1 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the 2 following:

3 "Sec. 1. RCW 28A.300.105 and 2011 c 270 s 2 are each amended to 4 read as follows:

5 (1) To the extent funds are available, an Indian education 6 division, to be known as the office of Native education, is created 7 within the office of the superintendent of public instruction. The 8 superintendent shall appoint an individual to be responsible for the 9 office of Native education.

10 (2) To the extent state funds are available, with additional 11 support of federal and local funds where authorized by law, the 12 office of Native education shall:

(a) Provide assistance to school districts in meeting the
 educational needs of American Indian and Alaska Native students;

(b) Facilitate the development and implementation of curricula and instructional materials in native languages, culture and history, and the concept of tribal sovereignty pursuant to RCW 28A.320.170;

(c) Provide assistance to districts in the acquisition of funding to develop curricula and instructional materials in conjunction with native language practitioners and tribal elders;

(d) Coordinate technical assistance for public schools that serve
 American Indian and Alaska Native students;

(e) Seek funds to develop, in conjunction with the Washington state native American education advisory committee, and implement the following support services for the purposes of both increasing the number of American Indian and Alaska Native teachers and principals and providing continued professional development for educational assistants, teachers, and principals serving American Indian and Alaska Native students:

30 (i) Recruitment and retention;

31 (ii) Academic transition programs;

32 (iii) Academic financial support;

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- 1 (iv) Teacher preparation;
- 2 (v) Teacher induction; and
- 3 (vi) Professional development;

4 (f) Facilitate the inclusion of native language programs in 5 school districts' curricula;

6 (g) Work with all relevant agencies and committees to highlight 7 the need for accurate, useful data that is appropriately 8 disaggregated to provide a more accurate picture regarding American 9 Indian and Alaska Native students; and

10 (h) Report to the governor, the legislature, and the governor's office of Indian affairs on an annual basis, beginning in December 11 2012, regarding the state of Indian education and the implementation 12 of all state laws regarding Indian education, specifically noting 13 system successes and accomplishments, deficiencies, and needs. The 14 15 reports issued in 2024 through 2027, must also include: Information about consultations and collaborations between school districts and 16 17 federally recognized Indian tribes under RCW 28A.320.170, including tribal perspectives on the implementation of the required curriculum; 18 and recommendations for promoting tribal consultation efforts with 19 school districts. 20

21 Sec. 2. RCW 28A.320.170 and 2015 c 198 s 2 are each amended to 22 read as follows:

(1) (a) ((Beginning July 24, 2015, when a school district board of 23 24 directors reviews or adopts its social studies curriculum, it)) By September 1, 2024, school districts shall incorporate a tribal 25 sovereignty curriculum developed and made available free of charge by 26 the office of the superintendent of public instruction into their 27 social studies curriculum. School districts may modify the curriculum 28 29 in order to: Include elements with a regionally specific focus; or integrate the curriculum into existing curricular materials. 30 31 Instruction provided in accordance with this subsection (1) (a) must be incorporated into all classes teaching United States history, 32 33 United States government, or civics in grades nine through 12.

34 (b) By September 1, 2026, school districts shall incorporate 35 ((curricula)) materials about the history, culture, and government of 36 the nearest federally recognized Indian tribe or tribes, ((so that 37 students)) including federally recognized Indian tribes whose 38 traditional lands and territories included parts of Washington state, 39 but who now reside in the state of Oregon or the state of Idaho, into 1 <u>their social studies curricula for the purpose of giving students the</u> 2 <u>opportunity to</u> learn about the unique heritage and experience of 3 their closest <u>federally recognized tribal</u> neighbors.

(((b) School districts shall meet the requirements of this 4 section by using curriculum developed and made available free of 5 6 charge by the office of the superintendent of public instruction and may modify that curriculum in order to incorporate elements that have 7 a regionally specific focus or to incorporate the curriculum into 8 existing curricular materials.)) School districts, before 9 10 incorporating the required materials into their social studies curricula, shall consult with the nearest federally recognized Indian 11 tribe or tribes for the purposes of discussing strategies and 12 practices for effectively implementing this subsection (1)(b). 13

(2) As ((they)) school districts conduct regularly scheduled 14 reviews and revisions of their social studies and history curricula, 15 16 ((school districts)) they shall consult and collaborate with any 17 federally recognized Indian tribe within their district, and with neighboring Indian tribes, including federally recognized Indian 18 tribes whose traditional lands and territories included parts of 19 Mashington state, but who now reside in the state of Oregon or the 20 21 state of Idaho, to incorporate expanded and improved curricular materials about Indian tribes, and to create programs of classroom 22 23 and community cultural exchanges.

(3) (a) School districts shall collaborate with the office of Native education established in RCW 28A.300.105 within the office of the superintendent of public instruction and the office of the superintendent of public instruction on curricular areas regarding tribal government and history that are statewide in nature, such as the concept of tribal sovereignty and the history of federal policy towards federally recognized Indian tribes.

(b) The ((program of Indian education within the)) office of the 31 32 superintendent of public instruction, through the office of Native education, shall ((help)): (i) Assist local school districts to 33 34 identify federally recognized Indian tribes whose reservations are in whole or in part within the boundaries of the district ((and/or)), 35 those that are nearest to the school district, including federally 36 37 recognized Indian tribes whose traditional lands and territories included parts of Washington state, but who now reside in the state 38 39 of Oregon or the state of Idaho, or both; and (ii) collaborate with 40 tribes that may have unique consultation challenges under this 1 section, such as consulting with a large number of school districts
2 or with school districts that have large student enrollments.

(4) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this 3 specific purpose, the office of superintendent of public instruction, 4 for the 2023-24 and 2024-25 school years, shall administer grants to 5 6 school districts and federally recognized Indian tribes in the state 7 of Washington for implementing the requirements of this section. In implementing this section, the office of the superintendent of public 8 instruction shall establish limits on the percentage of grant funds 9 10 that a recipient may retain for administrative purposes.

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 28A.305
12 RCW to read as follows:

Beginning in the 2023-24 school year, the state board of 13 education, in coordination with the office of native education 14 established in RCW 28A.300.105, shall implement a system of annual 15 16 monitoring and evaluations of school district compliance with RCW 28A.320.170(1). The monitoring and evaluations, which may be conduced 17 18 concurrently with other oversight and monitoring conducted by the state board of education, must include collected information for each 19 20 school district about:

21 (1) Collaborations with the nearest federally recognized Indian 22 tribes;

23 (2) The grade levels in which the curriculum is taught;

(3) The courses for which credit may be awarded and the number of
 students enrolled in, and having received credit for, those courses
 during the preceding school year;

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(4) Summaries of the curriculum implementation process; and

28 (5) The availability and implementation of applicable 29 professional development.

(6) Beginning in 2024 and concluding in 2027, the state board of education, in accordance with RCW 43.01.036, shall annually provide a report to the education committees of the legislature that summarizes school district compliance with RCW 28A.320.170(1). The reports required by this subsection may be incorporated within other oversight and monitoring reports produced by the state board of education.

37 (7) This section expires September 1, 2027.

1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. If specific funding for the purposes of 2 this act, referencing this act by bill or chapter number, is not 3 provided by June 30, 2023, in the omnibus appropriations act, this 4 act is null and void."

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5 On page 1, line 2 of the title, after "tribes;" strike the 6 remainder of the title and insert "amending RCW 28A.300.105 and 7 28A.320.170; adding a new section to chapter 28A.305 RCW; creating a 8 new section; and providing an expiration date."

<u>EFFECT:</u> Removes tribal sovereignty curriculum instruction frequency requirements for kindergarten through grade eight.

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
