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SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 1302

- AN ACT Relating to allowing local governments to encourage sustainable technology and resiliency by waiving utility connection
- 3 charges for organizations utilizing industrial symbiosis; amending
- 4 RCW 35.92.385 and 35.92.380; and creating a new section.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that climate change 7 and environmental degradation poses a significant and increasing threat to human health in Washington. This threat cannot be combatted 8 9 through reductions in greenhouse gas and other harmful emissions 10 alone. Instead, reductions must be combined with technological 11 innovations in clean eneray, resource efficiency, and 12 environmentally friendly practices.
 - The legislature finds that industrial symbiosis is one such innovation and practice. Industrial symbiosis is characterized by the beneficial utilization of waste products that may otherwise have deleterious environmental effects. Industrial symbiosis reduces waste, increases efficiency, promotes resiliency, and creates the conditions for further innovation.
- The legislature believes that by allowing local governments that operate their own utilities to waive connection charges for organizations practicing industrial symbiosis, Washington can

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- 1 encourage the development and utilization of this sustainable
- 2 technology, and that such utilization is important both
- 3 environmentally and economically.

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- Sec. 2. RCW 35.92.385 and 2023 c 249 s 1 are each amended to read as follows:
- (1) (a) Municipal utilities formed under this chapter may waive 6 7 connection charges for properties owned or developed by, or on the behalf of, a nonprofit organization, public development authority, 8 housing authority, or local agency that provides emergency shelter, 9 transitional housing, permanent supportive housing, or affordable 10 11 housing, including a limited partnership as described in RCW 84.36.560(7)(f)(ii) and a limited liability company as described in 12 13 RCW 84.36.560(7)(f)(iii).
- 14 <u>(b) Municipal utilities formed under this chapter may waive</u>
 15 <u>connection charges for properties owned or developed by public or</u>
 16 <u>private organizations that utilize the property for industrial</u>
 17 symbiosis.
- 18 (2) Connection charges waived under this chapter shall be funded 19 using general funds, grant dollars, or other identified revenue 20 stream.
 - (3) At such time as a property receiving a waiver under subsection (1) of this section is no longer operating under the eligibility requirements under subsection (1) of this section:
 - (a) The waiver of connection charges required under subsection(1) of this section is no longer required; and
 - (b) Any connection charges waived under subsection (1) of this section are immediately due and payable to the utility as a condition of continued service.
 - (4) For the purposes of this section:
- 30 (a) "Affordable housing" has the same meaning as in RCW 31 36.70A.030.
- 32 (b) "Connection charges" means the one-time capital and administrative charges, as authorized in RCW 35.92.025, that are imposed by a utility on a building or facility owner for a new utility service and costs borne or assessed by a utility for the labor, materials, and services necessary to physically connect a designated facility to the respective utility service.
- 38 (c) "Emergency shelter" means any facility that has, as its sole 39 purpose, the provision of a temporary shelter for the homeless and

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- 1 that does not require occupants to sign a lease or occupancy
 2 agreement.
- 3 (d) "Industrial symbiosis" means collaboration among businesses
 4 or organizations to exchange materials, energy, water, and byproducts
- 5 <u>in order to optimize resource use and enhance environmental,</u>
- 6 <u>economic</u>, and <u>social</u> <u>outcomes</u> for <u>projects</u> that <u>demonstrate</u>
- 7 measurable reductions in resource consumption or greenhouse gas
- 8 <u>emissions while supporting sustainable development and long-term</u>
- 9 <u>community benefits.</u>

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- 10 <u>(e)</u> "Permanent supportive housing" has the same meaning as in RCW 11 36.70A.030.
- 12 $((\frac{(e)}{(e)}))$ <u>(f)</u> "Transitional housing" has the same meaning as in RCW 13 84.36.043.
- 14 **Sec. 3.** RCW 35.92.380 and 2023 c 249 s 2 are each amended to 15 read as follows:

Whenever a city or town waives or delays collection of tap-in charges, connection fees, or hookup fees for low-income persons, a class of low-income persons, or a nonprofit organization, public development authority, housing authority, or local agency that provides emergency shelter, transitional housing, permanent supportive housing, or affordable housing as defined in RCW 35.92.385, or an organization utilizing the property for industrial symbiosis as defined in RCW 35.92.385 to connect to lines or pipes used by the city or town to provide utility service, the waiver or delay shall be pursuant to a program established by ordinance. As used in this section, the provision of "utility service" includes, but is not limited to, water, sanitary or storm sewer service, electricity, gas, other means of power, and heat.

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
