Brief Summary of Engrossed Substitute Bill (As Amended by Committee)

- Appropriates a total of \$407 million in 2015-17 from several state accounts to state transportation agencies and programs for various transportation purposes.
- Makes distributions of \$53 million in 2015-17 to cities and counties for transportation purposes.
- Transfers amounts between transportation accounts.

Background:

The operating and capital expenses of state transportation agencies and programs are provided for on a biennial basis by an omnibus transportation budget adopted by the Legislature in odd-numbered years. Additionally, supplemental budgets or additive spending measures may be adopted during a biennium, making various modifications to agency appropriations.

Summary of Amended Bill:

Appropriations totaling \$407 million are provided for certain state transportation agencies and programs for the 2015-17 fiscal biennium.

The bill distributes \$53 million in fuel tax receipts to cities and counties for transportation purposes for the 2015-17 fiscal biennium.

The bill makes several transfers between transportation accounts and amends the use of certain accounts during the 2015-17 fiscal biennium to permit the transfers.

Amended Bill Compared to Engrossed Substitute Bill:

All language in the underlying bill is removed. It is replaced with an appropriations act for the 2015-17 fiscal biennium that: (1) makes a total of \$459.75 million in additive appropriations to state transportation agencies and programs, cities, and counties; (2) transfers amounts between accounts; and (3) amends account usages to permit the transfers.

Appropriation: A total of \$459.750 million is appropriated from various transportation accounts.

Fiscal Note: Not requested.

Effective Date of Amended Bill: The bill contains an emergency clause and takes effect immediately.
