## SENATE BILL 5270

## State of Washington 63rd Legislature 2013 Regular Session

Read first time 01/24/13. Referred to Committee on Governmental Operations.

AN ACT Relating to motor voter preregistration for sixteen and seventeen year olds; amending RCW 46.20.155 and 29A.08.710; reenacting and amending RCW 42.56.250; and creating new sections.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature is committed to granting equal access to voter registration for all voters. б The legislature 7 recognizes the importance of fostering lifelong civic participation. 8 Currently, many young people are denied access to the most popular form 9 of voter registration, motor voter. More than forty percent of new 10 voters are registered through motor voter, but this easy and popular 11 form of voter registration is not available to young people if they obtained their driver's license at the age of sixteen or seventeen. 12 13 Denial of motor voter to so many young voters has contributed to lower 14 voter registration levels in the youngest voter age groups. In Washington, according to the United States census bureau, only 50.8 15 16 percent of eligible citizens between the ages of eighteen and twenty-17 four are registered to vote, compared to sixty-eight to eighty percent for other age groups. Studies show that young adults who vote are 18 19 likely to continue to do so throughout adulthood. The legislature

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1 recognizes that these representational disparities in registration 2 rates and voting rates within the youth electorate will improve by 3 enacting election policies that engage all young citizens. Therefore, 4 the legislature declares that this act, allowing eligible youth at 5 least sixteen years of age to preregister to vote, is intended to 6 increase voter turnout in young adults.

7 **Sec. 2.** RCW 46.20.155 and 2009 c 369 s 42 are each amended to read 8 as follows:

9 (1) Before issuing an original license or identicard or renewing a 10 license or identicard under this chapter, the licensing agent shall 11 determine if the applicant wants to <u>preregister or</u> register to vote or 12 transfer his or her voter registration by asking the following 13 question:

14 "Do you want to <u>preregister or</u> register to vote or transfer your 15 voter registration?"

16 If the applicant chooses to <u>preregister</u>, register, or transfer a 17 registration, the agent shall ask the following:

18 (1) "Are you a United States citizen?"

19 (2) "Are you ((or will you be eighteen)) at least sixteen years of 20 age ((on or before the next election))?"

If the applicant answers in the affirmative to both questions, the agent shall then submit the <u>preregistration</u>, registration, or transfer. If the applicant answers in the negative to either question, the agent shall not submit ((a voter registration)) an application. <u>Information</u> <u>provided for preregistration under this section is exempt from public</u> inspection and copying pursuant to RCW 42.56.250.

(2) The department shall establish a procedure that substantially meets the requirements of subsection (1) of this section when permitting an applicant to renew a license or identicard by mail or by electronic commerce.

31 **Sec. 3.** RCW 29A.08.710 and 2005 c 246 s 17 are each amended to 32 read as follows:

33 (1) The county auditor shall have custody of the original voter 34 registration records for each county. The original voter registration 35 form must be filed without regard to precinct and is considered 1 confidential and unavailable for public inspection and copying. An 2 automated file of all registered voters must be maintained pursuant to 3 RCW 29A.08.125. An auditor may maintain the automated file in lieu of 4 filing or maintaining the original voter registration forms if the 5 automated file includes all of the information from the original voter 6 registration forms including, but not limited to, a retrievable 7 facsimile of each voter's signature.

8 (2) The following information contained in voter registration records or files regarding a voter or a group of voters is available 9 10 for public inspection and copying, except as provided in RCW 40.24.060: 11 The voter's name, address, political jurisdiction, gender, date of 12 birth, voting record, date of registration, and registration number. 13 The information contained in voter preregistration applications under RCW 46.20.155 is exempt from public inspection and copying. No other 14 information from voter registration records or files is available for 15 public inspection or copying. 16

17 Sec. 4. RCW 42.56.250 and 2010 c 257 s 1 and 2010 c 128 s 9 are 18 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

19 The following employment and licensing information is exempt from 20 public inspection and copying under this chapter:

(1) Test questions, scoring keys, and other examination data used
to administer a license, employment, or academic examination;

(2) All applications for public employment, including the names of
applicants, resumes, and other related materials submitted with respect
to an applicant;

26 (3) The residential addresses, residential telephone numbers, personal wireless telephone numbers, 27 personal electronic mail addresses, social security numbers, and emergency contact information 28 29 of employees or volunteers of a public agency, and the names, dates of 30 birth, residential addresses, residential telephone numbers, personal 31 wireless telephone numbers, personal electronic mail addresses, social 32 security numbers, and emergency contact information of dependents of employees or volunteers of a public agency that are held by any public 33 34 agency in personnel records, public employment related records, or 35 volunteer rosters, or are included in any mailing list of employees or 36 volunteers of any public agency. For purposes of this subsection,

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1 "employees" includes independent provider home care workers as defined 2 in RCW 74.39A.240;

3 (4) Information that identifies a person who, while an agency 4 employee: (a) Seeks advice, under an informal process established by 5 the employing agency, in order to ascertain his or her rights in 6 connection with a possible unfair practice under chapter 49.60 RCW 7 against the person; and (b) requests his or her identity or any 8 identifying information not be disclosed;

9 (5) Investigative records compiled by an employing agency 10 conducting an active and ongoing investigation of a possible unfair 11 practice under chapter 49.60 RCW or of a possible violation of other 12 federal, state, or local laws prohibiting discrimination in employment;

(6) Criminal history records checks for board staff finalist
candidates conducted pursuant to RCW 43.33A.025;

15 (7) ((Except as provided in RCW 47.64.220, salary and benefit 16 information for maritime employees collected from private employers 17 under RCW 47.64.220(1) and described in RCW 47.64.220(2))) Information 18 contained in voter preregistration records under RCW 46.20.155; and

(8) Photographs and month and year of birth in the personnel files of employees and workers of criminal justice agencies as defined in RCW 10.97.030. The news media, as defined in RCW 5.68.010(5), shall have access to the photographs and full date of birth. For the purposes of this subsection, news media does not include any person or organization of persons in the custody of a criminal justice agency as defined in RCW 10.97.030.

26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. This act may be known and cited as the young 27 voter registration equality act.

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
