- 4 **Sec. 1.** RCW 26.44.240 and 2008 c 232 s 2 are each amended to 5 read as follows:
- foread as follows:

 6 (1) During an emergency situation when a child must be placed in

out-of-home care due to the absence of appropriate parents or

- 8 custodians, the department shall, or an authorized agency of a
- 9 federally recognized tribe may, request a federal name-based criminal
- 10 history record check of each adult residing in the home of the
- 11 potential placement resource. Upon receipt of the results of the
- 12 name-based check, the department shall, or an authorized agency of a
- 13 <u>federally recognized tribe may,</u> provide a complete set of each adult
- 14 resident's fingerprints to the Washington state patrol for submission
- 15 to the federal bureau of investigation within ((fourteen)) fifteen
- 16 calendar days from the date the name search was conducted. The child
- 17 shall be removed from the home immediately if any adult resident
- 18 fails to provide fingerprints and written permission to perform a
- 19 federal criminal history record check when requested.

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- 20 (2) When placement of a child in a home is denied as a result of
- 21 a name-based criminal history record check of a resident, and the

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- 1 resident contests that denial, the resident shall, within fifteen
- 2 calendar days, submit to the department or an authorized agency of a
- 3 <u>federally recognized tribe</u> a complete set of the resident's
- 4 fingerprints with written permission allowing the department or an
- 5 <u>authorized agency of a federally recognized tribe</u> to forward the
- 6 fingerprints to the Washington state patrol for submission to the
- 7 federal bureau of investigation.
- 8 (3) The Washington state patrol and the federal bureau of 9 investigation may each charge a reasonable fee for processing a 10 fingerprint-based criminal history record check.
- 11 (4) As used in this section, "emergency placement" refers to
 12 those limited instances when the department or an authorized agency
 13 of a federally recognized tribe is placing a child in the home of
 14 private individuals, including neighbors, friends, or relatives, as a
 15 result of a sudden unavailability of the child's primary caretaker.
