AN ACT Relating to establishing the Washington investment trust; amending RCW 30.04.020, 42.56.270, 42.56.400, 43.08.135, and 43.84.080; reenacting and amending RCW 42.56.400; adding a new section to chapter 39.58 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 41.06 RCW; adding a new chapter to Title 43 RCW; creating a new section; providing an effective date; providing expiration dates; and declaring an emergency.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. FINDINGS--INTENT. (1) The legislature finds 8 9 that there are significant public infrastructure and higher education needs of the state that are unmet, and that the level of unmet need has 10 11 been exacerbated by the economic downturn. The legislature further finds that there are opportunities to use the state's depository assets 12 13 to generate additional benefit for the people and the economy of the Therefore, the legislature intends to create the Washington 14 state. 15 investment trust as a legacy institution that amasses sufficient 16 capital reserves to address opportunities now and in the future.

17 (2) The legislature intends that the investment trust may:

18 (a) Facilitate investment in, and financing of, public

infrastructure systems that will increase public health, safety, and quality of life, improve environmental conditions, and promote community vitality and economic growth;

4 (b) Assist students who are in need of additional low-cost student 5 loans in order to finance the cost of higher education; and

(c) Leverage Washington's financial capital and resources, and work
in partnership with financial institutions, community-based
organizations, economic development organizations, guaranty agencies,
and other stakeholder groups.

(3) The mission of the trust is to use Washington's depository 10 assets in ways that afford most efficient use of taxpayer revenues and 11 12 public resources for the benefit of the people and economy of the 13 The legislature intends for the trust to apply business state. 14 strategies to manage taxpayer revenues while concurrently meeting identified needs and strategic opportunities across the state. 15 In achieving its purpose of improving public infrastructure and increasing 16 17 access to higher education, the legislature intends for the trust to adhere to the following priorities: 18

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(b) Long-term viability;

21 (c) Social return and monetary return on investments;

(a) Institutional safety and soundness;

22 (d) Prudent and best banking and business practices;

(e) Highest ethical, accountability, and transparency standards;and

25 (f) Insulation from political influence.

26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. DEFINITIONS. The definitions in this 27 section apply throughout this chapter unless the context clearly 28 requires otherwise.

29 (1) "Board" means the advisory board of the Washington investment 30 trust.

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(2) "Commission" means the Washington investment trust commission.

32 (3) "Department" means the department of financial institutions.

33 (4) "Director" means the director of the department of financial 34 institutions.

35 (5) "Public infrastructure system" means a system of a local 36 government or political subdivision, a special purpose district, a 37 public school district, an institution of higher education as defined

in RCW 28B.10.016, a federally recognized Indian tribe, or the state, 1 2 including but not limited to a system involving: Wastewater treatment; 3 storm water management; solid waste disposal; drinking water treatment; 4 flood control levees; energy efficiency enhancements; roads, streets, and bridges; transportation infrastructure, including freight rail and 5 6 transit; broadband and telecommunications infrastructure; outdoor 7 recreation and habitat protection facilities; community, social 8 service, or public safety facilities; schools and educational facilities; and affordable housing as defined in RCW 43.63A.510. 9

10 (6) "State-chartered bank" means any corporation organized under 11 the laws of this state that is engaged in banking, other than a trust 12 company, savings association, or a mutual savings bank. It does not 13 include the Washington investment trust.

14 (7) "State moneys" has the same meaning as in RCW 43.85.200.

15 (8) "Treasurer" means the treasurer of the state of Washington.

16 (9) "Trust" means the Washington investment trust.

17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. CREATION. The Washington investment trust 18 is created.

19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. COMMISSION. (1) The Washington investment 20 trust commission is created as the primary governing authority of the 21 trust. The commission shall consist of the governor, the lieutenant 22 governor, and the state treasurer.

23 (2) The commission may adopt rules regarding the:

24 (a) Safety and soundness standards of the trust;

25 (b) Criteria for evaluating, approving, and monitoring loans;

26 (c) Eligibility requirements and limits for borrowing;

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(d) Transparency requirements for trust operations;

(e) Ethics and conflict of interest requirements for the commission, the board, and officers and employees of the trust, including rules to ensure that they perform their functions in compliance with chapter 42.52 RCW; and

32 (f) Other topics as needed for efficient administration of the 33 trust.

34 (3) The commission shall commence trust operations by July 1, 2013.
35 (4) The commission may delegate to the trust president such duties

and powers as deemed necessary to carry on the business of the trust
 and enforce this chapter efficiently and effectively. The commission
 may not delegate its rule-making or policy-making authority.

4 (5) The commission may adopt policies and procedures for its own 5 governance.

6 (6) The commission may establish technical advisory committees or 7 consult with public and private sector experts in substantive areas 8 related to the trust's mission, objectives, and duties.

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** TRANSITION BOARD. (1)(a) The trust 10 transition board is established, with members as provided in this 11 subsection.

(i) The president of the senate shall appoint one member from eachof the two largest caucuses of the senate.

14 (ii) The speaker of the house of representatives shall appoint one 15 member from each of the two largest caucuses of the house of 16 representatives.

(iii) The president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives jointly shall appoint seven citizen members with a background in banking or financial issues.

20 (b) The president of the senate and speaker of the house of 21 representatives jointly shall select the chair from among the citizen 22 membership. The chair shall convene the initial meeting of the trust 23 transition board within forty-five days after the effective date of 24 this section.

(2) The trust transition board shall develop and recommend the following to the commission within the timeline established by the commission:

(a) A start-up business plan for the trust that includes plans and
 timelines for functions that are new and functions transitioning to the
 trust that were previously performed by another entity;

(b) Initial capital requirements of the trust;

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(c) Options for capitalizing the trust; and

33 (d) Other items requested by the commission in order to commence 34 trust operations by July 1, 2013.

(3) Legislative members of the trust transition board must be
 reimbursed for travel expenses in accordance with RCW 44.04.120.
 Nonlegislative members, except those representing an employer or

organization, are entitled to be reimbursed for expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties under chapter 43.--- RCW (the new chapter created in section 27 of this act) in accordance with RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.

(4) The trust transition board may appoint an interim president and 5 other necessary staff who are exempt from the provisions of chapter б 7 41.06 RCW, and who serve at the board's pleasure on such terms and 8 conditions as the board determines but subject to chapter 42.52 RCW. 9 department must provide technical assistance to the trust The 10 transition board. The board may also contract with additional persons who have specific technical expertise if the expertise is necessary to 11 12 carry out the requirements of this section.

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(5) This section expires July 1, 2013.

14 NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. DEPOSIT OF PUBLIC FUNDS. (1)(a) The trust shall serve as the depository for state moneys once the trust has built 15 16 sufficient capacity to accept and manage state moneys, as determined by 17 the commission. The commission shall establish a process and time frame for the deposit of state moneys into the trust. In determining 18 whether the trust has built sufficient capacity, the commission shall 19 20 consider the minimum leverage capital requirements specified in 12 21 C.F.R. Sec. 325.3 (2011).

(b) The treasurer shall deposit state moneys in the trust in accordance with the time frame and guidelines determined by the commission under this subsection.

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(2) All deposits in the trust are guaranteed by the state.

(3) All income earned by the trust on state moneys that are
deposited in or invested with the trust must be credited to and become
a part of the revenues and income of the trust.

(4) The trust may accept deposits of public funds, but is exemptfrom the requirements of chapter 39.58 RCW.

(5) The trust may accept funds from any source, including federalfunds or other public funds.

33 (6) The commission shall review state accounts that contain public 34 funds that are not state moneys, and make recommendations to the 35 governor and the appropriate committees of the legislature as to which 36 accounts should be deposited in the trust. 1 (7) The trust must return earnings, beyond those necessary for 2 continued sound operation of the trust as determined by the commission, 3 to the state general fund.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7. INVESTMENT OF STATE MONEYS. The trust may invest state moneys deposited in the trust that are not reasonably expected to be necessary to meet the short or intermediate-term liquidity needs of the state. The state treasurer retains authority to manage and invest the amount of funds necessary to meet the operational needs of state government.

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 8. INFRASTRUCTURE LOANS. The trust is 11 authorized to facilitate investment in, and financing of, construction, 12 rehabilitation, replacement, and improvement of new and existing public 13 infrastructure systems. Before initiating operations, the commission 14 must present an implementation plan and any necessary legislation to 15 the governor and appropriate legislative committees, that:

16 (1) Identifies the public infrastructure systems that the trust 17 plans to target initially;

18 (2) Identifies any existing state programs that the trust 19 recommends be transferred under its umbrella, and the steps and 20 timelines for the transitions;

(3) Describes additional financing products and services the trust plans to offer, the target markets, anticipated rates, terms, and conditions;

(4) Demonstrates how trust products and services will increase
 access to capital for public infrastructure systems and complement
 those of existing public and private sources; and

(5) Demonstrates how the trust plans to maximize revenues andpublic benefit.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 9. STUDENT LOANS. The trust is authorized to 30 administer a state guarantee loan program to assist students in need of 31 low-cost student loans and related loan benefits to address educational 32 needs as necessary to support student success. Before initiating 33 operations, the commission must present an implementation plan and any 34 necessary legislation to the governor and appropriate legislative 35 committees that:

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- (1) Identifies the needs and benefits to selected students that the
 program will target initially;
- 3 (2) Demonstrates how the trust plans to maximize revenues and
 4 public benefit while minimizing public risk;
- 5 (3) Demonstrates how the trust will coordinate with the office of 6 student financial assistance; and
- 7 (4) Identifies the ways that the program will address the following8 issues related to loans:
- 9 (a) Qualification criteria for students;
- 10 (b) Obligations and options for loan repayment;
- 11 (c) Requirements for loan guarantees and reserves;
- 12 (d) Fee and interest rate structure;
- 13 (e) Maximum loan amounts; and

14 (f) Ensuring student awareness of grants, federal loans, and other 15 financial aid programs.

16 NEW SECTION. Sec. 10. TREASURY AND BANKING SERVICES. (1) For financial institutions that make the trust a reserve depository, the 17 trust may serve as a clearinghouse, including all facilities for 18 providing domestic and foreign exchange, and may rediscount paper, on 19 20 terms the commission provides. For purposes of this subsection, 21 "financial institutions" means banks as defined in RCW 30.04.010, 22 savings banks as defined in RCW 32.04.020, savings and loan 23 associations as defined in RCW 33.04.005, and credit unions as defined in RCW 31.12.005. 24

(2) The trust may provide corporate trust services for the state
 and its political subdivisions including trustee, escrow agent, paying
 agent, bond registrar, and transfer agent.

(3) The trust may buy and sell federal funds; issue letters of credit for public deposits; and provide a safekeeping service for United States treasury securities, federal agency securities, corporate bonds, tax-free bonds, money market investments, and mortgage-backed securities.

33 (4) The trust may become a member of the federal reserve system.

(5) The trust may perform services currently contracted out by the
 department of social and health services regarding electronic benefits
 transfer cards.

1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 11. MANAGEMENT. (1) The commission shall 2 appoint a trust president with demonstrated experience in banking. The president is exempt from the provisions of chapter 41.06 RCW. 3 The 4 president shall serve at the commission's pleasure, on such terms and 5 conditions as the commission determines, but subject to chapter 42.52 6 RCW.

7 (2) The president shall provide support to the commission and the
8 advisory board, carry out trust policies and programs, and exercise
9 additional authority as may be delegated by the commission.

10 (3) Subject to available funding and consistent with commission 11 direction, the trust president:

12 (a) May employ such additional personnel as are necessary to the 13 bank's operations. This employment shall be in accordance with the 14 state civil service law, chapter 41.06 RCW; and

(b) May contract with persons who have the technical expertise needed to carry out a specific, time-limited project.

17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 12. ADVISORY BOARD. (1)(a) An investment trust 18 advisory board consisting of eleven members is created to review the 19 trust's operations and make recommendations relating to the trust's 20 management, services, policies, and procedures.

(b) The governor shall appoint members of the advisory board, subject to confirmation by the senate. The members of the advisory board must be knowledgeable in banking or finance and must represent a diversity of experience relevant to activities of the trust. Six or more of the members must have expertise in banking or finance. Advisory board members serve at the pleasure of the governor.

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(c) The board shall choose its chair from among its membership.

(2) The term of the members is three years. Five of the initial 28 29 board members must be appointed to serve an initial term of three years, three must be appointed to serve an initial term of two years, 30 31 and the three remaining members must be appointed to serve an initial term of one year. All subsequent terms are three years. 32 To ensure that the board can continue to act, a member whose term expires shall 33 34 continue to serve until his or her replacement is appointed. In the 35 case of any vacancy on the board for any reason, the governor shall 36 appoint a new member to serve out the term of the person whose position

has become vacant. A board member may be removed for cause by the
 governor.

3 (3) Members of the advisory board are entitled to reimbursement for
4 expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties under this chapter,
5 as provided in RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.

6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 13. FINANCIAL REGULATION. (1) The trust must 7 maintain capital adequacy and other standard indicators of safety and 8 soundness as is appropriate for a publicly owned financial institution.

9 (2) The director may examine the trust in the same manner as a 10 state-chartered financial institution under RCW 30.04.060. The 11 director shall take into consideration the unique circumstances of a 12 publicly owned financial institution when examining the trust. The 13 trust shall pay the director for the reasonable costs of examinations.

14 (3) The trust must undergo independent audits on the same basis as 15 state-chartered banks.

16 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 14. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS. (1) The trust 17 shall submit quarterly reports to the commission in a manner and form 18 prescribed by the commission.

19 (2) The commission shall make a report to the legislature on the20 affairs of the trust by December 1st of each year.

21 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 15. ETHICAL REQUIREMENTS. The trust may not 22 make a loan to any advisory board member, the president, or employees 23 of the trust. Advisory board members, the president, and employees of 24 the trust must follow applicable ethical requirements in chapter 42.52 25 RCW and in rules, policies, and procedures adopted by the commission.

26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 16. FEES AND TAXES. The trust is exempt from 27 payment of all fees and taxes levied by the state or any of its 28 subdivisions.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 17. TRUST RECORDS. (1) Under RCW 42.56.270 and 30 42.56.400, certain trust business records and records of the department 31 relating to the trust are exempt from public disclosure.

32 (2) Financial and commercial information and records submitted to33 either the department or the commission for the purpose of

administering this chapter may be shared between the department and the
 treasurer. These records may also be used in any suit or
 administrative hearing involving any provision of this chapter.

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(3) This section does not prohibit:

5 (a) The issuance of general statements based on the reports of 6 persons subject to this chapter as long as the statements do not 7 identify the information furnished by any person; or

8 (b) The publication by the director or the commission of the name 9 of any person violating this chapter and a statement of the manner of 10 the violation of that person.

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 18. CAPITALIZATION. The commission must make 12 recommendations to the appropriate fiscal committees of the legislature 13 on options for capitalization of the trust. Any recommendations must 14 include draft legislation for consideration by the legislature.

15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 19. A new section is added to chapter 39.58 RCW 16 to read as follows:

17 The Washington investment trust created in section 3 of this act 18 may accept deposits of public funds, but is not a public depositary and 19 is not subject to the requirements of this chapter.

20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 20. A new section is added to chapter 41.06 RCW 21 to read as follows:

In addition to the exemptions under RCW 41.06.070, the provisions of this chapter do not apply to the president of the Washington investment trust in section 11 of this act.

25 **Sec. 21.** RCW 30.04.020 and 2010 c 88 s 4 are each amended to read 26 as follows:

(1) The name of every bank shall contain the word "bank" and the name of every trust company shall contain the word "trust," or the word "bank." Except as provided in RCW 33.08.030 or as otherwise authorized by this section or approved by the director, only a national bank, federal savings bank, a bank or trust company authorized by this title, savings bank under Title 32 RCW, bank holding company or financial holding company, a holding company authorized by this title or Title 32 RCW, or a foreign or alien corporation or other legal person authorized
 by this title to do so, shall:

3 (a) Use as a part of his (([or her])) or her or its name or other 4 business designation, as a prominent syllable within a word comprising all or a portion of its name or other business designation, or in any 5 manner as if connected with his (([or her])) or her or its business or 6 7 place of business any of the following words or the plural thereof, to "bank," "banking," "banker," "bancorporation," "bancorp," or 8 wit: "trust," or any foreign language designations thereof, including, by 9 10 way of example, "banco" or "banque."

(b) Use any sign, logo, or marketing message, in any media, or use any letterhead, billhead, note, receipt, certificate, blank, form, or any written, printed, electronic or internet-based instrument or material representation whatsoever, directly or indirectly indicating that the business of such person is that of a bank or trust company.

(2) A foreign corporation or other foreign domiciled legal person, 16 17 whose name contains the words "bank," "banker," "banking," 18 "bancorporation," "bancorp," or "trust," or the foreign language equivalent thereof, or whose articles of incorporation empower it to 19 engage in banking or to engage in a trust business, may not engage in 20 21 banking or in a trust business in this state unless the corporation or 22 other legal person (a) is expressly authorized to do so under this 23 title, under federal law, or by the director, and (b) complies with all 24 applicable requirements of Washington state law regarding foreign 25 corporations and other foreign legal persons. If an activity would not 26 "transacting business" within the constitute meaning of RCW 27 23B.15.010(1) or chapter 23B.18 RCW, then the activity shall not constitute banking or engaging in a trust business. Nothing in this 28 29 subsection shall prevent operations by an alien bank in compliance with 30 chapter 30.42 RCW.

(3) This section shall not prevent a lender approved by the United States secretary of housing and urban development for participation in any mortgage insurance program under the National Housing Act from using the words "mortgage banker" or "mortgage banking" in the conduct of its business, but only if both words are used together in either of the forms which appear in quotations in this sentence.

37 (4) This section does not prevent the Washington investment trust

1 created in section 3 of this act from being called a trust or from
2 providing banking services without being called a bank.

3 (5) Any individual or legal person, or director, officer(({,})), or 4 manager of such legal person, who knowingly violates any provision of 5 this section shall be guilty of a gross misdemeanor.

6 Sec. 22. RCW 42.56.270 and 2011 1st sp.s. c 14 s 15 are each 7 amended to read as follows:

8 The following financial, commercial, and proprietary information is 9 exempt from disclosure under this chapter:

10 (1) Valuable formulae, designs, drawings, computer source code or 11 object code, and research data obtained by any agency within five years 12 of the request for disclosure when disclosure would produce private 13 gain and public loss;

14 (2) Financial information supplied by or on behalf of a person, 15 firm, or corporation for the purpose of qualifying to submit a bid or 16 proposal for (a) a ferry system construction or repair contract as 17 required by RCW 47.60.680 through 47.60.750 or (b) highway construction 18 or improvement as required by RCW 47.28.070;

19 (3) Financial and commercial information and records supplied by 20 private persons pertaining to export services provided under chapters 21 43.163 and 53.31 RCW, and by persons pertaining to export projects 22 under RCW 43.23.035;

(4) Financial and commercial information and records supplied by businesses or individuals during application for loans or program services provided by chapters 43.325, 43.163, 43.160, 43.330, <u>43.---</u> (<u>the new chapter created in section 27 of this act</u>), and 43.168 RCW, or during application for economic development loans or program services provided by any local agency;

(5) Financial information, business plans, examination reports, and any information produced or obtained in evaluating or examining a business and industrial development corporation organized or seeking certification under chapter 31.24 RCW;

(6) Financial and commercial information supplied to the state investment board by any person when the information relates to the investment of public trust or retirement funds and when disclosure would result in loss to such funds or in private loss to the providers of this information; 1

(7) Financial and valuable trade information under RCW 51.36.120;

2 (8) Financial, commercial, operations, and technical and research 3 information and data submitted to or obtained by the clean Washington 4 center in applications for, or delivery of, program services under 5 chapter 70.95H RCW;

6 (9) Financial and commercial information requested by the public 7 stadium authority from any person or organization that leases or uses 8 the stadium and exhibition center as defined in RCW 36.102.010;

9 (10)(a) Financial information, including but not limited to account 10 numbers and values, and other identification numbers supplied by or on 11 behalf of a person, firm, corporation, limited liability company, 12 partnership, or other entity related to an application for a horse 13 racing license submitted pursuant to RCW 67.16.260(1)(b), liquor 14 license, gambling license, or lottery retail license;

(b) Internal control documents, independent auditors' reports and financial statements, and supporting documents: (i) Of house-banked social card game licensees required by the gambling commission pursuant to rules adopted under chapter 9.46 RCW; or (ii) submitted by tribes with an approved tribal/state compact for class III gaming;

(11) Proprietary data, trade secrets, or other information that relates to: (a) A vendor's unique methods of conducting business; (b) data unique to the product or services of the vendor; or (c) determining prices or rates to be charged for services, submitted by any vendor to the department of social and health services for purposes of the development, acquisition, or implementation of state purchased health care as defined in RCW 41.05.011;

27 (12)(a) When supplied to and in the records of the department of 28 commerce:

(i) Financial and proprietary information collected from any person and provided to the department of commerce pursuant to RCW 43.330.050(8); and

(ii) Financial or proprietary information collected from any person and provided to the department of commerce or the office of the governor in connection with the siting, recruitment, expansion, retention, or relocation of that person's business and until a siting decision is made, identifying information of any person supplying information under this subsection and the locations being considered for siting, relocation, or expansion of a business; 1 (b) When developed by the department of commerce based on 2 information as described in (a)(i) of this subsection, any work product 3 is not exempt from disclosure;

4 (c) For the purposes of this subsection, "siting decision" means 5 the decision to acquire or not to acquire a site;

6 (d) If there is no written contact for a period of sixty days to 7 the department of commerce from a person connected with siting, 8 recruitment, expansion, retention, or relocation of that person's 9 business, information described in (a)(ii) of this subsection will be 10 available to the public under this chapter;

(13) Financial and proprietary information submitted to or obtained by the department of ecology or the authority created under chapter 70.95N RCW to implement chapter 70.95N RCW;

(14) Financial, commercial, operations, and technical and research information and data submitted to or obtained by the life sciences discovery fund authority in applications for, or delivery of, grants under chapter 43.350 RCW, to the extent that such information, if revealed, would reasonably be expected to result in private loss to the providers of this information;

(15) Financial and commercial information provided as evidence to the department of licensing as required by RCW 19.112.110 or 19.112.120, except information disclosed in aggregate form that does not permit the identification of information related to individual fuel licensees;

(16) Any production records, mineral assessments, and trade secrets submitted by a permit holder, mine operator, or landowner to the department of natural resources under RCW 78.44.085;

(17)(a) Farm plans developed by conservation districts, unless permission to release the farm plan is granted by the landowner or operator who requested the plan, or the farm plan is used for the application or issuance of a permit;

32 (b) Farm plans developed under chapter 90.48 RCW and not under the 33 federal clean water act, 33 U.S.C. Sec. 1251 et seq., are subject to 34 RCW 42.56.610 and 90.64.190;
