SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 2494

By House Appropriations (originally sponsored by Representatives Bergquist, Rude, Simmons, Senn, Pollet, Callan, Paul, Macri, Stonier, and Gregerson)

READ FIRST TIME 02/05/24.

AN ACT Relating to state funding for operating costs in schools; amending RCW 28A.150.260; creating new sections; and providing an effective date.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that schools are 6 facing increased operating costs to serve students and staff. Some of 7 these increases are beyond inflationary adjustments and reflect the 8 requirements of schools. Therefore, evolving needs and the 9 legislature intends to increase funding for materials, supplies, and operating costs in schools to address evolving operational needs. 10

11 Sec. 2. RCW 28A.150.260 and 2023 c 379 s 6 are each amended to 12 read as follows:

The purpose of this section is to provide for the allocation of state funding that the legislature deems necessary to support school districts in offering the minimum instructional program of basic education under RCW 28A.150.220. The allocation shall be determined as follows:

18 (1) The governor shall and the superintendent of public 19 instruction may recommend to the legislature a formula for the distribution of a basic education instructional allocation for each
 common school district.

(2) (a) The distribution formula under this section shall be for 3 allocation purposes only. Except as may be required under subsections 4 (4)(b) and (c), (5)(b), and (9) of this section, chapter 28A.155, 5 6 28A.165, 28A.180, or 28A.185 RCW, or federal laws and regulations, nothing in this section requires school districts to use basic 7 education instructional funds to implement a particular instructional 8 approach or service. Nothing in this section requires school 9 10 districts to maintain a particular classroom teacher-to-student ratio or other staff-to-student ratio or to use allocated funds to pay for 11 12 particular types or classifications of staff. Nothing in this section entitles an individual teacher to a particular teacher planning 13 14 period.

15 (b) To promote transparency in state funding allocations, the 16 superintendent of public instruction must report state per-pupil 17 allocations for each school district for the general apportionment, special education, learning assistance, transitional bilingual, 18 highly capable, and career and technical education programs. The 19 superintendent must report this information in a user-friendly format 20 21 on the main page of the office's website. School districts must include a link to the superintendent's per-pupil allocations report 22 23 on the main page of the school district's website. In addition, the budget documents published by the legislature for the enacted omnibus 24 25 operating appropriations act must report statewide average per-pupil allocations for general apportionment and the categorical programs 26 27 listed in this subsection.

28 (3) (a) To the extent the technical details of the formula have been adopted by the legislature and except when specifically provided 29 as a school district allocation, the distribution formula for the 30 31 basic education instructional allocation shall be based on minimum 32 staffing and nonstaff costs the legislature deems necessary to support instruction and operations in prototypical schools serving 33 high, middle, and elementary school students as provided in this 34 section. The use of prototypical schools for the distribution formula 35 does not constitute legislative intent that schools should be 36 operated or structured in a similar fashion as the prototypes. 37 Prototypical schools illustrate the level of resources needed to 38 39 operate a school of a particular size with particular types and grade 40 levels of students using commonly understood terms and inputs, such

as class size, hours of instruction, and various categories of school 1 staff. It is the intent that the funding allocations to school 2 districts be adjusted from the school prototypes based on the actual 3 number of annual average full-time equivalent students in each grade 4 level at each school in the district and not based on the grade-level 5 6 configuration of the school to the extent that data is available. The allocations shall be further adjusted from the school prototypes with 7 minimum allocations for small schools and to reflect other factors 8 identified in the omnibus appropriations act. 9

10 (b) For the purposes of this section, prototypical schools are 11 defined as follows:

(i) A prototypical high school has 600 average annual full-timeequivalent students in grades nine through 12;

14 (ii) A prototypical middle school has 432 average annual full-15 time equivalent students in grades seven and eight; and

16 (iii) A prototypical elementary school has 400 average annual 17 full-time equivalent students in grades kindergarten through six.

(4) (a) (i) The minimum allocation for each level of prototypical school shall be based on the number of full-time equivalent classroom teachers needed to provide instruction over the minimum required annual instructional hours under RCW 28A.150.220 and provide at least one teacher planning period per school day, and based on the following general education average class size of full-time equivalent students per teacher:

(ii) The minimum class size allocation for each prototypical high school shall also provide for enhanced funding for class size reduction for two laboratory science classes within grades nine through 12 per full-time equivalent high school student multiplied by a laboratory science course factor of 0.0833, based on the number of full-time equivalent classroom teachers needed to provide instruction over the minimum required annual instructional hours in RCW

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1 28A.150.220, and providing at least one teacher planning period per 2 school day: 3 Laboratory science 4 average class size 5 (b) (i) Beginning September 1, 2019, funding for average K-3 class 6 7 sizes in this subsection (4) may be provided only to the extent of, and proportionate to, the school district's demonstrated actual class 8 size in grades K-3, up to the funded class sizes. 9 10 (ii) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall develop rules to implement this subsection (4)(b). 11 12 (c) (i) The minimum allocation for each prototypical middle and high school shall also provide for full-time equivalent classroom 13 teachers based on the following number of full-time equivalent 14 students per teacher in career and technical education: 15 16 Career and technical 17 education average 18 class size Approved career and technical education offered at 19 20 Skill center programs meeting the standards established 21 by the office of the superintendent of public 22 23 24 (ii) Funding allocated under this subsection (4)(c) is subject to 25 RCW 28A.150.265. 26 (d) In addition, the omnibus appropriations act shall at a 27 minimum specify: 28 (i) A high-poverty average class size in schools where more than 50 percent of the students are eligible for free and reduced-price 29 30 meals; and 31 (ii) A specialty average class size for advanced placement and international baccalaureate courses. 32 (5)(a) The minimum allocation for each level of prototypical 33 34 school shall include allocations for the following types of staff in addition to classroom teachers: 35 36 Elementary Middle High 37 School School School

(b) (i) The superintendent may only allocate funding, up to the 15 16 combined minimum allocations, for social nurses, workers, 17 psychologists, counselors, classified staff providing student and staff safety, and parent involvement coordinators under (a) of this 18 19 subsection to the extent of and proportionate to a school district's 20 demonstrated actual ratios of: Full-time equivalent physical, social, 21 and emotional support staff to full-time equivalent students.

(ii) The superintendent must adopt rules to implement this subsection (5)(b) and the rules must require school districts to prioritize funding allocated as required by (b)(i) of this subsection for physical, social, and emotional support staff who hold a valid educational staff associate certificate appropriate for the staff's role.

(iii) For the purposes of this subsection (5)(b), "physical, social, and emotional support staff" include nurses, social workers, psychologists, counselors, classified staff providing student and staff safety, parent involvement coordinators, and other school district employees and contractors who provide physical, social, and emotional support to students as defined by the superintendent.

34 (6)(a) The minimum staffing allocation for each school district 35 to provide district-wide support services shall be allocated per one 36 thousand annual average full-time equivalent students in grades K-12 37 as follows:

1 grades nine through 12 for the following materials, supplies, and 2 operating costs, to be adjusted annually for inflation: 3 Per annual average 4 full-time equivalent student 5 in grades 9-12 6 7 8 9 10 Instructional professional development for certificated and 11 12 (9) In addition to the amounts provided in subsection (8) of this section and subject to RCW 28A.150.265, the omnibus appropriations 13 14 act shall provide an amount based on full-time equivalent student 15 enrollment in each of the following: Exploratory career and technical education courses 16 (a) for students in grades seven through 12; 17 (b) Preparatory career and technical education courses 18 for students in grades nine through 12 offered in a high school; and 19 20 Preparatory career and technical education courses (C) for 21 students in grades 11 and 12 offered through a skill center. 22 (10) In addition to the allocations otherwise provided under this section, amounts shall be provided to support the following programs 23 24 and services: 25 (a) (i) To provide supplemental instruction and services for students who are not meeting academic standards through the learning 26 27 assistance program under RCW 28A.165.005 through 28A.165.065, allocations shall be based on the greater of either: The district 28 percentage of students in kindergarten through grade 12 who were 29 eligible for free or reduced-price meals for the school year 30 31 immediately preceding the district's participation, in whole or part, 32 in the United States department of agriculture's community eligibility provision, or the district percentage of students in 33 grades K-12 who were eligible for free or reduced-price meals in the 34 35 prior school year. The minimum allocation for the program shall, except as provided in (a)(iii) of this subsection, provide for each 36 37 level of prototypical school resources to provide, on a statewide average, 2.3975 hours per week in extra instruction with a class size 38 39 of 15 learning assistance program students per teacher.

1 (ii) In addition to funding allocated under (a)(i) of this subsection, to provide supplemental instruction and services for 2 students who are not meeting academic standards in qualifying 3 schools. A qualifying school, except as provided in (a)(iv) of this 4 subsection, means a school in which the three-year rolling average of 5 6 the prior year total annual average enrollment that qualifies for free or reduced-price meals equals or exceeds 50 percent or more of 7 its total annual average enrollment. A school continues to meet the 8 definition of a qualifying school if the school: Participates in the 9 United States department of agriculture's community eligibility 10 provision; and met the definition of a qualifying school in the year 11 12 immediately preceding their participation. The minimum allocation for this additional high poverty-based allocation must provide for each 13 level of prototypical school resources to provide, on a statewide 14 average, 1.1 hours per week in extra instruction with a class size of 15 16 15 learning assistance program students per teacher, under RCW 17 28A.165.055, school districts must distribute the high poverty-based 18 allocation to the schools that generated the funding allocation.

(iii) For the 2024-25 and 2025-26 school years, allocations under 19 (a) (i) of this subsection for school districts providing meals at no 20 21 charge to students under RCW 28A.235.135 that are not participating, 22 in whole or in part, in the United States department of agriculture's 23 community eligibility provision shall be based on the school district percentage of students in grades K-12 who were eligible for free or 24 25 reduced-price meals in school years 2019-20 through 2022-23 or the 26 prior school year, whichever is greatest.

(iv) For the 2024-25 and 2025-26 school years, a school providing meals at no charge to students under RCW 28A.235.135 that is not participating in the department of agriculture's community eligibility provision continues to meet the definition of a qualifying school under (a) (ii) of this subsection if the school met the definition during one year of the 2019-20 through 2022-23 school years, or in the prior school year.

(b)(i) To provide supplemental instruction and services for students whose primary language is other than English, allocations shall be based on the head count number of students in each school who are eligible for and enrolled in the transitional bilingual instruction program under RCW 28A.180.010 through 28A.180.080. The minimum allocation for each level of prototypical school shall provide resources to provide, on a statewide average, 4.7780 hours

1 per week in extra instruction for students in grades kindergarten through six and 6.7780 hours per week in extra instruction for 2 students in grades seven through 12, with 15 transitional bilingual 3 instruction program students per teacher. Notwithstanding other 4 provisions of this subsection (10), the actual per-student allocation 5 6 may be scaled to provide a larger allocation for students needing more intensive intervention and a commensurate reduced allocation for 7 students needing less intensive intervention, as detailed in the 8 9 omnibus appropriations act.

(ii) To provide supplemental instruction and services 10 for 11 students who have exited the transitional bilingual program, 12 allocations shall be based on the head count number of students in each school who have exited the transitional bilingual program within 13 14 the previous two years based on their performance on the English proficiency assessment and are eligible for and enrolled in the 15 16 transitional bilingual instruction program under RCW 28A.180.040(1)(g). The minimum allocation for each prototypical 17 18 school shall provide resources to provide, on a statewide average, 19 3.0 hours per week in extra instruction with 15 exited students per teacher. 20

(c) To provide additional allocations to support programs for highly capable students under RCW 28A.185.010 through 28A.185.030, allocations shall be based on 5.0 percent of each school district's full-time equivalent basic education enrollment. The minimum allocation for the programs shall provide resources to provide, on a statewide average, 2.1590 hours per week in extra instruction with fifteen highly capable program students per teacher.

(11) The allocations under subsections (4)(a), (5), (6), and (8) of this section shall be enhanced as provided under RCW 28A.150.390 on an excess cost basis to provide supplemental instructional resources for students with disabilities.

(12) (a) For the purposes of allocations for prototypical high schools and middle schools under subsections (4) and (10) of this section that are based on the percent of students in the school who are eligible for free and reduced-price meals, the actual percent of such students in a school shall be adjusted by a factor identified in the omnibus appropriations act to reflect underreporting of free and reduced-price meal eligibility among middle and high school students.

(b) Allocations or enhancements provided under subsections (4),
 (7), and (9) of this section for exploratory and preparatory career

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1 and technical education courses shall be provided only for courses 2 approved by the office of the superintendent of public instruction 3 under chapter 28A.700 RCW.

4 (13)(a) This formula for distribution of basic education funds
5 shall be reviewed biennially by the superintendent and governor. The
6 recommended formula shall be subject to approval, amendment or
7 rejection by the legislature.

8 (b) In the event the legislature rejects the distribution formula 9 recommended by the governor, without adopting a new distribution 10 formula, the distribution formula for the previous school year shall 11 remain in effect.

(c) The enrollment of any district shall be the annual average 12 number of full-time equivalent students and part-time students as 13 provided in RCW 28A.150.350, enrolled on the first school day of each 14 month, including students who are in attendance pursuant to RCW 15 16 28A.335.160 and 28A.225.250 who do not reside within the servicing 17 school district. The definition of full-time equivalent student shall 18 be determined by rules of the superintendent of public instruction 19 and shall be included as part of the superintendent's biennial budget request. The definition shall be based on the minimum instructional 20 hour offerings required under RCW 28A.150.220. Any revision of the 21 present definition shall not take effect until approved by the house 22 ways and means committee and the senate ways and means committee. 23

(d) The office of financial management shall make a monthly
 review of the superintendent's reported full-time equivalent students
 in the common schools in conjunction with RCW 43.62.050.

27 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. Section 2 of this act takes effect 28 September 1, 2024.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. If specific funding for the purposes of 30 this act, referencing this act by bill or chapter number, is not 31 provided by June 30, 2024, in the omnibus appropriations act, this 32 act is null and void.

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
