AN ACT Relating to improving access to career opportunities for students who are participating in or who have completed preparatory secondary career and technical education programs; amending 2024 c 234 s 3 (uncodified); creating a new section; and providing an expiration date.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

7 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that the state, in 8 partnership with employers and the public school system, has 9 developed and invested in career and technical education programs for 10 high school students. These programs have been developed and expanded 11 with the intent of providing 16 and 17 year old students with hands-12 on work experience, coupled with education and training to work in 13 various industries throughout our state. Many of these programs are 14 designed to allow students to begin working in the field during or 15 upon completion of the program; however, some state agencies have 16 enacted rules that place age restrictions on when a student can start 17 test for a license or certification, or work in a a program, issued a certification 18 profession for which they have been or 19 license. These restrictions are not required by federal law, are 20 inconsistent with many other state laws, and are barriers to 16 and 21 17 year old students being able to begin coursework, or work in a

1 profession following completion of required education, training, or 2 certification or licensure.

Therefore, the legislature intends to direct the office of the 3 superintendent of public instruction to, through an expanded 4 statewide career and technical education task force, to review 5 6 existing laws, rules, and state agencies' policies, and develop recommendations for changes to such laws, rules, and policies to 7 improve access to career opportunities for 16 and 17 year old 8 students who are participating in or who have completed preparatory 9 10 secondary career and technical education programs.

11 Sec. 2. 2024 c 234 s 3 (uncodified) is amended to read as 12 follows:

(1) The statewide career and technical education task force is established in the office of the superintendent of public instruction. The members of the task force are as follows:

16 (a) The superintendent of public instruction or the 17 superintendent's designee;

18 (b) Two representatives from a statewide organization 19 representing career and technical education, at least one of whom 20 must be a career and technical education core plus classroom 21 instructor;

(c) A representative of career and technical education core plus
aerospace and advanced manufacturing selected by an organization
representing aerospace or advanced industrial manufacturers;

25 (d) A representative of career and technical education core plus 26 construction selected by an organization representing general 27 contractors;

(e) A representative of career and technical education core plus
maritime selected by an organization representing maritime interests;

30 (f) <u>A representative of school district career and technical</u> 31 <u>education directors;</u>

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(g) A representative of worksite learning coordinators;

33 <u>(h)</u> A representative from the state board for community and 34 technical colleges selected by the state board for community and 35 technical colleges;

36 (((g))) <u>(i)</u> A representative from a skill center as selected by 37 the Washington state skill center association;

38 (((h))) <u>(j)</u> A representative from the allied health industry; 39 ((and 1 (i)) (k) A representative from the workforce training and 2 education coordinating board selected by the workforce training and 3 education coordinating board;

4 (1) A representative from the department of labor and industries;

5 (m) A representative from an association that provides support 6 and leadership to educators in career and technical education 7 programs;

8 <u>(n) A representative from career connect Washington and the</u> 9 <u>career connected learning cross-agency work group established under</u> 10 <u>RCW 28C.30.030;</u>

11 (o) At least one representative of businesses and employer 12 associations and organizations interested in removing barriers to 13 youth employment;

14 (p) At least one representative of labor organizations in 15 relevant trades interested in removing barriers to youth employment; 16 and

17 (q) At least one representative of other interested entities, 18 groups, and interests identified by the office of the superintendent 19 of public instruction.

20 (2) The superintendent of public instruction or the 21 superintendent's designee shall chair the task force, and staff 22 support for the task force must be provided by the office of the 23 superintendent of public instruction.

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(3) The task force shall develop recommendations for:

25 (a) Expanding and strengthening the accessibility, stability, and uniformity of secondary work-integrated learning opportunities, 26 27 including career and technical education, career connected learning, 28 regional apprenticeship programs, career and technical education core plus programs, work-based learning, internships and externships, and 29 other types of work-integrated learning. Recommendations required by 30 31 this subsection (3)(a) should address governance, operations, and 32 codification, and must be in the form of draft legislation. The legislature does not intend for recommendations required by this 33 34 subsection (3)(a) to modify the operation of career and technical education core plus programs established prior to January 1, 2024; 35

36 (b) The successful administration and operation of career and 37 technical education core plus programs through appropriate 38 collaboration with industry sector leadership from program areas to 39 inform the administration and continual improvement of the programs, 40 review data outcomes, recommend program improvements, ensure that the

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1 programs reflect applicable industry competencies, and identify 2 appropriate program credentials; and

(c) A career and technical education core plus model framework 3 that can be used to guide the expansion, establishment, and operation 4 of career and technical education core plus programs. In making 5 6 recommendations in accordance with this subsection (3)(c), the task force must consider, at a minimum, the following: 7

(i) Curricula and instructional hours that lead or articulate to 8 industry-recognized nondegree credentials; 9

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(ii) Curricula provided without cost to educators;

11 (iii) Academic course equivalencies;

12 (iv) Courses and course sequencing;

(v) The development, maintenance, and expansion of industry, 13 14 labor, and community partnerships;

(vi) Program credentials; 15

16 (vii) Training and professional development for educators and 17 counselors;

18 (viii) Alignment with postsecondary education and training 19 programs;

(ix) The promotion of student, family, and community awareness of 20 career and technical education core plus programs, 21 including 22 instructional offerings and potential work placement opportunities; 23 and

(x) The development and expansion of a cohort of employers 24 25 willing to hire and place students that have successfully completed 26 career and technical education core plus programs; and

27 (d) Changes to relevant laws, rules, and policies necessary to 28 improve students' access to sustained interactions with industry and community professionals and provide firsthand engagement with the 29 30 tasks required for the various career fields, while also maintaining appropriate protections for the safety and welfare of minors. In 31 32 developing recommendations for this subsection (3)(d), the task force 33 shall:

(i) Identify barriers preventing the training, certification, or 34 employment of minors who are participating in or who have completed a 35 36 preparatory secondary career and technical education program;

(ii) Assess categories of work from which the department of labor 37 and industries has prohibited minors from engaging, but where minors 38 39 are receiving or have received training through preparatory secondary 40 career and technical education programs;

1 (iii) Assess categories of work from which the department of 2 labor and industries has prohibited minors from engaging, but where 3 minors have received professional licenses or certifications from a 4 state agency or other regulatory authority;

5 <u>(iv) Examine agency rules imposing age restrictions on when a</u> 6 <u>minor can start training, test for or receive a license or</u> 7 <u>certification, or work in a profession for which the minor is</u> 8 <u>participating in or has completed a preparatory secondary career and</u> 9 <u>technical education program;</u>

10 <u>(v) Assess other agency restrictions on the working hours and</u> 11 <u>schedules of minors who are participating in or who have completed a</u> 12 <u>preparatory secondary career and technical education program; and</u>

13 (vi) Assess the requirements and procedures for school districts 14 to receive approval to deliver career and technical education under 15 RCW 28A.700.010, including whether said requirements or procedures 16 account for relevant age restrictions imposed by agencies or 17 regulatory entities for training, certification, and employment.

18 <u>(4) The office of the superintendent of public instruction, the</u> 19 <u>department of labor and industries, and other affected agencies may</u> 20 <u>initiate changes to agency rules and practices based on</u> 21 <u>recommendations of the task force prior to the issuance of the</u> 22 <u>required report and any legislative action, provided that any such</u> 23 <u>changes comply with federal and state law</u>.

(((4))) (5) The task force, in accordance with RCW 43.01.036, shall report its findings and recommendations to the governor, the appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the legislature, and the state board of education by November 15, ((2025)) 2026.

(((5))) <u>(6)</u> This section expires June 30, ((2026)) <u>2027</u>.

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
