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HOUSE BILL 2423

State of Washington 68th Legislature 2024 Regular Session

- AN ACT Relating to gray wolf management; adding a new section to chapter 77.36 RCW; creating a new section; and providing an expiration date.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- The legislature finds the majestic gray 5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. 6 be a symbol of the wilderness and a marvel to all 7 Washingtonians. The howl of the gray wolf, a song of nature's resilience, epitomizes their role as an apex predator. The gray wolf 8 serves a crucial role in their ecosystem, particularly to species 9 10 down the food chain. This in turn improves biodiversity, offering 11 immense human benefits that are almost too great to be measured. The 12 success in the revival of gray wolf populations in Washington has proven to be one of the most successful recoveries of an extirpated 13 apex species in United States history. This should be celebrated and 14 15 modeled for future recovery efforts. It is important to always look 16 for ways to improve on our processes and further perfect our recovery 17 efforts. In this way, other counties in our state should learn from 18 the more successful counties that have more than achieved the lofty 19 recovery goals placed before them. In order to maximize recovery efforts for all the vital species in Washington, we must allow those 20

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- 1 counties that have successfully recovered gray wolf populations to
- 2 focus their efforts on other animals in danger of extinction.

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- 3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 77.36 4 RCW to read as follows:
 - (1) The department shall form a work group to develop a regional plan for gray wolf management in the portion of eastern Washington where the gray wolf is not designated by the federal government as threatened or endangered as of January 1, 2024.
- 9 (2) Members of the work group must include representatives of county cattlepersons organizations, representatives of county 10 governments, a representative from a regional nonprofit organization 11 that operates range riding and other year-round wolf and livestock 12 conflict avoidance tactics in northeast Washington, 13 representative from a conservation nonprofit. The department shall 14 15 invite affected Indian tribes to participate and shall give affected 16 Indian tribes the opportunity to review drafts of the plan before it is completed. The department is encouraged to invite representatives 17 of the United States forest service. The department shall hire an 18 outside third-party neutral facilitator to ensure effective 19 20 functioning of the work group.
 - (3) At a minimum, the plan must address the following objectives:
 - (a) Increased cooperation with input from county governments, cattlepersons associations, and local organizations providing range riding and other conflict deterrence efforts with respect to the methods and approaches to minimizing impacts to livestock production;
 - (b) Minimization of livestock loss and economically costly stress on livestock and minimizing the need for lethal control of wolves;
- 28 (c) Improved responsiveness from the department on planning 29 proactive deterrence for ranchers;
- 30 (d) Faster response time from the department when lethal control 31 is required;
 - (e) Habitat improvement for ungulate populations;
- 33 (f) An improved livestock loss and damage compensation program; 34 and
- 35 (g) Maintaining recovery objectives and an overall stable wolf 36 population in the region.
- 37 (4) The department shall provide progress reports to the 38 legislature on regional plan development in compliance with RCW 39 43.01.036 by December 1, 2024, and June 30, 2025. The department

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- 1 shall complete and implement the regional plan by December 31, 2025.
- 2 If the work group does not reach agreement on the regional plan
- 3 within six months, a minority report must be included.
 - (5) This section expires June 30, 2026.

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
