1 AN ACT Relating to establishing a statewide free college program
2 by changing the state need grant to the Washington college promise
3 scholarship; amending RCW 28B.92.030, 43.88C.010, 28B.10.790,
4 28B.12.030, 28B.92.040, 28B.92.050, 28B.92.065, 28B.15.065,
5 28B.15.740, 28B.15.760, 28B.15.762, 28B.15.820, 28B.116.010,
6 28A.180.120, 28B.76.502, 28B.76.525, 28B.76.526, 28B.76.540,
7 28B.76.699, 28B.77.020, 28B.117.020, 28B.118.090, 28B.133.010,
8 28B.133.020, and 28C.18.166; reenacting and amending RCW 28B.108.010,
9 28B.118.010, 28B.145.010, and 28B.145.030; adding new sections to
10 chapter 28B.92 RCW; repealing RCW 28B.92.010, 28B.92.020, 28B.92.060,
11 28B.92.080, 28B.92.082, 28B.92.084, 28B.119.005, 28B.119.010,
12 28B.119.020, 28B.119.030, 28B.119.040, 28B.119.050, and 28B.119.900;
13 and providing an effective date.

14 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

15 **PART I**
16 **CREATES THE WASHINGTON COLLEGE PROMISE SCHOLARSHIP**
17 **PROGRAM TO REPLACE THE STATE NEED GRANT PROGRAM**

18 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.92
19 RCW to read as follows:

1 (1) The legislature finds that individuals with a postsecondary
2 credential have a greater chance of earning a wage that can support
3 themselves and their families than if they do not obtain a
4 postsecondary credential. At the same time, Washington employers are
5 in need of many more individuals who possess postsecondary
6 qualifications. Access to postsecondary opportunities are vital to
7 ensure that more Washington high school graduates and working adults
8 can enter and complete a postsecondary program and compete for the
9 job opportunities available in the state.

10 (2) The legislature further finds that a statewide free college
11 program, for students who demonstrate financial need as defined in
12 section 3 of this act, is necessary to significantly reduce the
13 financial costs of obtaining a postsecondary credential. The
14 Washington college promise scholarship program is intended to
15 increase access to postsecondary opportunities for Washington
16 residents.

17 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.92
18 RCW to read as follows:

19 (1) The Washington college promise scholarship program is created
20 to provide a statewide free college program for eligible participants
21 and greater access to postsecondary education for Washington
22 residents. The Washington college promise scholarship program is
23 intended to increase the number of high school graduates and adults
24 that can attain a postsecondary credential and provide them with the
25 qualifications needed to compete for job opportunities in Washington.

26 (2) The office of student financial assistance shall implement
27 and administer the Washington college promise scholarship program and
28 is authorized to establish rules necessary for implementation of the
29 program.

30 (3) The legislature shall appropriate funding for the Washington
31 college promise scholarship program. Allocations must be made on the
32 basis of estimated eligible participants enrolled in eligible
33 institutions of higher education or apprenticeship programs. All
34 eligible students are entitled to a Washington college promise
35 scholarship.

36 (4) The office shall award Washington college promise
37 scholarships to all eligible students beginning in academic year
38 2021-22.

1 (5) Students who demonstrate financial need under section 3 of
2 this act and meet the following requirements are eligible for the
3 Washington college promise scholarship program:

4 (a) To be eligible for the Washington college promise
5 scholarship, students must be enrolled or accepted for enrollment for
6 at least three quarter credits or the equivalent semester credits at
7 an institution of higher education in Washington as defined in
8 RCW 28B.92.030 or enrolled in a registered apprenticeship program
9 approved under chapter 40.04 RCW.

10 (b) The Washington college promise scholarship is available to:

11 (i) Students who are resident students as defined in
12 RCW 28B.15.012(2) (a) through (e); or

13 (ii) Any person who has:

14 (A) Completed the full senior year of high school and obtained a
15 high school diploma, or the equivalent, either at a Washington public
16 high school or private high school approved under chapter 28A.195
17 RCW;

18 (B) Lived in Washington state for at least three years
19 immediately before receiving the diploma or its equivalent;

20 (C) Continuously lived in Washington state after receiving the
21 diploma or its equivalent and until such time as the individual is
22 admitted to an eligible institution of higher education; and

23 (D) Been granted deferred action for childhood arrival status
24 pursuant to the rules and regulations adopted by the United States
25 citizenship and immigration services.

26 (6) Washington college promise scholarship eligibility may not
27 extend beyond five years or one hundred twenty-five percent of the
28 published length of the program in which the student is enrolled or
29 the credit or clock-hour equivalent.

30 (7) Institutional aid administrators shall determine whether a
31 student eligible for the Washington college promise scholarship in a
32 given academic year may remain eligible for the ensuing year if the
33 student's family income increases by no more than a marginal amount.

34 (8) Qualifications for renewal include maintaining satisfactory
35 academic progress toward completion of an eligible program as
36 determined by the office and established in rule.

37 (9) Should a recipient terminate his or her enrollment for any
38 reason during the academic year, the unused portion of the
39 scholarship shall be returned to the state educational grant fund by
40 the institution of higher education according to the institution of

1 higher education's policy for issuing refunds, except as provided in
2 RCW 28B.92.070.

3 (10)(a) A part-time student enrolled in three to six credit-
4 bearing quarter credits, or the equivalent semester credits, is
5 eligible for a Washington college promise scholarship.

6 (b) A part-time precollege student who is enrolled in three to
7 six credit-bearing quarter credits, or the equivalent semester
8 credits, may receive a Washington college promise scholarship for up
9 to one academic year before beginning a program that leads to a
10 degree or certificate.

11 (c) An institution of higher education may award a Washington
12 college promise scholarship to an eligible student enrolled in three
13 to six credit-bearing quarter credits, or the semester equivalent, on
14 a provisional basis if:

15 (i) The student has not previously received a Washington college
16 promise scholarship from that institution;

17 (ii) The student completes the required financial aid application
18 approved by the office;

19 (iii) The institution has reviewed the student's financial
20 condition, and the financial condition of the student's family if the
21 student is a dependent student, and has determined that the student
22 is likely eligible for a Washington college promise scholarship; and

23 (iv) The student has signed a document attesting to the fact that
24 the financial information provided on the financial aid application
25 and any additional financial information provided directly to the
26 institution is accurate and complete, and that the student agrees to
27 repay the institution for the grant amount if the student submitted
28 false or incomplete information.

29 (d) An eligible student enrolled on a part-time basis shall
30 receive a prorated portion of the Washington college promise
31 scholarship for any academic period in which he or she is enrolled on
32 a part-time basis.

33 (11) Institutions of higher education shall award the student all
34 need-based and merit-based financial aid for which the student would
35 otherwise qualify. The Washington college promise scholarship is
36 intended to replace unmet financial need associated with the costs of
37 postsecondary education including loans, and, at the student's
38 option, work-study award, before any other grants or scholarships are
39 reduced.

1 (12) Students and participating institutions of higher education
2 shall comply with all the rules adopted by the council for the
3 administration of this chapter.

4 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.92
5 RCW to read as follows:

6 (1) In addition to other eligibility requirements outlined in
7 this chapter, students who demonstrate financial need are eligible to
8 receive the Washington college promise scholarship. For the purposes
9 of this act, students who demonstrate financial need are students
10 with family incomes at or below seventy percent of the state median
11 family income, adjusted for family size.

12 (2) Students with family incomes between zero and fifty percent
13 of the state median family income shall receive the maximum
14 Washington college promise scholarship award as defined in RCW
15 28B.92.030. Awards for students with incomes between fifty-one and
16 seventy percent of the state median family income shall be prorated
17 at the following percentages of the maximum Washington college
18 promise scholarship award amount granted to those with incomes below
19 fifty-one percent of the state median family income:

20 (a) Seventy percent for students with family incomes between
21 fifty-one and fifty-five percent of the state median family income;

22 (b) Sixty-five percent for students with family incomes between
23 fifty-six and sixty percent of the state median family income;

24 (c) Sixty percent for students with family incomes between sixty-
25 one and sixty-five percent of the state median family income; and

26 (d) Fifty percent for students with family incomes between sixty-
27 six and seventy percent of the state median family income.

28 **Sec. 4.** RCW 28B.92.030 and 2013 c 248 s 2 are each amended to
29 read as follows:

30 As used in this chapter:

31 (1) "Council" means the student achievement council.

32 (2) (~~"Disadvantaged student" means a posthigh school student who~~
33 ~~by reason of adverse cultural, educational, environmental,~~
34 ~~experiential, familial or other circumstances is unable to qualify~~
35 ~~for enrollment as a full-time student in an institution of higher~~
36 ~~education, who would otherwise qualify as a needy student, and who is~~
37 ~~attending an institution of higher education under an established~~

1 ~~program designed to qualify the student for enrollment as a full-time~~
2 ~~student.~~

3 ~~(3))~~ "Financial aid" means loans and/or grants to ~~((needy))~~
4 students who demonstrate financial need enrolled or accepted for
5 enrollment as a student at institutions of higher education.

6 (3) "Financial need" means a demonstrated financial inability to
7 bear the total cost of education as directed in rule by the office.

8 (4) "Institution" or "institutions of higher education" means:

9 (a) Any public university, college, community college, or
10 technical college operated by the state of Washington or any
11 political subdivision thereof; or

12 (b) Any other university, college, school, or institute in the
13 state of Washington offering instruction beyond the high school level
14 that is a member institution of an accrediting association recognized
15 by rule of the council for the purposes of this section and that
16 agrees to and complies with program rules adopted pursuant to RCW
17 28B.92.150. However, any institution, branch, extension or facility
18 operating within the state of Washington that is affiliated with an
19 institution operating in another state must be:

20 (i) A separately accredited member institution of any such
21 accrediting association;

22 (ii) A branch of a member institution of an accrediting
23 association recognized by rule of the council for purposes of this
24 section, that is eligible for federal student financial aid
25 assistance and has operated as a nonprofit college or university
26 delivering on-site classroom instruction for a minimum of twenty
27 consecutive years within the state of Washington, and has an annual
28 enrollment of at least seven hundred full-time equivalent students;
29 ~~((or))~~

30 (iii) A nonprofit institution recognized by the state of
31 Washington as provided in RCW 28B.77.240; or

32 (iv) An approved apprenticeship program under chapter 49.04 RCW.

33 (5) ~~("Needy student" means a posthigh school student of an~~
34 ~~institution of higher education who demonstrates to the office the~~
35 ~~financial inability, either through the student's parents, family~~
36 ~~and/or personally, to meet the total cost of board, room, books, and~~
37 ~~tuition and incidental fees for any semester or quarter. "Needy~~
38 ~~student" also means an opportunity internship graduate as defined by~~
39 ~~RCW 28C.18.162 who enrolls in a postsecondary program of study as~~

1 ~~defined in RCW 28C.18.162 within one year of high school~~
2 ~~graduation.)~~) "Maximum Washington college promise scholarship award":

3 (a) For students attending two or four-year institutions of
4 higher education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016, is tuition and
5 estimated fees for fifteen quarter credit hours or the equivalent, as
6 determined by the office, including operating fees, building fees,
7 and services and activities fees.

8 (b) For students attending private four-year institutions of
9 higher education in Washington, is the lesser of the maximum
10 Washington college promise scholarship award under (a) of this
11 subsection, or individual institution tuition for fifteen quarter
12 credit hours or the equivalent.

13 (c) For students attending two-year private institutions of
14 higher education in Washington, is the lesser of the maximum
15 Washington college promise scholarship award at a community or
16 technical college or individual institution tuition for fifteen
17 quarter credit hours or the equivalent.

18 (d) For students attending approved apprenticeship programs, is
19 tuition and fees, as determined by the office, in addition to
20 required program supplies and equipment.

21 (6) "Office" means the office of student financial assistance.

22 (7) "Placebound student" means a student who (a) is unable to
23 complete a college program because of family or employment
24 commitments, health concerns, monetary inability, or other similar
25 factors; and (b) may be influenced by the receipt of an enhanced
26 student financial aid award to complete a baccalaureate degree at an
27 eligible institution.

28 **PART II**

29 **CASELOAD FORECAST**

30 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 5.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.92
31 RCW to read as follows:

32 The caseload forecast council shall estimate the anticipated
33 caseload of the Washington college promise scholarship program and
34 submit the caseload forecast as specified in RCW 43.88C.020.

35 **Sec. 6.** RCW 43.88C.010 and 2018 c 208 s 4 are each amended to
36 read as follows:

1 (1) The caseload forecast council is hereby created. The council
2 shall consist of two individuals appointed by the governor and four
3 individuals, one of whom is appointed by the chairperson of each of
4 the two largest political caucuses in the senate and house of
5 representatives. The chair of the council shall be selected from
6 among the four caucus appointees. The council may select such other
7 officers as the members deem necessary.

8 (2) The council shall employ a caseload forecast supervisor to
9 supervise the preparation of all caseload forecasts. As used in this
10 chapter, "supervisor" means the caseload forecast supervisor.

11 (3) Approval by an affirmative vote of at least five members of
12 the council is required for any decisions regarding employment of the
13 supervisor. Employment of the supervisor shall terminate after each
14 term of three years. At the end of the first year of each three-year
15 term the council shall consider extension of the supervisor's term by
16 one year. The council may fix the compensation of the supervisor. The
17 supervisor shall employ staff sufficient to accomplish the purposes
18 of this section.

19 (4) The caseload forecast council shall oversee the preparation
20 of and approve, by an affirmative vote of at least four members, the
21 official state caseload forecasts prepared under RCW 43.88C.020. If
22 the council is unable to approve a forecast before a date required in
23 RCW 43.88C.020, the supervisor shall submit the forecast without
24 approval and the forecast shall have the same effect as if approved
25 by the council.

26 (5) A councilmember who does not cast an affirmative vote for
27 approval of the official caseload forecast may request, and the
28 supervisor shall provide, an alternative forecast based on
29 assumptions specified by the member.

30 (6) Members of the caseload forecast council shall serve without
31 additional compensation but shall be reimbursed for travel expenses
32 in accordance with RCW 44.04.120 while attending sessions of the
33 council or on official business authorized by the council.
34 Nonlegislative members of the council shall be reimbursed for travel
35 expenses in accordance with RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.

36 (7) "Caseload," as used in this chapter, means:

37 (a) The number of persons expected to meet entitlement
38 requirements and require the services of public assistance programs,
39 state correctional institutions, state correctional noninstitutional
40 supervision, state institutions for juvenile offenders, the common

1 school system, long-term care, medical assistance, foster care, and
2 adoption support;

3 (b) The number of students who are eligible for the Washington
4 college bound scholarship program and are expected to attend an
5 institution of higher education as defined in RCW 28B.92.030;

6 (c) The number of students who are eligible for the Washington
7 college promise scholarship program under section 2 of this act and
8 are expected to attend an institution of higher education as defined
9 in RCW 28B.92.030; and

10 (d) The number of children who are eligible, as defined in RCW
11 43.216.505, to participate in, and the number of children actually
12 served by, the early childhood education and assistance program.

13 (8) The caseload forecast council shall forecast the temporary
14 assistance for needy families and the working connections child care
15 programs as a courtesy.

16 (9) The caseload forecast council shall forecast youth
17 participating in the extended foster care program pursuant to RCW
18 74.13.031 separately from other children who are residing in foster
19 care and who are under eighteen years of age.

20 (10) The caseload forecast council shall forecast the number of
21 youth expected to receive behavioral rehabilitation services while
22 involved in the foster care system and the number of screened in
23 reports of child abuse or neglect.

24 (11) Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the
25 definitions provided in RCW 43.88.020 apply to this chapter.

26 PART III

27 UPDATING REFERENCES

29 read as follows:

30 Washington residents attending any nonprofit college or
31 university in another state which has a reciprocity agreement with

35 demonstrates financial need as defined under RCW 28B.92.030((4)–r));

7 read as follows:

8 (~~As used~~) The definitions in this section apply throughout this
9 chapter(~~, the following words and terms shall have the following~~
10 ~~meanings,~~) unless the context (~~shall~~) clearly (~~indicate another~~
11 ~~or different meaning or intent:~~) requires otherwise.

12 (1) (~~The term "needy student" shall mean a student enrolled or~~
13 ~~accepted for enrollment at a postsecondary institution who, according~~
14 ~~to a system of need analysis approved by the office of student~~
15 ~~financial assistance, demonstrates a financial inability, either~~
16 ~~parental, familial, or personal, to bear the total cost of education~~
17 ~~for any semester or quarter.~~

18 (~~2) The term~~) "Eligible institution" (~~shall~~) means any
19 postsecondary institution in this state accredited by the Northwest
20 Association of Schools and Colleges, or a campus of a member
21 institution of an accrediting association recognized by rule of the
22 student achievement council for purposes of this section, that is
23 eligible for federal student financial aid assistance and has
24 operated as a nonprofit college or university delivering on-site
25 classroom instruction for a minimum of twenty consecutive years
26 within the state of Washington, or any public technical college in
27 the state.

28 (2) "Student who demonstrates financial need" means a student
29 enrolled or accepted for enrollment at a postsecondary institution
30 who, according to a system of need analysis approved by the office of
31 student financial assistance, demonstrates a financial inability to
32 bear the total cost of education for any semester or quarter.

33 **Sec. 9.** RCW 28B.92.040 and 2011 1st sp.s. c 11 s 160 are each
34 amended to read as follows:

35 The office shall be cognizant of the following guidelines in the
36 performance of its duties:

37 (1) The office shall be research oriented, not only at its
38 inception but continually through its existence.

1 (2) The office shall coordinate all existing programs of
2 financial aid except those specifically dedicated to a particular
3 institution by the donor.

4 (3) The office shall take the initiative and responsibility for
5 coordinating all federal student financial aid programs to ensure
6 that the state recognizes the maximum potential effect of these
7 programs, and shall design state programs that complement existing
8 federal, state, and institutional programs. (~~The office shall ensure
9 that state programs continue to follow the principle that state
10 financial aid funding follows the student to the student's choice of
11 institution of higher education.~~)

12 (4) Counseling is a paramount function of the (~~state need
13 grant~~) Washington college promise scholarship program and other
14 state student financial aid programs, and in most cases could only be
15 properly implemented at the institutional levels; therefore, state
16 student financial aid programs shall be concerned with the attainment
17 of those goals which, in the judgment of the office, are the reasons
18 for the existence of a student financial aid program, and not solely
19 with administration of the program on an individual basis.

20 (5) The "package" approach of combining loans, grants and
21 employment for student financial aid shall be the conceptual element
22 of the state's involvement.

23 (6) The office shall ensure that allocations of state
24 appropriations for financial aid are made to individuals and
25 institutions in a timely manner and shall closely monitor
26 expenditures to avoid under or overexpenditure of appropriated funds.

27 **Sec. 10.** RCW 28B.92.050 and 2011 1st sp.s. c 11 s 161 are each
28 amended to read as follows:

29 The office shall have the following powers and duties:

30 (1) Conduct a full analysis of student financial aid as a means
31 of:

32 (a) Fulfilling educational aspirations of students of the state
33 of Washington, and

34 (b) Improving the general, social, cultural, and economic
35 character of the state.

36 Such an analysis will be a continuous one and will yield current
37 information relevant to needed improvements in the state program of
38 student financial aid. The office will disseminate the information
39 yielded by their analyses to all appropriate individuals and agents.

1 (2) Design a state program of student financial aid based on the
2 data of the study referred to in this section. The state programs
3 will supplement available federal and local aid programs. The state
4 programs of student financial aid will not exceed the difference
5 between the budgetary costs of attending an institution of higher
6 education and the student's total resources, including family
7 support, personal savings, employment, and federal, state, and local
8 aid programs.

9 (3) Determine and establish criteria for financial need of the
10 individual applicant based upon the consideration of that particular
11 applicant. In making this determination the office shall consider the
12 following:

13 (a) Assets and income of the student.

14 (b) Assets and income of the parents, or the individuals legally
15 responsible for the care and maintenance of the student.

16 (c) The cost of attending the institution the student is
17 attending or planning to attend.

18 (d) Any other criteria deemed relevant to the office.

19 (4) Set the amount of financial aid to be awarded to any
20 individual (~~needy or disadvantaged~~) student who demonstrates
21 financial need in any school year.

22 (5) Award financial aid to (~~needy or disadvantaged~~) students
23 who demonstrate financial need for a school year based upon only that
24 amount necessary to fill the financial gap between the budgetary cost
25 of attending an institution of higher education and the family and
26 student contribution.

27 (6) Review the need and eligibility of all applications on an
28 annual basis and adjust financial aid to reflect changes in the
29 financial need of the recipients and the cost of attending the
30 institution of higher education.

31 **Sec. 11.** RCW 28B.92.065 and 2015 3rd sp.s. c 36 s 4 are each
32 amended to read as follows:

33 Beginning with the 2015-2017 omnibus appropriations act and each
34 biennium thereafter, reductions in tuition levels resulting from
35 section 3, chapter 36, Laws of 2015 3rd sp. sess. will allow the
36 legislature to reduce (~~state need grant~~) Washington college promise
37 scholarship program appropriations by an equal amount from the
38 2013-2015 fiscal biennium amounts. The legislature does not intend to

1 reduce award levels for private colleges and universities below the
2 2014-15 academic year levels.

3 ~~((By reducing the overall cost of tuition, the legislature in
4 future biennia is better able and intends to serve those students
5 currently eligible but unserved in the state need grant.))~~

6 **Sec. 12.** RCW 28B.15.065 and 1977 ex.s. c 322 s 6 are each
7 amended to read as follows:

8 It is the intent of the legislature that ~~((needy))~~ students who
9 demonstrate financial need not be deprived of access to higher
10 education due to increases in educational costs or consequent
11 increases in tuition and fees. It is the sense of the legislature
12 that state appropriations for student financial aid be adjusted in an
13 amount which together with funds estimated to be available in the
14 form of basic educational opportunity grants as authorized under
15 Section 411 of the federal Higher Education Act of 1965 as now or
16 hereafter amended will equal twenty-four percent of any change in
17 revenue estimated to occur as a result of revisions in tuition and
18 fee levels under the provisions of chapter 322, Laws of 1977 ex.
19 sess.

20 **Sec. 13.** RCW 28B.15.740 and 2015 c 55 s 223 are each amended to
21 read as follows:

22 (1) Subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, the governing
23 boards of the state universities, the regional universities, The
24 Evergreen State College, and the community and technical colleges may
25 waive all or a portion of tuition and fees for ~~((needy))~~ students who
26 demonstrate financial need and are eligible for resident tuition and
27 fee rates pursuant to RCW 28B.15.012 and 28B.15.013. Subject to the
28 limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, the governing boards of the state
29 universities, the regional universities, The Evergreen State College,
30 and the community and technical colleges may waive all or a portion
31 of tuition and fees for other students at the discretion of the
32 governing boards, except on the basis of participation in
33 intercollegiate athletic programs, not to exceed three-fourths of one
34 percent of gross authorized operating fees revenue under RCW
35 28B.15.910 for the community and technical colleges considered as a
36 whole and not to exceed two percent of gross authorized operating
37 fees revenue for the other institutions of higher education.

1 (2) In addition to the tuition and fee waivers provided in
2 subsection (1) of this section and subject to the provisions of RCW
3 28B.15.455, 28B.15.460, and 28B.15.910, a total dollar amount of

21 the alliance. The roadmap must encompass all sectors of higher
22 education, including secondary to postsecondary transitions. The
23 roadmap must outline strategies that address:

24 (a) Strategic planning, which includes setting benchmarks and
25 goals for long-term degree production generally and in particular
26 fields of study;

27 (b) Expanding access, affordability, quality, efficiency, and
28 accountability among the various institutions of higher education;

29 (c) Higher education finance planning and strategic investments
30 including budget recommendations necessary to meet statewide goals;

31 (d) System design and coordination;

32 (e) Improving student transitions;

33 (f) Higher education data and analysis, in collaboration with the
34 education data center, which includes outcomes for recruitment,
35 retention, and success of students;

36 (g) College and career access preparedness, in collaboration with
37 the office of the superintendent of public instruction and the state
38 board of education;

39 (h) Expanding participation and success for racial and ethnic
40 minorities in higher education;

1 (i) Development and expansion of innovations in higher education
2 including innovations to increase attainment of postsecondary
3 certificates, and associate, baccalaureate, graduate, and
4 professional degrees; and innovations to improve precollege education
5 in terms of cost-effectiveness and transitions to college-level
6 education;

7 (j) Strengthening the education pipeline and degree production in
8 science, technology, engineering, and mathematics fields, and
9 aligning strategies under the roadmap with the STEM framework for
10 action and accountability developed under RCW 28A.188.030; and

11 (k) Relevant policy research.

12 (4) As needed, the council must conduct system reviews consistent
13 with RCW 28B.77.080.

14 (5) The council shall facilitate the development and expansion of
15 innovative practices within, between, and among the sectors to
16 increase educational attainment and assess the effectiveness of the
17 innovations.

18 (6) The council shall use the data and analysis produced by, and
19 in consultation with, the education data center created in RCW
20 43.41.400 in developing policy recommendations and proposing goals.
21 In conducting research and analysis the council at a minimum must:

22 (a) Identify barriers to increasing educational attainment,
23 evaluate effectiveness of various educational models, identify best
24 practices, and recommend methods to overcome barriers;

25 (b) Analyze data from multiple sources including data from
26 academic research and from areas and agencies outside of education
27 including but not limited to data from the department of health, the
28 department of corrections, and the department of social and health
29 services to determine best practices to remove barriers and to
30 improve educational attainment;

31 (c) Assess educational achievement disaggregated by income level,
32 age, gender, race and ethnicity, country of origin, and other
33 relevant demographic groups working with data from the education data
34 center;

35 (d) Track progress toward meeting the state's goals;

36 (e) Communicate results and provide access to data analysis to
37 policymakers, the superintendent of public instruction, institutions
38 of higher education, students, and the public; and

39 (f) Use data from the education data center wherever appropriate
40 to conduct duties in (a) through (e) of this subsection.

1 (7) The council shall collaborate with the appropriate state
2 agencies and stakeholders, including the state board of education,
3 the office of the superintendent of public instruction, the state
4 board for community and technical colleges, the workforce training
5 and education coordinating board, and the four-year institutions of
6 higher education to improve student transitions and success including
7 but not limited to:

8 (a) Setting minimum college admission standards for four-year
9 institutions of higher education, including:

10 (i) A requirement that coursework in American sign language or an
11 American Indian language satisfies any requirement for instruction in
12 a language other than English that the council or the institutions
13 may establish as a general undergraduate admissions requirement; and

14 (ii) Encouragement of the use of multiple measures to determine
15 whether a student must enroll in a precollege course, such as
16 placement tests, the SAT, high school transcripts, college
17 transcripts, or initial class performance;

18 (b) Proposing comprehensive policies and programs to encourage
19 students to prepare for, understand how to access, and pursue
20 postsecondary college and career programs, including specific

23 (15) "Tribal foster care system" means an out-of-home placement

25 (16) "Unaccompanied" means a youth or young adult experiencing
26 homelessness while not in the physical custody of a parent or
27 guardian.

30 The office of student financial assistance shall design the

35 (1) "Eligible students" are those students who:

26 (i) The "scholarship account," whose principal may be invaded,
27 and from which scholarships must be disbursed for baccalaureate
28 programs beginning no later than December 1, 2011, if, by that date,
29 state matching funds in the amount of five million dollars or more
30 have been received. Thereafter, scholarships shall be disbursed on an
31 annual basis beginning no later than May 1, 2012, and every October
32 1st thereafter;

33 (ii) The "student support pathways account," whose principal may
34 be invaded, and from which scholarships may be disbursed for
35 professional-technical certificate or degree programs in the fiscal
36 year following appropriations of state matching funds. Thereafter,

4 be disbursed for baccalaureate programs from earnings only in years

15 (v) An amount equal to at least fifty percent of all grants and
16 contributions must be deposited into the scholarship account until
17 such time as twenty million dollars have been deposited into the

20 scholarship account, the student support pathways account, the
21 advanced degrees pathways account, or the endowment account~~((s))~~. The
22 board and the program administrator must work to maximize private

25 the endowment account,))~~ these accounts to maintain a robust
26 scholarship program while simultaneously building the endowment, and

14 (d) In consultation with the council and the state board for
15 community and technical colleges, make an assessment of the
16 reasonable annual eligible expenses associated with eligible
17 education programs and eligible advanced degree programs identified
18 by the board;

19 (e) Determine the dollar difference between tuition fees charged
20 by institutions of higher education in the 2008-09 academic year and
21 the academic year for which an opportunity scholarship is being
22 distributed;

23 (f) Develop and implement an application, selection, and
24 notification process for awarding opportunity scholarships;

25 (g) Determine the annual amount of the opportunity scholarship
26 for each selected participant. The annual amount shall be at least
27 one thousand dollars or the amount determined under (e) of this
28 subsection, but may be increased on an income-based, sliding scale
29 basis up to the amount necessary to cover all reasonable annual
30 eligible expenses as assessed pursuant to (d) of this subsection, or
31 to encourage participation in professional-technical certificate
32 programs, professional-technical degree programs, ((~~o~~))
33 baccalaureate degree programs, or eligible advanced degree programs
34 identified by the board;

35 (h) Distribute scholarship funds to selected participants. Once
36 awarded, and to the extent funds are available for distribution, an
37 opportunity scholarship shall be automatically renewed as long as the
38 participant annually submits documentation of filing both a free
39 application for federal student aid (FAFSA) and for available federal
40 education tax credits including, but not limited to, the American

1 opportunity tax credit, or if ineligible to apply for federal student
2 aid, the participant annually submits documentation of filing a state
3 financial aid application as approved by the office of student
4 financial assistance; and until the participant withdraws from or is
5 no longer attending the program, completes the program, or has taken
6 the credit or clock hour equivalent of one hundred twenty-five
7 percent of the published length of time of the participant's program,
8 whichever occurs first;

9 (i) Notify institutions of scholarship recipients who will attend
10 their institutions and inform them of the terms of the students'
11 eligibility;

12 (j) Establish a required service obligation for participants
13 enrolled in an eligible advanced degree program, and establish a
14 process for verifying a participant's employment in a service
15 obligation area; and

16 (k) Establish a repayment obligation and appeals process for
17 participants who serve less than the required service obligation,
18 unless the program administrator determines the circumstances are
19 beyond the participant's control. If the participant is unable to pay
20 the repayment obligation in full, the participant may enter into
21 payment arrangements with the program administrator. The program
22 administrator is responsible for the collection of repayment
23 obligations on behalf of participants who fail to complete their
24 service obligation.

25 (3) With respect to the opportunity expansion program, the
26 program administrator shall:

27 (a) Assist the board in developing and implementing an
28 application, selection, and notification process for making
29 opportunity expansion awards; and

30 (b) Solicit and accept grants and contributions from private
31 sources for opportunity expansion awards.
