State of Washington 68th Legislature 2024 Regular Session

AN ACT Relating to establishing the ninth grade success grant program; adding a new section to chapter 28A.175 RCW; and creating a new section.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. The legislature finds that ninth grade is 6 a pivotal year for students and that ninth grade success is one of 7 the most predictive indicators of on-time graduation. Research 8 indicates that students are more likely to fail a class in the ninth 9 grade than in any other grade, but also shows that students who pass 10 all their ninth grade classes are up to four times more likely to 11 graduate.

12 The legislature further finds that targeted approaches have been 13 shown to increase ninth grade on-track scores in schools. These 14 approaches include establishing success teams that regularly review 15 data regarding student attendance, behavior, and grades to identify 16 when a student may be falling behind and intervene with strategic 17 supports. Through coaching and collaboration these success teams also 18 share best practices, evaluate outcome data, and progress towards 19 creating a sustainable framework that can be implemented in 20 subsequent school years.

1 The legislature acknowledges the impact of the ninth grade success team pilot program established in 2019, which resulted in 2 3 four out of five school districts reporting immediate and sustained increases in their ninth grade on-track rates. The successful 4 expansion of the program in the 2021-22 school year to 5 30 6 participating schools also had positive outcomes, with 83 percent of 7 schools increasing their baseline rates over the prior school year and 50 percent of schools reporting a double-digit increase. The 8 legislature now intends to create a permanent ninth grade success 9 grant program to expand access across Washington state. 10

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28A.175
12 RCW to read as follows:

(1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this 13 specific purpose, the office of the superintendent of public 14 instruction shall establish and administer the ninth grade success 15 16 grant program. The purpose of the grant program is to fund the 17 creation of ninth grade success teams that can identify and support 18 incoming high school students who are at risk of not graduating. The office of the superintendent of public instruction may adopt rules 19 20 for the grant program established under this section.

(2) (a) Beginning in the 2024-25 school year, the office of the 21 22 superintendent of public instruction shall award grants to eligible public schools as defined in RCW 28A.150.010. When awarding grants 23 24 under this section, the office of the superintendent of public instruction must prioritize schools with low ninth grade on-track 25 scores as identified through the Washington school improvement 26 27 framework and schools that have graduation rates below the statewide 28 average. The office of the superintendent of public instruction must attempt to award grants to public schools in different geographic 29 regions of the state. 30

31 (b) The office of the superintendent of public instruction may 32 contract with a qualified nonprofit organization that has experience 33 coaching school success teams to provide individualized coaching to 34 grant recipients.

35 (3) Recipients may use grant funds for costs associated with 36 establishing and operating a ninth grade success team program 37 including, but not limited to:

38 (a) Providing additional compensation or stipends for success39 team members;

(b) Providing related professional development and training for
 success team members;

3 (c) Hiring substitute teachers during periods when success team 4 members are performing program duties and training; and

5 (d) Providing student supports needed to help ninth grade 6 students thrive.

7 (4) By June 30, 2025, and annually thereafter until 2030, the 8 office of the superintendent of public instruction must report to the 9 governor and the education committees of the legislature on the 10 implementation of the grant program. The report must include:

11 (a) The number of grants awarded and which schools received an 12 award, organized by geographic location;

(b) The demographics of the students served by recipient schools' ninth grade success teams, disaggregated by race, ethnicity, gender, and the following student groups: Students receiving free or reducedprice lunch, students receiving special education services, students receiving transitional bilingual instruction, students in foster care, and students experiencing homelessness;

(c) Data comparing each recipient school's ninth grade on-trackscores before and after implementing ninth grade success teams;

(d) Longitudinal data on graduation rates for recipient schools,if available; and

(e) Recommendations for statutory improvements, resource needs,or opportunities for scalability.
