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**SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 2614**

1            AN ACT Relating to ballots returned electronically; amending RCW  
2            29A.60.185; and reenacting and amending RCW 29A.40.110.

3            BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4            **Sec. 1.** RCW 29A.40.110 and 2011 c 349 s 18, 2011 c 348 s 4, and  
5            2011 c 10 s 41 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

6            (1) The opening and subsequent processing of return envelopes for  
7            any primary or election may begin upon receipt. The tabulation of  
8            absentee ballots must not commence until after 8:00 p.m. on the day  
9            of the primary or election.

10           (2) All received return envelopes must be placed in secure  
11           locations from the time of delivery to the county auditor until their  
12           subsequent opening. After opening the return envelopes, the county  
13           canvassing board shall place all of the ballots in secure storage  
14           until processing. Ballots may be taken from the inner envelopes and  
15           all the normal procedural steps may be performed to prepare these  
16           ballots for tabulation.

17           (3) The canvassing board, or its designated representatives,  
18           shall examine the postmark on the return envelope and signature on  
19           the declaration before processing the ballot. The ballot must either  
20           be received no later than 8:00 p.m. on the day of the primary or  
21           election, or must be postmarked no later than the day of the primary

1 or election. All personnel assigned to verify signatures must receive  
2 training on statewide standards for signature verification. Personnel  
3 shall verify that the voter's signature on the ballot declaration is  
4 the same as the signature of that voter in the registration files of  
5 the county. Verification may be conducted by an automated  
6 verification system approved by the secretary of state. A variation  
7 between the signature of the voter on the ballot declaration and the  
8 signature of that voter in the registration files due to the  
9 substitution of initials or the use of common nicknames is permitted  
10 so long as the surname and handwriting are clearly the same.

11 (4) If the postmark is missing or illegible, the date on the  
12 ballot declaration to which the voter has attested determines the  
13 validity, as to the time of voting, for that ballot. For overseas  
14 voters and service voters, the date on the declaration to which the  
15 voter has attested determines the validity, as to the time of voting,  
16 for that ballot.

17 (a) Any overseas voter or service voter may return the signed  
18 declaration and voted ballot by fax or email by 8:00 p.m. on the day  
19 of the primary or election, and the county auditor must use  
20 established procedures to maintain the secrecy of the ballot.

21 (b) For ballots returned electronically by a voter who is not an  
22 overseas voter or service voter, the signed declaration must be  
23 received no later than the day before the county canvassing board  
24 certifies the election or primary results. Other than the deadline,  
25 the auditor must process a signed declaration the same as for  
26 completing an unsigned declaration, as provided under RCW 29A.60.165.

27 **Sec. 2.** RCW 29A.60.185 and 2005 c 242 s 5 are each amended to  
28 read as follows:

29 (1) Prior to certification of the election as required by RCW  
30 29A.60.190, the county auditor shall conduct an audit of results of  
31 votes cast on the direct recording electronic voting devices used in  
32 the county. This audit must be conducted by randomly selecting by lot  
33 up to four percent of the direct recording electronic voting devices  
34 or one direct recording electronic voting device, whichever is  
35 greater, and, for each device, comparing the results recorded  
36 electronically with the results recorded on paper. For purposes of  
37 this audit, the results recorded on paper must be tabulated as  
38 follows: On one-fourth of the devices selected for audit, the paper  
39 records must be tabulated manually; on the remaining devices, the

1 paper records may be tabulated by a mechanical device determined by  
2 the secretary of state to be capable of accurately reading the votes  
3 cast and printed thereon and qualified for use in the state under  
4 applicable state and federal laws. Three races or issues, randomly  
5 selected by lot, must be audited on each device. This audit procedure  
6 must be subject to observation by political party representatives if  
7 representatives have been appointed and are present at the time of  
8 the audit.

9 (2) Prior to certification of the election, for ballots returned  
10 electronically, pursuant to RCW 29A.40.110, the county auditor shall  
11 conduct an audit of such ballots if at least forty of such ballots  
12 are returned by 8:00 p.m. on the day of the election.

13 (a) Upon providing notice to each voter, pursuant to RCW  
14 29A.40.110, the auditor must randomly select twenty-five percent of  
15 such voters and include in their notice a request for the voter to  
16 return his or her original ballot along with the signed declaration.

17 (b) The auditor must analyze any original ballot returned no  
18 later than one week before the county canvassing board certifies the  
19 election or primary results, to ensure it matches the electronically  
20 returned ballot. If the auditor finds that any electronically  
21 returned ballot was manipulated, altered, or intercepted by another  
22 person, then the auditor must request every voter who submitted an  
23 electronic ballot, pursuant to RCW 29A.40.110, to return the original  
24 ballot. The request must be made in the same manner as providing  
25 notice to return the voter's signed declaration. The request must  
26 clearly indicate that the failure to return the original ballot does  
27 not affect the validity of that person's electronically submitted  
28 ballot.

29 (c) The auditor must analyze each returned original ballot to  
30 ensure it matches the electronically returned ballot. The auditor  
31 must conduct the audit in a manner to ensure the secrecy of the vote  
32 is maintained.

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
