate of 22 applied science degree which builds on an associate of applied science 23 degree. The college board shall convene a task force that includes 24 representatives of both the community and technical colleges to develop 25 objective selection criteria.

26 (2) By February 2008, the college board shall select up to three 27 colleges to develop and offer programs of study leading to an applied 28 baccalaureate degree. At least one of the colleges selected must be a 29 technical college. The college board shall use the objective selection 30 criteria developed under subsections (1) and (3) of this section to 31 make the selection.

32 (3)) Colleges may submit ((an)) applications to ((become a pilot 33 college under this section)) the college board. The college board and 34 the higher education coordinating board shall review the applications 35 and select the ((pilot)) colleges using objective criteria, including, 36 but not limited to:

(a) The college demonstrates the capacity to make a long-term
 commitment of resources to build and sustain a high quality program;

3 (b) The college has or can readily engage faculty appropriately 4 qualified to develop and deliver a high quality curriculum at the 5 baccalaureate level;

6 (c) The college can demonstrate demand for the proposed program 7 from a sufficient number of students within its service area to make 8 the program cost-effective and feasible to operate;

9 (d) The college can demonstrate that employers demand the level of 10 technical training proposed within the program, making it cost-11 effective for students to seek the degree; and

12 (e) The proposed program fills a gap in options available for 13 students because it is not offered by a public four-year institution of 14 higher education in the college's geographic area.

15 (((4))) (2) A college selected ((as a pilot college)) under this section may develop the curriculum for and design and deliver courses 16 leading to an applied baccalaureate degree. However, degree programs 17 18 developed under this section are subject to approval by the college 19 board under RCW 28B.50.090 and by the higher education coordinating 20 board under RCW 28B.76.230 before a ((pilot)) college may enroll 21 students in upper division courses. ((A pilot college approved under 22 subsection (1) of this section may not enroll students in upper 23 division courses before the fall academic quarter of 2006. A pilot 24 college approved under subsection (2) of this section may not enroll students in upper division courses before the fall academic quarter of 25 26 $\frac{2009.}{}$

27 Sec. 4. RCW 28B.76.020 and 1985 c 370 s 2 are each amended to read 28 as follows:

29 ((For the purposes of this chapter:)) The definitions in this
30 section apply throughout this chapter unless the context clearly
31 requires otherwise.

(1) "Board" means the higher education coordinating board((; and)).
 (2) "Four-year institutions" means the University of Washington,
 Washington State University, Central Washington University, Eastern
 Washington University, Western Washington University, and The Evergreen
 State College.

(3) "Major expansion" means expansion of the higher education
 system that requires significant new capital investment, including
 building new institutions, campuses, branches, or centers or
 significant expansion of existing campuses, branches, or centers.

5 (4) "Mission change" means a change in the level of degree awarded
 6 or institutional type not currently authorized in statute.

7 **Sec. 5.** RCW 28B.76.230 and 2005 c 258 s 11 are each amended to 8 read as follows:

9 (1) The board shall develop a comprehensive and ongoing assessment 10 process to analyze the need for additional degrees and programs, 11 additional off-campus centers and locations for degree programs, and 12 consolidation or elimination of programs by the four-year institutions. 13 <u>Major expansion and proposed mission changes may be proposed by the</u> 14 <u>board, any public institution of higher education, or by a state or</u> 15 <u>local government.</u>

16 (2) As part of the needs assessment process, the board shall 17 examine:

(a) Projections of student, employer, and community demand for
 education and degrees, including liberal arts degrees, on a regional
 and statewide basis;

(b) Current and projected degree programs and enrollment at public and private institutions of higher education, by location and mode of service delivery; and

(c) Data from the workforce training and education coordinating board and the state board for community and technical colleges on the supply and demand for workforce education and certificates and associate degrees.

(3) Every two years the board shall produce, jointly with the state 28 29 board for community and technical colleges and the workforce training and education coordinating board, an assessment of the number and type 30 31 of higher education and training credentials required to match employer demand for a skilled and educated workforce. 32 The assessment shall include the number of forecasted net job openings at each level of 33 higher education and training and the number of credentials needed to 34 35 match the forecast of net job openings.

36 (4) The board shall determine whether certain major lines of study37 or types of degrees, including applied degrees or research-oriented

1 degrees, shall be assigned uniquely to some institutions or 2 institutional sectors in order to create centers of excellence that 3 focus resources and expertise.

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(5) The following activities are subject to approval by the board:

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(b) Creation of any off-campus program by a four-year institution;

7 (c) Purchase or lease of major off-campus facilities by a four-year
8 institution or a community or technical college;

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(d) Creation of higher education centers and consortia;

(a) New degree programs by a four-year institution;

10 (e) New degree programs and creation of off-campus programs by an 11 independent college or university in collaboration with a community or 12 technical college; and

13 (f) Applied baccalaureate degree programs developed by colleges 14 under RCW 28B.50.810.

(6) Institutions seeking board approval under this section must demonstrate that the proposal is justified by the needs assessment developed under this section. Institutions must also demonstrate how the proposals align with or implement the statewide strategic master plan for higher education under RCW 28B.76.200.

20 (7) The board shall develop clear guidelines and objective 21 decision-making criteria regarding approval of proposals under this 22 section, which must include review and consultation with the 23 institution and other interested agencies and individuals.

(8) The board shall periodically recommend consolidation or
 elimination of programs at the four-year institutions, based on the
 needs assessment analysis.

27 (9) In the case of a proposed major expansion or mission change, the needs assessment process under subsection (2) of this section 28 constitutes a threshold inquiry. If the board determines that the need 29 for the proposed major expansion or mission change has not been 30 justified, the inquiry is concluded. If the board determines that the 31 need for the proposed major expansion or mission change has been 32 sufficiently established, the board, in consultation with any directly 33 involved institutions and other interested agencies and individuals, 34 shall proceed to examine the viability of the proposal using criteria 35 36 including, but not limited to:

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(a) The specific scope of the project including the capital

1	investment requirements, the number of full-time equivalent students
2	anticipated, and the number of academic programs planned;
3	(b) The existence of an efficient and sustainable financial plan;
4	(c) The extent to which existing resources can be leveraged;
5	(d) The current and five-year projected student population,
б	faculty, and staff to support the proposed programs, institution, or
7	innovation;
8	(e) The plans to accommodate expected growth over a twenty-year
9	time frame;
10	(f) The extent to which new or existing partnerships and
11	collaborations are a part of the proposal; and
12	(g) The feasibility of any proposed innovations to accelerate
13	degree production.
14	(10) After the board completes its evaluation of the proposed major
15	expansion or mission change using the needs assessment under subsection
16	(2) of this section and viability determination under subsection (9) of
17	this section, the board shall make a recommendation to either proceed,
18	modify, or not proceed with the proposed major expansion or mission
19	change. The board's recommendation shall be presented to the governor
20	and the legislature.

21 **Sec. 6.** RCW 28B.120.005 and 1999 c 169 s 2 are each amended to 22 read as follows:

23 The legislature finds that encouraging collaboration among the 24 various educational sectors to meet statewide productivity and 25 educational attainment needs as described in the system design plan 26 developed by the higher education coordinating board will strengthen the entire educational system, kindergarten through twelfth grade and 27 28 higher education. The legislature also recognizes that the most 29 effective way to develop innovative and collaborative programs is to encourage institutions to develop them voluntarily, in line with 30 31 established state goals. Through a system of competitive grants, the 32 legislature shall encourage the development of innovative and collaborative and cost-effective solutions to issues of critical 33 34 statewide need, including:

35 (1) <u>Raising educational attainment and planning and piloting</u> 36 <u>innovative initiatives to reach new locations and populations;</u> (2) Recognizing needs of special populations of students, including
 access and completion efforts targeting underrepresented populations;

3 (((2))) (3) Furthering the development of learner-centered, 4 technology-assisted course delivery, including expansion of online and 5 hybrid coursework, open courseware, and other uses of technology;

6 (((3))) (4) Furthering the development of competency-based
7 measurements of student achievement to be used as the basis for
8 awarding degrees and certificates; ((and

9 (4))) (5) Increasing the collaboration among both public and 10 private sector institutions of higher education; and

11 (6) Improving productivity through innovations such as accelerated 12 programs and alternative scheduling.

13 **Sec. 7.** RCW 28B.120.010 and 1999 c 169 s 5 are each amended to 14 read as follows:

The Washington fund for innovation and quality in higher education 15 program is established. The higher education coordinating board shall 16 administer the program ((for the purpose of awarding grants in which a 17 four-year institution of higher education is named as the lead 18 institution. The state board for community and technical colleges 19 20 shall administer the program for the purpose of awarding grants in which a community or technical college is named as the lead 21 institution)) and shall work in close collaboration with the state 22 board for community and technical colleges and other local and regional 23 Through this program the higher education coordinating 24 entities. 25 board((s)) may award on a competitive basis incentive grants to state 26 public or private nonprofit institutions of higher education or consortia of institutions to encourage ((cooperative)) programs 27 designed to address specific system problems. ((Grants shall not 28 29 exceed a two-year period.)) Each institution or consortia of 30 institutions receiving the award shall contribute some financial support, either by covering part of the costs for the program during 31 32 its implementation, or by assuming continuing support at the end of the grant period. ((Strong priority will be given to proposals that 33 34 involve more than one sector of education, and to proposals that show 35 substantive institutional commitment.)) Institutions are encouraged to 36 solicit nonstate funds to support these cooperative programs.

1 Sec. 8. RCW 28B.120.020 and 1999 c 169 s 3 are each amended to 2 read as follows:

3 The higher education coordinating board shall have the following 4 powers and duties in administering the program for those proposals in 5 which a four-year institution of higher education is named as the lead 6 institution and fiscal agent:

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(1) To adopt rules necessary to carry out the program;

8 (2) ((To establish one or more review committees to assist in the 9 evaluation of proposals for funding. The review committee shall 10 include individuals with significant experience in higher education in 11 areas relevant to one or more of the funding period priorities and 12 shall include representatives from both the four-year and two-year 13 sectors of higher education;

14 (3)) To award grants no later than September 1st in those years 15 when funding is available by June 30th;

(((4))) (3) To establish each biennium specific guidelines for 16 17 submitting grant proposals consistent with RCW 28B.120.005 and consistent with the strategic master plan for higher education, the 18 19 system design plan, the overall goals of the program and ((consistent 20 with)) the guidelines established by the state board for community and 21 technical colleges under RCW 28B.120.025. ((During the 1999-01 22 biennium the guidelines shall be consistent with the following desired 23 outcomes of:

24 (a) Minority and diversity initiatives that encourage the 25 participation of minorities in higher education, including students 26 with disabilities;

27 (b) K-12 teacher preparation models that encourage collaboration 28 between higher education and K-12 to improve the preparedness of 29 teachers, including provisions for higher education faculty involved 30 with teacher preparation to spend time teaching in K-12 schools;

31 (c) Collaborative instructional programs involving K-12, community 32 and technical colleges, and four-year institutions of higher education 33 to develop a three-year degree program, or reduce the time to degree;

34 (d) Contracts with public or private institutions or businesses to 35 provide services or the development of collaborative programs;

36 (e) Articulation and transfer activities to smooth the transfer of 37 students from K-12 to higher education, or from the community colleges 38 and technical colleges to four-year institutions; (f) Projects that further the development of learner-centered,
 technology-assisted course delivery; and

3 (g) Projects that further the development of competency-based
4 measurements of student achievement to be used as the basis for
5 awarding degrees and certificates.))

б After June 30, 2001, and each biennium thereafter, the board shall determine funding priorities for ((collaborative)) proposals for the 7 8 biennium in consultation with the governor, the legislature, the office of the superintendent of public instruction, the state board for 9 10 community and technical colleges, the workforce training and education coordinating board, higher education institutions, educational 11 12 associations, and business and community groups consistent with statewide needs; 13

14 (((5))) <u>(4)</u> To solicit grant proposals and provide information to 15 the institutions of higher education about the program; and

16 (((6))) <u>(5)</u> To establish reporting, evaluation, accountability, 17 monitoring, and dissemination requirements for the recipients of the 18 grants awarded by the higher education coordinating board.

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
