1 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the 2 following:

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- 4 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 43.10 5 RCW to read as follows:
- 6 (1) An employer must provide reasonable accommodations to an
- 7 employee for a pregnancy-related or childbirth-related health
- 8 condition if she so requests, with written certification from her
- 9 licensed health care provider, unless the employer demonstrates that
- 10 the accommodation would impose an undue hardship on the operation of
- 11 the employer's business. The employee must provide written notice to
- 12 the employer stating that a health condition related to pregnancy or
- 13 childbirth requires accommodation.
- 14 (2) Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, an employee
- 15 who is pregnant or has a health condition related to pregnancy or
- 16 childbirth shall not be required to obtain the advice of her
- 17 licensed health care provider, nor may an employer claim undue
- 18 hardship, for the following accommodations: (a) More frequent,
- 19 longer, or flexible restroom, food, and water breaks; (b) seating;
- 20 and (c) limits on lifting over twenty pounds.
- 21 (3) The employee and employer shall engage in an interactive
- 22 process with respect to an employee's request for a reasonable
- 23 accommodation. The department of labor and industries shall include
- 24 information in the "Your Rights as a Worker" poster, or similar
- 25 required workplace poster, regarding these respective rights and
- 26 responsibilities.

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- 1 (4) Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, an
- 2 employer shall not be required to create a new or additional
- 3 position in order to accommodate an employee pursuant to this
- 4 section, and shall not be required to discharge any employee,
- 5 transfer any other employee with greater seniority, or promote any
- 6 employee.
- 7 (5) An employer shall not require an employee who has a
- 8 pregnancy-related or childbirth-related health condition to accept
- 9 an accommodation, if such accommodation is unnecessary to enable the
- 10 employee to perform her job.
- 11 (6) An employer shall not:
- 12 (a) Take adverse action against an employee who requests or uses
- 13 an accommodation under this section that affects the terms,
- 14 conditions, or privileges of employment;
- 15 (b) Deny employment opportunities to an otherwise qualified
- 16 employee if such denial is based on the employer's need to make
- 17 reasonable accommodation required by this section; or
- 18 (c) Require an employee to take leave if another reasonable
- 19 accommodation can be provided for the employee's pregnancy-related
- 20 or childbirth-related health condition.
- 21 (7) This section does not preempt, limit, diminish, or otherwise
- 22 affect any other provision of law relating to sex discrimination or
- 23 pregnancy, or in any way diminish or limit the coverage for
- 24 pregnancy, childbirth, or a pregnancy-related health condition.
- 25 (8) The definitions in this subsection apply throughout this
- 26 section unless the context clearly requires otherwise.
- 27 (a) "Employee" means an individual employed by an employer.
- 28 (b) "Employer" means a person engaged in an industry who has
- 29 fifteen or more employees for each working day in each of twenty or
- 30 more calendar weeks in the current or preceding calendar year,
- 31 except that this section does not apply to an entity that is exempt
- 32 from federal taxation under U.S.C. Title 26, section 501(c).
- 33 (c) "Reasonable accommodation" means:

- 1 (i) Making existing facilities used by employees readily
- 2 accessible to and usable by employees who have a pregnancy-related
- 3 or childbirth-related disability;
- 4 (ii) Job restructuring, part-time or modified work schedules,
- 5 reassignment to a vacant position, acquisition or modification of
- 6 equipment or devices, appropriate adjustment or modifications of
- 7 examinations;
- 8 (iii) Temporary transfer to a less strenuous or hazardous
- 9 position; and
- 10 (iv) Limits on heavy lifting.
- 11 (d) "Undue hardship" means an action requiring significant
- 12 difficulty or expense, when considered in light of the following
- 13 factors:
- 14 (i) The nature and cost of the accommodation needed;
- 15 (ii) The overall financial resources of the facility or
- 16 facilities involved in the provision of the reasonable
- 17 accommodation; the number of persons employed by the employer; the
- 18 effect on expenses and resources; or the impact otherwise of such
- 19 accommodation upon the employer;
- 20 (iii) The overall financial resources of the employer; the
- 21 overall size of the business, including the number of employees; and
- 22 the number, type, and location of its facilities; and
- 23 (iv) The type of operation or operations of the employer,
- 24 including the composition, structure, and functions of the workforce
- 25 of such employer, the geographic separateness, and administrative or
- 26 fiscal relationship of the facility or facilities in question to the
- 27 employer.
- 28 (9) The attorney general shall investigate complaints and
- 29 enforce this section. Prior to filing a civil cause of action, a
- 30 person aggrieved by a violation of this section must file a
- 31 complaint with the attorney general. The attorney general shall
- 32 investigate to determine if there has been compliance with this
- 33 section. If the investigation indicates there is evidence that a
- 34 violation may have occurred, the attorney general shall issue a

- 1 written determination stating that a violation may have occurred.
- 2 If the investigation indicates that there is insufficient evidence
- 3 that a violation has occurred, the attorney general shall issue a
- 4 written determination stating that there is insufficient evidence to
- 5 determine whether a violation has occurred. The attorney general's
- 6 determination constitutes the final administrative action, but a
- 7 person may seek judicial review of the determination. A person
- 8 aggrieved by a violation of this section may pursue a civil cause of
- 9 action in court only after exhausting the administrative remedy
- 10 provided under this subsection."

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- EFFECT: Strikes the underlying bill that places reasonable accommodation requirements under the Human Rights Commission enforcement authority, and replaces it with reasonable accommodation requirements with enforcement authority under the Attorney General's Office. In particular, the striker does the following:
- (1) Requires an employer to provide reasonable accommodations to an employee for pregnancy-related or childbirth-related health conditions, if the employee requests and has written certification from her health care provider, unless the employer shows that the accommodation would impose an undue hardship;
- (2) Provides that written certification from a health care provider is not required and the employer may not claim undue hardship for accommodations on: restroom, food, or water breaks; seating; and limits on lifting over 20 pounds;
- (3) Requires the employer and employee to engage in an interactive process regarding the request for reasonable accommodation;
- (4) Applies to employers who have 15 or more employees and exempts tax-exempt nonprofit entities;
- (5) Requires the AG to investigate complaints and issue determinations, which are appealable in court, and provides for a cause of action once administrative remedies are exhausted;
- (6) Defines "reasonable accommodation" and "undue hardship" and other terms;
- (7) Prohibits an employer from engaging in certain acts (such as requiring an employee to accept an accommodation, taking adverse action against an employee, and requiring the employee to take leave if a reasonable accommodation can be provided).
