## SENATE BILL 5402

1 AN ACT Relating to the Cooper Jones bicyclist safety advisory 2 council; adding a new section to chapter 43.59 RCW; creating a new 3 section; and providing an expiration date.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that Washington 6 state is the nation's number one "Bike Friendly State." However, 7 people who bike encounter road safety dangers that result in severe injury and death. Bicycle ridership has significantly increased over 8 the last ten years, and the number of injuries and fatalities are 9 10 also on the rise, despite the five percent annual reduction goal. The 11 Cooper Jones act of 1998 laid the groundwork to begin a focus on bicycle safety and education. It is the intent of the legislature 12 that the Cooper Jones bicycle safety advisory council continue that 13 14 work with a focus on a review of best practices for the reduction and 15 eventual elimination of bicycle-related injuries and fatalities in 16 contribution to Washington state's adoption of Target Zero.

17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 43.59 18 RCW to read as follows:

(1) Within amounts appropriated to the traffic safety commission,the commission must convene the Cooper Jones bicyclist safety

advisory council comprised of stakeholders who have a unique interest
or expertise in bicyclist and road safety.

3 (2) The purpose of the council is to review and analyze data 4 related to bicyclist fatalities and serious injuries to identify 5 points at which the transportation system can be improved and to 6 identify patterns in bicyclist fatalities and serious injuries.

(3)(a) The council may include, but is not limited to:

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(i) A representative from the commission;

9 (ii) An emergency medical technician from the county in which the 10 most bicyclist deaths have occurred;

11 (iii) A representative from the Washington association of 12 sheriffs and police chiefs;

13 (iv) Multiple members of law enforcement who have investigated 14 bicyclist fatalities;

15 (v) A traffic engineer;

16 (vi) A representative from the department of transportation;

(vii) A representative of cities, and up to two stakeholders, chosen by the council, who represent municipalities in which at least one bicyclist fatality has occurred in the previous three years;

(viii) A representative from a bicyclist advocacy group;

21 (ix) An attorney that has worked in areas of the law related to 22 bicycles;

23 (x) A transportation planner with a focus on multimodal planning;

(xi) A public health official, researcher, or epidemiologist; and
(xii) A member of an academic transportation research
organization, such as the transportation research board.

The commission 27 (b) may invite other representatives of stakeholder groups to participate in the council 28 as deemed 29 appropriate by the commission. Additionally, the commission may invite a victim or family member of a victim to participate in the 30 31 council.

32 (4) The council must meet at least quarterly. By December 31st of each year, the council must issue an annual report detailing any 33 findings and recommendations to the governor and the transportation 34 committees of the legislature. The commission must provide the annual 35 36 report electronically to all municipal governments and state agencies that participated in the council during that calendar 37 vear. Additionally, the council must report any budgetary or fiscal 38 recommendations to the office of financial management 39 and the 40 legislature by August 1st on a biennial basis.

1 (5) As part of the review of bicyclist fatalities and serious injuries that occur in Washington, the council may review any 2 available information, including accident information maintained in 3 existing databases; statutes, rules, policies, or ordinances 4 governing bicyclists and traffic related to the incidents; and any 5 other relevant information. The council may make recommendations 6 regarding changes in statutes, ordinances, rules, and policies that 7 could improve bicyclist safety. Additionally, the council may make 8 recommendations on how to improve traffic fatality and serious injury 9 data quality. 10

11 (6)(a) Documents prepared by or for the council are inadmissible 12 and may not be used in a civil or administrative proceeding, except that any document that exists before its use or consideration in a 13 review by the council, or that is created independently of such 14 review, does not become inadmissible merely because it is reviewed or 15 16 used by the council. For confidential information, such as personally 17 identifiable information and medical records, which are obtained by the council, neither the commission nor the council may publicly 18 19 disclose such confidential information. No person who was in attendance at a meeting of the council or who participated in the 20 creation, retention, collection, or maintenance of information or 21 documents specifically for the commission or the council shall be 22 permitted to testify in any civil action as to the content of such 23 proceedings or of the documents and information prepared specifically 24 25 as part of the activities of the council. However, recommendations from the council and the commission generally may be disclosed 26 without personal identifiers. 27

28 The council may review, only to the extent otherwise (b) permitted by law or court rule when determined to be relevant and 29 necessary: Any law enforcement incident documentation, such as 30 31 incident reports, dispatch records, and victim, witness, and suspect statements; any supplemental reports, probable cause statements, and 32 911 call taker's reports; and any other information determined to be 33 relevant to the review. The commission and the council must maintain 34 the confidentiality of such information to the extent required by any 35 36 applicable law.

37 (7) If acting in good faith, without malice, and within the 38 parameters of and protocols established under this chapter, 39 representatives of the commission and the council are immune from civil liability for an activity related to reviews of particular
fatalities and serious injuries.

3 (8) This section must not be construed to provide a private civil4 cause of action.

5 (9)(a) The council may receive gifts, grants, or endowments from 6 public or private sources that are made from time to time, in trust 7 or otherwise, for the use and benefit of the purposes of the council 8 and spend the gifts, grants, or endowments from the public or private 9 sources according to their terms, unless the receipt of the gifts, 10 grants, or endowments violates RCW 42.17A.560.

(b) Subject to the appropriation of funds for this specific purpose, the council may provide grants targeted at improving bicyclist safety in accordance with recommendations made by the council.

15 (10) By December 1, 2020, the council must report to the 16 transportation committees of the legislature on the strategies that 17 have been deployed to improve bicyclist safety by the council and 18 make a recommendation as to whether the council should be continued 19 and if there are any improvements the legislature can make to improve 20 the council.

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(11) For purposes of this section:

(a) "Bicyclist fatality" means any death of a bicyclist resulting from a collision with a vehicle, whether on a roadway, at an intersection, along an adjacent sidewalk, or on a path that is contiguous with a roadway.

26 (b) "Council" means the Cooper Jones bicyclist safety advisory 27 council.

(c) "Serious injury" means any injury other than a fatal injury that prevents the injured person from walking, driving, or normally continuing the activities the person was capable of performing before the injury occurred.

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(12) This section expires June 30, 2021.

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
