1 AN ACT Relating to clarifying and restating the scope of local 2 authority regarding regulation of fireworks by adopting uniform 3 statewide standards and rules that continue the current limited scope 4 of local authority; amending RCW 70.77.250 and 70.77.270; and 5 declaring an emergency.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

7 **Sec. 1.** RCW 70.77.250 and 2002 c 370 s 19 are each amended to 8 read as follows:

9 (1) The chief of the Washington state patrol, through the 10 director of fire protection, shall enforce and administer this 11 chapter.

12 (2) The chief of the Washington state patrol, through the 13 director of fire protection, shall appoint such deputies and 14 employees as may be necessary and required to carry out the provisions of this chapter. 15

16 (3) The chief of the Washington state patrol, through the 17 director of fire protection, shall adopt those rules relating to 18 fireworks as are necessary for the implementation of this chapter.

19 (4) The chief of the Washington state patrol, through the 20 director of fire protection, shall adopt those rules as are necessary 21 to ensure statewide ((minimum)) standards for the enforcement of this

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chapter. Counties and cities shall comply with these ((state)) 1 statewide standards and rules. A county or a city may enact an 2 3 ordinance that is more restrictive than state law as to the days and hours of legal sale of consumer fireworks, the days and hours of 4 legal use of consumer fireworks, and types of consumer fireworks that 5 б may be sold and used within the geographical boundary of that county 7 or city. Any ordinance((s)) adopted by a county or a city that ((are)) is more restrictive than state law as authorized by this 8 section shall have an effective date no sooner than one year after 9 their adoption. Any provision of any ordinance, standard, rule, or 10 regulation adopted by a county or a city that is in conflict with the 11 12 provisions of this chapter is null and void and shall have no effect. The chief of the Washington state patrol, through the director of 13 fire protection, shall enforce this section and this chapter. 14

15 (5) The chief of the Washington state patrol, through the 16 director of fire protection, may exercise the necessary police powers 17 to enforce the criminal provisions of this chapter. This grant of 18 police powers does not prevent any other state agency and city, 19 county, or local government agency having general law enforcement 20 powers from enforcing this chapter within the jurisdiction of the 21 agency and city, county, or local government.

(6) The chief of the Washington state patrol, through the director of fire protection, shall adopt rules necessary to enforce the civil penalty provisions for the violations of this chapter. A civil penalty under this subsection may not exceed one thousand dollars per day for each violation and is subject to the procedural requirements under RCW 70.77.252.

(7) The chief of the Washington state patrol, through the director of fire protection, may investigate or cause to be investigated all fires resulting, or suspected of resulting, from the use of fireworks.

32 **Sec. 2.** RCW 70.77.270 and 2002 c 370 s 22 are each amended to 33 read as follows:

(1) The governing body of a city or county, or a designee, shall grant an application for a permit under RCW 70.77.260(1) if the application meets the standards under this chapter, and the applicable ordinances of the city or county. The permit shall be granted by June 10, or no less than thirty days after receipt of an application whichever date occurs first, for sales commencing on June 28 and on December 27; or by December 10, or no less than thirty days
after receipt of an application whichever date occurs first, for
sales commencing only on December 27.

(2) NFPA 1124: Code for the manufacture, transportation, storage, 4 and retail sales of fireworks and pyrotechnic articles, 2013 edition 5 as published in August 2012, by the national fire protection 6 association, is adopted in its entirety and without amendment. The 7 chief of the Washington state patrol, through the director of fire 8 protection, shall prescribe uniform, statewide standards and rules as 9 may be required to implement and to give full effect to all of the 10 provisions of this chapter for all requirements for retail fireworks 11 12 stands ((including, but not limited to, the location of the stands, setback requirements and siting of the stands, types of buildings and 13 construction material that may be used for the stands, use of the 14 stands and areas around the stands, cleanup of the area around the 15 16 stands, transportation of fireworks to and from the stands, and 17 temporary storage of fireworks associated with the retail fireworks stands)). All cities and counties ((which)) that allow retail 18 19 fireworks sales shall comply with these standards. Any provision of any ordinance, standard, rule, or regulation adopted by a county or a 20 city that is in conflict with the provisions of this chapter is null 21 and void and shall have no effect. The chief of the Washington state 22 patrol, through the director of fire protection shall enforce this 23 section and this chapter. 24

25 (3) No retail fireworks permit may be issued to any applicant 26 unless the retail fireworks stand is covered by a liability insurance policy with coverage of not less than fifty thousand dollars and five 27 28 hundred thousand dollars for bodily injury liability for each person 29 and occurrence, respectively, and not less than fifty thousand dollars for property damage liability for each occurrence, unless 30 31 such insurance is not readily available from at least three approved 32 insurance companies. If insurance in this amount is not offered, each fireworks permit shall be covered by a liability insurance policy in 33 the maximum amount offered by at least three different approved 34 35 insurance companies.

36 <u>(4)</u> No wholesaler may knowingly sell or supply fireworks to any 37 retail fireworks licensee unless the wholesaler determines that the 38 retail fireworks licensee is covered by liability insurance in the 39 same, or greater, amount as provided in this subsection.

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1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. This act is necessary for the immediate 2 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of 3 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes 4 effect immediately.

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
