**EFFECT:** The striking amendment:

Makes new supplemental capital appropriations of \$106.6 million for the 2015-2017 biennium, including all appropriation increases and decreases. Of that amount, \$87.3 million is financed from state general obligation bonds and \$19.3 million from other funds. Authorizes various agencies to enter into \$204.7 million in alternative financing contracts for specific projects.

Provides an additional \$4.185 million for two reappropriated projects.
