SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 5356

AN ACT Relating to training provided by the criminal justice 1 2 training commission on a victim-centered, trauma-informed approach to 3 interacting with victims and responding to calls involving genderbased violence 4 or sexual violence; amending RCW 43.101.270, 5 43.101.272, and 43.101.273; reenacting and amending RCW 43.101.276; and providing an effective date. 6

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

8 **Sec. 1.** RCW 43.101.270 and 2015 c 286 s 2 are each amended to 9 read as follows:

10 (1) Each year the criminal justice training commission shall 11 offer an intensive, integrated training session on investigating and 12 prosecuting sexual assault cases. The training shall place particular 13 emphasis on the development of professionalism and sensitivity 14 towards the victim and the victim's family.

15 (2) The commission shall seek advice from the Washington 16 association of prosecuting attorneys, the Washington defender 17 association, the Washington association of sheriffs and police 18 chiefs, ((and)) the Washington coalition of sexual assault programs, 19 and the student achievement council.

20 (3) The training shall be an integrated approach to sexual 21 assault cases so that prosecutors, law enforcement, defenders, <u>Title</u> 1 <u>IX investigators that serve institutions of higher education</u>, and 2 victim advocates can all benefit from the training.

3 (4) The training shall be self-supporting through fees charged to4 the participants of the training.

5 (5) The training shall include a reference to the possibility 6 that a court may allow children under the age of ((fourteen)) <u>18</u> to 7 testify in a room outside the presence of the defendant and the jury 8 pursuant to RCW 9A.44.150.

9 Sec. 2. RCW 43.101.272 and 2023 c 197 s 3 are each amended to 10 read as follows:

11 (1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the commission shall provide ongoing specialized, 12 13 intensive, and integrative training for persons responsible for investigating sexual assault and other gender-based violence 14 15 involving adult victims, including persons responsible for regularly 16 investigating prohibited conduct at institutions of higher education under Title IX of the education amendments of 1972, 20 U.S.C. Sec. 17 18 1681-1683, and as thereafter amended, and the highest ranking supervisors and commanders overseeing sexual assault and other 19 20 gender-based violence investigations. The training must be based on a 21 victim-centered, trauma-informed approach to responding to sexual assault. Among other subjects, the training must include content on 22 23 neurobiology of trauma and trauma-informed interviewing, the 24 counseling, and investigative techniques.

25 (2) The training must: Be based on research-based practices and 26 standards; offer participants an opportunity to practice interview skills and receive feedback from instructors; minimize the trauma of 27 all persons who are interviewed during abuse investigations; provide 28 methods of reducing the number of investigative interviews necessary 29 whenever possible; assure, to the extent possible, that investigative 30 31 interviews are thorough, objective, and complete; recognize needs of special populations; recognize the nature and consequences of 32 victimization; require investigative interviews to be conducted in a 33 34 manner most likely to permit the interviewed persons the maximum 35 emotional comfort under the circumstances; address record retention 36 and retrieval; address documentation of investigative interviews; and 37 educate investigators on the best practices for notifying victims of 38 the results of forensic analysis of sexual assault kits and other

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1 significant events in the investigative process, including for active 2 investigations and cold cases.

(3) In developing the training, the commission shall seek advice 3 from the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs, the 4 Washington coalition of sexual assault programs, and experts on 5 6 sexual assault, gender-based violence, and the neurobiology of trauma. The commission shall consult with the Washington association 7 of prosecuting attorneys and the student achievement council in an 8 effort to design training containing consistent elements for all 9 professionals engaged in interviewing and interacting with sexual 10 assault victims in the criminal justice system. 11

12 (4) Officers assigned to regularly investigate sexual assault and 13 other gender-based violence involving adult victims and the highest 14 ranking supervisors and commanders overseeing those investigations 15 shall complete the training within one year of being assigned.

16 Sec. 3. RCW 43.101.273 and 2023 c 197 s 6 are each amended to 17 read as follows:

(1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the commission shall, in partnership with the special resource prosecutor under RCW 43.101.279, develop and conduct specialized, intensive, and integrative training for persons responsible for prosecuting sexual assault cases involving adult victims.

24 (2) The training must:

(a) Use a victim-centered, trauma-informed approach to prosecuting sexual assaults including, but not limited to, the following goals: Recognizing the nature and consequences of victimization; prioritizing the safety and well-being of victims; and recognizing the needs of special populations;

30 (b) Include content on the neurobiology of trauma and trauma-31 informed interviewing, counseling, investigative, and prosecution 32 techniques;

33 (c) Offer participants an opportunity to practice interview and 34 trial skills, including receiving feedback from instructors;

35 (d) Share best practices for communicating with victims 36 throughout the criminal justice process;

37 (e) Include additional content relevant to and informed by best 38 practices for improving outcomes in sexual assault prosecutions, as 39 deemed appropriate by the commission;

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1 (f) Take into account the training under RCW 43.101.272 in order 2 to provide consistent and ((complimentary)) complementary training 3 for investigators and prosecutors;

4 (g) Be designed to qualify for some continuing legal education 5 credits through the Washington state bar association; and

6 (h) Be offered at least once per calendar year and be deployed in 7 different locations across the state, or through some other broadly 8 accessible means, in order to improve access to the training for 9 prosecutors serving in small offices or rural areas.

10 Sec. 4. RCW 43.101.276 and 2023 c 197 s 4 and 2023 c 168 s 4 are 11 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

(1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the commission shall develop <u>two curricula for</u> peace officer training <u>as follows:</u>

15 <u>(a) Training for peace officers working on patrol</u> on a victim-16 centered, trauma-informed approach to interacting with victims and 17 responding to calls involving ((gender-based)) <u>sexual</u> violence; and

18 (b) Training for peace officers on a victim-centered, trauma-19 informed approach to interacting with victims and responding to calls 20 involving gender-based violence.

(2) The curriculum for both subsection (1)(a) and (b) of this 21 section must: Be designed for deployment and use within individual 22 law enforcement agencies; include features allowing for it to be used 23 24 in different environments, which may include multimedia or video components; and allow for law enforcement agencies to host it in 25 small segments at different times over several days or weeks, 26 27 including roll calls. The training must include components on available resources for victims including, but not limited to, 28 29 material on and references to community-based victim advocates.

30 $((\frac{2}{2}))$ <u>(3)(a)</u> In developing the training <u>for interacting with</u> 31 <u>victims and responding to calls involving sexual violence</u>, the 32 commission shall seek advice from the Washington association of 33 sheriffs and police chiefs, the Washington coalition of sexual 34 assault programs, and experts on sexual assault((, gender-based 35 violence,)) and the neurobiology of trauma.

36 (((3))) <u>(b) All peace officers working on patrol shall complete</u> 37 <u>the training under subsection (1)(a) of this section within one year</u> 38 <u>of patrol assignment and at least once every three years thereafter.</u>

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1 <u>(4)(a) In developing the training for interacting with victims</u> 2 <u>and responding to calls involving gender-based violence, the</u> 3 <u>commission shall seek advice from the Washington association of</u> 4 <u>sheriffs and police chiefs and experts on gender-based violence and</u> 5 <u>the neurobiology of trauma.</u>

6 (b) All peace officers shall complete the training under 7 <u>subsection (1)(b) of</u> this section at least once every three years.

8 (((4))) <u>(5)</u> With the exception of the state parks and recreation 9 commission, the training requirements under this section do not apply 10 to limited authority Washington law enforcement agencies as defined 11 in RCW 10.93.020 whose authority does not include the investigation 12 of sexual assaults or gender-based violence.

13 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. This act takes effect July 1, 2026.

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
