1 AN ACT Relating to international commercial arbitration; and 2 adding a new chapter to Title 7 RCW.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** SCOPE OF APPLICATION. (1) This chapter 5 applies to international commercial arbitration, subject to any 6 agreement between the United States and any other country or 7 countries.

8 (2) The provisions of this chapter, except sections 9, 10, 26, 9 27, 28, 46, and 47 of this act, apply only if the place of 10 arbitration is in the territory of this state.

11

(3) An arbitration is international if:

(a) The parties to an arbitration agreement have, at the time of
 the conclusion of that agreement, their places of business in
 different countries;

(b) One of the following places is situated outside the countryor countries in which the parties have their places of business:

17 (i) The place of arbitration if determined in, or pursuant to,18 the arbitration agreement; or

(ii) Any place where a substantial part of the obligations of the commercial relationship is to be performed or the place with which the subject matter of the dispute is most closely connected; or

(c) The parties have expressly agreed that the subject matter of
 the arbitration agreement relates to more than one country.

(4) For the purposes of subsection (3) of this section:

4 (a) If a party has more than one place of business, the place of 5 business is that which has the closest relationship to the 6 arbitration agreement; and

7 (b) If a party does not have a place of business, reference is to8 be made to the party's habitual residence.

9 (5) This chapter shall not affect any other law of this state by 10 virtue of which certain disputes may not be submitted to arbitration 11 or may be submitted to arbitration only according to provisions other 12 than those of this chapter.

13 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. DEFINITIONS AND RULES OF INTERPRETATION.
14 (1) For the purpose of this chapter:

15 (a) "Arbitration" means any arbitration whether or not 16 administered by a permanent arbitral institution.

17 (b) "Arbitral tribunal" means a sole arbitrator or a panel of 18 arbitrators.

19 (c) "Commercial" means matters arising from all relationships of 20 a commercial nature, whether contractual or not, including, but not 21 limited to, any of the following transactions:

(i) A transaction for the supply or exchange of goods orservices;

(ii) A distribution agreement;

25 (iii) A commercial representation or agency;

26 (iv) An exploitation agreement or concession;

27 (v) A joint venture or other related form of industrial or 28 business cooperation;

(vi) The carriage of goods or passengers by air, sea, rail, or 30 road;

- 31 (vii) Construction;
- 32 (viii) Insurance;
- 33 (ix) Licensing;
- 34 (x) Factoring;
- 35 (xi) Leasing;
- 36 (xii) Consulting;
- 37 (xiii) Engineering;
- 38 (xiv) Financing;
- 39 (xv) Banking;

1

(xvi) The transfer of data or technology;

2 (xvii) Intellectual or industrial property, including trademarks,
3 patents, copyrights, and software programs; and

4 (xviii) Professional services.

5 (d) "Court" means a body or organ of the judicial system of this 6 state.

7 (2) Where a provision of this chapter, except section 39 of this 8 act, leaves the parties free to determine a certain issue, such 9 freedom includes the right of the parties to authorize a third party, 10 including an institution, to make that determination.

(3) Where a provision of this chapter refers to the fact that the parties have agreed, that they may agree, or in any other way refers to an agreement of the parties, such agreement includes any arbitration rules referred to in that agreement.

15 (4) Where a provision of this chapter, other than in sections 16 36(1) and 43(2)(a) of this act, refers to a claim, it also applies to 17 a counter-claim, and where it refers to a defense, it also applies to 18 a defense to such counter-claim.

19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. INTERNATIONAL ORIGIN AND GENERAL 20 PRINCIPLES. (1) In the interpretation of this chapter, regard is to 21 be had to its international origin and to the need to promote 22 uniformity in its application and the observance of good faith.

(2) Questions concerning matters governed by this chapter which
 are not expressly settled in it are to be settled in conformity with
 the general principles on which this chapter is based.

26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** RECEIPT OF WRITTEN COMMUNICATIONS. (1) 27 Unless otherwise agreed by the parties:

(a) Any written communication is deemed to have been received if 28 29 it is delivered to the addressee personally or if it is delivered at the addressee's place of business, habitual residence, or mailing 30 address. If none of these can be found after making a reasonable 31 inquiry, a written communication is deemed to have been received if 32 it is sent to the addressee's last-known place of business, habitual 33 34 residence, or mailing address by registered letter or any other means which provides a record of the attempt to deliver it; and 35

36 (b) The communication is deemed to have been received on the day 37 it is so delivered.

(2) The provisions of this section do not apply to communications
 in court proceedings.

3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. WAIVER OF RIGHT TO OBJECT. A party who 4 knows that any provision of this chapter from which the parties may 5 derogate or any requirement under the arbitration agreement has not 6 been complied with and yet proceeds with the arbitration without 7 stating the party's objection to such noncompliance without undue 8 delay or, if a time limit is provided therefore, within such period 9 of time, shall be deemed to have waived the party's right to object.

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 6. EXTENT OF COURT INTERVENTION. In matters 11 governed by this chapter, no court shall intervene except where so 12 provided in this chapter.

13 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7. COURT AUTHORITY FOR CERTAIN FUNCTIONS OF 14 ARBITRATION ASSISTANCE AND SUPERVISION. (1) The functions referred to 15 in sections 12 (3) and (4), 14(3), 15, 17(3), and 45(2) of this act 16 shall be performed by the superior court of the county in which the 17 agreement to arbitrate is to be performed or was made.

18 (2) If the arbitration agreement does not specify a county where 19 the agreement to arbitrate is to be performed and the agreement was 20 not made in any county in the state of Washington, the functions 21 referred to in sections 12 (3) and (4), 14(3), 15, 17(3), and 45(2) 22 of this act shall be performed in the county where any party to the 23 court proceeding resides or has a place of business.

(3) In any case not covered by subsections (1) or (2) of this
section, the functions referred to in sections 12 (3) and (4), 14(3),
15, 17(3), and 45(2) of this act shall be performed in any county in
the state of Washington.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 8. DEFINITION AND FORM OF ARBITRATION AGREEMENT. (1) For the purposes of this chapter, "arbitration agreement" is an agreement by the parties to submit to arbitration all or certain disputes which have arisen or which may arise between them in respect of a defined legal relationship, whether contractual or not. An arbitration agreement may be in the form of an arbitration clause in a contract or in the form of a separate agreement.

35 (2) The arbitration agreement shall be in writing.

1 (3) An arbitration agreement is in writing if its content is 2 recorded in any form, whether or not the arbitration agreement or 3 contract has been concluded orally, by conduct, or by other means.

(4) The requirement that an arbitration agreement be in writing 4 is met by an electronic communication if the information contained 5 б therein is accessible so as to be useable for subsequent reference. For the purposes of this section, "electronic communication" means 7 any communication that the parties make by means of data messages; 8 and "data message" means information generated, sent, received, or 9 stored by electronic, magnetic, optical, or similar means, including, 10 but not limited to, electronic data interchange (EDI), electronic 11 12 mail, telegram, telex, or telecopy.

13 (5) An arbitration agreement is in writing if it is contained in 14 an exchange of statements of claim and defense in which the existence 15 of an agreement is alleged by one party and not denied by the other.

16 (6) The reference in a contract to any document containing an 17 arbitration clause constitutes an arbitration agreement in writing, 18 provided that the reference is such as to make that clause part of 19 the contract.

20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 9. ARBITRATION AGREEMENT AND SUBSTANTIVE 21 CLAIM BEFORE COURT. (1) A court before which an action is brought in 22 a matter which is the subject of an arbitration agreement shall, if a 23 party so requests not later than when submitting the party's first 24 statement on the substance of the dispute, refer the parties to 25 arbitration unless it finds that the agreement is null and void, 26 inoperative, or incapable of being performed.

(2) Where an action referred to in subsection (1) of this section has been brought, arbitral proceedings may nevertheless be commenced or continued, and an award made, while the issue is pending before the court.

31 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 10. ARBITRATION AGREEMENT AND INTERIM 32 MEASURES BY COURT. It is not incompatible with an arbitration 33 agreement for a party to request, before or during arbitral 34 proceedings, from a court an interim measure of protection and for a 35 court to grant such measure.

36 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 11. NUMBER OF ARBITRATORS; IMMUNITY. (1) The 37 parties are free to determine the number of arbitrators.

(2) Failing such determination, the number of arbitrators shall
 be three.

3 (3) An arbitrator has the immunity of a judicial officer from 4 civil liability when acting in the capacity of arbitrator under any 5 statute or contract. The immunity afforded by this section shall 6 supplement, and not supplant, any otherwise applicable common law or 7 statutory immunity.

8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 12. APPOINTMENT OF ARBITRATORS. (1) No person 9 shall be precluded by reason of the person's nationality from acting 10 as an arbitrator, unless otherwise agreed by the parties.

(2) The parties are free to agree on a procedure of appointing the arbitrator or arbitrators, subject to the provisions of subsections (4) and (5) of this section.

14 (3) Failing such agreement:

15 (a) In an arbitration with three arbitrators, each party shall 16 appoint one arbitrator, and the two arbitrators thus appointed shall appoint the third arbitrator; if a party fails to appoint the 17 arbitrator within thirty days of receipt of a request to do so from 18 the other party, or if the two arbitrators fail to agree on the third 19 arbitrator within thirty days of their appointment, the appointment 20 21 shall be made, upon request of a party, by the court specified in section 7 of this act; and 22

(b) In an arbitration with a sole arbitrator, if the parties are unable to agree on the arbitrator, the arbitrator shall be appointed, upon request of a party, by the court specified in section 7 of this act.

27 (4) Where, under an appointment procedure agreed upon by the 28 parties:

29

(a) A party fails to act as required under such procedure;

30 (b) The parties, or two arbitrators, are unable to reach an 31 agreement expected of them under such procedure; or

32 (c) A third party, including an institution, fails to perform any33 function entrusted to it under such procedure;

Any party may request the court specified in section 7 of this act to take the necessary measure, unless the agreement on the appointment procedure provides other means for securing the appointment.

38 (5) A decision on a matter entrusted by subsection (3) or (4) of 39 this section to the court specified in section 7 of this act shall be

1 subject to no appeal. The court, in appointing an arbitrator, shall 2 have due regard to any qualifications required of the arbitrator by 3 the agreement of the parties and to such considerations as are likely 4 to secure the appointment of an independent and impartial arbitrator 5 and, in the case of a sole or third arbitrator, shall take into 6 account as well the advisability of appointing an arbitrator of a 7 nationality other than those of the parties.

8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 13. GROUNDS FOR CHALLENGE. (1) When a person is approached in connection with the person's possible appointment as 9 10 an arbitrator, the person shall disclose any circumstances likely to 11 give rise to justifiable doubts as to the person's impartiality or independence. An arbitrator, from the time of the arbitrator's 12 appointment and throughout the arbitral proceedings, shall without 13 delay disclose any such circumstances to the parties unless they have 14 15 already been informed of them by the arbitrator.

16 (2) An arbitrator may be challenged only if circumstances exist 17 that give rise to justifiable doubts as to the arbitrator's 18 impartiality or independence, or if the arbitrator does not possess 19 qualifications agreed to by the parties. A party may challenge an 20 arbitrator appointed by the party, or in whose appointment the party 21 has participated, only for reasons of which the party becomes aware 22 after the appointment has been made.

23 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 14. CHALLENGE PROCEDURE. (1) The parties are 24 free to agree on a procedure for challenging an arbitrator, subject 25 to the provisions of subsection (3) of this section.

(2) Failing such agreement, a party who intends to challenge an 26 arbitrator shall, within fifteen days after becoming aware of the 27 constitution of the arbitral tribunal or after becoming aware of any 28 29 circumstance referred to in section 13(2) of this act, send a written 30 statement of the reasons for the challenge to the arbitral tribunal. Unless the challenged arbitrator withdraws from the arbitrator's 31 office or the other party agrees to the challenge, the arbitral 32 tribunal shall decide on the challenge. 33

(3) If a challenge under any procedure agreed upon by the parties or under the procedure of subsection (2) of this section is not successful, the challenging party may request, within thirty days after having received notice of the decision rejecting the challenge, the court specified in section 7 of this act to decide on the

challenge, which decision shall be subject to no appeal. While such a
 request is pending, the arbitral tribunal, including the challenged
 arbitrator, may continue the arbitral proceedings and make an award.

Sec. 15. FAILURE OR IMPOSSIBILITY TO ACT. (1) If 4 NEW SECTION. 5 an arbitrator becomes de jure or de facto unable to perform the arbitrator's functions or for other reasons fails to act without б undue delay, the arbitrator's mandate terminates if the arbitrator 7 withdraws from the arbitrator's office or if the parties agree on the 8 termination. Otherwise, if a controversy remains concerning any of 9 10 these grounds, any party may request the court specified in section 7 11 of this act to decide on the termination of the mandate, which 12 decision shall be subject to no appeal.

13 (2) If, under this section or section 14(2) of this act, an 14 arbitrator withdraws from the arbitrator's office or a party agrees 15 to the termination of the mandate of an arbitrator, this does not 16 imply acceptance of the validity of any ground referred to in this 17 section or section 13(2) of this act.

18 NEW SECTION. Sec. 16. APPOINTMENT OF SUBSTITUTE ARBITRATOR. 19 Where the mandate of an arbitrator terminates under section 14 or 15 of this act or because of the arbitrator's withdrawal from office for 20 any other reason or because of the revocation of the arbitrator's 21 mandate by agreement of the parties or in any other case 22 of 23 termination of the arbitrator's mandate, a substitute arbitrator 24 shall be appointed according to the rules that were applicable to the 25 appointment of the arbitrator being replaced.

26 NEW SECTION. Sec. 17. COMPETENCE of ARBITRAL TRIBUNAL TO RULE ON ITS OWN JURISDICTION. (1) The arbitral tribunal may rule on its 27 28 own jurisdiction, including any objections with respect to the existence or validity of the arbitration agreement. For that purpose, 29 30 an arbitration clause which forms part of a contract shall be treated as an agreement independent of the other terms of the contract. A 31 decision by the arbitral tribunal that the contract is null and void 32 33 shall not entail *ipso jure* the invalidity of the arbitration clause.

34 (2) A plea that the arbitral tribunal does not have jurisdiction 35 shall be raised not later than the submission of the statement of 36 defense. A party is not precluded from raising such a plea by the 37 fact that the party has appointed, or participated in the appointment

of, an arbitrator. A plea that the arbitral tribunal is exceeding the scope of its authority shall be raised as soon as the matter alleged to be beyond the scope of its authority is raised during the arbitral proceedings. The arbitral tribunal may, in either case, admit a later plea if it considers the delay justified.

б (3) The arbitral tribunal may rule on a plea referred to in 7 subsection (2) of this section either as a preliminary question or in an award on the merits. If the arbitral tribunal rules as a 8 preliminary question that it has jurisdiction, any party may request, 9 within thirty days after having received notice of that ruling, the 10 11 court specified in section 7 of this act to decide the matter, which 12 decision shall be subject to no appeal. While such a request is 13 pending, the arbitral tribunal may continue the arbitral proceedings 14 and make an award.

15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 18. POWER OF ARBITRAL TRIBUNAL TO ORDER 16 INTERIM MEASURES. (1) Unless otherwise agreed by the parties, the 17 arbitral tribunal may, at the request of a party, grant interim 18 measures.

19 (2) An interim measure is any temporary measure, whether in the 20 form of an award or in another form, by which, at any time prior to 21 the issuance of the award by which the dispute is finally decided, 22 the arbitral tribunal orders a party to:

(a) Maintain or restore the status quo pending determination ofthe dispute;

(b) Take action that would prevent, or refrain from taking action that is likely to cause, current or imminent harm or prejudice to the arbitral process itself;

(c) Provide a means of preserving assets out of which asubsequent award may be satisfied; or

30 (d) Preserve evidence that may be relevant and material to the 31 resolution of the dispute.

32 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 19. CONDITIONS OF GRANTING INTERIM MEASURES. 33 (1) The party requesting an interim measure under section 18(2) (a), 34 (b), and (c) of this act shall satisfy the arbitral tribunal that:

35 (a) Harm not adequately reparable by an award of damages is 36 likely to result if the measure is not ordered, and such harm 37 substantially outweighs the harm that is likely to result to the

1 party against whom the measure is directed if the measure is granted; 2 and

3 (b) There is a reasonable possibility that the requesting party 4 will succeed on the merits of the claim. The determination on this 5 possibility shall not affect the discretion of the arbitral tribunal 6 in making any subsequent determination.

7 (2) With regard to a request for an interim measure under section 8 18(2)(d) of this act, the requirements in subsection (1)(a) and (b) 9 of this section shall apply only to the extent the tribunal considers 10 appropriate.

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 20. APPLICATION FOR PRELIMINARY ORDERS AND 12 CONDITIONS FOR GRANTING PRELIMINARY ORDERS. (1) Unless otherwise 13 agreed by the parties, a party may, without notice to any other 14 party, make a request for an interim measure together with an 15 application for a preliminary order directing a party not to 16 frustrate the purpose of the interim measure requested.

17 (2) The arbitral tribunal may grant a preliminary order provided 18 it considers that prior disclosure of the request for the interim 19 measure to the party against whom it is directed risks frustrating 20 the purpose of the measure.

(3) The conditions defined under section 19 of this act apply to any preliminary order, provided that the harm to be assessed under section 19(1)(a) of this act is the harm likely to result from the order being granted or not.

25 NEW SECTION. Sec. 21. SPECIFIC REGIME FOR PRELIMINARY ORDERS. (1) Immediately after the arbitral tribunal has made a determination 26 in respect of an application for a preliminary order, the arbitral 27 tribunal shall give notice to all parties of the request for the 28 29 interim measure, the application for the preliminary order, the 30 preliminary order, if any, and all other communications, including by indicating the content of any oral communication, between any party 31 and the arbitral tribunal in relation thereto. 32

(2) At the same time, the arbitral tribunal shall give an
 opportunity to any party against whom a preliminary order is directed
 to present its case at the earliest practicable time.

36 (3) The arbitral tribunal shall decide promptly on any objection37 to the preliminary order.

1 (4) A preliminary order shall expire after twenty days from the 2 date on which it was issued by the arbitral tribunal. However, the 3 arbitral tribunal may issue an interim measure adopting or modifying 4 the preliminary order after the party against whom the preliminary 5 order is directed has been given notice and an opportunity to present 6 its case.

7 (5) A preliminary order shall be binding on the parties but shall
8 not be subject to enforcement by a court. Such a preliminary order
9 does not constitute an award.

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 22. MODIFICATION, SUSPENSION, TERMINATION. 11 The arbitral tribunal may modify, suspend, or terminate an interim 12 measure or a preliminary order it has granted upon application of any 13 party or, in exceptional circumstances and upon prior notice to the 14 parties, on the arbitral tribunal's own initiative.

15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 23. PROVISION OF SECURITY. (1) The arbitral 16 tribunal may require the party requesting an interim measure to 17 provide appropriate security in connection with the measure.

(2) The arbitral tribunal shall require the party applying for a
 preliminary order to provide security in connection with the order
 unless the arbitral tribunal considers it inappropriate to do so.

21 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 24. DISCLOSURE. (1) The arbitral tribunal may 22 require any party promptly to disclose any material change in the 23 circumstances on the basis of which the measure was requested or 24 granted.

(2) The party applying for a preliminary order shall disclose to the arbitral tribunal all circumstances that are likely to be relevant to the arbitral tribunal's determination whether to grant or maintain the order, and such obligation shall continue until the party against whom the order has been requested has had an opportunity to present its case. Thereafter, subsection (1) of this section shall apply.

32 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 25. COSTS AND DAMAGES. The party requesting 33 an interim measure or applying for a preliminary order shall be 34 liable for any costs and damages caused by the measure or the order 35 to any party if the arbitral tribunal later determines that, in the 36 circumstances, the measure or the order should not have been granted.

The arbitral tribunal may award such costs and damages at any point
 during the proceedings.

3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 26. RECOGNITION AND ENFORCEMENT. (1) An 4 interim measure issued by an arbitral tribunal shall be recognized as 5 binding and, unless otherwise provided by the arbitral tribunal, 6 enforced upon application to the superior court, irrespective of the 7 country in which it was issued, subject to the provisions of section 8 27 of this act.

9 (2) The party who is seeking or has obtained recognition or 10 enforcement of an interim measure shall promptly inform the court of 11 any termination, suspension, or modification of that interim measure.

12 (3) The court of the state where recognition or enforcement is 13 sought may, if it considers it proper, order the requesting party to 14 provide appropriate security if the arbitral tribunal has not already 15 made a determination with respect to security or where such a 16 decision is necessary to protect the rights of third parties.

17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 27. GROUNDS FOR REFUSING RECOGNITION AND 18 ENFORCEMENT. (1) Recognition or enforcement of an interim award may 19 be refused only:

20 (a) At the request of the party against whom it is invoked if the 21 court is satisfied that:

(i) Such refusal is warranted on the grounds set forth in section
47(1)(a) (i), (ii), (iii), or (iv) of this act;

(ii) The arbitral tribunal's decision with respect to the
provision of security in connection with the interim measure issued
by the arbitral tribunal has not been complied with; or

(iii) The interim measure has been terminated or suspended by the arbitral tribunal or, where so empowered, by the court of the state in which the arbitration takes place or under the law of which that interim measure was granted; or

31

(b) If the court finds that:

(i) The interim measure is incompatible with the powers conferred upon the court unless the court decides to reformulate the interim measure to the extent necessary to adapt it to its own powers and procedures for the purposes of enforcing that interim measure and without modifying its substance; or

(ii) Any of the grounds set forth in section 47(1)(b) (i) or (ii)
 of this act apply to the recognition and enforcement of the interim
 measure.

4 (2) Any determination made by the court on any ground in 5 subsection (1) of this section shall be effective only for the 6 purposes of the application to recognize and enforce the interim 7 measure. The court where recognition or enforcement is sought shall 8 not, in making that determination, undertake a review of the 9 substance of the interim measure.

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 28. COURT ORDERED INTERIM MEASURES. A court 11 shall have the same power of issuing an interim measure in relation 12 to arbitration proceedings, irrespective of whether their place is in 13 the territory of this state, as it has in relation to proceedings in 14 courts. The court shall exercise such power in accordance with its 15 own procedures in consideration of the specific features of 16 international arbitration.

17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 29. EQUAL TREATMENT OF PARTIES. The parties 18 shall be treated with equality, and each party shall be given a full 19 opportunity of presenting its case.

20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 30. DETERMINATION OF RULES AND PROCEDURE. (1) 21 Subject to the provisions of this chapter, the parties are free to 22 agree on the procedure to be followed by the arbitral tribunal in 23 conducting the proceedings.

(2) Failing such agreement, the arbitral tribunal may, subject to
the provisions of this chapter, conduct the arbitration in such
manner as it considers appropriate. The power conferred upon the
arbitral tribunal includes the power to determine the admissibility,

8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 33. LANGUAGE. (1) The parties are free to 9 agree on the language or languages to be used in the arbitral 10 proceedings. Failing such agreement, the arbitral tribunal shall 11 determine the language or languages to be used in the proceedings. 12 This agreement or determination, unless otherwise specified therein, 13 shall apply to any written statement by a party, any hearing, and any 14 award, decision, or other communication by the arbitral tribunal.

15 (2) The arbitral tribunal may order that any documentary evidence 16 shall be accompanied by a translation into the language or languages 17 agreed upon by the parties or determined by the arbitral tribunal.

18 NEW SECTION. Sec. 34. STATEMENT OF CLAIM AND DEFENSE. (1) Within the period of time agreed by the parties or determined by the 19 arbitral tribunal, the claimant shall state the facts supporting its 20 claim, the point at issue, and the relief or remedy sought, and the 21 22 respondent shall state its defense in respect of these particulars, 23 unless the parties have otherwise agreed as to the required elements of such statements. The parties may submit with their statements all 24 25 documents they consider to be relevant or may add a reference to the documents or other evidence they will submit. 26

(2) Unless otherwise agreed by the parties, either party may amend or supplement its claims or defenses during the course of the arbitral proceedings, unless the arbitral tribunal considers it inappropriate to allow such amendment having regard to the delay in making it.

32 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 35. HEARINGS AND WRITTEN PROCEEDINGS. (1) 33 Subject to any contrary agreement by the parties, the arbitral 34 tribunal shall decide whether to hold oral hearings for the 35 presentation of evidence or for oral argument, or whether the 36 proceedings shall be conducted on the basis of documents and other

24 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 37. EXPERT APPOINTED BY ARBITRAL TRIBUNAL. 25 (1) Unless otherwise agreed by the parties, the arbitral tribunal:

(a) May appoint one or more experts to report to it on specific

(b) May require a party to give the expert any relevant
 information or to produce, or to provide access to, any relevant

(1) If, during arbitral proceedings, the parties settle the dispute, the arbitral tribunal shall terminate the proceedings and, if requested by the parties and not objected to by the arbitral tribunal, record the settlement in the form of an arbitral award on agreed terms.

9 (2) An award on agreed terms shall be made in accordance with the 10 provisions of section 42 of this act and shall state that it is an 11 award. Such an award has the same status and effect as any other 12 award on the merits of the case.

(i) The subject matter of the dispute is not capable ofsettlement by arbitration under the law of this state; or

28 (ii) The award is in conflict with the public policy of this 29 state.

30 (3) An application for setting aside may not be made after three 31 months have elapsed from the date on which the party making that 32 application had received the award or, if a request had been made 33 under section 44 of this act, from the date on which that request had 34 been disposed of by the arbitral tribunal.

32 (iv) The composition of the arbitral tribunal or the arbitral 33 procedure was not in accordance with the agreement of the parties, 34 or, failing such agreement, was not in accordance with the law of the 35 country where the arbitration took place; or

36 (v) The award has not yet become binding on the parties or has 37 been set aside or suspended by a court of the country in which, or 38 under the law of which, that award was made; or

39 (b) The court finds that:

1 (i) The subject matter of the dispute is not capable of 2 settlement by arbitration under the law of this state; or

3 (ii) The recognition or enforcement of the award would be 4 contrary to the public policy of this state.

5 (2) If an application for setting aside or suspension of an award 6 has been made to a court referred to in subsection (1)(a)(v) of this 7 section, the court where recognition or enforcement is sought may, if 8 it considers it proper, adjourn its decision and may also, on the 9 application of the party claiming recognition or enforcement of the 10 award, order the other party to provide appropriate security.
