4 read as follows:

5 (1) The term "operating fees" as used in this chapter shall
6 include the fees, other than building fees, charged all students
7 registering at the state's colleges and universities but shall not
8 include fees for short courses, self-supporting degree credit
9 programs and courses, marine station work, experimental station work,
10 correspondence or extension courses, and individual instruction and
11 student deposits or rentals, disciplinary and library fines, which
12 colleges and universities shall have the right to impose, laboratory,
13 gymnasium, health, technology and student activity fees, or fees,
14 charges, rentals, and other income derived from any or all revenue
15 producing lands, buildings and facilities of the colleges or
16 universities heretofore or hereafter acquired, constructed or
17 installed, including but not limited to income from rooms,
18 dormitories, dining rooms, hospitals, infirmaries, housing or student
19 activity buildings, vehicular parking facilities, land, or the
20 appurtenances thereon, or such other special fees as may be
21 established by any college or university board of trustees or regents
22 from time to time. All moneys received as operating fees at any
23 institution of higher education shall be deposited in a local account
24 containing only operating fees revenue and related interest:
25 PROVIDED, That (~~a minimum of five percent of operating fees shall be~~
26 ~~retained by the four-year institutions of higher education that~~
27 ~~increase tuition for resident undergraduate students above assumed~~
28 ~~tuition increases in the omnibus appropriations act,~~) a minimum of
29 four percent of operating fees shall be retained by four-year
30 institutions of higher education (~~that do not increase tuition for~~
31 ~~resident undergraduates above assumed increases in the omnibus~~
32 ~~appropriations act,~~) and a minimum of three and one-half percent of
33 operating fees shall be retained by the community and technical

1 colleges for the purposes of RCW 28B.15.820. At least thirty percent
2 of operating fees required to be retained by the four-year
3 institutions for purposes of RCW 28B.15.820 shall be used only for
4 the purposes of RCW 28B.15.820(10).

5 (2) In addition to the three and one-half percent of operating
6 fees retained by the institutions under subsection (1) of this
7 section, up to three percent of operating fees charged to students at
8 community and technical colleges shall be transferred to the
9 community and technical college innovation account for the
10 implementation of the college board's strategic technology plan in
11 RCW 28B.50.515. The percentage to be transferred to the community and
12 technical college innovation account shall be determined by the
13 college board each year but shall not exceed three percent of the
14 operating fees collected each year.

15 (3) Local operating fee accounts shall not be subject to
16 appropriation by the legislature but shall be subject to allotment
17 procedures by budget program and fiscal year under chapter 43.88 RCW.

3 net revenue loss from resident undergraduate tuition operating fees
4 based on budgeted full-time equivalent enrollment received for the
5 2015-2017 fiscal biennium under RCW 28B.15.067 (3) and (6), each
6 adjusted for inflation in subsequent biennia.

7 (2) As used in this section and RCW 28B.15.069, "inflation" shall
8 be based on the consumer price index, using the official current
9 base, compiled by the bureau of labor statistics, United States
10 department of labor for the state of Washington. If the bureau of
11 labor statistics develops more than one consumer price index for
12 areas within the state, the index covering the greatest number of
13 people and covering areas exclusively within the boundaries of the
14 state shall be used.

18 this chapter.

19 (2) Beginning in the 2011-12 academic year and through the
20 2014-15 academic year, reductions or increases in full-time tuition
21 fees shall be as provided in the omnibus appropriations act for
22 resident undergraduate students at community and technical colleges.

23 (3)(a) As specified in the omnibus appropriations act, in the
24 2015-16 academic year, full-time tuition operating fees for resident
25 undergraduates at community and technical colleges shall be no more
26 than the 2014-15 tuition operating fee and no less than six percent
27 of the state's average wage as defined in RCW 50.04.355.

33 RCW to read as follows:

34 Beginning with the 2015-2017 omnibus appropriations act and each
35 biennium thereafter, reductions in tuition levels resulting from
36 section 3, chapter ..., Laws of 2015 (section 3 of this act) will
37 allow the legislature to reduce state need grant appropriations by an
38 equal amount from the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium amounts.

1 **Sec. 5.** RCW 28B.15.069 and 2013 2nd sp.s. c 4 s 959 are each
2 amended to read as follows:

3 (1) The building fee for each academic year shall be a percentage
4 of total tuition fees. This percentage shall be calculated by the
5 office of financial management and be based on the actual percentage
6 the building fee is of total tuition for each tuition category in the
7 1994-95 academic year, rounded up to the nearest half percent. After
8 the effective date of this section, the dollar value of the building
9 fee shall not be reduced below the level in the 2014-15 academic year
10 adjusted for inflation. As used in this subsection, "inflation" has
11 the meaning in RCW 28B.15.066(2).

12 (2) The governing boards of each institution of higher education,
13 except for the technical colleges, shall charge to and collect from
14 each student a services and activities fee. A governing board may
15 increase the existing fee annually, consistent with budgeting
16 procedures set forth in RCW 28B.15.045, by a percentage not to exceed
17 the annual percentage increase in student tuition fees for resident
18 undergraduate students: PROVIDED, That such percentage increase shall
19 not apply to that portion of the services and activities fee
20 previously committed to the repayment of bonded debt. These rate
21 adjustments may exceed the fiscal growth factor. For the 2013-2015
22 fiscal biennium, each governing board is authorized to increase the
23 services and activities fees by amounts judged reasonable and
24 necessary by the services and activities fee committee and the
25 governing board consistent with the budgeting procedures set forth in
26 RCW 28B.15.045. The services and activities fee committee provided
27 for in RCW 28B.15.045 may initiate a request to the governing board
28 for a fee increase.

29 (3) Tuition and services and activities fees consistent with
30 subsection (2) of this section shall be set by the state board for
31 community and technical colleges for community college summer school
32 students unless the community college charges fees in accordance with
33 RCW 28B.15.515.

34 (4) Subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, each governing
35 board of a community college may charge such fees for ungraded
36 courses, noncredit courses, community services courses, and self-
37 supporting courses as it, in its discretion, may determine,
38 consistent with the rules of the state board for community and
39 technical colleges.

1 (5) The governing board of a college offering an applied
2 baccalaureate degree program under RCW 28B.50.810 may charge tuition
3 fees for those courses above the associate degree level at rates
4 consistent with rules adopted by the state board for community and
5 technical colleges, not to exceed tuition fee rates at the regional
6 universities.

7 **Sec. 6.** RCW 28B.95.020 and 2012 c 229 s 606 are each reenacted
8 and amended to read as follows:

9 The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter,
10 unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

11 (1) "Academic year" means the regular nine-month, three-quarter,
12 or two-semester period annually occurring between August 1st and July
13 31st.

14 (2) "Account" means the Washington advanced college tuition
15 payment program account established for the deposit of all money
16 received by the office from eligible purchasers and interest earnings
17 on investments of funds in the account, as well as for all
18 expenditures on behalf of eligible beneficiaries for the redemption
19 of tuition units and for the development of any authorized college
20 savings program pursuant to RCW 28B.95.150.

21 (3) "Committee on advanced tuition payment" or "committee" means
22 a committee of the following members: The state treasurer, the
23 director of the office of financial management, the director of the
24 office, or their designees, and two members to be appointed by the
25 governor, one representing program participants and one private
26 business representative with marketing, public relations, or
27 financial expertise.

28 (4) "Contractual obligation" means a legally binding contract of
29 the state with the purchaser and the beneficiary establishing that
30 purchases of tuition units will be worth the same number of tuition
31 units at the time of redemption as they were worth at the time of the
32 purchase, except as provided in RCW 28B.95.030(7).

33 (5) "Eligible beneficiary" means the person for whom the tuition
34 unit will be redeemed for attendance at an institution of higher
35 education. The beneficiary is that person named by the purchaser at
36 the time that a tuition unit contract is accepted by the governing
37 body. Qualified organizations, as allowed under section 529 of the
38 federal internal revenue code, purchasing tuition unit contracts as

1 future scholarships need not designate a beneficiary at the time of
2 purchase.

3 (6) "Eligible purchaser" means an individual or organization that
4 has entered into a tuition unit contract with the governing body for
5 the purchase of tuition units for an eligible beneficiary. The state
6 of Washington may be an eligible purchaser for purposes of purchasing
7 tuition units to be held for granting Washington college bound
8 scholarships.

9 (7) "Full-time tuition charges" means resident tuition charges at
10 a state institution of higher education for enrollments between ten
11 credits and eighteen credit hours per academic term.

12 (8) "Governing body" means the committee empowered by the
13 legislature to administer the Washington advanced college tuition
14 payment program.

15 (9) "Institution of higher education" means an institution that
16 offers education beyond the secondary level and is recognized by the
17 internal revenue service under chapter 529 of the internal revenue
18 code.

19 (10) "Investment board" means the state investment board as
20 defined in chapter 43.33A RCW.

21 (11) "Office" means the office of student financial assistance as
22 defined in chapter 28B.76 RCW.

23 (12) "State institution of higher education" means institutions
24 of higher education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016.

25 (13) "Tuition and fees" means undergraduate tuition and services
26 and activities fees as defined in RCW 28B.15.020 and 28B.15.041
27 rounded to the nearest whole dollar. For purposes of this chapter,
28 services and activities fees do not include fees charged for the
29 payment of bonds heretofore or hereafter issued for, or other
30 indebtedness incurred to pay, all or part of the cost of acquiring,
31 constructing, or installing any lands, buildings, or facilities.

32 (14) "Tuition unit contract" means a contract between an eligible
33 purchaser and the governing body, or a successor agency appointed for
34 administration of this chapter, for the purchase of tuition units for
35 a specified beneficiary that may be redeemed at a later date for an
36 equal number of tuition units, except as provided in RCW
37 28B.95.030(7).

38 (15) "Unit purchase price" means the minimum cost to purchase one
39 tuition unit for an eligible beneficiary. Generally, the minimum
40 purchase price is one percent of the undergraduate tuition and fees

1 for the current year, rounded to the nearest whole dollar, adjusted
2 for the costs of administration and adjusted to ensure the actuarial
3 soundness of the account. The analysis for price setting shall also
4 include, but not be limited to consideration of past and projected
5 patterns of tuition increases, program liability, past and projected
6 investment returns, and the need for a prudent stabilization reserve.

7 **Sec. 7.** RCW 28B.95.030 and 2011 1st sp.s. c 12 s 2 and 2011 1st
8 sp.s. c 11 s 170 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

9 (1) The Washington advanced college tuition payment program shall
10 be administered by the committee on advanced tuition payment which
11 shall be chaired by the director of the office. The committee shall
12 be supported by staff of the office.

13 (2)(a) The Washington advanced college tuition payment program
14 shall consist of the sale of tuition units, which may be redeemed by
15 the beneficiary at a future date for an equal number of tuition units
16 regardless of any increase in the price of tuition, that may have
17 occurred in the interval, except as provided in subsection (7) of
18 this section.

19 (b) Each purchase shall be worth a specific number of or fraction
20 of tuition units at each state institution of higher education as
21 determined by the governing body, except as provided in subsection
22 (7) of this section.

23 (c) The number of tuition units necessary to pay for a full
24 year's, full-time undergraduate tuition and fee charges at a state
25 institution of higher education shall be set by the governing body at
26 the time a purchaser enters into a tuition unit contract, except as
27 provided in subsection (7) of this section.

28 (d) The governing body may limit the number of tuition units
29 purchased by any one purchaser or on behalf of any one beneficiary,
30 however, no limit may be imposed that is less than that necessary to
31 achieve four years of full-time, undergraduate tuition charges at a
32 state institution of higher education. The governing body also may,
33 at its discretion, limit the number of participants, if needed, to
34 ensure the actuarial soundness and integrity of the program.

35 (e) While the Washington advanced college tuition payment program
36 is designed to help all citizens of the state of Washington, the
37 governing body may determine residency requirements for eligible
38 purchasers and eligible beneficiaries to ensure the actuarial
39 soundness and integrity of the program.

1 (3)(a) No tuition unit may be redeemed until two years after the
2 purchase of the unit. Units may be redeemed for enrollment at any
3 institution of higher education that is recognized by the internal
4 revenue service under chapter 529 of the internal revenue code.

5 (b) Units redeemed at a nonstate institution of higher education
6 or for graduate enrollment shall be redeemed at the rate for state
7 public institutions in effect at the time of redemption.

8 (4) The governing body shall determine the conditions under which
9 the tuition benefit may be transferred to another family member. In
10 permitting such transfers, the governing body may not allow the
11 tuition benefit to be bought, sold, bartered, or otherwise exchanged
12 for goods and services by either the beneficiary or the purchaser.

13 (5) The governing body shall administer the Washington advanced
14 college tuition payment program in a manner reasonably designed to be
15 actuarially sound, such that the assets of the trust will be
16 sufficient to defray the obligations of the trust including the costs
17 of administration. The governing body may, at its discretion,
18 discount the minimum purchase price for certain kinds of purchases
19 such as those from families with young children, as long as the
20 actuarial soundness of the account is not jeopardized.

21 (6) The governing body shall annually determine current value of
22 a tuition unit.

23 (7) For the 2015-16 and 2016-17 academic years, the committee and
24 the governing body shall make such one-time adjustments to all
25 unredeemed tuition units purchased before the effective date of this
26 section as may be necessary to ensure that the total payout value of
27 each account at the effective date of this section is not decreased
28 or diluted as a result of the initial application of any changes in
29 tuition under section 3, chapter ..., Laws of 2015 (section 3 of this
30 act). The first notification to holders of tuition units after the
31 adjustment in this subsection is made must include a statement
32 concerning the adjustment.

33 (8) The governing body shall promote, advertise, and publicize
34 the Washington advanced college tuition payment program.

35 ((+8)) (9) In addition to any other powers conferred by this
36 chapter, the governing body may:

37 (a) Impose reasonable limits on the number of tuition units or
38 units that may be used in any one year;

39 (b) Determine and set any time limits, if necessary, for the use
40 of benefits under this chapter;

1 (c) Impose and collect administrative fees and charges in
2 connection with any transaction under this chapter;

3 (d) Appoint and use advisory committees and the state actuary as
4 needed to provide program direction and guidance;

5 (e) Formulate and adopt all other policies and rules necessary
6 for the efficient administration of the program;

7 (f) Consider the addition of an advanced payment program for room
8 and board contracts and also consider a college savings program;

9 (g) Purchase insurance from insurers licensed to do business in
10 the state, to provide for coverage against any loss in connection
11 with the account's property, assets, or activities or to further
12 insure the value of the tuition units;

13 (h) Make, execute, and deliver contracts, conveyances, and other
14 instruments necessary to the exercise and discharge of its powers and
15 duties under this chapter;

16 (i) Contract for the provision for all or part of the services
17 necessary for the management and operation of the program with other
18 state or nonstate entities authorized to do business in the state;

19 (j) Contract for other services or for goods needed by the
20 governing body in the conduct of its business under this chapter;

21 (k) Contract with financial consultants, actuaries, auditors, and
22 other consultants as necessary to carry out its responsibilities
23 under this chapter;

24 (l) Solicit and accept cash donations and grants from any person,
25 governmental agency, private business, or organization; and

26 (m) Perform all acts necessary and proper to carry out the duties
27 and responsibilities of this program under this chapter.

EFFECT: Specifies that in FY 2016, the budget shall set the tuition operating fee between the current 2014-15 academic year levels and 14% of state average wage for UW/WSU; 10% for the regional universities; and 6% for the SBCTC. For FY 2017, the tuition operating fee is 14% of the state average wage for UW/WSU; 10% for the regional universities; and 6% for the SBCTC.

Clarifies that the total payout value of each GET account on the effective date of this section shall not be decreased or diluted as a result of the bill's change in tuition policy.

Provides the GET committee and governing body flexibility to make one-time adjustments each year based on the potential that the tuition operating fee may be different in FY 2016 from FY 2017.

Eliminates the null & void clause.

FISCAL IMPACT: Cost ranges between \$112M and \$232M depending on whether the budget fully funds FY 2016 or keeps tuition at 2014-15 levels.

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
