10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

11 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** This act is intended to reconcile and  
12 conform amendments made in chapter 161, Laws of 2010 with other  
13 legislation passed during the 2010 legislative sessions, as well as  
14 provide technical amendments to codified sections affected by chapter  
15 161, Laws of 2010. Any statutory changes made by this act should be  
16 interpreted as technical in nature and not be interpreted to have any  
17 substantive policy or legal implications.

18 **Sec. 2.** RCW 4.24.210 and 2006 c 212 s 6 are each amended to read  
19 as follows:

20 (1) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (3) or (4) of this  
21 section, any public or private landowners or others in lawful  
22 possession and control of any lands whether designated resource, rural,  
23 or urban, or water areas or channels and lands adjacent to such areas  
24 or channels, who allow members of the public to use them for the  
25 purposes of outdoor recreation, which term includes, but is not limited  
26 to, the cutting, gathering, and removing of firewood by private persons  
27 for their personal use without purchasing the firewood from the  
28 landowner, hunting, fishing, camping, picnicking, swimming, hiking,  
29 bicycling, skateboarding or other nonmotorized wheel-based activities,  
30 hanggliding, paragliding, rock climbing, the riding of horses or other  
31 animals, clam digging, pleasure driving of off-road vehicles,  
32 snowmobiles, and other vehicles, boating, nature study, winter or water  
33 sports, viewing or enjoying historical, archaeological, scenic, or  
34 scientific sites, without charging a fee of any kind therefor, shall  
35 not be liable for unintentional injuries to such users.

1 (2) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (3) or (4) of this  
2 section, any public or private landowner or others in lawful possession  
3 and control of any lands whether rural or urban, or water areas or  
4 channels and lands adjacent to such areas or channels, who offer or  
5 allow such land to be used for purposes of a fish or wildlife  
6 cooperative project, or allow access to such land for cleanup of litter  
7 or other solid waste, shall not be liable for unintentional injuries to  
8 any volunteer group or to any other users.

9 (3) Any public or private landowner, or others in lawful possession  
10 and control of the land, may charge an administrative fee of up to  
11 twenty-five dollars for the cutting, gathering, and removing of  
12 firewood from the land.

13 (4) Nothing in this section shall prevent the liability of a  
14 landowner or others in lawful possession and control for injuries  
15 sustained to users by reason of a known dangerous artificial latent  
16 condition for which warning signs have not been conspicuously posted.  
17 A fixed anchor used in rock climbing and put in place by someone other  
18 than a landowner is not a known dangerous artificial latent condition  
19 and a landowner under subsection (1) of this section shall not be  
20 liable for unintentional injuries resulting from the condition or use  
21 of such an anchor. Nothing in RCW 4.24.200 and this section limits or  
22 expands in any way the doctrine of attractive nuisance. Usage by  
23 members of the public, volunteer groups, or other users is permissive  
24 and does not support any claim of adverse possession.

25 (5) For purposes of this section, the following are not fees:

26 (a) A license or permit issued for statewide use under authority of  
27 chapter 79A.05 RCW or Title 77 RCW; and

28 (b) A daily charge not to exceed twenty dollars per person, per  
29 day, for access to a publicly owned ORV sports park, as defined in RCW  
30 (~~46.09.020~~) 46.09.310, or other public facility accessed by a  
31 highway, street, or nonhighway road for the purposes of off-road  
32 vehicle use.

33 **Sec. 3.** RCW 7.68.035 and 2009 c 479 s 8 are each amended to read  
34 as follows:

35 (1)(a) When any person is found guilty in any superior court of  
36 having committed a crime, except as provided in subsection (2) of this  
37 section, there shall be imposed by the court upon such convicted person

1 a penalty assessment. The assessment shall be in addition to any other  
2 penalty or fine imposed by law and shall be five hundred dollars for  
3 each case or cause of action that includes one or more convictions of  
4 a felony or gross misdemeanor and two hundred fifty dollars for any  
5 case or cause of action that includes convictions of only one or more  
6 misdemeanors.

7 (b) When any juvenile is adjudicated of any offense in any juvenile  
8 offense disposition under Title 13 RCW, except as provided in  
9 subsection (2) of this section, there shall be imposed upon the  
10 juvenile offender a penalty assessment. The assessment shall be in  
11 addition to any other penalty or fine imposed by law and shall be one  
12 hundred dollars for each case or cause of action that includes one or  
13 more adjudications for a felony or gross misdemeanor and seventy-five  
14 dollars for each case or cause of action that includes adjudications of  
15 only one or more misdemeanors.

16 (2) The assessment imposed by subsection (1) of this section shall  
17 not apply to motor vehicle crimes defined in Title 46 RCW except those  
18 defined in the following sections: RCW 46.61.520, 46.61.522,  
19 46.61.024, 46.52.090, 46.70.140, 46.61.502, 46.61.504, 46.52.101,  
20 46.20.410, 46.52.020, (~~(46.10.130, 46.09.130,)~~) 46.10.495, 46.09.480,  
21 46.61.5249, 46.61.525, 46.61.685, 46.61.530, 46.61.500, 46.61.015,  
22 46.52.010, 46.44.180, (~~(46.10.090(2))~~) 46.10.490(2), and  
23 (~~(46.09.120(2))~~) 46.09.470(2).

24 (3) When any person accused of having committed a crime posts bail  
25 in superior court pursuant to the provisions of chapter 10.19 RCW and  
26 such bail is forfeited, there shall be deducted from the proceeds of  
27 such forfeited bail a penalty assessment, in addition to any other  
28 penalty or fine imposed by law, equal to the assessment which would be  
29 applicable under subsection (1) of this section if the person had been  
30 convicted of the crime.

31 (4) Such penalty assessments shall be paid by the clerk of the  
32 superior court to the county treasurer who shall monthly transmit the  
33 money as provided in RCW 10.82.070. Each county shall deposit fifty  
34 percent of the money it receives per case or cause of action under  
35 subsection (1) of this section and retains under RCW 10.82.070, not  
36 less than one and seventy-five one-hundredths percent of the remaining  
37 money it retains under RCW 10.82.070 and the money it retains under  
38 chapter 3.62 RCW, and all money it receives under subsection (7) of

1 this section into a fund maintained exclusively for the support of  
2 comprehensive programs to encourage and facilitate testimony by the  
3 victims of crimes and witnesses to crimes. A program shall be  
4 considered "comprehensive" only after approval of the department upon  
5 application by the county prosecuting attorney. The department shall  
6 approve as comprehensive only programs which:

7 (a) Provide comprehensive services to victims and witnesses of all  
8 types of crime with particular emphasis on serious crimes against  
9 persons and property. It is the intent of the legislature to make  
10 funds available only to programs which do not restrict services to  
11 victims or witnesses of a particular type or types of crime and that  
12 such funds supplement, not supplant, existing local funding levels;

13 (b) Are administered by the county prosecuting attorney either  
14 directly through the prosecuting attorney's office or by contract  
15 between the county and agencies providing services to victims of crime;

16 (c) Make a reasonable effort to inform the known victim or his or  
17 her surviving dependents of the existence of this chapter and the  
18 procedure for making application for benefits;

19 (d) Assist victims in the restitution and adjudication process; and

20 (e) Assist victims of violent crimes in the preparation and  
21 presentation of their claims to the department of labor and industries  
22 under this chapter.

23 Before a program in any county west of the Cascade mountains is  
24 submitted to the department for approval, it shall be submitted for  
25 review and comment to each city within the county with a population of  
26 more than one hundred fifty thousand. The department will consider if  
27 the county's proposed comprehensive plan meets the needs of crime  
28 victims in cases adjudicated in municipal, district or superior courts  
29 and of crime victims located within the city and county.

30 (5) Upon submission to the department of a letter of intent to  
31 adopt a comprehensive program, the prosecuting attorney shall retain  
32 the money deposited by the county under subsection (4) of this section  
33 until such time as the county prosecuting attorney has obtained  
34 approval of a program from the department. Approval of the  
35 comprehensive plan by the department must be obtained within one year  
36 of the date of the letter of intent to adopt a comprehensive program.  
37 The county prosecuting attorney shall not make any expenditures from  
38 the money deposited under subsection (4) of this section until approval

1 of a comprehensive plan by the department. If a county prosecuting  
2 attorney has failed to obtain approval of a program from the department  
3 under subsection (4) of this section or failed to obtain approval of a  
4 comprehensive program within one year after submission of a letter of  
5 intent under this section, the county treasurer shall monthly transmit  
6 one hundred percent of the money deposited by the county under  
7 subsection (4) of this section to the state treasurer for deposit in  
8 the state general fund.

9 (6) County prosecuting attorneys are responsible to make every  
10 reasonable effort to insure that the penalty assessments of this  
11 chapter are imposed and collected.

12 (7) Every city and town shall transmit monthly one and seventy-five  
13 one-hundredths percent of all money, other than money received for  
14 parking infractions, retained under RCW 3.50.100 and 35.20.220 to the  
15 county treasurer for deposit as provided in subsection (4) of this  
16 section.

17 **Sec. 4.** RCW 18.27.100 and 2008 c 120 s 2 are each amended to read  
18 as follows:

19 (1) Except as provided in RCW 18.27.065 for partnerships and joint  
20 ventures, no person who has registered under one name as provided in  
21 this chapter shall engage in the business, or act in the capacity, of  
22 a contractor under any other name unless such name also is registered  
23 under this chapter.

24 (2) All advertising and all contracts, correspondence, cards,  
25 signs, posters, papers, and documents which show a contractor's name or  
26 address shall show the contractor's name or address as registered under  
27 this chapter.

28 (3)(a) All advertising that shows the contractor's name or address  
29 shall show the contractor's current registration number. The  
30 registration number may be omitted in an alphabetized listing of  
31 registered contractors stating only the name, address, and telephone  
32 number: PROVIDED, That signs on motor vehicles subject to RCW  
33 (~~46.16.010~~) 46.16A.030 and on-premise signs shall not constitute  
34 advertising as provided in this section. All materials used to  
35 directly solicit business from retail customers who are not businesses  
36 shall show the contractor's current registration number. A contractor  
37 shall not use a false or expired registration number in purchasing or

1 offering to purchase an advertisement for which a contractor  
2 registration number is required. Advertising by airwave transmission  
3 shall not be subject to this subsection (3)(a).

4 (b) The director may issue a subpoena to any person or entity  
5 selling any advertising subject to this section for the name, address,  
6 and telephone number provided to the seller of the advertising by the  
7 purchaser of the advertising. The subpoena must have enclosed a  
8 stamped, self-addressed envelope and blank form to be filled out by the  
9 seller of the advertising. If the seller of the advertising has the  
10 information on file, the seller shall, within a reasonable time, return  
11 the completed form to the department. The subpoena must be issued no  
12 more than two days after the expiration of the issue or publication  
13 containing the advertising or after the broadcast of the advertising.  
14 The good-faith compliance by a seller of advertising with a written  
15 request of the department for information concerning the purchaser of  
16 advertising shall constitute a complete defense to any civil or  
17 criminal action brought against the seller of advertising arising from  
18 such compliance. Advertising by airwave or electronic transmission is  
19 subject to this subsection (3)(b).

20 (4) No contractor shall advertise that he or she is bonded and  
21 insured because of the bond required to be filed and sufficiency of  
22 insurance as provided in this chapter.

23 (5) A contractor shall not falsify a registration number and use  
24 it, or use an expired registration number, in connection with any  
25 solicitation or identification as a contractor. All individual  
26 contractors and all partners, associates, agents, salesmen, solicitors,  
27 officers, and employees of contractors shall use their true names and  
28 addresses at all times while engaged in the business or capacity of a  
29 contractor or activities related thereto.

30 (6) Any advertising by a person, firm, or corporation soliciting  
31 work as a contractor when that person, firm, or corporation is not  
32 registered pursuant to this chapter is a violation of this chapter.

33 (7) An applicant or registrant who falsifies information on an  
34 application for registration commits a violation under this section.

35 (8)(a) The finding of a violation of this section by the director  
36 at a hearing held in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act,  
37 chapter 34.05 RCW, shall subject the person committing the violation to



1 a penalty of not more than ten thousand dollars as determined by the  
2 director.

3 (b) Penalties under this section shall not apply to a violation  
4 determined to be an inadvertent error.

5 **Sec. 5.** RCW 19.116.020 and 1990 c 44 s 3 are each amended to read  
6 as follows:

7 The definitions set forth in this section apply throughout this  
8 chapter, unless the context requires otherwise:

9 (1) "Debtor" has the meaning set forth in RCW ((~~62A.9-105(1)(d)~~)  
10 62A.9A-102.

11 (2) "Motor vehicle" means a vehicle required to be registered under  
12 chapter ((~~46.16~~)) 46.16A RCW.

13 (3) "Person" means an individual, company, firm, association,  
14 partnership, trust, corporation, or other legal entity.

15 (4) "Security agreement" has the meaning set forth in RCW ((~~62A.9-~~  
16 ~~105(1)(1)~~)) 62A.9A-102.

17 (5) "Security interest" has the meaning set forth in RCW 62A.1-  
18 201(37).

19 (6) "Secured party" has the meaning set forth in RCW ((~~62A.9-~~  
20 ~~105(1)(m)~~)) 62A.9A-102.

21 **Sec. 6.** RCW 19.118.170 and 1995 c 254 s 9 are each amended to read  
22 as follows:

23 Notwithstanding RCW ((~~46.12.380~~)) 46.12.635, the department of  
24 licensing shall make available to the registered owner all title  
25 history information regarding the vehicle upon request of the  
26 registered owner and receipt of a statement that he or she is  
27 investigating or pursuing rights under this chapter.

28 **Sec. 7.** RCW 43.21A.667 and 2009 c 564 s 933 are each amended to  
29 read as follows:

30 (1) The freshwater aquatic algae control account is created in the  
31 state treasury. Moneys directed to the account from RCW ((~~88.02.050~~)  
32 88.02.640) must be deposited in the account. Expenditures from the  
33 account may only be used as provided in this section. Moneys in the  
34 account may be spent only after appropriation.

1 (2) Funds in the freshwater aquatic algae control account may be  
2 appropriated to the department to develop a freshwater aquatic algae  
3 control program. Funds must be expended as follows:

4 (a) As grants to cities, counties, tribes, special purpose  
5 districts, and state agencies to manage excessive freshwater algae,  
6 with priority for the treatment of lakes in which harmful algal blooms  
7 have occurred within the past three years; and during the 2009-2011  
8 fiscal biennium to provide grants for sea lettuce research and removal  
9 to assist Puget Sound communities that are impacted by hyperblooms of  
10 sea lettuce; and

11 (b) To provide technical assistance to applicants and the public  
12 about aquatic algae control.

13 (3) The department shall submit a biennial report to the  
14 appropriate legislative committees describing the actions taken to  
15 implement this section along with suggestions on how to better fulfill  
16 the intent of chapter 464, Laws of 2005. The first report is due  
17 December 1, 2007.

18 **Sec. 8.** RCW 43.43.400 and 2007 c 350 s 1 are each amended to read  
19 as follows:

20 (1) The definitions in this subsection apply throughout this  
21 section unless the context clearly requires otherwise:

22 (a) "Aquatic invasive species" means any invasive, prohibited,  
23 regulated, unregulated, or unlisted aquatic animal or plant species as  
24 defined under RCW 77.08.010 (~~((49) through (54))~~) (28), (40), (44),  
25 (58), and (59), aquatic noxious weeds as defined under RCW  
26 17.26.020(5)(c), and aquatic nuisance species as defined under RCW  
27 77.60.130(1).

28 (b) "Recreational and commercial watercraft" includes the boat, as  
29 well as equipment used to transport the boat, and any auxiliary  
30 equipment such as attached or detached outboard motors.

31 (2) The aquatic invasive species enforcement account is created in  
32 the state treasury. Moneys directed to the account from RCW  
33 (~~((88.02.050))~~) 88.02.640 must be deposited in the account. Expenditures  
34 from the account may only be used as provided in this section. Moneys  
35 in the account may be spent only after appropriation.

36 (3) Funds in the aquatic invasive species enforcement account may  
37 be appropriated to the Washington state patrol and the department of

1 fish and wildlife to develop an aquatic invasive species enforcement  
2 program for recreational and commercial watercraft, which includes  
3 equipment used to transport the watercraft and auxiliary equipment such  
4 as attached or detached outboard motors. Funds must be expended as  
5 follows:

6 (a) By the Washington state patrol, to inspect recreational and  
7 commercial watercraft that are required to stop at port of entry weigh  
8 stations managed by the Washington state patrol. The watercraft must  
9 be inspected for the presence of aquatic invasive species; and

10 (b) By the department of fish and wildlife to:

11 (i) Establish random check stations, to inspect recreational and  
12 commercial watercraft as provided for in RCW 77.12.879(3);

13 (ii) Inspect or delegate inspection of recreational and commercial  
14 watercraft. If the department conducts the inspection, there will be  
15 no cost to the person requesting the inspection;

16 (iii) Provide training to all department employees that are  
17 deployed in the field to inspect recreational and commercial  
18 watercraft; and

19 (iv) Provide an inspection receipt verifying that the watercraft is  
20 not contaminated after the watercraft has been inspected at a check  
21 station or has been inspected at the request of the owner of the  
22 recreational or commercial watercraft. The inspection receipt is valid  
23 until the watercraft is used again.

24 (4) The Washington state patrol and the department of fish and  
25 wildlife shall submit a biennial report to the appropriate legislative  
26 committees describing the actions taken to implement this section along  
27 with suggestions on how to better fulfill the intent of chapter 464,  
28 Laws of 2005. The first report is due December 1, 2007.

29 **Sec. 9.** RCW 43.121.100 and 2005 c 53 s 4 are each amended to read  
30 as follows:

31 The council may accept contributions, grants, or gifts in cash or  
32 otherwise, including funds generated by the sale of "heirloom" birth  
33 certificates under chapter 70.58 RCW from persons, associations, or  
34 corporations and funds generated through the issuance of the "Keep Kids  
35 Safe" license plate under chapter ((46.16)) 46.18 RCW. All moneys  
36 received by the council or any employee thereof from contributions,  
37 grants, or gifts and not through appropriation by the legislature shall

1 be deposited in a depository approved by the state treasurer to be  
2 known as the children's trust fund. Disbursements of such funds shall  
3 be on the authorization of the council or a duly authorized  
4 representative thereof and only for the purposes stated in RCW  
5 43.121.050. In order to maintain an effective expenditure and revenue  
6 control, such funds shall be subject in all respects to chapter 43.88  
7 RCW, but no appropriation shall be required to permit expenditure of  
8 such funds.

11 The department is vested with all powers, functions, and duties  
12 with respect to and including the following:

16 (3) The motor vehicle excise tax as provided in chapter 82.44 RCW;

17 (4) The travel trailers and campers excise tax as provided in  
18 chapter 82.50 RCW;

19 (5) All general powers and duties relating to motor vehicles as  
20 provided in chapter 46.08 RCW;

21 (6) Certificates of title and registration certificates as provided  
22 in chapters 46.12 and (~~46.16~~) 46.16A RCW;

23 (7) The registration of motor vehicles as provided in chapter  
24 (~~46.16~~) 46.16A RCW;

25 (8) Dealers' licenses as provided in chapter 46.70 RCW;

26 (9) The licensing of motor vehicle transporters as provided in  
27 chapter 46.76 RCW;

28 (10) The licensing of vehicle wreckers as provided in chapter 46.80  
29 RCW;

30 (11) The administration of the laws relating to reciprocal or  
31 proportional registration of motor vehicles as provided in chapter  
32 46.85 RCW;

33 (12) The licensing of passenger vehicles for hire as provided in  
34 chapter 46.72 RCW;

35 (13) Drivers' licenses as provided in chapter 46.20 RCW;

36 (14) Commercial driver training schools as provided in chapter

31 (e) Transfer a license plate or plates issued under this chapter  
32 between two or more vehicles without first making application to  
33 transfer the license plates. A violation of this subsection (7)(e) is  
34 a traffic infraction subject to a fine not to exceed five hundred  
35 dollars. Any law enforcement agency that determines that a license  
36 plate or plates have been transferred between two or more vehicles  
37 shall confiscate the license plate or plates and return them to the  
38 department for nullification along with full details of the reasons for

1 confiscation. Each vehicle identified in the transfer will be issued  
2 a new license plate or plates upon application by the owner or owners

33 (14) "Protection product seller" means the person who sells the  
34 protection product to the consumer.

35 (15) "Provider fee" means the consideration paid by a consumer for  
36 a service contract.

37 (16) "Reimbursement insurance policy" means a policy of insurance  
38 that is issued to a service contract provider or a protection product

1 guarantee provider to provide reimbursement to the service contract  
2 provider or the protection product guarantee provider or to pay on  
3 behalf of the service contract provider or the protection product  
4 guarantee provider all contractual obligations incurred by the service  
5 contract provider or the protection product guarantee provider under  
6 the terms of the insured service contracts or protection product

9 (17)(a) "Service contract" means a contract or agreement for

36 service contract to the consumer.

37 (21) "Warranty" means a warranty made solely by the manufacturer,  
38 importer, or seller of property or services without consideration; that

1 is not negotiated or separated from the sale of the product and is  
2 incidental to the sale of the product; and that guarantees indemnity  
3 for defective parts, mechanical or electrical breakdown, labor, or  
4 other remedial measures, such as repair or replacement of the property  
5 or repetition of services.

13 department shall provide training to Washington state patrol employees  
14 working at port of entry weigh stations, and other local law  
15 enforcement employees, on how to inspect recreational and commercial  
16 watercraft for the presence of aquatic invasive species. A person who  
17 enters Washington by road transporting any commercial or recreational  
18 watercraft that has been used in any designated aquatic invasive  
19 species state or foreign country as defined by rule of the department  
20 must have in his or her possession valid documentation that the  
21 watercraft has been inspected and found free of aquatic invasive  
22 species. The department is authorized to require persons transporting  
23 recreational and commercial watercraft to stop at check stations.  
24 Check stations must be plainly marked by signs, operated by at least  
25 one uniformed fish and wildlife officer, and operated in a safe manner.  
26 Any person stopped at a check station who possesses a recreational or  
27 commercial watercraft that has been used in any designated aquatic  
28 invasive species state or foreign country as defined by rule of the  
29 department, or that is contaminated with aquatic invasive species, must  
30 bear the expense for any necessary impoundment, transportation,  
31 cleaning, and decontamination of the watercraft. Any person stopped at  
32 a check station who possesses a recreational or commercial watercraft
