1       AN ACT Relating to cybercrime; amending RCW 9.94A.515; reenacting  
2 and amending RCW 9A.52.010; adding a new chapter to Title 9A RCW;  
3 creating new sections; repealing RCW 9A.52.110, 9A.52.120, and  
4 9A.52.130; and prescribing penalties.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6       NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that the rapid pace  
7 of technological change and information computerization in the  
8 digital age generates a never ending sequence of anxiety inducing  
9 reports highlighting how the latest device or innovation is being  
10 used to harm consumers. The legislature finds that this generates an  
11 ongoing pattern of legislation being proposed to regulate each new  
12 technology. The legislature finds that a more systemic approach is  
13 needed to better protect consumers and address these rapidly  
14 advancing technologies. The legislature finds that the application of  
15 traditional criminal enforcement measures that apply long-standing  
16 concepts of trespass, fraud, and theft to activities in the  
17 electronic frontier has not provided the essential clarity,  
18 certainty, and predictability that regulators, entrepreneurs, and  
19 innovators need. The legislature finds that an integrated,  
20 comprehensive methodology, rather than a piecemeal approach, will  
21 provide significant economic development benefits by providing

1 certainty to the innovation community about the actions and  
2 activities that are prohibited. Therefore, the legislature intends to  
3 create a new chapter of crimes to the criminal code to punish and  
4 deter misuse or abuse of technology, rather than the perceived  
5 threats of individual technologies. This new chapter of crimes has  
6 been developed from an existing and proven system of computer  
7 security threat modeling known as the STRIDE system.

8 The legislature intends to strike a balance between public safety  
9 and civil liberties in the digital world, including creating  
10 sufficient space for white hat security research and whistleblowers.  
11 The state whistleblower and public record laws prevent this act from  
12 being used to hide any deleterious actions by government officials  
13 under the guise of security. Furthermore, this act is not intended to  
14 criminalize activity solely on the basis that it violates any terms  
15 of service.

16 The purpose of the Washington cybercrime act is to provide  
17 prosecutors the twenty-first century tools they need to combat  
18 twenty-first century crimes.

19       **NEW SECTION.**   **Sec. 2.**   This act may be known and cited as the  
20 Washington cybercrime act.

21       **NEW SECTION.**   **Sec. 3.**   The definitions in this section apply  
22 throughout this chapter unless the context clearly requires  
23 otherwise.

24       (1) "Access" means to gain entry to, instruct, communicate with,  
25 store data in, retrieve data from, or otherwise make use of any  
26 resources of electronic data, data network, or data system, including  
27 via electronic means.

28       (2) "Cybercrime" includes crimes of this chapter.

29       (3) "Data" means a digital representation of information,  
30 knowledge, facts, concepts, data software, data programs, or  
31 instructions that are being prepared or have been prepared in a  
32 formalized manner and are intended for use in a data network, data  
33 program, data services, or data system.

34       (4) "Data network" means any system that provides digital  
35 communications between one or more data systems or other digital  
36 input/output devices including, but not limited to, display  
37 terminals, remote systems, mobile devices, and printers.

1       (5) "Data program" means an ordered set of electronic data  
2 representing coded instructions or statements that when executed by a  
3 computer causes the device to process electronic data.

4       (6) "Data services" includes data processing, storage functions,  
5 internet services, email services, electronic message services, web  
6 site access, internet-based electronic gaming services, and other  
7 similar system, network, or internet-based services.

8       (7) "Data system" means an electronic device or collection of  
9 electronic devices, including support devices one or more of which  
10 contain data programs, input data, and output data, and that performs  
11 functions including, but not limited to, logic, arithmetic, data  
12 storage and retrieval, communication, and control. This term does not  
13 include calculators that are not programmable and incapable of being  
14 used in conjunction with external files.

15      (8) "Identifying information" means information that, alone or in  
16 combination, is linked or linkable to a trusted entity that would be  
17 reasonably expected to request or provide credentials to access a  
18 targeted data system or network. It includes, but is not limited to,  
19 recognizable names, addresses, telephone numbers, logos, HTML links,  
20 email addresses, registered domain names, reserved IP addresses,  
21 usernames, social media profiles, cryptographic keys, and biometric  
22 identifiers.

23      (9) "Malware" means any set of data instructions that are  
24 designed, without authorization and with malicious intent, to disrupt  
25 computer operations, gather sensitive information, or gain access to  
26 private computer systems. "Malware" does not include software that  
27 installs security updates, removes malware, or causes unintentional  
28 harm due to some deficiency. It includes, but is not limited to, a  
29 group of data instructions commonly called viruses or worms, that are  
30 self-replicating or self-propagating and are designed to infect other  
31 data programs or data, consume data resources, modify, destroy,  
32 record, or transmit data, or in some other fashion usurp the normal  
33 operation of the data, data system, or data network.

34      (10) "White hat security research" means accessing a data  
35 program, service, or system solely for purposes of good faith  
36 testing, investigation, identification, and/or correction of a  
37 security flaw or vulnerability, where such activity is carried out,  
38 and where the information derived from the activity is used,  
39 primarily to promote security or safety.

1       (11) "Without authorization" means to knowingly circumvent  
2 technological access barriers to a data system in order to obtain  
3 information without the express or implied permission of the owner,  
4 where such technological access measures are specifically designed to  
5 exclude or prevent unauthorized individuals from obtaining such  
6 information, but does not include white hat security research or  
7 circumventing a technological measure that does not effectively  
8 control access to a computer. The term "without the express or  
9 implied permission" does not include access in violation of a duty,  
10 agreement, or contractual obligation, such as an acceptable use  
11 policy or terms of service agreement, with an internet service  
12 provider, internet web site, or employer. The term "circumvent  
13 technological access barriers" may include unauthorized elevation of  
14 privileges, such as allowing a normal user to execute code as  
15 administrator, or allowing a remote person without any privileges to  
16 run code.

17       NEW SECTION.   **Sec. 4.**   (1) A person is guilty of computer  
18 trespass in the first degree if the person, without authorization,  
19 intentionally gains access to a computer system or electronic  
20 database of another; and

21           (a) The access is made with the intent to commit another crime in  
22 violation of a state law not included in this chapter; or

23           (b) The violation involves a computer or database maintained by a  
24 government agency.

25       (2) Computer trespass in the first degree is a class C felony.

26       NEW SECTION.   **Sec. 5.**   (1) A person is guilty of computer  
27 trespass in the second degree if the person, without authorization,  
28 intentionally gains access to a computer system or electronic  
29 database of another under circumstances not constituting the offense  
30 in the first degree.

31       (2) Computer trespass in the second degree is a gross  
32 misdemeanor.

33       NEW SECTION.   **Sec. 6.**   (1) A person is guilty of electronic data  
34 service interference if the person maliciously and without  
35 authorization causes the transmission of data, data program, or other  
36 electronic command that intentionally interrupts or suspends access  
37 to or use of a data network or data service.

1                   (2) Electronic data service interference is a class C felony.

2        NEW SECTION.   **Sec. 7.**   (1) A person is guilty of spoofing if he  
3    or she, without authorization, knowingly initiates the transmission,  
4    display, or receipt of the identifying information of another  
5    organization or person for the purpose of gaining unauthorized access  
6    to electronic data, a data system, or a data network, and with the  
7    intent to commit another crime in violation of a state law not  
8    included in this chapter.

9                   (2) Spoofing is a gross misdemeanor.

10      NEW SECTION.   **Sec. 8.**   (1) A person is guilty of electronic data  
11     tampering in the first degree if he or she maliciously and without  
12     authorization:

13       (a)(i) Alters data as it transmits between two data systems over  
14     an open or unsecure network; or

15       (ii) Introduces any malware into any electronic data, data  
16     system, or data network; and

17       (b)(i) Doing so is for the purpose of devising or executing any  
18     scheme to defraud, deceive, or extort, or commit any other crime in  
19     violation of a state law not included in this chapter, or of  
20     wrongfully controlling, gaining access to, or obtaining money,  
21     property, or electronic data; or

22       (ii) The electronic data, data system, or data network is  
23     maintained by a governmental agency.

24                   (2) Electronic data tampering in the first degree is a class C  
25     felony.

26      NEW SECTION.   **Sec. 9.**   (1) A person is guilty of electronic data  
27     tampering in the second degree if he or she maliciously and without  
28     authorization:

29       (a) Alters data as it transmits between two data systems over an  
30     open or unsecure network under circumstances not constituting the  
31     offense in the first degree; or

32       (b) Introduces any malware into any electronic data, data system,  
33     or data network under circumstances not constituting the offense in  
34     the first degree.

35                   (2) Electronic data tampering in the second degree is a gross  
36     misdemeanor.

1        NEW SECTION. **Sec. 10.** (1) A person is guilty of electronic data  
2 theft if he or she intentionally, without authorization, and without  
3 reasonable grounds to believe that he or she has such authorization,  
4 obtains any electronic data with the intent to:

- 5            (a) Devise or execute any scheme to defraud, deceive, extort, or  
6 commit any other crime in violation of a state law not included in  
7 this chapter; or  
8            (b) Wrongfully control, gain access to, or obtain money,  
9 property, or electronic data.

10          (2) Electronic data theft is a class C felony.

11        NEW SECTION. **Sec. 11.** A person who, in the commission of a  
12 crime under this chapter, commits any other crime may be punished for  
13 that other crime as well as for the crime under this chapter and may  
14 be prosecuted for each crime separately.

15        **Sec. 12.** RCW 9A.52.010 and 2011 c 336 s 369 are each reenacted  
16 and amended to read as follows:

17           The following definitions apply in this chapter:

33           ~~((+5)) (2) "Enters or remains unlawfully." A person "enters or~~  
34 ~~remains unlawfully" in or upon premises when he or she is not then~~  
35 ~~licensed, invited, or otherwise privileged to so enter or remain.~~

36           A license or privilege to enter or remain in a building which is  
37 only partly open to the public is not a license or privilege to enter  
38 or remain in that part of a building which is not open to the public.

1 A person who enters or remains upon unimproved and apparently unused  
2 land, which is neither fenced nor otherwise enclosed in a manner  
3 designed to exclude intruders, does so with license and privilege  
4 unless notice against trespass is personally communicated to him or  
5 her by the owner of the land or some other authorized person, or  
6 unless notice is given by posting in a conspicuous manner. Land that  
7 is used for commercial aquaculture or for growing an agricultural  
8 crop or crops, other than timber, is not unimproved and apparently  
9 unused land if a crop or any other sign of cultivation is clearly  
10 visible or if notice is given by posting in a conspicuous manner.  
11 Similarly, a field fenced in any manner is not unimproved and  
12 apparently unused land. A license or privilege to enter or remain on  
13 improved and apparently used land that is open to the public at  
14 particular times, which is neither fenced nor otherwise enclosed in a  
15 manner to exclude intruders, is not a license or privilege to enter  
16 or remain on the land at other times if notice of prohibited times of  
17 entry is posted in a conspicuous manner.

18 ((+6+)) (3) "Premises" includes any building, dwelling, structure  
19 used for commercial aquaculture, or any real property.
