AN ACT Relating to providing school districts and public schools with the assistance, resources, and training necessary to coordinate comprehensive supports across the behavioral health continuum for their students; and amending RCW 28A.310.510.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 Sec. 1. RCW 28A.310.510 and 2019 c 333 s 3 are each amended to 7 read as follows:

8 (1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this 9 specific purpose, each educational service district must establish a 10 regional school safety center as provided in this section.

11 (2) The regional school safety centers working in collaboration 12 with one another and the state school safety center, established in 13 RCW 28A.300.630, form a statewide network for school safety. The 14 purpose of this statewide network is to provide coordination of 15 school safety efforts throughout the state and to provide school 16 safety resources to the school districts in each educational service 17 district region.

office 18 (3) Working in collaboration with the of the superintendent of public instruction and the statewide network, each 19 regional school safety center must provide to the school districts in 20 21 its region:

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(a) Behavioral health coordination that, at a minimum, includes:

(i) Providing support for school district development and
implementation of plans for recognition, initial screening, and
response to emotional or behavioral distress in students as required
by RCW 28A.320.127;

6 (ii) Suicide prevention training for school counselors, school7 psychologists, and school social workers;

8 (iii) Facilitating partnerships and coordination between school 9 districts, public schools, and existing regional and local systems of 10 behavioral health care services and supports in order to increase 11 student and family access to the services and supports;

12 (iv) Assisting school districts and public schools in building 13 capacity to identify and support students in need of behavioral 14 health care services and to link students and families with 15 community-based behavioral health care services;

16 (v) Identifying, sharing, and integrating, to the extent 17 practicable, behavioral and physical health care service delivery 18 models;

19 (vi) Providing medicaid billing related training, technical 20 assistance, and coordination between school districts; and

(vii) Guidance in implementing best practices in response to, and to recover from, the suicide or attempted suicide of a student;

23 (b) School-based threat assessment coordination that, at a 24 minimum, includes:

(i) Providing training and technical assistance regarding the use of the model policy and procedure to establish a school-based threat assessment program, developed under RCW 28A.300.640;

(ii) Assisting with ongoing identification and implementation of best practices for school-based threat assessment programs, described under RCW 28A.320.123; and

(iii) Building partnerships with community partners, such as behavioral health providers, law enforcement agencies, emergency responders, juvenile justice organizations, and child welfare agencies, for the purpose of implementing school-based threat assessment programs that comply with best practices;

36 (c) Assistance with coordinating other entities in the region to
 37 provide support to school districts before emergencies occur;

(d) Plan, coordinate, and deliver the trainings required by this
 subsection (3), and other school district staff trainings related to
 school safety, in order to maximize quality professional learning;

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(e) Technical assistance to school districts seeking funding for
 first aid, health, and safety and security resources;

3 (f) Information about systems and programs that allow anonymous 4 reporting of student concerns;

5 (g) Real-time support and assistance for school districts in 6 crisis, such as offering information, technical assistance associated 7 with best practices, and staff trained in responding to school 8 emergencies;

9 (h) Develop collaborative relationships with community 10 organizations, private schools, businesses, and others interested in 11 supporting safe schools; and

12 (i) Other services consistent with state and federal school 13 safety requirements, including comprehensive safe school planning 14 under RCW 28A.320.125.

15 (4) The regional school safety centers may, based on the needs of 16 the school districts in their region, and in collaboration with 17 emergency responders, provide assistance to, and facilitate 18 communication between, emergency responders and schools or school 19 districts impacted by emergency situations.

(5) (a) The regional school safety center of each educational 20 service district, the department of health, the office of the 21 superintendent of public instruction, the academic centers for 22 23 excellence, and representatives of associations representing behavioral health professionals working in public schools shall 24 25 collaborate to provide administrative support to the technical assistance and training network established in subsection (6) of this 26 27 section to coordinate comprehensive supports across the behavioral 28 health continuum for their students. At a minimum this administrative 29 support must include:

30 <u>(i) Providing strategic oversight to ensure the priorities of the</u> 31 <u>network align with state frameworks, systemwide goals, and statutory</u> 32 <u>requirements;</u>

33 (ii) Managing grants and contracts related to the network;

34 <u>(iii) Establishing criteria for recruiting and selecting network</u> 35 partners;

36 <u>(iv) Analyzing state and local data to identify priorities for</u>
37 the network; and

38 <u>(v) Promoting, organizing, and coordinating network activities,</u>
39 <u>as necessary.</u>

1 (b) The regional school safety centers, through the educational service districts, shall create and maintain the infrastructure of 2 3 the network, including administering any grants or contracts managed by the network. 4 (c) The regional school safety centers must consult with the 5 6 tribal leaders congress on education and an association representing 7 Washington's federally recognized tribes to ensure that the technical assistance, resources, and training provided through the network are 8 culturally responsive. 9 (d) The regional school safety centers, through the educational 10 service districts, may contract with organizations equipped with the 11 infrastructure and expertise to effectively support and coordinate 12 sustainable, coherent, and cohesive behavioral health initiatives 13 within Washington's public education system. 14 (6) (a) A technical assistance and training network is established 15 16 to provide school districts and public schools with the technical 17 assistance, resources, and training necessary to coordinate comprehensive supports across the behavioral health continuum for 18 19 their students. 20 (b) The network must be comprised of statewide and regional 21 partners with specific experience and capacity to provide behavioral 22 health-related training and technical assistance to schools. Partners 23 may include the academic centers of excellence, federally recognized 24 tribes, and associations representing behavioral health professionals 25 working in public schools. (c) The network must provide direct assistance to school 26 districts and public schools for establishing, implementing, and 27 28 evaluating efforts to support students across the behavioral health 29 continuum. Assistance the network may provide to school districts and public schools includes: 30 31 (i) Conducting, or supporting local administration of, needs 32 assessments to identify the behavioral health needs of students, including the cultural and contextual factors affecting students' 33 34 mental health; (ii) Providing professional development and other training 35 opportunities for school district and public school staff on topics 36 such as: Implementation science, mental health awareness, trauma-37 informed practices, and effective intervention strategies; 38 39 (iii) Assisting school districts and public schools in designing 40 and implementing evidence-based behavioral health programs tailored

1 to their specific needs and resources, in alignment with school plans 2 for recognizing and responding to emotional or behavioral distress in 3 students under RCW 28A.320.127; (iv) Creating and distributing resources, such as guides, 4 toolkits, and intervention materials, to support school district and 5 6 public school behavioral health initiatives, including prevention 7 efforts; (v) Helping school districts and public schools develop and 8 9 revise policies and procedures related to behavioral health support, crisis intervention, and student well-being; 10 (vi) Facilitating behavioral health-related connections and 11 12 partnerships with community-based organizations, federally recognized tribes, and state and local agencies to enhance support for students, 13 14 leverage additional resources, and support schools in establishing and maintaining effective referral pathways; 15 (vii) Contracting with organizations equipped to provide 16 17 behavioral telehealth services to students in compliance with chapter 18 18.134 RCW; 19 (viii) Providing strategies and tools for involving families and 20 communities in behavioral health initiatives that are culturally responsive to foster a holistic approach to student support, 21 22 including informing them about available services and those that may be provided to children without parental consent; 23 24 (ix) Offering quidance on crisis response strategies and 25 behavioral health crisis intervention for school district and public 26 school staff and students; and 27 (x) Providing ongoing consultation and support to school districts and public schools as they implement and improve their 28 29 behavioral health systems, helping to address challenges and sustain 30 efforts over time. 31 (7) For purposes of this section, the following definitions 32 apply: 33 (a) "Network" means the technical assistance and training network 34 established in this section. (b) "Public schools" has the same meaning as in RCW 28A.150.010. 35

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
