WAC 232-12-001 Definition of terms. Definitions used in rules of the commission are defined in RCW 77.08.010. In addition, unless the context clearly requires otherwise:

(1) Snagging, gaffing, or spearing means: An effort to impale game fish in a part of its body other than its mouth by use of hooks or other devices.

(2) A valid license, permit, tag, stamp or punchcard means: A license, permit, tag, stamp, or punchcard that was issued to the bearer for the current season by the commission and is required to hunt, fish or possess wildlife and has not been altered except as provided by rule of the commission.

(3) Hook means: One single, double, or treble hook.

(4) Barbless hook means: A single, pointed hook from which all barbs have been filed off, pinched down, removed or deleted when manufactured.

(5) Falconry means: Possession, control, or use of a raptor for the purpose of hunting and free flight training.

(6) Anadromous game fish means:

- (a) Steelhead trout, *Oncorhynchus mykiss*
- (b) Searun cutthroat, *Oncorhynchus clarkii*
- (c) Searun Dolly Varden, *Salvelinus malma*

(7) Handgun means: Any pistol, revolver or short firearm with a barrel length of less than sixteen inches and does not have a shoulder stock.

(8) Lure or fly means: A manufactured article constructed of feathers, hair, fiber, wood, metal, glass, cork, leather, rubber or plastic which does not use scent and/or flavoring to attract fish. A lure or fly may not have more than three hooks attached. When fishing with a lure or fly, fish may be released until the catch limit is retained.

(9) Bait means: Any substance which attracts fish or wildlife by scent and/or flavor. Bait includes any device made of feathers, hair, fiber, wood, metal, glass, cork, leather, rubber or plastic which uses scent and/or flavoring to attract fish or wildlife.

(10) Steelhead means: A searun rainbow trout over twenty inches in length.

(11) Possession limit means: A two-day catch limit of game fish allowed to be retained in the field or in transit.

(12) Selective fishery regulations: Only artificial flies or lures with a barbless hook are allowed; bait is prohibited; fish may be released until the catch limit is retained. No one may fish from any floating device equipped with a motor, except where specifically allowed under special regulations for individual waters. If any fish has swallowed the hook or is hooked in the gill, eye or tongue, it should be kept if legal to do so.

(13) Fly fishing means: In waters designated as "fly fishing only" an angler may use: A dry fly, bucktail fly, wet fly, nymph or streamer with not more than one, single-pointed barbless hook; a conventional fly line at least twenty-five feet in length, with a back-up line of any kind behind the fly line. In waters designated as "fly fishing only" an angler may not fish from any floating device equipped with a motor, except where specifically allowed under special regulations for individual waters. When fishing with a lure or fly, fish may be released until the catch limit is retained.

(14) Boat fishing: Fishing while in or on a boat, raft, or any other floating device.

(15) Catch-and-release: A type of angling where none of the fish caught are retained by the angler.

(16) Daily catch limit: The maximum number of fish of a given species and size which a person may legally retain in a single day. When you are fishing with bait, all legal trout are counted as part of the daily catch limit, whether kept or released. Steelhead may be caught and released while using bait until the daily catch limit is retained.

(17) Fish in possession: Any fish retained, secure from escape, whether dead or alive. Bass or Walleye may be caught, retained, and released alive from a livewell until a daily catch limit is in possession.

(18) Mouth of stream, river, or slough: Those waters upstream of a line projected between the outermost uplands at the mouth. Outermost uplands means those lands are not covered by water during an ordinary high water.

(19) Maximum size limit: The longest length of a fish of a given species that an angler may keep, measured from snout to tip of tail (not fork).

(20) Minimum size limit: The shortest length of a fish of a given species that an angler may keep, measured from snout to tip of tail (not fork).

(21) Night closure: On those waters where night closures are specified, it is unlawful to fish from one hour after official sunset to one hour before official sunrise.

(22) Slough: Any swamp, marsh, bog, pond, side-channel, or backwater connected to a river by water. Many waters commonly called sloughs are not connected to a river and, therefore, are considered lakes.

(23) Wild cutthroat release: Only cutthroat trout with missing adipose fins may be possessed. There must be a healed scar in the location of the missing fin.

(24) Wild steelhead release: Only steelhead with missing adipose or ventral fins may be possessed. There must be a healed scar in the location of the missing fin. It is unlawful to use a gaff hook to land steelhead in waters designated "wild steelhead release."

(25) Free fishing weekends: The weekends corresponding with National Fishing Week have been declared as family fishing weekends in Washington. On these weekends fishing licenses will not be required to fish for game fish, except steelhead trout. These free fishing days are valid for everyone, regardless of residency or age. All other regulations remain in effect. Only waters open to fishing may be fished; lure and/or bait restrictions and size and catch limits currently in place must be followed.

WAC 232-12-017 Deleterious exotic wildlife. (1) The following animals are hereby designated as deleterious exotic wildlife:

- (a) Fish
 - (i) In the family Claridae, (walking catfish) all members of the family.
 - (ii) In the family Cyprinidae, (diploid grass carp.) *Ctenopharyngodon idella*
 - (iii) In the family Amiidae, (bowfin, mudfish or grinnel) *Amia calva*
 - (iv) In the family Characidae, the piranha (also pirameba, caribe, pira, piraya, chupita, rodoleira, palometa), all species of the genera *Serrasalmus*, *Rooseveltiella* and *Pygocentrus*
 - (v) In the family Cyprinidae, the rudd (*Scardinius erythrophthalmus*) and Ide (silver orfe or golden orfe (*Leuciscus idus*))
 - (vi) In the family Lepiosteidae, the gar-pikes
 - (vii) In the family Channidae, the snakeheads (China fish) and all forms of the genus *Channa* (*Ophicephalus*)
- (b) Amphibians
 - (i) In the family Pipidae, the African clawed frog (*Xenopus laevis*)
- (c) Birds
 - (i) In the family Anatidae, the mute swan (*Cygnus olor*)
- (d) Mammals
 - (i) In the family Viverridae, the mongoose (all members of the genus *Herpestes*)
 - (ii) In the family Suidae, the wild boar[,] (*Sus scrofa* and all wild hybrids)
 - (iii) In the family Tayassuidae, the collared peccary (javelina) (*Tayassu tajacu*)
 - (iv) In the family Bovidae, all members and hybrids of the following genera: *Rupicapra* (Chamois); *Hemitragus* (Tahr); *Capra* (goats, ibexes except domestic goat *Capra hircus*); *Ammotragus* (Barbary sheep or Aoudad); *Ovis* (sheep), except domestic sheep *Ovis aries*; *Damaliscus* (Sassabies); *Alcelaphus buselaphus* (Hartebeest); *Connochaetes* (Wildebeests).
 - (v) In the family Cervidae, the European red deer (*Cervus elaphus elaphus*), all nonnative subspecies of *Cervus elaphus*, and all hybrids with North American elk; Fallow deer (*Dama dama*), Axis deer (*Axix axis*), Rusa deer or Sambar deer (*Cervus unicolor*, *Cervus timorensis*, *Cervus mariannus* and *Cervus alfredi*), Sika deer (*Cervus Nippon*), Reindeer (all members of the Genus *Rangifer* except *Rangifer tarandus caribou*), and Roedeer (all members of the Genus *Capreolus*).

(2) It is unlawful to import into the state, hold, possess, propagate, offer for sale, sell, transfer, or release live specimens of deleterious exotic wildlife, their gametes and/or embryo, except as provided under (3), (4), (5), (6), or (7) below.

(3) Scientific research or display: The director may authorize, by written approval, a person to import into the state, hold, possess, and propagate live specimens of deleterious exotic wildlife for scientific research or for display by zoos or aquariums who are accredited institutional members of the American Association of Zoological Parks and Aquariums (AAZPA) provided:

- (a) The specimens are confined to a secure facility,
- (b) The specimens will not be transferred to any other location within the state, except to other AAZPA accredited facilities with written director approval or as otherwise authorized in writing by the director,

(c) The specimens will be euthanized and all parts incinerated at the end of the project, except federally listed endangered or threatened species may be retained or transferred where in compliance with federal law,

(d) The person will keep such records on the specimens and make such reports as the director may require, and

(e) The person complies with other requirements of this section.

(4) Retention or disposal of existing specimens lawfully in captivity:

(a) Specimens lawfully in captivity prior to January 18, 1991: A person holding exotic wildlife specimens in captivity which were classified by the wildlife commission as deleterious exotic wildlife on or before January 18, 1991 may retain the specimens of such deleterious exotic wildlife such person lawfully possessed prior to January 18, 1991 provided such person complies with subsections (4)(c) through (4)(h) hereunder and the other requirements of this section:

(b) Specimens lawfully in captivity prior to June 20, 1992: A person holding the following deleterious exotic wildlife specimens in captivity which were classified by the wildlife commission as deleterious exotic wildlife by operation of emergency rule filed June 19, 1992 (in the family Bovidae, *Sassabies* (all member of the Genus *Damaliscus*), *Hartebeest* (*Alcelaphus buselaphus*), *Wildebeests* (all members of the Genus *Connochaetes*), *Markhor* (*Capra falconeri*), and *Marcopolo sheep* (*Ovis ammon*); in the family Cervidae, *Fallow deer* (*Dama dama*), *Axis deer* (*Axis axis*), *Sika deer* (*Cervus Nippon*), *Rusa deer* or *Sambar deer* (*Cervus unicolor*, *Cervus timorensis*, *Cervus mariannus* and *Cervus alfredi*)), may retain the specimens of such deleterious exotic wildlife such person lawfully possessed prior to June 20, 1992, and the lawful progeny thereof provided such person complies with subsections (4)(c) through (4)(h) hereunder and the other requirements of this section and except as provided under subsection (7).

(c) The person reported to the director in writing the species, number and location of the specimens as required.

(d) The specimens are confined to a secure facility at the location reported,

(e) Live specimens are not propagated, except at AAZPA accredited facilities with the written permission of the director or as otherwise authorized in writing by the director,

(f) Live specimens shall be neutered, physically separated by sex, and/or rendered infertile by means of contraception, except at AAZPA accredited facilities with the written permission of the director,

(g) Live specimens are not released,

(h) Live specimens are not sold or transferred except:

(i) Live specimens in lawful possession may be permanently removed from the state of Washington or transported directly to slaughter where in accordance with other applicable law,

(ii) Federally listed endangered or threatened species may be transferred to AAZPA accredited facilities where in compliance with federal law,

(iii) Live specimens may be moved to the new primary residence of the possessor with the written approval of the director, provided all other requirements are satisfied and the

total number of locations where animals are held is not increased.

(iv) AAZPA facilities may sell and/or transfer live specimens within the state with the written permission of the director.

(5) Retention or disposal of existing specimens lawfully in captivity prior to February 13, 1993: A person holding exotic wildlife specimens in captivity which are newly classified by the Wildlife Commission as deleterious exotic wildlife by operation of this rule [*Reindeer* (all members of the Genus *Rangifer*, except *Rangifer tarandus caribou*), and *Roedeer* (all members of the Genus *Capreolus*)], may retain the specimens of such deleterious exotic wildlife such person lawfully possessed prior to February 13, 1993, provided:

(a) The person reports to the director in writing by March 31, 1993, and reports annually thereafter, or as otherwise required by the director, the species, number, and location of such specimens,

(b) The person complies with subsections (4)(d) through (4)(h) herein and the other requirements of this section.

(6) The provisions of this section shall not prohibit the importation, possession, propagation, sale, transfer, or release of live specimens of federally listed threatened or endangered species, their gametes and/or embryo, where in compliance with federal law.

(7) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (2), *Fallow deer* (*Dama dama*) and *reindeer* (all members of the Genus *Rangifer*, except *Rangifer tarandus caribou*) may be imported into the state, held, possessed, propagated, offered for sale, sold, and/or transferred provided:

(a) The person complies with subsection (4)(c) through (4)(g) hereunder and the other requirements of this section, except for subsections (4)(e), (4)(f), and (4)(h), and

(b) The person complies with department of agriculture WAC 16-54-035 as now or hereafter amended except:

(i) Animals which have resided at any time east of a line drawn through the eastern boundaries of North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, and the 100th Meridian where it passes through Texas or have had contact with or shared common ground with animals which have resided at any time east of such line shall not be imported into the state of Washington, unless specifically authorized in writing by the directors of the department of agriculture and the department of wildlife.

(c) No specimens affected with any infectious or communicable disease shall be imported into the state unless in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations and unless written permission is obtained from the directors of the department of agriculture and the department of wildlife.

(d) The specimens are confined to a secure facility.

(e) *Reindeer* may not be imported into, held, or possessed in *Ferry*, *Stevens*, or *Pend Oreille* counties or that portion of *Spokane County* north of *Spokane River*.

(8) Escaped animals

(a) Escaped deleterious exotic wildlife, including *Fallow deer* (*Dama dama*), and *Reindeer* (all members of the Genus *Rangifer*, except *Rangifer tarandus caribou*) will be considered a public nuisance. The department or any peace officer may seize, capture, or destroy deleterious exotic wildlife that have escaped the possessor's control. The former possessor shall be responsible for costs incurred by the department in

recovering, maintaining, or disposing of such animals, as well as any damage to the state's wildlife or habitat.

(b) Escapes of deleterious exotic wildlife must be reported immediately to the department.

(c) The recapture or death of escaped deleterious exotic wildlife must be reported immediately to the department.

(9) Secure facility

(a) All deleterious exotic wildlife will be held in a secure facility. For the purpose of this rule, a secure facility is an enclosure so constructed as to prevent danger to the environment or wildlife of the state, including escape of deleterious exotic wildlife specimens or ingress of resident wildlife ungulates (hoofed animals). The adequacy of the facility shall be determined by the director or agents of the director.

(b) For deleterious exotic wildlife listed in subsections (1)(d)(iv) and (1)(d)(v), the "secure facility" must comply with the fencing requirements in subsection (10) unless otherwise authorized by the director in writing.

(10) Fencing requirements

(a) Perimeter fences must be, at a minimum, eight feet above ground level for their entire length. The bottom six feet must be mesh of sufficient size to prevent resident wildlife ungulates (hoofed animals) from entering and deleterious exotic wildlife from escaping. Supplemental wire required to attain a height of eight feet may be smooth, barbed, or woven wire (at least 12-1/2 gauge) with strands spaced not more than six inches apart.

(b) Perimeter fences constructed of high tensile wire must be supported by a post or stay at minimum intervals of eight feet.

(c) Perimeter fences must be at least 12-1/2 gauge woven wire, 14-1/2 gauge high-tensile woven wire, chain link, nonclimbable woven fence, or other fence approved by the director.

(i) If the wire used is not a full eight feet in height, it must be overlapped one row and securely fastened at every other vertical row or woven together with cable.

(d) Electric fencing materials may be used on perimeter fences only as a supplement to conventional fencing materials.

(e) All gates in the perimeter fences must be self-closing, equipped with two locking devices, and installed only in locations that have been approved by the director. Double gates may be required at points in the perimeter fences subject to frequent vehicle traffic that is not related to activities involving the holding of deleterious exotic wildlife.

(f) Posts used in the perimeter fences must be:

(i) Wood (pressure treated), five-inch minimum diameter or an equivalent as approved by the director;

(ii) Spaced no more than twenty-four feet apart with stays or supports at eight foot intervals between the posts;

(iii) Extended at least eight feet above ground level;

(iv) Corners braced with wood or with an equivalent material as approved by the director.

(g) Fences must be maintained at all times to prevent deleterious exotic wildlife from escaping or resident wildlife ungulates (hoofed animals) from entering the enclosure. If such animals do pass through, under, or over the fence because of any topographic feature or other conditions, the person possessing deleterious exotic wildlife must immediately supplement the fence to prevent continued passage.

(h) For any fence existing prior to February 13, 1993, a person may petition the director in writing for a variance from the above fencing requirements. Any such petition must be filed no later than May 31, 1993 and must identify all aspects in which the existing fence does not meet the fencing requirements contained herein. On approval of the director, such person may maintain such existing fence with normal repair. However, any extension or relocation of existing fence must meet the fencing requirements contained herein.

(11) Marking requirements

(a) All live specimens of deleterious exotic wildlife except those listed in subsections (1)(a) and (1)(b), shall be permanently and individually identified by methods approved by the director,

(b) Identification assigned to an individual animal may not be transferred to any other animal.

(c) All specimens of deleterious exotic wildlife identified in subsections (1)(d)(iv) and (1)(d)(v) must be individually identified by the methods specified below.

(i) All live specimens of such deleterious exotic wildlife shall be marked with USDA Official ear tags or with ear tags supplied or approved by the department. Tags shall be applied in sequential order, and

(ii) All live specimens of such deleterious exotic wildlife shall be marked with a tattoo with an identifying number that has been recorded with the director. The tattoo must be placed on the left ear of the animal.

(d) All lawful progeny of deleterious exotic wildlife must be tagged and tattooed by December 31 of the year of birth or upon leaving the holding facility, whichever is earlier.

(e) Where allowed, if an animal is sold or transferred within the state, the tag and tattoo must accompany the animal. The new owner or possessor shall not renumber the animal.

(f) Where allowed, live specimens of deleterious exotic wildlife shall be marked prior to importation.

(g) No unmarked deleterious exotic wildlife may be sold or otherwise transferred from the holding facility.

(12) Testing of specimens

(a) Where allowed, prior to entry into the state of Washington, a person importing any member of the Genus *Cervus* which is identified in subsection (1)(v) herein must submit records of genetic tests, conducted by a professionally recognized laboratory to identify red deer genetic influence (genetic material from any member of any subspecies, race, or species of the elk-red deer-wapiti complex *Cervus elaphus* not indigenous to the state of Washington). Such testing shall be at the possessor's expense. Animals which are deemed by department of wildlife biologists upon examination to exhibit either: behavioral (vocalization), morphological (size, rump patch, color) or biochemical indications of such influence (hemoglobin, superoxide dismutase, transferrin and post-transferrin, or others to be developed) may not be imported.

(b) The director may require a person currently possessing any member of the Genus *Cervus* which are identified in subsection (1)(v) herein to submit records of genetic tests, conducted by a professionally recognized laboratory to identify red deer genetic influence (genetic material from any member of any subspecies, race, or species of the elk-red

deer-wapiti complex *Cervus elaphus* not indigenous to the state of Washington), for each individual cervid to the department. Such testing shall be at the possessor's expense. The director may require that any animal identified a red deer or having non-indigenous genetic influence be destroyed, removed from the state, or neutered.

(c) The director may require that all specimens of deleterious exotic wildlife lawfully in captivity be tested for brucellosis (*brucella abortus*), tuberculosis (*mycobacterium bovis* and *mycobacterium tuberculosis*), meningeal worm (*Paralophostrongylus tenuis*), and muscle worm (*Elaphostrongylus cervis*) in accordance with the procedures specified in department of agriculture WAC 16-54-035 as now or hereafter amended and/or for other disease or parasites determined to pose a risk to wildlife. The results of such tests shall be filed with the director as required.

(13) Reporting

(a) A person holding deleterious exotic wildlife in captivity shall submit a completed report no later than March 30, 1993 and then no later than January 31 of each year, or as otherwise required by the director, on a form provided by the department.

(b) Persons possessing deleterious exotic wildlife must notify the director within ten days of any change of such persons' address and/or location of the holding facility.

(14) Inspection

(a) All holding facilities for deleterious exotic wildlife located in the state are subject to inspection for compliance with the provisions of this section.

(b) Such inspections may take place without warrant or prior notice but shall be conducted at reasonable times and locations.

(15) Notification and disposition of diseased animals.

(a) Any person who has reason to believe that deleterious exotic wildlife being held pursuant to this rule have or have been exposed to a dangerous or communicable disease or parasite shall notify the department immediately.

(b) Upon having reason to believe that deleterious exotic wildlife held pursuant to this rule have been exposed to or contracted a dangerous or contagious disease or parasite, the director may order inspection of such animals by a licensed, accredited veterinarian or inspection agent. Inspection shall be at the expense of the possessor.

(c) The director shall determine when destruction of animals, quarantine, or disinfection is required at any facility holding deleterious exotic wildlife pursuant to this rule. If the director determines that destruction, quarantine, or disinfection is required, a written order shall be issued to the possessor describing the procedure to be followed and the time period for carrying out such actions. Such activities shall be at the expense of the possessor.

(16) Quarantine area

(a) Any facility holding deleterious exotic wildlife must have an approved quarantine facility within its exterior boundary or submit an action plan to the director that guarantees access to an approved quarantine facility within the state of Washington.

(i) An approved quarantine facility is one that meets criteria set by the Washington State department of agriculture.

(ii) The quarantine area must meet the tests of isolation, separate feed and water, escape security, and allowances for

the humane holding and care of its occupants for extended periods of time.

(b) Should the imposition of a quarantine become necessary, the possessor must provide an on-site quarantine facility or make arrangements at such possessor's expense to transport the animals to the approved quarantine facility named in the quarantine action plan.

(17) Seizure

(a) The department of wildlife may seize any unlawfully possessed deleterious exotic wildlife.

(b) The cost of any seizure and/or holding of deleterious exotic wildlife may be charged to the possessor of such animals.

WAC 232-12-021 Importation and retention of dead nonresident wildlife. It is unlawful:

(1) To import or possess dead wildlife, taken in another state or country, into Washington unless such wildlife was acquired lawfully. Proof of legal acquisition must be

retained during the period of retention of the carcass or edible parts.

(2) For a person who imports a dead mountain sheep, mountain goat, cougar or bear to fail to report such importation to the department in writing within ten days of the importation. The report must contain the name and address of the importer, the location where the dead wildlife is being stored and general information describing where and how the wildlife was obtained.

WAC 232-12-024 Requirements for sealing of pelts and collection of biological information for river otter, cougar, lynx, and bobcat. (1) It is unlawful to possess river otter, cougar, lynx, or bobcat taken in Washington without a department identification seal which has been attached to the raw pelt, on or off the carcass, prior to the pelt sealing deadline.

(2) Any river otter, cougar, or bobcat raw pelt must be presented by the person harvesting the animal, in such a manner that teeth and biological samples can be extracted, to an authorized department employee for sealing.

(3) The raw pelt of a bobcat or river otter must be sealed by an authorized department employee within 20 days after the close of the appropriate hunting or trapping season in which it was killed.

(4) Any person who takes a cougar must notify the department within 72 hours of kill (excluding legal state holidays) and provide the hunter's name, date and location of kill, and sex of animal. The raw pelt of a cougar must be sealed by an authorized department employee within five days of the notification of kill.

Any person who takes a cougar must present the cougar skull, in such a manner that teeth and biological samples can be extracted, to an authorized department employee at the time of sealing.

(5) It is unlawful to transport or cause the transport out of Washington a raw pelt of river otter, cougar, lynx, or bobcat taken in Washington without a department seal attached to the pelt.

(6) The raw pelt of a river otter, cougar, lynx, or bobcat taken outside Washington and imported into the state must be identified by a tag and/or seal from the state or country of origin and be accompanied by an invoice or declaration specifying the number of pelts in the shipment.

(7) It is unlawful to possess an unlocked, broken, or otherwise open department seal for river otter, cougar, lynx, or bobcat unless the seal wire or band has been cut through and removed from a pelt that has been received and invoiced by a licensed taxidermist or fur dealer for processing or removed from a pelt that has been processed. Taxidermist or fur dealer invoices must be sequentially numbered and record name, address, license number, date received, and seal number. The seal must accompany the pelt while being processed. The pelt must be punched with invoice number at the time of skinning or prior to the removal of the seal.

(8) When a river otter or bobcat is presented unskinned and is to be taken to a taxidermist for processing and will not be sold, an authorized department employee may lock

the seal and then cut through the band or wire. The cut seal must be presented to the taxidermist along with the unskinned carcass.

WAC 232-12-025 Hunts authorized pursuant to RCW 77.12.240. Anyone participating in a director-authorized hunt must conduct themselves in accordance with the following rules:

(1) Black bear

(a) No dogs are permitted out of the vehicle, including on a strikeboard, outside of the designated hunting area. If the bear is started inside a permit area, it may be pursued and killed outside the permit boundaries.

(b) When a bear is taken, the permittee shall skin the entire bear, including head, leaving claws attached, and deliver the hide, together with the first tooth behind the canine tooth on the lower jaw to the regional office. All bear hides taken pursuant to a black bear damage permit shall be disposed of as prescribed in RCW 77.12.240.

(c) Within 5 days after expiration of a black bear permit, the permittee shall return to the respective region a bear hunting report and the windshield identification cards. Failure to comply with this provision shall constitute ineligibility for the next year's black bear damage permit drawings.

(d) The permittee shall abide by all conditions as set forth on the black bear damage permit. Failure to comply with these hunting conditions shall constitute a violation of RCW 77.16.020(1) (Hunting bear during closed season).

(2) Deer and elk.

(a) Only persons with a damage permit are allowed to hunt and take one deer or one elk as designated on their damage control permit.

(b) If a hunter takes an animal of the same species during an earlier hunt, that person will be ineligible for a damage hunt permit.

(c) Deer and elk damage control hunts will be antlerless only unless specified either sex on the damage permit.

(d) The April 1 to June 30 time period will be excluded from damage control hunts.

(e) Permittees may hunt only within the prescribed area and season dates as specified on their permit. If a deer or elk is wounded inside the damage hunt area, it may be pursued and taken outside permit boundaries.

(f) Within five days after expiration of a deer or elk permit, the permittee shall return to the respective region a deer/elk hunting report. If an animal is taken, the permittee shall skin the entire animal and deliver the hide together with an incisor tooth to a regional game department office. All deer or elk hides taken pursuant to a damage permit shall be disposed of as prescribed in RCW 77.12.240. Failure to comply with this provision shall constitute ineligibility for the next year's damage permit drawings.

WAC 232-12-027 Game farm license provisions. It is unlawful to operate a game farm without a current, valid Washington state game farm license.

(1) Game farms licensed prior to January 1, 1992, may continue to possess, propagate, sell and transfer wildlife they lawfully possess on January 1, 1992, by virtue of their license issued by the department. Transfers of wildlife other than those species listed under 2 are restricted to licensed game farms authorized by written license to possess said wildlife.

(2) Game farms licensed on or after January 1, 1992, may purchase, possess, propagate, sell or transfer the following wildlife:

(a) Game birds - pheasant, of the genus *Phasianus*; gray partridge of the genus *Perdix*; chukar partridge of the genus *Alectoris*; quail of the genus *Lophortyx*, *Colinus*, *Callipepla*, and *Oreortyx*; waterfowl of the family *Anatidae*.

(3) Application for a game farm license shall be made on a form provided by the department.

(4) The director or designee of the director may issue, with conditions or restrictions, a game farm license, if the applicant meets the requirements of subsection (1) or (2) above and complies with the following criteria:

(a) The applicant is the owner or tenant of or has a possessory interest in the lands, waters, and riparian rights shown in the application.

(b) The rearing and holding facilities are adequate and structurally sound to prevent the egress of game farm wildlife.

(c) Operating conditions are clean and humane.

(d) No hazards to state wildlife exist from the operation.

(e) The license covers only the immediate premises and areas described on the application where wildlife will be held.

(5) Holders of a game farm license must make annual reports no later than the 15th of January to the director on forms to be furnished by the department.

(6) A licensed game farm must be inspected annually. All costs will be paid by the licensee. The inspection must occur during the months of June, July, or August. An inspection form will be provided by the department and must be completed and signed by a licensed veterinarian or an agent authorized by the department. The inspection form must accompany the annual report and be submitted to the director no later than the 15th day of January.

(7) A game farm license is not required for captive-bred mink, *Mustela vison*, and captive-bred silver fox, *Vulpes fulva*, lawfully acquired from a licensed breeder or fur farm and held for fur farming purposes.

WAC 232-12-031 Game farm invoice requirements. It is unlawful for a licensed game farm to transfer wildlife

unless the wildlife is accompanied by an invoice which must include the name and address of the game farm, date of transfer, number and species transferred, and the name and address of transferee. The invoice is the transferee's permit to hold such game in captivity and must be retained during the time such wildlife is in his possession. Game farms must retain a copy of all invoices on the licensed premise for a period of two years from date of transaction and must send a copy of the invoice or a list of transferees and species transferred to the department with the game farm's annual report.

WAC 232-12-034 Acquisition of wildlife by game farmer. A game farmer may acquire wildlife only from a licensed game farm or other lawful source.

WAC 232-12-037 Shooting preserves—Licensing—Permits—Operations. A game farm licensed under the provisions of chapter 77.12 RCW may function as a private shooting preserve and dispose of game birds produced or acquired by releasing them on the designated preserve for hunting. The permittee must abide by the following rules:

(1) Each person desiring to operate a private shooting preserve must make application to the department on forms supplied by the department.

(2) The department shall investigate the property described in the application and determine the number of wild game birds produced annually on the proposed shooting preserve area.

(3) Private shooting preserves must contain a minimum of one hundred acres to a maximum of one thousand acres in a contiguous block. The land must be owned or leased by the applicant for a minimum of five years, and cannot contain lakes or ponds in excess of two acres of surface water or be within one-half mile of bodies of water in excess of two acres.

(4) Shooting preserves may not be located on land having a projected fall population of wild upland game birds in excess of twenty birds per one hundred acres.

(5) Shooting preserves may not be located within one mile of a public hunting area owned or controlled by the department, except lands controlled by year-to-year agreement.

(6) The boundary of shooting preserves must be posted by the permittee with signs approved by the director in such manner as he may direct.

(7) The permittee shall release not less than one game bird per acre, annually.

(8) Game birds taken from a private shooting preserve must be marked and accompanied by an invoice showing the permittee's name, address, date of sale, number and species sold and the name and address of the hunter. Said invoice shall be retained by the hunter during the time such species are in his possession.

(9) During September or October each year, the permittee must deliver to the department the number of live game birds determined under subsection (2) or pay the department

the fair market value for the specified number of game birds sixteen weeks of age. Game birds delivered to the department must be sixteen weeks of age, fully feathered and in sound and healthy condition as determined by the department.

WAC 232-12-041 Permit for holding field trials.

(1) Except as authorized by permit issued by the director it is unlawful to hold field trials for hunting dogs during the months of April, May, June, and July. Field trials on department lands or those involving use of live wildlife may not be held without a permit.

(2) Applications for a field trial permit must be filed with the department at least thirty days before the proposed date for holding such trials. The application shall state the time and place the field trials will be held, the names of sponsors and persons who will conduct the trials, and such other information as the director may require.

WAC 232-12-044 Use of game birds for training dogs, field trials—Marking requirements. It is unlawful to possess game birds acquired from a licensed game farmer for the purpose of training dogs, field trials, or hunting unless the birds are marked in the following manner:

(1) Captive reared waterfowl shall be physically marked in the following manner:

(a) Removal of the hind toe from the right foot.

(b) Pinioning of a wing: *Provided*, That this method shall be the removal of the metacarpal bones of one wing or a portion of the metacarpal bones which renders the bird permanently incapable of flight.

(c) Banding of one metatarsus with a seamless metal band.

(d) Tattooing of a readily discernible number or letter or combination thereof on the web of one foot.

(2) All other game birds shall be physically marked by removal of the first joint of the outside toe on the right foot prior to four weeks of age or marked by a band purchased from the department.

WAC 232-12-047 Unlawful firearms for hunting.

It is unlawful to hunt any big game with:

(1) A fully automatic firearm.

(2) A handgun that does not meet the following criteria:

(a) For deer, bear, or cougar

(i) Be a minimum of .24 caliber;

(ii) Have a minimum barrel length of 4 inches, per manufacturer's specification; and

(iii) Fire a centerfire cartridge which uses a mushrooming or expanding type bullet that develops a minimum of 500 foot-pounds of energy at 100 yards.

(b) For all other big game species:

(i) Be a minimum of .24 caliber;

(ii) Have a minimum barrel length of 4 inches, per manufacturer's specification; and

(iii) Fire a centerfire cartridge which uses a mushrooming or expanding type bullet that develops a minimum of 750 foot-pounds of energy at 100 yards.

(3) A rifle with a bore diameter less than .240 of an inch (6mm), or barrel length less than 16 inches.

(4) A rifle cartridge with a bullet weighing less than 85 grains, or that develops less than 900 foot pounds of energy at 100 yds.

(5) A rifle cartridge containing a bullet other than a mushrooming or expanding type designed for big game hunting.

(6) A shotgun, provided that a 20 gauge, or larger shotgun, using shells loaded with slugs or buckshot size #1 or larger, may be used to hunt deer and bear.

(7) A muzzle-loader that does not meet the definition as provided in WAC 232-12-051.

It is unlawful to hunt game birds with a shotgun capable of holding more than three shells.

It is unlawful to hunt game birds or game animals, except bullfrogs, in a manner other than with a firearm, a bow and arrow, or by falconry.

It is unlawful to hunt game animals or game birds with a shotgun larger than 10 gauge.

It is unlawful to hunt game birds with a rifle or pistol, with the exception of blue grouse, spruce grouse and ruffed grouse.

It is unlawful to hunt wildlife with a crossbow.

WAC 232-12-051 Muzzleloading firearms. (1) It is unlawful to carry or possess any firearm during special muzzleloading seasons which does not meet the following specification for a muzzleloader. A muzzleloading firearm is loaded from the muzzle and uses black powder or a black powder substitute as recommended by the manufacturer for use in muzzleloading firearms. A muzzleloading firearm has a single or double barrel of at least 20 inches, rifled or smooth-bored. Ignition is to be wheel lock, matchlock, flintlock, or percussion using original style percussion caps that fit on the nipple and are exposed to the elements. Sights must be metal. Telescopic sights or sights containing glass are prohibited.

(2) A muzzleloading firearm used for deer must fire a single, nonjacketed lead projectile of nominal .40 caliber or larger, except that buckshot size #1 or larger may be used in a smoothbore of .60 caliber or larger.

(3) A muzzleloading firearm used for all other big game must fire a single, nonjacketed lead projectile of nominal .50 caliber or larger, or fire a single, nonjacketed lead projectile of at least 170 grains.

(4) This section shall not apply to the carrying of a handgun designed to be charged with black powder only.

(5) This section shall not apply to persons lawfully hunting game birds with a shotgun.

(6) Only one barrel of a double barrel muzzleloader may be charged with a load at any one time while hunting in a muzzleloading season except in specified firearm restricted areas.

WAC 232-12-054 Bow and arrow requirements. (1) It is unlawful for any person to hunt big game animals with a bow that possesses less than 40 pounds of pull measured at twenty-eight inches or less draw length or has a greater than 65% reduction (let off) in holding weight at full draw.

(2) It is unlawful to hunt big game animals with any arrow, including broadhead, weighing less than 400 grains (400 gr.) or having sharp broadhead blade or blades less than seven-eighths inches wide. It is unlawful to hunt with a broadhead blade unless the broadhead is unbarbed and completely closed at the back end of the blade or blades by a smooth, unbroken surface starting at maximum blade width forming a smooth line toward the feather end of the shaft and such line does not angle toward the point.

(3) It is unlawful for any person to carry or have in his possession any firearm while in the field archery hunting, during the bow and arrow season specified for that area.

(4) It is unlawful to shoot at wildlife with an arrow from a vehicle or from, across or along the maintained portion of a public highway.

(5) It is unlawful to use any device secured to or supported by the bow for the purpose of maintaining the bow at full draw or in a firing position.

(6) It is unlawful to have any electrical equipment or device(s) attached to the bow or arrow while hunting.

WAC 232-12-055 Hunting—Hunter orange clothing requirements. Effective September 1, 1991[:]

1) Except as authorized in section (4), it is unlawful to hunt upland birds or rabbits during any upland game bird season unless the hunter is wearing fluorescent hunter orange clothing.

2) It is unlawful to hunt deer or elk during the modern firearm seasons in any manner unless the hunter is wearing fluorescent hunter orange clothing.

3) It is unlawful to hunt bear, bobcat, raccoon, fox, coyote, rabbit, forest grouse or hare during those times and in those places open to the taking of deer or elk during a modern firearm season, unless the hunter is wearing fluorescent hunter orange clothing.

[4] Persons who are hunting upland game birds during an upland game bird season with a muzzleloading firearm, bow and arrow or falconry are not required to wear fluorescent hunter orange clothing.

WAC 232-12-057 Hunting with aid of aircraft, boats or other vehicles. (1) It is unlawful to use aircraft to spot, locate or report the location of wildlife for the purpose of hunting; except as authorized by a permit issued by the director.

(2) It is unlawful to hunt wildlife from a vehicle, aircraft, except as authorized by a permit issued by the director, or from a boat propelled by motor unless the motor of such boat has been completely shut off and its progress has ceased.

(3) It is unlawful to use a vehicle, aircraft, or motor-propelled boat for the purpose of pursuing, concentrating, or harassing any wild animal or wild bird.

(4) It is unlawful to hunt big game on the day one was airborne in an aircraft, except on a regularly scheduled commercial airline flight.

WAC 232-12-061 Tagging requirements. It is unlawful for a person who kills a big game animal or turkey to fail to immediately cut out and completely remove from their tag the designated notches corresponding to the day and month of the kill for that species. A person who kills such animal or bird, shall immediately attach their notched tag to the carcass of such animal or bird. That tag must remain attached to the carcass while it is being transported and must remain with the wildlife during the period of retention of the edible parts.

WAC 232-12-064 Live wildlife. Taking from the wild, importation, possession, transfer, holding in captivity.

(1) It is unlawful to take live wild animals, wild birds, or game fish from the wild without a permit provided for by rule of the commission.

(2) Notwithstanding the provisions of WAC 232-12-027(1), 232-12-067 and subsections (3) and (4) herein, it is unlawful to import into the state, hold, possess, propagate, offer for sale, sell, transfer, or release live specimens of wildlife listed in this subsection, their gametes and/or embryo, except as provided under subsections (7), (8), (9) or (10) below:

In the family Cervidae, all of the following species:

Roosevelt and Rocky Mountain elk	Cervus elaphus
Mule deer and Black-tailed deer	Odocoileus hemionus
White-tailed deer	Odocoileus virginianus
Moose	Alces alces
Caribou	Rangifer tarandus caribou

(3) It is unlawful to import into the state or to hold live wildlife which were taken, held, possessed or transported contrary to federal or state law, local ordinance or department rule. Live wild animals, wild birds or game fish shall not be brought into the state without first presenting licensed, accredited veterinarian or fish pathologist certification to the department that the wildlife is disease free and that the area from which acquired has no history of wildlife disease which may pose a risk to wildlife in this state. Proof of lawful importation must be produced for inspection on request of a department employee.

(4) It is unlawful to possess or hold in captivity live wild animals, wild birds, or game fish unless lawfully acquired and possessed. Proof of lawful acquisition and possession must be produced for inspection on request of a department employee. Such proof shall contain: (1) Species; (2) age and sex of animal; (3) origin of animal; (4) name of receiving party; (5) source-name and address; (6) invoice/statement date; and (7) documentation of prior transfers.

(5) Live wild animals, wild birds or game fish held in captivity or their progeny or parts thereof may not be sold or otherwise commercialized on except as provided by rule of the commission.

(6) No wildlife shall be released from captivity except as provided in WAC 232-12-271, except that it is lawful to return to the waters from which caught, game fish caught and subsequently kept alive on stringers, in live wells or other containers while fishing. The release of fish into any waters of the state, including private, natural or man-made ponds requires a fish planting permit.

(7) Scientific research or display: The director may authorize, by written approval, a person to import into the state, hold, possess and propagate live specimens of wildlife listed in subsection (2) for scientific research or for display by zoos or aquariums who are accredited institutional members of the American Association of Zoological Parks and Aquariums (AAZPA) provided:

(a) The specimens are confined to a secure facility,

(b) The specimens will not be transferred to any other location within the state, except to other AAZPA accredited facilities and transported by AAZPA accredited institutional members or their authorized agents with written approval of the director or as otherwise authorized in writing by the director,

(c) The specimens will not be sold or otherwise disposed of within the state without written approval of the director,

(d) The person will keep such records on the specimens and make such reports as the director may require, and

(e) The person complies with the other requirements of this section.

(8) Retention or disposal of existing specimens lawfully in captivity prior to June 20, 1992: A person holding live specimens of wildlife listed in subsection (2) by operation of emergency rule filed June 19, 1992 [in the family Cervidae, all of the following species: Roosevelt and Rocky Mountain elk (*Cervus elaphus*); Mule Deer and Black-tailed deer (*Odocoileus hemionus*); White-tailed deer (*Odocoileus virginianus*); and Moose (*Alces alces*)] may retain the specimens of such wildlife such person lawfully possessed prior to June 20, 1992 and the lawful progeny thereof

provided such person complies with subsections (8)(a) through (8)(f) hereunder and the other requirements of this section.

(a) The person reported to the director in writing the species, number and location of the specimens as required.

(b) The specimens are confined to a secure facility at the location reported,

(c) Live specimens are not propagated except at AAZPA accredited facilities with the written permission of the director or as otherwise authorized in writing by the director;

(d) Live specimens are not released, except with written permission of the director,

(e) Live specimens are not sold or transferred except:

(i) Live specimens in lawful possession prior to June 20, 1992 and lawful progeny may be permanently removed from the state of Washington or transported directly to slaughter where in accordance with other applicable law,

(ii) Federally listed endangered or threatened species may be transferred to AAZPA accredited facilities where in compliance with federal law,

(iii) Live specimens may be moved to the new primary residence of the possessor with the written approval of the director, provided all other requirements of this section are satisfied and the total number of locations where animals are held is not increased;

(iv) AAZPA facilities may sell and/or transfer live specimens within the state with the written permission of the director.

(f) Live specimens shall be neutered, physically separated by sex, and/or rendered infertile by means of contraception, except at AAZPA accredited facilities with the written permission of the director.

(9) Retention or disposal of existing specimens lawfully in captivity prior to February 13, 1993: A person holding live specimens of wildlife newly listed in subsection (2) by operation of this rule [Caribou (*Rangifer tarandus caribou*)], may retain the specimens of such wildlife the person lawfully possessed prior to February 13, 1993, provided:

(a) The person reports to the director in writing by March 31, 1993, and reports annually thereafter, or as otherwise required by the director, the species, number, and location of such specimens,

(b) The person complies with subsections (8)(b) through (8)(f) herein and the other requirements of this section.

(10) The provisions of this section shall not prohibit the importation, possession, propagation, sale, transfer, or release of live specimens of federally listed threatened or endangered species, their gametes and/or embryo, where in compliance with federal law.

(11) Escaped wildlife:

(a) Escaped wildlife will be considered a public nuisance. The department or any peace officer may seize, capture, or destroy wildlife that have escaped the possessor's control. The former possessor shall be responsible for costs incurred by the department in recovering, maintaining, or disposing of such animals, as well as any damage to the state's wildlife or habitat.

(b) Escapes of wildlife must be reported immediately to the department,

(c) The recapture or death of escaped wildlife must be reported immediately to the department.

(12) Secure facility:

(a) All captive wildlife will be held in a secure facility. For the purpose of this rule, a secure facility is an enclosure so constructed as to prevent danger to the environment or wildlife of the state, including escape of live wildlife specimens in captivity or ingress of resident wildlife ungulates (hoofed animals).

(b) For wildlife listed in subsection (2), the secure facility must comply with the fencing requirements in subsection (13) herein.

(13) Fencing requirements

(a) Perimeter fences must be, at a minimum, eight feet above ground level for their entire length. The bottom six feet must be mesh of sufficient size to prevent resident wildlife ungulates (hoofed animals) from entering and captive wildlife from escaping. Supplemental wire required to attain a height of eight feet may be smooth, barbed, or woven wire (at least 12-1/2 gauge) with strands spaced not more than six inches apart.

(b) Perimeter fences constructed of high tensile wire must be supported by a post or stay at minimum intervals of eight feet.

(c) Perimeter fences must be at least 12-1/2 gauge woven wire, 14-1/2 gauge high-tensile woven wire, chain link, non-climbable woven fence, or other fence approved by the director.

(i) If the wire used is not a full eight feet in height, it must be overlapped one row and securely fastened at every other vertical row or woven together with cable.

(d) Electric fencing materials may be used on perimeter fences only as a supplement to conventional fencing materials.

(e) All gates in the perimeter fences must be self-closing, equipped with two locking devices, and installed only in locations that have been approved by the director. Double gates may be required at points in the perimeter fences subject to frequent vehicle traffic that is not related to activities involving the holding of captive wildlife.

(f) Posts used in the perimeter fences must be:

(i) Wood (pressure treated), five-inch minimum diameter or an equivalent as approved by the director;

(ii) Spaced no more than twenty-four feet apart with stays or supports at eight foot intervals between the posts;

(iii) Extended at least eight feet above ground level;

(iv) Corners braced with wood or with an equivalent material as approved by the director.

(g) Fences must be maintained at all times to prevent captive wildlife from escaping or resident wildlife ungulates (hoofed animals) from entering the enclosure. If such animals do pass through, under, or over the fence because of any topographic feature or other conditions, the person possessing wildlife must immediately supplement the fence to prevent continued passage.

(h) For any fence existing prior to February 13, 1993, a person may petition the director in writing for a variance from the above fencing requirements. Any such petition must be filed no later than May 31, 1993 and must identify all aspects in which the existing fence does not meet the fencing requirements contained herein. On approval of the director, such person may maintain such existing fence with normal repair. However, any extension or relocation of existing fence must meet the fencing requirements contained herein.

(14) Marking requirements

(a) All live specimens of wildlife identified in subsection (2) must be individually identified by the methods specified below:

(i) All live specimens of such wildlife shall be marked with USDA official ear tags or with ear tags supplied or approved by the department. Tags shall be applied in sequential order, and

(ii) All live specimens of such wildlife shall be marked with a tattoo with an identifying number that has been recorded with the director. The tattoo must be placed on the left ear of the animal.

(b) Identification assigned to an individual animal may not be transferred to any other animal.

(c) Where allowed, all lawful progeny of wildlife identified in subsection (2) must be tagged and tattooed by December 31 of the year of birth or upon leaving the holding facility, whichever is earlier.

(d) Where allowed, if wildlife identified in subsection (2) is sold or transferred within the state, the tag and tattoo must accompany the animal. The new owner or possessor shall not renumber the animal.

(e) Where allowed, live specimens of wildlife identified in subsection (2) shall be marked prior to importation.

(f) No unmarked wildlife identified in subsection (2) may be sold or otherwise transferred from the holding facility.

(15) Testing of specimens.

(a) Where allowed, prior to entry into the state of Washington, persons importing any member of the Genus Cervus which is identified in subsection (2) herein, must submit records of genetic tests, conducted by a professionally recognized laboratory to identify red deer genetic influence (genetic material from any member of any subspecies, race, or species of the elk-red deer-wapiti complex Cervus elaphus not indigenous to the state of Washington. Such testing shall be at the possessor's expense. Animals which are deemed by department of wildlife biologists upon examination to exhibit either: behavioral (vocalization), morphological (size, rump patch, color) or biochemical indications of such influence (hemoglobin, superoxide dismutase, transferrin and post-transferrin, or others to be developed) may not be imported.

(b) A person currently holding any member of the genus Cervus elaphus identified in subsection (2) herein must submit records of genetic tests, conducted by a professionally recognized laboratory to identify red deer genetic influence (genetic material from any member of any subspecies, race, or species of the elk-red deer-wapiti complex Cervus elaphus not indigenous to the state of Washington), for each individual cervid to the director within 90 days of passage of this rule. Such testing shall be at the possessor's expense. Any animals identified as red deer or having non-indigenous genetic influence must be destroyed, removed from the state, or neutered within 180 days of passage of this rule.

(c) The director may require that specimens listed in subsection (2) lawfully in captivity be tested for brucellosis (brucella abortus), tuberculosis (mycobacterium bovis and mycobacterium tuberculosis), meningeal worm (Paralophostromylus tenuis), and muscle worm (Elaphostromylus cervis) in accordance with the procedures specified in department of agriculture WAC 16-54-035 as now or

hereafter amended, and/or for other diseases or parasites determined to pose a risk to wildlife. The results of such tests shall be filed with the director as required.

(16) Reporting

(a) A person holding wildlife listed in subsection (2) in captivity shall submit a completed report no later than March 30, 1993 and then no later than January 31 of each year, or as otherwise required by the director, on a form provided by the department.

(b) Persons possessing wildlife listed in subsection (2) must notify the director within ten days of any change of such persons' address and/or location of the holding facility.

(17) Inspection

(a) All holding facilities for captive wildlife located in the state are subject to inspection for compliance with the provisions of this section.

(b) Such inspections may take place without warrant or prior notice but shall be conducted at reasonable times and locations.

(18) Notification and disposition of diseased animals.

(a) Any person who has reason to believe that wildlife being held pursuant to this rule have or have been exposed to a dangerous or communicable disease or parasite shall notify the department immediately.

(b) Upon having reason to believe that wildlife held pursuant to this rule have been exposed to or contracted a dangerous or contagious disease or parasite, the director may order inspection of such animals by a licensed, accredited veterinarian, certified fish pathologist, or inspection agent. Inspection shall be at the expense of the possessor.

(c) The director shall determine when destruction of wildlife, quarantine, disinfection, or sterilization of facilities is required at any facility holding wildlife pursuant to this rule. If the director determines that destruction of wildlife, quarantine, disinfection, or sterilization of facilities is required, a written order shall be issued to the possessor describing the procedure to be followed and the time period for carrying out such actions. Such activities shall be at the expense of the possessor.

(19) Quarantine area

(a) Any facility holding wildlife listed in subsection (2) must have an approved quarantine facility within its exterior boundary or submit an action plan to the director that guarantees access to an approved quarantine facility within the state of Washington.

(i) An approved quarantine facility is one that meets criteria set by the Washington state department of agriculture.

(ii) The quarantine area must meet the tests of isolation, separate feed and water, escape security, and allowances for the humane holding and care of its occupants for extended periods of time.

(b) Should the imposition of a quarantine become necessary, the possessor of any wildlife must provide an on-site quarantine facility or make arrangements at such possessor's expense to transport such wildlife to an approved quarantine facility.

(20) Seizure

(a) The department of wildlife may seize any unlawfully possessed wildlife.

(b) The cost of any seizure and/or holding of wildlife may be charged to the possessor of such animals.

WAC 232-12-066 Revocation, modification, or suspension of a permit to hold wild animals, wild birds, or game fish in captivity. A permit issued hereunder may be revoked, modified or suspended by the director for cause as provided in WAC 232-12-197. Cause shall include, but not be limited to, failure to provide adequate holding facilities and equipment or the failure to provide adequate care, feed or maintenance of wildlife subject to the permit or for inhumane treatment of wildlife.

WAC 232-12-067 Sale of wildlife. (1) It is unlawful for publicly-owned zoos or aquariums who lawfully acquired wildlife under WAC 232-12-064 to offer for sale or sell that wildlife or the progeny of that wildlife except outside the state or except within the state to other publicly-owned zoos or aquariums or accredited institutional members of the American Association of Zoological Parks and Aquariums (AAZPA).

(2) It is unlawful for publicly-owned zoos or aquariums who lawfully acquired wildlife under WAC 232-12-274 to offer for sale or sell that wildlife or the progeny of that wildlife except the progeny may be sold to other publicly-owned zoos or aquariums or accredited institutional members of the American Association of Zoological Parks and Aquariums (AAZPA).

(3) Publicly-owned zoos and aquariums will keep accurate and current records of the sale of wildlife progeny as required by the director. These records will be maintained on a calendar year basis and retained for a period of 5 years.

(4) It is unlawful for any publicly-owned zoo or aquarium to fail to complete and submit to the department by January 31 of each year a report containing information required by the director.

(5) Wildlife agents may inspect at reasonable times and in a reasonable manner the wildlife, permits, records, and facilities of any publicly-owned zoo or aquarium offering for sale or selling wildlife.

WAC 232-12-071 Buying or selling game unlawful. Unless prohibited by federal regulations, nonedible parts of wild animals, game birds or game fish lawfully taken may be offered for sale, sold, purchased or traded, **except**,

It is unlawful to offer for sale, sell, purchase or trade cougar, mountain sheep, mountain goat, velvet antlers of deer or elk or the gall bladder, claws and teeth of bear, except those claws and teeth permanently attached to a full bear skin or mounted bear, unless the offer for sale, sale,

purchase or trade is authorized by a written permit issued by the director.

WAC 232-12-077 Wildlife taken by another. It is unlawful to possess wildlife taken during the open season by another unless it is accompanied by a statement which shows the name, address, hunting, fishing or other license or permit number and signature of the taker, the date, county and game management unit where taken.

WAC 232-12-081 Checking stations—Inspection of game and licenses. Hunters and fishermen occupying a motor vehicle approaching or entering a check station established by a wildlife agent must stop and produce for inspection:

- (1) Wildlife in their possession;
- (2) Licenses, permits, tags, stamps or punchcards required under Title 77 RCW or rules adopted thereunder.

WAC 232-12-082 Collection of sampling data—Unlawful acts. It is unlawful for any person or corporation licensed by the department to fail to comply with the directions of authorized department personnel related to the collection of sampling data and/or material from wildlife. It is also unlawful for any such person or corporation to fail to relinquish to the department, upon request, any part of steelhead or other species of fish commonly found in fresh water, containing coded-wire tags, including but not limited to, the snouts of those steelhead that are marked with clipped left ventral fins. This section does not apply to those species of fish classified as food fish by the director of fisheries or to private sector cultured aquatic products on aquatic farms.

WAC 232-12-083 Emergency rule criteria. (1) The director may close or shorten a season pursuant to RCW 77.12.150 only:

- (a) By emergency rule, and
- (b) When the director determines from biological data or climatic conditions which were unforeseen by the commission when the season was established, that the population of game fish, game animals, or game birds is in jeopardy with established seasons, and
- (c) When the delay necessary to have the issue determined by emergency action of the commission presents a real and immediate threat to wildlife.

(2) Any emergency rule issued by the director pursuant to this rule shall state:

- (a) The time and date when it shall be effective, and
- (b) The time and date when it shall terminate, and
- (c) The justification for its issuance.

(3) If the director has taken emergency action pursuant to this rule, he/she shall, upon determination that the threat to wildlife has abated, thereafter reopen the season limited to the time period originally set by the commission, and reestablish bag limits as originally set by the commission.

(4) Whenever the director takes action to close, shorten, or reopen a season pursuant to (1) or (3) above, he/she shall first take all reasonable steps to notify commission members the action contemplated.

WAC 232-12-086 Director or his designee is empowered to enter agreements to control nuisance or problem wildlife. When the director or his designee determines that nuisance or problem wildlife can be controlled by persons, political subdivisions of this state, or the United States, the director or his designee may enter into agreements for control of said nuisance or problem wildlife.

Agreements entered into shall be subject to the following criteria:

(1) The control activity shall not adversely affect the department's obligation to preserve, protect and perpetuate the states wildlife.

(2) The agreement shall include but is not limited to:

(a) The procedure for reporting control activity to the department.

(b) Species of animals approved for control.

(c) Location of control activity covered by the agreement.

(d) Methods of control activity allowed (by species).

(e) Disposition of animals controlled or captured.

(3) The person or agency doing the control work shall have the equipment, knowledge and ability to control those species listed in the agreement.

(4) Agreements may be revoked, modified or suspended by the director or issuing authority as provided in WAC 232-12-197.

(5) Term of the agreement shall not exceed three years. The agreement may be extended three years at a time with written approval of both parties.

WAC 232-12-087 Requirements to possess Indian caught anadromous game fish or roe. It is unlawful for a person other than a treaty Indian to buy, sell or possess anadromous game fish lawfully taken by a treaty Indian unless said fish are accompanied by a written statement showing taker's name, address, tribal affiliation and treaty fish identification card number, number of fish, date and location where taken. Provisions of this regulation shall not apply to anadromous game fish purchased from a department licensed fish buyer.

WAC 232-12-091 Commercial buying and processing of anadromous game fish or roe. (1) It is unlawful to buy, sell or possess with intent to sell anadromous game fish or roe, without having in possession a valid anadromous

game fish buyer's license and comply with the following provisions:

(a) An anadromous game fish buyer's license is valid for a year (January 1 to December 31).

(b) Fish buyer's licenses must be obtained by applying to the Department of Game, 600 North Capitol Way, Olympia, Washington 98504.

(c) The anadromous game fish buyer's license, or a copy, must be in possession of a person buying anadromous game fish or roe.

(d) Fish buyer's licenses are not transferable.

(e) Fish buyer's licenses authorize a person to buy only anadromous game fish or roe taken by treaty Indians possessing valid federal or tribal fishing identification cards during lawful open seasons.

(2) It is unlawful for a person possessing or buying anadromous game fish or roe from a treaty Indian to not comply with the following:

(a) Completely, accurately and legibly fill out a state of Washington treaty Indian fish receiving ticket including name of seller or tribal identification number, tribal affiliation, numbers of fish or skeins of roe, marine area or river where caught, and signature of the person directly receiving the fish.

(b) Obtain the signature of the seller on the tribal copy of the receiving ticket.

(c) Transmit the receiving tickets daily to the Northwest Indian Fish Commission.

(d) Retain a copy of the receiving ticket with the anadromous game fish or roe as long as the fish or roe are in possession.

(3) Transactions involving the possession or sale of treaty caught anadromous game fish between two or more licensed buyers, the recipients of said fish must possess a sales invoice.

(4) This section does not apply to a person who buys lawfully caught treaty Indian anadromous game fish for personal consumption.

WAC 232-12-094 Records for purchase and receipt of anadromous game fish and roe. (1) Department fish buyer permittees must keep a record of the number of anadromous game fish and skeins of roe received or purchased.

(2) A record of all sales of anadromous game fish and roe must be maintained by licensed fish buyers for three years and are subject to inspection by a wildlife agent. Records of sales must include:

(a) Name and address of the purchaser or consignee.

(b) Number and pounds of each sale.

(c) Date of delivery.

WAC 232-12-097 Transportation of anadromous game fish and roe. (1) It is unlawful to ship or transport game fish and roe by a private or common carrier unless accompanied by an invoice which includes:

(a) The name and address of the consignor and consignee.

(b) Pounds and number of anadromous game fish and skeins of roe in the shipment.

(c) The date of shipment.

(2) Containers of anadromous game fish and roe transported must be clearly and conspicuously marked indicating the contents. A copy of the invoice shall be forwarded by the carrier to the Department of Game, 600 North Capitol Way, Olympia, Washington 98504, within seven days of said shipment.

WAC 232-12-099 Treaty Indian fishing gear identification. It is unlawful for a treaty Indian to operate or fish with a gill net capable of taking anadromous game fish without having attached to one end of the float line a metal tag 3/4 of an inch by 4 inches with the following numbering system:

(1) The first digit shall indicate the treaty area, the second digit the tribe within the treaty area, and the third through the seventh digits shall be the last five numbers of the fisherman's Bureau of Indian Affairs identification number.

WAC 232-12-101 Falconry and captive propagation of raptors permitted. (1) The director may issue permits for the taking and possession of a raptor for the purpose of falconry, captive live propagation, and for the possession, transfer, use and disposition of adult birds and progeny thereof, except for those species restricted by the state or that appear on the federal endangered species list. The director may issue a permit under WAC 232-12-274 for the taking or possession of raptor eggs. However, a federally threatened or endangered raptor held legally before November 10, 1978, and their progeny that have not been intentionally released to the wild may be retained for falconry use under these regulations. Such permits will be restricted to residents of the state of Washington.

(2) It is unlawful to take or possess a raptor or raptor eggs without a permit from the director. It is unlawful to violate the conditions of a permit issued under this rule.

WAC 232-12-104 Falconry definitions. (1) "Raptor" means a migratory bird of the family *Accipitridae* other than the bald eagle (*Haliaeetus leucocephalus*), or the family *Falconidae*, or the great horned owl (*Bubo virginianus*), of the family *Strigidae*.

(2) "Captive-bred raptor" means the progeny of a mating of raptors in captivity.

(3) "Take" means to trap or capture or attempt to trap or capture a raptor from the wild.

(4) "Falconry" means the possession and use of raptors for the purpose of hunting or free flight training.

WAC 232-12-107 Falconry permits required. (1) It is unlawful for any persons to take, possess, transport, import, export, sell, purchase, barter, offer to sell, purchase or barter raptors for falconry purposes, or to engage in the practice of falconry without first obtaining and having upon their person a valid Washington state "falconry permit."

(2) The requirements for each such permit shall be stated on each permit application. The limitations on the use of these permits shall be stated on each such permit.

(3) Falconry permits shall be issued only to applicants who have successfully passed a supervised examination with a score of at least eighty percent and who have raptor housing facilities and falconry equipment approved by the director. The requirements for such facilities and equipment shall be stated on each falconry permit application.

(4) The department may periodically inspect the falconry facilities, equipment and raptors of a falconry permittee at reasonable times.

(5) It is unlawful for falconry permittees to have in their possession or under their control, or to capture or attempt to capture, a species or number of raptors specifically prohibited by the director.

(6) It is unlawful for any person[s] to possess a bald eagle, vulture, osprey, or owl (except the great horned owl) for falconry.

WAC 232-12-114 Permit required for capture of raptors. (1) It is unlawful for any persons to capture from the wild, any state or federal endangered or threatened species for the purpose of falconry.

(2) It is unlawful for any persons to take a raptor for the purpose of falconry, without first having in their possession and on their person, a valid Washington state "falconry permit."

(3) It is unlawful for any persons to take from the wild for the purpose of falconry, those raptor species listed on the Washington state falconry permit, without first having in possession and on their person, a valid "raptor capture permit."

(4) "Raptor capture permits" may be issued by the director to holders of valid falconry permits. Additional requirements of each permit shall be stated on the permit. Additional limitation on the use of each permit shall be stated on each permit.

WAC 232-12-117 Marking and identification of raptors required. (1) It is unlawful for any falconry permittees to take, possess, transport, import, export, or otherwise dispose of any golden eagle (*Aquila chrysaetos*), peregrine falcon (*Falco peregrinus*), gyrfalcon (*Falco rusticolus*), or Harris hawk (*Parabuteo unicinctus*) unless such bird is banded either by a seamless numbered band, or a permanent, nonreusable band, which are both provided by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

(2) Any gyrfalcon (*Falco rusticolus*) taken from the wild must be reported to the department within five days of taking and must be banded with a permanent nonreusable band provided by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

(3) It is unlawful to band any raptor taken from the wild, or band any raptor produced from an egg taken from the wild, or band any raptor produced from an egg from any source other than bred in captivity under authority of a raptor propagation permit, with a United States Fish and Wildlife Service seamless numbered band.

(4) Unless otherwise specifically exempted by the conditions of a raptor propagation permit, every raptor possessed for propagation (including offspring produced under the authority of the raptor propagation permit) must be banded in accordance with the following provisions:

(a) Except for captive-bred raptors lawfully marked with a seamless, numbered band provided by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, any raptor possessed for propagation purposes shall be banded with a permanent, nonreusable, numbered band issued by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

(b) Each captive-bred raptor produced under the authority of a raptor propagation permit shall be banded within two weeks of hatching with a numbered, seamless band provided by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, placed on the raptor's leg (metatarsus), following United States Fish and Wildlife Service banding regulations.

(5) Any lost band must be replaced with a permanent, nonreusable band supplied by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service. A United States Fish and Wildlife Service form 3-186A (Migratory bird acquisition/disposition report) must be filed in accordance with the instructions on the form, with the department within five working days of the loss.

(6) Unless specifically exempted by the director, all lost or removed bands must be replaced on the bird within 30 days of loss or removal.

(7) It is unlawful to possess a raptor band that has been altered.

WAC 232-12-121 Reporting requirements for capture, importation, exportation, transfer, or other disposal of raptors. (1) It is unlawful to possess a raptor under the authority of a falconry permit unless the permittee has submitted a United States Fish and Wildlife Service form 3-186A (Migratory bird acquisition/disposition report), completed in accordance with instructions on the form, to the department within five calendar days of initial possession.

(2) It is unlawful for a falconry permittee to capture, transfer, import, export, or otherwise dispose of raptors unless such permittee submits a United States Fish and Wildlife Service form 3-186A (Migratory bird acquisition/disposition report), completed in accordance with the instructions on the form, to the department within five calendar days of any such transaction.

(3) A raptor possessed under the authority of a falconry permit may be temporarily held by another permittee, holding a general or masters permit, for maintenance and care for a period not to exceed thirty days. The raptor must be accompanied at all times by a properly completed United States Fish and Wildlife Service form 3-186A (Migratory bird acquisition/disposition report) designating the person caring for the raptor as the possessor of record and by a signed, dated statement from the permittee authorizing the temporary possession.

(4) A person shall report to the department, the loss, death, or release of their raptor within five days of each loss, death or release. The carcass of any dead raptors shall be delivered to the nearest department office, unless authorized by the department to be retained by falconry permittee.

(5) It is unlawful for a falconry permittee to capture or take from the wild, any raptor species listed on Washington state falconry permit unless such permittee submits a department of wildlife "Raptor capture report form," completed in accordance with the instructions on the form, to the department within five calendar days of any such capture or take.

WAC 232-12-124 Methods of capture and prohibitions in taking raptors. (1) It is unlawful for a person to remove more than one immature raptor from a nest.

(2) It is unlawful to trap a raptor originally taken after it attains adult plumage at any time of the year except as provided in subsection (6) of this section.

(3) It is unlawful to remove any immature raptor from a nest unless one or more live, immature raptors remain in the nest after such removal.

(4) It is unlawful to possess or use a trap, snare, net, harnessed bait bird or other implement that is employed in an attempt to capture a raptor without said equipment being legibly marked with the name and address of the user.

(5) It is unlawful for a person to leave unattended a trap, snare, harnessed bait bird, or other implement that is set for the purpose of capturing a raptor, except for the Swedish goshawk-type trap.

(6) It is unlawful for a person, other than the permittee, to retrap a marked raptor, which has been reported as lost, unless prior permission has been authorized by the director.

WAC 232-12-127 Revocation, modifications or suspension of falconry permits. A permit issued hereunder may be revoked, modified or suspended by the director for cause as provided in WAC 232-12-197. Cause shall include,

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but is not limited to, the failure to provide adequate falconry facilities and equipment or the failure to provide adequate care, feed or maintenance for a raptor or for inhumane treatment of a raptor.

WAC 232-12-129 Captive propagation of raptors—Sale, records, reports and inspection. (1) Anyone holding a valid raptor propagation permit may offer for sale, sell, or trade any captive bred raptor, wearing a seamless U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service band, to anyone holding a permit authorizing possession of said raptor.

(2) Anyone holding a valid raptor propagation permit, falconry permit, or other permit authorizing possession may purchase said captive bred raptor.

(3) Sale of a captive bred raptor is unlawful if it is not accompanied by an invoice. The raptor propagator must retain a copy of the invoice for two years and must send to the department a copy or a listing of the transfers in an annual report.

(4) Anyone holding a valid raptor propagation permit must keep record of the date each clutch is initiated, the onset of incubation and the date of hatching of each chick. The initiation of each clutch of eggs must be reported to the department within 72 hours. These records must be up to date and the breeding facilities and records open for inspection by a wildlife agent at reasonable times.

(5) Anyone holding a valid raptor propagation permit must submit to the department before January 31 of each year a report summarizing the year's activities.

WAC 232-12-131 Permits for special hunting and trapping seasons. (1) Holders of valid hunting licenses may apply for permits for special hunting seasons as prescribed by the commission.

(2) Holders of valid trapping licenses may apply for permits for special trapping seasons as prescribed by the commission.

(3) It is unlawful for a person receiving a special modern firearm or archery hunting season elk permit to apply for an elk permit for the next two years. Holders of disabled hunter permits, or blind/visually handicapped hunter permits, and muzzleloader hunters are exempt from the two-year waiting period.

(4) It is unlawful for a person receiving a special hunting season cougar permit to apply for such a permit for the next two years. A person applying for a cougar permit during that period will be made ineligible for that year's drawing.

(5) It is unlawful for a person receiving a special hunting season goat permit to apply for such a permit for the next five years. A person applying for a goat permit during that period will be made ineligible for that year's drawing.

(6) It is unlawful for a person receiving a special hunting season permit for mountain sheep to apply for another permit for that species if they are successful in taking a mountain sheep. A person who receives a special

permit for mountain sheep and is unsuccessful in taking a sheep may reapply after waiting for five years. A person applying for a sheep permit during that period will be made ineligible for that year's drawing.

WAC 232-12-141 Wild animal trapping. (1) The trapping season authorizes the taking of furbearing animals for their hides and pelts only. Furbearers may not be taken from the wild and held alive for sale or personal use without a special permit pursuant to WAC 232-12-064.

(2) Any wildlife trapped for which the season is not open shall be released unharmed. Any wildlife that cannot be released unharmed must be left in the trap, and the department of wildlife must be notified immediately.

(3) Lawfully trapped furbearers must be lethally dispatched or immediately released. A firearm may be used for this purpose.

(4) It is unlawful to trap for wild animals:

(a) By any means other than foot-hold traps, cage (live) traps, instant-kill traps and snares.

(b) With a steel trap having a jaw spread exceeding seven and one-half inches, except [that] an instant kill trap having a jaw spread exceeding seven and one-half inches is lawful when set beneath the water surface.

(c) With a No. 3 size or larger steel trap if it does not have spacing of at least three-sixteenth of one inch when the trap is sprung and when the set is not capable of drowning the trapped animal[.]

(d) With a No. 3 size or larger steel trap with teeth when the set is not capable of drowning the trapped animal.

(e) Unless traps or devices are checked and animals removed within seventy-two hours, except within identified urban trapping areas, where the set is not capable of drown-

ing the animal, traps or devices must be checked and animals removed within forty-eight hours.

(f) With a snare attached to a spring pole or any spring pole type of device.

(g) Within thirty feet of any exposed meat bait which is visible to flying raptors.

WAC 232-12-147 Maximum number of fishing lines and hooks—Snagging and gaffing fish unlawful. It is unlawful to:

(1) Fish for game fish or attempt to take game fish in a manner other than with one line which must be under the immediate control of the angler.

(2) Fish for game fish with a line having attached to it more than 3 hooks.

(3) Snag or attempt to snag game fish.

A gaff or landing net may be used to land game fish lawfully hooked.

Fresh water ling may be taken during the open season set for that species by use of set lines and multiple hooks as prescribed in current season's regulations. Set lines must have securely affixed a metal tag legibly stating the fisherman's name and address.

(3) Weight attached to the leader or line.

(4) Bait.

(2) Upon retaining a steelhead trout over twenty inches in length, the holder of a steelhead permit card must immediately enter on the permit card in ink the date of the catch and the river code number as listed on the card.

(3) Every person possessing a steelhead permit card must, by June 1, following the period for which it was issued, return that permit card to an authorized license dealer or the department.

WAC 232-12-166 Northern squawfish sport-reward fishery Columbia and Snake rivers. The Washington department of fish and wildlife shall administer a bounty voucher program for Northern squawfish (*Ptychocheilus oregonensis*) taken by legal fishing methods, in waters open to fishing, from the mouth of the Columbia River to the boundary markers 650 feet below the fish ladders at Priest Rapids Dam; from the mouth of the Snake River to the boat restricted zone below Hells Canyon Dam, and from [the] backwaters and sloughs as well as up to 400 feet into the

tributaries of the reaches listed above on the Columbia and Snake rivers. In addition, the following requirements shall be met to qualify for a voucher:

(a) Each angler must register in person, prior to fishing, at one of the registration stations each fishing day. A fishing day is a 24-hour period from 9:01 p.m. through 9:00 p.m. of the following day;

(b) Each angler, in person must exchange their eligible Northern squawfish for a voucher during the posted hours, and at the same registration station where the angler registered during the same fishing day;

(c) Each Northern squawfish must be eleven inches or longer in total length and presented in fresh condition or alive;

(d) Anglers shall provide information regarding their catch as requested by department personnel at the registration site and mail in survey forms; and

(e) Anglers shall obtain [a Washington state game fishing license to fish for Northern squawfish] [angling licenses] and must use a single rod, reel, and line with up to three hooks with no more than three points each.

WAC 232-12-168 Fishing contests. [(1)] Contest defined: By definition, a fishing contest exists when 6 or more persons fish competitively and determine winners, regardless of prize value.

[(2)] Application:

(a) Fishing contest permit applications should be submitted to the department by November 1 of each year for contests that are to take place the following calendar year. After November 1, applications must be submitted not less than 30 days prior to the date for which the contest is proposed.

(b) Applications must include the permit fee required by RCW 77.32.211. The fee will be returned if the permit is denied. No more than seven permits will be issued to any one permittee during a calendar year. The fee is \$24 per permit.

[(3)] Approval:

(a) Fishing contests which adversely affect fish or wildlife resources or other recreational opportunity may be denied.

(b) Contests will not be allowed on sea-run cutthroat trout, Dolly Varden or bull trout.

(c) Contests involving only juveniles or the handicapped may exceed the participation limits in contests per month, contests per year, or boats per contest day with permission from the director. Also, contests involving only juveniles may target any fish species except sea-run cutthroat trout, Dolly Varden or bull trout, under one permit.

[(4)] Prize value: Total prize value per contest will not exceed \$400 when trout, steelhead, char, whitefish, grayling, or kokanee are included as target species; provided that contests wherein other species not listed above are targeted,

or where bass or walleye are the targeted species and at least 90 percent of bass or walleye are released alive and in good condition after the contest, may qualify for no limitation on amount of prize. Contests involving only juveniles are not required to meet 90 percent live release requirements even if bass or walleye are included as a target species.

[(5)] Legal requirements, all contests:

(a) Fishing contest permits must be in the possession of the contest sponsor or official at the contest site.

(b) Contests are restricted to the species and water[s] approved on the permit. Only those species listed as a target of the contest may be retained by contest participants during bass or walleye contests where all contestants fish at the same time and place.

(c) Sponsors must report contest information requested by the department within 10 days after the contest has ended. Subsequent contest permits will not be issued for one year after the date of the contest for which the report was not returned if this requirement is not fulfilled.

(d) Contest participants may not restrict public access at boat launches.

(e) Contests where all participants expect to fish at the same time from boats on lakes or reservoirs will not last longer than three consecutive days and have the following limits per water:

* No more than four weekend days per month nor more than two weekends per month may be scheduled on any water when contestants fish at the same time, and are allowed to fish from boats.

[**] Two separate contest permits may be issued with no more than 150 boats per contest.

(f) It is unlawful for the fishing contest permittee or any of the contest participants to fail to comply with the conditions of the fishing contest permit, or of general fishing rules not specifically exempted by this permit. Failure of the permittee or any of the contestants to comply with all provisions of the contest permit or of other fishing regulations during a contest may lead to revocation of the permit.

[(6)] Special regulations, bass and walleye contests:

(a) In any contest targeting either bass or walleye, all live bass or walleye must be released alive into the water from which they were caught after being weighed and/or measured. At the end of each day's competition, if the mortality of target fish caught that day exceeds 10%, the contest will be suspended. Suspended contests may be continued (within assigned permit dates) only if the cause of the high mortality can be positively identified, and the cause of the mortality (high waves, equipment deficiency, etc.) ceases or is corrected by contest officials. Contests involving only juveniles are not required to meet the 90 percent live release requirement for any approved species.

(b) During bass contests only, participants may continue to fish while holding a daily catch limit of bass in possession for the particular water being fished, as long as one fish is

released immediately upon catching a fish which would make the angler in excess of the daily catch limit if kept. The fish released may come either from the one just caught, or from the livewell, but at no time may the angler have more than a daily limit in the livewell.

(c) During bass contests, contestants may not use live bait, except that contests involving only juveniles which include bass as a target species may use bait.

(d) During bass contests held on waters managed under statewide "standard" regulations, participants may retain a daily catch limit of bass of any size to be weighed in. However, if the contest is on waters managed by "nonstandard" (exception) regulations, no deviations to size limits are allowed. Regardless of whether the contest is on a water managed by "standard" or "exception" regulations, tournament anglers may not be in possession of more than the daily catch limit for the water being fished, except as authorized under (6)(f) below.

(e) During walleye contests, all current bag and size remain in effect. No size or number limit exceptions are allowed for walleye contests except as authorized under (6)(f) below.

(f) The contest director or director designee may exceed possession limits for bass or walleye for the purpose of transporting fish from a weigh-in site to an open-water area. During transportation, the transport boat must not leave the water the fish were caught from and a copy of the contest permit must be on board during actual fish transport.

(g) Livewell dimensions: During walleye tournaments, all livewells used to hold walleye must be at least 34 inches in length and have a water capacity of at least 20 gallons. Not more than 6 walleye may be placed in a single livewell. All livewells must have both a functional freshwater pump and backup aeration capability.

(h) Boat identification: All boats used for fishing in bass contests must be clearly identified according to criteria established by the department.

WAC 232-12-169 Hunting contests. A person wishing to hold a hunting contest must comply with the following provisions:

(1) Only organizations filed with the state of Washington as a nonprofit corporation may apply for a hunting contest permit.

(2) Hunting contest permit applications shall be submitted to the department 30 days prior to the date for which the contest is proposed.

(3) Applications must include the permit fee required by RCW 77.32.211. The fee will be returned if the permit is denied.

(4) Contests are restricted to the species approved on the permit.

(5) Total value of prizes per contest shall not exceed \$2000.

(6) Entry fees or requests for donations are prohibited.

(7) It is unlawful to fail to comply with the conditions of a hunting contest permit.

Hunting contests which may adversely affect wildlife resources will be denied.

WAC 232-12-174 Domestic animals on department lands. It is unlawful for any person to allow domesticated animals to be unattended on, or to permit livestock to graze upon land under the control of the department without a written permit from the director. In addition to other penalties provided by law, any such person may be liable to the department for a compensatory fee of one dollar per head of livestock per day.

WAC 232-12-177 Vehicles using department lands.

(1) It is unlawful to operate a motor driven vehicle on lands owned, controlled or managed by the department except on such land or roads as may be authorized by the director.

(2) It is unlawful to operate a motor driven vehicle on a road controlled or managed by the department pursuant to road management agreement in a manner or for a purpose contrary to posted signs or notices except as authorized by the director.

WAC 232-12-181 Livestock grazing on department of wildlife lands. All persons wishing to apply for a grazing lease should contact the Washington Department of Wildlife, 600 North Capitol Way, Olympia, Washington 98504.

(1) The director is authorized to enter into grazing leases when the director determines that a grazing lease will benefit wildlife management programs and will be in the public interest. Except for temporary permits, each grazing lease shall first be submitted to the commission, which may review the lease to determine whether it will benefit wildlife or improve public hunting, fishing or recreation without adverse impact on wildlife. If, within 30 days, the commission has not disapproved the lease, the director shall be deemed authorized to enter into that lease.

(2) The director shall advertise and sell a license to use department lands for grazing at public auction to the highest bidder. The director is authorized to reject any and all bids if it is determined to be in the best interest of the department to do so. The director may negotiate a grazing lease without using the public auction process only when the director determines that benefits to wildlife would be equal to or greater than the cash or monetary payments foregone.

(3) The term of each grazing lease shall be no greater than five years. When an existing lease expires or is about to expire, and the director wishes to continue to permit grazing on the subject parcel, then a modified public auction process shall be used. A minimum bid based on market value shall be established prior to the public auction. The last previous or the existing lessee shall be provided the option of meeting the highest bid made at public auction. The director may grant a term longer than five years only with the prior approval of the commission. The director may permit exceptions to the public auction process only when the director determines that benefits to wildlife would be equal to or greater than the cash or monetary payment foregone.

(4) A temporary permit may be granted by the director to satisfy an immediate, short-term need where benefits to wildlife management programs and the public interest can be demonstrated. The term of a temporary permit shall not exceed two weeks and no fee need be charged.

(5) The director may approve a grazing lease where a grazing management plan which includes objectives and site characteristics, pasture rotation schedule, on-off dates, number of AUM's, and a monitoring plan has been developed by the agency. The director shall inspect the site of a grazing lease no less than two times each year. The director shall retain the right to alter provisions of the plan to reduce acreage available or the number of animals using the area when such change is, in the judgment of the director, required to benefit fish or wildlife management, public hunting and fishing, or other recreational uses. The director may not enter into any grazing lease not accompanied by a grazing management plan unless the commission has approved it.

(6) The director may cancel a lease (1) for noncompliance with the terms and conditions of the lease, or (2) if the area described in the lease is included in a land use plan determined by the agency to be a higher and better use, or (3) if the property is sold or conveyed, or (4) if damage to wildlife or wildlife habitat occurs.

(7) All lands covered by any agreement shall at all times be open to public hunting, fishing and other wildlife recreational uses unless such lands have been closed by action of the commission or emergency order of the director.

WAC 232-12-184 Aircraft—Authorized use on department lands. Except as authorized by the director or the director of the department of natural resources, it is unlawful to land aircraft on lands owned, leased or controlled by the department, except in the case of a bona fide emergency.

WAC 232-12-194 Procedure—Petitions for reissuance of hunting license—Time period for petition—Juvenile applicants. (1) A petition for reissuance of a license revoked under the terms of RCW 77.21.020 or 77.21.030 generally will not be considered by the commission until passage of at least one year from the date the license privilege was revoked.

(2) An applicant for reissuance of a license who is under the age of eighteen years shall be accompanied by a parent, family member over the age of eighteen years, or legal guardian in any appearance before the commission for purposes of requesting reissuance of a hunting license.

(3) Reissuance hearings for a person under the age of fourteen years shall be conducted by the commission in executive session.

(4) Upon motion of an applicant or a commission member, reissuance hearing for persons over the age of fourteen years may be conducted by the commission in executive session.

(5) Applications for reissuance of a license shall be made in writing and filed with the director. The application shall state the relief sought and grounds therefor. As soon as practicable, the director shall note the application for hearing at a regularly scheduled meeting of the commission, and give reasonable notice to the applicant by mail of the date, time and place of hearing.

WAC 232-12-197 Procedures to review administrative license decisions. The following procedure applies to all administrative decisions of the department which suspend, revoke, cancel, condition, refuse to issue or renew, or otherwise which adversely affect any license, permit, or administrative approval issued by the department. However, the procedures here do not apply to petitions for reissuance of hunting licenses revoked pursuant to RCW 77.21.020 or 77.21.030. Suspensions of licenses by the director pursuant to RCW 77.21.020 and 77.21.030 are covered by subsection (7) of this section.

(1) Any license, permit of administrative approval issued by the department may be suspended, revoked, cancelled, conditioned, or its issuance or reissuance denied, for cause. Cause is a general term, necessarily discretionary. The following typically may result in adverse administrative action: Failure to submit full, complete, or timely information required by law; failure to submit a timely or complete application for license renewal; violation of the terms or conditions of a license or permit; violations of game laws or rules or regulations or violation of a particularly crucial or important requirement of law; failure to qualify under the requirements for issuance of a license or permit; failure to give evidence of a continued ability to comply with license terms and conditions or agency rules and regulations; violations of RCW 77.21.020 and 77.21.030.

(2) Any person who, upon proper application, is denied a requested license or permit, refused reissuance of a requested license or permit or contests a condition placed in a granted license, permit or administrative approval, or who has a license, permit or administrative approval suspended, revoked, or cancelled is entitled to an opportunity for a hearing contesting the administrative action, pursuant to the Administrative Procedure Act, chapter 34.04 RCW. No administrative action towards an existing or continuing license shall be final without first affording at least twenty days notice of the agency's action and affording an opportunity for a hearing prior to the effective date of the action. To obtain a hearing, a written request must be filed with the director within ten days of receipt of the contested administrative decision. The request for hearing shall clearly state the relief sought and the grounds therefor.

(3) Upon receipt of the written request for administrative hearing, the director may appoint a hearing examiner to conduct further proceedings, including setting a time and place for hearing. Generally, the provisions of the uniform procedures rules, chapter 1-08 WAC, will apply to the hearing, unless here modified or modified by agreement of the parties.

(4) A hearing examiner will take evidence and otherwise conduct a hearing. Upon receipt of all proof and argument, written findings of fact, conclusions of law and proposed order will be issued by the examiner, with copies mailed to each party and attorney of record, if any.

(5) Within ten days of receipt of findings of fact, conclusions of law and the examiner's proposed order, an aggrieved party may file with the director exceptions to the order and written argument in support of the exceptions. Replies to the exceptions, if any, shall be filed within ten

days of receipt of the exceptions. The director will personally consider the record submitted and issue a final decision in writing, which shall be served by mail on all parties and attorneys of record, if any. The director's decision is a final decision for purposes of appeal to the superior court pursuant to RCW 34.04.130.

(6) There are no special rules of appearance before the department, except those specified in the Executive Conflict of Interest Act, chapter 42.18 RCW, and chapter 1-08 WAC.

(7) The department may take immediate administrative action, without affording an opportunity to prior hearing, in those instances constituting an emergency as further described in RCW 34.04.170(2). Additionally, pursuant to RCW 77.21.020 and 77.21.030, the director will immediately suspend hunting privileges upon receipt of information showing a hunting violation or accident. The occurrence of a violation or accident may be contested by the license holder. If uncontested, the director's suspension will result in revocation of the license, subject to the right to request reissuance, as specified in WAC 232-12-194.

WAC 232-12-207 Petitions—Consideration by commission. A petition requesting the promulgation, amendment or repeal of any rule, regulation or order of the commission may be made in writing to the director and shall state that the same is made pursuant to this regulation. Such petition shall set forth the proposed rule in full or the existing rule with amendment, as the case may be, and shall include a statement of all reasons why said rule should be adopted, amended or repealed.

All petitions shall be considered by the director who may in his discretion note the petition for consideration at a regular meeting of the commission. The director shall notify the petitioning party of the disposition of the petition within a reasonable time.

The petition shall be submitted to the director who may in his discretion place the petition on the agenda of the commission at one of its regular meetings and shall give reasonable notice to the petitioner of the time and place for hearing by the commission. Petitioner may appear and present argument to the commission at any such hearing.

The commission after hearing, shall issue a binding declaratory rule, a nonbinding declaratory rule or notify the petitioner that no declaratory rule is to be issued.

The director shall notify the petitioner of action taken with reference to the petition.

WAC 232-12-224 Possession of wildlife off an Indian reservation legally possessed on reservation. It is unlawful for an enrolled tribal member who has lawfully acquired possession of wildlife, with the exception of game fish, from an Indian reservation to possess that wildlife off the reservation for any purpose other than personal use. Wildlife taken from an Indian reservation must be accompanied by a permit issued by the department or appropriate tribal authority prior to being transported off the Indian reservation.

WAC 232-12-227 Hunter education training program requirements. (1) The director may designate a state coordinator for the purpose of administering the hunter education program. The state coordinator shall be responsible for the certification of volunteer instructors and the development of instructional materials, training aids, operating policies and procedures necessary to comply with the provisions of this section and RCW 77.32.155.

(2) It is unlawful for any person under the age of eighteen to obtain a hunting license in the state of Washington without having completed a department-approved course involving at least ten hours of instruction in conservation, safety and sportsmanship.

(3) Upon satisfactory completion of these requirements, each student shall be issued a certificate of accreditation signed by an authorized instructor or the state coordinator.

(4) It is unlawful for a license dealer to issue a hunting license for a person under eighteen years of age unless a hunter education certificate or a Washington hunting license for the preceding year containing the hunter education certificate number issued to said person is presented at the time of purchase.

WAC 232-12-241 Requirements of license dealers.

(2) License dealers shall remit all moneys collected from the sale of licenses, permits, tags, stamps[,] and punchcards by the 10th day of the following month in which the licenses are sold.

(3) License dealers must issue licenses, permits, tags, stamps[,] and punchcards in accordance with instructions provided by the department in the license dealer[']s manual.

(4) All records held pursuant to the statutes and regulations dealing with license dealers must be open to inspection by a wildlife agent or department designee at reasonable times.

(5) License dealers may charge an agent fee of \$1.00 for the issuance of each license document and \$.50 for the issuance of each tag, permit, special hunting permit application, and the state migratory waterfowl stamp.

WAC 232-12-264 Baiting of game birds—Unlawful. It is unlawful to hunt game birds by the aid of baiting, or in a baited area. As used in this section "baiting" or "baited area" means the placing, exposing, depositing, distributing or scattering of corn, wheat or other grain, or feed so as to constitute for such birds a lure or attraction to, on or over areas where hunters are attempting to take them. This shall not prohibit hunting of game birds, on or over standing crops, flooded crop lands, grain crops properly harvested on the field where grown or grains found scattered as the result of normal agricultural planting or harvesting.

WAC 232-12-267 Field identification of wildlife—Evidence of sex—Definitions. (1) It is unlawful to possess or transport game birds unless the feathered heads are left attached to the carcass, except falconry caught birds, until the carcass is processed and/or stored for consumption.

(2) It is unlawful to possess or transport big game animals unless evidence of the sex of the animal remains naturally attached to the carcass until the carcass is processed and/or stored for consumption.

(a) Evidence of sex means the head with antlers or horns attached or penis or testes of male big game animals or the head or udder of female big game animals any of which must be naturally attached to at least one quarter of the carcass or to the largest portion of meat.

(b) For the purpose of this rule, "stored for consumption" means at the final point of storage prior to consumption of the meat.

(3) It is unlawful to possess or transport goat, sheep, moose, deer or elk taken in hunting areas which have horn or antler restrictions unless the head or skull plate, with both horns or both antlers naturally attached, accompanies the carcass.

(4) The possession of a taxidermist's receipt which includes the taxidermist's name, address, and telephone number, the hunter's name, address, telephone number, license, and tag number, the species and sex of the game bird or big game animal taken, as well as antler points or horn size and the date and GMU location or special deer/elk permit area where taken, shall be deemed to constitute compliance with this section.

For the purpose of this rule "accompanies the carcass" means to remain with the carcass until it has reached the point of processing or storage.

WAC 232-12-271 Criteria for planting aquatic plants and releasing wildlife. (1) Release by persons other than the director. It is unlawful for persons other than the director to plant aquatic plants or release any species, subspecies, or hybrids of animals which do not already exist in the wild in Washington. If such species, subspecies, or hybrid does already exist in the wild in Washington, it may be released within its established range by persons other than the director, but only after obtaining a permit from the director.

(a) Application for a permit must be made on a form provided by the department. It must be submitted at least thirty days prior to acquisition of the wildlife or aquatic plants intended for release or planting, and must provide all information indicated.

(b) Permits will only be issued if the director determines there will be no adverse impact on the wildlife or wildlife habitat of the state.

(c) Each permit shall require that at least thirty days prior to planting or release of wildlife or aquatic plants they must be made available for inspection by the director. It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to show that the wildlife will not pose a disease threat. If the director is not satisfied that the wildlife or aquatic plants do not pose a disease threat, they shall not be released or planted in the state. Director approval for release or planting may be withdrawn for cause.

(d) Each permit shall require that an applicant intending to release wildlife in the state shall report immediately to the director the outbreak of any disease among the wildlife intended to be released. If the director determines that such outbreak presents a threat to the wildlife of the state, the director may immediately order such action as necessary including quarantine or destruction of stock, sterilization of enclosures and facilities, cessation of activities, and disposal of wildlife in a manner satisfactory to the director.

(e) Each permit shall require that wildlife to be released shall not be branded, tattooed, tagged, fin clipped or otherwise marked for identification without approval of the director or as required in WAC 232-12-044.

(f) Legally acquired pheasant of the genus *Phasianus*; gray partridge of the genus *Perdix*; chukar partridge of the genus *Alectoris*; quail of the genus *Lophortyx*, *Callipepla*, and *Colinus*; and mallard ducks of the species *Anas platyrhynchos* may be released without a permit for purposes of dog training, and hunting pursuant to WAC 232-12-044. Game birds released for these purposes must be purchased from facilities that have been inspected by a certified veterinarian within the past twelve months.

(2) Release by the director. The director may plant aquatic plants or release animal species, subspecies, or hybrids which have been planted or released previously in Washington if they do not pose a disease threat and if planting or release will not cause adverse impact on the wildlife or wildlife habitat of the state. Before releasing any

species, subspecies, or hybrid of animal not already existing in the wild in Washington, the director shall report to the commission on the planned release, stating the basis for determining that the planned release fulfills the criteria set forth herein. The director may release nonnative species, subspecies, or hybrids not previously released in Washington only if the director in his or her sole discretion has determined that:

(a) There is no reasonable expectation of adverse impact on the wildlife or wildlife habitat of the state and there is an adequate plan for evaluating such impact following the release;

(b) The commission has classified the species, subspecies, or hybrids to be released pursuant to RCW 77.12.020;

(c) Suitable habitat is available;

(d) The nonnative species, subspecies, or hybrids to be released are free of exotic pathogens;

(e) The release serves the public interest.

WAC 232-12-275 Wildlife rehabilitation permits.

(1) It is unlawful to possess wildlife for the purpose of rehabilitation without first obtaining a current, valid Washington state "wildlife rehabilitation permit."

(2) A wildlife rehabilitation permit, valid for the time specified on the permit, may be issued to a person to treat or care for injured, diseased, or abandoned wildlife for the purpose of successful release to the wild.

(3) The director may issue and condition a wildlife rehabilitation permit if the applicant complies with the following:

(a) The applicant is either a licensed veterinarian or can demonstrate 6 months of experience in wildlife rehabilitation, which must include 3 months during the spring or summer. The director may consider education in wildlife rehabilitation as a substitute for experience.

(b) The applicant must successfully complete a wildlife rehabilitator's examination(s) as prescribed by the director.

(c) Applicants who are not licensed veterinarians must provide to the department a letter signed by a person willing to act as principal veterinarian.

(d) The wildlife rehabilitation facility must meet the wildlife rehabilitation care standards and wildlife rehabilitation facility standards as prescribed by the director. Wildlife rehabilitation facilities permitted by the director prior to May 15, 1988 must meet the wildlife rehabilitation facility standards prescribed by the director or have a director approved plan for implementation on or before January 1, 1989.

(4) It is unlawful to hold wildlife for longer than 180 days except as authorized by the director.

(5) It is unlawful to publicly display wildlife while it is undergoing rehabilitation.

(6) It is unlawful to retain wildlife for the purpose of orphan-imprinting or to retain feathers of protected or endangered wildlife for the purpose of "imping," except as provided by written permission from the director.

(7) It is unlawful for wildlife being held for rehabilitation to be used for propagation.

(8) A wildlife rehabilitator may receive from the department and possess at the wildlife rehabilitation facility dead wildlife for the purpose of feeding wildlife being rehabilitated.

(9) The holder of a wildlife rehabilitation permit must submit to the department no later than January 31 of each year an annual report providing information as required by the director. The department will provide wildlife rehabilitators with a wildlife rehabilitation ledger which may also be submitted as the annual report.

(10) It is unlawful for a wildlife rehabilitation permit holder to fail to enter required information in the wildlife rehabilitation ledger within 24 hours of the day wildlife is received and on the day of all subsequent activities as required in the ledger.

(11) All permits and records held pursuant to statutes and rules dealing with wildlife rehabilitation will be kept on file at the wildlife rehabilitation facility. These records will be maintained on a calendar year basis and will be retained for a period of five years. A copy of the valid wildlife rehabilitation permit must be in the possession of any person possessing or transporting wildlife for the wildlife rehabilitation facility.

(12) Wildlife agents may inspect at reasonable times and in a reasonable manner the wildlife, permits, records, and wildlife rehabilitation facility of any wildlife rehabilitator.

(13) It is unlawful for a permittee to fail to comply with the conditions of a wildlife rehabilitation permit.

(14) For the purposes of this rule, the following definitions apply:

(a) "Wildlife rehabilitation" means the care and treatment of injured, diseased, or abandoned wildlife, including but not limited to capture, transporting, veterinary treatment, feeding, housing, exercise therapy, and any other treatment or training necessary for release back to the wild.

(b) "Wildlife rehabilitation facility" means the authorized site(s) as shown on the wildlife rehabilitation permit where the treatment and rehabilitation takes place.

(c) "Wildlife rehabilitator" means a person who cares for or treats injured, diseased, or abandoned wildlife for the purpose of releasing said wildlife to the wild.

(d) "Wildlife rehabilitation permit" means a permit issued by the director that authorizes a person to possess for treatment or care, injured, diseased, or abandoned wildlife for the purpose of successful release to the wild.

(e) "Principal veterinarian" means a licensed veterinarian who provides in writing their willingness to assist the rehabilitator in the medical treatment of injured, diseased, or abandoned wildlife.

(f) "Public display" means to place or locate wildlife so that it may be viewed by the public.

(g) "Imping" means a method of repairing broken feathers.

(h) "Orphan-imprinting" means to use nonreleasable adult wildlife for the purpose of feeding, socializing, and teaching appropriate behavior to young of the same species.

WAC 232-12-276 Scientific permits. (1) It is unlawful to collect wildlife or their nests and eggs for the purpose of research or display without first obtaining a Washington state scientific permit.

(2) A scientific permit, valid for the time specified on the permit, may be issued to a person to collect wildlife or their nests and eggs for the purpose of research or display.

(3) The director may issue and place conditions upon the exercise of a scientific permit if the applicant complies with the following:

(a) The applicant will submit a completed application providing specific information required by the director.

(b) The applicant will submit a study plan which includes specific project objectives and justification for collection; target species and number to be collected; method(s) of collection; location(s) of collection; and proposed final disposition of collection.

(c) The applicant will demonstrate their qualifications for conducting the collection and the research or display of wildlife as requested in the application.

(d) The applicant will demonstrate access to adequate facilities and competence necessary to care for live wildlife to be collected for research or display.

(4) Scientific permits will not be granted if, in the opinion of the director, the collection conflicts with existing collection, research or management activities.

(5) A copy of the valid scientific permit must be in the possession of any person exercising the privileges authorized by the permit. Subpermittees will be identified in a manner prescribed by the director.

(6) It is unlawful for a scientific permit holder to fail to keep accurate records showing information as required by the director. These records shall be maintained on a calendar year basis and shall be retained for a period of five years.

(7) It is unlawful for the holder of a scientific permit to fail to submit to the department an annual report providing information as required by the director no later than January 31 of the year following issuance of a scientific permit.

(8) Scientific permit holders collecting wildlife or their nests or eggs for the purpose of research must submit to the department a copy of the final report. Interim reports may be required.

(9) Wildlife agents may inspect at reasonable times and in a reasonable manner the wildlife, nests, eggs, permits, records, and facilities of a scientific permit holder.

(10) It is unlawful for live wildlife collected directly from the wild to be displayed except by publicly owned zoos and aquariums. Live nonreleasable wildlife acquired under a wildlife rehabilitation permit may be used for wildlife education programs under conditions prescribed by the director.

(11) It is unlawful to fail to comply with the conditions of a scientific permit.

(12) For the purposes of this rule, the following definitions apply:

(a) "Collect" means to take control of or attempt to take control of wildlife or their nests and eggs.

(b) "Display" means to place or locate wildlife so that public viewing is encouraged or allowed.

WAC 232-12-277 Taxidermy and furdealing records. (1) It is unlawful for a licensed taxidermist or furdealer upon receiving wildlife for mounting, tanning, storage or processing to fail to record the following information:

- (a) The taxidermist's name, address, and business phone;
- (b) The date the item was received;
- (c) The hunter/taker's name and address;
- (d) The owner's name and address;
- (e) A description of the species received;
- (f) The county where taken (GMU if available);
- (g) The license, tag, permit, and seal number;
- (h) The date the completed item was returned to the original customer. Such record must be maintained for a minimum of two years or as long as the wildlife is retained by the taxidermist or furdealer and shall be maintained in a central location at the principle place of business either in a ledger provided by the department or on sequentially numbered pre-printed invoices provided by the taxidermist or furdealer. Taxidermists or furdealers opting to use pre-printed invoices are required to maintain all sequentially numbered invoices, including voided documents.

(2) All records and wildlife held pursuant to the statutes or regulations dealing with taxidermy or furdealing must be open to inspection by a wildlife agent at reasonable times in accordance with the provisions of RCW 77.12.095.

(3) Licensed taxidermists or furdealers who have complied with the ledger requirements established in this section shall be deemed to be in compliance with the notice and reporting requirements contained in WAC 232-12-021 and 232-12-077.

WAC 232-12-284 Bighorn sheep—Branding requirements. (1) For the purpose of this regulation, horns shall be defined as the permanent, paired, hollow sheath of bighorn sheep attached to the bony core and skull.

(2) It is unlawful for a person who kills or possesses a bighorn sheep taken in Washington to fail, within ten days after acquisition, to present the horns for inspection and branding at a game department regional office. A department employee shall permanently brand an identification number on one of the horns.

(3) It is unlawful for any person to possess the horns of a bighorn sheep taken in Washington without a number so branded.

(4) It is unlawful for any person who transfers ownership or possession of the horns of a bighorn sheep to which an identification number has been branded to fail to give written notice of the transfer to the department within ten days after the transfer.

WAC 232-12-287 Possession of dead wildlife. Except as authorized by permit of the director, it is unlawful to possess wildlife found dead. Nothing in this regulation

will prohibit the possession of naturally shed antlers of deer and elk.

WAC 232-12-291 Hunting before or after hours. It is unlawful to hunt wild animals or wild birds contrary to posted or official daily hunting hours in current season regulations.

WAC 232-12-292 Bald eagle protection rules.

Purpose

- 1.1 The purpose of these rules is to protect the habitat and thereby increase and maintain the population of the bald eagle so that the species no longer is classified as threatened or endangered in Washington state. The "delisting" of the bald eagle for Washington state is a realistic goal which can best be accomplished by promoting cooperative efforts to manage for site-specific eagle habitat needs through a process which is sensitive to the site-specific landowner goals as well. The following rules are designed to promote such cooperative management.

Authority

- 2.1 These rules are promulgated pursuant to RCW 77.12.655.

Definitions

- 3.1 "Communal roost site" means all of the physical features surrounding trees used for night roosting that are important to the suitability of the roost for eagle use. These features include flight corridors, sources of disturbance, trees in which eagles spend the night, trees used for perching during arrival or departure and other trees or physical features, such as hills, ridges, or cliffs that provide wind protection.
- 3.2 "Cultural activities" means activities conducted to foster the growth of agricultural plants and animals.
- 3.3 "Delist" means to remove a species from the state special species list by action of the game commission or from the federal endangered species list by action of the secretary of the interior.
- 3.4 "Department" means department of game.
- 3.5 "Endangered" means a species which is seriously threatened with extirpation throughout all or a significant portion of its range within Washington.
- 3.6 "Government entities" means all agencies of federal, state and local governments.
- 3.7 "Landowner" means any individual, private, partnership, nonprofit, municipal, corporate, city, county, or state agency or entity which exercises control over a bald eagle habitat whether such control is based on legal or equitable title, or which manages or holds in trust land in Washington state.

- 3.8 "Nest tree" means any tree that contains a bald eagle nest or has contained a nest.
- 3.9 "Nest site" means all of the physical features surrounding bald eagle nests that are important to normal breeding behavior. These features include alternate and potential nest trees, perch trees, vegetative screening, foraging area, frequently used flight paths, and sources of disturbance.
- 3.10 "Perch tree" means a tree that is consistently used by eagles. It is often close to a nest or feeding site and is used for resting, hunting, consumption of prey, mating display and as a sentry post to defend the nest.
- 3.11 "Predicides" means chemicals used to kill or control problem wildlife.
- 3.12 "Region" means an ecological/geographic area that forms a unit with respect to eagles, e.g., Hood Canal, lower Columbia River, outer coast and south Puget Sound.
- 3.13 "Site management plan" means a legal agreement between the department and the landowner for management of a bald eagle nest or roost site.
- 3.14 "Threatened" means a species that could become endangered within Washington without active management or removal of threats.

Applicability and operation

- 4.1 The department of game shall make available to other governmental entities, interest groups, landowners and individuals information regarding the location and use pattern of eagle nests and communal roosts.
- 4.2 The department of game shall itself and through cooperative efforts (such as memoranda of understandings) work with other government agencies and organizations to improve the data base for nest and roost site activity and productivity. The department regularly shall confer with other governmental entities to improve the preliminary nest site management information and its accessibility and useability.
- 4.3 The department's goal shall be to identify, catalog and prioritize eagle nesting or roost sites. The department shall facilitate landowner notification that nesting or roost sites exist on their property and work with landowners to develop a nesting or roost site description.
- 4.4 When a proposed land-use activity involves land containing or adjacent to an eagle nest or communal roost, the permitting agency shall immediately notify the department of game of the permit application.
- 4.5 When the department determines that a proposed activity would adversely impact eagle habitat, a department representative shall meet on-site with the landowner and, where applicable, a representative of the permitting agency to discuss management options for the protection of eagle habitat. The purpose of these discussions shall be to reach agreement on a site management plan for bald eagle habitat protection.
- 4.6 It is recognized that normal on-going agricultural activities of land preparation, cultivating, planting, harvesting, other cultural activities, grazing and animal-rearing activities in existing facilities do not have significant adverse consequences for eagles and therefore do not require a site management plan. New building construction, conversion of lands from agriculture to other uses, application of pre-acides and aerial pesticide spraying, may, following a conference with the department of game, be subject to the site management planning process described in these rules.
- 4.7 Emergency situations, such as insect infestation of crops, requires immediate action on the site management plan or special permission to address the impending crisis by the department of game.

Site management plan for bald eagle habitat protection

- 5.1 The purpose of the site management plan is to provide for the protection of specific bald eagle habitat in such a way as to recognize the special characteristics of the site and the landowner's property rights, goals and pertinent options. To this end, every land owner shall have fair access to the process including available incentives and benefits. Any relevant factor shall be considered, including, but not limited to, the following:
- 5.1.1 The status of the eagle population in the region.
- 5.1.2 The useful life of the nest or roost trees and condition of the surrounding forest; the topography; accessibility and visibility; and existing and alternative flight paths, perch trees, snags and potential alternative nest and roost trees.
- 5.1.3 Eagle behavior and historical use patterns, available food sources, and vulnerability to disturbance.
- 5.1.4 The surrounding land-use conditions, including degree of development and human use.
- 5.1.5 Land ownership, landowner ability to manage, and flexibility of available landowner options.
- 5.1.6 Appropriate and acceptable incentive mechanisms such as conservation easements, transfer or purchase of development rights, leases, mutual covenants, or land trade or purchase.
- 5.1.7 Published recommendations for eagle habitat protection of other government entities such as the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.
- 5.2 The site management plan shall provide for
- 5.2.1 Tailoring the timing, duration or physical extent of activities to minimize disturbance to the existing eagle habitat and, where appropriate, identifying and taking steps to encourage and create alternative eagle habitat; and

5.2.2 Establishing a periodic review of the plan to monitor whether:

- a) The plan requires amendment in response to changing eagle and landowner circumstances
- b) The terms of the plan comply with applicable laws and regulations,
- c) The parties to the plan are complying with its terms.

5.3 The site management plan may also provide for implementing landowner incentive and compensation mechanisms through which the existing eagle habitat can be maintained or enhanced.

Guidelines for acquisition of bald eagle habitat

6.1 Real property interests may be acquired and agreements entered into which could enhance protection of bald eagle habitat. These include fee simple acquisition, land trades, conservation easements, transfer or purchase of development rights, leases, and mutual covenants. Acquisition shall be dependent upon having a willing seller and a willing buyer. Whatever interest or method of protection is preferable will depend on the particular use and ownership characteristics of a site. In discussing conservation objectives with private or public landowners, the department shall explore with the landowner the variety of protection methods which may be appropriate and available.

6.2 The following criteria and priorities shall be considered by the department when it is contemplating acquiring an interest in a bald eagle habitat.

6.2.1 Site considerations:

- a) Relative ecological quality, as compared to similar habitats
- b) Ecological viability—the ability of the habitat and eagle use to persist over time
- c) Defensibility—the existence of site conditions adequate to protect the eagle habitat from unnatural encroachments
- d) Manageability—the ability to manage the site to maintain suitable eagle habitat
- e) Proximity to food source
- f) Proximity to other protected eagle habitat
- g) Proximity to department land or other public land
- h) Eagle population density and history of eagle use in the area
- i) The natural diversity of native species, plant communities, aquatic types, and geologic features on the site.

6.2.2 Other considerations

- a) Ownership
- b) Degree of threat

- c) Availability of funding
- d) Existence of willing donor or seller and prior agency interest
- e) Cost

In general, priority shall be given to the most threatened high quality eagle habitats with associated natural values which require the least management.

Resolution of site management plan disputes

7.1 The department, the landowner and the permitting agency shall work to develop a mutually agreeable site management plan within 30 days of the original notice to the department of game. This plan shall become a part of the application for a permit.

7.2 Should agreement not be reached, the landowner may refer the site management plan to the bald eagle oversight committee (paragraph 8). The committee shall have 30 days from the date contacted to bring about agreement among the department, the landowner, and the permitting agency. The committee may use conciliation, mediation and factfinding, or any other method they deem appropriate to bring about a mutually acceptable resolution of the issues.

7.3 If the landowner chooses not to use the services of the bald eagle oversight committee or if resolution is not reached, the department of game shall within 15 days provide a site management plan to the landowner and permitting agency.

7.4 The landowner may initiate a formal appeal of the department of game's decision. Formal appeal procedures appear in WAC 232-12-197.

Bald eagle oversight committee

8.1 The director of the department of game shall appoint a five-member bald eagle oversight committee with two members representing landowner interests, two members representing wildlife interests and one nonvoting member from the department of game. Members are appointed for three year terms, with the initial terms for one, two or three years so that committee appointments will be staggered over time. The committee shall meet at least quarterly, and as needed, to accomplish the following:

- 8.1.1 Monitor the progress of cooperative bald eagle management processes under these regulations and make recommendations to the department and other interested parties to improve the effectiveness of these processes.
- 8.1.2 Undertake resolution of site management plan disputes under paragraph 7.2 above.
- 8.1.3 Coordinate joint efforts on Washington bald eagle protection.

8.2 The members of the committee shall not receive compensation but shall be reimbursed under RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060 for travel expenses incurred while attending official meetings of the committee.

Automatic review processes

- 9.1 The bald eagle oversight committee will report to the department of game annually regarding its activities under paragraph 8.1. The department of game will conduct an initial review of the bald eagle regulatory process after 3 years which will include a public hearing, and then every five years thereafter.

Penalties

- 10.1 Failure to comply with the processes set forth in these rules or with the provisions of a site management plan constitutes a misdemeanor as set forth in RCW 77.21.010.

WAC 232-12-297 Endangered, threatened, and sensitive wildlife species classification.**Purpose**

- 1.1 The purpose of this rule is to identify and classify native wildlife species that have need of protection and/or management to ensure their survival as free-ranging populations in Washington and to define the process by which listing, management, recovery, and delisting of a species can be achieved. These rules are established to ensure that consistent procedures and criteria are followed when classifying wildlife as endangered, or the protected wildlife subcategories threatened or sensitive.

Definitions

For purposes of this rule, the following definitions apply:

- 2.1 "Classify" and all derivatives means to list or delist wildlife species to or from endangered, or to or from the protected wildlife subcategories threatened or sensitive.
- 2.2 "List" and all derivatives means to change the classification status of a wildlife species to endangered, threatened, or sensitive.
- 2.3 "Delist" and its derivatives means to change the classification of endangered, threatened, or sensitive species to a classification other than endangered, threatened, or sensitive.
- 2.4 "Endangered" means any wildlife species native to the state of Washington that is seriously threatened with extinction throughout all or a significant portion of its range within the state.
- 2.5 "Threatened" means any wildlife species native to the state of Washington that is likely to become an endangered species within the foreseeable future throughout a significant portion of its range within the state without cooperative management or removal of threats.
- 2.6 "Sensitive" means any wildlife species native to the state of Washington that is vulnerable or declining and is likely to become endangered or threatened in a significant portion of its range within the state without cooperative management or removal of threats.

- 2.7 "Species" means any group of animals classified as a species or subspecies as commonly accepted by the scientific community.

- 2.8 "Native" means any wildlife species naturally occurring in Washington for purposes of breeding, resting, or foraging, excluding introduced species not found historically in this state.

- 2.9 "Significant portion of its range" means that portion of a species' range likely to be essential to the long term survival of the population in Washington.

Listing criteria

- 3.1 The commission shall list a wildlife species as endangered, threatened, or sensitive solely on the basis of the biological status of the species being considered, based on the preponderance of scientific data available, except as noted in section 3.4.

- 3.2 If a species is listed as endangered or threatened under the federal Endangered Species Act, the agency will recommend to the commission that it be listed as endangered or threatened as specified in section 9.1. If listed, the agency will proceed with development of a recovery plan pursuant to section 11.1.

- 3.3 Species may be listed as endangered, threatened, or sensitive only when populations are in danger of failing, declining, or are vulnerable, due to factors including but not restricted to limited numbers, disease, predation, exploitation, or habitat loss or change, pursuant to section 7.1.

- 3.4 Where a species of the class Insecta, based on substantial evidence, is determined to present an unreasonable risk to public health, the commission may make the determination that the species need not be listed as endangered, threatened, or sensitive.

Delisting criteria

- 4.1 The commission shall delist a wildlife species from endangered, threatened, or sensitive solely on the basis of the biological status of the species being considered, based on the preponderance of scientific data available.

- 4.2 A species may be delisted from endangered, threatened, or sensitive only when populations are no longer in danger of failing, declining, are no longer vulnerable, pursuant to section 3.3, or meet recovery plan goals, and when it no longer meets the definitions in sections 2.4, 2.5, or 2.6.

Initiation of listing process

- 5.1 Any one of the following events may initiate the listing process.

- 5.1.1 The agency determines that a species population may be in danger of failing, declining, or vulnerable, pursuant to section 3.3.

- 5.1.2 A petition is received at the agency from an interested person. The petition should be addressed to the director. It should set forth specific evidence and scientific data which shows that the species may be failing, declin-

ing, or vulnerable, pursuant to section 3.3. Within 60 days, the agency shall either deny the petition, stating the reasons, or initiate the classification process.

5.1.3 An emergency, as defined by the Administrative Procedure Act, chapter 34.05 RCW. The listing of any species previously classified under emergency rule shall be governed by the provisions of this section.

5.1.4 The commission requests the agency review a species of concern.

5.2 Upon initiation of the listing process the agency shall publish a public notice in the Washington Register, and notify those parties who have expressed their interest to the department, announcing the initiation of the classification process and calling for scientific information relevant to the species status report under consideration pursuant to section 7.1.

Initiation of delisting process

6.1 Any one of the following events may initiate the delisting process:

6.1.1 The agency determines that a species population may no longer be in danger of failing, declining, or vulnerable, pursuant to section 3.3.

6.1.2 The agency receives a petition from an interested person. The petition should be addressed to the director. It should set forth specific evidence and scientific data which shows that the species may no longer be failing, declining, or vulnerable, pursuant to section 3.3. Within 60 days, the agency shall either deny the petition, stating the reasons, or initiate the delisting process.

6.1.3 The commission requests the agency review a species of concern.

6.2 Upon initiation of the delisting process the agency shall publish a public notice in the Washington Register, and notify those parties who have expressed their interest to the department, announcing the initiation of the delisting process and calling for scientific information relevant to the species status report under consideration pursuant to section 7.1.

Species status review and agency recommendations

7.1 Except in an emergency under 5.1.3 above, prior to making a classification recommendation to the commission, the agency shall prepare a preliminary species status report. The report will include a review of information relevant to the species' status in Washington and address factors affecting its status, including those given under section 3.3. The status report shall be reviewed by the public and scientific community. The status report will include, but not be limited to an analysis of:

7.1.1 Historic, current, and future species population trends

7.1.2 Natural history, including ecological relationships (e.g. food habits, home range, habitat selection patterns).

7.1.3 Historic and current habitat trends.

7.1.4 Population demographics (e.g. survival and mortality rates, reproductive success) and their relationship to long term sustainability.

7.1.5 Historic and current species management activities.

7.2 Except in an emergency under 5.1.3 above, the agency shall prepare recommendations for species classification, based upon scientific data contained in the status report. Documents shall be prepared to determine the environmental consequences of adopting the recommendations pursuant to requirements of the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA).

7.3 For the purpose of delisting, the status report will include a review of recovery plan goals.

Public review

8.1 Except in an emergency under 5.1.3 above, prior to making a recommendation to the commission, the agency shall provide an opportunity for interested parties to submit new scientific data relevant to the status report, classification recommendation, and any SEPA findings.

8.1.1 The agency shall allow at least 90 days for public comment.

8.1.2 The agency will hold at least one public meeting in each of its administrative regions during the public review period.

Final recommendations and commission action

9.1 After the close of the public comment period, the agency shall complete a final status report and classification recommendation. SEPA documents will be prepared, as necessary, for the final agency recommendation for classification. The classification recommendation will be presented to the commission for action. The final species status report, agency classification recommendation, and SEPA documents will be made available to the public at least 30 days prior to the commission meeting.

9.2 Notice of the proposed commission action will be published at least 30 days prior to the commission meeting.

Periodic species status review

10.1 The agency shall conduct a review of each endangered, threatened, or sensitive wildlife species at least every five years after the date of its listing. This review shall include an update of the species status report to determine whether the status of the

species warrants its current listing status or deserves reclassification.

- 10.1.1 The agency shall notify any parties who have expressed their interest to the department of the periodic status review. This notice shall occur at least one year prior to end of the five year period required by section 10.1.
- 10.2 The status of all delisted species shall be reviewed at least once, five years following the date of delisting.
- 10.3 The department shall evaluate the necessity of changing the classification of the species being reviewed. The agency shall report its findings to the commission at a commission meeting. The agency shall notify the public of its findings at least 30 days prior to presenting the findings to the commission.
- 10.3.1 If the agency determines that new information suggests that classification of a species should be changed from its present state, the agency shall initiate classification procedures provided for in these rules starting with section 5.1.
- 10.3.2 If the agency determines that conditions have not changed significantly and that the classification of the species should remain unchanged, the agency shall recommend to the commission that the species being reviewed shall retain its present classification status.
- 10.4 Nothing in these rules shall be construed to automatically delist a species without formal commission action.

Recovery and management of listed species

- 11.1 The agency shall write a recovery plan for species listed as endangered or threatened. The agency will write a management plan for species listed as sensitive. Recovery and management plans shall address the listing criteria described in sections 3.1 and 3.3, and shall include, but are not limited to:
- 11.1.1 Target population objectives
- 11.1.2 Criteria for reclassification
- 11.1.3 An implementation plan for reaching population objectives which will promote cooperative management and be sensitive to landowner needs and property rights. The plan will specify resources needed from and impacts to the department, other agencies (including federal, state, and local), tribes, landowners, and other interest groups. The plan shall consider various approaches to meeting recovery objectives including, but not limited to regulation, mitigation, acquisition, incentive, and compensation mechanisms.

- 11.1.4 Public education needs
- 11.1.5 A species monitoring plan, which requires periodic review to allow the incorporation of new information into the status report.
- 11.2 Preparation of recovery and management plans will be initiated by the agency within one year after the date of listing.
- 11.2.1 Recovery and management plans for species listed prior to 1990 or during the five years following the adoption of these rules shall be completed within 5 years after the date of listing or adoption of these rules, whichever comes later. Development of recovery plans for endangered species will receive higher priority than threatened or sensitive species.
- 11.2.2 Recovery and management plans for species listed after five years following the adoption of these rules shall be completed within three years after the date of listing.
- 11.2.3 The agency will publish a notice in the Washington Register and notify any parties who have expressed interest to the department interested parties of the initiation of recovery plan development.
- 11.2.4 If the deadlines defined in sections 11.2.1 and 11.2.2 are not met the department shall notify the public and report the reasons for missing the deadline and the strategy for completing the plan at a commission meeting. The intent of this section is to recognize current department personnel resources are limiting and that development of recovery plans for some of the species may require significant involvement by interests outside of the department, and therefore take longer to complete.
- 11.3 The agency shall provide an opportunity for interested public to comment on the recovery plan and any SEPA documents.

Classification procedures review

- 12.1 The agency and an ad hoc public group with members representing a broad spectrum of interests, shall meet as needed to accomplish the following:
- 12.1.1 Monitor the progress of the development of recovery and management plans and status reviews, highlight problems, and make recommendations to the department and other interested parties to improve the effectiveness of these processes.
- 12.1.2 Review these classification procedures six years after the adoption of these rules and report its findings to the commission.

Authority

- 13.1 The commission has the authority to classify wildlife as endangered under RCW 77.12.020. Species classified as endangered are listed under WAC 232-12-014, as amended.
- 13.2 Threatened and sensitive species shall be classified as subcategories of protected wildlife. The commission has the authority to classify wildlife as protected under RCW 77.12.020. Species classified as protected are listed under WAC 232-12-011, as amended.

Taking and possessing game fish.

It is unlawful to:

Use a gaff hook to land steelhead in waters designated as "wild steelhead release."

Take bullfrogs except by angling, hand dip netting, spearing (gigging) or with bow and arrow.

Feed or use any substance to attract game fish unless specifically authorized by special regulations.

Fish for game fish with a bow and arrow or spear.

Possess fish which are under the minimum size or over the maximum size as shown in general or special regional regulations.

Annual limit - steelhead trout only: Each angler who possesses a valid steelhead permit card may retain thirty steelhead over twenty inches in length per year (May 1 to April 30).

Licenses - requirements.

When taking bullfrogs, a hunting or fishing license is required.

1994-95 license fees.

Military personnel, regardless of the length of time in the state of Washington, who are permanently stationed at a military installation within the state, are entitled to purchase a resident license. Military personnel must have a license to fish for game fish anywhere in the state. Dependents must establish a ninety-day residency.

WAC 232-12-807 Operations and procedures. The department of game is a public service agency whose statutory responsibility is to preserve, protect, and perpetuate all forms of wildlife in the state of Washington and to serve

the public by providing the maximum amount of wildlife-oriented recreation consistent with sound biological management.

The state game commission consists of six members appointed by the governor. They serve a term of six years each. Terms are arranged so that appointments of two members expire every two years. By law, three commissioners are appointed from eastern Washington and three from western Washington. The game commission establishes regulations, sets overall policies to guide the department, and appoints the director of game. The director is responsible for all activities of the department of game and reports directly to the game commission.

Organization of the department of game is one of decentralized management. A deputy director and two assistant directors aid in the operation and administration of the department. The Olympia staff consists of seven division administrators who head up areas of program planning and coordination. Completing the staff is a planning section and a special assistant to the director for federal affairs.

The fisheries management division is responsible for research, program development, planning and coordination of management for all fish classified as game fish.

The wildlife management division is responsible for research, planning, program development, and coordination of management for all wildlife in the state other than fish. Major activities of this division relate to big game species, a variety of small game including birds, nonhunted wildlife, and management of wildlife areas.

The habitat management division is responsible for research, planning, program development and coordination for protection, restoration, and enhancement of wildlife and fish habitat areas through the use of environmental laws and public education. A major portion of this program is related to cooperative contractual agreements with other land managers and private landholders.

The enforcement division is responsible for planning, program development, and coordination of enforcement and wildlife control activities.

The engineering and lands division is responsible for engineering and design, construction, maintenance, surveying, land acquisition, and property management services. The division also prepares and implements the department's capital budget.

The management services division has responsibility for the budget development, accounting, federal aid coordination, payroll, printing, mailing, purchasing, vendor payments, warehouse services, safety, maintenance of archives, department's license management, and data processing.

The information and education division is responsible for planning and program development of the hunter education and safety training, project WILD for school children, various publications, trapper training, interpretive displays, newsletters, news releases, and radio and television public service announcements.

The department of game has six administrative regions in the state; three on the eastside, three on the westside. Each region is administered by a regional supervisor who is responsible for all department programs within his assigned region. They are assisted by program managers for the key areas of enforcement, habitat, wildlife, and fisheries.

Program implementation is carried out primarily by field agents and biological or production staff.

The game commission, through the public meeting process, establishes all rules and regulations that govern departmental activities. This includes establishment of hunting and fishing seasons; approval of land acquisitions or exchanges; coordination with other federal, state, county, or city programs; and adjudication of requests for license reinstatements when individual privileges have been revoked in accordance with RCW's.

The game commission holds four statutory meetings each year in January, April, July, and October, and other special meetings as necessary to conduct its business.

WAC 232-12-814 Requests for public records. In accordance with requirements of chapter 1, Laws of 1973 that agencies prevent unreasonable invasions of privacy, protect public records from damage or disorganization, and prevent excessive interference with essential functions of the agency, public records may be inspected or copied or copies of such records may be obtained, by members of the public, upon compliance with the following procedures:

(1) A request shall be made in writing addressed to attention of the department of game public records officer. The request shall include the following information:

- (a) The name of the person requesting the record[;]
- (b) The calendar date on which the request was made;
- (c) The nature of the request; and an appropriate description of the record requested.

(2) In all cases in which a member of the public is making a request, it is the obligation of the public records officer or staff member to whom [a] request is made to assist the member of the public in appropriately identifying the public record requested.

(3) No public record shall be allowed to be removed from a department office by anyone other than an officially authorized person.

The director shall consider the matter and within two business days either affirm or reverse such denial.

WAC 232-12-827 Hunting of game animals by persons of disability. (1) **Preamble.** This regulation is intended to carry out the legislative policy of maximizing handicapped persons' access to recreational opportunity as codified in RCW 77.12.010. This regulation is intended to enhance the health, safety, and welfare of the general public and not that of any particular person or group of persons.

(2) **Definitions.** Terms used in this regulation are defined as follows:

(a) A "person of disability" is a permanently disabled person who is unable to be mobile without the assistance of a wheelchair or crutches. This definition is intended to include but not be limited to those disabled persons with lower extremity impairment such as paraplegics and amputees.

(b) A "disabled hunter" is a person who possesses a disabled hunter permit issued by the director as well as all other required licenses, tags, and permits.

(c) A "nondisabled companion" is a licensed hunter accompanying a disabled hunter for the purpose of assisting in retrieval, killing of game wounded by a disabled hunter, and tagging of game killed by a disabled hunter.

(3) **Disabled hunter permit.** The director may issue a disabled hunter permit to any person of disability who applies to the department and presents such evidence as the director may accept showing that the applicant is a person of disability.

(4) **Permitted and prohibited activities.**

(a) Shooting from an off-road vehicle. A disabled hunter may not possess a loaded firearm or discharge a firearm from within or upon a motor vehicle. A disabled hunter may not discharge a firearm upon, across, or along a public highway.

(b) Killing of game wounded by persons of disability. A nondisabled companion may accompany a disabled hunter and kill any game animal wounded by the disabled hunter. The companion must immediately notch and attach the disabled hunter's tag to the carcass of the animal. A nondisabled companion shall not possess a loaded gun in, or shoot from, a motor vehicle or off-road vehicle.

(c) Tagging game killed by a disabled hunter. A nondisabled companion may cut, notch, and affix tags to game animals killed by a disabled hunter.

(d) Retrieving game. A nondisabled companion may retrieve or assist in retrieving a game animal which has been either killed by a disabled hunter or wounded by a disabled hunter and killed by a nondisabled companion.

(e) Game killed, tagged, or retrieved by a nondisabled companion who is accompanying a disabled hunter shall count against the disabled hunter's bag limit and shall not count against the nondisabled companion's bag limit.

(f) This regulation shall terminate and cease to be effective at 11:59 p.m. on March 31, 1989.

WAC 232-12-829 Hunting of game animals by persons of disability. (1) **Preamble.** This regulation is intended to carry out the legislative policy of maximizing handicapped persons' access to recreational opportunity as codified in RCW 77.12.010. This regulation is intended to enhance the health, safety, and welfare of the general public and not that of any particular person or group of persons.

(2) **Definitions.** Terms used in this regulation are defined as follows:

(a) A "person of disability" is a permanently disabled person who is not ambulatory without the assistance of a wheelchair, crutches, or similar devices. This definition is intended to include but not be limited to those disabled persons with lower extremity impairment such as paraplegics and amputees.

(b) A "disabled hunter" is a person who possesses a disabled hunter permit issued by the director as well as all other required licenses, tags, and permits.

(c) A "nondisabled hunter" is a licensed hunter accompanying a disabled hunter for the purpose of assisting in retrieval, killing of game wounded by a disabled hunter, and tagging of game killed by a disabled hunter.

(3) **Disabled hunter permit.** The director may issue a disabled hunter permit to any person of disability who applies to the department and presents such evidence as the director may accept showing that the applicant is a person of disability.

(4) **Permitted and prohibited activities.**

(a) Shooting from an off-road vehicle. A nondisabled hunter may not possess a loaded firearm or discharge a firearm from within or upon a motor vehicle. A disabled or nondisabled hunter may not discharge a firearm upon, across, or along a public highway.

(b) Killing of game wounded by persons of disability. A nondisabled hunter may accompany a disabled hunter and kill any game animal wounded by the disabled hunter. The nondisabled hunter must immediately notch and attach the disabled hunter's tag to the carcass of the animal. A nondisabled hunter shall not possess a loaded gun in, or shoot from, a motor vehicle or off-road vehicle.

(c) Tagging game killed by a disabled hunter. A nondisabled hunter may cut, notch, and affix tags to game animals killed by a disabled hunter.

(d) Retrieving game. A nondisabled hunter may retrieve or assist in retrieving a game animal which has been either killed by a disabled hunter or wounded by a disabled hunter and killed by a nondisabled companion.

(e) Game killed, tagged, or retrieved by a nondisabled hunter who is accompanying a disabled hunter shall count against the disabled hunter's bag limit and shall not count against the nondisabled companion's bag limit.

(f) Each disabled hunter shall be provided, in addition to the disabled hunter permit, identifying signs which shall be displayed upon any motor vehicle from which they may be hunting.

(g) A disabled hunter may carry or convey a loaded weapon in or upon, and hunt from a motor vehicle, a nonhighway vehicle or snowmobile, provided such vehicle

is stopped, the motor is turned off and it is not on or beside the maintained portion of a public road.

WAC 232-12-831 Assistance to the visually handicapped. (1) This regulation is intended to carry out the legislative policy of this state to enhance participation in hunting opportunities by persons of disability.

(2) **Definition of blind and visually handicapped.** As used in this section, blind or visually handicapped means a person who is totally blind or whose central visual acuity does not exceed 20/200 in the better eye with corrective lenses, or the widest diameter of the visual field is no greater than 20 degrees.

(3) **Disabled hunter permit for the blind.** A blind or visually handicapped person may receive a disabled hunter permit for the blind or visually handicapped upon application.

(4) A person who possesses a disabled hunter permit for the blind or visually handicapped, as well as all other required licenses, tags, and permits, is authorized to designate a nondisabled licensed hunter who, while in the immediate company of the blind or visually handicapped hunter, may shoot, tag, and retrieve game for the blind or visually handicapped hunter.

232-14-010 Hydraulic Code guidelines.

WAC 232-14-010 Hydraulic Code guidelines. The State Hydraulic Code, RCW 75.20.100, 75.20.103, 75.20.106, 75.20.130, and 75.20.140, is jointly administered by the department of fisheries and department of game, by law separate agencies. That code requires that prior to construction or other work that will use, divert, obstruct, or change the natural flow or bed of any of the salt or fresh waters of the state, that written approval be obtained from the director of the department of fisheries or department of game. Rules establishing procedures for obtaining a hydraulic project approval and explaining criteria, policies and procedures typically utilized by the department of fisheries and department of game in administering the Hydraulic Code have been jointly promulgated by the two agencies. The body of the regulations is codified as WAC 220-110-010 *et seq.*, which can be found under rules and regulations codified for the department of fisheries. Those rules, chapter 220-110 WAC, as last amended by the department of fisheries Order 87-48, are here adopted by reference and also made a part of Title 232 WAC.

(b) Find ways to make the SEPA process more useful to decisionmakers and the public; promote certainty regarding the requirements of the act; reduce paperwork and the accumulation of extraneous background data; and emphasize important environmental impacts and alternatives.

(c) Prepare environmental documents that are concise, clear, and to the point, and are supported by evidence that the necessary environmental analyses have been made.

(d) Initiate the SEPA process early in conjunction with other agency operations to avoid delay and duplication.

(e) Integrate the requirements of SEPA with existing agency planning and licensing procedures and practices, so that such procedures run concurrently rather than consecutively.

(f) Encourage public involvement in decisions that significantly affect environmental quality.

(g) Identify, evaluate, and require or implement, where required by the act and these rules, reasonable alternatives

that would mitigate adverse effects of proposed actions on the environment.

(a) Coordinate scoping to insure that the individual preparing the document receives all substantive information submitted by any agency or person.

(b) Direct the areas of research and study to be undertaken and the content and organization of the document.

(c) Assist in obtaining information on file with another agency that is needed by the person preparing the document.

(d) Allow the person preparing the document access to department records relating to the document (under chapter 42.17 RCW, public disclosure and public records law).

(4) The responsible official may not require more information of a private applicant than allowed by these rules.

(5) Nothing herein shall be construed to prohibit the department from charging any fee of an applicant which the department is otherwise authorized to charge (see WAC 197-11-914). A performance bond in an amount specified by the department may be required of the applicant to insure payment of department expenses in preparing in whole, or part, a draft or final EIS or SEIS.

WAC 232-19-100 Public notice requirements. (1) When these rules require notice of environmental document preparation or availability, as a lead agency the department shall give public notice by using at least one of the following methods:

(a) Posting the property, for site-specific proposals;

(b) Publishing notice in a newspaper of general circulation in the county, city, or general area where the proposal is located;

(c) Notifying public or private groups which have expressed interest in a certain proposal or in the type of proposal being considered;

(d) Notifying the news media; and/or

(e) Publishing notice in the department's newsletters.

(2) Whenever possible, the department shall integrate these public notice requirements with existing notice procedures for any department or commission permits or approvals required for the proposal.

(3) The department may require an applicant to complete the public notice requirements for the applicant's proposal at his or her expense.

WAC 232-19-110 Notice/statute of limitations. (1)

The department, applicant for, or proponent of an action may publish a notice of action pursuant to RCW 43.21C.080.

WAC 232-19-120 Policies and procedures for conditioning or denying permits or other approvals. (1) The policies and goals in this section are supplementary to existing authorities of the department.

(2) It is the policy of the department to avoid or mitigate adverse environmental impacts which may result from the department's decisions.

(3) The department shall use all practical means, consistent with other essential considerations of state policy, to improve and coordinate plans, functions, programs, and resources to the end that the state and its citizens may:

(a) Fulfill the responsibilities of each generation as trustee of the environment for succeeding generations;

(b) Assure for all people of Washington safe, healthful, productive, and aesthetically and culturally pleasing surroundings;

(c) Attain the widest range of beneficial uses of the environment without degradation, risk to health or safety, or other undesirable and unintended consequences;

(d) Preserve important historic, cultural, and natural aspects of our national heritage;

(e) Maintain, wherever possible, an environment which supports diversity and variety of individual choice;

(f) Achieve a balance between population and resource use which will permit high standards of living and a wide sharing of life's amenities; and

(g) Enhance the quality of renewable resources and approach the maximum attainable recycling of depletable resources.

(4) The department recognizes that each person has a fundamental and inalienable right to a healthful environment and that each person has a responsibility to contribute to the preservation and enhancement of the environment.

(5) The department shall ensure that presently unquantified environmental amenities and values will be given appropriate consideration in decision making along with economic and technical considerations.

(6)(a) When the environmental document for a proposal shows it will cause specific adverse impacts, the responsible official shall consider whether:

(i) The environmental document identified mitigation measures that are reasonable and capable of being accomplished;

(ii) Other local, state, or federal requirements and enforcement would mitigate the significant adverse environmental impacts; and

(iii) Reasonable mitigation measures are sufficient to mitigate the significant adverse impacts.

(b) The responsible official may:

(i) Condition the approval for a proposal if mitigation measures are reasonable and capable of being accomplished and the proposal is inconsistent with the policies in this section; or

(ii) Deny the permit or approval for a proposal if reasonable mitigation measures are insufficient to mitigate significant adverse environmental impacts and the proposal is inconsistent with the policies in this section.

(c) The procedures in WAC 197-11-660 must also be followed when conditioning or denying permits or other approvals.

WAC 232-19-130 Informal appeal. Any person who, upon proper application, is denied a permit or approval or contests a condition placed in a permit or approval granted under these rules, may contact the responsible official to discuss the denial or conditions. If the result of this contact with the responsible official does not satisfy the applicant, then that person may contact the responsible official's supervisors up through the chain of command to the director of the department. If the applicant is not satisfied by the

results of this informal appeal process, then that person may make a formal appeal. The department encourages the applicant to exhaust this informal appeal process prior to initiating a formal appeal.

WAC 232-19-140 Formal administrative appeal.

Any person who, upon proper application, is denied a permit or approval or contests a condition placed in a permit or approval granted under these rules, or a final threshold determination or final EIS, is entitled to an opportunity for hearing, pursuant to the Administrative Procedure Act, chapter 34.04 RCW. To obtain a hearing a written request must be filed with the department. The mailing address is: Department of Game, Habitat Management Division, 600 North Capitol Way, Olympia, WA 98504. Requests must be filed within thirty days of the department's decision. An administrative law judge will be used to hear all evidence. The record in the hearing shall include those items set forth in RCW 34.04.090(5). The record, including a transcript of the oral proceedings, shall be submitted to the director for final decision pursuant to RCW 34.04.110. All final decisions are appealable as provided by the Administrative Procedure Act, chapter 34.04 RCW. Administrative law judges will be provided by the office of administrative hearings. The Director will select a conservation organization to conduct the 1994 bighorn auction. Selection of the conservation organization will be based on criteria developed by the Washington Department of Wildlife. The organization shall notify the Department of the name and address of the successful bidder within ten days of the auction.

AUCTION PERMIT HUNT

SPECIES - BIGHORN SHEEP

Hunting Season Dates: September 1 - October 31.

Hunt Area: Any sheep unit open in 1994 with two or more sheep permits.

Bag Limit: 1 Bighorn Ram

WHO MAY BID:

Anyone except those who have received a special bighorn sheep permit in Washington and were successful in taking a mountain sheep. A person who received a special permit for mountain sheep and were unsuccessful in taking a sheep may bid after a five year waiting period.

AUCTION HUNT PERMITTEE RULES

(1) Permittee shall contact the appropriate regional office of the Department of Wildlife when entering the designated hunt area.

(2) The permittee may be accompanied by others; however, only the permittee is allowed to carry a firearm and harvest an animal.

(3) Any attempt by members of the permittee's party to herd or drive wildlife is prohibited.

(4) If requested by the Department, the permittee is required to accompany wildlife officials to the site of the kill.

(5) The permittee will present the head and carcass of the bighorn sheep killed to any wildlife office within 72 hours of date of kill.

BLACK BEAR

Bag Limit: Fall General - One (1) black bear.

Tag Sale Deadline: Bear tags must be purchased by midnight of the day preceding modern firearm deer season opener. Actual dates are: Oct. 14, 1994; Oct. 13, 1995; Oct. 11, 1996.

PURSUIT ONLY SEASON

It is lawful to pursue or tree black bears during established pursuit-only seasons, provided any bear pursued or treed is NOT killed or injured. Hunters participating in a pursuit only season for black bear must have a valid hound stamp, and hunting license. A bear tag is not required to pursue black bear during the pursuit only season.

Aug. 1-31, 1994, 1995, and 1996, in GMUs 100-111, GMU 113 outside of Selkirk Grizzly Bear Recovery Zone*, GMUs 118-124 and GMUs 200 and 206.

The following regulations apply to the practice of HUNTING BLACK BEAR WITH BAIT.

Definition of Bait: A bait shall be defined as any substance placed with the intent of attracting bear.

Bait Types: The following materials are legal baits for hunting and pursuing black bear: Unprocessed plant and plant parts including fruit, inedible parts of legally obtained game fish, and game animals, carcasses of legally trapped furbearing animals (hide removed), carcasses of food fish, unclassified fish and unclassified wildlife, and parts of domestic livestock carcasses.

Baits may not contain paper, cardboard, plastic, glass, aluminum, tin, steel, or styrofoam, or other packaging materials.

All other baits are illegal.

Placement of Bait: Baits for black bear may not be placed in an area until five days prior to the start of that area's established bear harvest season.

A bait may not be placed within fifty yards of any body of water (lake, pond, reservoir, stream, river, and spring), and not within two hundred yards of any publicly maintained trail and/or open road.

A bait may not be placed within one-half mile of any publicly designated administrative site, campground, picnic area, landfill or dump site, and not within one-quarter mile of any permanent residence or seasonal dwelling (except that private landowners may bait on their property within one-quarter mile of their own residence or seasonal dwelling when such baiting does not violate any of the aforementioned distance requirements with adjacent landholders).

Bait Containers: Bait must be contained within an excavated pit, or within a confine constructed of materials located at the site. Such containment structures might include, but not be restricted to, log cubbies, rock piles and stumps. Containers may also be used to hold bait, but if used, must be securely fastened (to tree, ground, post, etc.).

Any items used to fasten bait containment materials such as nails, screws, bolts, rope, reinforcing rod, and spikes shall be removed from the area within 48 hours of the close of the bear harvest season. Excavated pits shall be filled, the area shall be returned to pre-baiting condition. Materials used to construct and erect tree stands overlooking the bait shall be removed within the same 48-hour period (except that tree stands may be left on private property with landowner's permission).

All hunters who hunt bear with bait shall affix their bear tag number at their bear baiting sites.

(Bear may be killed.)

(See Washington Atlas & Gazetteer or Colville National Forest map.)

(Draft) North Cascades Grizzly Bear Recovery Zone (D)NCGBRZ - Special Regulations

Note: A boundary description of the North Cascades Grizzly Bear Recovery Zone will appear in the hunting season pamphlet.

Hunting black bear with the use or aid of bait is prohibited in the (D) NCGBRZ within the recommended Situation 1 areas, which include all wilderness areas of the National Forests and of the North Cascades National Park Complex.

During the 1994 season, hunters may bait for black bear outside of wilderness areas of the (D)NCGBRZ. Educational information and baiting permits will be available on a voluntary basis during the 1994 season, and hunters are encouraged to participate. Beginning in 1995, hunters wishing to use bait within the NCGBRZ but outside of designated Situation 1 areas will be required to be an Advanced Hunter Education graduate (AHE), or to obtain a bait hunter education certificate from the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife.

TOOTH SUBMITTAL

Bear: Each hunter who takes a bear must submit the small premolar tooth behind the canine tooth of upper or lower jaw for age determination. Tooth envelopes are available from Department of Fish and Wildlife regional offices.

REPORT CARDS

Each successful hunter must fill out and return a Game Harvest Report Card to the Department of Fish and Wildlife within ten days after taking a deer or bear.

COYOTE

Coyote may be taken year around EXCEPT that coyote may only be killed and/or pursued with hounds during the following periods:

Eastern Washington

Sept. 1-Jan. 31, 1994-95; Sept. 1-Jan. 31, 1995-96; Sept. 1-Jan. 31, 1996-97; except year around in Grant, Adams, Benton, and Franklin counties.

Western Washington

Aug. 1-Mar. 15, 1994-95; Aug. 1-Mar. 15, 1995-96; Aug. 1-Mar. 15, 1996-97.

Coyote may not be taken by any means from September 15 to November 30 in the following closed areas: Pasayten Wilderness, GMUs 426 and 450, and those portions of GMUs 218, 304, and 448 within external boundaries of the Mount Baker-Snoqualmie, Okanogan and Wenatchee national forests.

FOREST GROUSE (BLUE, RUFFED, AND SPRUCE)

Bag and Possession Limits: Three (3) grouse per day, with a total of nine (9) grouse in possession at any time; straight or mixed bag.

Statewide: Sept. 1-Dec. 31 during 1994, 1995, and 1996; except CLOSED in GMU 522.

PTARMIGAN

Season closed statewide.

UPLAND BIRDS

Eastern Washington

Ring-necked Pheasant

Bag and Possession Limits: Three (3) cock pheasants per day, with a total of fifteen (15) cock pheasants in possession at any time.

Noon Oct. 15-Dec. 31, 1994; Noon Oct. 14-Dec. 31, 1995; Noon Oct. 12-Dec. 31, 1996.

Chukar Partridge

Bag and Possession Limits: Six (6) chukar per day, with a total of eighteen (18) chukar in possession at any time.

Early season in Asotin and Garfield counties; in that part of Whitman County south of the Washtucna - Colfax - Moscow Highway; in that part of Columbia County that is north and east of the Tucannon River: Sept. 24-Oct. 14, 1994; Sept. 22-Oct. 13, 1995; Sept. 21-Oct. 11, 1996.

Regular Season: Noon Oct. 15, 1994 - Jan. 15, 1995; Noon Oct. 14, 1995 - Jan. 7, 1996; Noon Oct. 12, 1996 - Jan. 12, 1997.

Gray (Hungarian) Partridge

Bag and Possession Limits: Six (6) gray partridges per day, with a total of eighteen (18) gray partridges in possession at any time.

Early season in Asotin and Garfield counties; in that part of Whitman County south of the Washtucna - Colfax - Moscow Highway; in that part of Columbia County that is north and east of the Tucannon River: Sept. 24-Oct. 14, 1994; Sept. 22-Oct. 13, 1995; Sept. 21-Oct. 11, 1996.

Regular Season: Noon Oct. 15, 1994-Jan. 15, 1995; Noon Oct. 14, 1995-Jan. 7, 1996; Noon Oct. 12, 1996-Jan. 12, 1997.

Mountain Quail

Bag and Possession Limits: Two (2) mountain quail per day, with a total of four (4) mountain quail in possession at any time.

Noon Oct. 15, 1994-Jan. 15, 1995; Noon Oct. 14, 1995-Jan. 7, 1996; Noon Oct. 12, 1996-Jan. 12, 1997.

Valley and Bobwhite Quail

Bag and Possession Limits: Ten (10) quail per day, with a total of thirty (30) quail in possession at any time, straight or mixed bag.

Noon Oct. 15, 1994-Jan. 15, 1995; Noon Oct. 14, 1995-Jan. 7, 1996; Noon Oct. 12, 1996-Jan. 12, 1997.

Yakama Indian Reservation: The 1994-95 Upland Bird Season within the Yakama Indian Reservation shall be the same as the season established by the Yakama Indian Nation.

Western WashingtonRing-necked Pheasant

Bag and Possession Limits: Two (2) pheasants of either sex per day on designated release sites, EXCEPT two (2) cock pheasants per day on other than designated release sites, with a total of fifteen (15) pheasants in possession at any time.

Early season: Sept. 24-30, 1994; Sept. 23-29, 1995; and Sept. 21-27, 1996 for juvenile hunters under 15 and senior hunters 65 years of age or older. Juvenile hunters must be accompanied by an adult.

Oct. 1-Nov. 30, 1994; Sept. 30-Nov. 30, 1995; and Sept. 28-Nov. 30, 1996; 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.; except Voice of America site (Clallam County) starting Oct. 15, 1994; Oct. 14, 1995; Oct. 12, 1996; except CLOSED in GMU 522.

A Western Washington Upland Bird Permit is required to hunt pheasant, quail, and partridge in western Washington, in addition to a current hunting license. Pheasant kills only must be recorded. Upon taking a pheasant, the holder of a Western Washington Upland Bird Permit must immediately enter on the corresponding space the date and location of kill.

There are three options available for the 1994, 1995, 1996 hunting season:

- (1) Full Season Option: Allows the harvest of ten (10) pheasants.
- (2) Juvenile (under 15): Allows the harvest of six (6) pheasants.
- (3) 2-Day Option: Allows the harvest of four (4) pheasants during two consecutive days.

Every person possessing a Western Washington Upland Bird Permit must by December 31, return the permit to the Department of Fish and Wildlife. The number of permits purchased per person is not limited.

A hunter shall select one valid option at the time they purchase their Western Washington Upland Bird Permit.

Special Restriction: Steelshot must be used in a shotgun to hunt pheasant on the Skagit Wildlife Area. Hunting is restricted on weekend mornings at Lake Terrell (all units including ARCO and INTELCO), Tennant Lake, Snoqualmie (including Stillwater, Cherry Valley, and Two Rivers segments) and Skagit (including headquarters and Smith Farm segments) Wildlife Areas. Only hunters with western Washington upland bird permits marked "odd" may hunt these sites from 8:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon on odd numbered weekend days. Only hunters with Western Washington Upland Bird Permits marked "even" may hunt these sites from 8:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon on even numbered weekend days. Hunters that select the two day option and juvenile hunters 14 years of age or younger may hunt during either weekend day morning. Juvenile hunters must be accompanied by an adult with an appropriately marked upland bird permit.

Mountain Quail

Bag and Possession Limits: Two (2) mountain quail per day, with a total of four (4) mountain quail in possession at any time.

Oct. 15-Nov. 30, 1994; Oct. 14-Nov. 30, 1995; Oct. 12-Nov. 30, 1996; except CLOSED in GMU 522.

Valley and Bobwhite Quail

Bag and Possession Limits: Ten (10) valley or bobwhite quail per day, with a total of thirty (30) valley or bobwhite quail in possession at any time; straight or mixed bag.

Oct. 15-Nov. 30, 1994; Oct. 14-Nov. 30, 1995; Oct. 12-Nov. 30, 1996; except CLOSED in GMU 522.

TURKEY

Spring Season

Gobblers and Turkeys with Visible Beards Only.

Statewide: April 15-May 15, 1995; April 15-May 15, 1996; and April 15-May 15, 1997.

Fall Season

Either Sex

Klickitat and Skamania counties: Nov. 18-22, 1994; Nov. 17-21, 1995; Nov. 22-26, 1996.

Asotin, Columbia, Garfield, and Walla Walla counties: Nov. 18-22, 1994; Nov. 17-21, 1995; Nov. 22-26, 1996. Only hunters that successfully complete the Department of Fish and Wildlife's Advanced Hunter Education (AHE) program will be eligible to hunt turkeys during this season. A certification card will be issued to all AHE graduates and must be in possession in addition to a valid hunting license and turkey tag while hunting in this area.

OFFICIAL HUNTING HOURS/BAG LIMITS:

Bag and Possession Limit: One turkey per calendar year for 1994. One turkey per day, with a total of three (3) per year; only one turkey from each subspecies may be killed per year in 1995 and 1996. Subspecies are defined by county of kill.

Eastern Wild Turkey: All of western Washington excluding Skamania and Klickitat counties.

Rio Grande Wild Turkey: All of eastern Washington excluding Klickitat, Ferry, Pend Oreille, and Stevens counties.

Merriam's Wild Turkey: Skamania, Klickitat, Pend Oreille, Ferry and Stevens counties.

Tag Sale Cutoff: To purchase multiple turkey tags, hunters shall send the appropriate tag fee (resident or non-resident) for each additional tag and their original 1995, 1996, or 1997 turkey tag to: Upland Bird Program, Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, 600 Capitol Way N., Olympia, WA 98501-1091. All multiple tag requests must be received by March 31, each year; a single statewide tag may be purchased at any time.

Hunting Hours: One-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset during spring and fall seasons.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS:

1. Turkey season is open for shotgun and bow-and-arrow hunting only.
2. A turkey tag is required for hunting turkey.
3. Each successful hunter must complete and return a game harvest report card to the Department of Fish and Wildlife within ten days after taking a turkey.
4. It is unlawful to use dogs to hunt turkeys.

Sage and Sharp-tailed Grouse

Season Closed Statewide, 1994, 1995, 1996.

BIRD DOG TRAINING SEASON

Aug. 1, 1994-Mar. 15, 1995; Aug. 1, 1995-Mar. 15, 1996; and Aug. 1, 1996-Mar. 15, 1997, except from Oct. 1-Nov. 30, 1994, Sept. 30-Nov. 30, 1995, and Sept. 28-Nov. 30, 1996, dog training is prohibited except from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on designated western Washington pheasant release sites.

Dog training may be conducted year around on posted portions of: Region One - Espanola (T 24 N, R 40 E, E1/2 of Sec. 16); Region Two - Wahluke Wildlife Area north of Highway 24; Region Three - South L.T. Murray Wildlife Area; Region Four - Fort Lewis Military Base, Skagit Wildlife Area, Lake Terrell Wildlife Area, and Snoqualmie Wildlife Area; Region Five - Vancouver Wildlife Area; Region Six - Scatter Creek Wildlife Area.

CANADA GOOSE SEPTEMBER SEASON

Early September Canada Goose season for portions of Clark, Cowlitz, Pacific, and Wahkiakum counties.

Bag and Possession Limits: Three (3) Canada geese per day with a total of six (6) in possession at any time.

Sept. 1-12, 1994; Sept. 1-12, 1995; Sept. 1-12, 1996.

Open Area: Those portions of Clark, Cowlitz, Pacific, and Wahkiakum counties within the following boundary: Beginning at the Washington-Oregon border on the Interstate 5 bridge near Vancouver, Washington, north on Interstate 5 to Kelso, west on Highway 4 from Kelso to Highway 401, south and west on Highway 401 to Highway 101 at the Astoria/Megler Bridge, then west on SR 101 to the city of Ilwaco, then west on Gray Drive to Canby Road, then southwest on Canby Road to the north jetty, then southwest on the north jetty to its end, then southeast to the Washington-Oregon state line, then upstream along the Washington/Oregon border to the point of origin.

Steel Shot Requirement: No person shall hunt in the open area of the September Canada goose season while using or possessing shotshells loaded with metal other than steel.

BAND-TAILED PIGEON

Closed Season Statewide, 1994, 1995, 1996.

MOURNING DOVE

Bag and possession limits: Ten (10) mourning doves per day with a total of twenty (20) mourning doves in possession at any time.

Statewide: Sept. 1-15 1994; Sept. 1-15, 1995; and Sept. 1-15, 1996; except CLOSED in GMU 522.

RABBIT AND HARE

Cottontail, Snowshoe Hare (or Washington Hare), and White-tailed Jackrabbit.

Bag and Possession Limits: Ten (10) rabbits or hares per day, with a total of thirty (30) in possession at any time; straight or mixed bag.

Statewide: Sept. 1, 1994-Mar. 15, 1995; Sept. 1, 1995-Mar. 15, 1996; Sept. 1, 1996-Mar. 15, 1997; except CLOSED in GMU 522.

Black-tailed Jackrabbit

Bag and Possession Limits: Ten (10) Black-tailed jackrabbits per day, with a total of thirty (30) in possession at any time.

Statewide: Year-around.

FALCONRY SEASONSUpland Game Bird - Falconry

Daily bag: Two (2) pheasants (either sex), six (6) partridge, five (5) quail, and three (3) forest grouse (blue, ruffed, spruce) per day.

Statewide: Sept. 1, 1994-Mar. 15, 1995; Sept. 1, 1995-Mar. 15, 1996; Sept. 1, 1996-Mar. 15, 1997.

Mourning Dove - Falconry

Daily Bag: Three (3) mourning doves per day straight bag or mixed bag with snipe, coots, and waterfowl during established seasons.

Statewide: Sept. 1-15 and Oct. 1-Dec 31, 1994; Sept. 1-15 and Oct. 1-Dec. 31, 1995; Sept. 1-15 and Oct. 1-Dec. 31, 1996.

Rabbit and Hare - Falconry

Daily bag: Ten (10) rabbits or hares per day; straight or mixed bag.

Statewide: Aug. 1, 1994-Mar. 15, 1995; Aug. 1, 1995-Mar. 15, 1996; Aug. 1, 1996-Mar. 15, 1997, for cottontail, snowshoe hare (or Washington hare), white-tailed and black-tailed jackrabbits.

WAC 232-28-242 1994-95, 1995-96, 1996-97 Elk hunting seasons and regulations.ELK SEASONS

Bag Limit: One (1) elk per hunter during the annual (July 1-March 31) hunting season.

Hunting Method: Elk hunters must select one of the hunting methods (modern firearm, archery, muzzleloader).

Tag Required: Elk hunters must choose one of the four elk hunting areas (Blue Mountains, Yakima, Colockum or Western Washington) to hunt in and buy the appropriate tag for that area.

Bull Elk Seasons: Open only to the taking of male elk with visible antlers (bull calves are illegal).

Definition: Visible Antler is defined as a horn-like growth projecting above the hairline.

Spike Bull Restriction GMUs: Bull elk taken in these GMUs must have at least one antler that is a spike above the ears (does not branch above ears). An animal with [branch] [branched] antlers on both sides is illegal but an animal with a spike on one side is legal in spike only units.

Spike Only GMUs: 145-154, 160-185, 314-329, 335-368, and 472.

Branched Antler Restriction GMUs: Bull elk taken in these GMUs must meet minimum antler point requirements. Minimum antler point requirements are antler points on one side only. Antler points may include eye guards but antler points on the lower half of either main beam must be at least four (4) inches long, measured from tip to nearest edge of beam. All other antler points must be at least one inch long. Antler restrictions apply to all hunters during any open season.

3 Point GMUs: 418, 460, 466, 478, 490, 506, 512, 524, 530, 556, 558, 572, 601, 602, 607, 636, 638, 681; and GMUs 157 and 485 by permit only.

Special Permits: Modern firearm late season elk tag holders along with muzzleloader tag holders may apply to be drawn in special elk permit seasons. Only hunters with elk tags identified in the Special Elk Permits tables may apply for special bull permits. Please see permit table for tag eligibility. Hunters drawn for a special permit may hunt only with a weapon in compliance with their tag and during the dates listed for the hunt.

Modern Firearm Elk Information

Modern firearm elk hunters have early and late hunts in all elk areas. Those who choose the early tag have the first opportunity to hunt bulls, but only those who choose the late tag are able to apply for special elk permits except as outlined above for bull permits.

Tag Required: Elk hunter must have a current, valid, unaltered, unnotched modern firearm elk tag as listed below on his/her person.

Hunting Method: May use rifle, bow and arrow, or muzzleloader, but only during modern firearm seasons.

Modern Firearm Elk Seasons

Legal Elk: Male elk with visible antlers are legal throughout the state except in GMUs 145-154, 160-185, 314-329, 335-368, and 472 spike bull restrictions apply and in branched antler areas branched antler restrictions apply.

Blue Mountains - Open Area: 100 series GMUs; GMUs 127, 130, and 157 limited to permit hunters only. GMUs 145-154, 160-185 are spike bull only, except by permit.

SPECIAL CLOSURES

HUNTING PROHIBITED AREAS

IT IS UNLAWFUL TO HUNT WILD ANIMALS (INCLUDING WILD BIRDS) IN THE FOLLOWING AREAS:

1. Little Pend Oreille National Wildlife Refuge: The southern part of the Little Pend Oreille National Wildlife Refuge in Stevens County is closed to hunting and discharge of firearms except during the period of Oct. 1-Dec. 31, 1994. This closure is south of a boundary beginning at the west project boundary in Section 3, Township 34 N, R 40 EWM, then easterly along Road 1.0 to the intersection with Road 2.0 in Section 2, then easterly along Road 2.0 to the easterly boundary in Section 8, Township 34 N, R 42 EWM.

The Little Pend Oreille National Wildlife Refuge north of the preceding boundary is open to all legally established hunting seasons during September through December.

2. Parker Lake: All lands south of Ruby Creek Road (USFS Road 2489), north of Tacoma Creek Road (USFS Road 2389) and west of Bonneville Power Administration power lines are designated as "CLOSED AREA" to the hunting of wild animals and wild birds EXCEPT during the period Aug. 1-Sept. 30, 1994. Both the Little Pend Oreille (1) and Parker Lake (2) closures were established to provide a protected area for the Air Force Military Survival Training Program.
3. Columbia River and all the islands in the river, and the Benton County shoreline below the high water mark,

and any peninsula originating on the Benton County shoreline, between Vernita Bridge (Highway 24) downstream to the old Hanford townsite powerline crossing (wooden towers) in Section 24, T 13 N, R 27 E, is designated as a "CLOSED AREA" to the hunting of wild animals and wild birds.

4. Green River (GMU 485): Except for special permit hunts, all lands within GMU 485 are designated as a "CLOSED AREA" to the hunting of big game by Department of Fish and Wildlife regulated hunters throughout the year. During the general westside elk season and general and late deer seasons, all lands within GMU 485 are also designated as a "CLOSED AREA" to the hunting of all wild animals (including wild birds). The City of Tacoma enforces trespass within GMU 485 on lands owned or controlled by the City during all times of the year.
5. McNeil Island: McNeil Island (part of GMU 480) is closed to the hunting of all wild animals (including wild birds) year around.
6. As posted on Bailey Youth Ranch, Franklin County, hunting is closed on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays.
7. As posted, hunting is closed on Department owned land on the Sunnyside Wildlife Area in Yakima County.

BIG GAME CLOSURES

1. Cathlamet: Those lands between State Highway 4 and the Columbia River between Cathlamet and Skamokawa, and all of Puget Island in Wahkiakum County; closed to all big game hunting. This closure is established to protect the endangered Columbian Whitetail Deer.
2. Clark, Cowlitz, Pacific, and Wahkiakum counties are closed to Columbian Whitetail Deer hunting.
3. Willapa National Wildlife Refuge: Except for Bow Area No. 802 (Long Island), Willapa National Wildlife Refuge is closed to all big game hunting.
4. Walla Walla Mill Creek Watershed (GMU 157): All lands in the Mill Creek Watershed are designated as a "CLOSED AREA" to the hunting of all wild animals (including wild birds) except for holders of special elk permits during the established open season. This area is closed to motorized vehicles.
5. Colockum elk hunting restrictions: No entry in GMU 330 (West Bar) except permit holders, October 23-25, 1994. Closed to entry (no trespassing) October 26-November 7, 1994.
6. Westport: Closed to hunting of all big game animals on that part of Westport Peninsula lying north of State Highway 105 from the west end of the Elk River Bridge and the Schafer Island Road to the ocean beach.
7. Baleville: Closed to hunting of all big game animals on those lands between State Highway 105 and the Willapa River west of Raymond.

UPLAND BIRD CLOSURES

It is unlawful to hunt game birds on the Columbia River or from any island in the Columbia River in the following areas:

1. From the mouth of Glade Creek (River Marker 57) to the old townsite of Paterson (River Marker 67) in Benton County, except the hunting of game birds is permitted from the main shoreline of the Columbia River in this area. (Check with Umatilla National Wildlife Refuge for other federal regulations for this area.)
2. Between the public boat launch at Sunland Estates in Grant County (Wanapum Pool) and a point perpendicular in Kittitas County; upstream to the posted marker 200 yards north of Quilomene Bay and a point perpendicular in Grant County, including islands.

HORSE RESTRICTIONS

Colocuckum horse restrictions: GMU 330 (West Bar)—It is unlawful to ride horses, mules, or other livestock during any open elk season in GMU 330 PROVIDED, however, that livestock may be used for transporting camp gear and elk carcasses. GMU 329 (Quilomene)—It is unlawful to allow a horse to enter the Brushy and Cape Horn agricultural fields prior to 9 a.m. from October 23-November 1, 1994.

HUNTING FIREARM RESTRICTION AREAS

In firearm restriction areas, handguns, centerfire and rimfire rifles are not legal for hunting except as provided below. Hunters may hunt only during the season allowed by their tag. Archery tag holders may hunt during archery seasons with archery equipment. Muzzleloaders may hunt during muzzleloader seasons with muzzleloader equipment except in the GMU 484 restriction area outlined for King County. Modern firearm tag holders may hunt during modern firearm seasons with bows and arrows, muzzleloaders or shotguns firing slugs or legal buckshot. Shotguns are not legal for hunting elk.

PERMIT APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS

You must have a valid 1994 Washington hunting license to apply for any special hunting season permit.

Application Deadline: Applications must be postmarked no later than July 1, 1994, or received not later than 5:00 p.m., July 1, 1994, at the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, 600 Capitol Way North, Olympia, WA 98501-1091, or any Department of Fish and Wildlife regional office.

Computer Drawing: Drawings for goat, bighorn sheep, moose, and cougar will be done by computer selection. All applicants will be notified by August 10, 1994.

Disqualification: Anyone who submits more than one application for each species will be disqualified for drawings for that species.

Incomplete Applications: To be eligible for the permit drawing, applications must contain hunt number and hunt name, date of birth, and hunting license number. Applicant's complete name and address including zip code must be included.

Permit Hunting Report: A hunter questionnaire report will be sent to each permittee. This questionnaire must be returned to the Department of Wildlife within ten days after the close of the hunting season.

MOOSE

Permit Season: Oct. 1 to Nov. 30, 1994, both dates inclusive.

Who May Apply: Anyone with a valid 1994 Washington hunting license. Only one moose permit will be issued during an individual's lifetime.

Application Instructions

Note: Hunt numbers and GMU numbers are not the same.

A permit gives a hunter additional opportunity but it does not give him/her an extra deer or elk.

To apply for Special Deer Permit: You must have a valid 1994 Washington hunting license and a modern firearm or muzzleloader deer tag. Only those hunters with a Washington Disabled Hunter Permit or Washington Blind or Visually Handicapped Hunter Permit may apply for Special Hunts for Disabled, Blind or Visually Handicapped. You may submit one (only one) special deer permit application for 1994.

If you were drawn for a modern firearm deer permit in 1994, you may not submit a deer permit application in 1995 or 1996 for the Blue Mountains Foothills A or Blue Mountains Foothills B hunts.

To apply for Special Elk Permit: You must have a valid 1994 Washington hunting license and a valid late modern firearm, muzzleloader, or archery elk tag. Each hunter must have the proper tag (identified in the tables) to apply for an elk permit. Only those hunters with a Washington Disabled Hunter Permit or Washington Blind or Visually Handicapped Hunter Permit may apply for the Special Hunts for Disabled, Blind or Visually Handicapped. You may submit one (only one) special permit application for elk. You may not submit an elk permit application if you were drawn for a modern firearm or archery elk permit during 1992 or 1993. Disabled, blind/visually impaired, and muzzleloader special hunts are exempt from the two-year waiting period. Permit hunters may hunt only with a weapon in compliance with their tag.

Application Deadline: To qualify for the drawing all applications must be postmarked no later than July 22, 1994 or received no later than 5:00 p.m. on July 22, 1994 at the

Department of Fish and Wildlife headquarters in Olympia or at any of the regional Department of Fish and Wildlife offices.

- Permits will be drawn by random computer selection.
- There are no refunds or exchanges for deer or elk tags for persons applying for special permits.

Special Hunting Season Permits

You MUST have a valid hunting license and tag to apply for any special hunting season set by the Fish and Wildlife Commission. (Special hunting seasons do not include hunts open to all hunters.)

SPECIAL DEER PERMIT HUNTING SEASONS (Open to Permit Holders Only)

Hunters must purchase a hunting license and deer tag prior to purchase of a permit application. Only modern firearm deer tag holders and muzzleloader deer tag holders may apply for the following permit hunts.

Use the FOUR DIGIT HUNT NUMBER on your application.

must go directly to the nearest check station and have geese tagged when leaving a hunt site. If a hunter takes the season bag limit of one dusky Canada goose or does not comply with requirements listed above regarding checking of birds and recording harvest on the Harvest Report, written authorization will be revoked and the hunter will not be able to hunt Western Washington Goose Management Area 2 for the remainder of the season.

Grant County: Those parts east of line beginning at the Douglas-Lincoln County line on State Highway 174, southwest on State Highway 174 to State Highway 155, south on State Highway 155 to U.S. Highway 2, southwest on U.S. Highway 2 to the Pinto Ridge Road, south on Pinto Ridge Road to State Highway 28, east on State Highway 28 to the Stratford Road, south on the Stratford Road to State Highway 17, south on State Highway 17 to the Grant-Adams County line.

Adams County: Those parts east of State Highway 17.

Franklin County: Those parts east and south of a line beginning at the Adams-Franklin County line on State Highway 17, south on State Highway 17 to U.S. Highway 395, south on U.S. Highway 395 to U.S. Interstate I-182, west on U.S. Interstate I-182 to the Franklin-Benton County line.

Benton County: Those parts south of U.S. Interstates I-182 and I-82.

Klickitat County: Those parts east of U.S. Highway 97.

Eastern Washington Goose Management Area 2

All of Okanogan, Douglas, and Kittitas counties and those parts of Grant, Adams, Franklin, and Benton counties not included in Eastern Washington Goose Management Area 1.

Eastern Washington Goose Management Area 3

All other parts of eastern Washington not included in Eastern Washington Goose Management Areas 1 and 2.

STEEL SHOT REQUIREMENT

No person shall hunt waterfowl or coots while using or possessing shotshells or a muzzleloader shotgun loaded with metal other than steel.

SPECIAL CLOSURES AND REGULATIONS

Special Closures

Columbia River:

It is unlawful to hunt waterfowl, coot, or snipe on or within one-fourth mile of the Columbia River in the following areas:

—Between the railroad bridge at Wishram and east along the Columbia River to the grain elevator at Roosevelt.

—Between Rock Island Dam and the Chelan County substation at Winesap in Chelan County and between Rock Island Dam and a point in Douglas County perpendicular to the Chelan County substation at Winesap.

—Between Chief Joseph Dam and the mouth of Nespelem Creek in Okanogan and Douglas counties.

—From the old Hanford townsite (wooden tower) powerline crossing in Sec. 30, T13N, R28E, to Vernita Bridge (Highway 24).

—On or within one-fourth mile of Badger and Foundation Islands in Walla Walla County.

It is unlawful to hunt game birds on the Columbia River or from any island in the Columbia River in the following areas:

—From the mouth of Glade Creek (River Marker 57) to the old townsite of Paterson (River Marker 67) in Benton County, except the hunting of game birds is permitted from the main shoreline of the Columbia River in this area. (Check with Umatilla National Wildlife Refuge for other federal regulations for this area.)

—Between the public boat launch at Sunland Estates in Grant County (Wanapum Pool) and a point perpendicular in Kittitas County; upstream to the posted marker 200 yards north of Quilomene Bay and a point perpendicular in Grant County, including islands.

The U.S. Department of Energy retains security closures on the Hanford Reservation along the Columbia River.

Snake River

It is unlawful to hunt waterfowl, coot, or snipe in the following areas:

—On or within one-half mile of the Snake River from the Highway 12 bridge upriver to Lower Monumental Dam.

—On or within one-fourth mile of the Snake River between the Interstate Highway 12 bridges at Clarkston, downstream to the Lower Granite Dam.

Yakima River

It is unlawful to hunt waterfowl, coot, or snipe within one-fourth mile of the Yakima River in the following areas:

—From the Sunnyside-Mabton Road bridge downstream to the Euclid Road bridge (4 miles).

—From the Grant Avenue bridge (steel bridge) north of Prosser downstream 2-1/2 miles, to the powerline.

I-82 Ponds

It is unlawful to hunt waterfowl, coot, or snipe in the following area:

—Those waters under Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife ownership known as Ponds 1, 2, 3, and 6 north and east of Interstate 82 and south and east of S.R. 12 from the city limits of Union Gap to the Zillah/Toppenish Road.

Padilla Bay

It is unlawful to hunt waterfowl, coot, or snipe in the following areas:

—Swinomish Spit Game Reserve—Beginning at the Burlington Northern railroad tracks on the west shoreline of the Swinomish Channel; then in a northwesterly direction along the west side of the Swinomish Channel to the red channel mark buoy N "20" (as indicated on Navigation Map #18427, 13th Ed., July 16, 1983); then 6,000 feet ENE (east-northeast); then 3,300 feet SSE (south-southeast); then 4,200 feet SW (southwest) to the dike at the south end of Padilla Bay; then continue westerly along said dike to the intersection of the Burlington Northern railroad tracks and the east shoreline of the Swinomish Channel; then continue along said railroad tracks (across swing bridge) to the west shore line of the Swinomish Channel and the point of beginning.

—Bayview Game Reserve—Beginning at a point on the Bayview-Edison Road 750 feet south of the intersection of the Bayview Cemetery Entrance road; then 4,000 feet WNW (west-northwest); then 5,750 feet NNW (north-northwest); then 3,750 feet ENE (east-northeast) to the northwest corner of Padilla Bay Tract No. 532; then east to the northeast corner of Padilla Bay Tract No. 532; then SSE (south-southeast) to the Bayview-Edison Road; then southerly along said road to the point of beginning.

Special Regulations

Skagit Wildlife Area Shotgun Shell Restriction

It is unlawful to have in possession more than 15 shotgun shells or to fire more than 15 shells in one day on the farmed island segment of the Skagit public hunting area, between the south fork of the Skagit River and Fresh Water Slough.

It is unlawful to hunt waterfowl from a moving boat or any free-floating device that is not in a fixed position which is either anchored or secured to shore in Port Susan Bay, Skagit Bay, Padilla Bay, and Samish Bay.

Belfair - Hood Canal

It is unlawful to hunt waterfowl in Lynch Cove and the Union River except in designated blinds. The western and southern boundaries of this closure are posted with red steel markers. (This includes all of the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife and Thelar Wetlands lands.)

FALCONRY SEASONS

A falconry license and a current hunting license are required for hunting with a raptor. In addition, an Eastern Washington Upland Bird Permit or a Western Washington Upland Bird Permit is required to hunt pheasant, quail, and partridge; and federal and state waterfowl stamps for hunting waterfowl are required. A 1995 hunting license, 1995 falconry license, and a 1995 Eastern or Western Washington Upland Bird Permit are required to hunt pheasant, partridge, and grouse after December 31.

Possession limit: 6, straight or mixed bag with ducks, coots, geese and mourning doves during established seasons.

WAC 232-28-514 1994-95 and 1995-96 Trapping seasons and regulations.

TRAPPING REGULATIONS

IT SHALL BE UNLAWFUL TO: Trap for wild animals before October 1, and after

March 15, in western Washington; EXCEPTION: trapping of unclassified wild animals causing damage or predation on private property by the owner or person legally controlling said property (or his designee) is permitted.

IT SHALL BE UNLAWFUL TO: Place traps or establish drowning wire and weights prior to 7:00 a.m. on the opening of the trapping season.

The fox season is closed within the exterior boundaries of the Mount Baker, Snoqualmie, Okanogan, Wenatchee, and Gifford Pinchot National Forests; and closed in San Juan, Island, Skagit, and Whatcom counties.

Federal lands within the Ross Lake and Lake Chelan National Recreation Areas are CLOSED to trapping.

Licenses will be issued only to trappers who have submitted their mandatory Trappers Report of Catch postmarked on or before April 10 of the previous year.

Trappers who fail to submit a report of catch must wait one year before purchasing another trapping license. False reports will be considered the same as no Report of Catch being filed.

Dec. 1, 1995-Jan. 31, 1996

To be issued a trapping license, new trappers must meet trapper education requirements.

Certain areas have extended, shortened, or closed seasons for listed species. Refer to the general season, then look for special seasons and exceptions in the trapping zone in which you wish to trap. All opening and closing dates are inclusive. Trapping season starts at 7 a.m. on opening dates.

Grande Ronde River, from mouth to County Road Bridge about two and one-half miles upstream: Year around season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches, maximum length twenty inches. Retaining steelhead is prohibited. Selective fishery regulations September 1 through May 31.

Closed waters: Within four hundred feet of the base of any dam and within a four hundred foot radius around the fish ladder entrance at Lyons Ferry Hatchery, within a two hundred foot radius upstream of the fish ladder exit above Lower Granite Dam, and within an area one thousand two hundred feet downstream from the base of the west lock gate at Little Goose Dam on the south bank of the Snake River and one hundred feet out into the river from said river bank.

Note: On the mainstem Snake River between Washington and Idaho the license of either state is valid. The angler must be in compliance with the laws of the state issuing the license. This provision does not allow an angler licensed in Idaho to fish on the Washington shore, or in the sloughs or tributaries of Washington. An angler fishing the Snake River is restricted to one daily catch limit even if licensed by both states.

Spokane River, from the mouth at Lake Roosevelt upstream to the Seven Mile Bridge, including Long Lake, formed by Long Lake Dam (see also Long Lake): Year around season. Trout - catch limit - five, no more than two over twenty inches. Walleye - catch limit - eight, no more than one over twenty inches. Only walleye less than sixteen inches or over twenty inches may be kept; closed April 1 through May 31.

From Seven Mile Bridge upstream to the Monroe Street Dam: Year around season. Trout - catch limit - one. Wild trout release (only rainbow trout with missing adipose fins may be possessed. There must be a healed scar in the location of the missing fin.) Selective fishery regulations.

From Monroe Street Dam upstream to Upriver Dam: Year around season.

From Upriver Dam upstream to the Idaho/Washington state line: Trout - catch limit - one, minimum length 12 inches; selective fishery regulations, except motors allowed.

Sprague Lake: Channel catfish - catch limit - five. Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept. Closed waters: March 1 through June 30 in that part of the lake and Cow Creek from Harper Island and posted markers on the lake shore southwest to Danekas Road. Note: The inlet stream, Negro Creek, is closed April 1 through June 15.

Spring Lake (Columbia County): March 1 through July 31 season. Fishing from any floating device prohibited.

Starvation Lake: April 30 through May 31 season. Additional season June 1 through October 31, catch-and-release only, selective fishery regulations.

Sullivan Creek, from Mill Pond upstream: Selective fishery regulations.

Summit Lake (Stevens County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Swan Lake (Ferry County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Thomas Lake: April 30 through October 31 season.

Touchet River, from mouth to Highway 12 Bridge at Waitsburg: June 1 through April 15 season. Open only to fishing for steelhead from September 1 through April 15. Wild steelhead release.

From Highway 12 Bridge at Waitsburg to Wolf Fork Bridge: June 1 through April 15 season. Wild steelhead release. Open only to fishing for steelhead and brown trout over twenty inches September 1 through April 15.

From Wolf Fork Bridge upstream and all tributaries: Trout, minimum length twelve inches selective fishery regulations.

Trout Lake (Ferry County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Tucannon River, note: All tributaries closed. Wild steelhead release.

Mouth to Highway 261 Bridge: Year around season. Closed to fishing for all trout April 16 through May 31.

From the Highway 261 Bridge upstream to Highway 12 Bridge: June 1 through August 31 season. Open only to fishing for steelhead and whitefish November 1 through April 15.

From the Highway 12 Bridge upstream to the mouth of Cummings Creek: Open only to fishing for steelhead and whitefish November 1 through April 15.

From the mouth of Cummings Creek upstream to a point four hundred feet upstream of the hatchery intake dam: Closed waters.

From a point four hundred feet upstream of the hatchery intake dam to the mouth of Panjab Creek: Trout - catch limit - five, selective fishery regulations. Only two Dolly Varden/Bull Trout over twenty inches may be retained as part of the trout daily catch limit.

From the mouth of Panjab Creek upstream: Closed waters.

Vanes Lake: April 30 through October 31 season.

Waitts Lake: April 30 through February 28 season.

Walla Walla River, wild steelhead release.

From mouth to the Touchet River: Year around season. Closed to fishing for all trout April 1 through May 31 wild steelhead release.

From the Touchet River upstream to state line: June 1 through April 15 season. Open only to fishing for steelhead November 1 through April 15.

Ward Lake (Ferry County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Watson Lake: March 1 through July 31 season. Fishing from any floating device prohibited.

Williams Lake (Spokane County): April 30 through September 30 season.

Williams Lake (Stevens County): December 1 through March 31 season.

Yokum Lake: April 30 through October 31 season.

Region II.

Description: That area of the state contained within the boundaries of Adams, Douglas, Franklin, Grant, and Okanogan counties.

All state-wide regulations apply to all Region II waters unless specifically exempted or amended by exceptions - Region II regulations (listed for separate waters and categories of waters).

When fishing or hunting within the boundaries of the Colville Indian Reservation, contact the office of the Colville Confederated Tribes to find out what tribal permits and regulations apply.

Campbell Lake (Okanogan County): September 1 through March 31 season.

Cascade Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Cattail Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Chewuch River (Chewack River) (Okanogan County), from mouth to Lake Creek: Trout, minimum length twelve

inches. Selective fishery regulations. Additional December 1 through March 31 season for whitefish only.

Chopaka Lake (Okanogan County): April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - catch limit - one. Fly fishing only.

Cliff Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Columbia River and impoundments and all connecting sloughs - see regulations, page . . .

Conconully Lake (Okanogan County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Conconully Reservoir (Okanogan County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Coot Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Cougar Lake (near Winthrop - Okanogan County): September 1 through March 31 season.

Cow Lake (Adams County): Channel catfish - catch limit - five. Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Coyote Creek Ponds (Adams County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Crab Creek, from Morgan Lake Road to Goose Lake Road (excluding Marsh Unit II impoundments): March 1 through July 31 season. Trout - catch limit - five. Fishing from any floating device prohibited.

Fourth of July Lake (Adams County): December 1 through March 31 season. Trout, no more than two over fourteen inches. Internal combustion engines prohibited.

Gadwall Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

George Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Gold Creek (Okanogan County), from mouth to Foggy Dew Creek: Selective fishery regulations.

Green Lake (Okanogan County): December 1 through March 31 season.

Green Lake, lower (Okanogan County): December 1 through March 31 season. Five.

Grimes Lake: June 1 through August 31 season. Trout - catch limit - one. Selective fishery regulations, except electric motors allowed.

Hallin Lake (Adams County): Channel catfish - catch limit - five. Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Hampton Lake, lower (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season. Internal combustion engines prohibited.

Hampton Lake, upper (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season. Internal combustion engines prohibited.

Hays Creek and Ponds (Adams County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Hourglass Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Hutchinson Lake (Adams County): March 1 through July 31 season. Internal combustion engines prohibited.

Indian Dan Pond: July 1 through October 31 season.

Jameson Lake (Douglas County): April 30 through July 4 and October 1 through October 31 seasons.

Jasmine Creek: Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Lake Creek, upstream from Pasayten Wilderness boundary: June 1 through August 31 season. Selective fishery regulations.

Leader Lake (Okanogan County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Lemna Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Lenice Lake: April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - catch limit - one. Selective fishery regulations.

Lenore Lake (Grant County): Closed: December 1 through February 28. March 1 through May 31 season. Catch-and-release only, selective fishery regulations, except electric motors allowed. June 1 through November 30 season. Trout - catch limit - one. Selective fishery regulations, except electric motors allowed. Closed waters: Area within two hundred yard radius of trash rack leading to the irrigation pumping station (south end of lake) and area approximately one hundred yards beyond the mouth of inlet stream to State Highway 17.

Little Twin Lake: December 1 through March 31 season.

Long Lake (Okanogan County): April 30 through September 30 season.

Lost River (Okanogan County): From one-quarter mile above bridge to mouth of Monument Creek: Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

From mouth of Drake Creek to outlet of Cougar Lake: Trout and Dolly Varden/Bull Trout - catch limit - two, minimum length fourteen inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Moses Lake: Crappie - catch limit - five. Only crappie more than ten inches long may be kept. Bluegill - catch limit - five. Only bluegill more than eight inches long may be kept.

North Potholes Reserve Ponds (Grant County): February 1 through October 10 season. Fishing from any floating device prohibited, except float tubes permitted.

Nunnally Lake: April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - catch limit - one. Selective fishery regulations. Closed waters: Outlet stream of Nunnally Lake.

Okanogan River (Okanogan County): Year around season. Wild steelhead release. Closed waters: From Zosel Dam downstream one-quarter mile below the railroad trestle.

Palmer Lake (Okanogan County): Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept. Set lines may be used for burbot. An angler may use no more than one set line having attached thereto any number of hooks. Set lines must be clearly identified with the angler's name and address.

Para-Juvenile Lake: March 1 through July 31 season. Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Park Lake: April 30 through September 30 season.

Patterson Lake: April 30 through October 31 season.

Pearrygin Lake (Okanogan County): April 30 through September 30 season.

Perch Lake: April 30 through September 30 season.

Pillar Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Poacher Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Potholes Reservoir: Crappie and bluegill - catch limit - twenty-five (species combined).

Proctor Lake (Okanogan County): Trout - catch limit - one. Selective fishery regulations.

Quail Lake: Catch-and-release, fly fishing only.

Quincy Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Rat Lake (Okanogan County): December 1 through March 31 season.

Ringold Springs Creek (Hatchery Creek): Closed waters.

Rocky Ford Creek and Ponds (Grant County): Trout - catch limit - one. Fly fishing only. Fishing from bank only (no wading).

Roosevelt Lake (Columbia River) (Grant County): See Region I.

Round Lake (Okanogan County): April 30 through September 30 season.

Royal Lake (Adams County): April 30 through September 30 season. Internal combustion engines prohibited.

Royal Slough (including Marsh Unit IV impoundments): Closed waters.

Rufus Woods Lake (Douglas County): Trout (including kokanee) - catch limit - two.

Saddle Mountain Lake: Closed waters.

Sago Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Salmon Creek, North Fork: Selective fishery regulations.

Salmon Creek, West Fork, from mouth to South Fork: Selective fishery regulations.

Scabrock Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Shiner Lake (Adams County): March 1 through July 31 season. Internal combustion engines prohibited.

Shoveler Lake: March 1 through July 31 season.

Similkameen River (Okanogan County) from mouth to Enloe Dam: June 1 through March 31 season. Wild steelhead release. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations June 1 through September 30.

From Enloe Dam to Canadian border: Additional December 1 through March 31 season for whitefish only.

Sinlahekin Creek (Okanogan County), from Palmer Lake to Cecile Creek bridge: June 1 through August 31 season. Selective fishery regulations. Additional December 1 through March 31 season for whitefish only.

Snake River: See Region I.

Snipe Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Spectacle Lake (Okanogan County): March 1 through July 31 season. Possession of fish other than trout is prohibited.

Sprague Lake: Channel catfish - catch limit - five. Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept. Closed waters: March 1 through June 30 in that part of the lake and Cow Creek from Harper Island and posted markers on lake shore southwest to Danekas Road. Note: The inlet stream, Negro Creek, is closed April 1 through June 15.

Spring Lakes (near Quincy - Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Twisp River (Okanogan County), from mouth to War Creek: Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Vic Meyers (Rainbow) Lake: April 30 through September 30 season.

Wannacut Lake (Okanogan County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Warden Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Warden Lake, South (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Washburn Island Pond (Okanogan County): April 1 through September 30 season. Bass - only bass less than 12 inches or over fifteen inches may be kept. Internal combustion engines prohibited.

Whitestone Lake (Okanogan County): Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Widgeon Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Region III.

Description: That area of the state contained within the boundaries of Benton, Chelan, Kittitas, and Yakima counties.

All state-wide regulations apply to all Region III waters unless specifically exempted or amended by Exceptions -

Region III regulations (listed for separate waters and categories of waters).

When fishing or hunting within the boundaries of the Yakima Indian Reservation contact the Office of the Confederated Tribes and Bands of the Yakima Indian Nation. Phone to find out what tribal permits and regulations apply. Waters open under tribal regulations are also open under state regulations.

In Benton County: Rivers, Streams and Beaver Ponds: Year around.

Exceptions - Region III Regulations. State-wide regulations apply to all waters except where modified in special regulations below.

American River, from mouth to Rainier Fork: Selective fishery regulations.

Bachelor Creek: Year around season. Trout - catch limit - five, no minimum length.

Beehive (Lake) Reservoir: April 30 through October 31 season. From July 5 through October 31 catch-and-release, selective fishery regulations.

An angler may use one set line with any number of hooks for burbot. Set lines must be clearly identified with the angler's name and address. Except east (downlake) of Fields Point from May 15 through September 30: Trout, minimum length eight inches, not more than two over fifteen inches and kokanee - catch limit - five, no minimum length.

Chelan Lake Tributaries from mouths upstream one mile except Stehekin River: July 1 through October 31 season. Selective fishery regulations.

Chelan River: Year around season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches.

Chiwaukum Creek, from mouth to South Fork: Selective fishery regulations.

Chiwawa River, from mouth to Rock Creek: Selective fishery regulations.

Clear Lake (Chelan County): April 30 through October 31 season. From July 5 through October 31 catch-and-release, selective fishery regulations.

Cle Elum Lake (Reservoir): Trout - catch limit - two, minimum length twelve inches. Kokanee catch limit - sixteen. An angler may use one set line with any number of hooks for burbot. Set lines must be clearly identified with the angler's name and address.

Cle Elum River, from mouth to Cle Elum Dam: Lawful to fish to base of Cle Elum Dam. Additional December 1 through March 31 season for whitefish only.

Columbia Park Pond: Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Columbia River and impoundments and all connecting sloughs - see Columbia River regulations page . . .

Eightmile Lake: Trout - catch limit - five, not more than two mackinaw.

North Elton Ponds: December 1 through March 31 season. Trout - catch limit - two. Internal combustion engines prohibited.

Enchantment Park Ponds: Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Entiat River, from mouth to Fox Creek: June 1 through March 31 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches; selective fishery regulations June 1 through November 30. Wild steelhead release.

Fiorito Lakes: Internal combustion engines prohibited.

Fish Lake (Chelan County): Trout, no more than two over fifteen inches.

Gold Creek, Gold Creek Pond and Outlet Channel (tributary to Keechelus Lake): Closed waters.

I-82 Ponds (1-7): Internal combustion engines prohibited. In addition, I-82 Ponds (1-2) closed to the taking of walleye.

Icicle Creek (River), from mouth to four hundred feet below Leavenworth National Fish Hatchery rack: June 1 through March 31 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Wild steelhead release.

From Rock Island Bridge upstream to Leland Creek: Selective fishery regulations.

Indian Creek (Yakima County): Closed waters.

Kachess Lake (Reservoir): Trout - catch limit - two, minimum length twelve inches. Kokanee catch limit - sixteen. Feeding (chumming) permitted. An angler may use one set line with any number of hooks for burbot. Set lines must be clearly identified with the angler's name and address.

Kachess River: Lawful to fish to base of Kachess Dam. From Kachess Lake (Reservoir) upstream to Mineral Creek: Closed waters.

Keechelus Lake (Reservoir): Trout - catch limit - two, minimum length twelve inches. Kokanee catch limit - sixteen. Feeding (chumming) permitted. An angler may use one set line with any number of hooks for burbot. Set lines must be clearly identified with the angler's name and address.

Leech Lake (White Pass area): Trout, no more than two over twelve inches, fly fishing only.

Lilly Lake (Chelan County): April 30 through October 31 season. From July 5 through October 31 catch-and-release, selective fishery regulations.

Little Naches River, Pileup Creek to Road 1913 Bridge: Selective fishery regulations.

Little Wenatchee River, from Lake Wenatchee to the falls below U.S. Forest Service Road 6700 Bridge at Riverside Campground: Selective fishery regulations.

Mad River, from Pine Flat Campground upstream to Jimmy Creek: Selective fishery regulations.

McCabe Pond: Five fish catch limit for all species combined. Fishing from any floating device prohibited.

Mercer Creek, that portion within Ellensburg city limits: Juveniles only (under fifteen years old). Trout - catch limit - five, no minimum length.

Merritt Lake: Trout - catch limit - sixteen.

Mineral Creek (tributary to upper Kachess River) from mouth to Wilderness Boundary: Closed waters.

Mud Lake: Trout - catch limit - two. Selective fishery regulations.

Myron Lake: Trout - catch limit - two. Selective fishery regulations.

Naches River, from the mouth to Rattlesnake Creek: Trout, minimum length twelve inches, maximum length twenty inches. Closed to fishing for steelhead. Additional December 1 through March 31 season for whitefish only.

From Rattlesnake Creek to Little Naches River: Trout, maximum length twenty inches. Closed to fishing for steelhead. Additional December 1 through March 31 season for whitefish only.

Naneum Pond: Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Nason Creek, from the Kahler Creek Bridge (near Coles Corner) upstream to Stevens Creek: Selective fishery regulations.

Nason Creek Fish Pond: Juveniles (under fifteen years old) and handicapped persons only.

Oak Creek: Trout - catch limit - five, no minimum length.

Panther Creek (Chelan County): Closed waters.

Rattlesnake Creek: Catch-and-release only, selective fishery regulations.

Rimrock Lake (Reservoir): Kokanee - catch limit - sixteen. Feeding (chumming) permitted.

Roses Lake: December 1 through March 31 season.

Schaefer Lake: Trout - catch limit - sixteen.

Spectacle Lake (Kittitas County): Trout - catch limit - sixteen.

Stehekin River, from the mouth to Agnes Creek: July 1 through October 31 season. Trout, minimum length fifteen inches; selective fishery regulations. Additional March 1 through June 30 season: Catch-and-release only, selective fishery regulations.

Swauk Creek, from mouth to Iron Creek: Selective fishery regulations.

Taneum Creek: Selective fishery regulations.

Tieton River: Trout - catch limit - five, no minimum length. Lawful to fish to base of Tieton (Rimrock) Dam. Additional December 1 through March 31 season for whitefish only.

Tieton River, North Fork, from Rimrock Lake to within four hundred feet of Clear Lake Dam: June 1 through August 15 season. Fishing is prohibited in the spillway channel and within four hundred feet of Clear Lake Dam.

Trapper Lake: Trout - catch limit - two.

Twin Lakes (Chelan County) and tributaries and outlet stream to junction with the Napeequa River: Closed waters.

Upper Wheeler Reservoir (Chelan County): Closed waters.

Wapato Lake: April 30 through October 31 season. From August 1 through October 31 Trout - catch-and-release, selective fishery regulations. Internal combustion engines allowed.

Wenas Lake: Trout - catch limit - five, of which not more than two may be brown trout.

Wenatchee Lake: Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Kokanee catch limit - sixteen. Feeding (chumming) permitted. Kokanee/sockeye under sixteen inches will be considered kokanee and under the jurisdiction of the department of wildlife while those sixteen inches and over will be considered sockeye salmon and under the jurisdiction of department of fisheries.

Wenatchee River, from mouth to Icicle River Road Bridge at Leavenworth: June 1 through March 31 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Wild steelhead release. Selective fishery regulations June 1 through November 30.

From Icicle River Road Bridge at Leavenworth to Lake Wenatchee: June 1 through November 30 season. Selective fishery regulations. Trout, minimum length twelve inches, maximum length twenty inches. Retaining steelhead is prohibited.

White River, from mouth of Napeequa River upstream to White River Falls: Selective fishery regulations.

Wide Hollow Creek: Trout - catch limit - five, no minimum length.

Wilson Creek (two branches within Ellensburg city limits): Juveniles only (under fifteen years old). Trout - catch limit - five, no minimum length.

Yakima River, from mouth to four hundred feet below Roza Dam: Year around season. Closed: April 1 through May 31 for trout. Trout, minimum length twelve inches; maximum length twenty inches. Closed to fishing for steelhead in the Yakima River including tributaries and drains.

From Roza Dam to four hundred feet below Easton Dam: Year around season. Trout: Catch-and-release, selective fishery regulations. Exception: Bait and single-pointed, barbed hooks may be used for whitefish only December 1 through February 28. Anglers may fish from boats equipped with motors from the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation restricted area signs at Roza Dam upstream to the boat launch ramp on the Roza Access Area (approximately one-half mile).

From Lake Easton to Keechelus Dam: Selective fishery regulations.

Yakima Sportsmen's Park Ponds: Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Region IV.

Description: That area of the state contained within the boundaries of Island, King, San Juan, Skagit, Snohomish, and Whatcom counties, and that portion of Pierce County east of a line from the mouth of the Nisqually River through Drayton Passage, Pitt Passage, Carr Inlet, and the Tacoma Narrows.

All state-wide regulations apply to all Region IV waters unless specifically exempted or amended by Exceptions - Region IV regulations (listed for separate waters and categories of waters).

Exceptions Region IV. Regulations. State-wide regulations apply to all waters except where modified in special regulations below.

American Lake: Feeding (chumming) permitted.

Armstrong Lake (Snohomish County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Baker Lake: April 30 through October 31 season. Feeding (chumming) permitted. An area two hundred feet in radius around the pump discharge, at the south end of the lake is closed.

Ballinger Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Barnaby Slough: Closed waters.

Bearpaw Lake (Whatcom County): April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - catch and possession limit - one, minimum length eighteen inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Beaver Lake (King County): Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Big Bear Creek (tributary of Sammamish River): Closed waters.

Big Beaver Creek, from closed water markers on Ross Lake upstream one-quarter mile: Closed waters. Upstream from one-quarter mile markers, including tributary streams, and beaver ponds that are tributary to Big Beaver Creek: July 1 through October 31 season; catch-and-release only, selective fishery regulations.

Big Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Bosworth Lake (Snohomish County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Boxley Creek (North Bend), from its mouth to the falls located at approximately rivermile 0.9: Closed waters.

Boyle Lake (the inlet and outlet are closed waters): April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - catch limit - two, minimum length fourteen inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Bridges Lake (the inlet and outlet are closed waters): April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - catch limit - two, minimum length fourteen inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Cain Lake: April 30 through October 31 season.

Calligan Lake: June 1 through October 31 season. All tributary streams, and the upper third of the outlet are closed waters.

Campbell Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Canyon Creek, (S.F. Stillaguamish River) mouth to forks: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

Carbon River, from its mouth to the Highway 162 Bridge: June 1 through January 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Additional February 1 through March 31 season: Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Wild steelhead release.

Cascade Lake (San Juan County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Cascade River: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of the trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches.

Note: The area from the Rockport-Cascade Road Bridge to the mouth is closed June 1 through September 30.

Cassidy Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Cavanaugh Lake: Feeding (chumming) permitted.

Cedar River, from its mouth to the Landsburg diversion dam: June 1 through September 1 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Selective fishery regulations.

From its mouth to the Landsburg Highway Bridge: Additional December 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Fishing from any floating

device prohibited. Night fishing closure. Wild steelhead release.

From Landsburg diversion dam upstream to Chester Morse Reservoir: Closed waters.

Chambers Bay and that portion of Marine Area 13 inside a line from Gordan Point to the dock at Pioneer gravel pit (second gravel pit approximately 1.2 miles north of Chambers Bay): June 1 through October 31 season.

Chambers Lake (within Ft. Lewis Military Reservation): Trout - catch-and-release only. Selective fishery regulations, except electric motors allowed. Contact Ft. Lewis for a land use permit.

Chaplain Lake: Closed waters.

Clear Lake (Pierce County): Feeding (chumming) permitted.

Clough Creek (North Bend): Closed waters.

Clover Creek, within the boundaries of McChord Air Force Base: Trout - catch limit - one, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Coal Creek (tributary of Lake Washington): Closed waters.

Coal Creek, (near Snoqualmie) from Highway 10 downstream: April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - no minimum length. Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Cottage Lake (King County): April 30 through October 31 season.

County Line Ponds: Closed Waters.

Crabapple Lake (Snohomish County): April 30 through October 31 season.

De Coursey Pond: April 30 through October 31 season. Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Deer Creek and Little Deer Creek (tributaries to North Fork Stillaguamish): Closed waters.

Deer Lake (Island County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Desire, Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Eagle Lakes (Big and Little): Closed waters.

Ebey Lake: Fly fishing only. Trout - catch limit - one, minimum length eighteen inches.

Echo Glen Pond:

Note: No public access. (State corrections facility.)

Erie Lake (Skagit County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Fazon Lake: Channel catfish - possession limit - two. Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept. Fishing from any floating device prohibited from first Friday in October through January 15.

Findley Lake: Closed waters.

Fisher Slough: From mouth to Highway 530 Bridge: Year around season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches entire season. Upstream from Highway 530 Bridge: June 1 through October 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

Flowing Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Fortson Mill Pond #2: April 30 through October 31 season. Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Geneva Lake (King County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Gissberg Ponds: Closed to fishing for channel catfish.

Goodwin Lake: Feeding (chumming) permitted. Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Goss Lake (Island County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Granite Lakes (Skagit County - near Marblemount): Grayling - catch-and-release only.

Green (Duwamish) River, from its mouth to the First Avenue Bridge: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Exempt from wild steelhead release July 1 through November 30. It is unlawful to fish with more than one single hook on sinking artificial lures; or with leads, weights, or sinkers less than twelve inches above or below the lure or bait.

From the First Avenue Bridge to Tacoma Headworks Dam: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Exempt from wild steelhead release July 1 through November 30. Fishing from any floating device prohibited November 1 through February 28. Note: Area from the Auburn-Black Diamond Bridge downstream to the 8th St. N.E. Bridge in Auburn is closed September 1 through October 15 and area from the Auburn-Black Diamond Bridge downstream to the Highway 18 Bridge is closed September 1 through October 31.

From the SR 167 Freeway Bridge to the Tacoma Headworks Dam: Additional March 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Wild steelhead release. Fishing from any floating device prohibited.

Greenwater River, from mouth to Greenwater Lakes: Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Hancock Lake: June 1 through October 31 season. All tributary streams and the upper third of the outlet are closed waters.

Harrison Pond: Closed waters.

Hart Lake (Pierce County): Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Heart Lake (Skagit County, near Anacortes): April 30 through October 31 season.

Howard Lake (Snohomish County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Hozomeen Lake (Whatcom County): July 1 through October 31 season.

Issaquah Creek: Closed waters.

Jennings Park Pond: April 30 through October 31 season. Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Johnson Creek (Whatcom County), from Northern Pacific Railroad tracks to the Lawson Street footbridge in Sumas: Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Kapowsin Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Kathleen Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Kelsey Creek (tributary of Lake Washington): Closed waters.

Ki Lake (Snohomish County): April 30 through October 31. Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Kimball Creek (near Snoqualmie): April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - no minimum length. Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Kings Lake Bog (King County): Closed waters.

Klaus Lake (the inlet and outlet to first Weyerhaeuser spur are closed waters): April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - catch limit - two, minimum length fourteen inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Lake Washington Ship Canal: See Washington, Lake; Union, Lake; Portage Bay and Salmon Bay.

Langlois Lake (King County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Little Bear Creek (tributary of Sammamish River): Closed waters.

Loma Lake (Snohomish County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Lucas Slough: Closed waters.

Margaret Lake (King County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Marine areas: (See page . . .).

Martha Lake (AM) (Snohomish County): April 30 through October 31 season.

May Creek (tributary of Lake Washington): Closed waters.

McMurray Lake (Skagit County): April 30 through October 31.

Mercer Slough (tributary of Lake Washington): Closed waters.

Mill Pond (Auburn): April 30 through October 31 season. Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Muck Creek and tributaries (within Ft. Lewis Military Reservation): Trout - catch-and-release only. Selective fishery regulations. Contact Ft. Lewis for a land use permit.

New Mire Creek (tributary of Lake Sawyer): April 30 through October 31 season. Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Newhalem Ponds: Closed waters.

Nisqually River: See Region VI.

Nooksack River from mouth to forks, Middle Fork to Dam. North Fork to Nooksack Falls: June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Wild steelhead release. Fishing from boats equipped with motors prohibited on the North and Middle Forks November 1 through March 15.

South Fork, from its mouth to source: Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Wild steelhead release, and selective fishery regulations.

South Fork, from its mouth to Skookum Creek: Additional November 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Wild steelhead release. Fishing from boats equipped with motors prohibited.

North Creek (tributary of Sammamish River): Closed waters.

North Lake (King County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Northern State Hospital Pond: April 30 through October 31 season. Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Ohop Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Old Fishing Hole Pond (Kent): April 30 through October 31 season. Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Padden Lake: April 30 through October 31 season. Internal combustion engines prohibited.

Pass Lake: Trout - catch limit - one, minimum length eighteen inches. Fly fishing only.

Phantom Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Philippa Creek (tributary to N.F. Snoqualmie River): Closed waters.

Pilchuck Creek, mouth to Highway 9 Bridge: June 1 through November 30 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Selective fishing regulations. Additional December 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

Pilchuck River, its entire length: Closed March 1 through November 30.

From its mouth to five hundred feet downstream from the Snohomish City diversion dam: December 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Fishing from any floating device prohibited.

Pine Lake (King County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Pipers Creek (Carkeek Creek), from its mouth to its source, including tributaries: Closed waters.

Portage Bay: Feeding (chumming) permitted.

Pratt River (tributary to Middle Fork Snoqualmie): Catch-and-release only, and selective fishery regulations.

Puyallup River, from its mouth to the Electron power plant outlet: June 1 through January 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

From its mouth to the Soldier's Home Bridge in Orting: Additional February 1 through March 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Wild steelhead release.

Raging River, from its mouth to the Highway 18 Bridge (three miles upstream from Preston): June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

Rapjohn Lake: April 30 through October 31 season. Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Rattlesnake Lake: April 30 through October 31 season. Selective fishery regulations, except electric motors allowed.

Rattlesnake Lake (King County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Ravensdale Lake: April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - catch limit - two, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Ravensdale Lake (King County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Ridley Lake (Whatcom County): July 1 through October 31 season. Trout - catch and possession limit - one, minimum length eighteen inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Riley Lake (Snohomish County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Rock Creek (below Landsburg): Closed waters.

Ross Lake (Reservoir): July 1 through October 31 season. Trout - catch limit - three, possession limit - six, minimum length thirteen inches. Selective fishery regulations. Fishing from boats with motors allowed.

Note: The following tributaries to Ross Lake are closed from the closed water markers near their mouths upstream the distance indicated. Big Beaver Creek, one-quarter mile (see special Big Beaver Creek regulations), Ruby Creek, entire stream. All other tributaries - one mile.

Ross Lake Tributary Streams not listed as closed: July 1 through October 31 season.

Salmon Bay, all waters from the Chittenden Locks (in Ballard) upstream (east) to the Fremont Bridge: July 1 through February 28 season. Trout - no more than two over twenty inches. Wild steelhead release.

Salmon Bay, from the east end of the north wing wall of the Chittenden Locks to a line approximately one hundred seventy-five feet seaward of, and parallel to the railroad bridge, and which runs through the wooden tower structure near the south shore: December 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. It is unlawful to fish with more than one hook on sinking artificial lures; or with leads, weights, or sinkers less than twelve inches above or below the lure or bait. Fishing from any floating device prohibited. This area is closed March 1

through November 30. See also department of fisheries' regulations.

Samish, Lake: Feeding (chumming) permitted. Cutthroat - catch limit - two, minimum length fourteen inches.

Samish River, from its mouth to the old Highway 99 Bridge and from the department of fisheries' rack to the Hickson Bridge: June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. December 1 through March 15 wild steelhead release. Note: Closed from Highway 99 Bridge to department of fisheries' salmon rack.

Sammamish Lake: Trout - no more than two over fourteen inches. Kokanee may not be kept.

Sammamish River (Slough), from the 68th Avenue N.E. Bridge to Lake Sammamish: June 1 through August 31 and December 1 through February 28 seasons. Trout, minimum length twenty inches. Wild steelhead release. All tributaries are closed.

Sauk River, from its mouth to the mouth of the White Chuck River: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches. June 15 through October 31 wild steelhead release.

From the mouth of the White Chuck River to headwaters, including North and South Forks: Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Selective fishery regulations. Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches.

From its mouth to the Darrington Bridge: Additional March 1 through April 30 season. Catch-and-release only, and selective fishery regulations.

Sawyer, Lake: Feeding (chumming) permitted.

Sequallitchew Lake: Contact Ft. Lewis for land use permit.

Serene Lake (Snohomish County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Shady Lake: June 1 through October 31 season. Trout, no more than one over fourteen inches.

Shannon, Lake: April 30 through October 31 season. Feeding (chumming) permitted.

Shoecraft Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Silver Lake (Pierce County): April 30 through October 31 season. Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Silver Lake (Whatcom County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Sixteen Lake (Skagit County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Skagit River, from its mouth to the Memorial Highway Bridge (Highway 536 at Mt. Vernon): Year around season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Retaining steelhead

is prohibited from April 1 through May 31. (See Fisher Slough.) Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches.

From Memorial Highway Bridge (Highway 536 at Mt. Vernon) upstream to Gorge Powerhouse at Newhalem: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches.

From the Gorge Powerhouse to Gorge Dam: Closed waters.

From Memorial Highway Bridge (Highway 536 at Mt. Vernon) to pipeline crossing at Sedro Woolley: Additional March 1 through March 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches.

From pipeline crossing at Sedro Woolley to mouth of Bacon Creek: Additional March 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches. Note: Closed waters from the pipeline crossing at Sedro Woolley to the Dalles Bridge at Concrete March 16 through May 31.

From the Dalles Bridge at Concrete to the mouth of Bacon Creek: Additional March 16 through April 30 season. Catch-and-release only, and selective fishery regulations, except lawful to fish from a boat with motor but not while under power.

Skykomish River, from its mouth to mouth of Sultan River: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches. Fishing from any floating device prohibited November 1 through February 28 from the boat ramp below Lewis Street Bridge at Monroe downstream two thousand five hundred feet. Additional March 1 through April 30 season: Trout - catch-and-release only, and selective fishery regulations. Fishing from any floating device prohibited from the boat ramp below Lewis Street Bridge at Monroe downstream two thousand five hundred feet.

From the mouth of the Sultan River to the forks: June 1 through March 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Wild steelhead release March 1 through March 31. Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches. Fishing from any floating device prohibited in the area one thousand five hundred feet upstream and one thousand feet downstream of the outlet at Skykomish Rearing Ponds and that same area is closed to fishing June 1 to 8:00 a.m. August 1.

Skykomish River, North Fork, from its mouth to one thousand feet downstream from Bear Creek Falls: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Closed waters from one thousand feet

below Bear Creek Falls to one thousand feet above Bear Creek Falls.

From one thousand feet upstream of Bear Creek Falls to: Quartz Creek: Catch-and-release, selective fishery regulations.

Skykomish River, South Fork, from its mouth to six hundred feet downstream from the Sunset Falls Fishway: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Closed waters from Sunset Falls Fishway to a point six hundred feet downstream of the fishway.

From Sunset Falls to source: June 1 through November 30 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Selective fishery regulations. Additional December 1 through February 28 season for whitefish only.

Snohomish River, all channels, sloughs, and interconnected waterways (excluding all tributaries) From Puget Sound to Highway 529: Year around season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches.

From Highway 529 upstream (all channels): June 1 through March 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

Snoqualmie River, from its mouth to the falls: June 1 through March 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. June 1 through November 30 selective fishery regulations. Fishing from boats with motors allowed. Fishing from any floating device prohibited November 1 through March 31 from the mouth of Tokul Creek downstream to the boat ramp at Plumb access, about one-quarter mile. Note: Waters within the Puget Power tunnel at the falls and within fifty feet of any point on Puget Power's lower Plant #2 building (north bank) are closed.

From Snoqualmie Falls, including the North and South Forks: Trout, minimum length ten inches. Selective fishery regulations. Additional November 1 through February 28 season for whitefish only.

Middle Fork Snoqualmie from mouth to source including all tributaries: Catch-and-release only, and selective fishery regulations.

Soos Creek, from mouth to salmon hatchery rack: June 1 through August 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

South Prairie Creek, closed downstream from Page Creek to its mouth.

Spada Lake (Reservoir): April 30 through October 31 season. Selective fishery regulations. Internal combustion engines prohibited. Note: All tributaries to lake are closed to fishing.

Spanaway Lake, and its outlet downstream to the dam (approximately 800 feet): Year around season.

Sportsman's Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Spring Lake (King County): Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Squalicum Lake: Trout - catch limit - two. Fly fishing only.

Steel Lake (King County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Stetattle Creek, from its mouth for one and one-half miles upstream, to mouth of Bucket Creek: Closed waters.

Stevens, Lake: Feeding (chumming) permitted. Bass - possession limit - one over eighteen inches.

Stillaguamish River, and all sloughs, downstream of Warm Beach-Stanwood Highway: Year around season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

Stillaguamish River, upstream from the Warm Beach-Stanwood Highway to the forks (except Harvey Creek, Pioneer Ponds, and Portage Creek are closed): June 1 through March 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches. Closed waters from the barrier dam (downstream of I-5) downstream two hundred feet.

Stillaguamish River, North Fork, from its mouth to Swede Heaven Bridge: Year around season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Note: Closed from Mt. Loop Highway bridge above Granite Falls downstream to a point four hundred feet below the outlet of the end of the fishway.

Stillaguamish River, South Fork, above Mountain Loop Highway Bridge above Granite Falls to source: June 1 through November 30 season.

Storm Lake (Snohomish County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Stuck River: See White River.

Suiattle River: Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches.

Sultan River, from its mouth to a point four hundred feet downstream from the diversion dam at river mile 16: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches. Note: North and South Forks are closed to fishing.

Sunday Creek (tributary to N.F. Snoqualmie River): Closed waters.

Swamp Creek (tributary to Sammamish River): Closed waters.

Tanwax Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Tapps Lake (Reservoir) and intake canal—Open area includes intake canal to within four hundred feet of the screen at Dingle Basin: Year around season.

Tate Creek (tributary to N.F. Snoqualmie River): Closed waters.

Taylor River (tributary to the Middle Fork Snoqualmie): Catch-and-release only, and selective fishery regulations.

Tennant Lake: Fishing from any floating device prohibited from first Friday in October through January 15.

Terrell, Lake: Fishing from any floating device prohibited from first Friday in October through January 15 except fishing from floating dock permitted. Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Thornton Creek (tributary to Lake Washington): Closed waters.

Tibbetts Creek (tributary to Lake Sammamish): Closed waters.

Toad Lake (Whatcom County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Tokul Creek, from its mouth to the posted cable boundary marker located approximately seven hundred feet upstream of the mouth: December 1 through March 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. This area is closed daily from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. This area is closed to all fishing from April 1 through November 30.

From the posted cable boundary marker located approximately seven hundred feet upstream of the mouth to the railroad trestle: Closed to all fishing year around.

Tolt River, from its mouth to the USGS trolley cable near the confluence of the North and South Forks: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. June 1 through November 30 season. Selective fishery regulations.

From the USGS trolley cable to the mouth of Yellow Creek on the North Fork, and to the dam on the South Fork: Closed waters.

North Fork above Yellow Creek: Trout - catch-and-release only, selective fishery regulations.

South Fork above the dam: Trout, minimum length ten inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Tradition Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Tye River: Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Selective fishery regulations. Additional November 1 through February 28 season for whitefish only.

Union, Lake: Feeding (chumming) permitted.

Voight's Creek: Closed waters from mouth to Highway 162 Bridge.

Wagners Lake (Snohomish County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Walker Lake (King County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Wallace River, from its mouth to the first Burlington-Northern Railroad bridge downstream of the Highway 2 Bridge: June 1 through September 1 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches. Note: Closed waters from the first Burlington-Northern Railroad bridge (below Highway 2) to a point two hundred feet upstream of the water intake of the salmon hatchery.

From the mouth to mouth of Olney Creek: Additional November 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Fishing from any floating device prohibited. Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches.

Wapato Lake: Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Washington, Lake, including that portion of the Sammamish River from the 68th Avenue N.E. Bridge downstream: Trout - no more than two over twenty inches. Wild steelhead release December 1 through May 31. May 1 through June 30 season: Trout - catch limit - eight, minimum length twelve inches. Closed to boat fishing one hundred yards either side of the floating bridges. Feeding (chumming) permitted year around. Kokanee/sockeye under twenty inches will be considered kokanee and under the jurisdiction of the department of wildlife while those twenty inches and over will be considered sockeye salmon and under the jurisdiction of the department of fisheries.

Whatcom Creek, mouth to stone bridge at Whatcom Falls Park: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

From stone bridge at Whatcom Falls Park upstream to Lake Whatcom: April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - no minimum length. Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Whatcom, Lake: April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - no more than one over fourteen inches. Feeding (chumming) permitted. (All tributaries are closed to fishing, and, in addition, that portion of Lake Whatcom between the Electric Avenue Bridge and the outlet dam.)

White (Stuck) River, from mouth to Highway 410 Bridge at Buckley: Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Note: Puget Power canal, including the screen bypass channel, is closed to fishing above the screen at Dingle Basin.

From mouth to R Street SE Bridge in Auburn: Additional November 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Wild steelhead release.

From the Weyerhaeuser 6000 Road Bridge (Bridge Camp) to its source: Additional November 1 through January 31 season for whitefish only.

Whitechuck River: Dolly Varden/Bull Trout: Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of trout daily catch limit, minimum length twenty inches.

Wilderness Lake (King County): April 30 through October 31 season.

Willow Lake (Whatcom County): July 1 through October 31 season. Trout - catch and possession limit - one, minimum length eighteen inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Wiser Lake: Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over fifteen inches may be kept.

Region V.

Description: That area of the state contained within the boundaries of Clark, Cowlitz, Klickitat, Lewis, Skamania, and Wahkiakum counties.

Berry Creek (tributary to Nisqually River): Selective fishery regulations.

Big White Salmon River, from mouth to within four hundred feet of Northwestern Dam: Year around season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Wild steelhead release.

From gas pipeline crossing above Northwestern Lake to Gilmer Creek: Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Bird Creek: Trout - catch limit - five.

Blockhouse Creek: Trout - catch limit - five.

Bloodgood Creek: Trout - catch limit - five.

Blue Creek, from mouth to Spencer Road: Closed waters.

Blue Lake (Cowlitz County): April 30 through October 31 season. Catch-and-release only. Selective fishery regulations.

Boman Creek: Trout - catch limit - five.

Butter Creek: Trout, minimum length ten inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Canyon Creek: Trout - catch limit - five.

Carlisle Lake: April 30 through February 28 season. Internal combustion engines prohibited. Bass - minimum length fourteen inches.

Castle Lake: Trout - catch limit - one, minimum length sixteen inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Cedar Creek (tributary of N.F. Lewis) from mouth to junction of Chelatchie Creek: June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches.

Chehalis River: See Region VI, page . . .

Chehalis River, South Fork from mouth to highway bridge at Boistfort: June 1 through March 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

Cispus River, North Fork: Trout, no more than one over twelve inches.

Clear Creek (tributary to Muddy River, Skamania County): Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Clearwater Creek (tributary to Muddy River, Skamania County): Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Coal Creek (Cowlitz County), from mouth to four hundred feet below falls: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

Coldwater Lake: All inlet streams and outlet streams closed waters. Trout - catch limit - one, minimum length sixteen inches. Selective fishery regulations. Note: Limited access available, contact National Volcanic Monument Headquarters for specific information.

Columbia River and impoundments and all connecting sloughs - see regulations page . . .

Connelly Creek and tributaries, from four hundred feet below the city of Morton Dam to its source: Closed waters.

Cougar Creek (tributary to Yale Reservoir): June 1 through August 31 season.

Coweeman River, from mouth to Mulholland Creek: June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Wild steelhead release and wild cutthroat release.

Cowlitz River, from mouth to Mayfield Dam: Year around season. Trout - catch limit - five, minimum length twelve inches, no more than two over twenty inches. Wild cutthroat release. Wild steelhead release June 1 through May 31. Closed to fishing for all game fish except steelhead April 1 through May 31. Lawful to fish up to four hundred feet or the posted deadline at barrier dam. From Mill Creek to the barrier dam, it is unlawful to fish from any floating device or fish with nonbuoyant artificial lures having more than one single-pointed hook. Night closure April 1 through September 30.

From Mayfield Dam to mouth of Muddy Fork: Year around season.

Cowlitz River, Clear Fork and Muddy Fork: Trout - catch limit - five, no more than one over twelve inches.

Davis Lake: April 30 through February 28 season.

Deep River: Year around season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

Drano Lake: See Columbia River regulations, page . . .

Elochoman River, from mouth to West Fork: June 1 through March 15 season. Trout - catch limit - five, minimum length twelve inches, no more than two over twenty inches. Wild steelhead release and wild cutthroat release.

From Beaver Creek Road Bridge to two hundred feet below weir at Beaver Creek hatchery: Closed waters.

From West Fork to source: Closed waters.

Fort Borst Park Lake: April 30 through February 28 season. Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Franz Lake: Closed waters.

Germany Creek, from mouth to end of Germany Creek Road (approximately five miles): June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Wild steelhead release and wild cutthroat release.

Gobar Creek (tributary to Kalama River): June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Wild steelhead release and wild cutthroat release.

Grays River, from mouth to mouth of South Fork: June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length twenty inches. Wild steelhead release. Open only to fishing for steelhead.

Grays River, East Fork: Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Green River, from mouth to 2800 Bridge: June 1 through November 30 season. Trout, minimum length twenty inches. Open only to fishing for steelhead.

Note: All tributaries closed.

From 2800 Bridge to source, including all tributaries: Closed waters.

Grizzly Lake: Closed waters.

Hamilton Creek: June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Wild steelhead release and wild cutthroat release.

Hemlock Lake (Trout Creek Reservoir): June 1 through October 31 season.

Horseshoe Lake: April 30 through February 28 season.

Horsethief Lake: April 30 through February 28 season.

Icehouse Lake: April 30 through February 28 season.

Indian Heaven Wilderness Lakes: Trout - catch limit - three.

Jewitt Creek: Trout - catch limit - five, no minimum length. Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Johnson Creek (tributary to Cowlitz River): Trout, minimum length ten inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Kalama River, for all sections from mouth to Kalama Falls that are open to fishing the following regulations apply: (1) Trout, minimum length twelve inches; and (2) wild cutthroat release; and (3) wild steelhead release.

From mouth upstream to one thousand feet below fishway at upper salmon hatchery: (1) Year around season; (2) night closure, April 1 through October 31; (3) fly fishing only, from September 1 through October 31 from the pipeline crossing to the posted deadline at the intake to the lower salmon hatchery; (4) from two hundred feet above to one thousand five hundred feet below the temporary rack is closed during the period the fish rack is installed; and (5) motors prohibited upstream of Modrow Bridge.

Klickitat River, from mouth to Fisher Hill Bridge: June 1 through November 30 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches.

From Fisher Hill Bridge to four hundred feet above #5 fishway: Closed waters.

From four hundred feet above #5 fishway to the Yakima Indian Reservation boundary: June 1 through November 30 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Additional December 1 through March 31 season for whitefish only.

From the Yakima Indian Reservation boundary upstream to source, including all tributaries: Closed waters.

Klineline Ponds: April 30 through February 28 season.

Kress Lake: April 30 through February 28 season. Bass - only bass less than twelve inches or over eighteen inches may be kept. Internal combustion engines prohibited.

Lacamas Creek (Clark County): Lawful to fish upstream to the base of Lacamas Lake Dam.

Lacamas Creek, tributary of Cowlitz River (Lewis County): June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

Lewis River, from mouth to forks: Year around season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Wild steelhead release and wild cutthroat release.

Lewis River, North Fork, from mouth to overhead powerlines below Merwin Dam: Year around season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Wild steelhead release and wild cutthroat release. Closed waters: Shoreward of the cable buoy and corkline at the mouth of the Lewis River Salmon Hatchery fish ladder.

From lower Cedar Creek concrete boat ramp to Colvin Creek: Night closure April 1 through October 31.

From mouth of Colvin Creek to overhead powerlines at Merwin Dam: Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Closed October 1 through December 15 to fishing.

From overhead powerlines to Merwin Dam: Closed waters.

From Yale Dam downstream one thousand three hundred feet to the cable crossing: Closed waters.

Lewis River Power Canal and old Lewis River streambed between Swift No. 1 powerhouse and Swift No. 2 powerhouse: April 30 through October 31 season. Fishing from any floating device prohibited.

From Eagle Cliff Bridge to lower falls: Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Lewis River, East Fork (south), the following are closed waters: (1) From the posted markers below to one hundred feet above Lucia Falls; (2) from four hundred feet below to four hundred feet above Molton Falls; and (3) from four hundred feet below Horseshoe Falls to one hundred feet above Sunset Falls.

From mouth to four hundred feet below Horseshoe Falls: June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Wild steelhead release. Night closure June 1 through October 31.

From one hundred feet above Sunset Falls to source: June 1 through December 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Wild steelhead release.

Mouth to posted markers at top boat ramp at Lewisville Park: Additional April 15 through May 31 season. Wild steelhead release. Open only for steelhead.

Little Ash Lake: April 30 through February 28 season.

Little Klickitat River, within Goldendale city limits: April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - catch limit - five, no minimum length. Juveniles only (under fifteen years old).

Little Nisqually River: Trout, minimum length ten inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Little White Salmon River, from fishway downstream to markers at federal fish hatchery a distance of one thousand five hundred feet: Closed waters.

Love Lake: Closed waters.

Mayfield Lake (Reservoir): Tiger musky - catch limit - one, minimum length thirty-six inches.

Merrill Lake: Trout - catch limit - two, maximum length twelve inches. Fly fishing only, except motors allowed.

Merwin (Lake) Reservoir: Trout - minimum length six inches.

Mill Creek (Cowlitz County), from mouth to forks (approximately one mile): June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Wild steelhead release and wild cutthroat release.

Mineral Creek (tributary to Nisqually River): Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Mineral Creek, North Fork: Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Mineral Lake: April 30 through September 30 season.

Muddy River (tributary to N.F. Lewis River): Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Newaukum River, main river, Middle Fork and South Fork: June 1 through March 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Wild steelhead release.

Newaukum River, North Fork, from mouth to four hundred feet below Chehalis city water intake: June 1 through March 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Wild steelhead release.

From Chehalis city water intake upstream: Closed waters.

Northwestern Reservoir: April 30 through February 28 season.

Ohanapecosh Creek (tributary to Cowlitz River): Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Olequa Creek: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

Outlet Creek: Trout - catch limit - five.

Packwood Lake: All inlet streams and outlet from log boom to dam: Closed waters. April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - catch limit - five, minimum length ten inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Panther Creek (tributary to Wind River): Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Pine Creek (tributary to N.F. Lewis River): Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Plummer Lake: April 30 through February 28 season.

Riffe (Lake) Reservoir: Lawful to fish up to the base of Swofford Pond Dam.

Rock Creek (Skamania County): June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Wild steelhead release and wild cutthroat release.

Rowland Lakes: April 30 through February 28 season.

Salmon Creek (Clark County), from mouth to 72nd Avenue N.E.: June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Wild steelhead release and wild cutthroat release.

Silver Creek (tributary to Cowlitz River), mouth to USFS Road 4778: Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Silver Lake: Bass - minimum length fourteen inches. Use of water dogs or salamanders for fishing prohibited.

Skamokawa Creek, mouth to forks just below Oatfield and Middle Valley Road: June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length twenty inches. Wild steelhead release. Open only to fishing for steelhead.

Skate Creek (tributary to Cowlitz River): Trout - catch limit - five, no more than one over twelve inches.

Skookumchuck River: See Region VI.

Spearfish Lake: April 30 through February 28 season.

Spring Creek: Trout - catch limit - five.

Swift Reservoir: April 30 through October 31 season.

Swofford Pond: Bass - possession limit - two. Only bass less than twelve inches or over eighteen inches may be kept. Channel catfish - minimum length twenty inches. Internal combustion engines prohibited.

Tilton River, from mouth to West Fork: June 1 through March 31 season. Trout - catch limit - five, no more than one over twelve inches.

Tilton River, South Fork and East Fork: Trout, minimum length ten inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Tilton River, North Fork and West Fork: Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Toutle River, mouth to forks, and North Fork from the mouth to the posted deadline below the fish collection facility: June 1 through November 30 season. Trout, minimum length twenty inches. Open only to fishing for steelhead.

From the mouth of the Green River to the posted deadline below the fish collection facility: Night closure and it is unlawful to fish with nonbuoyant artificial lures having more than one single-pointed hook.

From the posted deadline below the fish collection facility upstream to the headwaters, including all tributaries: Closed waters. (Note: Castle Lake, and Coldwater Lake open waters.)

Toutle River, South Fork, mouth to source (note: All tributaries closed): June 1 through November 30 season. Trout, minimum length twenty inches. Open only to fishing for steelhead.

Mouth to 4100 Road Bridge: Additional December 1 through March 31 season. Wild steelhead release. Open only to fishing for steelhead. Selective fishery regulations.

Trout Creek (tributary to Wind River): Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Trout Lake, tributary to Big White Salmon River: June 1 through October 31 season.

Tunnel Lake: April 30 through February 28 season.

Vancouver Lake and all other waters west of Burlington-Northern Railroad from Columbia River draw-bridge near Vancouver downstream to Lewis River: Trout - catch limit - two, minimum length twelve inches.

Walupt Lake: All inlet streams closed. April 30 through October 31 season. Trout, minimum length ten inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Washougal River, from mouth to bridge at Salmon Falls: June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum

length twelve inches. Wild steelhead release and wild cutthroat release. Night closure June 1 through October 31.

Mouth to Mt. Norway Bridge: Additional April 15 through May 31 season. Wild steelhead release. Open only for steelhead.

From bridge at Salmon Falls to its source: Closed waters.

Washougal River, West (North Fork), from mouth to the water intake at the department of wildlife hatchery: Closed waters.

From intake at department of wildlife hatchery to source: June 1 through March 15 season. Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Wild steelhead release and wild cutthroat release.

Willame Lake: April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - catch limit - two, minimum length fifteen inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Wind River, Burlington-Northern Railroad bridge to four hundred feet below Shipherd Falls (note: Waters south of the Burlington-Northern Railroad bridge are considered part of the Columbia River): June 1 through March 31 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Wild steelhead release.

From four hundred feet below to one hundred feet above Shipherd Falls fish ladder: Closed waters.

Tyee Springs: Closed waters.

From one hundred feet above Shipherd Falls fish ladder to source, including all tributaries: June 1 through November 30 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

Winston Creek (tributary to Cowlitz River): Trout, minimum length ten inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Yale Reservoir: Kokanee - catch limit - sixteen.

Yellowjacket Creek (tributary to Cispus River): Trout, minimum length twelve inches. Selective fishery regulations.

Yellowjacket Ponds: April 30 through February 28 season. Trout, no more than one over twelve inches.

Region VI.

Description: That area of the state contained within the boundaries of Clallam, Grays Harbor, Jefferson, Kitsap, Mason, Pacific, and Thurston counties and that portion of Pierce County on the Kitsap Peninsula and Fox Island.

Anderson Lake (Jefferson County): Internal combustion engines prohibited. April 30 through October 31 season.

From September 1 through October 31. Catch-and-release only. Selective fishery regulations.

Bay Lake: April 30 through October 31 season.

Bear River: June 1 through February 28 season. Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

Beaver Creek (Thurston County): See Black River.

Beaver Ponds in Kitsap County, and those ponds in Mason County on Tahuya Peninsula west of Belfair-Bremerton Highway (S.R. 3): April 30 through October 31 season. Trout - no minimum length.

Benson Lake: April 30 through October 31 season.

Marine waters regulations.

These regulations apply to all marine waters contained within the boundaries of Washington state, within Puget Sound, Hood Canal, the Strait of Juan de Fuca, the San Juan Islands, the Strait of Georgia, and the Pacific Ocean, including estuaries (river mouths) from salt water upstream to a line between the outermost headlands measured at the highest high tide (usually the debris line furthest inshore on surrounding beaches), unless otherwise described under area regulations (see individual areas, below).

Note: The above described waters lying within the boundaries of Clallam, Jefferson, Grays Harbor, Kitsap, Mason, Pacific, and Thurston counties and that portion of Pierce County on the Kitsap Peninsula and Fox Island are administered from the Region VI office in Montesano, telephone (206) 249-6522. The above described waters lying within the boundaries of Island, King, Pierce, San Juan, Skagit, Snohomish, and Whatcom counties are administered from the Region IV office in Mill Creek, telephone (206) 775-1311.

Fishing hours: Twenty-four hours per day year around.

License requirements: A valid current Washington state department of wildlife fishing license is required to fish for game fish in marine waters.

Note: The Washington state department of fisheries (WDF) requires persons taking Pacific salmon, food fish, shrimp, and razor clams to possess separate licenses for these species. See WDF regulations pamphlet.

Permit requirements: A valid current steelhead fishing permit is required of persons fishing for steelhead in marine waters. All steelhead taken from the above described marine areas shall be entered on the steelhead permit using the words Marine Area and followed by the appropriate marine area code number, see page . . .

Underwater spearfishing: Game fish may be taken by means of legal angling gear only. Spearing, gaffing, clubbing, netting, or trapping game fish is unlawful.

You must have a valid hunting license to apply for any special hunting season permit.

Application cards: Application must be made on special application cards which may be secured without charge at any license dealer or department of wildlife office. A check or money order made payable to "Department of Wildlife"

must accompany all applications. Mail application and check to Olympia address shown below. Applicants for goat, sheep, and moose who are not selected will receive a refund of the application fee less five dollars. If hunters apply on a partnership application, the fee for both hunters must be submitted with the application card. If a partnership application is drawn, both hunters will receive a permit and both hunters can take an animal. If the check does not clear or if no check or money order is received, the application will be eliminated from the drawing. Applications for cougar and lynx require a two dollar application fee. The same person may apply for sheep, goat, moose, cougar and lynx permits provided they are eligible as specified below.

Application deadline: Applications must be postmarked no later than July 5, 1990, or received not later than 5:00 p.m., July 5, 1990, at the Washington Department of Wildlife, 600 Capitol Way N, Olympia, WA 98501-1091, or any Department of Wildlife Regional Office.

Computer drawing: Drawings for goat, bighorn sheep, moose, cougar and lynx will be done by computer selection. All applicants will be notified by August 10, 1990.

Sheep hunter orientation: Each hunter who draws a bighorn sheep permit must attend an orientation session before receiving a permit. Permit holders will be notified of Hunter Orientation locations and dates.

Disqualification: Anyone who submits more than one application for each species will be disqualified for drawings for that species.

Incomplete applications: To be eligible for the permit drawing, applications must contain unit number and name, date of birth, hunting license number, complete name and address including zip code.

Permit hunting report: A hunting report will be sent to each permittee. This report must be returned to the department of wildlife within ten days after the close of the hunting season.

Cougar skull, pelt, and tooth requirement: Successful cougar permittees must present the unfrozen pelt and skull of cougar to a state wildlife agent for tagging and tooth extraction within five days of kill.

MOOSE

Open season: Oct. 1 to Nov. 30, 1990 both dates inclusive.

Who may apply: Anyone with a 1990 Washington hunting license. Only one moose permit will be issued during an individual's lifetime.

Bag limit: One moose of either sex.

PURSUIT-ONLY SEASON

SPECIAL COUGAR PERMIT SEASONS

(Cougar may be killed by permit holders only.)

Bag limit: One cougar during the 1990-91 hunting season provided that it is unlawful to kill or possess spotted cougar kittens or adult cougar accompanied by spotted kittens.

Who may apply: Anyone with a valid 1990 Washington hunting license may submit one (only) special permit application for cougar during the 1990-91 season. Successful cougar applicants must purchase a cougar tag by October 1, 1990. Special permits assigned to those hunters failing to purchase a cougar tag by the deadline will be redrawn and cougar tags issued to other applicants. Cougar permit hunters failing to return their cougar hunting questionnaire by January 31, 1991 will be ineligible to apply for a permit the following year.

CANADA LYNX

PERMIT REQUIRED TO HUNT AND/OR TRAP LYNX

Bag limit: One lynx during the 1990-91 permit only harvest season as shown below, *Provided* that it is unlawful to kill or possess lynx kittens or adult lynx accompanied by kittens. Successful lynx permittees must turn in the carcass of their lynx to a state wildlife agent when the pelt is sealed.

Who may apply: Anyone with a valid 1990 Washington hunting license may submit one (only) special permit application for lynx during the 1990-91 season.

Note: Lynx permits for both hunting and trapping will be drawn at the same time. Persons drawn with hunting license may only hunt lynx. Persons drawn with trapping license may only trap lynx. Lynx permittees failing to return their questionnaire by January 31, 1991 will be ineligible to apply for a permit the following year.

SPECIAL LYNX PERMIT SEASON

Permit season: November 21 to January 15, 1991
(Lynx may be killed by permit holders only.)

WAC 232-32-010 Purpose. The purpose of this chapter shall be to ensure compliance by the department of game with the provisions of chapter 72, Laws of 1984 (Title 75 RCW).

WAC 232-32-020 Definitions. (1) "Volunteer group" means any person or group of persons interested in or party to an agreement with the department of game relating to a cooperative wildlife project.

(2) "Cooperative wildlife project" means a project conducted by a volunteer group that will benefit the game

fish, game bird, game animal, or nongame wildlife resources of the state and for which the benefits of the project, including wildlife reared and released, are available to all citizens of the state.

WAC 232-32-030 Information required from volunteer groups. The following information should be furnished by volunteer groups when applying for a cooperative wildlife project.

(1) Date of application.

(2) Name of volunteer group or person proposing cooperative project. If a group, give the name, address, and telephone number of one person in that group who will serve as contact person and project leader.

(3) General description of proposed project, including title, project objectives (how the proposed project will benefit the wildlife resource), methods for achieving objectives, and criteria for measuring achievement of objectives.

(4) Location and physical size of project, as specific as possible, including county, legal description, street address (if applicable), property ownership, township, range, section, and acreage.

(5) Estimated beginning and ending date of project.

(6) Estimated cost of project in terms of money and man-days for required materials and labor. Include estimate of supervision or assistance that will be required of department of game personnel.

(7) If the project is to plant or rear fish or wildlife, the following additional information should be developed, unless exempted by the department: (a) Species to be produced; (b) proposed source of eggs, broodstock, or juveniles; including how these would be obtained, used, and transferred to and from the project; (c) type of incubation or rearing facilities available; (d) qualitative and quantitative information about water to be used for the project, including volume (high and low flows), temperature, acidity, alkalinity, dissolved oxygen, dissolved solids (for fish projects); (e) number and size(s) of fish, wildlife, or eggs proposed to be incubated, reared, or released, as well as the timing of all phases of these activities; (f) proposed release sites; (g) statement about the volunteer groups' knowledge of culture and pathology of the species proposed to be produced; and (h) availability of professional or technical expertise; i.e., local veterinarian, hatchery nearby, etc.

(8) A list of permits or agreements (other than those needed to raise or release game birds and game fish) needed to accomplish the proposed project, if known; included here would be cooperative landowner agreements, water rights, hydraulic project approval (HPA), building permit, shorelines permit, zoning variance, etc.

WAC 232-32-040 Review and selection process. The following steps are included in the process of reviewing and selecting cooperative wildlife projects:

(1) Applications will be made available to anyone interested in conducting a cooperative project. Application

forms will be available at any time at the Olympia headquarters and all regional offices of the department of wildlife.

(2) Applications for projects may be submitted at any time.

(3) The department will send each applicant, within 45 days of receipt of each application, a written acknowledgment of the receipt of the application and give the applicant a date when notification of acceptance or rejection of the proposal can be expected. The written acknowledgement will also provide the department's selection criteria and a general description of the review and selection process. Final decisions and notification of acceptance or rejection of proposals where funding is requested will be made only after the biennial budget is passed by the legislature and signed by the governor.

(4) The department will determine when a proposed project might affect the management programs of federal, other state, and local agencies and of treaty Indian tribes and will make contact with these entities, when the department determines it is appropriate to do so, during the review and selection process. If the department determines that ongoing coordination between a volunteer group and another agency or tribe would be appropriate, it may be required as a condition of the permit, when issued.

(5) Each approved agreement will include the following, when determined by the department to be necessary or appropriate: (a) Permit for release of fish or wildlife; (b) procedures for applying for a hydraulic project approval (HPA), and (c) description of methods that will be used to provide the volunteer group with fish, bird, or animal food or other available supplies.

WAC 232-32-050 Criteria used in selecting cooperative wildlife projects. The following criteria will be considered by the department in ranking project proposals for funding. These criteria are not rigid but are intended to guide the department in selecting projects that are feasible, cost effective, and complementary with other department programs.

(1) Game commission policy: The game commission policies, adopted in 1980, as amended, will be used, along with other criteria, to rank project proposals. Policies include the following: (a) The first management priority will be to establish and perpetuate the highest quality wildlife habitat, with the second priority being to provide recreation opportunity in the form of hunting, fishing, and wildlife enjoyment; and (b) within habitat capabilities, wildlife will be managed according to the following priorities: Natural reproduction rather than stocking; native species of wildlife; and species which provide the most recreational opportunities for hunting, fishing, and wildlife viewing.

(2) Program goals, objectives, and priorities: Project proposals will be ranked according to their adherence to program goals, objectives, and priorities, as outlined in department species plans and regional operational plans. When production or rearing projects are considered, potential

conflicts or competition with other species of fish and wildlife, including food fish and shellfish, will be considered.

(3) Costs versus benefits: Project proposals will be evaluated and ranked according to expected ratio of costs to public benefits. Costs will include both money and man-days; benefits may include direct benefits to wildlife or habitat and benefits to the public in terms of recreational opportunities or increased knowledge about wildlife.

(4) Educational value. Consideration will be given to a project's value in educating and informing the public about the life history and needs of wildlife.

(5) Capabilities of volunteer groups. When considering the renewal or refunding of projects, the relative success of that project and the overall capability of a particular volunteer group in managing cooperative projects and producing results will be considered; this will include the amount of department supervision or assistance required to accomplish the project.

WAC 232-32-060 Procedures for revocation of a cooperative wildlife project. The following criteria and procedures will be followed when the department considers revocation or actually revokes a cooperative wildlife project:

(1) The department may revoke a cooperative project agreement for the following reasons: (a) A violation of agreement provisions; (b) unavailability of adequate biological or financial resources to continue participation by the department; and (c) the development of unacceptable biological or resource management conflicts.

(2) When the department decides that a cooperative project is in danger of being revoked, a certified letter will be sent to the contact person, with the volunteer group responsible for the project advising him or her of the problem and either setting conditions for continuation of the project, or attempting to arrange a meeting to discuss ways of bringing the cooperative agreement into compliance or resolving other problems that might result in revocation.

(3) When the department decides that a cooperative project should be terminated, a certified letter to that effect will be sent to the contact person within the volunteer group responsible for the project. The exact termination date will be determined by the severity of the problem which requires revocation.

WAC 232-32-070 Priority for eggs, seed, juveniles, broodstock, and department facilities. The following priorities will be followed in allocating eggs, seed, juveniles, broodstock, or using rearing space at department hatcheries and other facilities:

- (1) Needs of the department of game
- (2) Needs of other public agencies in Washington
- (3) Cooperative wildlife projects
- (4) Exchange agreements with agencies outside Washington
- (5) Sales.
