SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 1450

State of Washington 69th Legislature 2025 Regular Session

By House Education (originally sponsored by Representatives Santos, Rude, Schmidt, Wylie, Parshley, Ortiz-Self, Nance, Pollet, and Tharinger)

1 AN ACT Relating to transition to kindergarten programs; amending 2 RCW 28A.300.072; creating a new section; and declaring an emergency.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

The legislature intends to support 4 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. 5 eligible four year old children who either need additional 6 preparation for kindergarten or who are living in extreme child care 7 access deserts and, despite qualifying, do not have access to state or federal early learning or child care programs by establishing a 8 9 state transition to kindergarten policy that supports students, 10 families, and communities.

11 In 2023, the legislature attempted to manage an exception to the 12 uniform entry qualifications for kindergarten that had been turned 13 into a basic education program referred to as the transitional 14 kindergarten program by: Continuing and renaming the program as the 15 kindergarten program; transition to using nonbasic education 16 allocations to fund the program; and directing the office of the 17 superintendent of public instruction to adopt rules for school 18 districts, charter schools, and state-tribal education compact 19 schools operating a program.

The legislature now finds that the public policy interest of supporting a thriving early learning ecosystem requires the state to

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1 reestablish a policy of individual exceptions to early enrollment in the public school system. The legislature intends the 2 for reestablished state transition to kindergarten policy to strengthen 3 coordination between early learning and child care programs 4 bv directing closer collaboration between the office of the 5 6 superintendent of public instruction and the department of children, youth, and families. The legislature recognizes that, to prevent 7 disruption of regional child care and early learning systems, the 8 state transition to kindergarten policy must include additional 9 10 collaboration between operators and proposed operators of the state transition to kindergarten policy and other early learning and child 11 12 care programs. The legislature intends for the increased agency oversight and modified requirements on operators enrolling children 13 under the state transition to kindergarten policy to minimize adverse 14 15 impacts on nonpublic school early learning and child care programs.

16 Sec. 2. RCW 28A.300.072 and 2023 c 420 s 1 are each amended to 17 read as follows:

18 (1) ((The intent of the legislature is to continue and rename transitional kindergarten as the transition to kindergarten program 19 and that the program be established in statute with the goal of 20 assisting eligible children in need of additional preparation to be 21 22 successful kindergarten students in the following school year. The)) 23 (a) The state transition to kindergarten policy supports children, 24 families, and communities by providing high quality early learning within the public school system to four year old children who either: 25 26 Need additional preparation for kindergarten; or are living in 27 extreme child care access deserts and, despite qualifying, do not have access to the early childhood education and assistance program, 28 29 the federal head start program, or the working connections child care program. Eligible children enrolled in the public school system under 30 the state transition to kindergarten ((program is not part of)) 31 policy are not participating in the state's statutory program of 32 basic education under RCW 28A.150.200. 33

34 (((2)(a))) (b) The office of the superintendent of public 35 instruction shall ((administer the transition to kindergarten program 36 and shall)) adopt rules under chapter 34.05 RCW for the 37 administration of, the allocation of state funding for, and minimum 38 standards and requirements for the <u>implementation of the state</u> 39 transition to kindergarten ((program. Initial rules, which include)

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1 expectations for school districts, charter schools as allowed by 2 subsection (7) of this section, and state-tribal education compact 3 schools transitioning existing programs to the new requirements 4 established in this section must be adopted in time for the 2023-24 5 school year, and permanent rules must be adopted by the beginning of 6 the 2024-25 school year)) policy.

7 (c) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall, in collaboration with the department of children, youth, and 8 9 families, and in accordance with the omnibus operating appropriations 10 act, regulate the enrollment of eligible children under the state transition to kindergarten policy. To support the equitable and 11 effective distribution of high quality early learning programs 12 13 statewide, the office of the superintendent of public instruction, when regulating enrollment under this subsection (1)(c), shall: (i) 14 15 Limit the number of sites approved to enroll eligible children under the state transition to kindergarten policy; (ii) distribute approved 16 17 sites across the state, prioritizing areas classified as extreme child care access deserts; and (iii) restrict the number of state-18 19 funded eligible children permitted to enroll at each approved site.

20 (d) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall 21 implement a process for school districts, charter schools, and state-22 tribal education compact schools to request advance approval to 23 enroll state-funded eligible children under the state transition to 24 kindergarten policy. At a minimum, the application must include:

25 (i) The number of sites for which approval to enroll eligible 26 children under the state transition to kindergarten policy is sought, 27 along with the projected number of state-funded eligible children to 28 be enrolled at each site;

29 (ii) A description of the screening processes or tools that will 30 be used to evaluate prospective children and determine eligibility 31 based on need;

32 <u>(iii) A statement, with supporting documentation, indicating</u> 33 whether the applicant is located in an extreme child care access 34 <u>desert;</u>

35 (iv) The results of the local child care and early learning needs
36 assessment required by subsection (3) (d) of this section; and

37 (v) A verification from a statewide child care resource and 38 referral organization that the applicant has worked in collaboration 39 with and does not adversely impact enrollment in regional early 40 learning and child care programs, such as early childhood education 1 and assistance programs, federal head start programs, licensed child 2 care centers, and licensed family homes.

(2) (a) Before the start of each school year, beginning with the 3 2025-26 school year, any school district, charter school, or state-4 tribal education compact school seeking state funding as outlined in 5 6 subsection (6) of this section for enrolling eligible children under the state transition to kindergarten policy shall, before enrolling 7 such children, obtain approval from the office of the superintendent 8 of public instruction through the application process required by 9 10 subsection (1) (d) of this section.

(b) School districts, charter schools ((as allowed by subsection (7) of this section)), and state-tribal education compact schools ((operating a)) approved to enroll eligible children under the state transition to kindergarten ((program)) policy shall adopt local policies regarding eligibility, recruitment, and enrollment ((for this program)) that, at a minimum, meet the requirements of subsection (3) of this section.

18 (3) The rules adopted under subsection (((2))) <u>(1)</u> of this 19 section must include, at a minimum, the following requirements for 20 school districts, charter schools ((as allowed by subsection (7) of 21 this section)), and state-tribal education compact schools 22 ((operating a)) approved to enroll eligible children under the state 23 transition to kindergarten ((program)) policy:

(a) (i) A limitation on ((program)) enrollment <u>under the state</u> transition to kindergarten policy to eligible children((. Eligible children include only those who:

27 (A) Have been determined to benefit from additional preparation 28 for kindergarten; and

29 (B) Are at least four years old by August 31st of the school year 30 they enroll in the transition to kindergarten program));

(ii) A requirement, as practicable, for school districts, charter schools ((as allowed by subsection (7) of this section)), and statetribal education compact schools to prioritize <u>enrollment to the</u> children of families with the lowest incomes and <u>the</u> children most in need for additional preparation to be successful in kindergarten ((when enrolling eligible children in a transition to kindergarten program;)

38 (iii) Access to the transition to kindergarten program does not 39 constitute an individual entitlement for any particular child.)); 1 (b) Except for children who have been excused from participation 2 by their parents or legal guardians, a requirement that the 3 Washington kindergarten inventory of developing skills as established 4 by RCW 28A.655.080 be administered to all eligible children enrolled 5 ((in - a)) under the state transition to kindergarten ((program))6 policy at the beginning of the child's enrollment ((in - the program))7 and at least one more time during the school year((-));

8 (c) A requirement that all eligible children enrolled ((in - a))9 <u>under the state</u> transition to kindergarten ((program)) <u>policy</u> be 10 assigned a statewide student identifier and that the ((transition to to transition to the kindergarten program)) <u>eligible children's assigned class or course</u> 12 be considered a separate class or course for the purposes of data 13 reporting requirements in RCW 28A.320.175((-));

(d) A requirement that a local child care and early learning 14 15 needs assessment is conducted before ((beginning or expanding a 16 transition to kindergarten program that considers the existing)) completing the application process required by subsection (1)(d) of 17 this section. The needs assessment must consider the availability and 18 affordability of early learning providers, such as the early 19 childhood education and assistance programs, head start programs, and 20 21 licensed child care centers and family home providers in the region. 22 Data available through the regionalized data dashboard maintained by the department of children, youth, and families or ((any)) other 23 appropriate sources may be used to inform the needs assessment 24 25 required by this subsection $((-))_{i}$

(e) (i) A requirement that school districts, charter schools ((as allowed by subsection (7) of this section)), and state-tribal education compact schools adhere to guidelines, as developed by the office of the superintendent of public instruction, related to:

30 (A) Best practices for site readiness of facilities ((that are 31 used for the program));

32 (B) Developmentally appropriate curricula designed to assist in 33 maintaining high quality ((programs)) instruction for enrolled 34 children; and

(C) Professional development opportunities((+));

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36 (ii) The office of the superintendent of public instruction must 37 ((develop a process for conducting)) conduct site visits of ((any)) 38 school districts, charter schools ((as allowed by subsection (7) of 39 this section, or)), and state-tribal education compact schools 40 ((operating a)) approved to enroll eligible children under the state 1 transition to kindergarten ((program)) policy and provide feedback on 2 elements listed in this subsection (3)(e)((-));

3 (f) A prohibition on charging tuition or other fees to state-4 funded ((eligible)) children ((for enrollment in a)) who are enrolled 5 under the state transition to kindergarten ((program.)) policy; and

(g) A prohibition on establishing a policy of excluding ((an))
eligible ((child)) children due only to the presence of a disability.

(4) (a) The office of the superintendent of public instruction, in 8 collaboration with the department of children, youth, and families, 9 shall develop statewide, coordinated eligibility, recruitment, 10 enrollment, and selection best practices and provide technical 11 12 assistance to ((those implementing a)) school districts, charter schools, and state-tribal education compact schools, exploring the 13 enrollment of eligible children under the state transition to 14 kindergarten ((program to support)) policy by supporting connections 15 16 with local early learning providers.

(b) School districts, charter schools ((as allowed by subsection (7) of this section)), and state-tribal education compact schools must consider the best practices developed under this subsection (4) when adopting the <u>local</u> policies required under subsection (2)(b) of this section.

(5) Nothing in this section prohibits school districts, charter schools ((as allowed by subsection (7) of this section)), and statetribal education compact schools from blending or colocating ((a)) <u>eligible children enrolled under the state</u> transition to kindergarten ((program with other)) policy with children enrolled in early learning programs.

(6) (a) ((Funding for the)) Subject to (b) of this subsection, state funding for eligible children enrolled under the state transition to kindergarten ((program)) policy must be based on the following:

32 (i) The distribution formula established under RCW 28A.150.260 (4)(a), (5), (6), (8), and (10)(a) and (b), calculated using the 33 actual number of annual average full-time equivalent eligible 34 children enrolled ((in the program)) under the state transition to 35 kindergarten policy. A transition to kindergarten child must be 36 counted as a kindergarten student for purposes of the funding 37 calculations referenced in this subsection, but must be reported 38 39 separately.

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(ii) The distribution formula developed in RCW 28A.160.150
 through 28A.160.192, calculated using reported ridership for eligible
 children ((enrolled in the program)) under the state transition to
 <u>kindergarten policy</u>.

5 (b) ((Funding provided for the transition to kindergarten program 6 is not part of the state's statutory program of basic education under 7 RCW 28A.150.200 and must be expended only for the support of 8 operating a transition to kindergarten program.

(7) Charter schools authorized under RCW 28A.710.080(2) are 9 10 immediately permitted to operate a transition to kindergarten program 11 under this section. Beginning with the 2025-26 school year, any charter school authorized under RCW 28A.710.080 (1) or (2) is 12 13 permitted to operate a transition to kindergarten program under this 14 section)) Beginning in the 2025-26 school year, the statewide annual 15 average full-time equivalent eligible children enrollment funding as outlined in (a) of this subsection may not exceed the statewide 16 17 annual average full-time equivalent eligible children enrolled during 18 the 2023-24 school year.

19 (c) The legislature does not intend to include funding for the 20 state transition to kindergarten policy within the state's obligation 21 for basic education funding under Article IX of the state 22 Constitution.

23 <u>(7) Access to a class or course offered by a school district,</u>
24 <u>charter school, or state-tribal education compact school through</u>
25 <u>enrollment under the state transition to kindergarten policy does not</u>
26 <u>constitute an individual entitlement for eligible children.</u>

27 <u>(8) For purposes of this section, the following definitions</u>
28 <u>apply:</u>

29 <u>(a) "Charter school" means a school established under chapter</u> 30 28A.710 RCW;

31 (b) "Eligible children" means children who are at least four 32 years old by August 31st of the school year they enroll in school under the state transition to kindergarten policy and who either: (i) 33 Have been determined to benefit from additional preparation for 34 kindergarten using an appropriate screening process or tool; or (ii) 35 qualify for enrollment in, but do not have access to, the early 36 childhood education and assistance program, the federal head start 37 program, or the working connections child care program, due to living 38 39 in an extreme child care access desert;

1 (c) "Extreme child care access desert" means a locale that is
2 part of a cluster of extreme unmet need geographies and is part of a
3 cluster of highly constrained supply locales;

4 (d) "Extreme unmet need locale" means a cluster of contiguous
5 locations where the unmet need levels are high relative to unmet need
6 levels in other neighborhoods statewide, and where these high
7 neighborhood unmet need levels are highly correlated amongst
8 contiguous neighborhoods in the cluster;

9 <u>(e) "Highly constrained supply locale" means a cluster of</u> 10 <u>contiguous neighborhoods where the level of supply constraint is high</u> 11 <u>relative to constraint levels in other neighborhoods statewide, and</u> 12 <u>where these high neighborhood levels of constrained supply are highly</u> 13 <u>correlated amongst contiguous neighborhoods in the cluster;</u>

14 (f) "Site" means a school, whether a common school, charter 15 school, or state-tribal compact school, approved to enroll eligible 16 children who are state-funded as outlined in subsection (6) of this 17 section; and

18 (g) "State-tribal education compact school" means a school 19 subject to chapter 28A.715 RCW.

20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. This act is necessary for the immediate 21 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of 22 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes 23 effect immediately.

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
