1 AN ACT Relating to eliminating the public printer and transferring
2 print functions to the department of information services; amending RCW
3 43.78.030, 43.78.070, 43.78.090, 43.78.100, 43.78.105, 43.78.110,
4 43.78.170, 43.105.041, 1.08.039, 15.24.085, 15.62.190, 16.67.170,
5 28A.300.040, 28B.10.029, 40.04.030, 40.06.030, 40.07.050, and
6 43.08.061; reenacting and amending RCW 43.105.020 and 41.06.070; adding
7 new sections to chapter 43.105 RCW; creating a new section; recodifying
8 RCW 43.78.030, 43.78.070, 43.78.090, 43.78.100, 43.78.105, 43.78.110,
9 43.78.130, 43.78.140, 43.78.150, 43.78.160, and 43.78.170; repealing
10 RCW 43.78.010, 43.78.020, 43.78.040, 43.78.050, and 43.78.080; and
11 providing effective dates.

12 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

13 **Sec. 1.** RCW 43.78.030 and 1994 c 82 s 1 are each amended to read
14 as follows:

15 The ((~~public printer~~)) department shall print and bind the session
16 laws, the journals of the two houses of the legislature, all bills,
17 resolutions, documents, and other printing and binding of either the
18 senate or house, as the same may be ordered by the legislature; and
19 such forms, blanks, record books, and printing and binding of every

1 description as may be ordered by all state officers, boards,
2 commissions, and institutions, and the supreme court, and the court of
3 appeals and officers thereof, as the same may be ordered on
4 requisition, from time to time, by the proper authorities. This
5 section shall not apply to the printing of the supreme court and the
6 court of appeals reports, to the printing of bond certificates or bond
7 offering disclosure documents, to the printing of educational
8 publications of the state historical societies, or to any printing done
9 or contracted for by institutions of higher education: PROVIDED, That
10 institutions of higher education, in consultation with the ((~~public~~
11 ~~printer~~)) department, develop vendor selection procedures comparable to
12 those used by the ((~~public-printer~~)) department for contracted printing
13 jobs. Where any institution or institution of higher learning of the
14 state is or may become equipped with facilities for doing such work, it
15 may do any printing: (1) For itself, or (2) for any other state
16 institution when such printing is done as part of a course of study
17 relative to the profession of printer. Any printing and binding of
18 whatever description as may be needed by any institution or agency of
19 the state department of social and health services not at Olympia, or
20 the supreme court or the court of appeals or any officer thereof, the
21 estimated cost of which shall not exceed one thousand dollars, may be
22 done by any private printing company in the general vicinity within the
23 state of Washington so ordering, if in the judgment of the officer of
24 the agency so ordering, the saving in time and processing justifies the
25 award to such local private printing concern.

26 Beginning on July 1, 1989, and on July 1st of each succeeding odd-
27 numbered year, the dollar limit specified in this section shall be
28 adjusted as follows: The office of financial management shall
29 calculate such limit by adjusting the previous biennium's limit by an
30 appropriate federal inflationary index reflecting the rate of inflation
31 for the previous biennium. Such amounts shall be rounded to the
32 nearest fifty dollars.

33 **Sec. 2.** RCW 43.78.070 and 2009 c 549 s 5148 are each amended to
34 read as follows:

35 The ((~~public-printer~~)) department shall use the state printing
36 plant upon the following conditions((~~, to wit~~)):

1 (1) (~~He or she~~) The department shall do the public printing, and
2 charge (~~therefor the~~) fees as provided by law. (~~He or she~~) The
3 department may print the Washington Reports for the publishers
4 (~~thereof~~) under a contract (~~approved in writing by the governor~~).

5 (2) The gross income (~~of the public printer~~) from public printing
6 shall be deposited in an account designated "state printing plant
7 revolving fund" in depositories approved by the state treasurer, and
8 shall be disbursed (~~by the public printer by check and only~~) as
9 follows:

10 First, in payment of the actual cost of labor, material, supplies,
11 replacements, repairs, water, light, heat, telephone, rent, and all
12 other expenses necessary in the operation of the plant: PROVIDED, That
13 no machinery shall be purchased except on written approval of the
14 (~~governor~~) director;

15 Second, in payment of the cost of reasonable insurance upon the
16 printing plant, payable to the state (~~and of all fidelity bonds~~
17 ~~required by law of the public printer~~);

18 Third, (~~in payment to the public printer of a salary which shall~~
19 ~~be fixed by the governor in accordance with the provisions of RCW~~
20 ~~43.03.040~~;

21 ~~Fourth,~~) in remitting the balance to the state treasurer for the
22 general fund: PROVIDED, That a reasonable sum to be determined by the
23 (~~governor, the public printer,~~) department and the director of
24 financial management shall be retained in the fund for working capital
25 (~~for the public printer~~).

26 **Sec. 3.** RCW 43.78.090 and 1965 c 8 s 43.78.090 are each amended to
27 read as follows:

28 Whenever required by law or by the legislature or by any state
29 officer, board, commission, or institution the (~~public printer~~)
30 department shall keep the type used in printing any matter forming a
31 part of the first, second, third, and fourth classes standing for a
32 period not exceeding sixty days for use in reprinting such matter.

33 **Sec. 4.** RCW 43.78.100 and 1993 c 379 s 106 are each amended to
34 read as follows:

35 The (~~public printer~~) department shall furnish all paper, stock,
36 and binding materials required in all public work, and shall charge the

1 same to the state, as it is actually used, at the actual price at which
2 it was purchased plus (~~five percent~~) an amount sufficient to cover
3 the cost for waste, insurance, storage, and handling. This section
4 does not apply to institutions of higher education.

5 **Sec. 5.** RCW 43.78.105 and 1993 c 379 s 105 are each amended to
6 read as follows:

7 The (~~public printer~~) department may use the state printing plant
8 for the purposes of printing or furnishing materials under RCW
9 43.78.100 (as recodified by this act) if an interlocal agreement under
10 chapter 39.34 RCW has been executed between an institution of higher
11 education and the (~~public printer~~) department.

12 **Sec. 6.** RCW 43.78.110 and 2009 c 486 s 12 are each amended to read
13 as follows:

14 (1) Whenever in the judgment of the (~~public printer~~) department
15 certain printing, ruling, binding, or supplies can be secured from
16 private sources more economically than by doing the work or preparing
17 the supplies in the state printing plant, the (~~public printer~~)
18 department may obtain such work or supplies from such private sources.
19 The solicitation for the contract opportunity must be posted on the
20 state's common vendor registration and bid notification system. The
21 (~~public printer~~) department shall develop procurement policies and
22 procedures, such as unbundled contracting and subcontracting, that
23 encourage and facilitate the purchase of such services or supplies from
24 Washington small businesses to the maximum extent practicable and
25 consistent with international trade agreement commitments.

26 (2) In event any work or supplies are secured on behalf of the
27 state under this section the state printing plant shall be entitled to
28 add up to five percent to the cost (~~thereof~~) to cover the handling of
29 the orders which shall be added to the bills and charged to the
30 respective authorities ordering the work or supplies. (~~The five~~
31 ~~percent handling charge shall not apply to contracts with institutions~~
32 ~~of higher education.~~)

33 (3) The definitions in this subsection apply throughout this
34 section.

35 (a) "Common vendor registration and bid notification system" has
36 the definition in RCW 39.29.006.

1 (b) "Small business" has the definition in RCW 39.29.006.

2 **Sec. 7.** RCW 43.78.170 and 2009 c 356 s 5 are each amended to read
3 as follows:

4 The ((~~public printer~~)) department shall use one hundred percent
5 recycled copy and printing paper for all jobs printed on white copy and
6 printing paper.

7 **Sec. 8.** RCW 43.105.020 and 2009 c 565 s 32, 2009 c 509 s 7, and
8 2009 c 486 s 14 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

9 The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter
10 unless the context clearly ((~~required [requires]~~)) requires otherwise.

11 (1) "Administrator" means the community technology opportunity
12 program administrator designated by the department.

13 (2) "Backbone network" means the shared high-density portions of
14 the state's telecommunications transmission facilities. It includes
15 specially conditioned high-speed communications carrier lines,
16 multiplexors, switches associated with such communications lines, and
17 any equipment and software components necessary for management and
18 control of the backbone network.

19 (3) "Board" means the information services board.

20 (4) "Broadband" means a high-speed, high capacity transmission
21 medium, using land-based, satellite, wireless, or any other mechanism,
22 that can carry either signals or transmit data, or both, over long
23 distances by using a wide range of frequencies.

24 (5) "Committee" means the state interoperability executive
25 committee.

26 (6) "Common vendor registration and bid notification system" has
27 the definition in RCW 39.29.006.

28 (7) "Community technology programs" means programs that are engaged
29 in diffusing information and communications technology in local
30 communities, particularly in unserved and underserved areas of the
31 state. These programs may include, but are not limited to, programs
32 that provide education and skill-building opportunities, hardware and
33 software, internet connectivity, digital media literacy, development of
34 locally relevant content, and delivery of vital services through
35 technology.

1 (8) "Council" means the advisory council on digital inclusion
2 created in RCW 43.105.400.

3 (9) "Department" means the department of information services.

4 (10) "Director" means the director of the department.

5 (11) "Educational sectors" means those institutions of higher
6 education, school districts, and educational service districts that use
7 the network for distance education, data transmission, and other uses
8 permitted by the K-20 board.

9 (12) "Equipment" means the machines, devices, and transmission
10 facilities used in information processing, such as computers, word
11 processors, terminals, telephones, wireless communications system
12 facilities, cables, and any physical facility necessary for the
13 operation of such equipment.

14 (13) "High-speed internet" means broadband.

15 (14) "Information" includes, but is not limited to, data, text,
16 voice, and video.

17 (15) "Information processing" means the electronic capture,
18 collection, storage, manipulation, transmission, retrieval, and
19 presentation of information in the form of data, text, voice, or image
20 and includes telecommunications and office automation functions.

21 (16) "Information services" means data processing,
22 telecommunications, office automation, and computerized information
23 systems.

24 (17) "Information technology portfolio" or "portfolio" means a
25 strategic management process documenting relationships between agency
26 missions and information technology and telecommunications investments.

27 (18) "K-20 educational network board" or "K-20 board" means the K-
28 20 educational network board created in RCW 43.105.800.

29 (19) "K-20 network" means the network established in RCW
30 43.105.820.

31 (20) "K-20 network technical steering committee" or "committee"
32 means the K-20 network technical steering committee created in RCW
33 43.105.810.

34 (21) "Local governments" includes all municipal and quasi municipal
35 corporations and political subdivisions, and all agencies of such
36 corporations and subdivisions authorized to contract separately.

37 (22) "Office printers" means any device that allows an individual
38 user to print from a computer through a network.

1 (23) "Oversight" means a process of comprehensive risk analysis and
2 management designed to ensure optimum use of information technology
3 resources and telecommunications.

4 ~~((+23+))~~ (24) "Printer services" means services that provide office
5 printers and management of printer devices, supplies, consumables,
6 repair services, and support within an enterprise.

7 (25) "Proprietary software" means that software offered for sale or
8 license.

9 ~~((+24+))~~ (26) "Purchased services" means services provided by a
10 vendor to accomplish routine, continuing, and necessary functions.
11 This term includes, but is not limited to, services acquired for
12 equipment maintenance and repair, operation of a physical plant,
13 security, computer hardware and software installation and maintenance,
14 telecommunications installation and maintenance, data entry, keypunch
15 services, programming services, and computer time-sharing.

16 ~~((+25+))~~ (27) "Small business" has the definition in RCW 39.29.006.

17 ~~((+26+))~~ (28) "Telecommunications" means the transmission of
18 information by wire, radio, optical cable, electromagnetic, or other
19 means.

20 ~~((+27+))~~ (29) "Video telecommunications" means the electronic
21 interconnection of two or more sites for the purpose of transmitting
22 and/or receiving visual and associated audio information. Video
23 telecommunications shall not include existing public television
24 broadcast stations as currently designated by the department of
25 commerce under chapter 43.330 RCW.

26 **Sec. 9.** RCW 43.105.041 and 2009 c 486 s 13 are each amended to
27 read as follows:

28 (1) The board shall have the following powers and duties related to
29 information services:

30 (a) To develop standards and procedures governing the acquisition
31 and disposition of equipment, proprietary software and purchased
32 services, licensing of the radio spectrum by or on behalf of state
33 agencies, ~~((and))~~ confidentiality of computerized data, and standards
34 for printer services and office printers;

35 (b) To purchase, lease, rent, or otherwise acquire, dispose of, and
36 maintain equipment, proprietary software, and purchased services, or to
37 delegate to other agencies and institutions of state government, under

1 appropriate standards, the authority to purchase, lease, rent, or
2 otherwise acquire, dispose of, and maintain equipment, proprietary
3 software, and purchased services: PROVIDED, That, agencies and
4 institutions of state government are expressly prohibited from
5 acquiring or disposing of equipment, proprietary software, and
6 purchased services without such delegation of authority. The
7 acquisition and disposition of equipment, proprietary software, and
8 purchased services is exempt from RCW 43.19.1919 and, as provided in
9 RCW 43.19.1901, from the provisions of RCW 43.19.190 through 43.19.200,
10 except that the board, the department, and state agencies, as
11 delegated, must post notices of technology procurement bids on the
12 state's common vendor registration and bid notification system. This
13 subsection (1)(b) does not apply to the legislative branch;

14 (c) To develop statewide or interagency technical policies,
15 standards, and procedures;

16 (d) To review and approve standards and common specifications for
17 new or expanded telecommunications networks proposed by agencies,
18 public postsecondary education institutions, educational service
19 districts, or statewide or regional providers of K-12 information
20 technology services, and to assure the cost-effective development and
21 incremental implementation of a statewide video telecommunications
22 system to serve: Public schools; educational service districts;
23 vocational-technical institutes; community colleges; colleges and
24 universities; state and local government; and the general public
25 through public affairs programming;

26 (e) To provide direction concerning strategic planning goals and
27 objectives for the state. The board shall seek input from the
28 legislature and the judiciary;

29 (f) To develop and implement a process for the resolution of
30 appeals by:

31 (i) Vendors concerning the conduct of an acquisition process by an
32 agency or the department; or

33 (ii) A customer agency concerning the provision of services by the
34 department or by other state agency providers;

35 (g) To establish policies for the periodic review by the department
36 of agency performance which may include but are not limited to analysis
37 of:

38 (i) Planning, management, control, and use of information services;

1 (ii) Training and education; and

2 (iii) Project management;

3 (h) To set its meeting schedules and convene at scheduled times, or
4 meet at the request of a majority of its members, the chair, or the
5 director;

6 (i) To review and approve that portion of the department's budget
7 requests that provides for support to the board; and

8 (j) To develop procurement policies and procedures, such as
9 unbundled contracting and subcontracting, that encourage and facilitate
10 the purchase of products and services by state agencies and
11 institutions from Washington small businesses to the maximum extent
12 practicable and consistent with international trade agreement
13 commitments.

14 (2) Statewide technical standards to promote and facilitate
15 electronic information sharing and access are an essential component of
16 acceptable and reliable public access service and complement content-
17 related standards designed to meet those goals. The board shall:

18 (a) Establish technical standards to facilitate electronic access
19 to government information and interoperability of information systems,
20 including wireless communications systems. Local governments are
21 strongly encouraged to follow the standards established by the board;
22 and

23 (b) Require agencies to consider electronic public access needs
24 when planning new information systems or major upgrades of systems.

25 In developing these standards, the board is encouraged to include
26 the state library, state archives, and appropriate representatives of
27 state and local government.

28 (3)(a) The board, in consultation with the K-20 board, has the duty
29 to govern, operate, and oversee the technical design, implementation,
30 and operation of the K-20 network including, but not limited to, the
31 following duties: Establishment and implementation of K-20 network
32 technical policy, including technical standards and conditions of use;
33 review and approval of network design; procurement of shared network
34 services and equipment; and resolving user/provider disputes concerning
35 technical matters. The board shall delegate general operational and
36 technical oversight to the K-20 network technical steering committee as
37 appropriate.

1 (b) The board has the authority to adopt rules under chapter 34.05
2 RCW to implement the provisions regarding the technical operations and
3 conditions of use of the K-20 network.

4 **Sec. 10.** RCW 1.08.039 and 1955 c 235 s 8 are each amended to read
5 as follows:

6 The committee may enter into contracts or otherwise arrange for the
7 publication and/or distribution, provided for in RCW 1.08.038, with or
8 without calling for bids, by the (~~public printer~~) department of
9 information services or by private printer, upon specifications
10 formulated under the authority of RCW 1.08.037, and upon such basis as
11 the committee deems to be most expeditious and economical. Any such
12 contract may be upon such terms as the committee deems to be most
13 advantageous to the state and to potential purchasers of such
14 publications. The committee shall fix terms and prices for such
15 publications.

16 **Sec. 11.** RCW 15.24.085 and 2002 c 313 s 121 are each amended to
17 read as follows:

18 The restrictive provisions (~~of chapter 43.78~~) relating to public
19 printing in chapter 43.105 RCW shall not apply to promotional printing
20 and literature for the Washington apple commission, the Washington
21 state fruit commission, or the Washington state dairy products
22 commission.

23 **Sec. 12.** RCW 15.62.190 and 1989 c 5 s 19 are each amended to read
24 as follows:

25 The restrictive provisions (~~of chapter 43.78~~) relating to public
26 printing in chapter 43.105 RCW shall not apply to promotional printing
27 and literature for the Washington state honey bee commission.

28 **Sec. 13.** RCW 16.67.170 and 1969 c 133 s 16 are each amended to
29 read as follows:

30 The restrictive provisions (~~of chapter 43.78 RCW, as now or~~
31 ~~hereafter amended,~~) relating to public printing in chapter 43.105 RCW
32 shall not apply to promotional printing and literature for the
33 commission.

1 **Sec. 14.** RCW 28A.300.040 and 2009 c 556 s 10 are each amended to
2 read as follows:

3 In addition to any other powers and duties as provided by law, the
4 powers and duties of the superintendent of public instruction shall be:

5 (1) To have supervision over all matters pertaining to the public
6 schools of the state;

7 (2) To report to the governor and the legislature such information
8 and data as may be required for the management and improvement of the
9 schools;

10 (3) To prepare and have printed such forms, registers, courses of
11 study, rules for the government of the common schools, and such other
12 material and books as may be necessary for the discharge of the duties
13 of teachers and officials charged with the administration of the laws
14 relating to the common schools, and to distribute the same to
15 educational service district superintendents;

16 (4) To travel, without neglecting his or her other official duties
17 as superintendent of public instruction, for the purpose of attending
18 educational meetings or conventions, of visiting schools, and of
19 consulting educational service district superintendents or other school
20 officials;

21 (5) To prepare and from time to time to revise a manual of the
22 Washington state common school code, copies of which shall be made
23 available online and which shall be sold at approximate actual cost of
24 publication and distribution per volume to public and nonpublic
25 agencies or individuals, said manual to contain Titles 28A and 28C RCW,
26 rules related to the common schools, and such other matter as the state
27 superintendent or the state board of education shall determine.
28 Proceeds of the sale of such code shall be (~~transmitted to the public~~
29 ~~printer who shall credit the state superintendent's account within~~)
30 deposited in the state printing plant revolving fund (~~by a like~~
31 ~~amount~~) and credited to the state superintendent's account within the
32 fund;

33 (6) To file all papers, reports and public documents transmitted to
34 the superintendent by the school officials of the several counties or
35 districts of the state, each year separately. Copies of all papers
36 filed in the superintendent's office, and the superintendent's official
37 acts, may, or upon request, shall be certified by the superintendent

1 and attested by the superintendent's official seal, and when so
2 certified shall be evidence of the papers or acts so certified to;

3 (7) To require annually, on or before the 15th day of August, of
4 the president, manager, or principal of every educational institution
5 in this state, a report as required by the superintendent of public
6 instruction; and it is the duty of every president, manager, or
7 principal, to complete and return such forms within such time as the
8 superintendent of public instruction shall direct;

9 (8) To keep in the superintendent's office a record of all teachers
10 receiving certificates to teach in the common schools of this state;

11 (9) To issue certificates as provided by law;

12 (10) To keep in the superintendent's office at the capital of the
13 state, all books and papers pertaining to the business of the
14 superintendent's office, and to keep and preserve in the
15 superintendent's office a complete record of statistics, as well as a
16 record of the meetings of the state board of education;

17 (11) With the assistance of the office of the attorney general, to
18 decide all points of law which may be submitted to the superintendent
19 in writing by any educational service district superintendent, or that
20 may be submitted to the superintendent by any other person, upon appeal
21 from the decision of any educational service district superintendent;
22 and the superintendent shall publish his or her rulings and decisions
23 from time to time for the information of school officials and teachers;
24 and the superintendent's decision shall be final unless set aside by a
25 court of competent jurisdiction;

26 (12) To administer oaths and affirmations in the discharge of the
27 superintendent's official duties;

28 (13) To deliver to his or her successor, at the expiration of the
29 superintendent's term of office, all records, books, maps, documents
30 and papers of whatever kind belonging to the superintendent's office or
31 which may have been received by the superintendent's for the use of the
32 superintendent's office;

33 (14) To administer family services and programs to promote the
34 state's policy as provided in RCW 74.14A.025;

35 (15) To promote the adoption of school-based curricula and policies
36 that provide quality, daily physical education for all students, and to
37 encourage policies that provide all students with opportunities for
38 physical activity outside of formal physical education classes;

1 (16) To perform such other duties as may be required by law.

2 **Sec. 15.** RCW 28B.10.029 and 2004 c 167 s 10 are each amended to
3 read as follows:

4 (1) An institution of higher education may exercise independently
5 those powers otherwise granted to the director of general
6 administration in chapter 43.19 RCW in connection with the purchase and
7 disposition of all material, supplies, services, and equipment needed
8 for the support, maintenance, and use of the respective institution of
9 higher education. Property disposition policies followed by
10 institutions of higher education shall be consistent with policies
11 followed by the department of general administration. Purchasing
12 policies and procedures followed by institutions of higher education
13 shall be in compliance with chapters 39.19, 39.29, and 43.03 RCW, and
14 RCW 43.19.1901, 43.19.1906, 43.19.1911, 43.19.1917, 43.19.1937,
15 43.19.534, 43.19.685, 43.19.700 through 43.19.704, and 43.19.560
16 through 43.19.637. The community and technical colleges shall comply
17 with RCW 43.19.450. Except for the University of Washington,
18 institutions of higher education shall comply with RCW 43.41.310,
19 43.41.290, and 43.41.350. If an institution of higher education can
20 satisfactorily demonstrate to the director of the office of financial
21 management that the cost of compliance is greater than the value of
22 benefits from any of the following statutes, then it shall be exempt
23 from them: RCW 43.19.685; 43.19.534; and 43.19.637. Any institution
24 of higher education that chooses to exercise independent purchasing
25 authority for a commodity or group of commodities shall notify the
26 director of general administration. Thereafter the director of general
27 administration shall not be required to provide those services for that
28 institution for the duration of the general administration contract
29 term for that commodity or group of commodities.

30 (2) The council of presidents and the state board for community and
31 technical colleges shall convene its correctional industries business
32 development advisory committee, and work collaboratively with
33 correctional industries, to:

34 (a) Reaffirm purchasing criteria and ensure that quality, service,
35 and timely delivery result in the best value for expenditure of state
36 dollars;

1 (b) Update the approved list of correctional industries products
2 from which higher education shall purchase; and

3 (c) Develop recommendations on ways to continue to build
4 correctional industries' business with institutions of higher
5 education.

6 (3) Higher education and correctional industries shall develop a
7 plan to build higher education business with correctional industries to
8 increase higher education purchases of correctional industries
9 products, based upon the criteria established in subsection (2) of this
10 section. The plan shall include the correctional industries'
11 production and sales goals for higher education and an approved list of
12 products from which higher education institutions shall purchase, based
13 on the criteria established in subsection (2) of this section. Higher
14 education and correctional industries shall report to the legislature
15 regarding the plan and its implementation no later than January 30,
16 2005.

17 (4) Institutions of higher education shall set as a target to
18 contract, beginning not later than June 30, 2006, to purchase one
19 percent of the total goods and services required by the institutions
20 each year produced or provided in whole or in part from class II inmate
21 work programs operated by the department of corrections. Institutions
22 of higher education shall set as a target to contract, beginning not
23 later than June 30, 2008, to purchase two percent of the total goods
24 and services required by the institutions each year produced or
25 provided in whole or in part from class II inmate work programs
