- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that technology can be
- 6 effectively integrated into other K-12 core subjects that students are
- 7 expected to know and be able to do. Integration of knowledge and
- 8 skills in technology literacy and fluency into other subjects will
- 9 engage and motivate students to explore high-demand careers, such as
- 10 engineering, mathematics, computer science, communication, art
- 11 entrepreneurship, and others; fields in which skilled individuals will
- 12 create the new ideas, new products, and new industries of the future;
- 13 and fields that demand the collaborative information skills and
- 14 technological fluency of digital citizenship.
- 15 Sec. 2. RCW 28A.150.210 and 2009 c 548 s 103 are each amended to
- 16 read as follows:
- 17 A basic education is an evolving program of instruction that is
- 18 intended to provide students with the opportunity to become responsible

- 1 and respectful global citizens, to contribute to their economic well-
- 2 being and that of their families and communities, to explore and
- 3 understand different perspectives, and to enjoy productive and
- 4 satisfying lives. Additionally, the state of Washington intends to
- 5 provide for a public school system that is able to evolve and adapt in
- 6 order to better focus on strengthening the educational achievement of
- 7 all students, which includes high expectations for all students and
- 8 gives all students the opportunity to achieve personal and academic
- 9 success. To these ends, the goals of each school district, with the
- 10 involvement of parents and community members, shall be to provide
- 11 opportunities for every student to develop the knowledge and skills
- 12 essential to:
- 13 (1) Read with comprehension, write effectively, and communicate
- 14 successfully in a variety of ways and settings and with a variety of
- 15 audiences;
- 16 (2) Know and apply the core concepts and principles of mathematics;
- 17 social, physical, and life sciences; civics and history, including
- 18 different cultures and participation in representative government;
- 19 geography; arts; and health and fitness;
- 20 (3) Think analytically, logically, and creatively, and to integrate
- 21 <u>technology literacy and fluency as well as</u> different experiences and
- 22 knowledge to form reasoned judgments and solve problems; and
- 23 (4) Understand the importance of work and finance and how
- 24 performance, effort, and decisions directly affect future career and
- 25 educational opportunities.
- 26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** This act takes effect September 1, 2011.
