AN ACT Relating to antiharassment strategies in public schools; amending RCW 28A.300.285; adding a new section to chapter 43.06B RCW; and creating a new section.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that despite a recognized law prohibiting harassment, intimidation, and bullying of 6 7 students in public schools and despite widespread adoption of 8 antiharassment policies by school districts, harassment of students continues and has not declined since the law was enacted. Furthermore, 9 10 students and parents continue to seek assistance against harassment, 11 and schools need to disseminate more widely their antiharassment 12 policies and procedures. The legislature intends to expand the tools, information, and strategies that can be used to combat harassment, 13 intimidation, and bullying of students, and increase awareness of the 14 15 need for respectful learning communities in all public schools.

16 Sec. 2. RCW 28A.300.285 and 2007 c 407 s 1 are each amended to 17 read as follows:

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(1) By August 1, ((2003)) <u>2011</u>, each school district shall adopt or

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amend if necessary a policy((, within the scope of its authority,)) and 1 2 procedure that at a minimum incorporates the revised model policy and procedure provided under subsection (4) of this section that prohibits 3 the harassment, intimidation, or bullying of any student. It is the 4 responsibility of each school district to share this policy with 5 parents or guardians, students, volunteers, and school employees in 6 7 accordance with rules adopted by the superintendent of public instruction. Each school district shall designate one person in the 8 district as the primary contact regarding the antiharassment, 9 intimidation, or bullying policy. The primary contact shall receive 10 copies of all formal and informal complaints, have responsibility for 11 12 assuring the implementation of the policy and procedure, and serve as 13 the primary contact on the policy and procedures between the school district, the office of the education ombudsman, and the office of the 14 superintendent of public instruction. 15

16 (2) "Harassment, intimidation, or bullying" means any intentional 17 electronic, written, verbal, or physical act, including but not limited 18 to one shown to be motivated by any characteristic in RCW 9A.36.080(3), 19 or other distinguishing characteristics, when the intentional 20 electronic, written, verbal, or physical act:

(a) Physically harms a student or damages the student's property;or

(b) Has the effect of substantially interfering with a student's education; or

25 (c) Is so severe, persistent, or pervasive that it creates an 26 intimidating or threatening educational environment; or

(d) Has the effect of substantially disrupting the orderlyoperation of the school.

Nothing in this section requires the affected student to actually possess a characteristic that is a basis for the harassment, intimidation, or bullying.

32 (3) The policy <u>and procedure</u> should be adopted or amended through 33 a process that includes representation of parents or guardians, school 34 employees, volunteers, students, administrators, and community 35 representatives. It is recommended that each such policy emphasize 36 positive character traits and values, including the importance of civil 37 and respectful speech and conduct, and the responsibility of students

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to comply with the district's policy prohibiting harassment,
 intimidation, or bullying.

(4)(a) By August 1, ((2002)) 2010, the superintendent of public 3 instruction, in consultation with representatives of parents, school 4 personnel, the office of the education ombudsman, the Washington state 5 <u>school_directors'_association</u>, and other interested parties, shall 6 provide to ((school districts and educational service districts a)) the 7 education committees of the legislature a revised and updated model 8 harassment, intimidation, and bullying prevention policy and procedure. 9 The superintendent of public instruction shall publish on its web site, 10 11 with a link to the safety center web page, the revised and updated model harassment, intimidation, and bullying prevention policy and 12 13 procedure, along with training and instructional materials on the 14 components that ((should)) shall be included in any district policy and procedure. The superintendent shall adopt rules regarding school 15 districts' communication of the policy and procedure to parents, 16 students, employees, and volunteers. ((Training-materials-shall-be 17 disseminated in a variety of ways, including workshops and other staff 18 developmental activities, and through the office of the superintendent 19 20 of public instruction's web site, with a link to the safety center web 21 page. On the web site:

22 (a) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall 23 post — its — model — policy, — recommended — training — materials, — and 24 instructional materials;))

25 (b) The office of the superintendent of public instruction has the 26 authority to update with new technologies access to this information in 27 the safety center, to the extent resources are made available((; and)). (c) ((Individual school districts shall have direct access to the 28 29 safety-center-web-site-to-post-a-brief-summary-of-their-policies, 30 programs, - partnerships, - vendors, - and - instructional - and - training materials, and to provide a link to the school district's web site for 31 further information.)) Each school district shall by August 15, 2011, 32 provide to the superintendent of public instruction a brief summary of 33 its policies, procedures, programs, partnerships, vendors, and 34 35 instructional and training materials to be posted on the school safety 36 center web site, and shall also provide the superintendent with a link 37 to the school district's web site for further information. The

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district's primary contact for bullying and harassment issues shall annually by August 15th verify posted information and links and notify the school safety center of any updates or changes.

(5) The Washington state school directors association, with the 4 assistance of the office of the superintendent of public instruction, 5 shall convene an advisory committee to develop a model policy б 7 prohibiting acts of harassment, intimidation, or bullying that are conducted via electronic means by a student while on school grounds and 8 during the school day. The policy shall include a requirement that 9 10 materials meant to educate parents and students about the seriousness of cyberbullying be disseminated to parents or made available on the 11 12 school district's web site. The school directors association and the advisory committee shall develop sample materials for school districts 13 14 to disseminate, which shall also include information on responsible and safe internet use as well as what options are available if a student is 15 being bullied via electronic means, including but not limited to, 16 17 reporting threats to local police and when to involve school officials, the internet service provider, or phone service provider. The school 18 directors association shall submit the model policy and sample 19 materials, along with a recommendation for local adoption, to the 20 21 governor and the legislature and shall post the model policy and sample 22 materials on its web site by January 1, 2008. Each school district board of directors shall establish its own policy by August 1, 2008. 23

(6) As used in this section, "electronic" or "electronic means"
means any communication where there is the transmission of information
by wire, radio, optical cable, electromagnetic, or other similar means.

27 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 43.06B RCW 28 to read as follows:

In addition to duties assigned under RCW 43.06B.020, the office of the education ombudsman shall serve as the lead agency to provide resources and tools to parents and families about public school antiharassment policies and strategies.
