17 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

18 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** A supplemental capital budget is hereby
19 adopted and, subject to the provisions set forth in this act, the
20 several dollar amounts hereinafter specified, or so much thereof as
21 shall be sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby

1 appropriated and authorized to be incurred for capital projects
2 during the period beginning with the effective date of this act and
3 ending June 30, 2025, out of the several funds specified in this act.

20 The appropriations in this section are subject to the following
21 conditions and limitations:

22 (1) (a) (~~(\$50,000,000)~~) \$61,390,000 of the state building
23 construction account—state appropriation in this section is provided
24 solely as match for federal authority allocated under this section
25 and section 7017 of this act for the statewide broadband office to
26 administer the broadband equity, access, and deployment state grants
27 program in section 60102 of P.L. 117-58 (infrastructure investment
28 and jobs act). Expenditure of the amount in this subsection is
29 contingent on the receipt of this grant funding.

30 (b) To the extent permitted by federal law, the office shall
31 provide state match only for projects where the lead applicant is a
32 public or tribal government entity. The office must allocate state
33 match funds in a manner that prioritizes projects based on
34 affordability, fair labor practices, speed to deployment, open
35 access, local and tribal coordination, and the provision of digital
36 navigation services, as outlined in the scoring criteria contained in

1 the plan submitted by the office to the national telecommunications
2 and information administration.

3 (c) The legislature intends to provide sufficient funds to match
4 federal funds available during the 2025-2027 fiscal biennium.

5 (2) In addition to scoring and weighting criteria established
6 pursuant to the federal broadband equity, access, and deployment
7 program, the state broadband office must establish additional
8 secondary selection criteria, including, but not limited to, criteria
9 that give weight to projects that:

10 (a) Provide open-access wholesale last-mile broadband service for
11 the useful life of the subsidized networks on fair, equal, and
12 neutral terms to all potential retail providers; and

13 (b) Demonstrate support from the local government or any tribal
14 government with oversight over the location or locations to be
15 served.

16 (3) The statewide broadband office must include, in the five-year
17 action plan developed using initial planning funds from the broadband
18 equity, access, and deployment program funded under P.L. 117-58
19 (infrastructure investment and jobs act):

20 (a) Consideration of broadband infrastructure projects that use
21 wireless technology in order to expand access at the lowest cost to
22 the most unserved or underserved residents; and

23 (b) Steps the office will take to promote: The use of existing
24 infrastructure; dig-once policies; streamlined permitting processes;
25 and cost-effective access to poles, conduits, easements, and rights-
26 of-way. To the extent permitted under federal law, the office must
27 consider creating a pool of grant funds dedicated to pole costs.

28 (4) \$300,000 of the general fund—federal appropriation provided
29 in this section is for a staff position dedicated to advising the
30 statewide broadband office on the availability and feasibility of
31 deploying new and emerging technologies in broadband internet
32 service.

24 The appropriation in this section is subject to the following
25 conditions and limitations:

26 (1) (a) \$500,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
27 solely for the department to convene a work group to:

28 (i) Analyze the financial investments required for owners of tier
29 1 covered buildings to comply with the state energy performance
30 standard under RCW 19.27A.210; and

31 (ii) Make recommendations to the legislature to assist building
32 owners in attaining compliance, which must include, but are not
33 limited to:

34 (A) Identifying energy efficiency investments or other strategies
35 and related timelines for increasing energy efficiency in the
36 buildings sector;

1 (B) Providing a cost-benefit analysis of options, including
2 energy efficiency, to meet the goal of reducing greenhouse gas
3 emissions from the buildings sector; and

4 (C) Recommendations to balance financial investments while
5 maximizing clean energy benefits for the state, including statutory
6 changes that may be necessary for this purpose.

7 (b) The work group membership convened under this section must
8 include, but is not limited to: One representative of the office of
9 the superintendent of public instruction; one representative of a
10 K-12 maintenance and operation administrators association; one
11 representative of each of the state's public four-year institutions
12 of higher education; one representative of the state board for
13 community and technical colleges; one representative of the
14 department of social and health services; one representative of the
15 department of corrections; one representative of the department of
16 enterprise services; one representative of a health care
17 organization; one representative from a local government; one
18 representative from an organization representing privately owned tier
19 1 covered buildings; one representative from a business specializing
20 in performance contracting for energy services; one representative
21 from a nonprofit specializing in clean energy; and two
22 representatives of a national association for industrial and office
23 parks.

24 (c) The department must submit to the appropriate committees of
25 the legislature:

26 (i) Analysis of financial investments as required by this section
27 by December 15, 2023; and

28 (ii) A final report with recommendations as required by this
29 section by September 1, 2024.

30 (2) Except as provided in subsections (1) (~~and~~), (13), and (14)
31 of this section, the appropriation in this section is provided solely
32 for competitive grants to eligible entities for predevelopment,
33 design, and construction of projects that provide a public benefit
34 through research, development, demonstration, or deployment of clean
35 energy technologies that save energy and reduce energy costs, reduce
36 harmful air emissions, or increase energy independence for the state.
37 Priority must be given to projects that benefit vulnerable
38 populations and overburdened communities, including tribes.

39 (3) Entities eligible for grant funding under this section
40 include local governments, federally recognized tribal governments

1 and tribes' contracted service providers, public and private
2 utilities that serve retail customers in the state, for-profit
3 entities, research institutions, nonprofit organizations, and state
4 agencies.

5 (4) To be eligible, a project must be consistent with the state
6 energy strategy adopted under chapter 43.21F RCW and policies under
7 chapter 19.405 RCW. To the extent practicable, the department must
8 prioritize projects that build upon Washington's strengths in
9 aerospace, maritime, information and communications technology, grid
10 modernization, advanced materials, and decarbonizing the built
11 environment.

12 (5) The department must invite stakeholders to participate in the
13 design and implementation of grant programs funded under this
14 section. The department must consider equity and environmental
15 justice when developing the program structure and opportunities for
16 applicant participation.

17 (6) When soliciting and evaluating proposals, awarding contracts,
18 and monitoring projects under this section, the department must:

19 (a) Ensure that competitive processes, rather than sole source
20 contracting processes, are used to select all projects, except as
21 otherwise noted in this section;

22 (b) Ensure that a public benefit results from the use of public
23 funds through due diligence and monitoring of contracted projects,
24 including ensuring compliance with all applicable laws related to the
25 project selection process, project monitoring, and contracting; and

26 (c) Prioritize projects for funding that leverage the greatest
27 amount of matching funds, such as local levy funding.

28 (7) (a) The department must require project applicants to:

29 (i) Disclose all sources of public funding invested in a project;
30 and

31 (ii) Identify by name any former or current state of Washington
32 employees employed by the applicant or its governing body in the 24
33 months preceding the application submittal. The identification must
34 include the person's separation date and job title or position held.
35 If the department determines that a conflict of interest or other
36 violation of chapter 42.52 RCW exists, the application must be
37 disqualified from further consideration.

38 (b) If, after a grant has been awarded, the department finds that
39 a grantee has violated chapter 42.52 RCW, either in procuring or
40 performing under the grant, the department in its sole discretion may

1 terminate the grant funding by written notice. If the grant is
2 terminated, the department must reserve its right to pursue all
3 available remedies under law to address the violation.

4 (8) The department must specify the requirements in subsections
5 (6) and (7) of this section in funding contracts entered into by the
6 department under this section.

7 (9) \$10,000,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
8 solely for grants to tribes for clean energy development projects.
9 Eligible uses of grant funding include planning, predesign, design,
10 construction, project predevelopment, and deployment of clean energy
11 projects that contribute to achieving the state's greenhouse gas
12 emissions reduction goals and related policies. The department must
13 collaborate with tribes in the design and development of this grant
14 program.

15 (10) \$10,000,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
16 solely for state match for federal funding that aligns with
17 subsection (2) of this section and accelerates meeting state clean
18 energy and climate goals. Funding may be used to match federal grants
19 to the state or nonstate entities for clean energy research,
20 development, and demonstration projects.

21 (11) \$12,000,000 of the appropriation in the section is provided
22 solely for grants for strategic research, development, and
23 demonstration of new and emerging clean energy generation and storage
24 technologies and climate change mitigation technologies, including
25 greenhouse gas removal. Grants awarded under this subsection must
26 reduce reliance on fossil fuels, reduce risk of irregularities in
27 power supply, offer opportunities for economic and job growth, and
28 strengthen technology supply chains. Grant funds are intended to
29 catalyze diverse new technologies that change production, use,
30 storage, and transportation of energy. The department may provide
31 funding to projects at various stages of readiness, including early-
32 stage research, pilot and demonstration projects, and dual use
33 projects that produce clean energy and additional benefits.

34 (12) \$20,000,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
35 solely for grants for electrical grid integration and innovation
36 projects. To be eligible, a project must develop and demonstrate
37 distributed energy resources, as defined in RCW 19.405.020, and
38 nonwire alternatives that advance community resilience, support
39 implementation of demand response and sustainable microgrids, improve
40 integration of renewable energy and energy storage, and accelerate

1 beneficial load integration and demand management for building
2 electrification, equipment electrification, and electric vehicle
3 charging.

4 (13) \$7,500,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
5 solely to support regional energy analytics capability at Pacific
6 Northwest national laboratory.

7 (14) \$500,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
8 solely for the Nooksack Indian tribe to enter into an agreement with
9 a third-party contractor to complete a prefeasibility study of
10 geothermal power generation options in Whatcom county. Power
11 generation options considered must include, at a minimum: Hydro-
12 thermal, enhanced geothermal, and high enthalpy enhanced geothermal.
13 The tribe must select the contractor in consultation with the public
14 utility district No. 1. of Whatcom county. The tribe must submit the
15 completed study to the department by June 15, 2025.

16 (15) The department must strive to allocate all of the amounts
17 appropriated in this section within the 2023-2025 fiscal biennium in
18 the manner prescribed in each subsection. However, no sooner than
19 January 1, 2024, if upon review of applications the department
20 determines there are not adequate suitable projects in a category,
21 the department may reallocate funding among the purposes of
22 subsections (9) through (12) of this section. Beginning January 1,
23 2024, the department must provide quarterly notice of any funding
24 reallocations to the appropriate fiscal committees of the
25 legislature.

26 (16) (a) This section takes effect January 1, 2025.

27 (b) If the climate commitment account is repealed as of December
28 30, 2024, then this section is null and void on December 31, 2024.

7 Communities of Concern (40000603)

8 The appropriation in this section is subject to the following
9 conditions and limitations:

10 (1) The department shall not expend the appropriation in this
11 section unless and until the nonstate share of project costs have
12 been either expended or firmly committed, or both, in an amount
13 sufficient to complete the project or a distinct phase of the project
14 that is useable to the public for the purpose intended by the
15 legislature. This requirement does not apply to projects where a
16 share of the appropriation is for design costs only.

17 (2) Prior to receiving funds, project recipients must demonstrate
18 that the project site is under control for a minimum of 10 years,
19 either through ownership or a long-term lease. This requirement does
20 not apply to appropriations for preconstruction activities or
21 appropriations in which the sole purpose is to purchase real property
22 that does not include a construction or renovation component.

23 (3) Projects funded in this section may be required to comply
24 with Washington's high performance building standards under chapter
25 39.35D RCW.

26 (4) Project funds are available on a reimbursement basis only and
27 may not be advanced under any circumstances.

28 (5) In contracts for grants authorized under this section, the
29 department shall include provisions that require that capital
30 improvements be held by the grantee for a specified period of time
31 appropriate to the amount of the grant and that facilities be used
32 for the express purpose of the grant. If the grantee is found to be
33 out of compliance with provisions of the contract, the grantee shall
34 repay to the state general fund the principal amount of the grant
35 plus interest calculated at the rate of interest on state of
36 Washington general obligation bonds issued most closely to the date
37 of authorization of the grant.

(6) Projects funded in this section, including those that are owned and operated by nonprofit organizations, are generally required to pay state prevailing wages.

(7) The department must comply with the requirements set forth in executive order 21-02 and must consult with the department of archaeology and historic preservation and affected tribes on the potential effects of these projects on cultural resources and historic properties. Consultation with the department of archaeology and historic preservation and affected tribes must be initiated before project funds are made available.

Green Jobs and Infrastructure Grants (40000604)

The appropriation in this section is subject to the following conditions and limitations:

(1) The appropriation in this section is provided solely for grants to eligible entities that help mitigate and reverse the effects of climate change, help communities meet their energy and climate change regulatory requirements, bring increased federal and private investment to the state, help develop the advanced workforce of the future, and ensure Washington state maintains or grows its position as a world leader in developing the projects and processes that are used to fight climate change globally. Eligible activities

1 under this section include, but are not limited to, planning
2 predevelopment, design, engineering, and construction of clean
3 technology projects.

4 (2) Entities eligible for grants under this section include, but
5 are not limited to, local governments, federally recognized tribal
6 governments and tribes' contracted service providers, public and
7 private utilities, ports, associate development organizations, for-
8 profit entities, academic and research institutions, nonprofit
9 organizations, and state agencies.

10 (3) Projects eligible for funding must be physically located in
11 Washington state. Eligible projects must be consistent with the state
12 energy strategy adopted under chapter 43.21F RCW and clean energy
13 policies under chapter 19.405 RCW. Projects must further the goals of
14 the climate commitment act as described in RCW 70A.65.260(1)(j).

15 (4) The department must consider equity and environmental justice
16 when developing the program structures and opportunities for
17 applicant participation and must follow principles established in its
18 community engagement plan adopted under RCW 70A.02.050.

19 (5) Except for match funds allocated in subsection (7) of this
20 section, when soliciting and evaluating grant application proposals,
21 awarding contracts, and monitoring projects under this section, the
22 department must:

23 (a) Use competitive processes to select all projects, except as
24 otherwise noted in this section. The department must design a
25 competitive process to allow provision of grant award to projects in
26 a timely manner and consistent with the project timeline.
27 Applications must be accepted on a rolling basis, and final
28 determination must be made by the department;

29 (b) Ensure compliance with all applicable laws related to the
30 project selection process, project monitoring, and contracting; and

31 (c) Prioritize projects that leverage the greatest amount of
32 matching funds, such as local levy funding or private investment in
33 advanced manufacturing capability.

34 (6) Project applicants must disclose all sources of public
35 funding invested in a project. Grant contracts must provide that if,
36 after a grant has been awarded, the department finds that a grantee
37 has violated chapter 42.52 RCW, either in procuring or performing
38 under the grant, the department in its sole discretion may terminate
39 the grant funding by written notice, and that, if the grant is

1 terminated, the department will reserve its right to pursue all
2 available remedies under law to address the violation.

3 (7) \$26,500,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
4 solely for grants to be used as state match for competitive federal
5 funding and for formula grants that require state match. To the
6 extent practicable, the department shall prioritize grants that
7 provide benefit to vulnerable populations in overburdened
8 communities, with a goal of directing at least 20 percent of funds to
9 this purpose.

10 (8) \$20,000,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
11 solely for grants to projects that demonstrate high-wage, clean job
12 creation in Washington, provide risk reduction for investments in
13 public and private infrastructure in order to increase a community's
14 capacity for clean manufacturing, or provide investments in workforce
15 development to attract and train the workforce required to grow the
16 clean energy economy.

17 (9) \$2,500,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
18 solely for the department to support access to and to flexibly
19 administer the program. The department may use these funds to hire
20 full-time equivalent positions within the department, as well as
21 contract for additional capacity and subject matter expertise.

22 (10) The department must strive to allocate all of the amounts
23 appropriated in subsections (7) and (8) of this section within the
24 2023-2025 fiscal biennium in the manner prescribed in each
25 subsection. However, no sooner than January 1, 2025, if upon review
26 of applications the department determines there are not adequate
27 suitable projects in a category, the department may reallocate
28 funding among the purposes of subsections (7) and (8) of this
29 section. Beginning January 1, 2025, the department must provide
30 quarterly notice of any funding reallocations to the governor and
31 appropriate fiscal committees of the legislature.

32 (11) \$2,500,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
33 solely for the Myno carbon removal facility.

34 (12)(a) Subsections (1) through (10) of this section take effect
35 January 1, 2025.

36 (b) If the climate commitment account is repealed as of December

10 (1) The department shall not expend the appropriation in this
11 section unless and until the nonstate share of project costs have
12 been either expended or firmly committed, or both, in an amount
13 sufficient to complete the project or a distinct phase of the project
14 that is useable to the public for the purpose intended by the
15 legislature. This requirement does not apply to projects where a
16 share of the appropriation is for design costs only.

17 (2) Prior to receiving funds, project recipients must demonstrate
18 that the project site is under control for a minimum of 10 years,
19 either through ownership or a long-term lease. This requirement does
20 not apply to appropriations for preconstruction activities or
21 appropriations in which the sole purpose is to purchase real property
22 that does not include a construction or renovation component.

9 cultural resources, and regardless of whether the agency receives a
10 request for consultation from a federally recognized tribe. The goal
11 of the consultation process is to identify tribal resources or rights
12 potentially affected by the funding decisions and funding programs,
13 assess their effects, and seek ways to avoid, minimize, or mitigate
14 any adverse effects on tribal resources or rights.

15 (2) At the earliest possible date prior to submittal of an
16 application, applicants for funding from the accounts created in RCW
17 70A.65.250, 70A.65.260, and 70A.65.270 shall engage in a
18 preapplication process with all affected federally recognized tribes
19 within the project area. During the 2023-2025 fiscal biennium, salmon
20 habitat and climate resilience projects funded from the natural
21 climate solutions account created in RCW 70A.65.270 that went through
22 the application and prioritization process before July 1, 2023, are
23 exempt from the preapplication requirements under this subsection.

24 (a) The preapplication process must include the applicant
25 notifying the department of archaeology and historic preservation,
26 the department of fish and wildlife, and all affected federally
27 recognized tribes within the project area. The notification must
28 include geographical location, detailed scope of the proposed
29 project, preliminary application details available to federal, state,
30 or local governmental jurisdictions, and all publicly available
31 materials, including public funding sources.

32 (b) The applicant must also offer to discuss the project with the
33 department of archaeology and historic preservation, the department
34 of fish and wildlife, and all affected federally recognized tribes
35 within the project area. Discussions may include the project's impact
36 to tribal resources, including tribal cultural resources,
37 archaeological sites, sacred sites, fisheries, or other rights and
38 interests in tribal lands and lands within which a tribe or tribes
39 possess rights reserved or protected by federal treaty, statute, or
40 executive order.

1 (c) All affected federally recognized tribes may submit to the
2 appropriate agency or agencies a summary of tribal issues, questions,
3 concerns, or other statements regarding the project, which must
4 become part of the official application file. The summary does not
5 limit what issues affected federally recognized tribes may raise in
6 the consultation process identified in subsections (1), (3) through
7 (7), and (9) of this section.

8 (d) The notification and offer to initiate discussion must be
9 documented with the application when it is filed, and a copy of the
10 application must be delivered to the department of archaeology and
11 historic preservation, the department of fish and wildlife, and to
12 the affected federally recognized tribe or tribes. If the discussions
13 pursuant to (b) of this subsection do not occur, the applicant must
14 document the reason why the discussion or discussions did not occur.

15 (e) Nothing in this section may be interpreted to require the
16 disclosure of information that is exempt from disclosure pursuant to
17 RCW 42.56.300 or federal law, including section 304 of the national
18 historic preservation act of 1966. Any information that is exempt
19 from disclosure pursuant to RCW 42.56.300 or federal law, including
20 section 304 of the national historic preservation act of 1966, shall
21 not become part of the official application file.

22 (3) If any funding decision, program, project, or activity that
23 may impact tribal resources, including tribal cultural resources,
24 archaeological sites, sacred sites, fisheries, or other rights and
25 interests in tribal lands and lands within which a tribe or tribes
26 possess rights reserved by federal treaty, statute, or executive
27 order is funded from the accounts created in RCW 70A.65.250,
28 70A.65.260, and 70A.65.270 without such a consultation with an
29 affected federally recognized tribe, the affected federally
30 recognized tribe may request that all further action on the decision,
31 program, project, or activity cease until meaningful consultation is
32 completed. Upon receipt of such a request by an agency or agencies
33 with the authority to allocate funding or administer grant programs
34 from the accounts listed in subsection (1) of this section in support
35 of the proposed project, further action by the agency or agencies on
36 any decision, program, project, or activity that would result in
37 significant physical disturbance of the tribal resource or resources
38 described in this subsection must cease until the consultation has
39 been completed.

1 (4) Upon completion of agency and tribal consultation, an
2 affected federally recognized tribe may request a formal review of
3 the consultation by submitting a request to the governor's office of
4 Indian affairs and notifying the appropriate agencies and the
5 department of archaeology and historic preservation. The state
6 agencies and tribe must meet to initiate discussion within no more
7 than 20 days of the request. This consultation must be offered and
8 conducted separately with each affected federally recognized tribe,
9 unless the tribes agree to conduct a joint consultation with the
10 state.

11 (5) After the state agencies and tribe or tribes have conducted a
12 formal review under subsection (4) of this section, an affected
13 federally recognized tribe or state agency may request that the
14 governor and an elected tribal leader or leaders of a federally
15 recognized tribal government meet to formally consider the
16 recommendations from the parties. If requested, this meeting must
17 occur within 30 days of the request, except that a federally
18 recognized tribe may choose to opt out of the meeting. This timeline
19 may be extended by mutual agreement between the governor and the
20 tribal leaders.

21 (6) After the meeting identified in subsection (5) of this
22 section has occurred, the governor or an elected tribal leader of a
23 federally recognized tribe may call for the state and tribe or tribes
24 to enter into formal mediation, except that a federally recognized
25 tribe may choose to opt out of the mediation. If entered into, the
26 mediation must be conducted as a government-to-government proceeding,
27 with each sovereign government retaining their right to a final
28 decision that meets their separate obligations and interests.
29 Mediators must be jointly selected by the parties to the mediation.
30 An agreement between the governor and a tribal leader or leaders
31 resulting from the mediation is formally recognized and binding on
32 the signatory parties. Absent an agreement, participation in
33 mediation does not preclude any additional steps that any party can
34 initiate, including legal review, to resolve a continuing
35 disagreement.

36 (7) During the proceedings outlined in subsections (4) through
37 (6) of this section, the agency or agencies with the authority to
38 allocate funding or administer grant programs from the accounts
39 listed in subsection (1) of this section in support of the proposed
40 project may not approve or release funding, or make other formal

1 decisions, including permitting, that advance the proposed project
2 except where required by law.

3 (8) By June 30, 2023, the governor's office of Indian affairs, in
4 coordination with the department of archaeology and historic
5 preservation and federally recognized tribes, shall develop a state
6 agency tribal consultation process, including best practices for
7 early, meaningful, and effective consultation, early notification and
8 engagement by applicants with federally recognized tribes as a part
9 of the preapplication process in subsection (2) of this section, and
10 protocols for communication and collaboration with federally
11 recognized tribes. The consultation process developed under this
12 section must be periodically reviewed and updated in coordination
13 with federally recognized tribes. The governor's office of Indian
14 affairs must provide training and other technical assistance to state
15 agencies, as they implement the required consultation.
16 Notwithstanding the governor's office of Indian affairs' ongoing work
17 pursuant to this subsection, the provisions of subsections (1)
18 through (7) and (9) of this section become effective as of June 9,
19 2022.

20 (9) The requirements of this section apply to local governments
21 that receive funding from the accounts created in RCW 70A.65.250,
22 70A.65.260, and 70A.65.270, where that funding is disbursed to
23 project and program applicants. Where requested, the governor's
24 office of Indian affairs must provide training and other technical
25 assistance to local government agencies as they implement the
26 consultation requirements of this section.

27 (10) Any agency subject to or implementing this section may adopt
28 rules in furtherance of its duties under this section.

29 (11) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this
30 specific purpose, the department must establish a tribal capacity
31 grant program to provide funding to federally recognized tribes for
32 the costs of implementing this section.

33 **Sec. 8006.** RCW 79.64.020 and 2014 c 32 s 3 are each amended to
34 read as follows:

35 A resource management cost account in the state treasury is
36 created to be used solely for the purpose of defraying the costs and
37 expenses necessarily incurred by the department in managing and
38 administering state lands((~~r~~)) and aquatic lands((~~r~~)) and the making
39 and administering of leases, sales, contracts, licenses, permits,

1 easements, and rights-of-way as authorized under the provisions of
2 this title. Appropriations from the resource management cost account
3 to the department shall be expended for no other purposes. Funds in
4 the resource management cost account may be appropriated or
5 transferred by the legislature for the benefit of all of the trusts
6 from which the funds were derived. During the 2013-2015 fiscal
7 biennium, the legislature may transfer from the aquatics revenues in
8 the resources management cost account to the marine resources
9 stewardship trust account for the purposes of chapter 43.372 RCW.
10 During the 2023-2025 fiscal biennium, the legislature may transfer no
11 more than \$5,000,000 from the resource management cost account to the
12 land bank account created in RCW 79.19.120.

13 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8007.** On June 30, 2024, the state treasurer
14 shall transfer \$5,000,000, or as much thereof as is necessary, from
15 the resource management cost account created in RCW 79.64.020 to the
16 land bank account created in RCW 79.19.120. Before June 30, 2024, the
17 office of financial management, in consultation with the department
18 of natural resources, shall provide the state treasurer with the
19 amount necessary to transfer.

20 **Sec. 8008.** RCW 79A.25.210 and 2023 c 475 s 945 are each amended
21 to read as follows:

22 The firearms range account is hereby created in the state general
23 fund. Moneys in the account shall be subject to legislative
24 appropriation and shall be used for purchase and development of land,
25 construction or improvement of range facilities, including fixed
26 structure construction or remodeling, equipment purchase, safety or
27 environmental improvements, noise abatement, and liability protection
28 for public and nonprofit firearm range training and practice
29 facilities.

30 Grant funds shall not be used for expendable shooting supplies,
31 or normal operating expenses. In making grants, the board shall give
32 priority to projects for noise abatement or safety improvement. Grant
33 funds shall not supplant funds for other organization programs.

34 The funds will be available to nonprofit shooting organizations,
35 school districts, and state, county, or local governments on a match
36 basis. All entities receiving matching funds must be open on a
37 regular basis and usable by law enforcement personnel or the general

1 public who possess Washington concealed pistol licenses or Washington
2 hunting licenses or who are enrolled in a firearm safety class.

3 Applicants for a grant from the firearms range account shall
4 provide matching funds in either cash or in-kind contributions. The
5 match must represent one dollar in value for each one dollar of the
6 grant except that in the case of a grant for noise abatement or
7 safety improvements the match must represent one dollar in value for
8 each two dollars of the grant. In-kind contributions include but are
9 not limited to labor, materials, and new property. Existing assets
10 and existing development may not apply to the match.

11 Applicants other than school districts or local or state
12 government must be registered as a nonprofit or not-for-profit
13 organization with the Washington secretary of state. The
14 organization's articles of incorporation must contain provisions for
15 the organization's structure, officers, legal address, and registered
16 agent.

17 Organizations requesting grants must provide the hours of range
18 availability for public and law enforcement use. The fee structure
19 will be submitted with the grant application.

20 Any nonprofit organization or agency accepting a grant under this
21 program will be required to pay back the entire grant amount to the
22 firearms range account if the use of the range facility is
23 discontinued less than ten years after the grant is accepted.

24 Entities receiving grants must make the facilities for which
25 grant funding is received open for hunter safety education classes
26 and firearm safety classes on a regular basis for no fee.

27 Government units or school districts applying for grants must
28 open their range facility on a regular basis for hunter safety
29 education classes and firearm safety classes.

30 The board shall adopt rules to implement chapter 195, Laws of
31 1990, pursuant to chapter 34.05 RCW. During the 2017-2019 and
32 2019-2021 fiscal biennia, expenditures from the firearms range
33 account may be used to implement chapter 74, Laws of 2017 (SHB 1100)
34 (concealed pistol licenses) and chapter 282, Laws of 2017 (SB 5268)
35 (concealed pistol license notices). During the 2021-2023 and
36 2023-2025 fiscal biennia, expenditures from the firearms range
37 account may be used to implement chapter 74, Laws of 2017 (SHB 1100)
38 (concealed pistol licenses).

39 During the 2023-2025 fiscal biennium, the legislature may also
40 appropriate moneys in the firearms range account to the department of

1 natural resources for recreational target shooting pilot sites as
2 provided in section 3028 of this act.

3 During the 2023-2025 fiscal biennium, the application and
4 matching funds requirements of this section do not apply to the
5 recreational target shooting pilot sites in section 3028 of this act.

6 NEW SECTION. Sec. 8009. (1)(a) The director of the office of
7 financial management, or the director's designee, shall collect a
8 list of clean energy projects from state agencies that may qualify
9 for elective payment under P.L. 117-169 (inflation reduction act of
10 2022), such as the purchase of electric vehicle fleets; alternative
11 fuel vehicle refueling and charging; and renewable energy projects
12 including wind, solar, geothermal, electrolytic hydrogen, and energy
13 storage.

14 (b) For tax years 2023 and 2024, the director or director's
15 designee shall work with agencies, including institutions of higher
16 education, to complete all steps necessary to file an annual tax
17 return with the United States internal revenue service on behalf of
18 the state in order to claim elective payments available for state
19 agency clean energy projects that have been placed into service.

20 (2) The office of financial management shall provide a report to
21 the fiscal committees of the legislature by July 1, 2024, and June
22 30, 2025, that summarizes the state's tax return submitted that year,
23 including the total dollar value of projects included in the tax
24 return and the total dollar amount of direct pay tax credits sought.
25 The report must also include an itemized list of the projects that
26 displays the dollar amounts and types of tax credits sought.

27 (3) Funds received by the state pursuant to this section shall be
28 deposited into the inflation reduction elective pay account created
29 in chapter . . . (Engrossed Senate Bill No. 6098), Laws of 2024
30 (concerning accounts).

31 (4) It is the intent of the legislature that funds received under
32 this section will be allocated to capital projects through omnibus
33 capital appropriations acts.

34 NEW SECTION. Sec. 8010. If any provision of this act or its
35 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
36 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
37 persons or circumstances is not affected.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8011.** This act is necessary for the immediate
2 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of
3 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes
4 effect immediately.
