## SENATE BILL 5017

## State of Washington 67th Legislature 2021 Regular Session

1 AN ACT Relating to clarifying school district procurement 2 requirements for personal service contracts for construction 3 management, value engineering, constructibility review, and building 4 commissioning; amending RCW 28A.335.190; creating a new section; and 5 declaring an emergency.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

7 1. The legislature finds that school NEW SECTION. Sec. 8 construction procurement processes must comply with the requirements 9 of public works laws specified in chapter 39.04 RCW. Competitive 10 bidding requirements under chapter 39.04 RCW apply to construction 11 contracts by registered contractors. Procurement requirements in RCW 12 28A.335.190 for public works by school districts are not well defined 13 and may be interpreted as being inconsistent with the requirements of 14 chapter 39.04 RCW and with the authority to contract for personal 15 services under RCW 28A.320.035. The purpose of this act is to make 16 retroactive, remedial, curative, and technical amendments to clarify 17 the intent of RCW 28A.335.190.

18 Sec. 2. RCW 28A.335.190 and 2013 c 223 s 1 are each amended to 19 read as follows:

p. 1

1 (1) When, in the opinion of the board of directors of any school district, the cost of any furniture, supplies, equipment, building, 2 improvements, or repairs, ((<del>or</del>)) other <u>construction</u> work 3 by a contractor who meets the criteria in RCW 39.04.350, 4 or other purchases, except books, will equal or exceed the threshold levels 5 6 specified in subsections (2) and (4) of this section, complete plans and specifications for such work or purchases shall be prepared and 7 notice by publication given in at least one newspaper of general 8 circulation within the district, once each week for two consecutive 9 weeks, of the intention to receive bids and that specifications and 10 11 other information may be examined at the office of the board or any 12 other officially designated location. The cost of any public work, improvement, or repair for the purposes of this section shall be the 13 14 aggregate of all amounts to be paid for labor, material, and 15 equipment on one continuous or interrelated project where work is to 16 be performed simultaneously or in close sequence. The bids shall be 17 in writing and shall be opened and read in public on the date and in the place named in the notice and after being opened shall be filed 18 19 for public inspection.

(2) Every purchase of furniture, equipment, or supplies, except 20 21 books, the cost of which is estimated to be in excess of forty 22 thousand dollars, shall be on a competitive basis. The board of 23 directors shall establish a procedure for securing telephone and/or written quotations for such purchases. Whenever the estimated cost is 24 25 from forty thousand dollars up to seventy-five thousand dollars, the 26 procedure shall require quotations from at least three different 27 sources to be obtained in writing or by telephone, and recorded for 28 public perusal. Whenever the estimated cost is in excess of seventy-29 five thousand dollars, the public bidding process provided in subsection (1) of this section shall be followed. 30

31 (3) Any school district may purchase goods produced or provided 32 in whole or in part from class II inmate work programs operated by 33 the department of corrections pursuant to RCW 72.09.100, including 34 not limited to furniture, equipment, or supplies. School but districts are encouraged to set as a target to contract, beginning 35 after June 30, 2006, to purchase up to one percent of the total goods 36 required by the school districts each year, goods produced or 37 provided in whole or in part from class II inmate work programs 38 39 operated by the department of corrections.

1 (4) The board may make improvements or repairs to the property of the district through a department within the district without 2 following the public bidding process provided in subsection (1) of 3 this section when the total of such improvements or repairs does not 4 exceed the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars. Whenever the 5 6 estimated cost of a building, improvement, repair, or other public works project is one hundred thousand dollars or more, the public 7 bidding process provided in subsection (1) of this section shall be 8 followed unless the contract is let using the small works roster 9 process in RCW 39.04.155 or under any other procedure authorized for 10 11 school districts. One or more school districts may authorize an educational service district to establish and operate a small works 12 roster for the school district under the provisions of RCW 39.04.155. 13

(5) The contract for the work or purchase shall be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder as described in RCW 39.26.160(2) but the board may by resolution reject any and all bids and make further calls for bids in the same manner as the original call. On any work or purchase the board shall provide bidding information to any qualified bidder or the bidder's agent, requesting it in person.

(6) In the event of any emergency when the public interest or 20 21 property of the district would suffer material injury or damage by delay, upon resolution of the board declaring the existence of such 22 an emergency and reciting the facts constituting the same, the board 23 may waive the requirements of this section with reference to any 24 25 purchase or contract: PROVIDED, That an "emergency," for the purposes of this section, means a condition likely to result in immediate 26 physical injury to persons or to property of the school district in 27 the absence of prompt remedial action. 28

(7) This section does not apply to the direct purchase of school buses by school districts and educational services in accordance with RCW 28A.160.195.

32 (8) This section does not apply to the purchase of Washington33 grown food.

(9) At the discretion of the board, a school district may develop and implement policies and procedures to facilitate and maximize to the extent practicable, purchases of Washington grown food including, but not limited to, policies that permit a percentage price preference for the purpose of procuring Washington grown food.

39 (10) As used in this section, "Washington grown" has the 40 definition in RCW 15.64.060.

1 (11) As used in this section, "price percentage preference" means 2 the percent by which a responsive bid from a responsible bidder whose 3 product is a Washington grown food may exceed the lowest responsive 4 bid submitted by a responsible bidder whose product is not a 5 Washington grown food.

6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. This act is necessary for the immediate 7 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of 8 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes 9 effect immediately.

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
