WHEREAS, Women's sports promote physical, mental, and emotional well-being, encouraging young girls and women to pursue excellence, develop leadership skills, and serve as role models for future generations; and

WHEREAS, Since the passage of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, participation in women's sports at the high school and collegiate levels has increased by over 1,000 percent, contributing to the remarkable growth in the popularity, visibility, and power of women's sports, resulting in increased attendance and expanded media coverage at women's sporting events; and

WHEREAS, Prior to the passage of Title IX, fewer than 300,000 girls participated in high school sports, whereas by 2023, that number had grown to 3.4 million, and the number of female athletes in college athletics increased from 30,000 in 1972 to 215,000 in 2023; and

WHEREAS, The growing popularity of women's sports from collegiate athletics to professional leagues has fostered greater visibility, recognition, and financial support, contributing to the empowerment of women across the nation and inspiring a new generation of female athletes; and

21 WHEREAS, The continued success of women's sports is a testament 22 to the hard work, dedication, and perseverance of athletes, coaches,

and support staff who have worked tirelessly to build competitive, fair, and inclusive opportunities for female athletes; and

WHEREAS, Spokane was proudly selected to host elite female college basketball teams from across the country for the NCAA's Sweet 16 and Elite 8 series, showcasing the extraordinary talent and competitive spirit of women's athletics on a national stage; and

WHEREAS, Female athletes have flourished through opportunities to compete with each other rather than competing with biological men because it often puts women at a disadvantage due to biological males' inherent physiological advantages, such as greater muscle mass, bone density, and lung capacity, which can impact competitive balance and undermine equal opportunities for women; and

WHEREAS, Former competitive swimmer Riley Gaines, a 12-time All-American and 5-time SEC Champion, tied for 5th place in the 200-yard freestyle final at the 2022 NCAA Women's Swimming Championships and has since become a prominent and outspoken advocate for fairness in women's sports; and

WHEREAS, Young female athletes have demonstrated their concerns about safety and fairness by protesting biological males competing in women's sports, including two female basketball players from Tumwater, Washington, who chose to sit out after their school allowed a biological male from a competing school to play against their team; and

WHEREAS, Tennis legend and 18-time Grand Slam champion Martina Navratilova, a member of the LGBTQ community, has been a vocal advocate for maintaining fairness in women's sports by opposing the inclusion of biological males in female categories, emphasizing the importance of preserving equal opportunity for women; and

WHEREAS, The principle of fairness remains fundamental in all sports, ensuring that all athletes compete on a level playing field and are given the opportunity to achieve their fullest potential;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Washington State Senate acknowledge the profound and lasting impact of Title IX on women's sports and the role athletics have played in addressing discrimination and systemic barriers faced by women, giving female athletes the visibility they deserve; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Washington State Senate honor the contributions of female athletes across the United States who
