## HOUSE BILL 1559

State of Washington 68th Legislature 2023 Regular Session

Read first time 01/24/23. Referred to Committee on Postsecondary Education & Workforce.

AN ACT Relating to the student basic needs at public postsecondary institutions act; adding a new section to chapter 3 28B.10 RCW; adding new sections to chapter 28B.50 RCW; creating new 4 sections; and providing an expiration date.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 28B.10 7 RCW to read as follows:

8 (1) By the beginning of the 2023-24 academic year, institutions 9 of higher education shall each establish a student basic needs task 10 force comprised of staff and faculty, student representatives, and 11 community organizations with expertise in accessing basic needs. Each 12 task force shall develop a hunger-free campus strategic plan for its 13 campus beginning no later than April 1, 2024. Each strategic plan 14 must:

(a) By the beginning of the 2023-24 academic year and every year thereafter, collect and disseminate results of a student survey developed by the state board for community and technical colleges and the student achievement council to assess food security, housing security, and access to basic economic supports;

(b) Analyze gaps in student basic needs in the student body andinstitution;

1 (c) If none exists, design a benefits resource hub to assist 2 students with accessing public benefits, emergency financial 3 assistance such as those created under RCW 28B.50.295, and other 4 community resources using a minimum of one full-time navigator;

5 (d) Hire full-time benefits navigators to assist students in 6 accessing public benefits and existing emergency assistance programs 7 such as those funded by RCW 28B.50.295;

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(e) Ensure access to a campus food pantry for students;

9 (f) Establish and update methods to identify likely low-income 10 and food-insecure students and conduct communications and outreach 11 methods by the institution to promote opportunities for benefits 12 assistance (such as basic food enrollment, working connections child 13 care enrollment, referrals to the special supplemental nutrition 14 program for women, infants, and children, affordable housing 15 assistance) and emergency financial resources;

16 (g) Assess the needs and advantages of their benefits navigator 17 model; and

(h) Identify opportunities for the institution and partnerships
with community-based organizations to holistically support students'
basic needs, access to benefits and community resources.

21 (2) Each annual plan must include at least two activities to 22 implement into the strategic plan.

(3) Institutions of higher education shall each provide a brief written report from their respective student basic needs task forces to the student achievement council and the state board for community and technical colleges by the end of the 2023-24 academic year and every subsequent year. Each report must include findings and activities from the strategic plan and be published online in an easily accessible location.

30 (4) The definitions in this subsection apply throughout this31 section unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

(a) "Benefits navigator" means an individual who is employed by
 an institution of higher education for the purpose of helping
 students seek, apply for, and receive assistance from benefits
 programs, emergency resources, and community resources.

36 (b) "Benefits resource hub" means a single location on campus 37 where students are directed to get assistance from a benefits 38 navigator to understand what basic needs benefits they may be 39 eligible for and receive assistance in applications, enrollment, and 40 removing barriers to receive support services. 1 (c) "Institutions of higher education" means institutions as 2 defined in RCW 28B.10.016, university campuses created under chapter 3 28B.45 RCW, and tribal institutions of higher education operated by 4 an Indian tribe as defined in RCW 43.376.010.

5 (d) "Student basic needs" means food, water, nutrition, shelter, 6 clothing, physical health, mental health, child care, or similar 7 needs that students enrolled at an institution of higher education 8 may face difficulty with and that hinders their ability to begin or 9 continue their enrollment.

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28B.50
11 RCW to read as follows:

(1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the state board for community and technical colleges and the student achievement council shall convene a postsecondary basic needs work group. The purpose of the work group is to learn from the experiences of students and local institutions of higher education. The work group shall:

18 (a) Develop budgetary and administrative policy in the 19 administration of the work group;

(b) Coordinate with and provide technical assistance to student
 basic needs task forces at institutions of higher education;

(c) By the beginning of the 2023-24 academic year and every year thereafter, coordinate the collection of a student survey data that measures the basic needs of students and disseminate survey results;

(d) Identify how many full-time benefits navigators are necessaryto adequately assist an institution's student population;

(e) Facilitate discussions and generate recommendations amongst
 relevant stakeholders on the basic needs of Washington's higher
 education student population;

30 (f) Assess the distribution of state funds for basic needs 31 support provided to institutions of higher education and university 32 campuses;

33 (g) Assess how effectively funds of institutions of higher 34 education are meeting students' basic needs;

35 (h) Issue biennial recommendations, beginning January 1, 2025, 36 regarding strategies to address students' basic needs to the 37 appropriate committees of the legislature in accordance with RCW 38 43.01.036; and 1 (i) Support a collaborative partnership with not-for-profit 2 organization(s) with expertise in student basic needs programs, or 3 benefits navigation to provide ongoing technical assistance and 4 training.

5 (2) The definitions in this subsection apply throughout this 6 section unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

7 (a) "Benefits navigator" means an individual who is employed by 8 an institution of higher education for the purpose of helping 9 students seek, apply for, and receive assistance from benefits 10 programs, emergency resources, and community resources.

(b) "Institutions of higher education" means institutions as defined in RCW 28B.10.016, university campuses created under chapter 28B.45 RCW, and tribal institutions of higher education operated by an Indian tribe as defined in RCW 43.376.010.

(c) "Student basic needs" means food, water, nutrition, shelter, clothing, physical health, mental health, child care, or similar needs that students enrolled at an institution of higher education may face difficulty with and that hinders their ability to begin or continue their enrollment.

20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 28B.50 21 RCW to read as follows:

(1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the state board for community and technical colleges and the student achievement council shall:

(a) Design and implement a benefits navigator grant program to provide funding to institutions of higher education to be used in the implementation of duties established under section 1 of this act;

(b) Where applicable, maximize use of the basic food education
 and training program to fund navigators and maximize federal funds to
 help low-income students meet their basic needs; and

31 (c) Review applications for the benefits navigator grant program 32 and select institutions of higher education to receive the grant 33 using objective criteria included within the application and online 34 in an easily accessible location.

35 (2) The definitions in this subsection apply throughout this36 section unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

37 (a) "Benefits navigator" means an individual who is employed by38 an institution of higher education for the purpose of helping

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students seek, apply for, and receive assistance from benefits
 programs, emergency resources, and community resources.

3 (b) "Institutions of higher education" means institutions as 4 defined in RCW 28B.10.016, university campuses created under chapter 5 28B.45 RCW, and tribal institutions of higher education operated by 6 an Indian tribe as defined in RCW 43.376.010.

7 (c) "Student basic needs" means food, water, nutrition, shelter, 8 clothing, physical health, mental health, child care, or similar 9 needs that students enrolled at an institution of higher education 10 may face difficulty with and that hinders their ability to begin or 11 continue their enrollment.

12 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. (1) Subject to the availability of amounts 13 appropriated for this specific purpose, the college board shall 14 select four college districts, two on each side of the crest of the 15 Cascade mountains, to participate in a pilot program to provide free 16 and low-cost meal plans or food vouchers to eligible low-income 17 students.

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(2) The pilot program expires July 1, 2025.

19 (3) This section expires January 1, 2026.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. (1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the council shall select two public four-year institutions of higher education, one on each side of the crest of the Cascade mountains, to participate in a pilot program to provide free and low-cost meal plans or food vouchers to eligible low-income students.

- 26 (2) The pilot program expires July 1, 2025.
- 27 (3) This section expires January 1, 2026.

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
