## SENATE BILL 5888

State of Washington 68th Legislature 2024 Regular Session

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1 AN ACT Relating to statewide health care coordination and 2 communication regarding individuals housed in confinement settings; 3 and adding a new chapter to Title 70 RCW.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

The legislature finds that the growing 5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. 6 number of projects and programs between and within government 7 agencies related to the health of individuals housed in confinement settings create challenges in coordination and communication. These 8 include mental health, traumatic brain injury, 9 health issues 10 substance use, communicable disease and infection prevention, health 11 preventive services, and excess mortality.

legislature further finds that health in correctional 12 The institutions and other confinement settings is vital to public health 13 14 and reentry because many individuals in these settings interact with 15 return to their communities. Statewide coordination and and 16 communication efforts for treating individuals in correctional and 17 other confinement facilities will positively influence the community 18 and reentry of such individuals.

19 The legislature intends to address the lack of coordination and 20 communication caused by the numerous projects and programs relating 21 to individuals housed in confinement settings by creating a new 1 council within the department of health that will be supported by 2 representation from state agencies, local governments, federally 3 recognized tribes, and other relevant parties.

4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. The definitions in this section apply 5 throughout this chapter unless the context clearly requires 6 otherwise.

7 (1) "Confined" or "confinement" means incarcerated in a 8 correctional institution or admitted to an institute for mental 9 disease, as defined in 42 C.F.R. part 435, Sec. 1010.

10 (2) "Correctional institution" has the meaning provided in RCW 11 9.94.049.

12 (3) "Council" means the council of health care coordination for 13 justice-involved youth and adults.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. (1) The council of health care coordination for justice-involved youth and adults is hereby created and located in the department of health for the purpose of addressing coordination and communication between federally recognized tribes and state and local agencies that house individuals in confinement settings.

20 (2)(a) The council shall be composed of the following voting 21 members:

(i) A physician appointed by the secretary of the department of health;

24 (ii) The secretary of the department of social and health 25 services, or the secretary's designee;

26 (iii) The director of the health care authority, or the 27 director's designee;

28 (iv) The secretary of the department of corrections, or the 29 secretary's designee;

30 (v) The secretary of the department of children, youth, and 31 families, or the secretary's designee;

32 (vi) One member representing the Washington association of 33 sheriffs and police chiefs;

34 (vii) One member representing a federally recognized tribe in 35 Washington state, appointed by the governor's office of Indian 36 affairs;

37 (viii) The governor or the governor's designee;

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1 (ix) One member representing county juvenile court 2 administrators; and

3 (x) One member with lived experience of using the health care 4 system in an institution of total confinement.

5 (b) The council may also include as nonvoting members other 6 attendees as councilmembers deem appropriate including, but not 7 limited to, additional persons with lived experience of using the 8 health care system in an institution of total confinement or members 9 of the public with knowledge of carceral health care.

10 (c) Members of the council shall serve without additional 11 compensation but shall be reimbursed for travel expenses in 12 accordance with RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060 while attending meetings 13 of the council or on official business authorized by the council. The 14 department of health must provide stipends for councilmembers in 15 accordance with RCW 43.03.220.

16 (3) The chair of the council shall be the physician appointed by 17 the secretary of the department of health, who will be fully 18 dedicated to council duties. The council may select other officers as 19 the voting members deem necessary.

(4) Through the department of health, the council shall employ the following full-time staff positions to support the council's duties: One data analyst, one administrative assistant, and two epidemiologists.

(5) The council shall meet at least quarterly. Additional meetings may be called by the chair and shall be called by the chair upon the written request of eight members. Meetings must be held in accordance with the open public meetings act, chapter 42.30 RCW.

(6) As appropriate, councilmembers are responsible for tracking activities within their respective agencies or jurisdictions that relate to the health of individuals housed in facilities of confinement.

32 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. (1) The council shall review current laws 33 and policies relating to health care information sharing among 34 agencies that house individuals in jails, the department of 35 corrections, juvenile rehabilitation facilities, juvenile detention 36 facilities, western and eastern state hospitals, the special 37 commitment center, and other entities as the council finds 38 appropriate. The council shall make recommendations to:

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(a) Improve and ensure information and data sharing among and
within state agencies regarding the health of adults and juveniles in
such facilities;

4 (b) Improve coordination among and within state and local 5 agencies and avoid duplication;

6 (c) Provide an easy, fast, and effective forum for communication 7 and information sharing among the department of health, the health 8 care authority, the department of social and health services, the 9 department of corrections, the department of children, youth, and 10 families, the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs, 11 court administrators, and federal, local, and community 12 organizations; and

13 (d) Improve communication and information sharing between the 14 state and its federal partners to proactively address public health 15 issues.

16 (2) The council may appoint such advisory committees as may be 17 necessary to carry out the provisions of this chapter. The council 18 shall review each advisory committee on a biennial basis to determine 19 whether to continue the advisory committee.

(3) A council member must participate in or coordinate with any additional councils or statewide activities created in the future involving the health of adults and youth who are incarcerated or otherwise housed in confinement settings.

(4) By November 1, 2024, and annually thereafter, the council must submit a report on the council's activities accomplished in the prior year to the governor and the appropriate committees of the legislature. The report must comply with the requirements of RCW 43.01.036.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. Sections 1 through 4 of this act 30 constitute a new chapter in Title 70 RCW.

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
