1 2023-25 Energy Retrofits and Solar Power for Public Buildings
2 (40000283)

3 The appropriation in this section is subject to the following
4 conditions and limitations:

5 (1) (~~(\$22,500,000)~~) \$14,500,000 of the appropriation in this
6 section is provided solely for grants to local governments, public
7 higher education institutions, school districts, tribal governments,
8 and state agencies for improvements to facilities and related
9 projects that result in energy and operational cost savings.

10 (a) At least 20 percent of each competitive grant round is
11 designated for award to eligible projects in small cities or towns
12 with a population of 5,000 or fewer residents.

13 (b) In each competitive round, a higher energy savings to
14 investment ratio must result in a higher project ranking. Priority
15 consideration must be given to applicants that have not received
16 grant awards for this purpose in prior biennia.

17 (c) The department must determine a minimum match ratio to
18 maximize the leverage of nonstate funds.

19 (2) \$22,500,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
20 solely for grants to be awarded in competitive rounds to local
21 governments, public higher education institutions, school districts,
22 tribal governments, and state agencies for projects that involve the
23 purchase and installation of solar energy systems, including solar
24 modules and inverters, with a preference for products manufactured in
25 Washington.

26 (a) At least 20 percent of each competitive grant round is
27 designated for award to eligible projects in small cities or towns
28 with a population of 5,000 or fewer residents.

29 (b) In each competitive round, a higher energy savings to
30 investment ratio must result in a higher project ranking. Priority
31 consideration must be given to applicants that have not received
32 grant awards for this purpose in prior biennia.

33 (c) The department must determine a minimum match ratio to
34 maximize the leverage of nonstate funds.

35 (3) \$5,000,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
36 solely for the energy efficiency and environmental performance
37 improvements to minor works, stand-alone, and emergency projects at
38 facilities owned by agencies that repair or replace existing building
39 systems and reduce greenhouse gas emissions from state operations,

1 including, but not limited to, HVAC, lighting, insulation, windows,
2 and other mechanical systems. Eligibility for this funding is
3 dependent on an analysis using the office of financial management's
4 life-cycle cost tool that compares project design alternatives for
5 initial and long-term cost-effectiveness. Assuming a reasonable
6 return on investment, the department shall provide grants in the
7 amount required to improve the project's energy efficiency compared
8 to the original project request.

9 (4) \$4,000,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
10 solely for the Washington state association of counties to provide
11 funding for energy audits on county-owned tier 1 and tier 2 covered
12 buildings and collect and manage data on the costs for counties to
13 comply with the requirements of RCW 19.27A.210 and 19.27A.250.

14 (a) The Washington state association of counties may award grants
15 to counties with qualifying buildings to assess current energy
16 performance and determine the approximate costs of facility and
17 system upgrades to meet state energy performance standards in chapter
18 19.27A RCW.

19 (b) The Washington state association of counties shall submit to
20 the appropriate committees of the legislature no later than December
21 31, 2025, a report detailing the current energy performance of each
22 county-owned tier 1 and tier 2 building for which an energy audit was
23 completed with the funding provided in this subsection (4), and an
24 estimate of the costs for bringing each building into compliance with
25 the state energy performance standards in chapter 19.27 RCW.

26 (c) Up to 12 percent of the amount of the grants awarded in (a)
27 of this subsection may be retained by the Washington state
28 association of counties for administrative costs.

29 (5) \$4,000,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
30 solely for the association of Washington cities to provide funding
31 for energy audits on city-owned tier 1 and tier 2 covered buildings
32 and collect and manage data on the costs for cities to comply with
33 the requirements of RCW 19.27A.210 and 19.27A.250.

34 (a) The association of Washington cities may award grants to
35 cities with qualifying buildings to assess current energy performance
36 and determine the approximate costs of facility and system upgrades
37 to meet state energy performance standards in chapter 19.27A RCW.

38 (b) The association of Washington cities shall submit to the
39 appropriate committees of the legislature no later than December 31,
40 2025, a report detailing the current energy performance of each city-

1 owned tier 1 and tier 2 building for which an energy audit was
2 completed with the funding provided in this subsection (5), and an
3 estimate of the costs for bringing each building into compliance with
4 the state energy performance standards in chapter 19.27 RCW.

5 (c) Up to 12 percent of the amount of the grants awarded in (a)
6 of this subsection may be retained by the association of Washington
7 cities for administrative costs.

8 (6) The department shall develop metrics that indicate the
9 performance of energy efficiency efforts.

10 ~~((+5))~~ (7) If a grant is provided in subsection (1) or (3) of
11 this section to purchase heating devices or systems, the agency must,
12 whenever possible and most cost effective, select devices and systems
13 that do not use fossil fuels.

14 ~~((+6))~~ (8) Grants provided in subsections (1) ~~(, (2), and (3))~~
15 through (5) of this section to state agencies are exempt from the
16 match requirements in this section.

3 The appropriations in this section are subject to the following
4 conditions and limitations:

5 (1) (a) \$50,000,000 of the state building construction account—
6 state appropriation in this section is provided solely as match for
7 federal authority allocated under this section and section 7017 of
8 this act for the statewide broadband office to administer the
9 broadband equity, access, and deployment state grants program in
10 section 60102 of P.L. 117-58 (infrastructure investment and jobs
11 act). Expenditure of the amount in this subsection is contingent on
12 the receipt of this grant funding.

13 (b) To the extent permitted by federal law, the office shall
14 provide state match only for projects where the lead applicant is a
15 public entity.

16 (c) The legislature intends to provide sufficient funds to match
17 federal funds available during the 2025-2027 fiscal biennium.

18 (2) In addition to scoring and weighting criteria established
19 pursuant to the federal broadband equity, access, and deployment
20 program, the state broadband office must establish additional
21 secondary selection criteria, including, but not limited to, criteria
22 that give weight to projects that:

23 (a) Provide open-access wholesale last-mile broadband service for
24 the useful life of the subsidized networks on fair, equal, and
25 neutral terms to all potential retail providers; and

26 (b) Demonstrate support from the local government or any tribal
27 government with oversight over the location or locations to be
28 served.

29 (3) The statewide broadband office must include, in the five-year
30 action plan developed using initial planning funds from the broadband
31 equity, access, and deployment program funded under P.L. 117-58
32 (infrastructure investment and jobs act):

33 (a) Consideration of broadband infrastructure projects that use
34 wireless technology in order to expand access at the lowest cost to
35 the most unserved or underserved residents; and

36 (b) Steps the office will take to promote: The use of existing
37 infrastructure; dig-once policies; streamlined permitting processes;
38 and cost-effective access to poles, conduits, easements, and rights-

1 of-way. To the extent permitted under federal law, the office must
2 consider creating a pool of grant funds dedicated to pole costs.

3 (4) \$300,000 of the general fund—federal appropriation provided
4 in this section is for a staff position dedicated to advising the
5 statewide broadband office on the availability and feasibility of
6 deploying new and emerging technologies in broadband internet
7 service.

21 **FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE**

22 2023-25 Clean Energy Fund Program (40000294)

23 The appropriation in this section is subject to the following
24 conditions and limitations:

25 (1)(a) \$500,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
26 solely for the department to convene a work group to:

27 (i) Analyze the financial investments required for owners of tier
28 1 covered buildings to comply with the state energy performance
29 standard under RCW 19.27A.210; and

30 (ii) Make recommendations to the legislature to assist building
31 owners in attaining compliance, which must include, but are not
32 limited to:

33 (A) Identifying energy efficiency investments or other strategies
34 and related timelines for increasing energy efficiency in the
35 buildings sector;

1 (B) Providing a cost-benefit analysis of options, including
2 energy efficiency, to meet the goal of reducing greenhouse gas
3 emissions from the buildings sector; and

4 (C) Recommendations to balance financial investments while
5 maximizing clean energy benefits for the state, including statutory
6 changes that may be necessary for this purpose.

7 (b) The work group membership convened under this section must
8 include, but is not limited to: One representative of the office of
9 the superintendent of public instruction; one representative of a
10 K-12 maintenance and operation administrators association; one
11 representative of each of the state's public four-year institutions
12 of higher education; one representative of the state board for
13 community and technical colleges; one representative of the
14 department of social and health services; one representative of the
15 department of corrections; one representative of the department of
16 enterprise services; one representative of a health care
17 organization; one representative from a local government; one
18 representative from an organization representing privately owned tier
19 1 covered buildings; one representative from a business specializing
20 in performance contracting for energy services; one representative
21 from a nonprofit specializing in clean energy; and two
22 representatives of a national association for industrial and office
23 parks.

24 (c) The department must submit to the appropriate committees of
25 the legislature:

26 (i) Analysis of financial investments as required by this section
27 by December 15, 2023; and

28 (ii) A final report with recommendations as required by this
29 section by September 1, 2024.

30 (2) Except as provided in subsections (1) and (13) of this
31 section, the appropriation in this section is provided solely for
32 competitive grants to eligible entities for predevelopment, design,
33 and construction of projects that provide a public benefit through
34 research, development, demonstration, or deployment of clean energy
35 technologies that save energy and reduce energy costs, reduce harmful
36 air emissions, or increase energy independence for the state.
37 Priority must be given to projects that benefit vulnerable
38 populations and overburdened communities, including tribes.

39 (3) Entities eligible for grant funding under this section
40 include local governments, federally recognized tribal governments

1 and tribes' contracted service providers, public and private
2 utilities that serve retail customers in the state, for-profit
3 entities, research institutions, nonprofit organizations, and state
4 agencies.

5 (4) To be eligible, a project must be consistent with the state
6 energy strategy adopted under chapter 43.21F RCW and policies under
7 chapter 19.405 RCW. To the extent practicable, the department must
8 prioritize projects that build upon Washington's strengths in
9 aerospace, maritime, information and communications technology, grid
10 modernization, advanced materials, and decarbonizing the built
11 environment.

12 (5) The department must invite stakeholders to participate in the
13 design and implementation of grant programs funded under this
14 section. The department must consider equity and environmental
15 justice when developing the program structure and opportunities for
16 applicant participation.

17 (6) When soliciting and evaluating proposals, awarding contracts,
18 and monitoring projects under this section, the department must:

19 (a) Ensure that competitive processes, rather than sole source
20 contracting processes, are used to select all projects, except as
21 otherwise noted in this section;

22 (b) Ensure that a public benefit results from the use of public
23 funds through due diligence and monitoring of contracted projects,
24 including ensuring compliance with all applicable laws related to the
25 project selection process, project monitoring, and contracting; and

26 (c) Prioritize projects for funding that leverage the greatest
27 amount of matching funds, such as local levy funding.

28 (7)(a) The department must require project applicants to:

29 (i) Disclose all sources of public funding invested in a project;
30 and

31 (ii) Identify by name any former or current state of Washington
32 employees employed by the applicant or its governing body in the 24
33 months preceding the application submittal. The identification must
34 include the person's separation date and job title or position held.
35 If the department determines that a conflict of interest or other
36 violation of chapter 42.52 RCW exists, the application must be
37 disqualified from further consideration.

38 (b) If, after a grant has been awarded, the department finds that
39 a grantee has violated chapter 42.52 RCW, either in procuring or
40 performing under the grant, the department in its sole discretion may

1 terminate the grant funding by written notice. If the grant is
2 terminated, the department must reserve its right to pursue all
3 available remedies under law to address the violation.

4 (8) The department must specify the requirements in subsections
5 (6) and (7) of this section in funding contracts entered into by the
6 department under this section.

7 (9) \$10,000,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
8 solely for grants to tribes for clean energy development projects.
9 Eligible uses of grant funding include planning, predesign, design,
10 construction, project predevelopment, and deployment of clean energy
11 projects that contribute to achieving the state's greenhouse gas
12 emissions reduction goals and related policies. The department must
13 collaborate with tribes in the design and development of this grant
14 program.

15 (10) \$10,000,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
16 solely for state match for federal funding that aligns with
17 subsection (2) of this section and accelerates meeting state clean
18 energy and climate goals. Funding may be used to match federal grants
19 to the state or nonstate entities for clean energy research,
20 development, and demonstration projects.

21 (11) (~~(\$12,000,000)~~) (a) \$10,500,000 of the appropriation in the
22 section is provided solely for grants for strategic research,
23 development, and demonstration of new and emerging clean energy
24 generation and storage technologies and climate change mitigation
25 technologies, including greenhouse gas removal. Grants awarded under
26 this subsection must reduce reliance on fossil fuels, reduce risk of
27 irregularities in power supply, offer opportunities for economic and
28 job growth, and strengthen technology supply chains. Grant funds are
29 intended to catalyze diverse new technologies that change production,
30 use, storage, and transportation of energy. The department may
31 provide funding to projects at various stages of readiness, including
32 early-stage research, pilot and demonstration projects, and dual use
33 projects that produce clean energy and additional benefits.

34 (b) \$1,500,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
35 solely to support proof-of-concept development of biogenic carbon
36 dioxide electrolysis, a chemical technology process that utilizes
37 water, electricity, and biogenic CO2 as inputs, and produces carbon
38 monoxide as an output to be utilized for the production or
39 manufacture of sustainable aviation fuel.

1 (12) \$20,000,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
2 solely for grants for electrical grid integration and innovation
3 projects. To be eligible, a project must develop and demonstrate
4 distributed energy resources, as defined in RCW 19.405.020, and
5 nonwire alternatives that advance community resilience, support
6 implementation of demand response and sustainable microgrids, improve
7 integration of renewable energy and energy storage, and accelerate
8 beneficial load integration and demand management for building
9 electrification, equipment electrification, and electric vehicle
10 charging.

11 (13) \$7,500,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided
12 solely to support regional energy analytics capability at Pacific
13 Northwest national laboratory.

14 (14) The department must strive to allocate all of the amounts
15 appropriated in this section within the 2023-2025 fiscal biennium in
16 the manner prescribed in each subsection. However, no sooner than
17 January 1, 2024, if upon review of applications the department
18 determines there are not adequate suitable projects in a category,
19 the department may reallocate funding among the purposes of
20 subsections (9) through (12) of this section. Beginning January 1,
21 2024, the department must provide quarterly notice of any funding
22 reallocations to the appropriate fiscal committees of the
23 legislature.

33 The appropriations in this section are subject to the following
34 conditions and limitations:

35 (1) (~~(\$163,663,000)~~) \$188,816,000 of the state taxable building
36 construction account—state appropriation (~~(is)~~) and \$364,000 of the
37 capital community assistance account—state appropriation are provided

1 solely for the new construction, acquisition, or rehabilitation of
2 affordable housing projects that serve and benefit low-income and
3 special needs populations including, but not limited to, people with
4 chronic mental illness or behavioral health conditions, farmworkers,
5 people who are homeless, and people in need of permanent supportive
6 housing. The department shall strive to invest at least 20 percent of
7 the appropriation provided under this subsection with by and for
8 organizations, as defined by the office of equity.

9 (2) (~~(\$25,000,000)~~) \$36,500,000 of the state taxable building
10 construction account—state appropriation (~~(is)~~) and \$8,500,000 of the
11 Washington housing trust account—state appropriation are provided
12 solely for affordable housing projects that serve and benefit low-
13 income people with developmental or intellectual disabilities. The
14 department must use a separate application form and evaluation
15 criteria for applications under this subsection. The department must
16 coordinate with the department of social and health services
17 regarding any needed supportive services and make efforts to enact
18 the recommendations of the housing needs study for individuals with
19 intellectual and developmental disabilities, as provided in section
20 1068(6), chapter 332, Laws of 2021.

21 (3) \$100,000,000 of the state taxable building construction
22 account—state appropriation is provided solely for the apple health
23 and homes rapid permanent supportive housing program created in
24 chapter 216, Laws of 2022. Of the amounts provided in this
25 subsection, \$5,000,000 is provided solely for the St. Agnes Haven
26 project in Spokane.

27 (4) (~~(\$40,000,000)~~) \$60,000,000 of the state building
28 construction account—state appropriation is provided solely for
29 awards to organizations eligible under RCW 43.185A.040 for the
30 development of homeownership projects affordable to first-time low-
31 income households throughout the state. Projects serving homebuyers
32 whose income is up to 80 percent of the area median income, adjusted
33 for household size, for the county where the property is located are
34 eligible to apply, except that projects located in rural areas of the
35 state, as defined by the department, serving homebuyers whose income
36 is up to 100 percent of the area median income, adjusted for
37 household size, for the county where the property is located are
38 eligible to apply. Eligible activities include, but are not limited
39 to, down payment assistance, closing costs, acquisition,

1 rehabilitation costs, and new construction. Eligible organizations
2 may include those that plan to provide housing to socially
3 disadvantaged communities as defined in 13 C.F.R. Sec. 124.103. The
4 department shall strive to invest at least 50 percent of these funds
5 with by and for organizations, as defined by the office of equity,
6 and make efforts to enact the recommendations of the homeownership
7 disparities work group created in section 128(100), chapter 297, Laws
8 of 2022.

9 (5) \$25,000,000 of the state building construction account—state
10 appropriation is provided solely for affordable housing preservation
11 projects, which may include, but are not limited to:

12 (a) Projects preserving and extending the affordability
13 commitment period for projects in the housing trust fund portfolio.
14 The funds may be provided for major building improvements,
15 preservation, and system replacements, necessary for the existing
16 housing trust fund portfolio to maintain long-term viability. The
17 department must require a capital needs assessment be provided prior
18 to contract execution. Funds may not be used to add or expand the
19 capacity of the property. When allocating funds, the department must
20 prioritize buildings that are older than 15 years and that serve very
21 low-income and extremely low-income populations.

22 (b) Projects preserving affordable multifamily housing at risk of
23 losing its affordability due to expiration of use restrictions that
24 otherwise require affordability including, but not limited to, United
25 States department of agriculture funded multifamily housing. The
26 department must prioritize projects that satisfy the goal of long-
27 term preservation of Washington's affordable multifamily housing
28 stock, particularly in rural areas of the state. Funds may be used
29 for acquisition or for acquisition and rehabilitation of properties
30 to preserve the affordable housing units beyond their existing use
31 restrictions and keep them in Washington's housing portfolio for a
32 minimum of 40 years. If a capital needs assessment is required, the
33 department must work with the applicant to ensure that this does not
34 create an unnecessary impediment to rapidly accessing these funds.

35 (c) The funding provided under this subsection (5) is not subject
36 to the 90-day application periods in RCW 43.185.070 or 43.185A.050.

37 (d) The amount awarded under this subsection (5) may not be
38 calculated in award limitations for other housing trust fund awards.

39 (6) (~~(\$4,000,000)~~) \$16,000,000 of the state taxable building
40 construction account—state appropriation is provided solely for a

1 grant to the northwest cooperative development center to provide
 2 subgrants for the acquisition and preservation of mobile or
 3 manufactured home communities. Funding provided under this subsection
 4 may be used to acquire mobile or manufactured home communities for
 5 the purpose of avoiding household displacement due to sale or other
 6 transactions and ensuring preservation of housing affordability for
 7 low-income households for a minimum of 40 years.

8 (7) (~~(\$2,000,000)~~) \$5,000,000 of the state taxable building
 9 construction account—state appropriation is provided solely for a
 10 grant to the northwest cooperative development center to provide
 11 subgrants to organizations that are "mobile home park cooperatives"
 12 or "manufactured housing cooperatives" under RCW 59.20.030 for
 13 completing capital improvement processes. Subgrants provided under
 14 this subsection may be used solely for critical improvements,
 15 repairs, and infrastructure upgrades to promote the preservation of
 16 mobile or manufactured home communities as affordable housing. The
 17 grantee must award subgrants based on needs relating to health,
 18 safety, and cost.

19 (8) (~~(\$40,337,000)~~) \$57,937,000 of the state taxable building
 20 construction account—state appropriation (~~(is)~~) and \$3,536,000 of the
 21 capital community assistance account—state appropriation are provided

18 limit what issues affected federally recognized tribes may raise in
19 the consultation process identified in subsections (1), (3) through
20 (7), and (9) of this section.

21 (d) The notification and offer to initiate discussion must be
22 documented with the application when it is filed, and a copy of the
23 application must be delivered to the department of archaeology and
24 historic preservation, the department of fish and wildlife, and to
25 the affected federally recognized tribe or tribes. If the discussions
26 pursuant to (b) of this subsection do not occur, the applicant must
27 document the reason why the discussion or discussions did not occur.

28 (e) Nothing in this section may be interpreted to require the
29 disclosure of information that is exempt from disclosure pursuant to
30 RCW 42.56.300 or federal law, including section 304 of the national
31 historic preservation act of 1966. Any information that is exempt
32 from disclosure pursuant to RCW 42.56.300 or federal law, including
33 section 304 of the national historic preservation act of 1966, shall
34 not become part of the official application file.

35 (3) If any funding decision, program, project, or activity that
36 may impact tribal resources, including tribal cultural resources,
37 archaeological sites, sacred sites, fisheries, or other rights and
38 interests in tribal lands and lands within which a tribe or tribes
39 possess rights reserved by federal treaty, statute, or executive
40 order is funded from the accounts created in RCW 70A.65.250,

1 70A.65.260, and 70A.65.270 without such a consultation with an
2 affected federally recognized tribe, the affected federally
3 recognized tribe may request that all further action on the decision,
4 program, project, or activity cease until meaningful consultation is
5 completed. Upon receipt of such a request by an agency or agencies
6 with the authority to allocate funding or administer grant programs
7 from the accounts listed in subsection (1) of this section in support
8 of the proposed project, further action by the agency or agencies on
9 any decision, program, project, or activity that would result in
10 significant physical disturbance of the tribal resource or resources
11 described in this subsection must cease until the consultation has
12 been completed.

13 (4) Upon completion of agency and tribal consultation, an
14 affected federally recognized tribe may request a formal review of
15 the consultation by submitting a request to the governor's office of
16 Indian affairs and notifying the appropriate agencies and the
17 department of archaeology and historic preservation. The state
18 agencies and tribe must meet to initiate discussion within no more
19 than 20 days of the request. This consultation must be offered and
20 conducted separately with each affected federally recognized tribe,
21 unless the tribes agree to conduct a joint consultation with the
22 state.

23 (5) After the state agencies and tribe or tribes have conducted a
24 formal review under subsection (4) of this section, an affected
25 federally recognized tribe or state agency may request that the
26 governor and an elected tribal leader or leaders of a federally
27 recognized tribal government meet to formally consider the
28 recommendations from the parties. If requested, this meeting must
29 occur within 30 days of the request, except that a federally
30 recognized tribe may choose to opt out of the meeting. This timeline
31 may be extended by mutual agreement between the governor and the
32 tribal leaders.

33 (6) After the meeting identified in subsection (5) of this
34 section has occurred, the governor or an elected tribal leader of a
35 federally recognized tribe may call for the state and tribe or tribes
36 to enter into formal mediation, except that a federally recognized
37 tribe may choose to opt out of the mediation. If entered into, the
38 mediation must be conducted as a government-to-government proceeding,
39 with each sovereign government retaining their right to a final
40 decision that meets their separate obligations and interests.

1 Mediators must be jointly selected by the parties to the mediation.
2 An agreement between the governor and a tribal leader or leaders
3 resulting from the mediation is formally recognized and binding on
4 the signatory parties. Absent an agreement, participation in
5 mediation does not preclude any additional steps that any party can
6 initiate, including legal review, to resolve a continuing
7 disagreement.

8 (7) During the proceedings outlined in subsections (4) through
9 (6) of this section, the agency or agencies with the authority to
10 allocate funding or administer grant programs from the accounts
11 listed in subsection (1) of this section in support of the proposed
12 project may not approve or release funding, or make other formal
13 decisions, including permitting, that advance the proposed project
14 except where required by law.

15 (8) By June 30, 2023, the governor's office of Indian affairs, in
16 coordination with the department of archaeology and historic
17 preservation and federally recognized tribes, shall develop a state
18 agency tribal consultation process, including best practices for
19 early, meaningful, and effective consultation, early notification and
20 engagement by applicants with federally recognized tribes as a part
21 of the preapplication process in subsection (2) of this section, and
22 protocols for communication and collaboration with federally
23 recognized tribes. The consultation process developed under this
24 section must be periodically reviewed and updated in coordination
25 with federally recognized tribes. The governor's office of Indian
26 affairs must provide training and other technical assistance to state
27 agencies, as they implement the required consultation.
28 Notwithstanding the governor's office of Indian affairs' ongoing work
29 pursuant to this subsection, the provisions of subsections (1)
30 through (7) and (9) of this section become effective as of June 9,
31 2022.

32 (9) The requirements of this section apply to local governments
33 that receive funding from the accounts created in RCW 70A.65.250,
34 70A.65.260, and 70A.65.270, where that funding is disbursed to
35 project and program applicants. Where requested, the governor's
36 office of Indian affairs must provide training and other technical
37 assistance to local government agencies as they implement the
38 consultation requirements of this section.

39 (10) Any agency subject to or implementing this section may adopt
40 rules in furtherance of its duties under this section.

1 (11) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this
2 specific purpose, the department must establish a tribal capacity
3 grant program to provide funding to federally recognized tribes for
4 the costs of implementing this section.

5 **Sec. 8005.** RCW 70A.305.190 and 2022 c 102 s 2 are each amended
6 to read as follows:

7 (1) The model toxics control capital account is hereby created in
8 the state treasury.

9 (2) In addition to the funds deposited into the model toxics
10 control capital account required under RCW 82.21.030, the following
11 moneys must be deposited into the model toxics control capital
12 account:

13 (a) The costs of remedial actions recovered under this chapter,
14 except as provided under RCW 70A.305.170(7);

15 (b) Penalties collected or recovered under this chapter; and

16 (c) Any other money appropriated or transferred to the account by
17 the legislature.

18 (3) Moneys in the model toxics control capital account must be
19 used for the improvement, rehabilitation, remediation, and cleanup of

23 used only for capital projects and activities that carry out the

28 (a) Remedial actions, including the following generally in
29 descending order of priority:

30 (i) Extended grant agreements entered into under subsection
31 (5)(a) of this section;

32 (ii) Grants or loans to local governments for remedial actions,
33 including planning for adaptive reuse of properties as provided for
34 under subsection (5)(d) of this section. The department must
35 prioritize funding of remedial actions at:

36 (A) Facilities on the department's hazardous sites list with a
37 high hazard ranking for which there is an approved remedial action
38 work plan or an equivalent document under federal cleanup law;

1 (B) Brownfield properties within a redevelopment opportunity zone
2 if the local government is a prospective purchaser of the property
3 and there is a department-approved remedial action work plan or
4 equivalent document under the federal cleanup law;

5 (iii) Department-conducted remedial actions;

6 (iv) Grants to persons intending to remediate contaminated real
7 property for development of affordable housing;

8 (v) Public funding to assist potentially liable persons to pay
9 for the costs of remedial action in compliance with clean-up
10 standards under RCW 70A.305.030(2) (e) if:

11 (A) The amount and terms of the funding are established under a
12 settlement agreement under RCW 70A.305.040(4); and

13 (B) The director has found that the funding will achieve both a
14 substantially more expeditious or enhanced cleanup than would
15 otherwise occur, and the prevention or mitigation of unfair economic
16 hardship;

17 (vi) Public funding to assist prospective purchasers to pay for
18 the costs of remedial action in compliance with clean-up standards
19 under RCW 70A.305.030(2) (e) if:

20 (A) The facility is located within a redevelopment opportunity
21 zone designated under RCW 70A.305.150;

22 (B) The amount and terms of the funding are established under a
23 settlement agreement under RCW 70A.305.040(5); and

24 (C) The director has found the funding will achieve a
25 substantially more expeditious or enhanced cleanup than would
26 otherwise occur, provide a public benefit in addition to cleanup
27 commensurate with the scope of the public funding; and meet any
28 additional criteria established in rule by the department; and

29 (vii) To expedite multiparty clean-up efforts, purchase of
30 remedial action cost-cap insurance;

31 (b) Grants, or loans, or contracts to local governments for solid
32 waste plans and programs under chapters 70A.205, 70A.214, 70A.224,
33 70A.222, 70A.230, and 70A.300 RCW. Funds must be allocated consistent
34 with priorities and matching requirements in the respective chapters;

35 (c) Toxic air pollutant reduction programs, including grants or
36 loans to local governments for woodstoves and diesel;

37 (d) Grants, loans, or contracts to local governments for
38 hazardous waste plans and programs under chapters 70A.405 and 70A.300
39 RCW, including chemical action plan implementation. Funds must be

1 allocated consistent with priorities and matching requirements in the
2 respective chapters; and

3 (e) Petroleum-based plastic or expanded polystyrene foam debris
4 clean-up activities in fresh or marine waters.

5 (5) The department may establish and administer a program to
6 provide grants and loans to local governments for remedial actions,
7 including planning for adaptive reuse of contaminated properties. To
8 expedite cleanups throughout the state, the department may use the
9 following strategies when providing grants to local governments under
10 this subsection:

11 (a) Enter into an extended grant agreement with a local
12 government conducting remedial actions at a facility where those
13 actions extend over multiple biennia and the total eligible cost of
14 those actions exceeds \$20,000,000. The agreement is subject to the
15 following limitations:

16 (i) The initial duration of such an agreement may not exceed 10
17 years. The department may extend the duration of such an agreement
18 upon finding substantial progress has been made on remedial actions
19 at the facility;

20 (ii) Extended grant agreements may not exceed 50 percent of the
21 total eligible remedial action costs at the facility; and

22 (iii) The department may not allocate future funding to an
23 extended grant agreement unless the local government has demonstrated
24 to the department that funds awarded under the agreement during the
25 previous biennium have been substantially expended or contracts have
26 been entered into to substantially expend the funds;

27 (b) Enter into a grant agreement with a local government
28 conducting a remedial action that provides for periodic reimbursement
29 of remedial action costs as they are incurred as established in the
30 agreement;

31 (c) Enter into a grant agreement with a local government prior to
32 it acquiring a property or obtaining necessary access to conduct
33 remedial actions, provided the agreement is conditioned upon the
34 local government acquiring the property or obtaining the access in
35 accordance with a schedule specified in the agreement;

36 (d) Provide integrated planning grants to local governments to
37 fund studies necessary to facilitate remedial actions at brownfield
38 properties and adaptive reuse of properties following remediation.
39 Eligible activities include, but are not limited to: Environmental
40 site assessments; remedial investigations; health assessments;

1 feasibility studies; site planning; community involvement; land use
2 and regulatory analyses; building and infrastructure assessments;
3 economic and fiscal analyses; and any environmental analyses under
4 chapter 43.21C RCW;

5 (e) Provide grants to local governments for remedial actions
6 related to area-wide groundwater contamination. To receive the
7 funding, the local government does not need to be a potentially
8 liable person or be required to seek reimbursement of grant funds
9 from a potentially liable person;

10 (f) The director may alter grant matching requirements to create
11 incentives for local governments to expedite cleanups when one of the
12 following conditions exists:

13 (i) Funding would prevent or mitigate unfair economic hardship
14 imposed by the clean-up liability;

15 (ii) Funding would create new substantial economic development,
16 public recreational opportunities, or habitat restoration
17 opportunities that would not otherwise occur; or

18 (iii) Funding would create an opportunity for acquisition and
19 redevelopment of brownfield property under RCW 70A.305.040(5) that
20 would not otherwise occur; and

21 (g) When pending grant applications under subsection (4)(d) and
22 (e) of this section exceed the amount of funds available, designated
23 redevelopment opportunity zones must receive priority for
24 distribution of available funds.

25 (6) Except for unanticipated receipts under RCW 43.79.260 through
26 43.79.282, moneys in model toxics control capital account may be
27 spent only after appropriation by statute.

28 (7) The legislature finds that, in 2023, wildfires in Spokane
29 county resulted in a loss of approximately 366 homes as well as
30 secondary buildings. The burning of these structures has resulted in
31 a large toxic debris field containing asbestos, heavy metals,
32 plastics, and fuel which are at risk of leaching into the soil and
33 groundwater. During the 2023-2025 fiscal biennium, moneys in the
34 model toxics control capital account may be used for financial
35 assistance to local governments for the testing of hazardous
36 materials, removal of debris, and remediation of soil necessary to
37 support the rebuilding of communities impacted by these wildfires.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8006.** By June 30, 2025, custody and control
2 of the maple lane campus must be transferred from the department of
3 corrections to the department of social and health services.

4 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8007.** (1) The legislature recognizes the
5 honor of Seattle being chosen as a host city for the 2026 FIFA World
6 Cup soccer competition. The matches will attract hundreds of
7 thousands of fans to our region and bring unprecedented attention to
8 Seattle and the state of Washington as a whole. In recognition of the
9 economic benefit to the state, the legislature intends to provide
10 assistance in making the capital improvements necessary to host this
11 event.

12 (2) The stadium and exhibition center capital improvement account
13 is created in the state treasury for the purpose of advancing moneys
14 to the Washington state public stadium authority for capital
15 improvements required to host the 2026 world cup. Moneys in the
16 account may be spent only after appropriation.

17 (3) The department of commerce must work with the state treasurer
18 to record distributions from the account and calculate the repayment
19 obligation for amounts expended. Moneys must be repaid no later than
20 September 30, 2026, and accrue interest at a rate that is 0.5 percent
21 higher than the interest rate that the account would have earned
22 without the transfer. If not earlier paid, on September 30, 2026, the
23 director of the office of financial management shall direct the state
24 treasurer to transfer any amounts due from the stadium and exhibition

26 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8008.** (1) The legislature intends to provide
27 avenues and funding to allow entities within the state to leverage
28 federal match funding to the greatest extent possible. During the
29 2023-2025 fiscal biennium, the department of commerce may use
30 unallocated amounts appropriated in sections 1020, 1021, and 1022 of
31 this act for grants under this section with the written authorization
32 of the director of the office of financial management.

33 (2) Grants under this section may be provided solely for matching
34 funds to allow entities within the state to compete for and receive
35 funding opportunities from federal agencies, including but not
36 limited to, the United States department of energy, the United States
37 environmental protection agency, the United States department of

1 agriculture, the United States economic development administration,
2 and the United States department of defense.

3 (3) Entities eligible for grants under this section include, but
4 are not limited to, local governments, federally recognized tribal
5 governments and tribes' contracted service providers, public and
6 private utilities, ports, associate development organizations, for-
7 profit entities, academic and research institutions, nonprofit
8 organizations, and state agencies.

9 (4) Projects eligible for funding must be physically located in
10 Washington state and may be spent only for activities eligible to
11 match for competitive federal funding and formula grants. Eligible
12 projects must be consistent with the state energy strategy adopted
13 under chapter 43.21F RCW and clean energy policies under chapter
14 19.405 RCW. Projects must further the goals of the climate commitment
15 act as described in RCW 70A.65.260(1)(j).

16 (5) The department must:

17 (a) Consider equity and environmental justice in developing
18 opportunities for applicant participation and must follow principles
19 established in its community engagement plan adopted under RCW
20 70A.02.050.

21 (b) Consider projects that will spur an additional investment or
22 economic activity in the region.

23 (c) To the extent practicable, seek projects that provide
24 benefits to vulnerable populations in overburdened communities, with
25 a goal of directing at least 20 percent of grants for this purpose.

26 (6) The department may require the applicant to provide nonstate
27 matching funds beyond the amount required to secure the federal
28 funding opportunity.

29 (7) On a quarterly basis, the department of commerce and office
30 of financial management must submit to the capital committees of the
31 legislature a list of all grants authorized under this section.

32 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8009.** A new section is added to chapter
33 70A.01 RCW to read as follows:

34 (1) The consolidated climate account is created in the state
35 treasury. Revenues to the account consist of appropriations and
36 transfers by the legislature and all other funding directed for
37 deposit into the account. Moneys in the account may be spent only
38 after appropriation.

1 (2) (a) If chapter . . . (Initiative Measure No. 2117), Laws of
2 2025, is approved by the voters at the next general election and
3 certified by the secretary of state, any residual balance remaining
4 in the following accounts must be transferred by the state treasurer

11 (b) The office of financial management and state treasurer may

15 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8010.** (1) Agencies may not expend moneys from
16 the: (a) Climate investment account; (b) climate commitment account;
17 (c) natural climate solutions account; or (d) air quality and health
18 disparities improvement account on or after the effective date of
19 Initiative Measure No. 2117.

20 (2) Unspent appropriations in the 2023-2025 capital omnibus
21 appropriations act, chapter 474, Laws of 2023 and chapter . . . , Laws
22 of 2024 (this act), which are appropriated from the: (a) Climate
23 investment account; (b) climate commitment account; (c) natural
24 climate solutions account; or (d) air quality and health disparities
25 improvement account and which take effect before January 1, 2025,
26 must thereafter be paid from the consolidated climate account as if
27 they were appropriated from that account.

28 (3) Appropriations in this act from the accounts listed in
29 subsection (1) (a) through (1) (d) of this section which take effect on
30 or after January 1, 2025, shall lapse.

31 (4) This section takes effect only if chapter . . . (Initiative
32 Measure No. 2117), Laws of 2025, is approved by the voters at the
33 next general election and certified by the secretary of state.

34 **Sec. 8011.** RCW 43.19.125 and 2011 1st sp.s. c 43 s 204 are each
35 amended to read as follows:

36 (1) The director of enterprise services shall have custody and
37 control of the capitol buildings and grounds, supervise and direct

11 NEW SECTION. Sec. 8012. If any provision of this act or its
12 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
13 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
14 persons or circumstances is not affected.

15 NEW SECTION. Sec. 8013. This act is necessary for the immediate
16 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of
17 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes
18 effect immediately.
