## SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 1610

1 AN ACT Relating to the disclosure of critical energy 2 infrastructure information; and amending RCW 42.56.420.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 Sec. 1. RCW 42.56.420 and 2023 c 404 s 3 are each amended to 5 read as follows:

6 The following information relating to security is exempt from 7 disclosure under this chapter:

8 (1) Those portions of records assembled, prepared, or maintained 9 to prevent, mitigate, or respond to criminal terrorist acts, which are acts that significantly disrupt the conduct of government or of 10 11 the general civilian population of the state or the United States and 12 that manifest an extreme indifference to human life, the public which 13 disclosure of would have a substantial likelihood of 14 threatening public safety, consisting of:

(a) Specific and unique vulnerability assessments or specific and unique response or deployment plans, including compiled underlying data collected in preparation of or essential to the assessments, or to the response or deployment plans; and

(b) Records not subject to public disclosure under federal law that are shared by federal or international agencies, and information prepared from national security briefings provided to state or local

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1 government officials related to domestic preparedness for acts of 2 terrorism;

(2) Those portions of records containing specific and unique 3 vulnerability assessments or specific and unique emergency and escape 4 response plans at a city, county, or state adult or juvenile 5 6 correctional facility, or secure facility for persons civilly confined under chapter 71.09 RCW, the public disclosure of which 7 would have a substantial likelihood of threatening the security of a 8 city, county, or state adult or juvenile correctional facility, 9 secure facility for persons civilly confined under chapter 71.09 RCW, 10 11 or any individual's safety;

12 (3) Information compiled by school districts or schools in the 13 development of their comprehensive safe school plans under RCW 14 28A.320.125, to the extent that they identify specific 15 vulnerabilities of school districts and each individual school;

16 (4) Information regarding the public and private infrastructure 17 and security of computer and telecommunications networks, consisting 18 of security passwords, security access codes and programs, access codes for secure software applications, security and service recovery 19 plans, security risk assessments, and security test results to the 20 21 extent that they identify specific system vulnerabilities, and other 22 such information the release of which may increase risk to the 23 confidentiality, integrity, or availability of security, information technology infrastructure, or assets; 24

(5) The system security and emergency preparedness plan required under RCW 35.21.228, 35A.21.300, 36.01.210, 36.57.120, 36.57A.170, and 81.112.180; ((and))

(6) Personally identifiable information of employees, and other security information, of a private cloud service provider that has entered into a criminal justice information services agreement as contemplated by the United States department of justice criminal justice information services security policy, as authorized by 28 C.F.R. Part 20; and

34 <u>(7) (a) Critical energy infrastructure information in possession</u> 35 <u>of any agency.</u>

36 (b) The following definitions apply for purposes of this 37 subsection:

38 (i) "Critical energy infrastructure" means systems and assets, 39 whether physical or virtual, the incapacity or destruction of which

40 threatens to disrupt or diminish the supply of energy to the extent

1 that the public health, safety, and general welfare may be jeopardized; 2 3 (ii) (A) "Critical energy infrastructure information" means information regarding critical energy infrastructure where the 4 information: 5 6 (I) Records containing actual, potential, or threatened interference with, attacks on, compromise of, or incapacitation of 7 critical energy infrastructure or protected systems by either 8 physical or computer-based attacks, or other similar conduct that 9 violates federal, state, or local law, harms interstate commerce of 10 Washington state or the United States, or threatens to disrupt or 11 diminish the supply of energy to the extent that the public health, 12 safety, and general welfare may be jeopardized; or 13 14 (II) Does not simply give the general location of or relay publicly available information about the critical energy 15 16 infrastructure.

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
