1 AN ACT Relating to a state Indian child welfare act; amending RCW
2 13.32A.152, 13.34.040, 13.34.070, 13.34.105, 13.34.130, 13.34.132,
3 13.34.190, 26.10.034, 26.33.040, and 74.13.350; reenacting and amending
4 RCW 13.34.030, 13.34.065, and 13.34.136; and adding a new chapter to
5 Title 13 RCW.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

7 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** SHORT TITLE. This chapter shall be known
8 and cited as the "Washington state Indian child welfare act."

9 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** APPLICATION. This chapter shall apply in
10 all child custody proceedings as that term is defined in this chapter.
11 Whenever there is a conflict between chapter 13.32A, 13.34, or 26.33
12 RCW, the provisions of this chapter shall apply.

13 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** INTENT. The legislature finds that the
14 state is committed to protecting the essential tribal relations and
15 best interests of Indian children by promoting practices designed to
16 prevent voluntary or involuntary out-of-home placement. Whenever such
17 placement is necessary, the best interests of the Indian child is

1 served by placing the Indian child in accordance with the placement
2 priorities expressed in the federal Indian child welfare act and in
3 this chapter. The legislature further finds that where placement away
4 from the parent or Indian custodian is necessary for the child's
5 safety, the state is committed to a placement that reflects and honors
6 the unique values of the child's tribal culture and is best able to
7 assist the Indian child in establishing, developing, and maintaining a
8 political, cultural, social, and spiritual relationship with the
9 child's tribe and tribal community.

10 It is the intent of the legislature that this chapter is a step in
11 clarifying existing laws and codifying existing policies and practices.
12 This chapter shall not be construed to reject or eliminate current
13 policies and practices that are not included in its provisions.

14 The legislature further intends that nothing in this chapter is
15 intended to interfere with policies and procedures that are derived
16 from agreements entered into between the department and a tribe or
17 tribes, as authorized by section 109 of the federal Indian child
18 welfare act. The legislature finds that this chapter specifies the
19 minimum requirements that must be applied in a child custody proceeding
20 and does not prevent the department from providing a higher standard of
21 protection to the right of any Indian child, parent, Indian custodian,
22 or Indian child's tribe.

23 It is also the legislature's intent that the department's policy
24 manual on Indian child welfare, the tribal-state agreement, and
25 relevant local agreements between individual federally recognized
26 tribes and the department should serve as persuasive guides in the
27 interpretation and implementation of the federal Indian child welfare
28 act, this chapter, and other relevant state laws.

29 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 4.** DEFINITIONS. The definitions in this
30 section apply throughout this chapter unless the context clearly
31 requires otherwise.

- 32 (1) "Active efforts" means at least the following:
33 (a) The department or supervising agency's efforts to prevent or
34 eliminate the need for removal, or continued removal of the child from
35 the family home, including taking the parent or parents or Indian
36 custodian through the steps of the plan rather than requiring that the
37 plan be performed on its own. "Passive efforts" consist of merely

1 drawing up a plan and requiring the parent or Indian custodian to use
2 his or her own resources to bring the plan to fruition. In actions
3 under chapters 13.34 and 26.33 RCW, "active efforts" require more
4 direct involvement with the family than reasonable efforts;

5 (b) In any proceeding under chapter 13.34 or 26.33 RCW in which the
6 petitioner does not otherwise have a statutory or contractual duty to
7 directly provide services to, or procure services for, the parent or
8 Indian custodian, "active efforts" means a documented, concerted, and
9 good faith effort to facilitate the parent's or Indian custodian's
10 receipt of and engagement in services capable of meeting the criteria
11 set out in (a) of this subsection.

12 (2) "Adoptive placement" means the permanent placement of an Indian
13 child for adoption in any action under chapter 26.33 RCW resulting in
14 a final decree of adoption. "Adoptive placement" does not include a
15 placement based upon an act by an Indian child which, if committed by
16 an adult, would be deemed a crime, or upon an award, in a divorce
17 proceeding, of custody to one of the child's parents.

18 (3) "Best interests of the Indian child" means the use of practices
19 in accordance with the federal Indian child welfare act, this chapter,
20 and other applicable law, that are designed to accomplish the
21 following: (a) Protect the safety, development, and stability of the
22 Indian child; (b) prevent the Indian child's voluntary or involuntary
23 out-of-home placement; (c) whenever such placement is necessary or
24 ordered, to place the Indian child in accordance with the placement
25 preferences expressed in the federal Indian child welfare act or this
26 chapter; and make an effort to secure a placement of the Indian child
27 that reflects the unique values of the Indian child's tribal culture
28 and is best able to assist the Indian child in establishing,
29 developing, and maintaining a political, cultural, social, and
30 spiritual relationship with the Indian child's tribe and tribal
31 community.

32 (4) "Child custody proceeding" means a foster care placement,
33 termination of parental rights, preadoptive placement, and adoptive
34 placement.

35 (5) "Court of competent jurisdiction" means a federal or state
36 court that entered an order in a child custody proceeding involving an
37 Indian child, as long as the state court had proper subject matter

1 jurisdiction in accordance with this chapter and the laws of that
2 state, or the tribal court that had or has exclusive or concurrent
3 jurisdiction pursuant to 25 U.S.C. Sec. 1911.

4 (6) "Department" means the department of social and health services
5 and any of its divisions. "Department" also includes supervising
6 agencies as defined in RCW 74.13.020(12) with which the department
7 entered into a contract to provide services, care, placement, case
8 management, contract monitoring, or supervision to children subject to
9 a petition filed under chapter 13.34 or 26.33 RCW.

10 (7) "Foster care placement" means any action removing an Indian
11 child from its parent or Indian custodian for temporary placement in a
12 foster home or the home of a guardian where the parent or Indian
13 custodian cannot have the child returned upon demand but where parental
14 rights have not been terminated.

15 (8) "Indian" means a person who is a member of an Indian tribe, or
16 who is an Alaska native and a member of a regional corporation as
17 defined in 43 U.S.C. Sec. 1606.

18 (9) "Indian child" means an unmarried and unemancipated Indian
19 person who is under eighteen years of age and is either: (a) A member
20 of an Indian tribe; or (b) eligible for membership in an Indian tribe
21 and is the biological child of a member of an Indian tribe.

22 (10) "Indian child's family" or "extended family member" means an
23 individual, defined by the law or custom of the child's tribe, as a
24 relative of the child. If the child's tribe does not identify such
25 individuals by law or custom, the term means an adult who is the Indian
26 child's grandparent, aunt, uncle, brother, sister, brother-in-law,
27 sister-in-law, niece, nephew, first or second cousin, or step-parent,
28 even following termination of the marriage.

29 (11) "Indian child's tribe" means a tribe in which an Indian child
30 is a member or eligible for membership.

31 (12) "Indian custodian" means an Indian person who under tribal
32 law, tribal custom, or state law, has legal or temporary physical
33 custody of an Indian child, or to whom the parent has transferred
34 temporary care, physical custody, and control of an Indian child.

35 (13) "Indian tribe" or "tribe" means any Indian tribe, band,
36 nation, or other organized group or community of Indians recognized as
37 eligible for the services provided to Indians by the secretary of the

1 interior because of their status as Indians, including any Alaska
2 native village as defined in 43 U.S.C. Sec. 1602(c).

3 (14) "Member" and "membership" means a determination by an Indian
4 tribe by any means and based on any criteria deemed appropriate by that
5 Indian tribe that a person is a member or eligible for membership in
6 that Indian tribe and shall not be limited by enrollment or blood
7 quantum unless expressly so limited by that Indian tribe.

8 (15) "Parent" means a biological parent or parents of an Indian
9 child or a person who has lawfully adopted an Indian child, including
10 adoptions made under tribal law or custom. "Parent" does not include
11 an unwed father whose paternity has not been acknowledged or
12 established. Except for purposes of the federal Indian child welfare
13 act as codified in 25 U.S.C. Secs. 1913(b), (c), and (d), 1916, 1917,
14 and 1951, "parent" does not include a person whose parental rights to
15 that child have been terminated.

16 (16) "Preadoptive placement" means the temporary placement of an
17 Indian child in a foster home or institution after the termination of
18 parental rights, but prior to or in lieu of adoptive placement.

19 (17) "Qualified expert witness" means a person who:

20 (a)(i) Is a social worker, sociologist, physician, psychologist,
21 traditional tribal therapist and healer, spiritual leader, historian,
22 or elder; and

23 (ii) Is a member of the child's Indian tribe who is recognized by
24 the child's tribal community as knowledgeable regarding tribal customs
25 as the customs pertain to family organization or child-rearing
26 practices.

27 (b) If such a person is not available then "qualified expert
28 witness" means:

29 (i) A member of another tribe who is formally recognized by the
30 Indian child's tribe as having the knowledge to be a qualified expert
31 witness; or

32 (ii) A layperson having substantial experience in the delivery of
33 child and family services to Indians, and substantial knowledge of the
34 prevailing social and cultural standards and child-rearing practices
35 within the Indian child's tribe; or

36 (iii) A professional person having substantial education and
37 experience in the person's professional specialty and having

1 substantial knowledge of the prevailing social and cultural standards
2 and child-rearing practices within the Indian child's tribe.

3 (c) No employee of the department or a supervising agency may be a
4 "qualified expert witness" unless expressly recognized as such by the
5 Indian child's tribe.

6 (18) "Secretary of the interior" means the secretary of the United
7 States department of the interior.

8 (19) "Termination of parental rights" means any action resulting in
9 the termination of the parent-child relationship.

10 (20) "Tribal court" means a court or body vested by an Indian tribe
11 with jurisdiction over child custody proceedings, including but not
12 limited to a federal court of Indian offenses, a court established and
13 operated under the code or custom of an Indian tribe, or an
14 administrative body of an Indian tribe vested with authority over child
15 custody proceedings.

16 (21) "Tribal customary adoption" means adoption or other process
17 through the tribal custom, traditions, or laws of an Indian child's
18 tribe by which the Indian child is permanently placed with a nonparent
19 and through which the nonparent is vested with the rights, privileges,
20 and obligations of a legal parent. Termination of the parent-child
21 relationship between the Indian child and the biological parent is not
22 required to effect or recognize a tribal customary adoption.

23 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 5.** DETERMINATION OF INDIAN STATUS. (1) Any
24 party seeking the foster care placement of, termination of parental
25 rights over, or the adoption of, a child must make a good faith effort
26 to determine whether the child is an Indian child by contacting any
27 Indian tribe in which the child may be a member or may be eligible for
28 membership. The petitioning party may also consult with the child's
29 parent, any person who has custody of the child or with whom the child
30 resides, and any other person that reasonably can be expected to have
31 information regarding the child's possible membership or eligibility
32 for membership in an Indian tribe to determine if the child is an
33 Indian child.

34 (2) A written determination by an Indian tribe that a child is a
35 member of or eligible for membership in that tribe, or testimony
36 attesting to such status by a person authorized by the tribe to make
37 such a determination, shall be conclusive that the child is an Indian

1 child. A written determination by an Indian tribe, or testimony by a
2 person authorized by the tribe to make such a determination, that a
3 child is not a member of, or eligible for membership in that tribe,
4 shall be conclusive that the child is not an Indian child as to that
5 tribe. Where a tribe provides no response to notice under section 7 of
6 this act, such nonresponse shall not constitute evidence that the child
7 is not a member or eligible for membership.

8 (3) The determination of the Indian status of a child shall be made
9 as soon as practicable in order to serve the best interests of the
10 Indian child.

11 (4) Where a child has been determined not to be an Indian child,
12 any party to the proceeding, or an Indian tribe that subsequently
13 determines the child is a member, may move the court for
14 redetermination of the child's Indian status at any time based upon new
15 evidence, redetermination by the child's tribe, or newly conferred
16 recognition of the tribe.

17 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 6.** JURISDICTION. (1) An Indian tribe shall
18 have exclusive jurisdiction over any child custody proceeding involving
19 an Indian child who resides or is domiciled within the reservation of
20 that tribe, unless the tribe has consented to the state's concurrent
21 jurisdiction, where the tribe has expressly declined to exercise its
22 exclusive jurisdiction, or where the state is exercising emergency
23 jurisdiction in strict compliance with section 15 of this act.

24 (2) If an Indian child is already a ward of a tribal court at the
25 start of the child custody proceeding, the Indian tribe may retain
26 exclusive jurisdiction, notwithstanding the residence or domicile of
27 the child.

28 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7.** NOTICE. In any child custody proceeding in
29 which any party or the court knows, or has reason to know, that the
30 child is or may be an Indian child, the party seeking the foster care
31 placement of, or the termination of parental rights to, an Indian child
32 shall notify the parent or Indian custodian and the Indian child's
33 tribe, by registered mail with return receipt requested, of the pending
34 proceedings and of their right of intervention. If the identity or
35 location of the parent or Indian custodian and the tribe cannot be
36 determined, such notice shall be given to the secretary by registered

1 mail, return receipt requested. The secretary has fifteen days after
2 receipt to provide the requisite notice to the parent or Indian
3 custodian and the tribe. No foster care placement or termination of
4 parental rights proceeding shall be held until at least ten days after
5 receipt of notice by the parent or Indian custodian and the tribe or
6 the secretary. The parent or Indian custodian or the tribe shall, upon
7 request, be granted up to twenty additional days to prepare for the
8 proceeding.

9 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8.** TRANSFER OF JURISDICTION. (1) In any child
10 custody proceeding involving an Indian child who is not domiciled or
11 residing within the reservation of the Indian child's tribe or who is
12 not a ward of a tribal court, the court shall, in the absence of
13 parental objection or good cause, transfer the proceeding to the
14 jurisdiction of the Indian child's tribe, upon the motion of any of the
15 following persons:

- 16 (a) Either of the child's parents;
- 17 (b) The child's Indian custodian;
- 18 (c) The child's tribe; or
- 19 (d) The child.

20 The tribe may decline transfer of the proceeding.

21 (2) If the child's tribe has not formally intervened, the moving
22 party shall serve a copy of the motion and all supporting documents on
23 the tribal court to which the moving party seeks transfer.

24 (3) If either of the Indian child's parents objects to transfer of
25 the proceeding to the Indian child's tribe, the court shall not
26 transfer the proceeding.

27 (4) Following entry of an order transferring jurisdiction to the
28 Indian child's tribe:

29 (a) Upon receipt of an order from a tribal court accepting
30 jurisdiction, the state court shall dismiss the child custody
31 proceeding without prejudice.

32 (b) Pending receipt of such tribal court order, the state court may
33 conduct additional hearings and enter orders which strictly comply with
34 the requirements of the federal Indian child welfare act and this
35 chapter. The state court shall not enter a final order in any child
36 custody proceeding, except an order dismissing the proceeding and
37 returning the Indian child to the care of the parent or Indian

1 custodian from whose care the child was removed, while awaiting receipt
2 of a tribal court order accepting jurisdiction, or in the absence of a
3 tribal court order or other formal written declination of jurisdiction.

4 (c) If the Indian child's tribe declines jurisdiction, the state
5 court shall enter an order vacating the order transferring jurisdiction
6 and proceed with adjudication of the child custody matter in strict
7 compliance with the federal Indian child welfare act, this chapter, and
8 any applicable tribal-state agreement.

9 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 9.** INTERVENTION. The Indian child, the Indian
10 child's tribe or tribes, and the Indian custodian have the right to
11 intervene at any point in any child custody proceeding involving the
12 Indian child.

13 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 10.** FULL FAITH AND CREDIT. The state shall
14 give full faith and credit to the public acts, records, judicial
15 proceedings, and judgments of any Indian tribe applicable to Indian
16 child custody proceedings.

17 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 11.** RIGHT TO COUNSEL. In any child custody
18 proceeding under this chapter in which the court determines the Indian
19 child's parent or Indian custodian is indigent, the parent or Indian
20 custodian shall have the right to court-appointed counsel. The court
21 may, in its discretion, appoint counsel for the Indian child upon a
22 finding that the appointment is in the best interests of the Indian
23 child.

24 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 12.** RIGHT TO ACCESS TO EVIDENCE. Each party to
25 a child custody proceeding involving an Indian child shall have the
26 right to examine all reports or other documents filed with the court
27 upon which any decision with respect to the proceeding may be based.

28 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 13.** EVIDENTIARY REQUIREMENTS. (1) Before an
29 Indian child can be placed in a foster care placement, the department
30 or supervising agency must show that active efforts have been made to
31 provide remedial services and rehabilitative programs designed to
32 prevent the breakup of the Indian family and that these efforts have

1 proved unsuccessful. The court shall not order a foster care placement
2 without a specific finding describing the active efforts that have been
3 made and the circumstances that show such efforts were unsuccessful.

4 (2) The court may not order that an Indian child be placed in
5 foster care in the absence of a determination, supported by clear and
6 convincing evidence, including the testimony of a qualified expert
7 witness, that the continued custody of the child by the child's parent
8 or Indian custodian, is likely to result in serious emotional or
9 physical damage to the child. For purposes of this subsection, any
10 harm that may result from interfering with the bond or attachment that
11 may have formed between the child and a foster care provider shall not
12 be a basis for denying return of custody to the parent or Indian
13 custodian.

14 (3) The court shall not order the termination of parental rights
15 over an Indian child in the absence of a determination, supported by
16 evidence beyond a reasonable doubt, including the testimony of a
17 qualified expert witness, that the continued custody of the child by
18 the child's parent or Indian custodian, or the return of custody of the
19 child to the child's parent or Indian custodian, is likely to result in
20 serious emotional or physical damage to the child. For purposes of
21 this subsection, any harm that may result from interfering with the
22 bond or attachment that may have formed between the child and a foster
23 care provider shall not be a basis for termination of parental rights
24 over an Indian child.

25 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 14.** CHOICE OF LAW. If another state or federal
26 law applicable to a child custody proceeding provides a higher standard
27 of protection to the rights of the Indian child in accordance with the
28 best interests of the Indian child as defined in section 4 of this act,
29 the Indian child's tribe, or the parent or parents or Indian custodian
30 of an Indian child, than the rights provided under this chapter, the
31 court shall apply the higher standard as long as the higher standard
32 does not directly conflict with the federal Indian child welfare act.

33 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 15.** EMERGENCY REMOVAL OF AN INDIAN CHILD. (1)
34 Notwithstanding any other provision of federal or state law, the court
35 may order emergency removal of an Indian child, including an Indian
36 child who is a resident of or is domiciled on an Indian reservation,

1 but is temporarily located off the reservation, or the emergency
2 placement of such child in a foster home or institution, to prevent
3 imminent physical damage or harm to the child.

4 (2) In case of an emergency removal of an Indian child, regardless
5 of residence or domicile of the child, the court or the department or
6 supervising agency shall terminate the emergency removal or placement
7 immediately when the removal or placement is no longer necessary to
8 prevent imminent physical damage or harm to the child.

9 (3) The party that obtained the emergency removal or placement
10 shall:

11 (a) Immediately initiate a child custody proceeding subject to
12 strict compliance with the federal Indian child welfare act and this
13 chapter;

14 (b) Transfer the child to the jurisdiction of the appropriate
15 Indian tribe; or

16 (c) Restore the child to the child's parent or Indian custodian, if
17 appropriate.

18 (4) An emergency removal or placement of an Indian child shall
19 immediately terminate, and any court order approving the removal or
20 placement shall be vacated, when the removal or placement is no longer
21 necessary to prevent imminent physical damage or harm to the child.

22 (5) Upon termination of the emergency removal or placement order,
23 the child shall immediately be returned to the custody of the child's
24 parent or Indian custodian unless any of the following circumstances
25 exist:

26 (a) The child is transferred to the jurisdiction of the child's
27 tribe;

28 (b) In an involuntary foster care placement proceeding pursuant to
29 and in strict compliance with the federal Indian child welfare act and
30 this chapter, the court orders that the child shall be placed in foster
31 care; or

32 (c) The child's parent or Indian custodian voluntarily consents to
33 the foster care placement of the child pursuant to and in strict
34 compliance with the provisions of the federal Indian child welfare act
35 and this chapter.

36 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 16.** CONSENT. (1) If an Indian child's parent
37 or Indian custodian voluntarily consents to a foster care placement of

1 the child or to termination of parental rights, the consent is not
2 valid unless executed in writing and recorded before a judge of a court
3 of competent jurisdiction and accompanied by the judge's certificate
4 that the terms and consequences of the consent were fully explained in
5 detail and were fully understood by the parent or Indian custodian.
6 The court must also certify that either the parent or Indian custodian
7 fully understood the explanation in English or that it was interpreted
8 into a language that the parent or Indian custodian understood. Any
9 consent for release of custody given prior to, or within ten days
10 after, the birth of the Indian child shall not be valid.

11 (2) An Indian child's parent or Indian custodian may withdraw
12 consent to a voluntary foster care placement at any time and, upon the
13 withdrawal of consent, the child shall be returned to the parent or
14 Indian custodian.

15 (3) In a voluntary proceeding for termination of parental rights
16 to, or adoptive placement of, an Indian child, the consent of the
17 parent may be withdrawn for any reason at any time prior to the entry
18 of a final decree termination of parental rights or adoption, and the
19 child shall be returned to the parent.

20 (4) After the entry of a final decree of adoption of an Indian
21 child, the parent may withdraw consent to the adoption upon the grounds
22 that consent was obtained through fraud or duress. Upon a finding that
23 such consent was obtained through fraud or duress the court shall
24 vacate the decree and return the child to the parent. No adoption
25 which has been effective for at least two years may be invalidated
26 under this section unless otherwise allowed by state law.

27 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 17.** IMPROPER REMOVAL OF AN INDIAN CHILD. If a
28 petitioner in a child custody proceeding under this chapter has
29 improperly removed the child from the custody of the parent or Indian
30 custodian or has improperly retained custody after a visit or other
31 temporary relinquishment of custody, the court shall decline
32 jurisdiction over the petition and shall immediately return the child
33 to the child's parent or Indian custodian unless returning the child to
34 the parent or Indian custodian would subject the child to substantial
35 and immediate danger or threat of such danger.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 18.** REMOVAL OF INDIAN CHILD FROM ADOPTIVE OR
2 FOSTER CARE PLACEMENT. (1) If a final decree of adoption of an Indian
3 child has been vacated or set aside or the adoptive parents voluntarily
4 consent to the termination of their parental rights to the child, the
5 biological parent or prior Indian custodian may petition to have the
6 child returned to their custody and the court shall grant the request
7 unless there is a showing by clear and convincing evidence that return
8 of custody to the biological parent or prior Indian custodian is not in
9 the best interests of the child.

10 (2) If an Indian child is removed from a foster care placement or
11 a preadoptive or adoptive home for the purpose of further foster care,
12 preadoptive, or adoptive placement, the placement shall be in
13 accordance with this chapter, except when an Indian child is being
14 returned to the parent or Indian custodian from whose custody the child
15 was originally removed.

16 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 19.** PLACEMENT PREFERENCES. (1) In the absence
17 of good cause to the contrary, any adoptive or other permanent
18 placement of an Indian child, preference shall be given to a placement
19 with one of the following, in descending priority order:

- 20 (a) Relatives;
- 21 (b) An Indian family of the same tribe as the child;
- 22 (c) An Indian family of a Washington Indian tribe that is of a
23 similar culture to the child's tribe; or
- 24 (d) Any other family which can provide a suitable home for an
25 Indian child, such suitability to be determined in consultation with a
26 local Indian child welfare advisory committee.

27 (2) When an emergency removal, foster care placement, or
28 preadoptive placement of an Indian child is necessary, a good faith
29 effort will be made to place the Indian child:

- 30 (a) In the least restrictive setting;
- 31 (b) Which most approximates a family situation;
- 32 (c) Which is in reasonable proximity to the Indian child's home;

33 and

- 34 (d) In which the Indian child's special needs, if any, will be met.

35 (3) In any foster care or preadoptive placement, a preference shall
36 be given, in absence of good cause to the contrary, to the child's
37 placement with one of the following:

1 (a) A member of the child's extended family.

2 (b) A foster home licensed, approved, or specified by the child's
3 tribe.

4 (c) An Indian foster home licensed or approved by an authorized
5 non-Indian licensing authority.

6 (d) A child foster care agency approved by an Indian tribe or
7 operated by an Indian organization which has a program suitable to meet
8 the Indian child's needs.

9 (e) A non-Indian child foster care agency approved by the child's
10 tribe.

11 (f) A non-Indian family that is committed to:

12 (i) Promoting and allowing appropriate extended family visitation;

13 (ii) Establishing, maintaining, and strengthening the child's
14 relationship with his or her tribe or tribes; and

15 (iii) Participating in the cultural and ceremonial events of the
16 child's tribe.

17 (4) Notwithstanding the placement preferences listed in subsection
18 (1) of this section, if a different order of placement preference is
19 established by the child's tribe, the court or agency effecting the
20 placement shall follow the order of preference established by the
21 tribe.

22 (5) The standards to be applied in meeting the preference
23 requirements of this section shall be the prevailing social and
24 cultural standards of the Indian community in which the parent or
25 extended family members of an Indian child reside, or with which the
26 parent or extended family members maintain social and cultural ties.

27 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 20.** COMPLIANCE. (1) The department, in
28 consultation with Indian tribes, shall establish standards and
29 procedures for the department's review of cases subject to this chapter
30 and methods for monitoring the department's compliance with provisions
31 of the federal Indian child welfare act and this chapter. These
32 standards and procedures and the monitoring methods shall also be
33 integrated into the department's child welfare contracting and contract
34 monitoring process.

35 (2) A court of competent jurisdiction shall vacate a court order
36 and order such additional proceedings as are necessary for appropriate
37 disposition for any of the following violations of this chapter:

1 (a) Failure to provide notice to an Indian parent, Indian
2 custodian, or tribe under the federal Indian child welfare act and this
3 chapter;

4 (b) Failure to recognize the jurisdiction of an Indian tribe;

5 (c) Failure, without cause as specified under this chapter, to
6 transfer jurisdiction to an Indian tribe where a party appropriately
7 requests transfer;

8 (d) Failure to give full faith and credit to the public acts,
9 records, or judicial proceedings of an Indian tribe;

10 (e) Failure to return the child to the child's parent or Indian
11 custodian when emergency removal or placement is no longer necessary to
12 prevent imminent serious physical damage or harm;

13 (f) Failure to strictly comply with the voluntary consent
14 requirement of this chapter;

15 (g) Failure to make active efforts to provide remedial services or
16 rehabilitative programs designed to prevent the breakup of the Indian
17 family as required by this chapter; or

18 (h) Failure to provide the testimony of qualified expert witnesses
19 as required by this chapter.

20 (3) If a petitioner in a child custody proceeding before a state
21 court has improperly removed the child from the custody of the child's
22 parent or Indian custodian or has improperly retained custody after a
23 visit or other temporary relinquishment of custody, the court shall
24 decline jurisdiction over the petition and shall immediately order the
25 return of the child to the child's parent or Indian custodian unless
26 returning the child to the parent or Indian custodian would subject the
27 child to imminent serious physical damage or harm.

28 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 21.** SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this act
29 or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
30 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
31 persons or circumstances is not affected.

32 **Sec. 22.** RCW 13.32A.152 and 2004 c 64 s 5 are each amended to read
33 as follows:

34 (1) Whenever a child in need of services petition is filed by: (a)
35 A youth pursuant to RCW 13.32A.150; (b) the child or the child's parent

2 on the parents of the youth. Service shall first be attempted in

16 than one tribe, the petitioning party shall send notice to all tribes

18 (b) The notice shall: (i) Contain a statement notifying the parent
19 or custodian and the tribe of the pending proceeding; and (ii) notify
20 the tribe of the tribe's right to intervene and/or request that the
21 case be transferred to tribal court.

25 For purposes of this chapter:

26 (1) "Abandoned" means when the child's parent, guardian, or other
27 custodian has expressed, either by statement or conduct, an intent to
28 forego, for an extended period, parental rights or responsibilities
29 despite an ability to exercise such rights and responsibilities. If
30 the court finds that the petitioner has exercised due diligence in
31 attempting to locate the parent, no contact between the child and the
32 child's parent, guardian, or other custodian for a period of three
33 months creates a rebuttable presumption of abandonment, even if there
34 is no expressed intent to abandon.

35 (2) "Child" and "juvenile" means any individual under the age of
36 eighteen years.

1 (3) "Current placement episode" means the period of time that
2 begins with the most recent date that the child was removed from the

4 placement in out-of-home care and continues until: (a) The child
5 returns home; (b) an adoption decree, a permanent custody order, or
6 guardianship order is entered; or (c) the dependency is dismissed,

8 (4) "Department" means the department of social and health

10 (5) "Dependency guardian" means the person, nonprofit corporation,
11 or Indian tribe appointed by the court pursuant to this chapter for the
12 limited purpose of assisting the court in the supervision of the
13 dependency.

14 (6) "Dependent child" means any child who:

15 (a) Has been abandoned;

16 (b) Is abused or neglected as defined in chapter 26.44 RCW by a
17 person legally responsible for the care of the child; or

18 (c) Has no parent, guardian, or custodian capable of adequately
19 caring for the child, such that the child is in circumstances which
20 constitute a danger of substantial damage to the child's psychological
21 or physical development.

22 (7) "Developmental disability" means a disability attributable to
23 intellectual disability, cerebral palsy, epilepsy, autism, or another
24 neurological or other condition of an individual found by the secretary
25 to be closely related to an intellectual disability or to require
26 treatment similar to that required for individuals with intellectual
27 disabilities, which disability originates before the individual attains
28 age eighteen, which has continued or can be expected to continue

31 (8) "Guardian" means the person or agency that: (a) Has been
32 appointed as the guardian of a child in a legal proceeding, including

35 term "guardian" does not include a "dependency guardian" appointed

6 licensed pursuant to RCW 74.15.030 or in a home not required to be

8 (16) "Sibling" means a child's birth brother, birth sister,
9 adoptive brother, adoptive sister, half-brother, or half-sister, or as
10 defined by the law or custom of the Indian child's tribe for an Indian
11 child as defined in (~~25 U.S.C. Sec. 1903(4)~~) section 4 of this act.

12 (17) "Social study" means a written evaluation of matters relevant
13 to the disposition of the case and shall contain the following
14 information:

15 (a) A statement of the specific harm or harms to the child that
16 intervention is designed to alleviate;

17 (b) A description of the specific services and activities, for both
18 the parents and child, that are needed in order to prevent serious harm
19 to the child; the reasons why such services and activities are likely
20 to be useful; the availability of any proposed services; and the
21 agency's overall plan for ensuring that the services will be delivered.
22 The description shall identify the services chosen and approved by the
23 parent;

24 (c) If removal is recommended, a full description of the reasons
25 why the child cannot be protected adequately in the home, including a
26 description of any previous efforts to work with the parents and the
27 child in the home; the in-home treatment programs that have been
28 considered and rejected; the preventive services, including housing
29 assistance, that have been offered or provided and have failed to
30 prevent the need for out-of-home placement, unless the health, safety,
31 and welfare of the child cannot be protected adequately in the home;

33 (d) A statement of the likely harms the child will suffer as a
34 result of removal;

35 (e) A description of the steps that will be taken to minimize the
36 harm to the child that may result if separation occurs including an

2 child and the child's siblings if appropriate; and

3 (f) Behavior that will be expected before determination that
4 supervision of the family or placement is no longer necessary.

5 (18) "Supervising agency" means an agency licensed by the state
6 under RCW 74.15.090, or licensed by a federally recognized Indian tribe
7 located in this state under RCW 74.15.190, that has entered into a
8 performance-based contract with the department to provide case
9 management for the delivery and documentation of child welfare services
10 as defined in RCW 74.13.020.

11 **Sec. 24.** RCW 13.34.040 and 2004 c 64 s 3 are each amended to read
12 as follows:

13 (1) Any person may file with the clerk of the superior court a
14 petition showing that there is within the county, or residing within
15 the county, a dependent child and requesting that the superior court
16 deal with such child as provided in this chapter. There shall be no
17 fee for filing such petitions.

18 (2) In counties having paid probation officers, these officers
19 shall, to the extent possible, first determine if a petition is
20 reasonably justifiable. Each petition shall be verified and contain a
21 statement of facts constituting a dependency, and the names and
22 residence, if known to the petitioner, of the parents, guardian, or
23 custodian of the alleged dependent child.

24 (3) Every petition filed in proceedings under this chapter shall
25 contain a statement alleging whether the child is or may be an Indian

4 (1)(a) When a child is taken into custody, the court shall hold a
5 shelter care hearing within seventy-two hours, excluding Saturdays,
6 Sundays, and holidays. The primary purpose of the shelter care hearing
7 is to determine whether the child can be immediately and safely
8 returned home while the adjudication of the dependency is pending.

9 (b) Any parent, guardian, or legal custodian who for good cause is
10 unable to attend the shelter care hearing may request that a subsequent
11 shelter care hearing be scheduled. The request shall be made to the
12 clerk of the court where the petition is filed prior to the initial
13 shelter care hearing. Upon the request of the parent, the court shall
14 schedule the hearing within seventy-two hours of the request, excluding

9 enrolled in the school, developmental program, or child care the child

11 the child in the school, program, or child care if it would be in the
12 best interest of the child to remain in the same school, program, or

14 (g) Appointment of a guardian ad litem or attorney;

15 (h) Whether the child is or may be an Indian child as defined in
16 (~~25 U.S.C. Sec. 1903~~) section 4 of this act, whether the provisions
17 of the federal Indian child welfare act or chapter 13.--- RCW (the new
18 chapter created in section 35 of this act) apply, and whether there is
19 compliance with the federal Indian child welfare act and chapter 13.---
20 RCW (the new chapter created in section 35 of this act), including
21 notice to the child's tribe;

22 (i) Whether, as provided in RCW 26.44.063, restraining orders, or
23 orders expelling an allegedly abusive household member from the home of
24 a nonabusive parent, guardian, or legal custodian, will allow the child
25 to safely remain in the home;

26 (j) Whether any orders for examinations, evaluations, or immediate
27 services are needed. The court may not order a parent to undergo
28 examinations, evaluation, or services at the shelter care hearing
29 unless the parent agrees to the examination, evaluation, or service;

30 (k) The terms and conditions for parental, sibling, and family
31 visitation.

32 (5)(a) The court shall release a child alleged to be dependent to
33 the care, custody, and control of the child's parent, guardian, or
34 legal custodian unless the court finds there is reasonable cause to
35 believe that:

36 (i) After consideration of the specific services that have been
37 provided, reasonable efforts have been made to prevent or eliminate the

1 need for removal of the child from the child's home and to make it
2 possible for the child to return home; and

3 (ii)(A) The child has no parent, guardian, or legal custodian to
4 provide supervision and care for such child; or

5 (B) The release of such child would present a serious threat of
6 substantial harm to such child, notwithstanding an order entered
7 pursuant to RCW 26.44.063; or

8 (C) The parent, guardian, or custodian to whom the child could be
9 released has been charged with violating RCW 9A.40.060 or 9A.40.070.

10 (b) If the court does not release the child to his or her parent,
11 guardian, or legal custodian, the court shall order placement with a
12 relative or other suitable person as described in RCW 13.34.130(1)(b),
13 unless there is reasonable cause to believe the health, safety, or
14 welfare of the child would be jeopardized or that the efforts to
15 reunite the parent and child will be hindered. The court must also
16 determine whether placement with the relative or other suitable person
17 is in the child's best interests. The relative or other suitable
18 person must be willing and available to:

19 (i) Care for the child and be able to meet any special needs of the
20 child;

21 (ii) Facilitate the child's visitation with siblings, if such
22 visitation is part of the supervising agency's plan or is ordered by
23 the court; and

24 (iii) Cooperate with the department or supervising agency in
25 providing necessary background checks and home studies.

26 (c) If the child was not initially placed with a relative or other
27 suitable person, and the court does not release the child to his or her
28 parent, guardian, or legal custodian, the supervising agency shall make
29 reasonable efforts to locate a relative or other suitable person

31 shall weigh the child's length of stay and attachment to the current
32 provider in determining what is in the best interest of the child.

1 (e) Any placement with a relative, or other suitable person
2 approved by the court pursuant to this section, shall be contingent
3 upon cooperation with the department's or supervising agency's case
4 plan and compliance with court orders related to the care and
5 supervision of the child including, but not limited to, court orders
6 regarding parent-child contacts, sibling contacts, and any other
7 conditions imposed by the court. Noncompliance with the case plan or
8 court order is grounds for removal of the child from the home of the
9 relative or other suitable person, subject to review by the court.

10 (f) Uncertainty by a parent, guardian, legal custodian, relative,
11 or other suitable person that the alleged abuser has in fact abused the
12 child shall not, alone, be the basis upon which a child is removed from
13 the care of a parent, guardian, or legal custodian under (a) of this
14 subsection, nor shall it be a basis, alone, to preclude placement with
15 a relative or other suitable person under (b) of this subsection.

16 (6)(a) A shelter care order issued pursuant to this section shall
17 include the requirement for a case conference as provided in RCW
18 13.34.067. However, if the parent is not present at the shelter care
19 hearing, or does not agree to the case conference, the court shall not
20 include the requirement for the case conference in the shelter care

22 (b) If the court orders a case conference, the shelter care order

34 schedule and hear the matter on an expedited basis.

35 (2) A copy of the petition shall be attached to each summons.

36 (3) The summons shall advise the parties of the right to counsel.

1 The summons shall also inform the child's parent, guardian, or legal
2 custodian of his or her right to appointed counsel, if indigent, and of
3 the procedure to use to secure appointed counsel.

4 (4) The summons shall advise the parents that they may be held
5 responsible for the support of the child if the child is placed in out-
6 of-home care.

7 (5) The judge may endorse upon the summons an order directing any
8 parent, guardian, or custodian having the custody or control of the
9 child to bring the child to the hearing.

10 (6) If it appears from affidavit or sworn statement presented to
11 the judge that there is probable cause for the issuance of a warrant of
12 arrest or that the child needs to be taken into custody pursuant to RCW

21 for the care and support of children with developmental disabilities.
22 The legislature recognizes that, because of the intense support
23 required to care for a child with developmental disabilities, the help
24 of an out-of-home placement may be needed. It is the intent of the
25 legislature that, when the sole reason for the out-of-home placement is
26 the child's developmental disability, such services be offered by the
27 department to these children and their families through a voluntary
28 placement agreement. In these cases, the parents shall retain legal
29 custody of the child.

30 As used in this section, "voluntary placement agreement" means a
31 written agreement between the department and a child's parent or legal
32 guardian authorizing the department to place the child in a licensed
33 facility. Under the terms of this agreement, the parent or legal
34 guardian shall retain legal custody and the department shall be
35 responsible for the child's placement and care. The agreement shall at
36 a minimum specify the legal status of the child and the rights and
