1 AN ACT Relating to establishing a statewide low-income energy
2 assistance program; amending RCW 19.405.120; adding new sections to
3 chapter 43.330 RCW; and creating a new section.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** (1) The legislature finds that there is an
6 urgent need for stronger policy and a new program option to secure
7 universally accessible low-income energy bill assistance and reduce
8 the \$275,000,000 annual energy burden in Washington. Many income-
9 eligible households do not have sufficient support. The department of
10 commerce November 2024 study of options for a statewide energy
11 assistance program in Washington lays out core features of a just
12 system to expand and secure access to energy affordability measures.
13 To address present and widening disparities in household access to
14 energy assistance will require easier applications, safe data
15 sharing, low barrier eligibility determinations, systematic processes
16 for filling in gaps in the reach of existing programs, and guaranteed
17 funding sources. The recommended program design promotes a more
18 centralized approach to energy assistance. Key elements include those
19 that reduce administrative burdens, but also improve the experience
20 and likelihood that an eligible household receives assistance.

1 (2) It is the intent of the legislature for the department of
2 commerce to phase in this program across utilities and home heating
3 fuel types, prioritizing areas of the state with a disproportionate
4 share of low-income households in energy assistance need and where
5 low-income monthly bill assistance programs targeted at addressing
6 energy assistance need are lacking.

7 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 43.330
8 RCW to read as follows:

9 The definitions in this section apply throughout sections 3 and 4
10 of this act unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

11 (1) "Low-income" has the same meaning as in RCW 19.405.020.

12 (2) "Community action council" has the same meaning as "community
13 action agency" in RCW 43.185C.010.

14 (3) "Energy assistance" means monetary assistance, such as a
15 grant program or discounts for low-income households, that lowers a
16 low-income household's energy burden.

17 (4) "Energy burden" has the same meaning as in RCW 19.405.020.

18 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** A new section is added to chapter 43.330
19 RCW to read as follows:

20 (1) The statewide low-income energy assistance program is
21 established within the department. The purpose of the program is to
22 reduce energy burden for low-income households in Washington. The
23 department must begin providing energy assistance through the program
24 by October 1, 2027. The department, in consultation with the
25 utilities and transportation commission, must write rules to
26 implement this section.

27 (2) In accordance with subsection (4) of this section, the
28 department must establish enrollment details which must include, but
29 are not limited to:

30 (a) All low-income households are eligible to participate in the
31 program;

32 (b) Low-income households may apply directly to the program;

33 (c) Low-income households may apply to the utility from which
34 they receive service if the utility has voluntarily chosen to serve
35 as coadministrator of the program;

36 (d) Low-income households may apply through a community action
37 council for state-funded energy assistance in partnership with the
38 participating utility;

1 (e) Low-income households may self-attest that they meet income
2 qualifications;

3 (f) The department may verify that applicants and participants
4 meet the income qualifications, and may work with utilities and
5 community action councils to conduct this verification;

6 (g) There is no risk to eligibility based on immigration status
7 or income self-attestation; and

8 (h) The department must explore auto-enrollment of known eligible
9 households.

10 (3) The department may enter into agreements with utilities to
11 serve as coadministrators of the statewide low-income energy
12 assistance program for the purposes of enhancing customer engagement,
13 facilitating enrollment of eligible customers, and sharing
14 administrative duties with the department. Serving as a
15 coadministrator is voluntary for utilities. If a utility chooses to
16 be a coadministrator, the utility may also choose to be the lead
17 coadministrator.

18 (4) Subject to appropriation, the department must phase in the
19 program across utilities and home heating fuel types, prioritizing
20 areas of the state with a disproportionate share of low-income
21 households in energy assistance need and where low-income monthly
22 bill assistance programs targeted at addressing energy assistance
23 need are lacking.

24 (5) (a) The department must administer the program by providing
25 funds to utilities that participate in the program. The utilities
26 must pass these funds on to their low-income residential customers
27 and show the energy assistance on the customers' monthly bills.

28 (b) (i) A utility with more than 25,000 customers in the state
29 that participates in the program must provide energy assistance to
30 customers and then seek reimbursement from the department equal to
31 the energy assistance provided. The department must provide
32 reimbursement within 30 days of receipt of a reimbursement request
33 from the utility.

34 (ii) A utility serving up to 25,000 customers in the state that
35 participates in the program may request that the department provide
36 funds for energy assistance in advance of the utility providing the
37 energy assistance to customers. The department may provide energy
38 assistance upfront with appropriate contractual agreements.

1 (c) The discount or dollar amount that the department provides to
2 low-income households must be tiered to provide the most energy
3 assistance to the households with the greatest need.

4 (d) The department and each utility's obligation to provide
5 energy assistance under the statewide program is based on available
6 funding appropriated for this specific purpose. It is the intent of
7 the legislature that sustained funding shall be provided to meet low-
8 income household needs from climate commitment act auction revenues
9 or other state general fund dollars.

10 (e) The department must ensure that benefit levels provided
11 through the statewide low-income energy assistance program are not
12 less than what a customer enrolled in their utility program received
13 from their utility program in the previous year.

14 (6) A utility participating in the statewide low-income energy
15 assistance program may not reduce the level of low-income energy
16 assistance, discounts, or affordability benefits it provided in the
17 previous calendar year as a result of participation in the statewide
18 program.

19 (7) The department must submit a report to the governor and
20 legislature that includes a program evaluation of the statewide low-
21 income energy assistance program by July 1st in every even-numbered
22 year. The advisory group established in section 4 of this act must
23 advise the department on the program evaluation, which must include
24 meaningful metrics around equitable access and overall program
25 delivery.

26 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 4.** A new section is added to chapter 43.330
27 RCW to read as follows:

28 The department must establish an advisory group for the statewide
29 low-income energy assistance program, which must include, but is not
30 limited to, members from low-income households, and at least one
31 member each from a community organization, community action council,
32 an investor-owned utility, and a consumer-owned utility. The advisory
33 group must be composed of a diverse group of stakeholders and must be
34 established by the department before program implementation to help
35 inform program development. The advisory group must advise the
36 department throughout program implementation and on the program
37 evaluation required in section 3 of this act.

1 **Sec. 5.** RCW 19.405.120 and 2019 c 288 s 12 are each amended to
2 read as follows:

3 (1) It is the intent of the legislature to demonstrate progress
4 toward ~~((making energy assistance funds available to low-income~~
5 ~~households)) addressing the disproportionate impacts of home energy
6 bills on low-income households and reduce energy assistance need
7 consistent with the policies identified in this section.~~

8 (2)(a) An electric utility must make programs and funding
9 available for energy assistance to low-income households by July 31,
10 2021.

11 **(b) An electric utility's participation in the statewide low-**
12 **income energy assistance program may supplement, but may not replace,**
13 **the requirements outlined in this section.**

14 (3) Each utility must demonstrate progress in providing energy
15 assistance pursuant to the assessment and plans in subsection ~~((4))~~
16 (5) of this section. To the extent practicable, priority must be
17 given to low-income households with a higher energy burden.

18 ~~((3))~~ (4) Beginning July 31, 2020, the department must collect
19 and aggregate data estimating the energy burden and energy assistance
20 need and reported energy assistance for each electric utility, in
21 order to improve agency and utility efforts to serve low-income
22 households with energy assistance. The department must update the
23 aggregated data on a biennial basis, make it publicly accessible on
24 its internet website and, to the extent practicable, include
25 geographic attributes.

26 (a) The aggregated data published by the department must include,
27 but is not limited to:

28 (i) The estimated number and demographic characteristics of
29 households served by energy assistance for each utility and the
30 dollar value of the assistance;

31 (ii) The estimated level of energy burden and energy assistance
32 need among customers served, accounting for household income and
33 other drivers of energy burden;

34 (iii) Housing characteristics including housing type, home
35 vintage, and fuel types; and

36 (iv) Energy efficiency potential.

37 (b) Each utility must disclose information to the department for
38 use under this subsection, including:

1 (i) The amount and type of energy assistance and the number and
2 type of households, if applicable, served for programs administered
3 by the utility;

4 (ii) The amount of money passed through to third parties that
5 administer energy assistance programs; ~~((and))~~

6 (iii) The amount of money used to mitigate rate impacts to low-
7 income customers and a description of any other benefits provided to
8 ratepayers from the sale of allowances as required under RCW
9 70A.65.120(4), if applicable; and

10 (iv) Subject to availability, any other information related to
11 the utility's low-income assistance programs that is requested by the
12 department.

13 (c) The information required by (b) of this subsection must be
14 from the electric utility's most recent completed budget period and
15 in a form, timeline, and manner as prescribed by the department.

16 ~~((4))~~ (5)(a) In addition to the requirements under subsection
17 ~~((3))~~ (4) of this section, each electric utility must submit
18 biennially to the department an assessment of:

19 (i) The programs and mechanisms used by the utility to reduce
20 energy burden ~~((and the effectiveness of those programs and~~
21 ~~mechanisms in both short-term and sustained energy burden~~
22 ~~reductions))~~;

23 (ii) The outreach strategies used to encourage participation of
24 eligible households, including consultation with community-based
25 organizations and Indian tribes as appropriate, and comprehensive
26 enrollment campaigns that are linguistically and culturally
27 appropriate to the customers they serve in vulnerable populations;
28 and

29 (iii) A cumulative assessment of ~~((previous funding levels for~~
30 ~~energy assistance compared to the funding levels needed to meet: (A)~~
31 ~~Sixty percent of the current energy assistance need, or increasing~~
32 ~~energy assistance by fifteen percent over the amount provided in~~
33 ~~2018, whichever is greater, by 2030; and (B) ninety percent of the~~
34 ~~current energy assistance need by 2050)) program participation rates
35 and funding levels compared to what is needed to meet energy
36 assistance need.~~

37 (b) The assessment required in (a) of this subsection must
38 include a plan to improve the effectiveness of the assessed
39 mechanisms and strategies toward meeting the energy assistance need.

1 ~~((5))~~ (6) A consumer-owned utility may enter into an agreement
2 with a public university, community-based organization, or joint
3 operating agency organized under chapter 43.52 RCW to aggregate the
4 disclosures required in this section and submit the assessment
5 required in subsections ~~((3))~~ (4) and ~~((4))~~ (5) of this section.
6 ~~((6))~~ (7)(a) The department must submit a biennial report to
7 the legislature that:
8 (i) Aggregates information into a statewide summary of energy
9 assistance programs, energy burden, and energy assistance need;
10 (ii) Identifies and quantifies current expenditures on low-income
11 energy assistance; and
12 (iii) Evaluates the effectiveness of additional ~~((optimal))~~
13 mechanisms for energy assistance including, but not limited to,
14 customer rates, a low-income specific discount, system benefits
15 charges, and public and private funds.
16 (b) The department must also assess mechanisms to prioritize
17 energy assistance towards low-income households with a higher energy
18 burden.
19 ~~((7))~~ (8) Nothing in this section may be construed to restrict
20 the rate-making authority of the commission or the governing body of
21 a consumer-owned utility as otherwise provided by law.

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
