## E2SHB 1332 - S COMM AMD

1 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the 2 following:

3 "Sec. 1. RCW 28A.300.105 and 2011 c 270 s 2 are each amended to 4 read as follows:

5 (1) To the extent funds are available, an Indian education 6 division, to be known as the office of Native education, is created 7 within the office of the superintendent of public instruction. The 8 superintendent shall appoint an individual to be responsible for the 9 office of Native education.

10 (2) To the extent state funds are available, with additional 11 support of federal and local funds where authorized by law, the 12 office of Native education shall:

(a) Provide assistance to school districts in meeting the
 educational needs of American Indian and Alaska Native students;

(b) Facilitate the development and implementation of curricula and instructional materials in native languages, culture and history, and the concept of tribal sovereignty pursuant to RCW 28A.320.170;

(c) Provide assistance to districts in the acquisition of funding to develop curricula and instructional materials in conjunction with native language practitioners and tribal elders;

(d) Coordinate technical assistance for public schools that serve
 American Indian and Alaska Native students;

(e) Seek funds to develop, in conjunction with the Washington state native American education advisory committee, and implement the following support services for the purposes of both increasing the number of American Indian and Alaska Native teachers and principals and providing continued professional development for educational assistants, teachers, and principals serving American Indian and Alaska Native students:

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- (i) Recruitment and retention;
- 31 (ii) Academic transition programs;

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- 1 (iii) Academic financial support;
- 2 (iv) Teacher preparation;
- 3 (v) Teacher induction; and
- 4 (vi) Professional development;

5 (f) Facilitate the inclusion of native language programs in 6 school districts' curricula;

7 (g) Work with all relevant agencies and committees to highlight 8 the need for accurate, useful data that is appropriately 9 disaggregated to provide a more accurate picture regarding American 10 Indian and Alaska Native students; and

(h) Report to the governor, the legislature, and the governor's 11 office of Indian affairs on an annual basis, beginning in December 12 2012, regarding the state of Indian education and the implementation 13 of all state laws regarding Indian education, specifically noting 14 system successes and accomplishments, deficiencies, and needs. The 15 reports issued in 2024 through 2027, must also include: Information 16 17 about consultations and collaborations between school districts and federally recognized Indian tribes under RCW 28A.320.170, including 18 19 tribal perspectives on the implementation of the required curriculum; and recommendations for promoting tribal consultation efforts with 20 21 school districts.

22 Sec. 2. RCW 28A.320.170 and 2015 c 198 s 2 are each amended to 23 read as follows:

(1) (a) ((Beginning July 24, 2015, when a school district board of 24 directors reviews or adopts its social studies curriculum, it)) By 25 September 1, 2024, school districts shall incorporate the curriculum 26 27 referenced in (c) of this subsection (1) into their social studies curricula. Instruction provided in accordance with this subsection 28 29 (1) (a) must be incorporated into all classes teaching United States 30 history, United States government, or civics in grades nine through 31 12, and provided no less than:

32 (i) Once to students while they are in any of the grades of 33 kindergarten through three;

- 34 (ii) Once to students while they are in grades four or five; and 35 (iii) Twice to students while they are in any of the grades of 36 six through eight.
- 37 (b) By September 1, 2026, school districts shall incorporate 38 ((curricula)) materials about the history, culture, and government of 39 the nearest federally recognized Indian tribe or tribes, ((so that Code Rev/CC:akl 2 S-5276.1/24

including federally recognized Indian tribes whose 1 students)) traditional lands and territories included parts of Washington, but 2 that now reside in Oregon, Idaho, and British Columbia, into their 3 social studies curricula for the purpose of giving students the 4 opportunity to learn about the unique heritage and experience of 5 6 their closest <u>federally recognized tribal</u> neighbors. <u>School</u> districts, before incorporating the required materials into their 7 social studies curricula, shall consult with the nearest federally 8 recognized Indian tribe or tribes about strategies and practices for 9 10 effectively implementing this subsection (1) (b).

11 ((<del>(b)</del>)) <u>(c)</u> School districts shall meet the requirements of this 12 section by using curriculum developed and made available free of 13 charge by the office of the superintendent of public instruction and 14 may modify that curriculum in order to incorporate elements that have 15 a regionally specific focus or to incorporate the curriculum into 16 existing curricular materials.

17 (2) As ((they)) school districts conduct regularly scheduled reviews and revisions of their social studies and history curricula, 18 19 ((school districts)) they shall consult and collaborate with any federally recognized Indian tribe within their district, and with 20 21 neighboring Indian tribes, including federally recognized Indian tribes whose traditional lands and territories included parts of 22 23 Washington, but that now reside in Oregon, Idaho, and British <u>Columbia</u>, to incorporate expanded and improved curricular materials 24 25 about Indian tribes, and to create programs of classroom and 26 community cultural exchanges.

(3) (a) School districts shall collaborate with the office of Native education established in RCW 28A.300.105 within the office of the superintendent of public instruction and the office of the superintendent of public instruction on curricular areas regarding tribal government and history that are statewide in nature, such as the concept of tribal sovereignty and the history of federal policy towards federally recognized Indian tribes.

34 <u>(b)</u> The ((program of Indian education within the)) office of the 35 superintendent of public instruction, through the office of Native 36 <u>education</u>, shall ((help)):

37 <u>(i) Assist</u> local school districts <u>to</u> identify federally 38 recognized Indian tribes whose reservations are in whole or in part 39 within the boundaries of the district ((and/or)), and those that are 40 nearest to the school district, including federally recognized Indian

tribes whose traditional lands and territories included parts of 1 Washington, but that now reside in Oregon, Idaho, and British 2 3 Columbia; and (ii) Collaborate with tribes that may have unique consultation 4 challenges under this section, such as consulting with a large number 5 6 of school districts or with school districts that have large student 7 enrollments. 8 (4) (a) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the office of the superintendent of public 9 10 instruction, for the 2024-25 and 2025-26 school years, shall administer grants to support the implementation of the requirements 11 of this section. Grants may be awarded to school districts or 12 directly to federally recognized Indian tribes and may be used for 13 costs associated with curriculum design and implementation and costs 14 15 related to collaboration with federally recognized Indian tribes, including reimbursements to tribes for collaboration-related costs. 16 17 In awarding the grants, the office of the superintendent of public instruction shall, to the extent possible, divide the grant awards 18 equally between school districts and federally recognized Indian 19 tribes that apply for funds under the grant program. 20

21 (b) In implementing this subsection (4), the office of the 22 superintendent of public instruction shall establish limits on the 23 percentage of grant funds that a school district may retain for 24 administrative purposes.

25 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 28A.305
26 RCW to read as follows:

27 Beginning in the 2024-25 school year, the state board of education, in coordination with the office of native education 28 29 established in RCW 28A.300.105, shall implement a system of annual 30 monitoring and evaluations of school district compliance with RCW 31 28A.320.170(1). The monitoring and evaluations, which may be conducted concurrently with other oversight and monitoring conducted 32 by the state board of education, must include collected information 33 for each school district about: 34

35 (1) Collaborations with the nearest federally recognized Indian 36 tribes;

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(2) The grade levels in which the curriculum is taught;

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(3) The courses for which credit may be awarded and the number of
 students enrolled in, and having received credit for, those courses
 during the preceding school year;

4 (4) Summaries of the curriculum implementation process; and

5 (5) The availability and implementation of applicable 6 professional development.

7 (6) Beginning in 2025 and concluding in 2028, the state board of 8 education, in accordance with RCW 43.01.036, shall annually provide a 9 report to the education committees of the legislature that summarizes 10 school district compliance with RCW 28A.320.170(1). The reports 11 required by this subsection may be incorporated within other 12 oversight and monitoring reports produced by the state board of 13 education.

14 (7) This section expires September 1, 2028.

15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. If specific funding for the purposes of 16 this act, referencing this act by bill or chapter number, is not 17 provided by June 30, 2024, in the omnibus appropriations act, this 18 act is null and void."

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19 On page 1, line 2 of the title, after "tribes;" strike the 20 remainder of the title and insert "amending RCW 28A.300.105 and 21 28A.320.170; adding a new section to chapter 28A.305 RCW; creating a 22 new section; and providing an expiration date."

<u>EFFECT:</u> (1) Allows OSPI to administer grants for implementation of tribal curriculum integration to federally recognized Indian tribes.

(2) Directs OSPI, in awarding grants for implementation of tribal curriculum integration and to the extent possible, to divide the grant awards equally between school districts and federally recognized Indian tribes that apply for funds under the grant program.
