AN ACT Relating to the capital budget; making appropriations and 1 2 authorizing expenditures for capital improvements; amending RCW 3 39.80.040, 43.83B.430, 70.148.020, and 43.34.080; amending 2015 3rd sp.s. c 3 ss 1032, 1033, 1036, 1040, 1076, 1077, 1078, 1083, 1108, 4 1114, 2004, 2016, 2023, 2035, 3054, 3084, 3165, 3166, 3179, 3200, 5 3211, 3229, 3235, 4002, 5010, 5011, 5012, 5013, 5028, 5091, 7001, 6 7002, 7012, 7023, 7037, and 7038 (uncodified); adding new sections to 7 8 2015 3rd sp.s. c 3 (uncodified); creating a new section; repealing 2015 3rd sp.s. c 3 s 1072 (uncodified); making appropriations; and 9 10 declaring an emergency.

11 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

A supplemental capital budget is hereby 12 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. 13 adopted and, subject to the provisions set forth in this act, the 14 several dollar amounts hereinafter specified, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby 15 16 appropriated and authorized to be incurred for capital projects 17 during the period beginning with the effective date of this act and 18 ending June 30, 2017, out of the several funds specified in this act.

GENERAL GOVERNMENT

3 FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

4 Housing Trust Fund Appropriation (30000833)

5 The appropriation in this section is subject to the following 6 conditions and limitations:

7 (1) The appropriation in this section is provided solely for the 8 department to award loans and grants on a competitive basis to 9 affordable housing projects statewide that will produce, at a 10 minimum, a total of 1,900 homes and 500 seasonal beds, in the 11 following categories and amounts:

(a) For people with chronic mental illness, 281 homes;

13

(b) For homeless families with children, 529 homes;

14 (c) For people with disabilities, developmental disabilities, 15 veterans, and others, 400 homes; of that number, a minimum of 80 must 16 be for veterans;

(d) For homeless youth, 200 homes;

- 18 (e) For farmworkers, 176 homes and 500 seasonal beds;
- 19 (f) For seniors, 200 homes;
- 20 (g) For homeownership, 100 homes.

(2) If upon review of completed applications, the department determines there are not adequate suitable projects in a category, the department may allocate funds to projects serving other lowincome and special needs populations, provided those projects are located in an area with an identified need for the type of housing proposed.

(3) In evaluating projects for homes for homeless families with 27 children specified in subsection (1)(b) of this section, consistent 28 29 with Engrossed House Bill No. 1633, the department must give preference for applications based on some or all of the criteria in 30 chapter 43.185.070(5), including projects involving collaborative 31 partnerships between local school districts and either public housing 32 authorities or nonprofit housing providers, that help children of 33 34 low-income families succeed in school.

(4) \$625,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided solely for designing, engineering, constructing, installing, and other costs and fees associated with connecting existing and future farmworker housing in Skagit county to the city of Burlington sewer system.

1 (5)(a) \$2,500,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided solely as a grant to ((the Puget Sound regional council)) 2 King county on behalf of jurisdictions within the regional transit 3 authority district encompassing portions of King, Pierce, and 4 Snohomish counties for a revolving loan fund to 5 support the б development of affordable housing opportunities related to equitable transit-oriented development in accordance with Second Engrossed 7 Substitute Senate Bill No. 5987 (transportation revenue). This amount 8 must be provided in the form of a direct grant without a requirement 9 10 that the grant be a reimbursement for local expenditures.

(b) Amounts provided in this section must be used to ((plan, 11 predesign, design, provide technical assistance and financial 12 services, and build low-income housing units in)) support the 13 development or preservation of affordable housing opportunities 14 15 related to equitable transit-oriented development for households whose adjusted income is at or below 80 percent of area median 16 17 income, including underserved communities of concern. "Underserved communities of concern" are persons and families who: (i) Have 18 incomes at or below thirty percent of the median family income for 19 the county or standard metropolitan statistical area where the 20 project is located; (ii) experience chronic homelessness; and (iii) 21 lack affordable housing. Underserved communities of concern include 22 23 veterans, immigrants, and refugee communities.

24 (c) Amounts provided in this section must be matched by local 25 government nonstate cash resources.

26 (6) \$500,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided 27 solely for energy efficiency upgrades for the transitions supportive 28 housing project in north Spokane.

29 (7) \$2,050,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided 30 solely for design and construction of a low-barrier housing facility 31 to serve people with chronic mental illness in north Everett.

32 (8) \$350,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided 33 solely for design and construction of an emergency shelter for women 34 and families by Catholic community services in Kirkland.

35 (9) \$1,400,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided 36 solely for design and construction of an emergency shelter for 37 homeless men by a regional coalition for housing in eastside King 38 county.

Ultra-Efficient Affordable Housing Demonstration (30000836)

9 The appropriation in this section is subject to the following 10 conditions and limitations:

(1) The appropriation in this section is provided solely for loans or grants to low-income housing developers to design and construct ultra-high energy efficient housing projects including single and multifamily units;

(1) \$100,000 of the appropriation is provided solely for a study of available housing opportunities for veterans experiencing homelessness and the conversion of units to provide permanent supportive housing for geriatric veterans with psychiatric disorders. The study must also, in collaboration with the department of veterans affairs, evaluate the feasibility of converting building 10 at the state veterans home at Retsil into housing for veterans.

(2) \$125,000 of the appropriation is provided solely for landlord 24 25 mitigation for the cost of damages that may be caused to private market units renting to housing choice voucher holders. (1) As directed by the department of ecology in consultation with the office of financial management, the state treasurer shall transfer amounts among the state toxics control account, the local toxics control account, and the environmental legacy stewardship account as needed during the 2015-2017 fiscal biennium to maintain positive account balances in all three accounts.

18 (2) As directed by the department of ecology in consultation with 19 the office of financial management, the state treasurer shall 20 transfer amounts from the cleanup settlement account established in RCW 70.105D.130 to the state toxics control account, the local toxics 21 control account or the environmental legacy stewardship account to 22 maintain positive account balances up to an amount not to exceed 23 24 \$13,000,000 that must be considered an inter fund loan that must be repaid with interest to the cleanup settlement account in three equal 25 26 repayments in fiscal years 2018, 2019, and 2020.
