AN ACT Relating to creating a funding mechanism to promote innovation at community and technical colleges; amending RCW 28B.15.031 and 28B.15.100; reenacting and amending RCW 43.79A.040; adding a new section to chapter 28B.50 RCW; and creating a new section.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

б NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. (1) The legislature finds that the community 7 and technical college system mission to ensure affordable access to 8 higher education geographically distributed throughout the state is 9 aligned with innovative approaches to learning and substantial 10 efficiencies that have been implemented since the legislature 11 established the system in 1967. Systemic approaches include a common 12 accounting system, a common administrative computing system, a single system budget request for operating and capital expenses, and common 13 14 course numbering. Innovative approaches include the system's e-15 learning platform, the adoption of open educational resources, and the 16 adoption of lecture-capture tools that allow students to replay 17 lectures, review classroom materials, and distribute outstanding instruction via the web anytime, anywhere. 18

1 (2) It is the intent of the legislature to further enhance the 2 community and technical college system by making the maximum use of 3 technologies to:

4 (a) Help dismantle the barriers of geographic isolation, cost,
5 competing demands of work and family life, and past educational
6 failure;

7 (b) Create a system for learning that is welcoming to all, easy to 8 enter and use, and tailored to the needs of each learner; and

9 (c) Foster personal relationships and support all students and 10 their families to learn and thrive.

11 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28B.15.031 and 2003 c 232 s 2 are each amended to read 12 as follows:

(1) The term "operating fees" as used in this chapter shall include 13 the fees, other than building fees, charged all students registering at 14 the state's colleges and universities but shall not include fees for 15 16 short courses, self-supporting degree credit programs and courses, 17 marine station work, experimental station work, correspondence or extension courses, and individual instruction and student deposits or 18 19 rentals, disciplinary and library fines, which colleges and 20 universities shall have the right to impose, laboratory, gymnasium, 21 health, technology and student activity fees, or fees, charges, rentals, and other income derived from any or all revenue producing 22 23 lands, buildings and facilities of the colleges or universities 24 heretofore or hereafter acquired, constructed or installed, including but not limited to income from rooms, dormitories, dining rooms, 25 26 hospitals, infirmaries, housing or student activity buildings, vehicular parking facilities, land, or the appurtenances thereon, or 27 such other special fees as may be established by any college or 28 29 university board of trustees or regents from time to time. All moneys 30 received as operating fees at any institution of higher education shall 31 be deposited in a local account containing only operating fees revenue and related interest: PROVIDED, That a minimum of three and one-half 32 33 percent of operating fees shall be retained by the institutions for the 34 purposes of RCW 28B.15.820.

35 (2) In addition to the three and one-half percent of operating fees
36 retained by the institutions under subsection (1) of this section, up
37 to three percent of operating fees charged to students at community and

technical colleges shall be transferred to the community and technical college_innovation_account_for_the_implementation_of_the_college board's_strategic_technology_plan_in_section_3_of_this_act. The percentage_to_be_transferred_to_the_community_and_technical_college innovation account_shall be determined_by the college board_each year but_shall_not_exceed_three_percent_of_the_operating_fees_collected_each year.

8 <u>(3)</u> Local operating fee accounts shall not be subject to 9 appropriation by the legislature or allotment procedures under chapter 10 43.88 RCW.

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 28B.50 RCW 12 to read as follows:

(1) The community and technical college innovation account is 13 created in the custody of the state treasurer. All receipts from 14 operating fees in RCW 28B.15.031(2) must be deposited into the account. 15 16 Expenditures from the account may be used only as provided in 17 subsection (2) of this section. Only the director of the college board or the director's designee may authorize expenditures from the account. 18 19 The account is subject to allotment procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW, 20 but an appropriation is not required for expenditures.

21 (2) Funds in the community and technical college innovation account 22 may be used solely to:

(a) Pay and secure the payment of the principal of and interest on financing contracts, such as certificates of participation issued for the innovation account under chapter 39.94 RCW and authorized by the legislature; and

27 (b) Implement the college board's strategic technology plan to improve student achievement, student services, and increase systemwide 28 administrative efficiencies. The college board must approve projects 29 30 under the strategic technology plan to improve student achievement, 31 student services, and increase systemwide administrative efficiencies before the director authorizes expenditures to be made. For large 32 enterprise resource planning projects, the college board shall develop 33 a technical and operational business plan and submit it to the 34 legislature for approval before the project can be implemented. 35

36 (3) Consistent with the implementation of the strategic technology37 plan, the college board and the community and technical colleges shall

engage in substantial business process reengineering and adopt systemwide approaches to admissions, financial aid, student identification numbers, student transcripts, and other systemwide processes.

(4) If the community and technical college system pursues an 5 enterprise resource planning solution, they shall consider adoption of 6 7 existing solutions already deployed at institutions of higher education in the state; short and long-term total costs of ownership; 8 opportunities for partnerships, collaboration, coordination and 9 10 consolidation with other entities in higher education; technical flexibility; and other requirements that support costs efficiencies. 11 12 If the college board adopts a plan for an enterprise solution that is 13 not coordinated with other institutions of higher education, 14 authorization of expenditure of funds by the legislature must be approved by the office of financial management. 15

Sec. 4. RCW 43.79A.040 and 2010 1st sp.s. c 19 s 22, 2010 1st sp.s. c 13 s 4, 2010 1st sp.s. c 9 s 6, 2010 c 222 s 4, and 2010 c 215 s 7 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

(1) Money in the treasurer's trust fund may be deposited, invested, and reinvested by the state treasurer in accordance with RCW 43.84.080 in the same manner and to the same extent as if the money were in the state treasury, and may be commingled with moneys in the state treasury for cash management and cash balance purposes.

(2) All income received from investment of the treasurer's trust
fund must be set aside in an account in the treasury trust fund to be
known as the investment income account.

27 (3) The investment income account may be utilized for the payment of purchased banking services on behalf of treasurer's trust funds 28 limited to, depository, safekeeping, and 29 including, but not disbursement functions for the state treasurer or affected state 30 31 agencies. The investment income account is subject in all respects to chapter 43.88 RCW, but no appropriation is required for payments to 32 financial institutions. Payments must occur prior to distribution of 33 34 earnings set forth in subsection (4) of this section.

35 (4)(a) Monthly, the state treasurer must distribute the earnings 36 credited to the investment income account to the state general fund 37 except under (b), (c), and (d) of this subsection.

The following accounts and funds must receive their 1 (b) 2 proportionate share of earnings based upon each account's or fund's average daily balance for the period: 3 The Washington promise scholarship account, the college savings program account, the 4 Washington advanced college tuition payment program account, the 5 accessible communities account, the community and technical college 6 innovation account, the agricultural local fund, the American Indian 7 scholarship endowment fund, the foster care scholarship endowment fund, 8 the foster care endowed scholarship trust fund, the students with 9 10 dependents grant account, the basic health plan self-insurance reserve account, the contract harvesting revolving account, the Washington 11 12 state combined fund drive account, the commemorative works account, the 13 county enhanced 911 excise tax account, the Washington international 14 exchange scholarship endowment fund, the toll collection account, the developmental disabilities endowment trust fund, the energy account, 15 the fair fund, the family leave insurance account, the food animal 16 17 veterinarian conditional scholarship account, the fruit and vegetable 18 inspection account, the future teachers conditional scholarship account, the game farm alternative account, the GET ready for math and 19 science scholarship account, the Washington global health technologies 20 21 and product development account, the grain inspection revolving fund, 22 the juvenile accountability incentive account, the law enforcement officers' and firefighters' plan 2 expense fund, the local tourism 23 24 promotion account, the pilotage account, the produce railcar pool 25 account, the regional transportation investment district account, the 26 rural rehabilitation account, the stadium and exhibition center 27 account, the youth athletic facility account, the self-insurance revolving fund, the sulfur dioxide abatement account, the children's 28 trust fund, the Washington horse racing commission Washington bred 29 owners' bonus fund and breeder awards account, the Washington horse 30 racing commission class C purse fund account, the 31 individual 32 development account program account, the Washington horse racing commission operating account (earnings from the Washington horse racing 33 commission operating account must be credited to the Washington horse 34 racing commission class C purse fund account), the life sciences 35 36 discovery fund, the Washington state heritage center account, the 37 reduced cigarette ignition propensity account, and the reading 38 achievement account.

1 (c) The following accounts and funds must receive eighty percent of 2 their proportionate share of earnings based upon each account's or 3 fund's average daily balance for the period: The advanced right-of-way 4 revolving fund, the advanced environmental mitigation revolving 5 account, the federal narcotics asset forfeitures account, the high 6 occupancy vehicle account, the local rail service assistance account, 7 and the miscellaneous transportation programs account.

8 (d) Any state agency that has independent authority over accounts 9 or funds not statutorily required to be held in the custody of the 10 state treasurer that deposits funds into a fund or account in the 11 custody of the state treasurer pursuant to an agreement with the office 12 of the state treasurer shall receive its proportionate share of 13 earnings based upon each account's or fund's average daily balance for 14 the period.

15 (5) In conformance with Article II, section 37 of the state 16 Constitution, no trust accounts or funds shall be allocated earnings 17 without the specific affirmative directive of this section.

18 Sec. 5. RCW 28B.15.100 and 2003 c 232 s 6 are each amended to read 19 as follows:

20 (1) The governing boards of the state universities, the regional 21 universities, The Evergreen State College, and the community colleges shall charge to and collect from each of the students registering at 22 the particular institution for any quarter or semester such tuition 23 24 fees and services and activities fees, and other fees as such board shall in its discretion determine. For the governing boards of the 25 26 state universities, the regional universities, and The Evergreen State College, the total of all fees shall be rounded to the nearest whole 27 dollar amount: PROVIDED, That such tuition fees shall be established 28 in accordance with RCW 28B.15.067. 29

30 (2) Part-time students shall be charged tuition and services and 31 activities fees proportionate to full-time student rates established for residents and nonresidents: PROVIDED, That except for students 32 registered at community colleges, students registered for fewer than 33 two credit hours shall be charged tuition and services and activities 34 fees at the rate established for two credit hours: PROVIDED FURTHER, 35 36 That, subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, residents of Idaho 37 or Oregon who are enrolled in community college district number twenty

for six or fewer credits during any quarter or semester may be exempted from payment of all or a portion of the nonresident tuition fees differential upon a declaration by the higher education coordinating board that it finds Washington residents from the community college district are afforded substantially equivalent treatment by such other states.

7 (3) Full-time students registered for more than eighteen credit hours shall be charged an additional operating fee for each credit hour 8 in excess of eighteen hours at the applicable established per credit 9 hour tuition fee rate for part-time students: PROVIDED, That, subject 10 to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, the governing boards of the state 11 universities and the community colleges may exempt all or a portion of 12 13 the additional charge, for students who are registered exclusively in 14 first professional programs in medicine, dental medicine, veterinary medicine, doctor of pharmacy, or law, or who are registered exclusively 15 in required courses in vocational preparatory programs. 16
