AN ACT Relating to government efficiency by eliminating, revising, or decodifying obsolete or inactive statutory provisions that concern the office of financial management; amending RCW 38.40.030, 43.03.049, 43.08.015, and 43.320.090; and repealing RCW 28B.15.101, 39.80.070, 43.41.220, 43.41.230, 43.41.240, 43.41.250, 43.41.905, and 43.132.800.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

8 Sec. 1. RCW 38.40.030 and 1989 c 19 s 47 are each amended to 9 read as follows:

10 If any member of the organized militia is injured, incapacitated, or otherwise disabled while in active state service or inactive duty 11 12 as a member of the organized militia, he or she shall receive from 13 the state of Washington just and reasonable relief in the amount to 14 be determined as provided in this section, including necessary 15 medical care. If the member dies from disease contracted or injury 16 received or is killed while in active state service or inactive duty under order of the governor, then the dependents of the deceased 17 18 shall receive such compensation as may be allowed as provided in this 19 section. If the United States or any agent thereof, in accordance 20 with anv federal statute or regulation, furnishes monetary 21 assistance, benefits, or other temporary or permanent relief to

1 militia members or to their dependents for injuries arising out of and occurring in the course of their activities as militia members, 2 but not including Social Security benefits, then the amount of 3 compensation which any militia member or his or her dependents are 4 otherwise entitled to receive from the state of Washington as 5 6 provided in this section shall be reduced by the amount of monetary assistance, benefits, or other temporary or permanent relief the 7 militia member or his or her dependents have received and will 8 receive from the United States or any agent thereof as a result of 9 10 his or her injury. All claims arising under this section shall be 11 inquired into by a board of three officers, at least one being a 12 medical officer, to be appointed by the adjutant general. The board has the same power to take evidence, administer oaths, issue 13 subpoenas, compel witnesses to attend and testify and produce books 14 15 and papers, and punish their failure to do so as is possessed by a 16 general court martial. The amount of compensation or benefits payable 17 shall conform as nearly as possible to the general schedule of payments and awards provided under the workers' compensation law in 18 19 effect in the state of Washington at the time the disability or death occurred. The findings of the board shall be reviewed by the adjutant 20 general ((and submitted to the governor)) for final approval. The 21 22 ((reviewing officer or the governor)) adjutant general may return the 23 proceedings for revision or for the taking of further testimony. The action of the board when finally approved by the ((governor)) 24 25 adjutant general is final and conclusive and constitutes the fixed award for the injury or loss and is a debt of the state of 26 Washington. 27

28 Sec. 2. RCW 43.03.049 and 2011 1st sp.s. c 21 s 63 are each 29 amended to read as follows:

30 Exceptions to restrictions on subsistence, lodging, or travel 31 expenses under this chapter may be granted for the critically necessary work of an agency. For boards, commissions, councils, 32 33 committees, or similar groups in agencies of the executive branch, the exceptions ((shall be)) are subject to approval by the ((director 34 of financial management or the director's designee)) agency head or 35 authorized designee. For boards, commissions, councils, committees, 36 or similar groups in the executive branch under the purview of a 37 38 separately elected official, president of an institution of higher 39 education, chair, or executive director, the exceptions are subject

1 to approval of the separately elected official, president of the institution of higher education, chair, or executive director. For 2 agencies of the judicial branch, the exceptions shall be subject to 3 approval of the chief justice of the supreme court. For the house of 4 representatives and the senate, the exceptions shall be subject to 5 6 the approval of the chief clerk of the house of representatives and 7 the secretary of the senate, respectively, under the direction of the senate committee on facilities and operations and the executive rules 8 committee of the house of representatives. For other legislative 9 agencies, the exceptions shall be subject to approval of both the 10 11 chief clerk of the house of representatives and the secretary of the 12 senate under the direction of the senate committee on facilities and operations and the executive rules committee of the house of 13 14 representatives.

15 **Sec. 3.** RCW 43.08.015 and 1993 c 500 s 3 are each amended to 16 read as follows:

17 Within the policies and procedures established pursuant to RCW 18 43.41.110(13) and 43.88.160(1), the state treasurer shall take such actions as are necessary to ensure the effective cash management of 19 20 public funds. This cash management shall include the authority to 21 represent the state in all contractual relationships with financial 22 institutions. The state treasurer may delegate cash management responsibilities to the affected agencies ((with the concurrence of 23 24 the office of financial management)).

25 Sec. 4. RCW 43.320.090 and 1993 c 472 s 23 are each amended to 26 read as follows:

27 (1)It shall be unlawful for the director of financial institutions, any deputized assistant of the director, or any 28 29 employee of the department of financial institutions to borrow money 30 from any bank, consumer loan company, credit union, foreign bank branch, savings bank, savings and loan association, or trust company 31 or department, securities broker-dealer or investment advisor, or 32 33 similar lending institution under the department's direct jurisdiction unless the extension of credit: 34

35 (a) Is made on substantially the same terms (including interest 36 rates and collateral) as, and following credit underwriting 37 procedures that are not less stringent than, those prevailing at the 38 time for comparable transactions by the financial institution with

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1 other persons that are not employed by either the department or the 2 institution; and

3 (b) Does not involve more than the normal risk of repayment or 4 present other unfavorable features.

5 (2) ((The director of the office of financial management shall
6 adopt rules, policies, and procedures interpreting and implementing
7 this section.

8 (3)) Every person who knowingly violates this section shall 9 forfeit his or her office or employment and be guilty of a gross 10 misdemeanor.

(5) RCW 43.41.240 (Approval of board or commission not established or required by statute) and 1998 c 245 s 64 & 1994 sp.s. c 9 s 875;

(6) RCW 43.41.250 (Criteria for new board or commission not
established or required by statute) and 1994 sp.s. c 9 s 876;
