1 AN ACT Relating to expanding the students experiencing 2 homelessness and foster youth pilot program; amending RCW 28B.50.916 3 and 28B.77.850; and creating a new section.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 Sec. 1. RCW 28B.50.916 and 2021 c 62 s 1 are each amended to 6 read as follows:

7 (1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, ((the college board shall select eight college 8 districts, with no less than four located outside of the Puget Sound 9 10 region to participate in a pilot)) each community and technical 11 college may implement a program to provide assistance to students 12 experiencing homelessness and to students who were in the foster care 13 system when they graduated high school. The ((college districts 14 chosen to participate in the pilot)) program must provide certain 15 accommodations to these students that may include, but are not 16 limited to, the following:

- 17 (a) Access to laundry facilities;
- 18 (b) Access to storage;
- 19 (c) Access to locker room and shower facilities;
- 20 (d) Reduced-price meals or meal plans, and access to food banks;
- 21 (e) Access to technology;

(f) Access to short-term housing or housing assistance,
especially during seasonal breaks; and

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(g) Case management services.

4 (2) The ((college districts)) community and technical colleges 5 may also establish plans to develop surplus property for affordable 6 housing to accommodate the needs of students experiencing 7 homelessness and students who were in the foster care system when 8 they graduated high school.

9 (3) The ((college districts participating in the pilot program)) 10 community and technical colleges shall leverage existing community 11 resources by making available to students in the ((pilot)) program 12 information that is available for individuals experiencing 13 homelessness, including through not-for-profit organizations, the 14 local housing authority, and the department of commerce's office of 15 homeless youth.

16 (4) The ((college districts)) community and technical colleges 17 participating in the ((pilot)) program shall <u>annually</u> provide a joint 18 report to the appropriate committees of the legislature ((by)) <u>in</u> 19 <u>accordance with RCW 43.01.036 beginning</u> December 1, 2023, that 20 includes at least the following information:

21 (a) The number of students experiencing homelessness or food 22 insecurity, and the number of students who were in the foster care 23 system when they graduated high school who ((were attending)) <u>attended</u> a community or technical college during the ((pilot)) 24 25 program. The college board shall coordinate with all of the community and technical colleges to collect voluntary data on how many students 26 27 experiencing homelessness or food insecurity are attending the community and technical colleges; 28

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(b) The number of students assisted by the ((pilot)) program;

30 (c) Strategies for accommodating students experiencing 31 homelessness or food insecurity, and former foster care students; and

32 (d) Legislative recommendations for how students experiencing 33 homelessness or food insecurity, and former foster care students 34 could be better served.

35 (5) ((The college districts not selected to participate in the 36 pilot program are:

37 (a) Invited to participate voluntarily; and

38 (b) Encouraged to submit the data required of the pilot program 39 participants under subsection (4) of this section, regardless of 40 participation status. 1 (6) The pilot program expires July 1, 2024.

(7) This section expires January 1, 2025)) For purposes of this
section, "program" means the students experiencing homelessness and
foster youth program.

5 Sec. 2. RCW 28B.77.850 and 2021 c 62 s 2 are each amended to 6 read as follows:

7 (1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, ((the council shall select four public four-year 8 institutions of higher education, two on each side of the crest of 9 10 the Cascade mountain range, to participate in a pilot)) each public 11 four-year institution of higher education may implement a program to provide assistance to students experiencing homelessness and to 12 13 students who were in the foster care system when they graduated high school. The ((four-year institutions of higher education chosen to 14 15 participate in the pilot)) program must provide certain accommodations to these students that may include, but are not 16 17 limited to, the following:

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(a) Access to laundry facilities;

- 19 (b) Access to storage;
- 20 (c) Access to locker room and shower facilities;
- 21 (d) Reduced-price meals or meal plans, and access to food banks;
- 22 (e) Access to technology;

23 (f) Access to short-term housing or housing assistance, 24 especially during seasonal breaks; and

- 25
- (g) Case management services.

(2) The four-year institutions of higher education may also establish plans to develop surplus property for affordable housing to accommodate the needs of students experiencing homelessness and students who were in the foster care system when they graduated high school.

31 (3) The four-year institutions of higher education participating in the ((pilot)) program shall leverage existing community resources 32 by making available to students in the ((pilot)) program information 33 for individuals experiencing homelessness, 34 that is available including through not-for-profit organizations, the local housing 35 authority, and the department of commerce's office of homeless youth. 36 (4) The four-year institutions of higher education participating 37

38 in the ((pilot)) program shall <u>annually</u> provide a joint report to the 39 appropriate committees of the legislature ((by)) <u>in accordance with</u> 1 <u>RCW 43.01.036 beginning</u> December 1, 2023, that includes at least the 2 following information:

3 (a) The number of students experiencing homelessness or food insecurity, and the number of students who were in the foster care 4 system when they graduated high school who ((were attending)) 5 6 attended a four-year institution of higher education during the ((pilot)) program. The council shall coordinate with all of the four-7 year institutions of higher education to collect voluntary data on 8 how many students experiencing homelessness or food insecurity are 9 attending the four-year institutions of higher education; 10

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(b) The number of students assisted by the ((pilot)) program;

12 (c) Strategies for accommodating students experiencing 13 homelessness or food insecurity, and former foster care students; and

14 (d) Legislative recommendations for how students experiencing 15 homelessness or food insecurity, and former foster care students 16 could be better served.

17 (5) ((The four-year institutions of higher education not selected 18 to participate in the pilot program are:

19 (a) Invited to participate voluntarily; and

20 (b) Encouraged to submit the data required of the pilot program 21 participants under subsection (4) of this section, regardless of 22 participation status.

23 (6) The pilot program expires July 1, 2024.

(7) This section expires January 1, 2025)) For purposes of this
section, "program" means the students experiencing homelessness and
foster youth program.

27 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. If specific funding for the purposes of 28 this act, referencing this act by bill or chapter number, is not 29 provided by June 30, 2023, in the omnibus appropriations act, this 30 act is null and void.
