Background: To ship fluid milk and milk products across state lines, the Washington State Department of Agriculture (WSDA) administers a milk inspection program in accordance with standards established by the National Conference of Interstate Milk Shipments (NCIMS). A milk assessment fee is assessed to support the dairy inspection program, and to maintain compliance with the provisions of NCIMS and the Grade A Pasteurized Milk Ordinance.

The current authority to collect the milk assessment expires on June 30, 2015.

Summary of Bill: The current authority to assess milk processed in the state is extended until June 30, 2020. The current maximum assessment level of \$0.0054 per hundredweight is retained.

The funds continue to be deposited in the dairy inspection account within the agricultural local fund. The funds continue to be used only to provide inspection services to the dairy industry.

Appropriation: None.

Fiscal Note: Requested on January 6, 2015. [OFM requested ten-year cost projection pursuant to I-960.]

Effective Date: Ninety days after adjournment of session in which bill is passed.

Staff Summary of Public Testimony: PRO: The dairy inspection statute has been updated every five years since 1990, giving WSDA five years to discuss and confirm with the industry that the amount of the inspection fee is correct. This has been done. The program complies with federal requirements in order for milk and milk products to be shipped outside the state. The percentage of Darigold's milk solids exported to the Pacific rim and Mexico is 40 percent.
