# STYLE AND FORMAT OF THE WASHINGTON STATE REGISTER

## 1. ARRANGEMENT OF THE REGISTER

The Register is arranged in the following nine sections:

- (a) **PREPROPOSAL**-includes the Preproposal Statement of Intent that will be used to solicit public comments on a general area of proposed rule making before the agency files a formal notice.
- (b) **EXPEDITED REPEAL**-includes the Preproposal Statement of Inquiry that lists rules being repealed using the expedited repeal process. Expedited repeals are not consistently filed and may not appear in every issue of the register.
- (c) **PROPOSED**-includes the full text of formal proposals, continuances, supplemental notices, and withdrawals.
- (d) **EXPEDITED ADOPTION**-includes the full text of rules being changed using the expedited adoption process. Expedited adoptions are not consistently filed and may not appear in every issue of the Register.
- (e) **PERMANENT**-includes the full text of permanently adopted rules.
- (f) **EMERGENCY**-includes the full text of emergency rules and rescissions.
- (g) **MISCELLANEOUS**-includes notice of public meetings of state agencies, rules coordinator notifications, summaries of attorney general opinions, executive orders and emergency declarations of the governor, rules of the state Supreme Court, and other miscellaneous documents filed with the code reviser's office under RCW 34.08.020 and 42.30.075.
- (h) **TABLE**-includes a cumulative table of the WAC sections that are affected in the current year.
- (i) **INDEX**-includes a cumulative index of Register Issues 01 through 24.

Documents are arranged within each section of the Register according to the order in which they are filed in the code reviser's office during the pertinent filing period. Each filing is listed under the agency name and then describes the subject matter, type of filing and the WSR number. The three part number in the heading distinctively identifies each document, and the last part of the number indicates the filing sequence with a section's material.

## 2. PRINTING STYLE—INDICATION OF NEW OR DELETED MATERIAL

RCW 34.05.395 requires the use of certain marks to indicate amendments to existing agency rules. This style quickly and graphically portrays the current changes to existing rules as follows:

- (a) In amendatory sections—
  - (i) underlined material is new material;
  - (ii) deleted material is (~~lined out between double parentheses~~);
- (b) Complete new sections are prefaced by the heading NEW SECTION;
- (c) The repeal of an entire section is shown by listing its WAC section number and caption under the heading REPEALER.

## 3. MISCELLANEOUS MATERIAL NOT FILED UNDER THE ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURE ACT

Material contained in the Register other than rule-making actions taken under the APA (chapter 34.05 RCW) does not necessarily conform to the style and format conventions described above. The headings of these other types of material have been edited for uniformity of style; otherwise the items are shown as nearly as possible in the form submitted to the code reviser's office.

## 4. EFFECTIVE DATE OF RULES

- (a) Permanently adopted agency rules normally take effect thirty-one days after the rules and the agency order adopting them are filed with the code reviser's office. This effective date may be delayed or advanced and such an effective date will be noted in the promulgation statement preceding the text of the rule.
- (b) Emergency rules take effect upon filing with the code reviser's office unless a later date is provided by the agency. They remain effective for a maximum of one hundred twenty days from the date of filing.
- (c) Rules of the state Supreme Court generally contain an effective date clause in the order adopting the rules.

## 5. EDITORIAL CORRECTIONS

Material inserted by the code reviser's office for purposes of clarification or correction or to show the source or history of a document is enclosed in [brackets].

<sup>2</sup> A filing of any length will be accepted on the closing dates of this column if it has been prepared and completed by the order typing service (OTS) of the code reviser's office; see WAC 1-21-040. Agency-typed material is subject to a ten page limit for these dates; longer agency-typed material is subject to the earlier non-OTS dates.

<sup>3</sup> At least twenty days before the rule-making hearing, the agency shall cause notice of the hearing to be published in the Register; see RCW 34.05.320(1). These dates represent the twentieth day after the distribution date of the applicable Register.

<sup>4</sup> A minimum of forty-five days is required between the distribution date of the Register giving notice of the expedited adoption and the agency adoption date. No hearing is required, but the public may file written objections. See RCW 34.05.230 and 1.12.040.



## **REGULATORY FAIRNESS ACT**

The Regulatory Fairness Act, chapter 19.85 RCW, was enacted in 1982 to minimize the impact of state regulations on small business. Amended in 1994, the act requires a small business economic impact analysis of proposed rules that impose more than a minor cost on twenty percent of the businesses in all industries, or ten percent of the businesses in any one industry. The Regulatory Fairness Act defines industry as businesses within a four digit SIC classification, and for the purpose of this act, small business is defined by RCW 19.85.020 as "any business entity, including a sole proprietorship, corporation, partnership, or other legal entity, that is owned and operated independently from all other businesses, that has the purpose of making a profit, and that has fifty or fewer employees."

### **Small Business Economic Impact Statements (SBEIS)**

A small business economic impact statement (SBEIS) must be prepared by state agencies when a proposed rule meets the above criteria. Chapter 19.85 RCW requires the Washington State Business Assistance Center (BAC) to develop guidelines for agencies to use in determining whether the impact of a rule is more than minor and to provide technical assistance to agencies in developing a SBEIS. All permanent rules adopted under the Administrative Procedure Act, chapter 34.05 RCW, must be reviewed to determine if the requirements of the Regulatory Fairness Act apply; if an SBEIS is required it must be completed before permanent rules are filed with the Office of the Code Reviser.

### **Mitigation**

In addition to completing the economic impact analysis for proposed rules, state agencies must take reasonable, legal, and feasible steps to reduce or mitigate the impact of rules on small businesses when there is a disproportionate impact on small versus large business. State agencies are encouraged to reduce the economic impact of rules on small businesses when possible and when such steps are in keeping with the stated intent of the statute(s) being implemented by proposed rules. Since 1994, small business economic impact statements must contain a list of the mitigation steps taken, or reasonable justification for not taking steps to reduce the impact of rules on small businesses.

### **When is an SBEIS Required?**

When:

The proposed rule has more than a minor (as defined by the BAC) economic impact on businesses in more than twenty percent of all industries or more than ten percent of any one industry.

### **When is an SBEIS Not Required?**

When:

The rule is proposed only to comply or conform with a federal law or regulation, and the state has no discretion in how the rule is implemented;

There is less than minor economic impact on business;

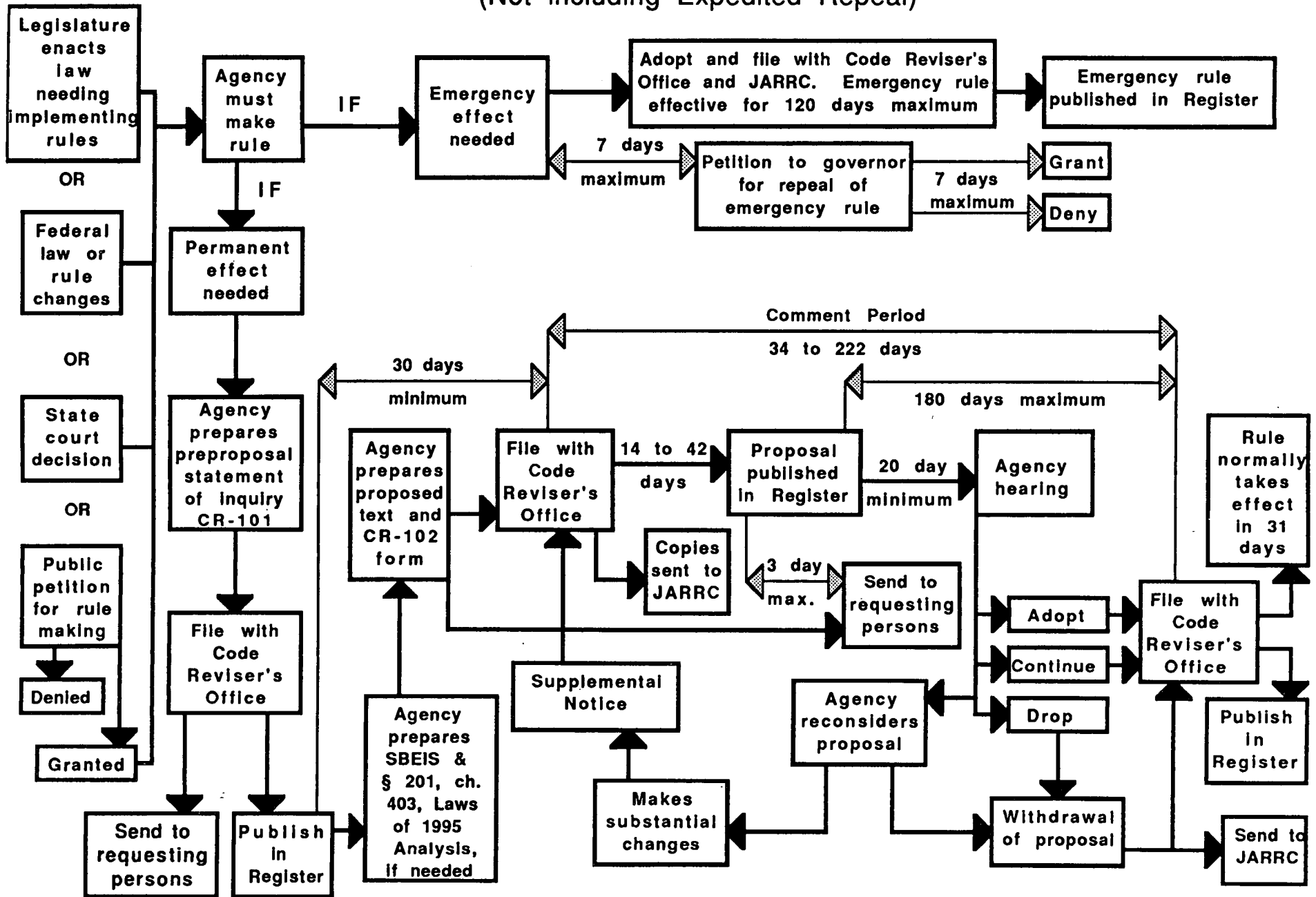
The rule **REDUCES** costs to business (although an SBEIS may be a useful tool for demonstrating this reduced impact);

The rule is adopted as an emergency rule, although an SBEIS may be required when an emergency rule is proposed for adoption as a permanent rule; or

The rule is pure restatement of state statute.

Subject of Possible Rule Making: Title 365 WAC, criteria and guidance to assist local governments planning under RCW 36.70A.040 to analyze the consistency of project actions with the applicable development regulations, or in the absence of development regulations, the adopted comprehensive plan.

Statutes Authorizing the Agency to Adopt Rules on this Subject: RCW 36.70B.040.

Reasons Why Rules on this Subject may be Needed and What They Might Accomplish: RCW 36.70B.040 authorizes the Department of Community, Trade and Economic Development (CTED) to adopt by rule criteria to analyze project consistency. Local governments planning under the Growth Management Act need guidance on how to analyze project consistency when consistency with applicable regulations or comprehensive plan policies is not clear.

Other Federal and State Agencies that Regulate this Subject and the Process Coordinating the Rule with These Agencies: None.

Process for Developing New Rule: The rule was developed by a drafting committee and circulated for comment among the members of the 1724 Advisory Committee to amend the SEPA rules, interest groups, counties, and cities.

Over a period of two years, the Department of Ecology and CTED met with the 1724 Advisory Committee consisting of county and city planners, environmental and citizen groups, the business community, and other state agencies. The advisory committee was convened to develop amendments to chapter 197-11 WAC to integrate SEPA and the Growth Management Act, including criteria for project consistency. The draft amendments were circulated for state-wide public comment and hearings. Subsequently, in 1997, rule-making authority to develop the consistency criteria was transferred to CTED.

The results of ecology's process are being relied upon as part of this CTED rule-making process. The former SEPA rule advisory committee and a smaller drafting committee will continue to be used to develop this rule.

Subject of Possible Rule Making: Establishing direct supervision, stamping and continuing education for on-site sewage treatment system designers required under chapter 18.210 RCW.

Statutes Authorizing the Agency to Adopt Rules on this Subject: RCW 18.210.050 and 18.210.060.

Reasons Why Rules on this Subject may be Needed and What They Might Accomplish: 2SSB 5821, codified as chapter 18.210 RCW requires the department to develop and administer a licensing program for designers of on-site wastewater treatment systems. 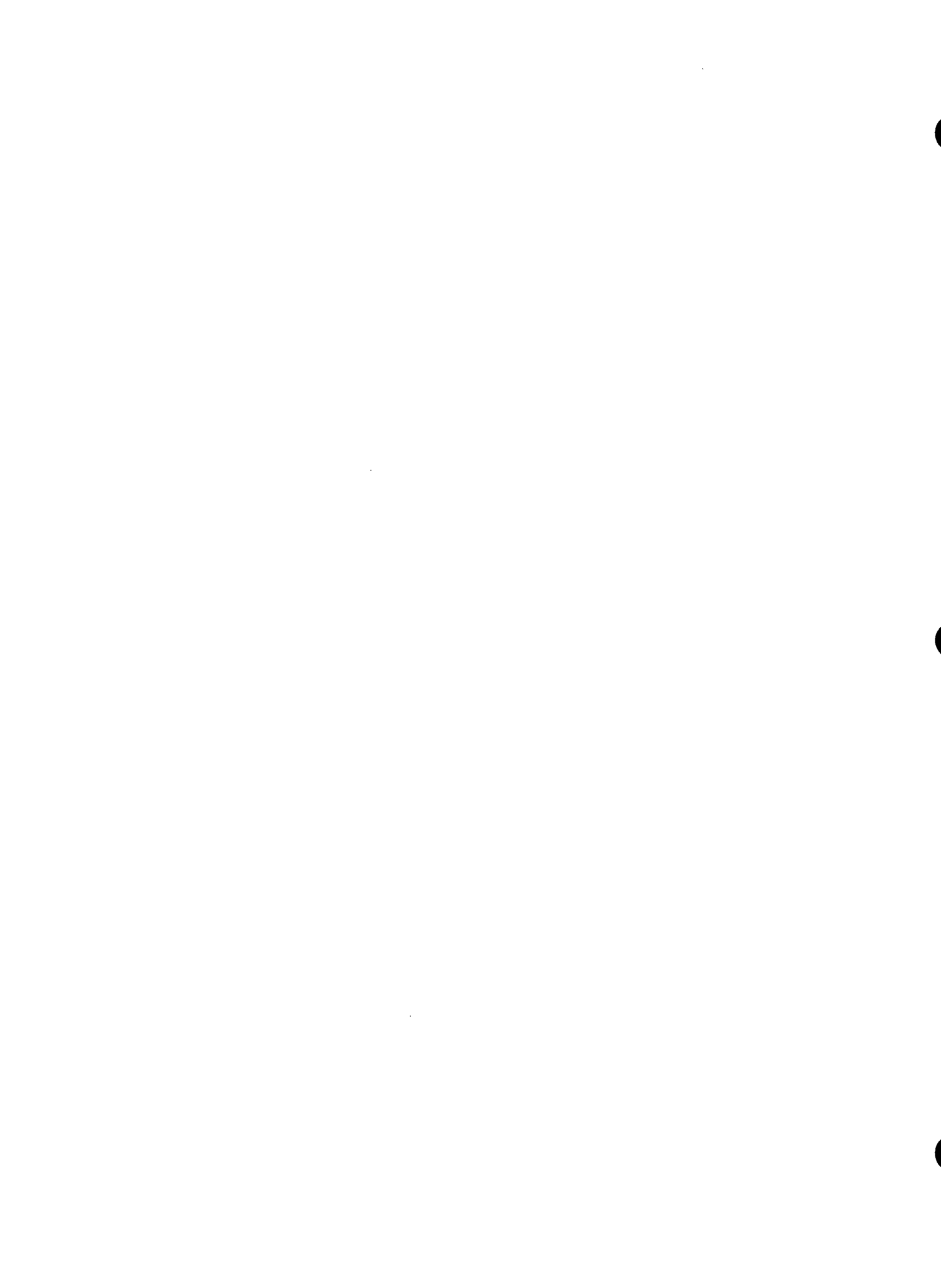

(a) The circumstances that created the need; and

(b) Your health, safety and ability to continue to live independently.

(4) When we determine ongoing additional requirement benefits are needed, we:

(a) Increase your cash assistance benefit to provide the additional benefits by monthly payment;

(b) Periodically review whether you continue to need the additional benefits. We conduct this review at least:

(i) Twice a year for TANF and refugee cash assistance recipients;

(ii) Yearly for general assistance or SSI recipients when we decide the need is not likely to change; or

(iii) More frequently if we expect your circumstances to change.

Explanation of Rule, its Purpose, and Anticipated Effects: The Teachers' Retirement System Plan 3 went into effect July 1, 1996. The school employees' retirement system went into effect on September 1, 2000. These rules give guidance to members regarding the new retirement plans' administration.

Proposal Changes the Following Existing Rules: Sections of chapters 415-108, 415-112, 415-113 and 415-115 WAC have been amended to accommodate the existence of SERS and TRS Plan 3. Changes to the amended rules are described below.

**WAC 415-108-726 If I accrue service credit in PERS and another retirement plan at the same time, may I participate in PERS?** (1)(a) Yes. You may earn service credit in PERS and any of the following systems at the same time if:

(i) You work for a PERS employer and an employer covered by a retirement system of the city of Seattle, Spokane or Tacoma (First Class City Retirement System); and

(ii) You cannot report service for the First Class City Retirement System in PERS;

(b) The combined service credit under PERS and the retirement system listed in (a) of this subsection may not exceed one month of service for a calendar month of employment.

(c) To qualify for PERS service credit, it is up to the employee to initiate the process by applying under subsection (2) of this section.

**Example:** A member works part time for the City of Seattle and part time for the University of Washington (UW). She may receive partial service credit in PERS for the UW service since she cannot report the time she works for Seattle under PERS.

**Note:** The combined service credit under PERS and the City of Seattle Retirement System may not exceed one month of service for a calendar month of employment. To receive PERS service credit she must apply to the department.

**(2) How do I apply?**

(a) To apply for membership and service credit under subsection (1) of this section you must send the department an application. The application is a statement that you want membership and/or service credit in PERS. Include:

- (i) Your name;
- (ii) Your SSN;
- (iii) All period(s) of service that you want to receive service credit for;
- (iv) All PERS and non-PERS employer(s) that you worked for during the periods of service referenced in (a)(iii) of this subsection.

(b) After the department receives your application, it will contact your employer(s) to verify how much service credit you have earned. When the department receives the necessary information, it will determine how much service credit you will receive. At that time the department will send you a bill for member contributions and interest that must be paid in order to establish the service credit.

**(3) When should I submit my payment?**

You should pay contributions and interest required under subsection (2)(b) of this section within twenty-four consecutive months from the last day of the calendar year for which you claim service credit. After that date, you must pay the actuarial cost of purchasing the service credit under RCW 41.40.104 and 41.50.165.

**(4) What if I worked before this WAC became effective?**

PROPOSED

If you worked for a PERS employer and for one of the retirement systems listed in subsection (1) of this section, before this WAC became effective, you have until December 31, 2000, to apply in order to purchase service credit by paying member contributions plus interest. After December 31, 2000, you must pay the actuarial cost of purchasing the service credit under RCW 41.40.104 and 41.50.165.

(5) You may participate in PERS if you are concurrently employed, as described in WAC 415-113-200, in a SERS position.

**DEFINITIONS**

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-010 Definitions.** All definitions in RCW 41.35.010 apply to terms used in this chapter. Other terms relevant to the administration of chapter 41.35 RCW are defined in this chapter.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-0102 Normally—Definition.** "Normally," as used in the definition of eligible position under RCW 41.35.010, means a position is eligible if it is expected to require at least five months of seventy or more hours of compensated service each month during each of two consecutive years. Once a position is determined to be eligible, it will continue to be eligible if it requires at least five months of seventy or more hours of compensated service during at least one year in any two-year period.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-0103 Project position—Definition.** "Project position" means a position established by an employer that has a specific goal and end date.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-0104 Report—Definition.** "Report" means an employer's reporting of an employee's hours of service, compensation and contributions to the department on the monthly transmittal report.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-0108 Year—Definition.** "Year" means any twelve consecutive month period established and applied consistently by an employer to evaluate the eligibility of a specific position. The term generally will be limited to a school year.

**Example:** An employer has used the twelve consecutive month period from September 1 to August 31 to evaluate the eligibility of positions. When the employer hires a new employee to fill an existing position, the employer must continue to use the September 1 through August 31 period to define a year for the position.

**Example:** If the same employer in the above example hires a person to work in a project position beginning in November, the employer will use the twelve-month period beginning in November to evaluate the eligibility of the new position. The employer must consistently apply this twelve-month period to evaluate the eligibility of this position.

(1) As a member, you have the right to designate a beneficiary or beneficiaries to receive a benefit in the event of your death while you are an active member. You may change your beneficiary designation at any time by filing a change of beneficiary form with the department.

(2) You may name:

(a) An organization or person, including your unborn or later adopted children. Unborn or later adopted children will not be included unless you specifically designate them as beneficiaries on the form. You must state the date of birth for any living person you name as a beneficiary;

(b) Your estate;

(c) A trust in existence at the time of death. Before making distribution to any trust the department must receive:

(i) A copy of the trust document;

(ii) The name, address, telephone number of the current trustee; and

(iii) The tax identification number;

(d) A trust to be established under your last will.

(3) You may name contingent beneficiaries in addition to primary beneficiaries.

**Examples:**

**EXAMPLE ONE.**

**Facts**

John, a member, completes a beneficiary designation form.

In the place on the form reserved for persons, he names his daughter Ann. He checks the box to indicate that Ann is a primary beneficiary.

In the place on the form reserved for trust/organizational beneficiaries, he lists the "Barbara Trust." His daughter Barbara is the trust beneficiary. He checks the box to indicate that the trust is a primary beneficiary.

**Result**

Subject to applicable statute, at John's death, the department will consider both the Barbara Trust and daughter Ann as primary beneficiaries. The department will require the name of the trustee, the tax identification number, a copy of the trust and other information specified in this rule before distribution to the trust.

**EXAMPLE TWO.**

**Facts**

John, a member, completes a beneficiary designation form.

In the place on the form reserved for persons, he names his daughter Ann. He checks the box to indicate that Ann is a primary beneficiary.

**PROPOSED**

In the place on the form reserved for trust/organizational beneficiaries, he lists his daughter Barbara personally (no trust name is provided). He checks the box labeled "primary beneficiary." John misunderstands the form and rather than provide the names of the trustee or trust administrator, John writes the word "both" in the blank provided.

### Result

At John's death, the department learns that John has created no trusts. Subject to existing statute, if the department receives no notice of competing claims to John's death benefit, the department will distribute the death benefit to Ann. If the department receives notice of competing claims, a court resolution may be required.

### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-320 Determining SERS Plan 3 defined benefit retirement eligibility.** This WAC provides eligibility terms for retirement from the defined benefit component of SERS Plan 3.

(1) Definition. Qualified service credit—For purposes of this section, the following types of service credit may be used to qualify for retirement:

- (a) SERS Plan 3 service credit;
  - (b) Service credit earned in a dual member system, but only in combination with SERS Plan 3 service credit (chapter 41.54 RCW); or
  - (c) Up to forty-five days of sick leave (RCW 41.35.010).
- (2) Members must be age 65 to retire with an unreduced defined benefit. SERS Plan 3 members can retire with an unreduced defined benefit at age 65 if they have accumulated the following amounts of qualified service credit:

- (a) Ten service credit years;
  - (b) Five service credit years, including twelve service credit months after attaining age 54; or
  - (c) Five service credit years by September 1, 2000, under Plan 2.
- (3) Members may retire with a reduced benefit after attaining age 55. A SERS Plan 3 member who has attained age 55 may retire with an actuarially reduced defined benefit (RCW 41.35.680) if they have accumulated at least ten years of qualified service credit.

(4) Members may use only qualified service credit to receive a retirement benefit from the SERS Plan 3 defined benefit component.

(5) To be eligible to receive a retirement benefit, SERS Plan 3 members must:

- (a) Submit a completed, signed, and notarized SERS Plan 3 retirement application; and
- (b) Terminate employment with all retirement system employers from which they are claiming service credit. Termination from non-SERS system employers is required in cases where a member is using dual member rules to qualify for retirement (chapter 41.54 RCW).

### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-324 Married member's benefit selection—Spousal consent required.** (1) The member, if mar-

ried, must provide the spouse's written consent to the option selected under WAC 415-110-326. If a married member does not provide spousal consent, the department will pay the retired member a joint and one-half survivor benefit allowance and record the member's spouse as the survivor in compliance with chapter 41.35 RCW and RCW 41.35.220(2).

(2) Spousal consent is not needed to enforce a marital dissolution order requiring the department to pay an expouse under RCW 41.50.790.

(3) "Spousal consent" means that the married member's spouse consents to the retirement option selected by the member. The spouse's notarized signature on a completed retirement application constitutes spousal consent.

### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-326 Retirement benefit options.** RCW 41.35.220 enables the department to provide retiring members with four retirement benefit options. The retiring member must choose an option(s) when applying for service or disability retirement:

(1) Option one (standard allowance). The department will pay a monthly retirement allowance based solely on the single life of the member, as provided by RCW 41.35.220, 41.35.440, or 41.35.690. When the retiree dies all benefits cease. Any remaining balance of the retiree's accumulated contributions will be paid to:

- (a) The retiree's designated beneficiary; or if none, to
- (b) The retiree's surviving spouse; or if none, to
- (c) The retiree's legal representative.

The member must designate a beneficiary at the time of retirement by filing a completed and notarized form provided by the department.

(2) Benefit options with a survivor feature. A retiring member is allowed to select from several retirement options which create an actuarially equivalent benefit that includes a survivor feature. The survivor feature entitles the survivor to receive a monthly allowance after the retiree dies. If the member chooses one of the survivor options, the monthly benefit the member will receive is actuarially reduced to offset the cost of the survivor feature. After the retiree dies, the department pays the survivor an allowance for the duration of his or her life. If the retiree and the survivor both die before the retiree's accumulated contributions are exhausted, the remaining balance is retained in the retirement fund.

Once retired with a survivor option, the retiree may only change the survivor option upon returning to eligible employment for two consecutive years.

(a) Option two (joint and whole allowance). When the retiree dies, the department pays the survivor an allowance equal to the gross monthly allowance received by the retiree.

(b) Option three (joint and one-half allowance). When the retiree dies, the department pays the survivor an allowance equal to one-half of the retiree's gross monthly retirement allowance.

(c) Option four (joint and two-thirds allowance).

(i) This subsection applies to members retiring on or after January 1, 1996.

(ii) When the retiree dies, the department pays the survivor an allowance equal to two-thirds (66.667%) of the retiree's gross monthly retirement allowance.

(3) If a member retires on or after June 6, 1996, the department is required to pay an exspouse survivor benefits pursuant to a marital dissolution order that complies with RCW 41.50.790.

**(4) Benefit increases when survivor predeceases retiree (pop-up provision).**

(a) This section applies to members retiring on or after January 1, 1996, who select option two, three, or four.

(b) If the survivor dies before the retiree, the retiree's monthly retirement allowance increases, effective the first day of the following month, to:

(i) The amount that would have been received had the retiree chosen option one; plus

(ii) Any cost-of-living adjustments the retiree received prior to the survivor's death based on the original option selection.

(c) Pop-up recalculation examples.

Plan two:

Agnes retires from SERS Plan 2 in 2006 (Year 0). Agnes would like Beatrice, her daughter, to receive a monthly allowance after Agnes dies. Therefore, Agnes selects a retirement benefit option with a survivor feature. As a result, her monthly allowance is reduced from \$2,000 (standard allowance) to \$1,750. Unfortunately, Beatrice dies in 2011 (Year 5). Under the "pop-up" provision, Agnes' monthly benefit will increase to \$2,191.05, the amount she would have received had she chosen option one (standard allowance) plus her accumulated COLAs:

\* In the future (i.e. Year 4), COLAs will be based on the increased benefit amount.

(d) If the survivor dies and the retiree's benefit increases under this section, and thereafter the retiree also dies before all contributions are exhausted, the remaining balance is retained by the retirement fund.

(5) Any retiree who retired before January 1, 1996, and who elected to receive a reduced retirement allowance under subsection (2) of this section is entitled to receive a retirement allowance adjustment if the retiree meets the following conditions:

(a) The retiree's designated beneficiary predeceases or has predeceased the retiree; and

(b) The retiree provides to the department proper proof of the designated beneficiary's death. The retiree is not required to apply for the increased benefit provided by this subsection.

The adjusted retirement allowance will be effective on July 1, 1998, or the first of the month following the date of death of the designated beneficiary, whichever comes last. The adjustment is computed as described in RCW 41.35.220 (3)(c) for Plan 2 retirees.

(6) **Survivor.** For the purposes of this provision, "survivor" means a person nominated by the member to receive a monthly benefit allowance after the member dies. A member nominates the survivor at the time of retirement by filing a completed and notarized form provided by the department.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-340 Actuarial tables, schedules, and factors.** This chapter contains the tables, schedules, and factors adopted by the director of the department of retirement systems for calculating optional retirement allowances of members of the Washington state public employees' retirement system. These tables, schedules, and factors were adopted by the director upon the recommendation of the state actuary based on the actuary's investigation into the mortality, service, compensation, and other experience of the members and beneficiaries of public employees' retirement system. The tables, schedules, and factors contained in this chapter shall govern the retirement allowances only of members retiring during the period from September 1, 2000, until such time as these tables, schedules, and factors are amended by the director following the next actuarial investigation conducted by the state actuary. Any new tables, schedules, and factors adopted by the director in the future shall govern retirement allowances calculated at the time of retirement only of members retiring after the adoption of such new tables, schedules, and factors.

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 415-110-400 Retirement allowance deduction for payment of insurance premiums. (1) Definitions.** Unless a different meaning is plainly required by the context:

(a) "Group life insurance policy or plan" means a contract of group life insurance issued by an insurance carrier authorized to do business in the state of Washington which meets one of the group requirements set forth in chapter 48.24 RCW;

(b) "Group disability insurance policy or plan" means a group disability insurance contract issued by an insurance carrier authorized to do business in the state of Washington which meets the requirements of chapter 48.21 RCW, and the term shall also include a group health care service contract as issued pursuant to, and regulated by, the provisions of chapter 48.40 RCW.

(2) **Scope.** Any beneficiary of a retirement allowance payable for service or disability under the provisions of chapter 41.35 RCW may authorize the director to deduct from his or her retirement allowance, on a monthly basis only, the premiums on any group life or disability insurance policy or plan currently covering the beneficiary, issued to the employer by which the retiree was employed prior to retirement. The department and the director are not and will not be liable for any failure to make such deduction payments on time or in the proper amount.

(3) **Procedure.** Any beneficiary, who desires to authorize a retirement allowance deduction as provided by this section, shall notify the department of his or her intention in writing at least thirty days prior to the date that the first

deduction is to be made and shall file with the department a formal authorization on such form as may be provided by the department.

(4) **Revocability.** You must submit to the department an express written statement of revocation to revoke an authorization for a retirement allowance deduction for payment of insurance premiums under this section. Such a revocation shall be applicable to the first retirement allowance deduction which would otherwise be made at the end of the calendar month following the month in which the statement of revocation is filed.

**REPORTABLE COMPENSATION**

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 415-110-441 Purpose and scope of compensation earnable rules.** WAC 415-110-443 through 415-110-488 codify the department's existing interpretation of statutes and existing administrative practice regarding classification of payments as compensation earnable in SERS Plan 2 and SERS Plan 3. The department has applied and will apply these rules to determine the proper characterization of payments occurring prior to the effective dates of these sections.

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 415-110-443 Reportable compensation table.** The following table is provided as a quick reference guide to help you characterize payments under SERS Plan 2 and SERS Plan 3. Be sure to turn to the referenced rule to ensure that you have correctly identified the payment in question. The department determines compensation earnable based upon the nature of the payment, not the name applied.

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 415-110-445 What compensation can be reported?** In order for payments to be subject to retirement system contributions and included in the calculation of a member's retirement benefit, those payments must meet the definition of compensation earnable in RCW 41.35.010.

(1) **Payments for personal services rendered.** To determine whether a payment meets this definition and can be reported, ask the following questions:

(a) Was the payment earned as a salary or wage for personal services rendered during a fiscal year? If the answer is no, the payment is not reportable. If the answer is yes, ask question (b).

(b) Was the payment paid by an employer to an employee? If the answer is no, the payment is not reportable. If the answer is yes, report the payment.

(2) **Payments included that are not for personal services rendered.** The legislature has included certain specific payments within the definition of compensation earnable even though those payments are not for personal services rendered by the employee to the employer. (See WAC 415-110-464 through 415-110-469.)

(3) **Reportable compensation is earned when the service is rendered, rather than when payment is made.**

**Example:** If a member works during September but does not receive payment for the work until October, the reportable compensation was earned during September and must be reported to the department as September earnings.

(4) **Salary characterizations are based upon the nature of the payment.** A payment is reportable compensation if it meets the criteria of subsection (1) or (2) of this section. The name given to the payment or the document authorizing it is not controlling in determining whether the payment is reportable compensation. The department determines whether a payment is reportable compensation by considering:

(a) What the payment is for; and

(b) Whether the reason for the payment brings it within the statutory definition of compensation earnable.

**Example:** A payment conditioned upon retirement is not reportable compensation. Attaching the label "longevity" to the payment does not change the fact that the payment is conditioned on retirement. Such a payment is not for services rendered and will not be counted as reportable compensation despite being identified by the employer as a longevity payment.

(5) **Differences in reportable compensation between plans.** WAC 415-110-445 through 415-110-488 define reportable compensation for each of the two SERS plans. The characterization of payments as reportable compensation or not reportable compensation in WAC 415-110-455 through 415-110-488 is the same for both SERS Plan 2 and SERS Plan 3.

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 415-110-451 Salary or wages.** Most employees receive a base rate of salary or wages expressed as an hourly or monthly rate of pay. This payment is for services rendered and qualifies as reportable compensation. Two possible components of an employee's base rate are salary considerations based on longevity or educational attainment.

(1) A member who receives a salary increase based upon longevity or educational attainment receives a higher salary without working more hours. The higher salary indicates a higher level of performance due to greater experience or more education. The payment is therefore a payment for personal service and is reportable compensation.

(2) Simply attaching the label "longevity" to a payment does not guarantee that it will be reportable compensation. If a payment described as a longevity payment is actually based upon some other criteria, such as retirement or notification of intent to retire, the payment may not be reportable.

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 415-110-453 Performance bonuses.** Bonuses that are based upon meeting certain performance goals are earned for services rendered and are reportable compensation. If a bonus was earned over a specified period of time, it should be prorated for reporting purposes.

PROPOSED

**Example:** An employer pays each employee in the work group an additional \$100 if the work group had no work related accidents in the preceding year. Remaining accident free is a performance goal. Therefore, the payment is for services rendered and qualifies as reportable compensation. The bonus should be prorated over each of the preceding twelve months during which it was earned.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-455 Cafeteria plans.** Compensation received in any form under the provisions of a "cafeteria plan," "flexible benefits plan," or similar arrangement pursuant to section 125 of the United States Internal Revenue Code is reportable compensation if the employee has an absolute right to receive cash or deferred cash payments in lieu of the fringe benefits offered. In such an instance, the fringe benefits are being provided in lieu of cash and are considered reportable compensation, just as the cash would be. If there is no cash option, the value of the fringe benefit is not a salary or wage and is not reportable compensation, see WAC 415-110-475.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-456 Leave payments earned over time.** (1) **Sick and annual leave usage.** Sick leave and annual leave is accumulated over time and paid to a person during a period of excused absence. Leave accrues at a prescribed rate, usually a certain number of hours per month. The employee earns a leave day by rendering service during the month the leave accrued. When the employee uses his or her accrued leave by taking a scheduled work day off with pay, the payment is deferred compensation for services previously rendered. The payment is a salary or wage earned for services rendered and is reportable.

(2) **Annual leave cash outs.** Annual leave cash outs are not reportable compensation for SERS Plan 2 and SERS Plan 3 members. Although annual leave cash outs, like payments for leave usage, are deferred compensation earned for services previously rendered, they are excluded from the definition of compensation earnable by statute, see RCW 41.35.010 (6)(a).

(3) **Sick leave cash outs.** Sick leave cash outs are excluded from the definition of compensation earnable for SERS Plan 2 and SERS Plan 3 members by statute.

Sick leave cash outs are excluded from reportable compensation for:

- (i) School district employees by RCW 28A.400.210; and
- (ii) Educational service district employees by RCW 28A.310.490. See RCW 41.35.010 (6)(a).

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-457 Retroactive salary increases.** A retroactive salary payment to an employee who worked during the covered period is a payment of additional salary for services already rendered.

**Note:** A retroactive salary increase is not the same as a retroactive payment upon reinstatement or in lieu of reinstatement of a terminated or suspended employee. For treatment of back payments for periods where services were not rendered, see WAC 415-110-467.

(1) To qualify as reportable compensation under this section, the payment must be a bona fide retroactive salary increase. To ensure that is the case, the retroactive payment must be made pursuant to:

(a) An order or conciliation agreement of a court or administrative agency charged with enforcing federal, state, or local statutes, ordinances, or regulations protecting employment rights;

(b) A bona fide settlement of such a claim before a court or administrative agency;

(c) A collective bargaining agreement; or

(d) Action by the personnel resources board which expressly states the payments are retroactive.

(2) The payments will be deemed earned in the period in which the work was done.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-458 Severance pay earned over time.** All forms of severance pay are excluded from earnable compensation and are not reportable for Plan 2 or Plan 3 by RCW 41.35.010 (6)(a).

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-459 Payroll deductions.** Salary or wages for services rendered that are withheld from a member's pay still qualify as reportable compensation.

(1) **Retirement contributions.** Payments deducted from employee compensation for employee retirement contributions are reportable. Employer contributions are a fringe benefit and are not reportable, see WAC 415-110-475.

(2) **Tax withholding.** Payments withheld to satisfy federal tax obligations qualify as reportable compensation.

(3) **Voluntary deductions.** Payments deducted voluntarily, such as I.R.C. section 457 plan contributions or other authorized deductions, are reportable.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-463 Payments not for services rendered.** In general, payments cannot be reported to the retirement system unless they are for services rendered. However, the legislature has identified some types of compensation which are reportable even though they are not for services rendered.

(1) WAC 415-110-464 through 415-110-469 discuss all payments that are not for services rendered that nonetheless qualify as reportable compensation.

(2) WAC 415-110-475 through 415-110-488 discuss some payments that are not a salary or wage for services rendered and so do not qualify as reportable compensation. A payment not for services rendered other than those identified in WAC 415-110-464 through 415-110-469 is not reportable

compensation even if it is not listed in WAC 415-110-475 through 415-110-488.

(3) A payment made in lieu of a payment that is not for services rendered (such as a payment made in lieu of a car allowance) will be treated in the same way that the original payment was treated. Such a payment is not for services rendered and is not reportable.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-464 Legislative leave.** If a SERS member takes a leave without pay from an eligible position to serve in the legislature, the member may elect to participate in SERS as a legislator.

(1) The employee may choose between:

(a) The reportable compensation he or she would have earned had the member not served in the legislature; or

(b) The actual reportable compensation for nonlegislative public employment and the legislative service combined.

(2) If the member selects option (a) of this subsection, he or she is responsible for paying the additional employer and employee contributions to the extent the reportable compensation reported is higher than it would have been under (b) of this subsection.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-465 Paid leave not earned over time.** If paid leave is not based upon earned leave accumulated over time, the payment is not a deferred payment for services previously rendered. Further, the member on leave is not currently rendering services in exchange for the payment. However, RCW 41.35.470 and 41.35.650 identify payments received from the employer while on paid leave as reportable for SERS. Contributions are due on these payments to the extent they meet the following conditions:

(1) The payment is equal to the salary for the position that the person is on leave from;

(2) The payment is actually from the employer. Payments from an employer that are conditioned upon reimbursement from a third party are payments from the third party. Because the payments are not from the employer, they are not reportable compensation. The only exception is union leave paid by the employer subject to reimbursement from the union under the conditions specified in RCW 41.35.470 (Plan 2) and RCW 41.35.650 (Plan 3) and WAC 415-110-466.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-466 Union leave.** If a member takes an authorized leave of absence to serve as an elected official of a labor organization and the employer pays the member on leave subject to reimbursement from the union, the person's pay qualifies as reportable compensation provided that all the conditions of RCW 41.35.470 (Plan 2) and RCW 41.35.650 (Plan 3) as appropriate, are met.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-467 Reinstatement or payment in lieu of reinstatement.** If an employer makes payments to an employee for periods where the employee was not employed and those payments are made upon reinstatement of the employee or in lieu of reinstatement, the payments are not earned for services rendered. However, RCW 41.35.010(6) specifically designates such payments as reportable compensation. The payments are only reportable to the extent that they are equivalent to the salary the employee would have earned had he or she been working.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-468 Compensation authorized by statute for periods of absence due to sickness or injury.** Compensation that a member receives for periods of absence due to sickness or injury are not payments for services rendered unless the payments are authorized pursuant to sick leave earned by the member for services rendered, see WAC 415-110-456. Certain specific types of payments for periods of absence due to sickness or injury have been included within the statutory definition of compensation earnable and therefore qualify as reportable compensation.

(1) **Assault pay** qualifies as reportable compensation only to the extent authorized by RCW 27.04.100, 72.01.045, and 72.09.240.

(2) **Imputed compensation for periods of duty disability** that a member would have received but for a disability occurring in the line of duty qualify as reportable compensation only to the extent authorized by RCW 41.35.070.

(3) **Shared leave.**

(a) Compensation that an employee, as defined in RCW 41.04.655, receives due to participation in a leave sharing program to the extent authorized by RCW 41.04.650 through 41.04.670 qualifies as reportable compensation.

(b) Shared leave payments received by members who are not state employees, do not qualify as reportable compensation. Such payments are not for services rendered, nor are they specifically included within the statutory definition of compensation earnable.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-469 Standby pay.** Some employers pay employees for being on "standby." A member is on standby when not being paid for time actually worked and the employer requires the member to be prepared to report immediately for work if the need arises, although the need may not arise. Because the member is not actually working, the member is not rendering service. However, RCW 41.35.010(6) specifically identifies standby pay that meets the above requirements as reportable compensation. Although included in the definition of compensation earnable, time spent on standby is excluded from the definition of "service," see RCW 41.35.010(7).

PROPOSED

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-470 Nonmoney maintenance.** Are payments from my employer in any form other than money considered compensation earnable? If you are a SERS Plan 2 or Plan 3 member, you are not entitled to count the value of any nonmoney maintenance compensation you receive from your employer as compensation earnable.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-475 Fringe benefits.** Payments made by an employer to a third party to provide benefits for an employee are not part of the employee's salary or wage. Those payments are not reportable compensation. Examples of these types of payments are insurance premiums (other than those made under bona fide cafeteria plans, see WAC 415-110-455) and matching and nonmatching employer contributions to a benefit plan.

**Note:** Mandatory salary deferrals are salary, not benefits. Such payments are reportable, see WAC 415-110-459.

**Example:** An employer makes matching payments to employees who participate in a deferred compensation plan. This is not a mandatory salary deferral for purposes of SERS reportable compensation. Since the employer matching payment (employer match) is made contingent upon employee plan participation, it is not payment for services rendered. Therefore, it is a fringe benefit that is not reportable compensation under SERS.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-477 Disability insurance.** Disability insurance payments are paid to persons for periods when they are unable to work. Because no services are rendered in exchange for these payments, they are not reportable compensation. This is true whether the payments come directly from the employer or from an insurance company.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-479 Workers' compensation.** Workers' compensation is paid to persons for periods when they are unable to work. Workers' compensation payments, like disability insurance, are not payments for services rendered and are not reportable compensation.

**Example:** Some employees on unpaid disability leave submit their workers' compensation payments to their employer who then issues the employee a check for the same amount through the payroll system. This exchange of payments does not change the character of the workers' compensation payment. Whether the payments come from the department of labor and industries, a self-insured employer, or have the appearance of coming from the employer, workers' compensation payments are not payments for services rendered and do not qualify as reportable compensation.

**Note:** A member may elect to make contributions and receive service credit for periods of disability covered by industrial insurance, see RCW 41.35.070.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-480 Vehicles—Does the value of my use of an employer vehicle qualify as compensation earnable?** You are not entitled to count any of the value of an employer-provided vehicle as compensation earnable.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-482 Illegal payments.** Payments made by an employer in excess of the employer's legal authority are not reportable.

**Example:** School districts are prohibited from increasing an employee's salary to include a payment in lieu of a fringe benefit per RCW 28A.400.220. If a district increased a person's salary instead of providing a fringe benefit, the payment would be illegal and should not be reported.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-483 Optional payments.** If an employee can receive an additional payment only on the condition of taking an action other than providing service to the employer, the payment is not for services rendered and is not reportable compensation.

**Example:** An employer offers to make a contribution to a deferred compensation plan on behalf of an employee only if the employee agrees to defer a portion of his or her salary. Because the employee does not have a right to receive the contribution based solely on the rendering of service, the employer payment is not reportable compensation.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-484 Reimbursements for expenses.** Reimbursements are not earned for services rendered and thus are not reportable compensation. Typical reimbursement payments include mileage reimbursements for use of a private car on employer business, see WAC 415-110-485, or meal and lodging reimbursements for business trips.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-485 Vehicle allowances—Are vehicle allowances earnable compensation?** (1) If your employer provides you any payment or allowance in lieu of a reimbursement for expenses you incur or expect to incur in performing services for your employer, the payment or allowance is not compensation earnable. Your vehicle allowance does not qualify as compensation earnable if you receive the allowance in lieu of reimbursement for expenses that you incur or expect to incur in using your own vehicle for business purposes.

PROPOSED



(2) **The department presumes that any vehicle allowance provided to you by your employer is a payment in lieu of reimbursement for expenses and is not compensation earnable.** If the contract authorizing your vehicle allowance states that it is provided solely in lieu of reimbursement for expenses that you incur or expect to incur in using your own vehicle for business purposes, the department's presumption is not rebuttable.

(3) **Your vehicle allowance may qualify as compensation earnable to the extent that it exceeds your actual expenses.** If your employer documents that your vehicle allowance exceeds the actual expenses you incur in driving your own vehicle for business purposes, the excess amount is compensation earnable. Your employer must maintain monthly contemporaneous records documenting the following:

(a) The dates, if any, on which you used a privately owned vehicle in performing services for your employer;

(b) The miles you drove the vehicle on each of these trips; and

(c) Your itinerary for each of these trips.

(4) **How to determine what amount of your vehicle allowance, if any, is reportable as compensation earnable.** If your employer documents that your vehicle allowance exceeds the actual expenses you incur in using your own vehicle for business purposes, your employer must report to the department as compensation earnable:

Your Vehicle Allowance LESS (Miles X IRS Rate)

(a) "Miles" above means the number of miles you drove a privately owned vehicle for business purposes during the month.

(b) "IRS rate" above means the Internal Revenue Service mileage rate for use by taxpayers computing the value of the use of a vehicle.

(5) **Your vehicle allowance qualifies as compensation earnable if you also receive a separate reimbursement for each occasion you use your own vehicle for business purposes.** If, in addition to your vehicle allowance, you receive a separate reimbursement for vehicle expenses for each occasion that you use a privately owned vehicle for business purposes, your vehicle allowance is compensation earnable.

(6) **Any part of your vehicle allowance that qualifies as earnable compensation is excess compensation.** If any part of your vehicle allowance is included in the calculation of your retirement allowance, your employer will be billed for excess compensation under RCW 41.50.150. Your employer's bill will equal the total estimated cost of the portion of your retirement allowance payment attributable to your vehicle allowance.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-487 Retirement bonus or incentive.** A payment made to an employee as a bonus or incentive when retiring or terminating is not a payment for services rendered. Rather, the payment is made in exchange for an employee's promise or notification of intent to retire or terminate. A

retirement or termination bonus or incentive is not reportable compensation.

Example: A collective bargaining agreement authorizes a school district to pay employees a higher salary during the last two years of employment if the employee gives written notice of his or her intent to retire or terminate. Because the payment is in exchange for the agreement to retire or terminate and not for services, the payment is not reportable compensation.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-488 Severance pay not earned over time—Contract buy outs.** Severance pay that is not earned over time is not earned for services rendered and is not reportable. An example of severance pay not earned over time is a payment negotiated as part of termination agreement.

Example: At the time of an employee's termination the employer agrees to pay a lump sum payment equal to two months' salary. The employer identifies this payment as "severance pay." Because the payment was not earned for services rendered, it is not reportable compensation and will not be included in the retirement calculation.

For treatment of severance pay earned over time, see WAC 415-110-458.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-491 Salary imputed to periods of unpaid leave.** In some circumstances specified in statute, a member may elect to establish service credit for periods of unpaid leave. The salary imputed to a member for purposes of calculating contributions owing for such periods of leave is not reportable compensation. Depending on the type of leave, the imputed compensation may or may not be included as average final compensation in calculating a member's retirement allowance.

(1) Authorized unpaid leave. RCW 41.35.470 (Plan 2) and RCW 41.35.650 (Plan 3) provides members with an option to establish service credit for periods of unpaid leave. RCW 41.35.070 provides members with an option to establish service credit for periods of disability covered by industrial insurance. Salary imputed to members in order to calculate contributions for such periods is not reportable compensation and can not be included as average final compensation in calculating a member's retirement allowance.

(2) Military leave. Salary imputed to a member for purposes of calculating contributions owing for periods of interrupted military service is not reportable compensation. Federal law requires that if a member elects to purchase credit for such periods of military service, and that period falls in the member's average final compensation period, the member is entitled to have the imputed salary he or she would have earned during the period of absence used in the calculation of his or her average final compensation.

PROPOSED

## MEMBERSHIP

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-550 Elected officials—Eligibility for retirement service membership.** (1) For purposes of this section and WAC 415-110-570, and pursuant to RCW 41.35.030 and 41.35.010, "elected" officials means:

(a) Individuals who are elected or appointed to any vacant elective office at a school district or educational service district; or

(b) Active SERS members who become elected or appointed to any state elective position.

(2) An active member of SERS who is elected to a state elective position may elect to continue membership in SERS or apply for membership in PERS pursuant to RCW 41.40.023(3).

(3) An active member of SERS who is elected or appointed to a nonstate elective position for an employer other than a school district or educational service district, does not have the option to continue membership in SERS pursuant to such elected service. However, the member may apply for membership in PERS pursuant to RCW 41.40.023(3).

(4) Pursuant to RCW 41.35.030 (2)(a), elected officials are exempted from retirement system membership but may apply for membership during the official's current term of elected office. To apply for membership, the official shall submit a written application directly to the department. If the department approves the application, the elected official is entitled to establish membership and service credit retroactive to the first day of the official's current term of elected service. To establish such membership, the official shall pay the required employee contributions for the official's current term of elected service with interest as determined by the department.

(5) Upon establishing membership for the official's current term of elected office, the official is entitled to establish membership and service credit retroactive to the first day of any previous elected term or terms of office. The official will be required to establish membership for all consecutive terms of office. To exercise this option, the official shall apply to the department pursuant to subsection (4) of this section. If the department approves the application, the official shall:

(a) Pay the required employee contributions for such previous term or terms of elected service with interest as determined by the department; and

(b) Pay the required employer contributions for such previous term or terms of elected service with interest as determined by the department. The employer may, at its discretion, pay the required employer contributions plus interest in lieu of the employee making payment of this amount.

(6) If an official is employed in an eligible position at the time of election to office and will hold multiple positions concurrently the official may:

(a) Apply to the department to participate in membership pursuant to the official's elected position as provided in subsection (4) of this section; or

(b) Choose not to participate pursuant to the official's elected position while continuing membership through the nonelected position.

(7) Except as provided under RCW 41.35.030, once an elected official has exercised the option of becoming a member of the retirement system the official shall be a member until the official separates from all eligible public employment. An official does not separate from public employment when that official's term of office ends and the official commences another term of office in the same or a different position for the same employer without a break in service. An official does not separate from service if the official resigns from the official's elected position and is later reappointed to the same position during the same term.

(8) The department will apply this section to service by elected officials which occurred prior to the effective date of this section.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-560 Appointed officials—Eligibility and application for retirement service membership.** (1) For purposes of this section and WAC 415-110-570, and pursuant to RCW 41.35.030 and 41.35.010, "appointed" officials means only those individuals who are active SERS members or were previously active SERS members and are appointed directly by the governor to any position, including but not limited to, agency directorships and memberships on a state committee, board or commission.

(2) An individual must be a gubernatorial appointee or be appointed to serve in a position that meets the requirements of RCW 41.35.010 in order to be eligible for membership and service credit.

(3) Pursuant to RCW 41.35.030, appointed officials are exempted from retirement system membership but may apply for membership during the official's current appointed term of office. To apply for membership, the official shall submit a written application directly to the department. If the department approves the application, the official is entitled to establish membership and service credit retroactive to the first day of the official's current term of appointed service. To establish such membership, the official shall pay the required employee contributions for the official's current term of appointed service with interest as determined by the department.

(4) Upon establishing membership for the official's current term of appointed service, the official is entitled to establish membership retroactive to the first day of any previous elected term or terms of office. To exercise this option, the official shall apply to the department pursuant to subsection (3) of this section. If the department approves the application, the official shall:

(a) Pay the required employee contributions for such previous term or terms of elected service with interest as determined by the department; and

(b) Pay the required employer contributions for such previous term or terms of elected service with interest as determined by the department. The employer may, at its discretion, pay the required employer contributions plus interest in lieu of the employee making payment of this amount.

PROPOSED

(c) "Current term of appointed service" includes an appointed official's entire current term of service. If the official has not been appointed to a position with a set term of office, "current term of appointed service" includes all uninterrupted service in the official's current appointed position.

(5) If an appointed official is employed in an eligible position at the time of appointment to office and will hold the two positions concurrently, the official may:

(a) Apply to the department to participate in membership pursuant to the appointed position as provided in subsection (3) of this section; or

(b) Choose not to participate pursuant to the official's appointed position while continuing membership through the nonappointive position.

(6) Once an appointed official has exercised the option of becoming a member of the retirement system either at the start of the official's initial term or at a successive term, the official shall be a member until the official separates from all eligible public employment. An appointed official does not separate from public employment when that official's term of office ends and the official commences another term of office in the same or a different position for the same employer without a break in service. An appointed official does not separate from service if the official resigns from the appointed position and is later reappointed to the position during the same term.

(7) The department will apply this section to service by appointed officials which occurred prior to the effective date of this section.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-570 Elected and appointed officials—Requirements for service credit.** (1) SERS members who were elected to office by statewide election and elect membership in SERS pursuant to WAC 415-110-550, may receive one month of service credit for each month during which they earn compensation pursuant to their elected positions.

(2) Except for officials covered under subsection (1) of this section, members who were elected to office or appointed by the governor to positions and elect membership in SERS pursuant to WAC 415-110-550 or 415-110-560, may receive service credit only for months during which they are compensated:

(a) In excess of ninety times the state hourly minimum wage in effect at the time they render the service; and

(b) For ninety or more total hours of work.

(3) On or after September 1, 1991, except for officials covered under subsection (1) of this section, members who were elected to office or appointed by the governor to positions and elect membership in SERS pursuant to WAC 415-110-550 or 415-110-560, may earn:

(a) One month of service credit for each month during which they are compensated:

(i) For ninety or more total hours of work; and

(ii) In excess of ninety times the state hourly minimum wage in effect at the time they render the service; or

(b) One-half month of service credit for each month during which they are compensated:

(i) For less than ninety hours but equal to or more than seventy total hours of work; and

(ii) In excess of ninety times the state hourly minimum wage in effect at the time they render the service; or

(c) One-quarter month of service credit for each month during which they are compensated:

(i) For less than seventy total hours of work; and

(ii) In excess of ninety times the state hourly minimum wage in effect at the time they render the service.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-679 Purpose and scope of eligibility rules.** WAC 415-110-680 through 415-110-728 codify the department's existing interpretation of statutes and existing administrative practice regarding eligibility for membership in Plan 2 and Plan 3. The department has applied and will apply these rules to determine eligibility for service occurring prior to effective dates of these sections.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-680 Am I eligible for membership? (1) You are eligible for membership if you are employed in an eligible position.** Your position is eligible under RCW 41.35.010 if the position, as defined by your employer, normally requires at least five months of seventy or more hours of compensated service per month during each year.

(2) **If you leave an eligible position to serve in a project position, you may retain eligibility.** If you are a member and you leave employment in an eligible position to serve in a project position, the project position is eligible if:

(a) The position, as defined by the employer, normally requires at least five months of seventy or more hours of compensated service each month; or

(b) The position requires at least seventy hours per month and you take the position with the understanding that you are expected to return to your permanent eligible position at the completion of the project.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-690 How is my eligibility evaluated? (1) Your eligibility is based on your position. In evaluating whether your position is eligible, your employer will determine only whether the position meets the criteria of an eligible position under RCW 41.35.010.** Your employer will not consider your membership status or individual circumstances unless you:

PROPOSED

(a) Leave employment in an eligible position to serve in a project position (see WAC 415-110-680); or

(b) Work in both a SERS and TRS position during the same school year (see WAC 415-110-728).

**(2) Your employer will evaluate your position's eligibility for a particular year at the beginning of the year.**

**(3) Your employer or the department may reclassify your position's eligibility based upon your actual work history.** If your employer declares your position to be ineligible at the beginning of a year and by the end of the year, you have actually worked five or more months of seventy or more hours, your employer will, at that time, review your position's eligibility. If at the end of the first year:

(a) Your employer believes your position meets the requirements for an eligible position and declares the position as eligible, you will enter membership and your employer will report you to the department effective from the date your employer declares the position as eligible; or

(b) Your employer believes that the position will not meet the criteria for an eligible position during the next year, your employer may continue to define your position as ineligible. However, if during the next year the position actually requires you to again work seventy or more hours each month for at least five months, the department will declare your position as eligible. You will enter membership in the retirement system.

(i) Except as provided in (b)(ii) of this subsection, your employer will report you to the department effective from the first month of the first year in which your position required you to work for seventy or more hours.

(ii) If:

(A) Your employer has monitored the work history of your position for eligibility;

(B) Has notified you in writing when you entered the position that the position was not considered eligible; and

You will enter membership prospectively.

**(4) The department will not reclassify your position's eligibility until history of the position shows that it meets the criteria for an eligible position.** If your employer has declared your position ineligible, the department will not reclassify your position as eligible until history of the position shows a period of two consecutive years of at least five months of seventy or more hours of compensated employment each month.

**counts as one position.** If you are employed with the same employer in two ineligible positions during a year which, when combined, equate to an eligible position and your employer expects you to continue in this employment for a second consecutive year, your employer will report the total hours you work in both positions to the department as an eligible position.

Example: A person normally works for one employer as a cook for forty hours each month and as a bus driver for forty hours each month. The person is eligible for membership because he works a total of eighty hours each month for at least five months each year and this is the normal pattern of his employment.

Example: A person normally works for one employer for forty hours each month as a cook. For one year only, she takes on extra duties by also working forty hours per month as a bus driver. Although she worked eighty hours each month for five or more months during one year, she is not eligible for membership because these hours are not the normal pattern of her employment.

Example: A person works for one employer for forty hours each month as a cook and also works for another employer for forty hours each month as a bus driver. The person is not eligible for membership because he cannot combine the hours of employment with these separate employers to establish membership.

**(2) You may be reported in TRS if you work in two positions and one position is covered under TRS.** See WAC 415-110-728.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-710 If I work for an employer after I retire, will my retirement benefit be affected? (1) If you reenter membership after retiring, the department will suspend payment of your benefit.**

**(2) You may work for an employer in some circumstances without reentering membership.** You may enter employment with an employer after retirement without having to reenter membership if:

(a) You are employed in an ineligible position; or

(b) You are employed in an eligible position on a temporary basis for five months or less in a calendar year.

(i) If you enter compensated employment in an eligible position during a month, that month is counted as a month of employment in the calendar year regardless of the number of hours you worked in the month.

(ii) If you are employed in an eligible position for any five months during a calendar year, the department will count your employment as five months of employment, regardless of whether or not the months are consecutive or your employment is with one or more employers.

(3) **You are required to reenter membership if you become reemployed in an eligible position on a temporary basis for more than five months in a calendar year.** If you become reemployed in an eligible position on a temporary basis for more than five months in a calendar year, you will reenter membership in the retirement system beginning with the sixth month of your employment. Effective at the beginning of the sixth month of your employment:

- (a) Your employer will report you to the department; and
- (b) The department will suspend your retirement allowance.

(4) **You are required to reenter membership if you become permanently reemployed in an eligible position.** If you become reemployed in an eligible position on a permanent basis, you will immediately become a member. Effective from the date of your reemployment in a permanent eligible position:

- (a) Your employer will report you to the department; and
- (b) The department will suspend your retirement allowance.

(5) **Meaning of employment on a temporary or permanent basis.**

(a) "Employed on a temporary basis" under subsection (2) of this section means your employer expects your employment to last for five months or less and not be on a recurring basis.

(b) "Employed on a permanent basis" under subsection (3) of this section means either:

- (i) Your employer expects you to continue in your position for more than five months in any calendar year; or
- (ii) Your employer expects you to continue in the same position for more than one year on a recurring basis and your employment is for five months or less during each year.

(2) **If you are receiving a disability allowance from any retirement system administered by the department, you cannot participate in SERS.**

**WAC 415-110-820 Interim retirement allowance—Final computation of retirement allowance—Adjustment of retirement allowance for errors.** (1) At the time of a member's application for retirement, the department does not have all information necessary to make a final computation of the member's retirement allowance. Based upon estimates of the retiree's compensation and earned service credit through the date of retirement, the department shall compute an interim retirement allowance made payable to the member in the interim between the member's date of retirement and the department's final computation of the member's retirement allowance. The interim retirement allowance is an initial, estimated computation of the retiree's retirement allowance subject to adjustment by the department based upon subsequent review of information provided by the member's employer.

(2) In computing the interim retirement allowance, the department shall, subject to later correction, consider only the amount of the member's salary actually reported by the employer up to the date of the interim computation, but shall impute the member's earned service credit for the same period.

(3) Following the department's computation of the interim benefit and receipt earnings history, the department shall complete a final computation of the member's retirement allowance. The department's final computation may either increase or decrease the amount of the interim retirement allowance computed pursuant to subsection (1) of this section.

(4) Pursuant to RCW 41.50.130, following the department's final computation of the member's retirement allowance as provided in subsection (3) of this section, the department may subsequently adjust a member's retirement allowance to correct any error in retirement system records. For purposes of this subsection, errors in retirement system records include, but are not limited to, the following:

(a) Applying an incorrect retirement allowance formula in computing the retirement allowance;

(b) Including service that is not creditable to the member;

(c) Including payments that do not constitute earnable compensation to a member in the member's retirement allowance computation, or excluding earnable compensation not reported by an employer;

(d) Benefit overpayments and underpayments;

(e) Including an individual in the membership of the retirement system who is not entitled to such membership.

## MEMBERSHIP CONVERSION

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-110-910 Conversion of service.** (1) **You will be converted from PERS to SERS if:**

(a) You were employed with a school district or educational service district in an eligible position as of September 1, 2000;

(b) You participated and then separated in PERS prior to September 1, 2000, and became reemployed in an eligible position at a school district or educational service district after September 1, 2000;

(c) You retired out of PERS Plan 2 and:

(i) Returned to PERS covered employment and became an active PERS membership; and

(ii) Were a member as of September 1, 2000, at a school district or educational service district; or

(d) You retired out of PERS Plan 2 and:

(i) Returned to PERS covered employment and became an active PERS membership;

(ii) Separated from your PERS position; and

(iii) Become employed in an eligible SERS position prior to applying for reretirement in PERS.

(2) **What happens to my existing PERS service and account history when I am converted from PERS to SERS membership?** All of your PERS service and account history with any PERS employer will be moved to SERS.

(3) **How many times will my PERS service be moved to SERS?** Your PERS service shall be moved to SERS only once pursuant to subsection (1) of this section. After you have been converted from PERS to SERS, subsequent reenrollment(s) into SERS shall not cause any additional conversions of any PERS service. Any future eligible employment in PERS shall be reported into PERS and any future eligible employment in SERS shall be reported into SERS.

**Example: Employed in PERS prior to conversion.** Joe has 15 years of service in PERS. He has been employed by a school district for the last 5 years. Joe previously was employed by a county for 10 years.

**Conversion from PERS to SERS.** Since Joe is employed with the school district on September 1, 2000, his PERS service is moved to SERS service. Both his 5 years of service with the school district and his 10 years of service with the county are moved to SERS. Joe's PERS account now has zero service credit and contributions; Joe's SERS account now has 15 years of service credit and contributions.

**Return to PERS service.** After another year of service with the school district, Joe separates employment with 16 years of credit in SERS and returns to employment with the county. Joe's 16 years of service remains in SERS and he begins to accrue service in PERS, starting from zero, for his new employment with the county.

**Return to SERS employment.** Joe works for the county for 5 years. He now has 5 years of service

**ployment.** (1) The purpose of this rule is to establish a method to actuarially recompute the retirement allowance of a Plan 2 member or the defined benefit retirement allowance of a Plan 3 member who retires, reenters employment causing his or her retirement allowance to be suspended, and then retires again. The actuarially recomputed retirement allowance shall:

(a) Include service credit the member earned following reestablishment of membership if any; and

(b) Account for the actuarial reduction applied to the member's initial retirement if the member initially retired prior to age sixty-five.

(2) If a Plan 2 or Plan 3 retiree reenters membership, upon the individual's next retirement, the department shall reinstate and actuarially recompute the individual's retirement allowance pursuant to RCW 41.35.230 (Plan 2) or RCW 41.35.640 (Plan 3) as follows:

(a) If the member first retired before age sixty-five, the department shall:

(i) Calculate the retirement allowance pursuant to RCW 41.35.400 (Plan 2) or RCW 41.35.620 (Plan 3) using the retiree's total years of career service, including service earned prior to initial retirement and service earned after reentering membership;

(ii) Actuarially reduce the member's retirement allowance based on the present value of the retirement allowance payments the individual received during the initial retirement; and

(iii) Calculate any survivor option selected by the retiree based upon the monthly retirement allowance calculated pursuant to (a)(i) and (ii) of this subsection.

(b) If the member initially retired at or after age sixty-five, the department shall recompute the member's retirement allowance pursuant to RCW 41.35.400 (Plan 2) or RCW 41.35.620 (Plan 3) and include any additional service credit earned and any applicable increase in the member's average final compensation resulting from the member's reentry into membership. Under no circumstances shall a retiree receive a retirement allowance creditable to a month during which that individual earned service credit.

(3) If a retiree's retirement allowance is suspended under RCW 41.35.450 or 41.35.640 due to reemployment but the retiree does not reenter membership, upon the retiree's separation from such employment, the retiree shall receive an actuarially recomputed retirement allowance equal to the sum of:

(a) The amount of the monthly suspended retirement allowance; plus

(b) An actuarially computed increase based upon the retirement allowance payments the member did not receive due to reemployment. The retiree may elect to receive the actuarially computed increase in either:

(i) An amount amortized over the expected term of the recomputed retirement allowance; or

(ii) A lump sum payment equal to the suspended retirement allowance plus interest.



credit in PERS and he still has 16 years of service credit in SERS. Joe separates employment from the county and goes back to work in a SERS covered position with an educational service district. Joe's PERS employer will stop reporting him and the educational service district will begin reporting Joe into SERS. He will begin accumulating service in SERS starting at 16 years. The 5 years of service that Joe rendered at the county stays in PERS.

(4) **If I am a PERS Plan 2 retiree and become employed in an eligible SERS position, will my service be converted from PERS to SERS?** Except as allowed in subsection (1)(c) and (d) of this section, a PERS Plan 2 retiree will not have any of their service, account or retirement history converted to SERS.

## Chapter 415-111 WAC

### PLAN 3 - DEFINED CONTRIBUTION PLANS

#### ADMINISTRATION

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-111-100 Application of chapter.** This chapter applies only to members of Plan 3 retirement systems created under chapters 41.32 (TRS) and 41.35 (SERS) RCW.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-111-110 Member and employer responsibility.** (1) **What am I responsible for as a Plan 3 member?** As a Plan 3 member your responsibilities include, but are not limited to:

- (a) Adhering to published time frames;
- (b) Making investment decisions for your defined contribution account;
- (c) Reviewing account information provided on statements, such as quarterly statements, and notifying the correct organization of any errors;
- (d) Filling out the correct form for a requested action;
- (e) Correctly completing the appropriate form for a requested action and submitting the form to the correct organization as directed on each form; and
- (f) Monitoring to ensure contributions do not exceed Internal Revenue Code limits (see WAC 415-111-111).

(2) **What can happen if I do not fulfill my responsibilities?** If you do not fulfill your responsibilities, the consequences may include, but are not limited to:

- (a) You may not qualify for certain benefits, such as the transfer payment;
- (b) You may have a delay in the correction of errors on your account;
- (c) You may have a delay in the processing of your request for a defined contribution withdrawal; or
- (d) You may have a delay in the investment of your account as directed.

(3) **What responsibilities do employers have?** Employers' responsibilities include, but are not limited to:

- (a) Adhering to Plan 3 administrative requirements, including the respective roles of employers and employees, communicated to employers by the department in written materials and formal training.
- (b) Maintaining a supply of Plan 3 forms;
- (c) Submitting contributions to the department as soon as possible and at least in accordance with chapter 41.50 RCW;
- (d) Reporting an employee's Plan 3 transfer election as soon as possible after receipt of the appropriate form from the employee;
- (e) Submitting to DRS the form on which the member made their Plan 3 transfer election as soon as possible after receipt of the appropriate form;
- (f) Reporting an employee's contribution rate election as soon as possible after receipt of the appropriate form from the employee;
- (g) Reporting an employee's investment program election as soon as possible after receipt of the appropriate form from the employee; and
- (h) Monitoring to ensure that a member's contributions do not exceed Internal Revenue Code limits (see WAC 415-111-111).

(4) **What can happen if my employer does not fulfill their responsibilities?** If your employer does not fulfill their responsibilities, the consequences may include, but are not limited to:

- (a) Your employer may have to make your member account whole;
- (b) Your employer may be subject to penalties assessed by the department; or
- (c) Your employer may be subject to penalties assessed by the Internal Revenue Service.

If the department determines that an employer has erred in its administrative role, such that an employee incurs an investment loss, the department will determine the amount of loss and bill the employer.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-111-111 Monitoring deferral limits.** (1) **Can contributions in Plan 3 affect my deferral limits in other tax-deferred plans?** Yes. Contributions to Plan 3 reduce your taxable income; this may affect your deferral limits if you participate in another tax deferred program that has a maximum contribution based on a percentage of your taxable income. You should consult with the Internal Revenue Service, a tax advisor, or a financial advisor regarding all questions of federal or state tax implications arising from participation in Plan 3.

(2) **Who is responsible for ensuring that I do not exceed my tax deferral limits?** Both your employer and you are responsible for ensuring that you do not exceed your tax deferral limits:

- (a) Employers are responsible for monitoring to ensure that the contributions you make to your employer-sponsored tax deferred plan(s) do not exceed the limits under the Internal Revenue Code.

PROPOSED

(b) You are responsible for monitoring to ensure that the total contributions you make to all of your tax deferred plan(s) do not exceed the limits under the Internal Revenue Code if you participate in a tax deferred program(s) outside of your employer sponsored plan(s).

## INVESTMENT OPTIONS

### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-111-210 Investment program election.** You may choose between two ERBB-approved investment programs: The total allocation portfolio, administered by the Washington state investment board, and a self-directed investment program. You may contribute to only one of these programs at a time. However, you may maintain accounts in both investment programs and transfer money between investment programs.

Pursuant to WAC 415-111-110, you bear the responsibility for completing the correct form for making an investment program election and submitting it to your employer as directed on the form.

(1) **Where do I get the form to make my election?** Your employer must provide the appropriate form to elect an investment program if you are enrolling into Plan 3, transferring from Plan 2 to Plan 3, or changing your investment program.

(2) **When do I have to choose an investment program?** If you are a new member or are reenrolling, you must select one of the ERBB-approved investment programs within ninety calendar days from your date of hire in an eligible position. However, if you are transferring from Plan 2 to Plan 3, you must select an investment program when you transfer. The ninety-day period does not apply to a member transferring from Plan 2 to Plan 3.

If it is determined you should be reported into Plan 3 membership retroactively, the ninety-day period starts from the date it is discovered, as determined by the department, that you should have been reported.

(3) **What happens if I do not make an investment program election?** You will be assigned to the default investment program described in subsection (4) of this section, if:

(a) You are a new employee or changing your employer and do not make an investment program election within the ninety-day election period described in subsection (2) of this section; or

(b) You are transferring from Plan 2 to Plan 3 and do not make an investment program election at the time of transfer.

(4) **What is the default investment program?** The default investment program is the total allocation portfolio of the Washington state investment board.

(5) **Can I change my investment program?** Once you have made an initial investment election or been directed into the default program, you may change your investment program at any time by submitting the appropriate form to your employer.

### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-111-220 Defined contribution rate election.** A Plan 3 member shall contribute from his or her compensation according to one of the rate structures described in RCW 41.34.040.

Pursuant to WAC 415-111-110, you bear the responsibility for completing the correct form for making a contribution rate election and submitting it in a timely manner to your employer as directed on the form.

(1) **Where do I get the form to make my election?** Your employer must provide the appropriate form to elect a contribution rate if you are enrolling into Plan 3 or transferring from Plan 2 to Plan 3.

(2) **When do I have to elect a contribution rate?** You must irrevocably elect a contribution rate within ninety calendar days from your date of hire in an eligible position. However, if you are transferring from Plan 2 to Plan 3, you must elect a contribution rate when you transfer. The ninety-day period does not apply to a member transferring from Plan 2 to Plan 3.

(a) Once a member elects a contribution rate, contributions will begin the first day of the pay cycle in which the member makes the election.

(b) If it is determined that a member should be reported into Plan 3 membership retroactively, the ninety-day period starts from the date it is discovered, as determined by the department, that the member should have been reported.

(c) A Plan 3 member working in eligible positions for more than one employer may select a different contribution rate with each employer.

(3) **What happens if I do not make a contribution rate election?** Pursuant to RCW 41.34.040, you will be irrevocably assigned to Option A if:

(a) You are a new employee or changing your employer and do not make a contribution rate election within the ninety-day election period described in subsection (2) of this section; or

(b) You are transferring from Plan 2 to Plan 3 and do not make a contribution rate election at the time of transfer. Contributions required under subsection (a) or (b) shall begin effective the first day of the pay cycle in which you are assigned to Option A.

(4) **Can I change my contribution rate?** Once you elect a contribution rate or are defaulted into Option A, you cannot change your contribution rate unless you change employers. Each time you change employers, you will be allowed the ninety-day period described in subsection (2) of this section to elect a new contribution rate. For the purposes of this section, employer is defined as each school district and each educational service district.

### NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-111-230 Self-directed investment program allocation.** This section applies only to members who elect the self-directed investment program pursuant to WAC 415-111-210.

(1) **What is an allocation?** An allocation is a set of instructions defining which self-directed investment program funds you wish your money to be invested in. The amount you allocate to each fund must be designated as a whole percentage. The sum of the percentages that you allocate must equal one-hundred percent.

Example: Martha has elected the self-directed program as her investment manager and is contributing \$150 per month. Martha decides to invest into three different funds with the following amounts: \$30 invested in fund #1, \$45 invested in fund #2 and \$75 invested in fund #3. To accomplish this she must establish the following allocation:

Allocation to fund #1	20%
Allocation to fund #2	30%
Allocation to fund #3	50%
Total Allocation	100%

(2) **How do I establish an allocation?** You must establish your allocation by contacting the department's designated recordkeeper. Once established, you may change your allocation at any time by contacting the department's designated recordkeeper.

(3) **What happens if I do not designate an allocation?** If you do not provide an allocation prior to any of your investment money being received by the department's designated recordkeeper, or if you provide an allocation where the sum of the allocated portions does not equal one-hundred percent, your investment money will be directed into the default fund such that:

(a) If your total allocations do not equal one-hundred percent, (i) the department will determine the percentage that is unallocated, and (ii) direct the unallocated percentage into the default fund.

Example: Ralph designates the following allocation: 33% fund #1, 33% fund #2, and 33% fund #3. Since the total allocation equals 99%, the unallocated 1% will be directed into the default fund.

(b) If the total allocations exceed one-hundred percent, the entire allocation will be directed into the default fund.

Example: Chris designates the following allocations: 38% into fund #1, 40% into fund #2, and 10% into fund #3 and 15% into fund #4. Since the total allocation equals 103%, all of Chris' investment money will be directed into the default fund.

(c) If no allocation is provided, the entire allocation will be directed into the default fund: Provided, That if the member previously participated in the self-directed investment program, the member's most recent allocation will be used. If that allocation includes a fund or funds that are no longer available, the portion of your investment money allocated to the unavailable fund(s) will be directed into the default fund.

Example: Lew is a new member and elects the self-directed investment program, but does not establish an allocation. All of Lew's invest-

ment money will be directed into the default fund.

Example: Linda becomes reemployed in an eligible position and elects to participate in the self-directed investment program again, but does not provide an allocation.

Linda previously participated in the self-directed investment program and had the following allocation:

- 10% in Fund #1
- 10% in Fund #2
- 30% in Fund #3
- 25% in Fund #4
- 25% in Fund #5

Since she did not establish a new allocation, her previous allocation will be used. However, fund #2 is no longer available so that part of her allocation will be directed into the default fund. A new allocation will be established for Linda as follows:

- 10% in Fund #1
- 10% in Default Fund
- 30% in Fund #3
- 25% in Fund #4
- 25% in Fund #5

(4) **What is the default fund?** The default fund for the self-directed investment program is the Money Market Fund.

(5) **Can I change my allocation?** Once you have established an allocation or been directed into the default fund, you may change your allocation at any time by contacting the department's designated recordkeeper.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-111-310 Defined contribution withdrawal.**

(1) **How do I withdraw from my defined contribution account?** Except as otherwise allowed by RCW 41.34.070, you must meet the following criteria to withdraw from your defined contribution account:

- (a) You must separate from all eligible employment;
- (b) Notice of separation must be received by the department from your employer(s) through the retirement transmittal system; and
- (c) You must submit the appropriate form for requesting a defined contribution withdrawal. Pursuant to WAC 415-111-110, you bear the responsibility for completing and submitting the form to the department's designated recordkeeper as directed on the form.

(2) **Can I still receive my defined contribution withdrawal if I return to work before receiving my withdrawal?** If you have made a request for payment and meet all of the criteria in subsection (1) of this section, you may return to work in an eligible position and still take payment of the requested defined contribution withdrawal.

**(2) If you terminate TRS Plan ((~~F~~)) 1 membership, you will not reenter TRS Plan ((~~F~~)) 1 unless you requalify for membership or repay withdrawn contributions as a dual member.** If you were a Plan ((~~F~~)) 1 member and have terminated your membership, you can reestablish your membership and be eligible to participate in the system again only if you:

(a) Become reemployed as a teacher in a position or positions meeting the membership eligibility criteria under RCW 41.32.240 and WAC 415-112-125(1); or

(b) Repaid withdrawn contributions as a dual member under portability. See RCW 41.54.020(2).

**(3) If you have service credit in TRS Plan ((~~H~~)) 2, you will only reestablish membership if you work as a teacher in an eligible position.** If you were a Plan ((~~H~~)) 2 member who separated from service, you will reestablish membership and be eligible to participate in the system again only if you:

(a) Become reemployed as a teacher; and

(b) Render service in a position or positions meeting the membership eligibility criteria under WAC 415-112-125(1) or 415-112-140(1).

**(4) If you have service credit in TRS Plan 3, you will only reestablish membership if you work as a teacher in an eligible position.** If you were a Plan 3 member who separated from service, you will reestablish membership and be eligible to participate in the system again only if you:

(a) Become reemployed as a teacher; and

(b) Render service in a position or positions meeting the membership eligibility criteria under WAC 415-112-125(1) or 415-112-140(1).

(b) Terminate your membership in PERS by withdrawing your accumulated contributions.

**(4) If you were enrolled in PERS prior to June 7, 1984, based on employment as an educational staff associate and converted to SERS you may maintain your SERS membership.** If you were enrolled in the PERS prior to June 7, 1984, based on employment as an educational staff associate, and were converted to SERS membership under RCW 41.40.750, you will remain in SERS unless you choose either to:

(a) Transfer your membership to TRS within the time limits established in RCW 41.32.032; or

(b) Terminate your membership in SERS Plan 2 by withdrawing your accumulated contributions.

**WAC 415-112-727 Retirement benefit options.** RCW 41.32.530 (Plan 1) (~~and~~), RCW 41.32.785 (Plan 2) and RCW 41.32.851 (Plan 3) enable the department to provide retiring members with four retirement benefit options. In addition, retiring Plan 1 members may select the COLA (cost-of-living adjustment) option. The retiring member must choose an option(s) when applying for service or disability retirement.

(1) **Benefit options without survivor feature.**

(a) Maximum benefit allowance. Plan 1 retirees may elect to receive the maximum benefit possible which is based

on a single life annuity. The maximum benefit allowance does not include a survivor allowance or beneficiary payment. When the retiree dies, all benefits cease. Any remaining balance in employee contributions is retained by the retirement system.

(b) Option One (standard allowance). The department pays a monthly retirement allowance based on a reduced single life annuity of the member, as provided in RCW 41.32.480 (Plan 1 - Service), RCW 41.32.550 (Plan 1 - Disability), RCW 41.32.765 (Plan 2 - Service), ((~~or~~)) RCW 41.32.790 (Plan 2 - Disability)((-)), RCW 41.32.875 (Plan 3 - Service), or RCW 41.32.880 (Plan 3 - Disability). Except for Plan 3, when the retiree dies, all benefits cease. Any remaining balance of the member's accumulated contributions will be paid to:

- (i) The retiree's designated beneficiary; or if none, to
- (ii) The retiree's surviving spouse; or if none, to
- (iii) The retiree's legal representative.

A member selecting Option One must designate a beneficiary at the time of retirement by filing a completed and notarized form provided by the department.

(2) **Benefit options with a survivor feature.** A retiring member is allowed to select from several retirement options which create an actuarially equivalent benefit that includes a survivor feature. The survivor feature entitles the survivor to receive a monthly allowance after the retiree dies. If the member chooses one of the survivor options, the monthly benefit the member will receive is actuarially reduced to offset the cost of the survivor feature. After the retiree dies, the department pays the survivor an allowance for the duration of his or her life. If the retiree and the survivor both die before the retiree's accumulated contributions are exhausted, the remaining balance is retained in the retirement fund.

(a) Option Two (joint and whole allowance). When the retiree dies, the department pays the survivor a retirement allowance equal to the gross monthly allowance received by the retiree.

(b) Option Three (joint and one-half allowance). When the retiree dies, the department pays the survivor an allow-

ance equal to one-half of the retiree's gross monthly retirement allowance.

(c) Option Four (joint and two-thirds allowance).

(i) This subsection applies to members retiring on or after January 1, 1996.

(ii) When the retiree dies, the department pays the survivor an allowance equal to two-thirds (66.667%) of the retiree's gross monthly retirement benefit allowance.

(3) If a member retires on or after June 6, 1996, the department is required to pay an ex-spouse survivor benefits pursuant to a marital dissolution order that complies with RCW 41.50.790.

**(4) Supplemental COLA option for Plan 1 members.** Retiring Plan 1 members may select an annual cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) option in addition to their choice of retirement benefit options listed above in subsections (1) and (2) of this section. Retiring members who choose this supplemental option will have their monthly retirement allowance actuarially reduced to offset the cost of annual adjustment.

**(5) Benefit increases when survivor predeceases retiree (pop-up provision).**

(a) This section applies to members retiring on or after January 1, 1996, who select Option Two, Three, or Four.

(b) Plan 1 members. If the survivor dies before the retiree, the retiree's monthly retirement allowance increases, effective the first day of the following month, to:

(i) The amount that would have been received had the retiree chosen the maximum benefit, minus;

(ii) Any reduction in the maximum allowance resulting from a withdrawal of contributions, plus;

(iii) Any cost-of-living adjustments the retiree received prior to the survivor's death based on the original option selection.

(c) Plan 2 and Plan 3 members. If the survivor dies before the retiree, the retiree's monthly retirement allowance increases, effective the first day of the following month, to:

(i) The amount that would have been received had the retiree chosen the standard allowance; plus

(ii) Any cost-of-living adjustments the retiree received prior to the survivor's death based on the original option selection.

(d) Pop-up recalculation example.

Plan One:

Lucinda retires from TRS Plan 1 in 1996 (Year 0) with \$55,000 in accumulated contributions. As a TRS 1 member she is allowed to withdraw some or all of her contributions when she retires. She decides to withdraw \$5,000 so she and Garth, her husband, can take a cruise. This will actuarially reduce Lucinda's maximum benefit from \$2,000 per month to \$1,963.86. Lucinda would also like Garth to receive a monthly allowance after she dies. Therefore, Lucinda chooses one of the benefit options with a survivor feature. As a result, her monthly allowance is further actuarially reduced from \$1,963.86 to \$1,846.03. Unfortunately, Garth dies in January 2001 (Year 5). Under the "pop-up" provision, Lucinda's monthly benefit will increase to \$1,963.86, the amount she would have received had she chosen the maximum benefit (after reduction for her withdrawals). If Lucinda selected the COLA option or if she has otherwise become eligible for a COLA, the accumulated COLAs (based on the prior benefit allowance) will be added to the \$1,963.86\*.

Plan Two:

Agnes retires from TRS Plan 2 in 1996 (Year 0). She would like Beatrice, her daughter, to receive a monthly allowance after Agnes dies. Therefore, Agnes selects a retirement benefit option with a survivor feature. As a result her monthly allowance is reduced from \$2,000 (standard allowance) to \$1,750. Unfortunately, Beatrice dies in January 2001 (Year 5). Under the "pop-up" provision, Agnes' monthly benefit will increase to the amount she would have received had she chosen Option One (standard allowance) plus her accumulated COLA's:

\*In the future (i.e., 2001 or Year 5), COLAs will be based on the increased benefit amount.

(e) If the survivor dies and the retiree's benefit increases under this section, and thereafter the retiree also dies before all contributions are exhausted, the remaining balance is retained by the retirement fund.

(6) Any retiree who retired before January 1, 1996, and who elected to receive a reduced retirement allowance under subsection (2) of this section is entitled to receive a retirement allowance adjustment if the retiree meets the following conditions:

(a) The retiree's designated beneficiary predeceases or has predeceased the retiree; and

(b) The retiree provides the department proper proof of the designated beneficiary's death. The retiree is not required to apply for the increased benefit provided in this subsection.

The adjusted retirement allowance will be effective on July 1, 1998, or the first day of the month following the date of death of the designated beneficiary, whichever comes last. The adjustment is computed as described in RCW 41.32.530

PROPOSED

(3)(c) for Plan 1 retirees or RCW 41.32.785 (3)(c) for Plan 2 retirees.

(7) **Survivor.** For the purposes of this provision, "survivor" means a person nominated by the member to receive a monthly benefit allowance after the member dies. A member nominates the survivor at the time of retirement by filing a completed and notarized form provided by the department.

  - (b) Plans 2 and 3: Average final compensation as defined in RCW 41.32.010(30);
- (4) **PERS:** Average final compensation as defined in RCW 41.40.010(17);
- (5) **LEOFF Plan 2:** Final average salary as defined in RCW 41.26.030 (12)(b); ((and))
- (6) **WSPRS:** Average final salary as defined in RCW 43.43.120; and
- (7) **SERS:** Average final compensation as defined in RCW 41.35.010(14).

**WAC 415-113-041 Am I a dual member?** You must meet all of the following criteria to be a dual member:

- (1) **You must be a member of a dual member system.** You must be a current member participant in at least one dual member system to be a dual member. You may have established dual member status if you are or were a member participant of a dual member system on or after:
  - (a) July 1, 1988, for current or former members of PERS, SERS, TRS, SCERS or WSPRS;
  - (b) July 25, 1993, for current or former members of LEOFF Plan ((H)) 2; or
  - (c) January 1, 1994, for current or former members of a first class city retirement system;
- (2) **You must be a former or current member of another dual member system.**
- (3) **You must not have been retired for service from a retirement system.** You are not a dual member if you have ever been retired for service from any retirement system administered by the department of retirement systems or a first class city retirement system.
- (4) **You must not be in receipt of a disability benefit from a dual member system.** If you are receiving a disabil-

ity retirement allowance or disability leave benefits from a dual member system or LEOFF Plan 1, you cannot be a dual member.

(a) If you have received a lump sum disability benefit from PERS Plan 2, SERS Plan 2 or 3, TRS Plan 2 or 3 or LEOFF Plan 2 you are in receipt of a disability benefit unless the department has found that you are no longer disabled.

(b) You are not receiving a disability retirement allowance or disability leave benefits if you:

(i) Previously received disability benefits and the department has subsequently found that you are no longer disabled, and has terminated your disability benefit; or

(ii) Retired for disability from service from WSPRS.

**Example 1:** A former PERS Plan 1 member who has never been retired and becomes a member participant in TRS Plan 2 through employment with a TRS employer becomes a dual member.

**WAC 415-113-042 Can I terminate my status as a dual member? Termination of dual member status—Reestablishing dual member status.** (1) **If you are not a member, you are not a dual member.** If you are no longer a member participant in any dual member system, you are no longer a dual member. If you later become a member of a dual member system, you again become a dual member.

**Example 2:** Upon separation from TRS Plan 2 eligible employment, the person in Example 1 in WAC 415-113-041 is no longer a member of TRS Plan 2 nor a dual member.

(2) **If you retire, you are no longer a dual member.** Upon retirement from any or all dual member systems, a person is no longer a dual member except for the purpose of receiving a deferred retirement allowance under RCW 41.54.030(3) and WAC 415-113-070.

(3) **If you are not a dual member, you may still be eligible for a multiple system benefit.** If you are no longer a dual member you may still be able to receive a multiple system benefit if otherwise eligible. The accrual date of your retirement allowance will vary depending upon the provisions of the particular system. You can find the accrual dates of different dual member systems in the following provisions:

(a) **PERS 1:** RCW 41.40.193;

(b) **PERS 2:** RCW 41.40.680;

(c) **TRS 1:** WAC 415-112-520;

(d) **TRS 2:** RCW 41.32.795;

(e) **TRS 3:** RCW 41.32.855;

(f) **LEOFF 2:** RCW 41.26.490;

(g) **SERS 2:** RCW 41.35.450;

(h) **SERS 3:** RCW 41.35.640.

(4) **Defined terms used.** Definitions for the following terms used in this section may be found in the sections listed.

(a) "Dual member" - RCW 41.54.010(4), WAC 415-113-041.

(b) "Dual member system" - WAC 415-113-0303.

(c) "Member participant" - WAC 415-113-0305.

**WAC 415-113-065 Can I substitute salary from one system to another? (1) You can substitute base salary between systems.**

(a) If you elect to retire with a multiple system benefit, you may substitute your base salary under one dual member system for your includable compensation in a second dual member system for purposes of computing a retirement allowance from the second system. Using the substituted salary, the department will compute your average compensation under each system's own requirements.

**Example 6:** At retirement, a person is a member participant in PERS Plan 2 and has prior creditable service in TRS Plan 1. Assume the multiple system retiree earned her highest compensation during her PERS Plan 2 service. The retiree's PERS Plan 2 retirement allowance will be based on her PERS Plan 2 average compensation. For purposes of computing her TRS average compensation and retirement allowance, she may substitute her PERS Plan 2 base salary earned over two consecutive fiscal years for her earnable compensation in TRS.

**Example 7:** At retirement, a person is a member participant in TRS Plan 1 and has prior creditable service in PERS Plan 1. Assume the multiple system retiree earned his highest compensation during his membership in TRS Plan 1. The retiree may substitute his base salary earned while a member in TRS Plan 1 for his PERS Plan 1 compensation earnable. However, because he may substitute only his base salary from TRS Plan 1 for his compensation earnable in PERS, his PERS average compensation will not include any cashout payments from his TRS employer.

(b) If you do not have sufficient service credit months in one dual member system to complete an average compensation period under that system, the department will substitute the appropriate number of months of base salary from another system to complete the average compensation period.

**Example 8:** A person who has creditable service in TRS Plan 1 and PERS Plan 2 retires at age sixty-five having accrued twenty-four months of service in PERS Plan 2. Under PERS Plan 2, a member's average compensation period is the member's highest consecutive sixty-month period of compensation. To compute the multiple system retiree's PERS Plan 2 retirement allowance, the

department will substitute her highest consecutive thirty-six service credit months of TRS base salary to complete the PERS sixty-month average compensation period.

(2) **Adjusted full-time salary is not base salary.** A multiple system retiree's adjusted full-time salary under RCW 41.32.345 shall not constitute base salary for purposes of computing the retiree's multiple system benefit.

(3) **Includable compensation defined.** For purposes of this chapter, "includable compensation" means:

(a) Earnable compensation under TRS Plan 1, 2 or 3 as defined in RCW 41.32.010(10);

(b) Compensation earnable under PERS Plan 1 or 2 as defined in RCW 41.40.010(8);

(c) Basic salary under LEOFF Plan 2 as defined in RCW 41.26.030 (13)(b); ~~(and)~~

(d) Monthly salary under WSPRS as used in RCW 43.43.120(15); and

(e) Compensation earnable under SERS Plan 2 or 3 as defined in RCW 41.35.010(6).

(4) **Defined terms used.** Definitions for the following terms used in this section may be found in the sections listed.

(a) "Average compensation" - WAC 415-113-0302.

(b) "Base salary" - RCW 41.54.010(1).

(c) "Dual member system" - WAC 415-113-0303.

(d) "Member participant" - WAC 415-113-0305.

(e) "Multiple system benefit" - WAC 415-113-0306.

(f) "Multiple system retiree" - WAC 415-113-0308.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending WSR 99-22-043, filed 10/29/99, effective 11/29/99)

**WAC 415-113-070 Can I defer my retirement allowance from a system if I retire with a multiple system benefit? (1) You may defer receipt of your retirement allowance.** If, by combining creditable service, you qualify to retire in one system but not in a second system, you must either:

(a) Receive an actuarially reduced retirement allowance from the second system; or

(b) Defer retirement in the second system until a later date of your choice. If you choose to begin receiving a retirement allowance from your second system before you are fully eligible, the benefit will be actuarially reduced.

(i) If you elect to defer retirement in the second system, you retain dual member status for the sole purpose of receiving a deferred multiple system benefit;

(ii) If you retire from all systems but elect to defer retirement in one dual member system under RCW 41.54.030(3), you may not subsequently withdraw accumulated contributions from that system.

(c) An actuarial reduction under (a) or (b) of this subsection, if applicable, will account for the difference between your age at the time you begin receiving the retirement allowance and the earliest age where you would be fully eligible based upon your combined service. "Fully eligible" means a person who has enough combined service to qualify for a retirement allowance from a dual member system without receiving a reduction for:

(i) Early retirement from a Plan 2 or Plan 3 system under RCW 41.40.630(2), ~~41.35.420(2), 41.35.680(2), 41.32.765(2), 41.32.875(2), 41.26.430(2);~~ or

(ii) Early retirement from a Plan 3 system under RCW 41.32.875(2); or

(iii) Retirement as a nonmember participant from WSPRS under RCW 43.43.280(2).

**(2) If you defer your retirement allowance and later reenter membership, you are no longer a dual member.**

If, after deferring retirement, you enter membership in a dual member system, your dual member status terminates. Once your dual member status terminates:

(a) You may only retire under the deferred system if eligible based solely upon that system's retirement eligibility criteria; and

(b) Your retirement allowance under the deferred system will be based solely upon service actually established in that system.

**Example 9:** A sixty-two year old dual member of PERS Plan 1 and TRS Plan 2 retires. He elects to receive PERS Plan 1 benefits but defer receipt of a TRS Plan 2 retirement allowance. If he becomes reemployed in a TRS Plan 2 eligible position, he will reenter TRS Plan 2 membership if otherwise eligible and terminate his dual member status, but he will continue to receive his PERS Plan 1 retirement allowance until he works more than the work-limit in a calendar year under WAC 415-108-710. The member's eligibility to retire from TRS Plan 2 will be based solely on his accrued service credit in TRS Plan 2 and his TRS Plan 2 retirement allowance will be based solely on his compensation while he was a member participant in TRS Plan 2.

**Example 10:** Assume the retiree in Example 9 above became reemployed in a PERS position rather than a TRS Plan 2 position. He could work in this position up to the work-limit in a calendar year under WAC 415-108-710 without having his PERS retirement allowance suspended. If the retiree works over the work-limit:

- The department would suspend his retirement allowance until the next calendar year. He would remain a dual member. He would be able to retire in TRS 2 if otherwise eligible;
- The retiree could elect to reenter PERS Plan 1 membership at any time, if otherwise eligible, and terminate his dual member status. His election for membership is not retroactive. The effect on the person's right to a TRS Plan 2 benefit is the same as in Example 9. See WAC 415-108-710.

**(3) If you defer your retirement allowance and die before you begin receiving the allowance, your survivor may receive a continuing benefit.** If you defer receipt of your retirement allowance from a system and die before you elect to begin receiving the allowance:

PROPOSED

(a) Your surviving spouse, if any, must elect to receive either:

(i) A joint and one hundred percent survivor option from the deferred system. If your surviving spouse selects this option, your base salary under one system may be substituted for your includable compensation in the deferred system to compute the survivor retirement allowance from the deferred system; or

(ii) A refund of your accumulated contributions from the deferred system.

(b) If you do not have a surviving spouse, the department will pay your accumulated contributions from the deferred system to:

(i) Your designated beneficiary or beneficiaries; or

(ii) Your estate, if there are no living beneficiaries.

(4) **Defined terms used.** Definitions for the following terms used in this section may be found in the sections listed.

(a) "Dual member system" - RCW 41.32.010(4), WAC 415-113-041.

(b) "Member participant" - WAC 415-113-0305.

(e) "Nonmember participant" - WAC 415-113-0309.

(f) "System" - RCW 41.54.010(6).

## NEW SECTION

**WAC 415-113-200 SERS and PERS concurrent employment.** For the purposes of this section and pursuant to RCW 41.35.005, 41.35.010, 41.40.010, and 41.54.100, "concurrent employment" refers to an individual who is employed simultaneously in an eligible SERS Plan 2 or Plan 3 position and an eligible PERS Plan 2 position.

If a member has been concurrently employed at any time, this section governs the calculation of service credit, average final compensation, and retirement benefits attributable to all periods of PERS employment, SERS employment, and concurrent employment.

(1) **Can I participate in SERS and PERS at the same time?** Yes, you may participate in SERS and PERS at the same time when employed concurrently in a PERS eligible position and a SERS eligible position. Your SERS employer will report your SERS eligible service in SERS. Your PERS employer will report your PERS eligible service in PERS.

(2) **Will the factors used to calculate my defined benefit be different because of concurrent employment in SERS and PERS?** No, the department will calculate your service credit and average final compensation as if all of your employment was reported in one system. These two factors are used to calculate your defined benefit.

(3) **Will the amount of my benefit be different because of concurrent employment?**

(a) If you are concurrently employed in SERS Plan 2 and PERS Plan 2, the amount of your benefit from SERS and PERS combined will be the same as if all of your service had been reported and you received a benefit in one system, because:

(i) SERS Plan 2 and PERS Plan 2 both use identical two-percent benefit formulas; and

(ii) Your total service credit and average final compensation will not be different than if all of your service had been reported in one system pursuant to subsection (2) of this section.

(b) If you are concurrently employed in SERS Plan 3 and PERS Plan 2, the amount of your benefit may be greater or less than if all of your service had been reported in one system:

(i) SERS Plan 3 uses a one-percent defined benefit formula and has a defined contribution component. You are responsible for the investment of your defined contribution component, which is subject to investment gains or losses; therefore, the dollar value of your total benefit may be greater or less than what you would have received if all of your service had been reported in one defined benefit system.

(ii) The allocation of your service credit while concurrently employed, as described in subsection (4) of this section, may also affect the dollar value of your benefit.

(4) **How is my service credit granted while concurrently employed?** As a concurrently employed member, you are entitled to exactly the same amount of service credit for your SERS and PERS service combined that you would have received had all of your service been reported in one system.

To calculate your service credit the department will:

(a) Combine your SERS and PERS service to determine the amount of service credit you would have earned had all of your service been reported in one system.

(b) Calculate and grant service credit in SERS based only on your reported SERS service.

(c) Calculate and grant service credit in PERS by subtracting the amount of service credit granted for SERS in (b) of this subsection from the amount of service credit calculated in (a) of this subsection that you would have earned had all of your service been reported in one system (see example 1):

(i) For any month that you receive one month of service credit in SERS for a calendar month of employment, you will not receive any PERS service credit in that month.

(ii) The combined service credit in SERS and PERS may not exceed one month of service for a calendar month of employment.

(d) Adjust the SERS service credit at the conclusion of each school year in accordance with the provisions of RCW 41.35.180. This adjustment may cause changes in the combined SERS/PERS service credit and/or changes in the PERS service credit. (See example 2).

**Example 1: Monthly computation of concurrent employment service credit.**

### Part-time SERS and part-time PERS.

(a) During a month, a member works 80 hours at a school district and 100 hours at a county. If all of the service had been reported in one system, the maximum the member could have earned is one service credit for that month. The member will be granted .5 service credit in SERS based on the 80 hours of service reported in SERS and will receive .5 service credit in PERS based on subtracting the .50 service

credit in SERS from the maximum of 1.00 service credit.

(b) During a month, a member works 65 hours at a school district and 30 hours at a county. If all of the service had been reported in one system, the maximum the member could have earned is one service credit for that month. The member will be granted .25 service credit in SERS based on the 65 hours of service reported in SERS and will receive .75 service credit in PERS based on subtracting the .25 service credit in SERS from the maximum of 1.00 service credit.

**Full-time SERS and part-time PERS.**

During a month, a member works 172 hours for an educational service district and works 30 hours for a state agency. If all of the service had been reported in one system, the maximum the member could have earned is one service credit for that month. The member will be granted one month of service credit in SERS based on the 172 hours of service reported in SERS and will receive 0.0 service credit in PERS (even though they worked 30 hours) based on subtracting the 1.00 service credit in SERS from the maximum of 1.00 service credit.

**Part-time SERS and full-time PERS.**

During a month, a member works 40 hours for a school district and 180 hours for a city. If all of the service had been reported in one system, the maximum the member could have earned is one service credit for that month. The member will be granted .25 service credit in SERS based on the 40 hours of service reported in SERS and will receive .75 service credit in PERS based on subtracting the .25 service credit in SERS from the maximum of 1.00 service credit.

**Example 2: Application of the educational service credit rules and the effects on concurrent employment service credit computation.**

During September, October, and November a member works 60 hours, 30 hours, and 70 hours in SERS and works 90 hours, 30 hours, and 60 hours in PERS, respectively. Based on these hours, the member would have been granted .25, .25, and .50 service credits in SERS and .75, 0.0, and .50 in PERS. The member's service credit calculated on a monthly basis through November is shown in Table 1 below.

At the end of the school year, the educational service credit rules (RCW 41.35.180) are applied. The application of these rules may cause one or more months of SERS service credit to change. A change in the SERS service credit for any given month may cause the combined SERS/PERS service credit to change. See Table 2, second line. The PERS service credit would then need to be recalculated for any month that the SERS service credit changed.

The members service for the entire school year is shown in Table 2 below. Applying the educational service credit rules, the member is now entitled to six service credit months in SERS for the school year (.50 in each month of September through August) based on working a total of 750 hours for the year. Thus, the service credit in September would be changed to .50 service credit in SERS and .50 credit in PERS. The service credit in October would be changed to .50 service credit in SERS and would remain at 0.0 service credit in PERS. November's service credit calculation is not affected by the application of the educational service credit rules.

(5) **How is my average final compensation calculated if I have been concurrently employed?** Your average final compensation will be calculated by combining all compensation earnable and service credit from all periods of SERS employment, PERS employment, and concurrent employment and then determining your highest consecutive sixty service credit months prior to your retirement, termination, or death. If an authorized leave occurs during the highest consecutive sixty service credit months, amounts earned during the period of leave will not be used in the calculation of average final compensation, except under RCW 41.40.710(2), 41.35.470(2) or 41.35.650(2).

(6) **How is my defined benefit in each system calculated?** A retirement allowance will be calculated using the appropriate formula for each system and plan as described in chapters 41.40 and 41.35 RCW, except that:

(a) The PERS service credit granted under subsection (4) of this section will be used in the PERS calculation and the SERS service credit granted under subsection (4) of this section will be used in the SERS calculation; and

(b) The average final compensation calculated under subsection (5) of this section will be used as the average final compensation for both PERS and SERS.

- (b) External investment manager and consultant costs; and
- (c) State investment board investment management operating expenses, in the case of investment options provided through the state investment board.

Each category of expense shall be expressed in terms of basis points. A basis point is equal to one-hundredth of one percent. The administrator will determine the participating member's monthly fee by multiplying the average monthly value of each participating member's self-directed account assets by the basis points for each expense category.

(2) **Adoption of expense charge.** The expense charges used to calculate self-directed investment fees for participating members shall be established in a memorandum of understanding, interagency agreement, and/or contract. Each expense charge shall be reviewed and approved at a regularly scheduled meeting of the employee retirement benefits board, with opportunity for public testimony. No expense charge may be included in a memorandum of understanding, interagency agreement, and/or contract until such charge has been approved by the employee retirement benefits board. No expense charge which has been approved may be changed unless such change has been approved by the board.

Areas 20B, 21A, 21B, 22A, 22B, 25A, and 25E.

(5) The following areas are closed from January 16 through April 15, except to dip bag net gear:

(a) Area 24A except for a year round closure in Swinomish Channel in those waters between the bridge spanning the channel south of La Conner and a line perpendicular to the channel at the northeast end of the La Conner boat basin, 24B, and 24D.

(b) Waters of Area 25C south of a line from Tala Point to Foulweather Bluff.

(c) Area 25D.

(d) Waters of Area 26B west of a line from Point Monroe to Point Jefferson.

(e) Area 26C.

(f) Waters of Area 26D north of a line from Neill Point to Piner Point.

(g) Waters of Area 27A north of a line from South Point to Lofall and contiguous waters of 27A south of a line projected true east from Hazel Point including all waters of Dabob and Quilcene Bays.

(h) Waters of Area 27B north of a line from Triton Head to Tekiu Point.

(i) Waters of Area 27C east of a line from Ayers Point to Union.

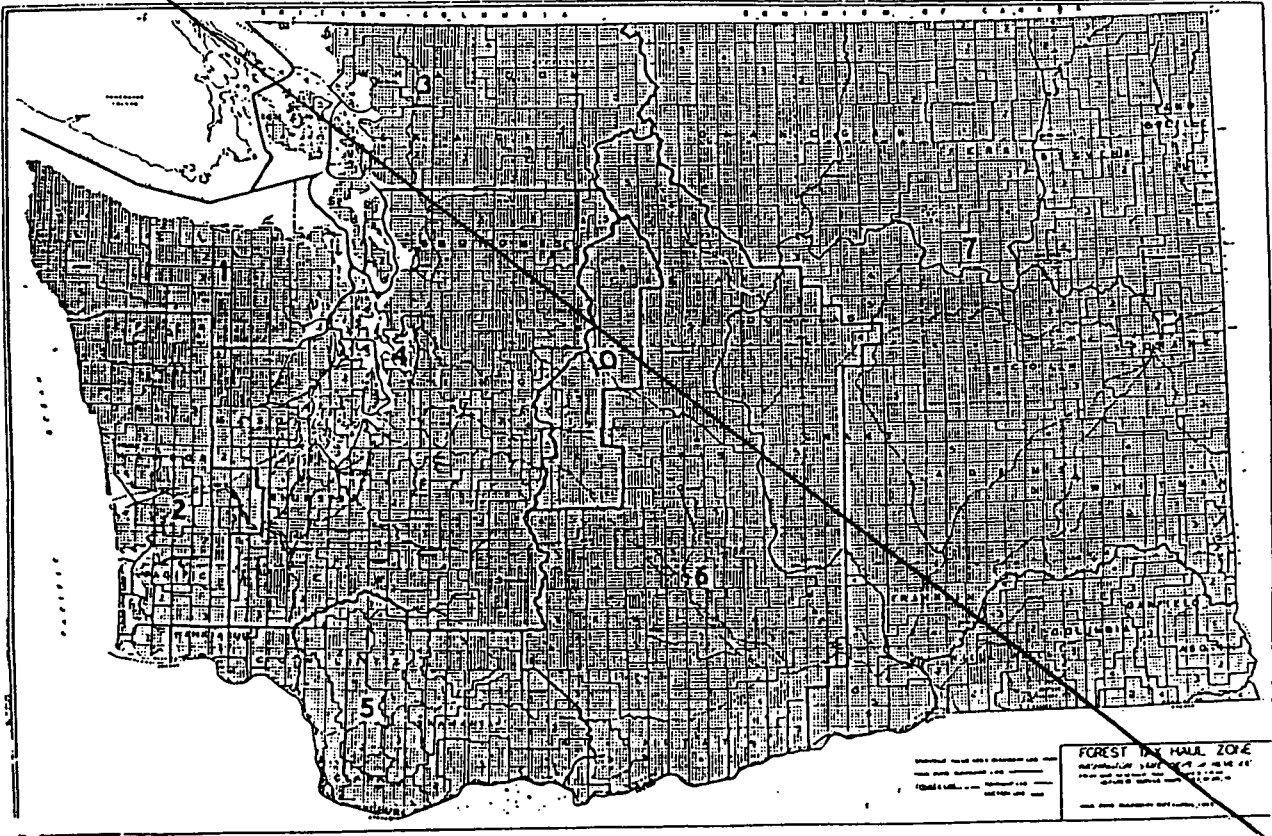

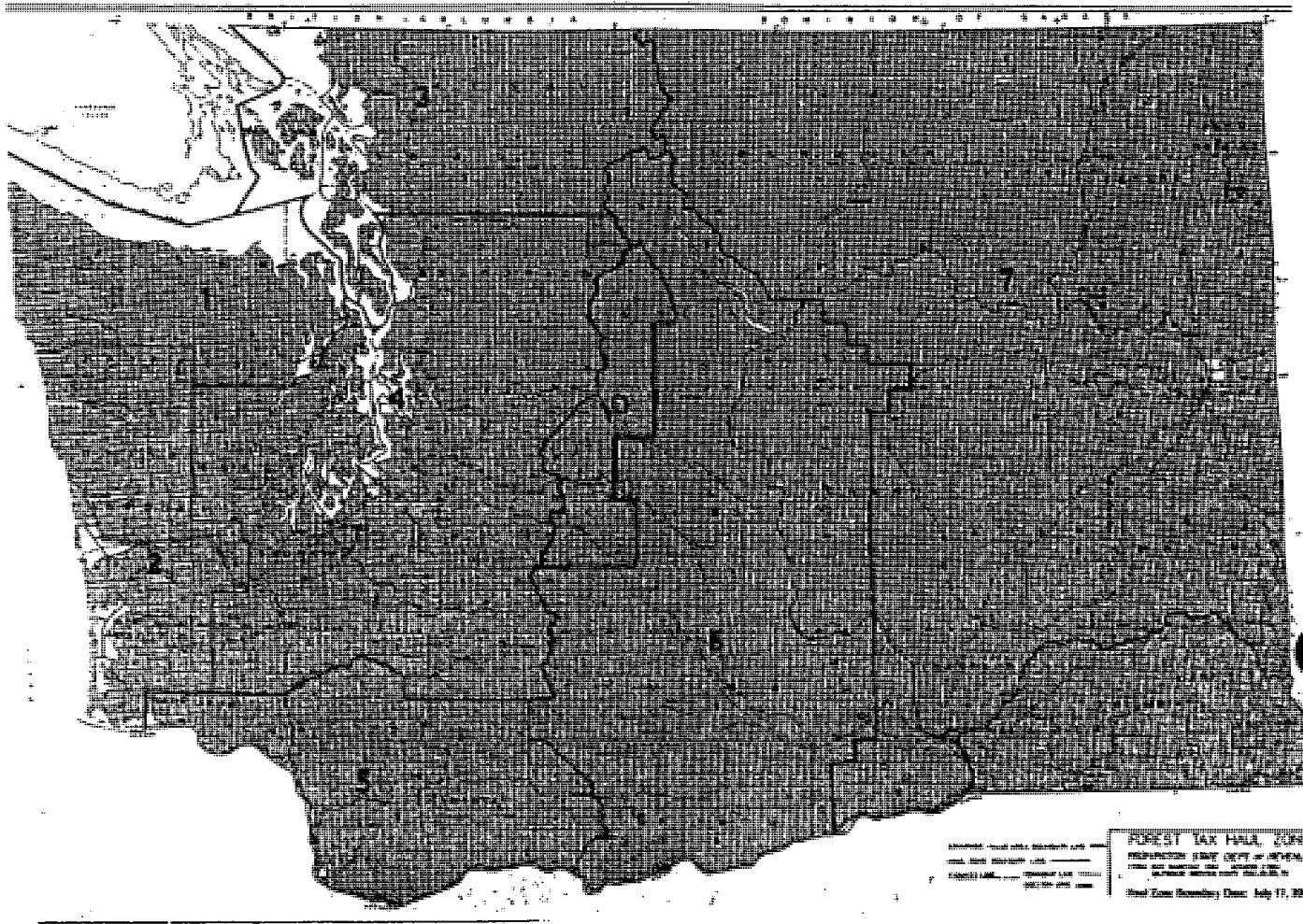

Purpose: RCW 84.33.091 requires that the stumpage value tables rule be revised twice annually. WAC 458-40-

660 is being amended to provide the proposed stumpage values for the first half of 2001. Large harvesters of timber use these values to calculate the timber excise tax on harvested timber. The damaged timber adjustment has been moved into the rule as part of a consolidation effort.

Statutory Authority for Adoption: RCW 82.32.300 and 84.33.096.

Statute Being Implemented: RCW 84.33.091, 82.32.060, and 84.33.077.

Summary: The rule contains eight tables of stumpage values. These eight tables represent the areas in the state in which timber is harvested. Each table breaks out the values

by timber species, quality, and a downward adjustment or hauling. The rule also contains two harvest adjustment tables for the volume per acre harvesting, logging conditions, remote island harvesting, damaged timber, and thinning. In addition, the rule also contains a domestic market adjustment table for some timber that is not sold by a competitive bidding process and prohibited from export.

Reasons Supporting Proposal: RCW 84.33.091 requires the values provided in this rule be revised twice a year. The damaged timber adjustment is moved to have it placed with other harvest adjustments.

Rule is not necessitated by federal law, federal or state court decision.

Explanation of Rule, its Purpose, and Anticipated Effects: The amendment of WAC 458-40-660 complies with RCW 84.33.091 that requires the department to publish stumpage values on a semiannual basis. The tables set out the amount that each species or subclassification of timber would sell for at a voluntary sale made in the ordinary course of business for purposes of immediate harvest for each stumpage value area. Timber harvesters, other than small harvesters, use the tables as a basis for calculating the amount of timber excise tax owed. In addition, the damaged timber provisions previously contained in WAC 458-40-670 have been clarified with some examples and moved into this rule. The provisions were moved to consolidate and simplify the chapter for taxpayers.

Proposal Changes the Following Existing Rules: Values are updated and the damaged timber adjustment in WAC 458-40-670 has been moved into this rule with clarifying examples. See Explanation of Rule above.

No small business economic impact statement has been prepared under chapter 19.85 RCW. A small business economic impact statement is not required because the rule and the proposed amendments do not impose any requirements or burdens upon small businesses that are not already specifically required by statute.

RCW 34.05.328 applies to this rule adoption. These are significant legislative rules pursuant to RCW 34.05.328 (5)(a)(i).

(3) **Harvest value adjustments.** The stumpage values in subsection (2) of this rule for the designated stumpage value areas are adjusted for various logging and harvest conditions, subject to the following:

(a) No harvest adjustment is allowed for special forest products, chipwood, or small logs.

(b) Conifer and hardwood stumpage value rates cannot be adjusted below one dollar per MBF.

(c) Except for the timber yarded by helicopter, a single logging condition adjustment applies to the entire harvest unit. The taxpayer must use the logging condition adjustment class that applies to a majority (more than 50%) of the acreage in that harvest unit. If the harvest unit is reported over more than one quarter, all quarterly returns for that harvest unit must report the same logging condition adjustment. The helicopter adjustment applies only to the timber volume from the harvest unit that is yarded from stump to landing by helicopter.

(d) The volume per acre adjustment is a single adjustment class for all quarterly returns reporting a harvest unit. A harvest unit is established by the harvester prior to harvesting. The volume per acre is determined by taking the volume logged from the unit excluding the volume reported as chipwood or small logs and dividing by the total acres logged. Total acres logged does not include leave tree areas (RMZ, UMZ, forested wetlands, etc.,) over 2 acres in size.

(e) A domestic market adjustment applies to timber which meet the following criteria:

(i) **Public timber**—Harvest of timber not sold by a competitive bidding process that is prohibited under the authority of state or federal law from foreign export may be eligible for the domestic market adjustment. The adjustment may be applied only to those species of timber that must be processed domestically. According to type of sale, the adjustment may be applied to the following species:

Federal Timber Sales: All species except Alaska-cedar. (Stat. Ref. - 36 C.F.R. 223.10)

State, and Other Nonfederal, Public Timber Sales: Western Redcedar only. (Stat. Ref. - 50 U.S.C. appendix 2406.1)

(ii) **Private timber**—Harvest of private timber that is legally restricted from foreign export, under the authority of The Forest Resources Conservation and Shortage Relief Act (Public Law 101-382), (16 U.S.C. Sec. 620 et seq.); the Export Administration Act of 1979 (50 U.S.C. App. 2406(i)); a Cooperative Sustained Yield Unit Agreement made pursuant to the act of March 29, 1944 (16 U.S.C. Sec. 583-583i); or Washington Administrative Code (WAC 240-15-015(2)) is also eligible for the Domestic Market Adjustment.

(4) Damaged timber. Timber harvesters planning to remove timber from areas having damaged timber may apply to the department of revenue for an adjustment in stumpage values. The application must contain a map with the legal descriptions of the area, an accurate estimate of the volume of damaged timber to be removed, a description of the damage sustained by the timber with an evaluation of the extent to which the stumpage values have been materially reduced from the values shown in the applicable tables, and a list of estimated additional costs to be incurred resulting from the removal of the damaged timber. The application must be received and approved by the department of revenue before the harvest commences. Upon receipt of an application, the department of revenue will determine the amount of adjustment to be applied against the stumpage values. Timber that has been damaged due to sudden and unforeseen causes may qualify.

(a) Sudden and unforeseen causes of damage that qualify for consideration of an adjustment include:

(i) Causes listed in RCW 84.33.091; fire, blow down, ice storm, flood.

(ii) Others not listed; volcanic activity, earthquake.

(b) Causes that do not qualify for adjustment include:

(i) Animal damage, root rot, mistletoe, prior logging, insect damage, normal decay from fungi, and pathogen caused diseases; and

(ii) Any damage that can be accounted for in the accepted normal scaling rules through volume or grade reductions.

(c) The department of revenue will not grant adjustments for applications involving timber that has already been harvested but will consider any remaining undisturbed damaged timber scheduled for removal if it is properly identified.

(d) The department of revenue will notify the harvester in writing of approval or denial. Instructions will be included for taking any adjustment amounts approved.

(3) Each county prepares and submits a final prospectus to the county road administration board;

(4) For each final prospectus submitted, county road administration board staff computes the total priority rating score and assembles all projects into rank-ordered arrays by region; and

(5) The county road administration board reviews the rank-ordered arrays in each region and, based upon the RATA funds projected to be ~~((available))~~ allocable for the next project program period (see WAC 136-161-070), selects and approves specific projects for RATA funding.

**WAC 136-161-070 RAP program cycle—Selection and approval of projects for RATA funding.** (1) At its last regular meeting before the beginning of each biennium, the

county road administration board will select projects and allocate anticipated RATA funds to projects in each region. The preliminary priority arrays as developed in WAC 136-161-060 will be updated to exclude any county which is ineligible under chapter 136-150 WAC, and projects will be selected from these arrays. Selections will be made in each region in declining priority rank order, provided that:

(a) No county shall be allocated RATA funds in excess of its regional county limit as specified in WAC 136-161-080; and

(b) Any projects which were partially funded in the prior biennium shall, unless otherwise requested by the county, be fully funded before new projects are selected. Ties in total rating points will be broken by the county road administration board in favor of the county having the lesser total amount of previously allocated RATA funds.

(2) The statewide net amount of RATA funds available for allocation to projects in the project program period will be based on the most recent state fuel tax revenue forecast prepared quarterly by the department of transportation, less estimated administrative costs, and less any amounts set aside for emergent projects as described in WAC 136-163-020. The total amount of RATA funds available for allocation to projects in a region (i.e., "forecasted regional apportionment amount") will be based on the regional apportionment percentages of the statewide net amount as determined in chapter 136-100 WAC.

(3) For the biennium beginning July 1, 1995, the project program period will be the next four state fiscal years (1996, 1997, 1998 and 1999, beginning July 1, 1995, and ending June 30, 1999). For the biennium beginning July 1, 1997, the project program period will begin July 1, 1999 and end June 30, 2001. ~~((For each biennium thereafter, the project program period will be two years in length, beginning and ending two years later than the preceding project program period.))~~

(4) The RATA amounts allocated to projects in the first year of the biennium are limited to no more than ninety percent of the net amount estimated to be ~~((available))~~ allocable to each region for the project program period, with the remaining ~~((ten percent))~~ percentage allocated at such time as deemed appropriate by the county road administration board.

(5) Acceptance of the RATA allocation for a project by the full execution of a CRAB/county contract as described in chapter 136-170 WAC constitutes agreement to complete the project in compliance with the scope, design and project limits in the final prospectus. (a) The contract shall be valid and binding, and the county shall be entitled to receive RATA funding in accordance with the vouchering/payment process as described in chapter 136-180 WAC, only if the contract is properly signed and returned to the county road administration board within forty-five calendar days of its mailing by the county road administration board.

(b) The county certifies that it is in compliance with the provisions of chapter 136-150 WAC.

(c) The project will be constructed in accordance with the scope, design and project limits as described in the final prospectus and in accordance with the plans and specifications approved by the county engineer.

(d) The county will notify the county road administration board when a construction contract has been awarded and/or when construction has commenced, and when the project has been completed.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending Order 99-06, filed 11/18/99, effective 12/19/99)

**WAC 182-25-010 Definitions.** The following definitions apply throughout these rules.

(1) "Administrator" means the administrator of the Washington state health care authority (HCA) or designee.

(2) "Appeal procedure" means a formal written procedure for resolution of problems or concerns raised by enrollees which cannot be resolved in an informal manner to the enrollee's satisfaction.

(3) "Basic health plan" (or BHP) means the system of enrollment and payment ~~((on a prepaid capitated basis))~~ for basic health care services administered by the administrator through managed health care systems.

(4) "BHP plus" means the program of expanded benefits available to children through coordination between the department of social and health services (DSHS) and basic health plan. Eligibility for BHP Plus is determined by the department of social and health services, based on Medicaid eligibility criteria. To be eligible for the program children must be under age nineteen, with a family income at or below two hundred percent of federal poverty level, as defined by the United States Department of Health and Human Services. They must be Washington state residents, not eligible for Medicare, and may be required to meet additional DSHS eligibility requirements.

(5) "Co-payment" means a payment indicated in the schedule of benefits which is made by an enrollee to a health care provider or to the MHCS.

(6) "Covered services" means those services and benefits in the BHP schedule of benefits (as outlined in the member handbook issued to the enrollee, or to a subscriber on behalf of the enrollee), which an enrollee shall be entitled to receive from a managed health care system in exchange for payment of premium and applicable co-payments.

(7) "Disenrollment" means the termination of covered services in BHP for a subscriber and dependents, if any.

(8) "Effective date of enrollment" means the first date, as established by BHP, on which an enrollee is entitled to receive covered services from the enrollee's respective managed health care system.

(9) "Dependent" means:

PROPOSED

(a) The subscriber's lawful spouse, not legally separated, who resides with the subscriber; or

(b) The unmarried child of the subscriber or the subscriber's dependent spouse, whether by birth, adoption, legal guardianship, or placement pending adoption, who is:

(i) Younger than age nineteen, and who has not been relinquished for adoption by the subscriber or the subscriber's dependent spouse; or

(ii) Younger than age twenty-three, and a registered student at an accredited secondary school, college, university, technical college, or school of nursing, attending full time, other than during holidays, summer and scheduled breaks; or

(c) A person of any age who is under legal guardianship of the subscriber or the subscriber's dependent spouse, and who is incapable of self-support due to disability.

(10) "Eligible full-time employee" means an employee who meets all eligibility requirements in WAC 182-25-030 and who is regularly scheduled to work thirty or more hours per week for an employer. The term includes a self-employed individual (including a sole proprietor or a partner of a partnership, and may include an independent contractor) if the individual:

(a) Is regularly scheduled to work thirty hours or more per week; and

(b) Derives at least seventy-five percent of his or her income from a trade or business that is licensed to do business in Washington.

Persons covered under a health benefit plan pursuant to the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1986 shall not be considered eligible employees for purposes of minimum participation requirements.

(11) "Eligible part-time employee" means an employee who meets all the criteria in subsection (10) of this section, but who is regularly scheduled to work fewer than thirty hours per week for an employer.

(12) "Employee" means one who is in the employment of an employer, as defined by RCW 50.04.080.

(13) "Employer" means an enterprise licensed to do business in Washington state, as defined by RCW 50.04.080, with employees in addition to the employer, whose wages or salaries are paid by the employer.

(14) "Enrollee" means a person who meets all eligibility requirements, who is enrolled in BHP, and for whom applicable premium payments have been made.

(15) "Family" means an individual or an individual and spouse, if not legally separated, and dependents. For purposes of eligibility determination and enrollment in the plan, an individual cannot be a member of more than one family.

(16) "Financial sponsor" means a person, organization or other entity, approved by the administrator, that is responsible for payment of all or a designated portion of the monthly premiums on behalf of a subscriber and any dependents.

(17) "Gross family income" means total cash receipts, as defined in (a) of this subsection, before taxes, from all sources, for subscriber and dependents whether or not they are enrolled in BHP, with the exceptions noted in (b) of this subsection.

(a) Income includes:

(i) Money wages, tips and salaries before any deductions;

(ii) Net receipts from nonfarm self-employment (receipts from a person's own unincorporated business, professional enterprise, or partnership, after deductions for business expenses);

(iii) Net receipts from farm self-employment (receipts from a farm which one operates as an owner, renter, or sharecropper, after deductions for farm operating expenses);

(iv) Regular payments from Social Security, railroad retirement, unemployment compensation, strike benefits from union funds, workers' compensation, veterans' payments, public assistance, alimony, child support, military family allotments, private pensions, government employee pensions (including military retirement pay), and regular insurance or annuity payments;

(v) Work study or training stipends;

(vi) Dividends and interest accessible to the enrollee without a penalty;

(vii) Net rental income, net royalties, periodic receipts from estates or trusts, and net gambling or lottery winnings.

(b) Income does not include the following types of money received:

(i) Capital gains;

(ii) Any assets drawn down as withdrawals from a bank, the sale of property, a house or a car;

(iii) Tax refunds, gifts, loans, lump-sum inheritances, one-time insurance payments, or compensation for injury (except workers' compensation);

(iv) Noncash benefits, such as the employer-paid or union-paid portion of health insurance or other employee fringe benefits, food or housing received in lieu of wages, the value of food and fuel produced and consumed on farms, the imputed value of rent from owner-occupied nonfarm or farm housing, and such noncash benefit programs as Medicare, Medicaid, food stamps, school lunches, and housing assistance;

(v) Income earned by dependent children;

(vi) Income of a family member who resides in another household when such income is not available to the subscriber or dependents seeking enrollment in BHP;

(vii) College or university scholarships, grants, fellowships and assistantships;

(viii) Payments from the department of social and health services adoption support program authorized under RCW 26.33.320 and 74.13.100 through 74.13.145;

(ix) Documented child care expenses for the care of a dependent child of a subscriber may be deducted (at a rate set by the administrator and consistent with Internal Revenue Service requirements) when calculating gross family income. To qualify for this deduction, the subscriber must be employed during the time the child care expenses were paid, and payment may not be paid to a parent or step parent of the child or to a dependent child of the subscriber or his/her spouse.

(18) "Home care agency" means a private or public agency or organization that administers or provides home care services directly or through a contract arrangement to ill, disabled, or infirm persons in places of temporary or permanent residence, and is licensed by the department of social and health services (DSHS) as a home care agency. In order to qualify, the agency must be under contract with one of the

following DSHS programs: Chore, Medicaid Personal Care, Community Options Program Entry System (COPES) or Respite Care (up to level three).

(19) "Institution" means a federal, state, county, city or other government correctional or detention facility or government-funded facility where health care historically has been provided and funded through the budget of the operating agency, and includes, but is not limited to: Washington state department of corrections institutions; federal, county and municipal government jail and detention institutions; Washington state department of veterans affairs soldiers' and veterans' homes; department of social and health services state hospitals and facilities and juvenile rehabilitation institutions and group homes. An institution does not include: Educational institutions; government-funded acute health care or mental health facilities except as provided above; chemical dependency facilities; and nursing homes.

(20) "Institutionalized" means to be confined, voluntarily or involuntarily, by court order or health status, in an institution, as defined in subsection (19) of this section. This does not include persons on work release or who are residents of higher education institutions, acute health care facilities, alcohol and chemical dependency facilities, or nursing homes.

(21) "Insurance broker" or "agent" means a person who is currently licensed as a disability insurance broker or agent, according to the laws administered by the office of the insurance commissioner under chapter 48.17 RCW.

(22) "Managed health care system" (or "MHCS") means:

(a) Any health care organization (including health care providers, insurers, health care service contractors, health maintenance organizations, or any combination thereof) which has entered into a contract with the HCA to provide basic health care services; or

(b) A self-funded or self-insured method of providing insurance coverage to subsidized enrollees provided under RCW 41.05.140 and subject to the limitations under RCW 70.47.100(7).

(23) "Maternity benefits through medical assistance," also known as S-Medical, means the coordinated program between BHP and DSHS for eligible pregnant women. This program includes all Medicaid benefits, including maternity coverage. Eligible members must be at or below one hundred eighty-five percent of the federal poverty level. Eligibility for this program is determined by DSHS, based on Medicaid eligibility criteria.

(24) "Medicaid" means the Title XIX Medicaid program administered by the department of social and health services, and includes the medical care programs provided to the "categorically needy" and the "medically needy" as defined in chapter 388-503 WAC.

(25) "Medicare" means programs established by Title XVIII of Public Law 89-97, as amended, "Health Insurance for the Aged and Disabled."

(26) "Nonsubsidized enrollee" or "full premium enrollee" means an individual who enrolls in BHP, as the subscriber or dependent, and who pays or on whose behalf is paid the full costs for participation in BHP, without subsidy from the HCA.

(27) "Open enrollment" means a time period designated by the administrator during which enrollees may enroll additional dependents or apply to transfer their enrollment from one managed health care system to another.

(28) "Participating employee" means an employee of a participating employer or home care agency who has met all the eligibility requirements and has been enrolled for coverage under BHP.

(29) "Participating employer" means an employer who has been approved for enrollment in BHP as an employer group.

(30) "Preexisting condition" means any illness, injury or condition for which, in the three months immediately preceding an enrollee's effective date of enrollment in BHP:

(a) Treatment, consultation or a diagnostic test was recommended for or received by the enrollee; or

(b) The enrollee was prescribed or recommended medication; or

(c) Symptoms existed which would ordinarily cause a reasonably prudent individual to seek medical diagnosis, care or treatment.

(31) "Premium" means a periodic payment, based upon gross family income and determined under RCW 70.47.060(2), which an individual, their employer or a financial sponsor makes to BHP for subsidized or nonsubsidized enrollment in BHP.

(32) "Program" means subsidized BHP, nonsubsidized BHP, BHP Plus, or maternity benefits through medical assistance.

(33) "Provider" or "health care provider" means a health care professional or institution duly licensed and accredited to provide covered services in the state of Washington.

(34) "Rate" means the ((per capita)) amount, including administrative charges and any applicable premium and prepayment tax imposed under RCW 48.14.020, negotiated by the administrator with and paid to a managed health care system, to provide BHP health care benefits to enrollees.

(35) "Schedule of benefits" means the basic health care services adopted and from time to time amended by the administrator, which an enrollee shall be entitled to receive from a managed health care system in exchange for payment of premium and applicable co-payments, as described in the member handbook.

(36) "Service area" means the geographic area served by a managed health care system as defined in its contract with HCA.

(37) "Subscriber" is a person who applies to BHP on his/her own behalf and/or on behalf of his/her dependents, if any, who meets all applicable eligibility requirements, is enrolled in BHP, and for whom the monthly premium has been paid. Notices to a subscriber and, if applicable, a financial sponsor or employer shall be considered notice to the subscriber and his/her enrolled dependents.

(38) "Subsidized enrollee" or "reduced premium enrollee" means an individual who enrolls in BHP, either as the subscriber or an eligible dependent, whose current gross family income does not exceed twice the federal poverty level as adjusted for family size and determined annually by the federal Department of Health and Human Services, and who receives a premium subsidy from the HCA. To the

extent that state funds are specifically appropriated for this purpose, with a corresponding federal match, "subsidized enrollee" also means an individual who enrolls in BHP, either as the subscriber or an eligible dependent, whose current gross family income is more than two hundred percent, but less than two hundred fifty-one percent, of the federal poverty level as adjusted for family size and determined annually by the federal Department of Health and Human Services, and who receives a premium subsidy from the HCA.

(39) "Subsidy" means the difference between the amount of periodic payment the HCA makes to a managed health care system on behalf of a subsidized enrollee, and the amount determined to be the subsidized enrollee's responsibility under RCW 70.47.060(2).

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending Order 99-06, filed 11/18/99, effective 12/19/99)

**WAC 182-25-030 Eligibility.** (1) To be eligible for enrollment in BHP, an individual must be a Washington state resident who is not:

(a) Eligible for free Medicare coverage or eligible to buy Medicare coverage; or

(b) Institutionalized at the time of enrollment.

(2) Persons not meeting these criteria, as evidenced by information submitted on the application for enrollment or otherwise obtained by BHP, will not be enrolled. An enrollee who is no longer a Washington resident, who becomes eligible for free or purchased Medicare, or who is later determined to have failed to meet BHP's eligibility criteria at the time of enrollment, will be disenrolled from the plan as provided in WAC 182-25-090. An enrollee who was not confined to an institution at the time of enrollment, who is subsequently confined to an institution, will not be disenrolled, provided he or she remains otherwise eligible and continues to make all premium payments when due.

(3) Eligibility for BHP Plus and maternity benefits through medical assistance is determined by DSHS, based on Medicaid eligibility criteria.

(4) For subsidized enrollment in BHP, an individual must meet the eligibility criteria in subsection (1) of this section (~~(- have a gross family income that does not exceed two hundred percent of federal poverty level as adjusted for family size and determined annually by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services)) and the definition of "subsidized enrollee" in WAC 182-25-010(38), and must pay, or have paid on his or her behalf, the monthly BHP premium.~~

(5) To be eligible for nonsubsidized enrollment in BHP, an individual may have any income level, must meet the eligibility criteria in subsection (1) of this section, and must pay, or have paid on their behalf, the full costs for participation in BHP, including the cost of administration, without subsidy from the HCA.

(6)(a) An individual otherwise eligible for enrollment in BHP may be denied enrollment if the administrator has determined that acceptance of additional enrollment would exceed limits established by the legislature, would jeopardize the orderly development of BHP, or would result in an overexpenditure of BHP funds. An individual otherwise eligible for enrollment in either the subsidized or nonsubsidized program

may also be denied enrollment if no MHCS is accepting new enrollment in that program or from the geographic area where the applicant lives.

(b) If the administrator closes or limits subsidized enrollment, to the extent funding is available, BHP will continue to accept and process applications for enrollment from:

(i) Applicants who will pay the full premium, provided at least one MHCS is accepting new nonsubsidized enrollment from the geographic area where the applicant lives;

(ii) Children eligible for BHP Plus;

(iii) Children eligible for subsidized BHP, who were referred to DSHS for BHP Plus coverage, but were found ineligible for BHP Plus for reasons other than noncompliance;

(iv) Employees of a home care agency group enrolled or applying for coverage under WAC 182-25-060;

(v) Eligible individual home care providers;

(vi) Licensed foster care workers;

(vii) Limited enrollment of new employer groups; and

(viii) Subject to availability of funding, additional space for enrollment may be reserved for other applicants as determined by the administrator, in order to ensure continuous coverage and service for current individual and group accounts. (For example: Within established guidelines, processing routine income changes that may affect subsidy eligibility for current enrollees; adding new family members to an existing account; transferring enrollees between group and individual accounts; restoring coverage for enrollees who are otherwise eligible for continued enrollment under WAC 182-25-090 after a limited suspension of coverage due to late payment or other health care coverage; adding newly hired employees to an existing employer group; or adding new or returning members of federally recognized native American tribes to that tribe's currently approved financial sponsor group.)

(c) If the administrator has closed or limited subsidized enrollment, applicants for subsidized BHP who are not in any of the categories in (b) of this subsection may reserve space on a reservation list to be processed according to the date the reservation or application is received by BHP. When enrollment is reopened by the administrator, applicants whose names appear on the reservation list will be notified by BHP of the opportunity to enroll. BHP may require new application forms and documentation from applicants on the reservation list, or may contact applicants to verify continued interest in applying, prior to determining their eligibility.

Title of Rule: Standards for the certification of handlers of organic food.



Purpose: Chapter 16-164 WAC provides standards for identifying, storing, handling and labeling of organic food products. The rule includes the requirements for organic food handler certification including record-keeping requirements, use of post-harvest materials, inspection, sampling and fee schedules.

Statutory Authority for Adoption: Chapter 15.86 RCW.  
Statute Being Implemented: Chapter 15.86 RCW.

Summary: The proposed amendments to chapter 16-164 WAC update the organic handling standards. The amendments include new definitions to improve the clarity of the rule, an update of the application and certification requirements, and additional provisions concerning the requirements for handling organic food products.

Reasons Supporting Proposal: Applicants to the organic food program will benefit from the rule update and from the clarification of the definitions, organic handling standards, materials that are approved and prohibited for use in handling organic food products, and record-keeping requirements. Consumers will benefit by the increase in the integrity of organic food products.

Name of Proponent: Organic Food Program, Washington State Department of Agriculture, governmental.

Rule is not necessitated by federal law, federal or state court decision.

Explanation of Rule, its Purpose, and Anticipated Effects: The standards for the certification of handlers of organic food, chapter 16-164 WAC, are designed to protect the integrity of organic food products. The rules include the requirements for the identification, storage, labeling, record-keeping and handling of organic food products. The rules specify the postharvest materials that are approved and prohibited in handling organic food products. The process for applying for organic food handler certification, the inspection and sampling procedures, the criteria for granting certification, and the fee schedule are all included within the rule.

The Washington State Department of Agriculture (WSDA) Organic Advisory Board has been working with organic food program staff, for the last few years, to develop the proposed amendments. The WSDA Organic Advisory Board utilized the United States Department of Agriculture's National Organic Standards Board and the Organic Trade Association's American Organic Standards as a basis for the proposed changes. The amendments are being proposed so that Washington's organic standards are aligned with these national organic standards. The amendments will increase consumer protection by increasing the integrity of organic food products. The amendments will also help to maintain domestic and international market acceptance for Washington organic food products.

Proposal Changes the Following Existing Rules: **Introduction:** The standards for the certification of handlers of organic food, chapter 16-164 WAC, are designed to protect the integrity of organic food products. The rules include the requirements for the identification, storage, labeling, record-keeping and handling of organic food products. The rules

specify the postharvest materials that are approved and prohibited in handling organic food products. The process for applying for organic food handler certification, the inspection and sampling procedures, the criteria for granting certification and the fee schedule are all included within the rule.

The WSDA Organic Advisory Board has been working with organic food program staff, for the last few years, to develop the proposed amendments. The WSDA Organic Advisory Board utilized the United States Department of Agriculture's National Organic Standards Board and the Organic Trade Association's American Organic Standards as a basis for the proposed changes. The amendments are being proposed so that Washington's organic standards are aligned with these national organic standards.

**Notes on Amendments:** WAC 16-164-010 Purpose, this section is amended to clarify that organic food handlers include produce distributors, grocery distributors, fruit packers, marketing companies, brokers, warehouses and retailers.

WAC 16-164-020 Definitions, adds definitions for commingling, container, EPA's List 4, handle, label, labeling, new applicant, renewal applicant and retail facility. Amends the definition of handler, organic food product, and prohibited. Deletes the definition of packer.

WAC 16-164-030 Organic certification of handlers, including packers and vendors, this section has been repealed as it is no longer needed.

WAC 16-164-035 Application for certification, this section has been amended to clarify that all facilities that handle organic food products must be certified except for retailers. It clarifies that retailers may obtain certification under this chapter. The section specifies the components of the organic handling plan. The organic handling plan includes a flow chart, a list of postharvest materials, a description of record-keeping system used, the pest management program, and copies of labels used by the handler.

WAC 16-164-037 Confidentiality, this is a new section that clarifies that business related information is exempt from public disclosure.

WAC 16-164-040 Organic handler standards, the standards are updated and revised. The standards are changed to prohibit storing of organic food products with diphenylamine or thiabendazole treated food. The standards prohibit stacking wet nonorganic food products on top of organic food products. The standards require the use of potable water. The standards require all containers to be new, designated for organic use only or completely emptied and cleaned. The standards prohibit commingling of organic with nonorganic food products. The standards specify approved and prohibited pest control practices. The standards specify handling requirements for preparing organic food products for retail sale. The standards specify how organic food products can be identified and displayed.

WAC 16-164-050 Postharvest materials and practices, this section approves the use of acetic acid, ascorbic acid, biological control organisms, ozone, periacetic acid, microorganisms and restricted use of cleansers and chlorine compounds. This section prohibits the use of irradiation and quaternary ammonium compounds on food bearing surfaces.

WAC 16-164-055 Labels, labeling and market information, this is a new section that specifies how handlers can label and represent organic food products in order to ensure that organic food products are accurately and clearly labeled so as not to mislead consumers.

WAC 16-164-060 Record-keeping requirements, this section is amended to simplify the record-keeping requirements. The proposed changes will require handlers to (1) track organic food products from receiving through shipping, (2) maintain copies of organic certificates, and (3) clearly identify products as organic on record-keeping documents.

WAC 16-164-070 Inspections, no changes.

WAC 16-164-080 Sampling, there is a minor change to allow organic food products to be tested for both pesticide residues and other contaminants.

WAC 16-164-085 Certification, this is a new section that clarifies the conditions for certification.

WAC 16-164-090 Decertification, this section is amended to specify that refusing an inspection is a violation of the standards and may result in decertification.

WAC 16-164-100 Fee schedule, this section has been amended to distinguish between new applicants and renewal applicants. New applicants are charged a new applicant fee of \$75 that covers the additional administrative costs associated with processing new applications. The fee schedule is edited to provide clarity.

WAC 16-164-110 Organic food handler certification logo, this new section includes a logo that may be used by WSDA certified organic handlers of organic food products.

A small business economic impact statement has been prepared under chapter 19.85 RCW.

#### Small Business Economic Impact Statement

**Introduction:** Standards for the certification of handlers of organic food, chapter 16-164 WAC, provides the certification procedures and requirements for handlers of organic food products. The standards specify application, inspection, sampling, certification and decertification procedures as well as the requirements for the handling, storage, labeling, recordkeeping, and use of the WSDA organic food logo. Standards also specify the fee structure for fees charged to applicants for the application and certification services.

**Purpose for the Rule Amendment:** The purpose for the proposed amendments to chapter 16-164 WAC is to clarify and strengthen the rules for the handling of organic food products and provide harmonization with national and international organic food standards.

**Businesses Affected by the Rule Amendment:** Chapter 16-164 WAC affects all individuals and businesses that handle organic food in Washington state. Handlers are defined as any person who sells, arranges the sale, represents, or packs organic food products. Handlers include produce distributors, grocery distributors, fruit packers, food marketing companies, food brokers, food warehouses, and retail food stores. The department currently certifies one hundred thirteen handlers of organic food in the state of Washington. Approximately one-half of the certified handlers are small

businesses with less than fifty full-time, year round employees.

**Reporting, Record-keeping and Compliance Requirements:** The record-keeping requirements have been effective for all handlers of organic food in the state of Washington since 1990. No new record-keeping requirements would be imposed; the amendments would merely reiterate the current requirements in clear succinct language. The record-keeping requirements proposed in the amended WAC 16-164-060 specify that the handlers must maintain sufficient records to track organic food products from receiving through to distribution or sale. Examples of such records are provided. Handlers are also required to have organic food certificates available at all times for all organic food products handled at their facility. The records must be properly maintained by the handler for a minimum of five years from the date of processing.

Amendments to chapter 16-164 WAC clarify the language for the compliance requirements and add restrictions on storage with thiabendazole treated foods. The compliance requirements for handlers of organic food are strengthened by the proposed amendments. The clear, succinct language promotes voluntary compliance and thus reduces compliance enforcement costs for the organic food program.

**New Application Fee:** The proposed amendments to the organic handler rules include a new fee for new applicants. The new applicant fee will enable the organic food program to recover the additional costs of processing new applications for organic handler certification. A new application fee has been assessed for all new organic producer and processor applicants since 1998. There are an average of twenty-five new applicants each year.

**Professional Services:** The reporting, record-keeping and compliance requirements would not necessitate the need for professional services. No professional service expenses would be incurred by the small businesses affected by chapter 16-164 WAC.

**Industries Impacted by the Rule Amendment:** All handlers of organic food in Washington state are impacted by chapter 16-164 WAC. One hundred thirteen handlers of organic food products in Washington state are currently affected by chapter 16-164 WAC. Approximately one-half of the handlers are small businesses with less than fifty full time, year round employees.

**Impact On Small Businesses:** The proposed revisions maintain the current fees charged to handler applicants. The proposed amendments to chapter 16-164 WAC would not impose a disproportionate economic impact on small businesses because all handlers, whether small businesses or large corporations, of organic food are required to submit application fees based on a percentage of their gross organic sales or organic service fee revenues. Handlers are also required to maintain records that track organic food products from receiving through distribution or sale. No new record-keeping requirements would be imposed; the amendments would merely reiterate the current requirements in clear and succinct language. Therefore the amendments to the record-keeping requirements would not impose a disproportionate burden on small businesses.

New applicants will have a new application fee of \$75. This will affect an estimated 25-30 businesses per year. The new applicant fee will apply to all new businesses that apply for certification to handle organic food products. The new applicant fee would not impose a disproportionate economic impact on small businesses.

**Mitigation:** The organic food program will provide information and technical assistance for complying with the organic handler standards. Information and technical assistance is available through the telephone, United States mail, e-mail, and the organic food program's web page.

**Industry Outreach:** The WSDA has worked with the Organic Advisory Board (OAB) on the proposed amendments to chapter 16-164 WAC. The OAB is comprised of organic industry members including farmers, packers, processors, consumers and farm input suppliers. The proposed amendments are being sent to all organic producers, processors and handlers. The proposal will include a comment form in order to facilitate the affected industry's ability to comment on the proposal.

This chapter provides standards for the certification of handlers of organic food products, including ~~((packers and vendors))~~ produce distributors, grocery distributors, fruit packers, marketing companies, brokers, warehouses, and retailers.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending Order 5070, filed 6/20/95, effective 7/21/95)

**WAC 16-164-020 Definitions.** As used in this chapter:

(1) "Approved" means any material or practice which meets the required criteria or standards for use in the handling of organic agricultural products.

(2) "Commingling" means the physical contact between unpackaged organic food products and nonorganic food products during production, processing, transportation, storage or handling.

(3) "Container" means a box, bin, carton, package or other wrapping that encloses or holds organic food products.

(4) "Department" means the department of agriculture of the state of Washington.

~~((3))~~ (5) "Director" means the director of the department of agriculture or his or her duly authorized representative.

~~((4))~~ (6) "EPA's list 4" means the United States Environmental Protection Agency's list 4 of other (inert) pesticide ingredients that are generally regarded as safe or that have sufficient data to substantiate they can be used safely in pesticide products. This list is available at EPA's website [www.epa.gov/opprd001/inerts/lists.html](http://www.epa.gov/opprd001/inerts/lists.html).

(7) "Facility" includes, but is not limited to, any premises, plant, establishment, facilities and the appurtenances thereto, in whole or in part, where organic food products are prepared, handled, packaged, or repackaged in any manner for eventual sale or distribution for eventual sale to the ultimate consumer.

~~((5))~~ (8) "Handle" means to sell, arrange the sale of, represent, process, distribute or package organic food products.

(9) "Handler" means any person who sells, arranges the sale of, represents, processes, distributes, or packs organic food products.

~~((6))~~ (10) "Label" means all written, printed, or graphic material on the immediate container of an organic food product or accompanying or representing the product.

(11) "Labeling" means all labels and other written, printed, or graphic matter:

(a) Upon any article or any of its containers or wrappers;

or

(b) Accompanying or representing such article.

(12) "Material" means any substance or mixture of substances that is used in the handling of organic agricultural products.

~~((7))~~ (13) "New applicant" means any person that applies for organic certification for the first time, or any person that applies whose organic certification has been expired for at least one year.

(14) "Organic food product" means any food product, including fruit, vegetable, meat, dairy, beverage and grocery, that is marketed using the term organic or any derivative of the term organic in its labeling or advertising. This includes using the term organic on the principal display panel, the ingredients list or other locations on the label.

~~((8))~~ "Paacker" means any person who receives any organic food product, either through gaining possession or through providing a service, from a producer or other party and packages or repackages that food product.

~~((9))~~ (15) "Packing" means to wrap, box, or put together raw or processed organic food in a container, box, or package in preparation for sale.

~~((10))~~ (16) "Person" means any natural person, firm, partnership, exchange, association, trustee, receiver, corporation, and any other member, officer, or employee thereof or assignee for the benefit of creditors.

~~((11))~~ (17) "Processed organic food" means food that in whole or in part is organically grown and which in its processing has not been treated with synthetically or artificially derived preservatives, colorings, flavorings, or any other artificial or synthetic additive, except as otherwise approved for use under chapter 16-158 WAC.

~~((12))~~ (18) "Prohibited" means any material or practice which ~~(is disallowed in)~~ does not meet the required criteria or standards for use in the handling of organic agricultural products.

(6) The application must include an organic handling plan that includes, as applicable:

(a) A description of the handling operation;

(b) A schematic flow chart of the organic handling process;

(c) A list of the postharvest materials used in the handling of organic food products;

(d) A description of the recordkeeping system used at the facility to trace organic food products;

Organic food certificates must be current and correspond to the organic food products handled by the facility. **AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending Order 00-134, filed 7/31/00, effective 8/31/00)

**WAC 220-56-115 Angling—Lawful and unlawful acts.** (1) It is unlawful for any person to use more than one line with three hooks while angling for food fish for personal use except:

(a) It is unlawful to use more than two hooks while fishing for bottomfish or halibut.

(b) It is lawful to use forage fish jigger gear as provided for in WAC 220-56-265 and squid jig gear as provided for in WAC 220-56-390.

(c) A second line using forage fish jigger gear is lawful while fishing in Catch Record Card Areas 5, 6, 7, 8-1, 8-2, 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13.

(d) It is unlawful to use treble hooks in Catch Record Card Areas 5 through 13 except on forage fish jigger gear.

(2) It shall be unlawful for any person to take, fish for or possess food fish taken for personal use by any means other

than angling with a line attached to a pole held in hand while landing the fish or with a hand-operated line without rod or reel except as follows:

(a) It is lawful to leave the pole in a pole holder while playing or landing the fish if the pole is capable of being readily removed from the pole holder.

(b) It is lawful to use an electric power-operated reel designed for sport fishing attached to a pole.

(c) It is lawful to fish for or possess salmon taken for personal use with hand lines (lines not attached to a handheld pole) except use of hand lines is unlawful in those waters west of the mouth of the Sekiu River, the Pacific Ocean, Washington waters at the mouth of the Columbia River west of a line projected true north and south through Buoy 10, Grays Harbor, and Willapa Bay.

(3) It shall be unlawful for any person while angling for food fish to fail to keep his angling gear under his direct and immediate physical control.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending Order 00-134, filed 7/31/00, effective 8/31/00)

**WAC 220-56-123 Unlawful provisions—Westport and Ocean Shores Boat Basins.** During the period August 16 through January 31, in the waters of the Westport and Ocean Shores Boat Basins:

(1) It is unlawful to fish for or possess salmon taken for personal use using any gear other than the gear provided for in this section:

(a) Nonbuoyant lures are defined as lures that do not have enough buoyancy to float in freshwater. Nonbuoyant lures other than natural bait lures must have no more than one single hook and that hook may not exceed 3/4 inch from point to shank. Nonbuoyant natural bait lures may have no more than two single hooks each of which may not exceed 3/4 inch from point to shank.

(b) Buoyant lures are defined as lures that have enough buoyancy to float in freshwater and may have any number of hooks.

(c) No leads, weights, or sinkers may be attached below or less than 12 inches above a lure.

(d) All hooks must be attached within 3 inches of the bait or lure.

(2) It is unlawful to fish for or possess food fish or shellfish from one hour after official sunset to one hour before official sunrise.

(3) It is unlawful to use ((~~baitfish~~)) forage fish jigger gear.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending Order 98-122, filed 7/15/98, effective 8/15/98)

**WAC 220-56-126 Nonbuoyant lures and night closures—Saltwater.** It is unlawful to fish for or possess salmon taken for personal use from the following saltwater areas unless the hooks meet the requirements of this section.

(1) Nonbuoyant lure restriction: In the following waters during the periods shown, it is unlawful to use a nonbuoyant lure that has more than one single hook or has a hook measuring more than 3/4 inch point to shank:

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 00-80, filed 5/24/00, effective 6/24/00)

**WAC 220-56-175 Catch record cards.** It is unlawful for any person to fail to comply with the catch record requirements as provided for in this section:

(1) In order to fish for or possess for personal use any crab, anadromous salmon, sturgeon, halibut taken from Catch Record Card Areas 5 through 13, or steelhead, an angler must obtain and have in personal possession a valid appropriate catch record card as described in WAC 220-69-236 except for commercially caught salmon retained for personal use as provided for in WAC 220-20-016 and commercially caught sturgeon retained for personal use as provided for in WAC 220-20-021.

(2) Any angler, after obtaining a catch record card shall validate the catch record card by completely, accurately, and legibly completing all personal identification information in ink on the catch record card prior to detaching the catch record card from the underlying copy of the catch record card or, for automated licenses, affixing the appropriate validation sticker to the catch record card. A catch record card remains valid so long as there are one or more unfilled spaces available for the species being fished for, except that for sturgeon a catch record card remains valid when the sturgeon portion of the catch record card is filled. A person may not retain sturgeon after the sturgeon portion of the catch record card is filled.

(3) Immediately upon catching and possessing a salmon, steelhead, sturgeon or halibut, the angler shall enter in ink in the appropriate space the place, date of catch, species (catch type), for sturgeon, length and, for halibut, vessel type.

(4) Immediately upon retaining a Dungeness crab aboard a vessel or on the shore, the fisher must enter in ink in the appropriate space the place and date of catch, fishery type and enter a tally mark for each Dungeness crab retained from each catch record card area fished. At the end of the fishing day, the fisher shall enter the total number of crab tally marks for each fishery type.

(5) Every person possessing a catch record card shall by April 30 of the year following the year printed on the card return such card to the department of fish and wildlife.

(6) Any person possessing a catch record card shall, upon demand of any law enforcement officer or authorized department employee, exhibit said card to such officer or employee for inspection.

(7) A catch record card shall not be transferred, borrowed, altered, or loaned to another person.

(2) During the gear restricted periods provided for in this section it is unlawful to fish for food fish or shellfish from one hour after official sunset to one hour before official sunrise.

(3) No leads, weights, or sinkers may be attached below or less than 12 inches above a lure.

(4) All hooks must be attached within 3 inches of the bait or lure.

(5) It is unlawful to use ((baitfish)) forage fish jigger gear.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 00-29, filed 3/29/00, effective 5/1/00)

**WAC 220-56-145 Possession of gamefish, food fish or shellfish in unlawful condition—Possession aboard a vessel.**

(1) It is unlawful to possess Dolly Varden/bull trout or sturgeon in the field at any time in such condition that the total length cannot be determined.

(2) It is unlawful to possess gamefish, food fish, or shellfish in the field in such condition that the species, size, weight ((ø)), sex, or wild or hatchery origin cannot be determined if a species, size, weight ((ø)), sex, or wild or hatchery origin restriction applies to the species, and it is unlawful to possess salmon or steelhead in the field in such condition that the total length and presence or absence of all fins cannot be determined. This subsection does not apply if the fisher has stopped fishing for the day after the catch has been brought ashore, or if the catch is in the process of being prepared for immediate consumption.

(3) It is unlawful for any person to possess more than one daily limit of fish or shellfish in fresh form while aboard a vessel.

It is lawful to use artificial scent with bait when fishing for sturgeon.~~) (1) It is lawful to fish for sturgeon the entire year, except:

(a) It is unlawful to fish for sturgeon from a floating device May 1 through June 30 downstream from the boating deadline below Bonneville Dam to markers on the Oregon and Washington shores of the Columbia River at Beacon Rock;

(b) It is unlawful to fish for sturgeon inside the south navigation lock at Bonneville Dam from a marker on the westernmost point of Robins Island to a marker on the Oregon mainland shore; and

(c) It is unlawful to fish for sturgeon in those waters of the Columbia River between the upstream line of Bonneville Dam and the lowermost Bonneville power line crossing, except when fishing with hand-casted hook and line gear from the mainland shore downstream of a line from a fishing boundary on the Washington shore approximately three-quarters of a mile below the dam to the downstream end of Cascade Island, thence to the Oregon fishing boundary marker on Bradford Island, located approximately 850 feet downstream from the fish ladder entrance.

(2) The daily limit is one sturgeon, with the following size restrictions:

(a) Minimum size 48 inches in length in the Columbia River and tributaries upstream from The Dalles Dam.

(b) Minimum size 42 inches in length in all other state waters.

(c) Maximum size 60 inches in length.

Once the daily limit has been retained, it is lawful to continue to fish for sturgeon, provided that all subsequent sturgeon are released immediately.

(3) The possession limit is two daily limits of fresh, frozen or processed sturgeon.

(4) There is an annual personal use limit of ten sturgeon from April 1 through March 31, regardless of where the sturgeon were taken.

(5) It is unlawful to fish for sturgeon with terminal gear other than bait and single barbless hooks. It is lawful to use artificial scent with bait when fishing for sturgeon.

(6) It is unlawful to fish for or possess sturgeon taken for personal use from freshwater, except the Chehalis River, from one hour after official sunset to one hour before official sunrise.

(7) It is unlawful to possess in the field or transport for personal use any sturgeon from which either the head or tail or both have been removed, or to possess sturgeon eggs without having retained the carcass of the fish from which the eggs have been removed.

(8) It is unlawful to use a gaff or other fish landing aid that penetrates the fish while restraining, handling or landing a sturgeon.

(9) It is unlawful to fail to immediately return to the water any undersize sturgeon.

(10) It is unlawful to totally or partially remove oversize sturgeon from the water.

(11) It is unlawful to retain sturgeon taken from the following waters:

(a) Those waters of the Snake River and tributaries upstream from lower Granite Dam;

(b) Those waters of the Columbia River and tributaries upstream from Priest Rapids Dam; and

(c) Those waters of the Columbia River and tributaries between the upstream line of Bonneville Dam and a line 400 feet below McNary Dam during the period September 1 through December 31.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 99-13, filed 3/30/99, effective 5/1/99)

WAC 220-56-320 Shellfish gear—Unlawful acts. (1) It is unlawful for the owner or operator of any personal use shellfish gear to leave such gear unattended in the waters of the state unless said gear is marked with a buoy to which shall be affixed in a permanent visible and legible manner the first and last name and permanent mailing address of the operator. It is unlawful for more than one person's name and address to appear on the same marker buoy. Unattended shellfish gear must have the line attaching the buoy to the pot weighted sufficiently to prevent the line from floating on the water's surface. The following additional requirements apply to buoys attached to unattended shellfish pots:

(a) All buoys must consist of durable material and remain visible on the surface at all times except during extreme tidal conditions. It is unlawful to use bleach, anti-freeze or detergent bottles, paint cans or any other container.

(b) All buoys attached to shrimp gear must be yellow or fluorescent yellow in color. Flags and staff, if attached, may be any color.

(c) All buoys attached to crab gear must be half red or half fluorescent red in color and half white in color. Flags and staff, if attached, may be any color.

(2) The maximum perimeter of any shrimp pot shall not exceed 10 feet, and the pot shall not exceed 1-1/2 feet in height.

(3) It is unlawful to fish for or possess crab taken with shellfish pot gear that are equipped with tunnel triggers or other devices which prevent free exit of crabs under the legal limit unless such gear is equipped with not less than two escape rings located in the upper half of the pot which are not less than 4-1/4 inches inside diameter. The minimum mesh size for crab pots is 1-1/2 inches.

(4) It is unlawful to take, fish for or possess shrimp taken for personal use with shellfish pot gear in the waters of Hood Canal southerly of the site of the Hood Canal Floating Bridge unless such gear meets the following requirements:

(a) The entire top, bottom, and sides of the shellfish pots must be constructed of mesh material and except for the entrance tunnels have the minimum mesh opening size defined below.

(b) The minimum mesh opening size for Hood Canal shrimp pots is defined as a mesh that a 7/8-inch square peg will pass through each mesh without changing the shape of the mesh opening.

(c) All entrance tunnels must open into the pot from the side.

(d) The sum of the maximum widths of all entrance tunnels must not exceed 1/2 the perimeter of the bottom of the pot.

(5) It is unlawful to fish for or possess shellfish taken for personal use with shellfish pot gear unless the gear allows for escapement using at least one of the following methods:

(a) Attachment of pot lid hooks or tiedown straps with a single strand or loop of untreated, 100 percent cotton twine no larger than thread size 120 so that the pot lid will open freely if the twine or fiber is broken.

(b) An opening in the pot mesh no less than three inches by five inches which is laced or sewn closed with untreated, 100 percent cotton twine no larger than thread size 120. The opening must be located within the top half of the pot and be unimpeded by the entry tunnels, bait boxes, or any other structures or materials.

(c) Attachment of pot lid or one pot side serving as a pot lid with no more than three single loops of untreated 100 percent cotton or other natural fiber twine no larger than thread size 120 so that the pot lid or side will open freely if the twine or fiber is broken.

(6) Shellfish pots must be set in a manner that they are covered by water at all times.

(i) Closed in Sequim Bay Shrimp District and Carr Inlet Shrimp District.

(ii) Marine Areas 8-1, 8-2, 9 and 10 closed Monday through Wednesday of each week during the open period.

(g) Dabob Bay - All state-owned tidelands in Dabob Bay north of a line drawn from Camp Harmony to Lindsays Beach are closed to the harvest of clams the entire year except as follows:

(i) State-owned tidelands from a row of tires at Camp Discovery south approximately 2,000 feet to a second row of tires.

(ii) State-owned tidelands beginning approximately 3/4 mile north of Camp Harmony extending approximately 1,200 feet north.

(iii) State-owned tidelands from markers and signs posted immediately north of the community of Lindsays Beach north to a line immediately north of Broad Spit identified by markers and signs.

(h) Dosewallips State Park: Open March 1 through May 31 only in area defined by boundary markers and signs posted on the beach.

(i) Duckabush - All state-owned tidelands on the west shore of Hood Canal from Quatsap Point to the south end of the Duckabush flats are closed to the harvest of clams.

(j) Dungeness Spit - Open May 15 through September 30.

(k) Eagle Creek: Open January 1 through April 30.

(l) Fort Flagler State Park: Open April 1 through June 30.

(m) Frye Cove - Open January 1 through May 31.

(n) Garrison Bay: Tidelands at Guss Island and those tidelands at British camp between the National Park Service dinghy dock at the north end and the park boundary at the south end are closed the entire year.

(o) Gertrude Island - All tidelands at Gertrude Island closed the entire year.

(p) Hoodspout: Tidelands at Hoodspout Salmon Hatchery are closed the entire year.

(q) Hope Island State Park (South Puget Sound): Closed the entire year.

(r) Illahee State Park: Open May 1 through May 31.

(s) Kayak Point County Park: Closed the entire year except mussels open the entire year.

(t) Kitsap Memorial State Park: Open June 1 through June 15.

(u) Kopachuck State Park: May 1 through May 15.

(v) Liberty Bay - All state-owned tidelands in Liberty Bay north and west of the Keyport Naval Supply Center are closed to the harvest of clams the entire year.

(w) McNeil Island - All tidelands on McNeil Island are closed the entire year.

(x) Mukilteo State Park - Closed the entire year.

(y) Mystery Bay State Park: Open October 1 through April 30.

(z) North Bay - All state-owned tidelands in North Bay (Case Inlet) north of a line drawn southwest from Rocky Point to the north end of Reach Island thence due west to the mainland are closed to the harvest of clams the entire year except state-owned Tidelands on the east side of North Bay north of the power transmission lines and south of the power transmission lines for 1,600 feet.

(aa) North Sequim Bay State Park - Open May 16 through June 15.

(bb) Oak Bay County Park: Open June 1 through July 15.

(cc) Oyster Reserves: Puget Sound and Willapa Bay state oyster reserves are closed the entire year except as follows:

(i) Case Inlet: Tidelands on the east side of North Bay at the north end of the inlet open the entire year.

(ii) North Bay: State-owned oyster reserves on the east side of North Bay north of the power transmission lines which cross the bay at the north end of Case Inlet open the entire year.

(iii) Oakland Bay: Tidelands at the north end of Oakland Bay and on the channel of the northwest shore of the Bay-shore Peninsula between department markers open March 1 through September 30.

(iv) Willapa Bay - Long Island oyster reserve: Northwest side of Long Island between reserve monuments 39 and 41 and southwest side of Long Island between reserve monuments 58 and 59.

(dd) Penrose Point State Park: Closed the entire year.

(ee) Picnic Point County Park: Closed the entire year.

(ff) Pillar Point County Park: Open November 1 through April 30.

(gg) Pitship Point: Closed the entire year.

(hh) Pitt Island - All tidelands on Pitt Island are closed the entire year.

(ii) Point Whitney (excluding Point Whitney Lagoon): May 16 through May 31.

(jj) Point Whitney Lagoon: Open June 1 through June 15.

(kk) Port Townsend Ship Canal: Open April 1 through June 15.

(ll) Potlatch DNR tidelands: Open March 1 through June 30.

(mm) Potlatch East: Open March 1 through June 30.

(nn) Potlatch State Park: Open March 1 through June 30.

(oo) Purdy Spit County Park: The southern shore of the spit from the boat ramp to the bridge is closed the entire year.

(pp) Quilcene Bay - All state-owned tidelands in Quilcene Bay north of a line drawn from the Quilcene Boat Haven to Fisherman's Point are closed to the harvest of clams the entire year, except those tidelands on the west side of the bay defined by boundary markers and a sign on the beach are open April 1 through September 30, daily from official sunrise to official sunset only.

(qq) Rendsland Creek: Open January 1 through April 30.

(rr) Saltwater State Park: Closed the entire year.

(ss) Samish Island Recreation Area - Open January 1 through June 15.

(tt) Scenic Beach State Park - Open April 16 through June 15.

(uu) Seahurst County Park: Closed the entire year.

(vv) Sequim Bay State Park - Open May 1 through June 30.

(ww) Shine Tidelands: Open January 1 through April 30.

(xx) South Indian Island County Park: Open January 1 through April 30.

(yy) Spencer Spit State Park: Open April 1 through July 31.

(zz) Strait of Juan de Fuca: All beaches west of the tip of Dungeness Spit: Open November 1 through March 31.

(aaa) Triton Cove Oyster Farm: Open July 1 through August 15.

(bbb) Triton Cove State Park: Open April 1 through June 30.

(ccc) Twanoh State Park: Closed the entire year.

(ddd) West Dewatto: DNR Beach 44A is open January 1 through March 31.

(eee) Willapa Bay: State-owned tidelands east of the department Willapa Bay Field Station and Nahcotta Tidelands Interpretive Site are closed year-round.

(fff) Wolfe Property State Park: Open January 1 through June 15.

(2) It is lawful to take, dig for and possess clams, cockles, borers, and mussels, not including razor clams, taken for personal use in Grays Harbor and Willapa Harbor the entire year, except from state oyster reserves, which are closed to clam digging the entire year.

(3) It is lawful to take, dig for and possess clams, cockles, borers, and mussels, not including razor clams taken for personal use from the Pacific Ocean beaches from November 1 through March 31.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending Order 00-134, filed 7/31/00, effective 8/31/00)

**WAC 220-56-380 Oysters—Areas and seasons.** (1) It is lawful to take and possess oysters taken for personal use from public tidelands the entire year, except that public tidelands at the following beaches are closed unless otherwise provided:

(a) Brown Point: Closed the entire year.

(b) Dabob Bay - All state-owned tidelands in Dabob Bay north of a line drawn from Camp Harmony to Lindsays

Beach are closed to the harvest of oysters the entire year, except as follows:

(i) State-owned tidelands from a row of tires at Camp Discovery south approximately 2,000 feet to a second row of tires.

(ii) State-owned tidelands beginning approximately 3/4 mile north of Camp Harmony extending approximately 1,200 feet north.

(c) Dosewallips State Park: Open March ((+) 2 through July 31 only in areas defined by boundary markers and signs posted on the beach.

(d) Duckabush - All state-owned tidelands on the west shore of Hood Canal from Quatsap Point to the south end of the Duckabush flats are closed to the harvest of oysters the entire year.

(e) Eagle Creek: Open January 1 through May 31.

(f) Hoodspout: Tidelands at the Hoodspout Salmon Hatchery are closed the entire year.

(g) Illahee State Park: Open May 1 through May 31.

(h) Kitsap Memorial State Park: Open June 1 through July 15.

(i) Kopachuck State Park: Open May 1 through May 31.

(j) Liberty Bay - All state-owned tidelands in Liberty Bay north and west of the Keyport Naval Supply Center are closed to the harvest of oysters the entire year.

(k) Mystery Bay: Open October 1 through April 30.

(l) North Bay - All state-owned tidelands in North Bay (Case Inlet) north of a line drawn southwest from Rocky Point to the north end of Reach Island thence due west to the mainland are closed to the harvest of oysters the entire year except for state-owned tidelands on the east side of North Bay north of the power transmission lines and south of the power transmission lines for 1,600 feet.

(m) Oyster Reserves: Puget Sound and Willapa Bay oyster reserves are closed the entire year except the following are open the entire year:

(i) North Bay - State-owned reserves on the east side of North Bay north of the power transmission lines.

(ii) Willapa Bay - Long Island oyster reserve: Northwest side of Long Island between reserve monuments 39 and 41 and southwest side of Long Island between reserve monuments 58 and 59.

(n) Penrose Point State Park: Open May 1 through June 30.

(o) Point Whitney (excluding Point Whitney Lagoon): Open April 1 through July 15.

(p) Potlatch East: Open March 1 through June 30.

(q) Potlatch State Park: Open March 1 through June 30.

(r) Quilcene Bay - All state-owned tidelands in Quilcene Bay north of a line drawn from the Quilcene Boat Haven to Fisherman's Point are closed except those tidelands on the west side of the bay defined by boundary markers and a sign at the beach are open April 1 through September 30, daily from official sunrise to official sunset, only.

(s) Scenic Beach State Park: Open April 16 through July 15.



- (t) Triton Cove Oyster Farm: Open May 1 through August 30.
- (u) Triton Cove State Park: Open April 1 through June 30.
- (v) West Dewatto: DNR Beach 44A is open January 1 through August 31.
- (w) Willapa Bay: State-owned tidelands east of the department Willapa Bay Field Station and the Nahcotta Tidelands Interpretive Site are open only between boundary markers and posted signs.
- (x) Wolfe Property State Park: Open January 1 through June 15.

**WAC 232-12-077 Wildlife taken by another.** It is unlawful to possess wildlife taken during the open season by another unless it is accompanied by a statement which shows the name, address, hunting, fishing or other license or permit number and signature of the taker, the date, county and game management unit where taken except that in areas where a saltwater license is valid, it is lawful to continue to fish until the daily limit for all lawful anglers aboard a vessel is retained and no statement is required for such fish.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending Order 00-134, filed 7/31/00, effective 8/31/00)

**WAC 232-12-619 Permanent Washington statewide game fish rules.** The following statewide rules apply to all waters unless modified under regional regulation exceptions.

- (1) Fishing seasons open at 12:01 a.m. on the first day and close at 11:59 p.m. on the last day and fishing is allowed 24 hours per day.
- (2) It is unlawful to:
  - (a) Use a gaff hook to land game fish.
  - (b) Take bullfrogs except by angling, hand dip netting, spearing (gigging) or with bow and arrow.
  - (c) Feed or use any substance to attract game fish unless specifically authorized by special regulations.
  - (d) Fish for game fish with a bow and arrow or spear.
  - (e) Possess fish which are under the minimum size or over the maximum size as shown in general or exceptions to statewide rules.

(3) Seasonal steelhead limit: Each angler who possesses a valid steelhead catch record card may not retain more than thirty steelhead April 1st through the following March 31st.

(4) Military personnel, regardless of the length of time in the state of Washington, who are permanently stationed at a military installation within the state, are entitled to purchase a resident license. Military personnel must have a license to fish for game fish anywhere in the state. Dependents must establish a ninety-day residency.

(5) Wild cutthroat release: In waters requiring a wild cutthroat release, it is unlawful to possess any cutthroat that does not have a missing adipose fin and a healed scar in the location of the missing fin.

(6) Wild steelhead release: In waters requiring wild steelhead release, it is unlawful to possess any steelhead trout that does not have a missing adipose or ventral fin and a healed scar at the location of the missing fin.

(7) Free fishing weekend: The Saturday and Sunday following the first Monday in June is declared as free fishing weekend in Washington. On this weekend a fishing license is not required for any person, regardless of residency or age, to fish for or possess game fish and a fish and wildlife lands vehicle use permit is not required to utilize department parking facilities, except that it is unlawful to fish for or possess steelhead trout without the required catch record card. During free fishing weekend only the licensing requirement is affected, and all other rules remain in effect.

(8) Trout taken with bait: When fishing with bait, all trout equal to or greater than the minimum size are counted as part of the daily limit, whether kept or released, except steelhead trout may be caught and released while using bait until the daily limit is retained.

(9) Fish taken with artificial flies and lures: Where use of bait is prohibited, or where artificial flies or lures are used voluntarily, fish may be released until the daily limit is retained. If any fish has swallowed the hook or is hooked in the gill, eye or tongue, it should be kept if legal to do so.

(10) Burbot taken with set line: Where use of a set line is allowed for burbot, a single set line identified with the fisher's name and address and a maximum of five hooks may be used.

(11) Rainbow trout taken from landlocked lakes: Rainbow trout taken from landlocked lakes shall not be considered steelhead and no catch record card is required.

(b) It is unlawful for any person to retain more than ten wild steelhead in the aggregate from all of the following rivers and tributaries thereto:

- (i) Bogachiel River.
- (ii) Calawah River.
- (iii) Dickey River.
- (iv) Sol Duc River.
- (v) Quillayute River.

(c) It is unlawful for any person to retain more than ten wild steelhead from the Clearwater River.

(15) Possession limit. Except as otherwise provided, the possession limit is two daily limits in fresh, frozen or processed form.

(16) Marine waters rules: These rules apply to all marine waters contained within the boundaries of Washington state, within Puget Sound, Hood Canal, the Strait of Juan de Fuca, the San Juan Islands, the Straight of Georgia, and the Pacific Ocean, including estuaries (river mouths) from salt water upstream to a line between the outermost headlands measured at the highest high tide (usually the debris line furthest

inshore on surrounding beaches), unless otherwise described under area regulations (see individual areas, below):

(a) Fishing hours: Twenty-four hours per day year around except those waters of Area 10 west of the Lake Washington Ship Canal to a north-south line 175 feet west of the Burlington-Northern Railroad Bridge are closed waters.

(b) License requirements: A valid current Washington state department of fish and wildlife saltwater license, and, if appropriate, a sport catch record card, is required to fish for game fish including steelhead in marine waters. All steelhead taken from marine areas shall be entered on the catch record card using the words Marine Area and followed by the appropriate marine area code number.

(c) Gear restrictions: Angling gear only, and in those waters of Area 10 downstream of the First Avenue South Bridge to an east-west line through southwest Hanford Street on Harbor Island and parallel to southwest Spokane Street where it crosses Harbor Island, nonbuoyant lure restriction July 1 through November 30. (e) Kitsap County and Mason County on Tahuya Peninsula west of Belfair-Bremerton Highway (S.R. 3): Beaver ponds: Last Saturday in April through October 31 season. Trout: No minimum length.

(3) Specific freshwater exceptions to statewide rules:

Alta Lake (Okanogan County): Last Saturday in April through September 30 season.

Amber Lake (Spokane County): Last Saturday in April through September 30 season. Selective gear rules, except electric motors allowed. Trout: Daily limit two, minimum length fourteen inches; release rainbow trout missing adipose fin. Additional season October 1 through November 30. Selective gear rules. All species: Release all fish.

American Lake (Pierce County): Chumming permitted. Bass: Release fish 12 to 17 inches in length. Only one fish over 17 inches in length may be retained.

American River (Yakima County): Selective gear rules.

Ancient Lake (Grant County): Bass: Release fish 12 to 17 inches in length. Only one fish over 17 inches in length may be retained.

Anderson Lake (Jefferson County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season. Fishing from a floating device equipped with an internal combustion motor prohibited. From September 1 through October 31, selective gear rules and all species: Release all fish.

Armstrong Lake (Snohomish County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season.

Asotin Creek, mainstem and forks (Asotin County): Closed to fishing for steelhead.

PROPOSED

From SR 129 Bridge upstream to the forks: Lawful to fish up to base of Headgate Dam.

North Fork from mouth upstream to USFS boundary: Selective gear rules.

North Fork from USFS boundary upstream and all other tributaries: Closed waters.

South Fork and tributaries: Closed waters.

B.C. Mill Pond (Stevens County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season.

Bachelor Creek (Yakima County): Year around season. Trout: Daily limit five, no minimum length.

Badger Lake (Spokane County): Last Saturday in April through September 30 season.

Baker Lake (Whatcom County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season, except closed waters in an area two hundred feet in radius around the pump discharge at the south end of the lake. Chumming permitted. Trout: Minimum length six inches and maximum length eighteen inches.

Baker River (Skagit County): From the mouth to Baker River fish barrier dam: Closed waters June 1 through August 31.

Ballinger Lake (Snohomish County): Bass: Release fish 12 to 17 inches in length. Only one fish over 17 inches in length may be retained.

Barnaby Slough (Skagit County): Closed waters.

Battle Ground Lake (Clark County): Fishing from a floating device equipped with an internal combustion motor prohibited. Trout: No more than 2 trout 20 inches or greater in length may be retained.

Bay Lake (Pierce County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season.

Bayley Lake (Stevens County): Last Saturday in April through July 4 season. Fly fishing only. Fishing from a floating device equipped with a motor prohibited. Trout: Daily limit one, minimum length fourteen inches. Additional season, July 5 through October 31. Fly fishing only. Fishing from a floating device equipped with a motor prohibited. All species: Release all fish. Inlet stream: Closed waters.

Bear Creek (Yakima County), tributary to South Fork Tieton River: From the mouth to the falls (approximately 3/4 mile): Closed waters.

Bear Lake (Spokane County): Juveniles, holders of disability licenses, and licensed adults accompanied by a juvenile only.

Bear River (Pacific County): June 1 through March 31 season. Nonbuoyant lure restriction and night closure August 16 through November 30. Single point barbless hooks required August 16 through November 30 downstream from the Lime Quarry Road. Upstream from the Lime Quarry Road: Selective gear rules June 1 through March 31. All game fish: Release all fish. Salmon: Open only October 16 through November 30. Daily limit 6 fish of which no more than 2 may be adult fish. Release wild adult coho and wild adult chinook.

Blockhouse Creek (Klickitat County): Trout: Daily limit five.

Blue Creek (Lewis County), from mouth to Spencer Road: Closed waters except December 1 through December 31 season from mouth to posted sign at rearing pond outlet. Non-buoyant lure restriction and night closure. All species: Release all fish except that up to two hatchery steelhead with intact ventral fins may be retained per day.

Blue Lake (Columbia County): March 1 through October 31 season. Fishing from any floating device prohibited.

Blue Lake (Cowlitz County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season. Selective gear rules. All species: Release all fish.

Blue Lake (Grant County): Last Saturday in April through September 30 season.

Blue Lake (near Sinlahekin) (Okanogan County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season. Selective gear rules, except electric motors allowed. Trout: Daily limit one.

Blue Lake (near Wannacut Lake) (Okanogan County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season. Selective gear rules, except electric motors allowed. Trout: Daily limit one.

Bobcat Creek and Ponds (Adams County): March 1 through September 30 season. Bass: Release fish 12 to 17 inches in length. Only one fish over 17 inches in length may be retained.

Bogachiel River (Clallam County), from mouth to National Park boundary: June 1 through April 30 season. December 1

through April 30, selective gear rules from Highway 101 to National Park boundary. Trout: Minimum length fourteen inches. Brookies Lake (Grant County): Selective gear rules. Trout: Daily limit one fish.

Browns Lake and inlet streams (Pend Oreille County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season. Fly fishing only. Fishing from a floating device equipped with a motor prohibited.

Buck Lake (Kitsap County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season.

Buckskin Creek and tributaries (Yakima County), from mouth to the west boundary of Suntides Golf Course: Closed waters.

Bumping Lake (Reservoir) (Yakima County): Chumming permitted. Trout: Kokanee not counted in daily trout limit. Kokanee daily limit sixteen.

Bumping River (Yakima County):

From mouth to Bumping Reservoir: Lawful to fish to base of Bumping Dam. Selective gear rules June 1 through October 31. Whitefish: Additional December 1 through March 31 season. Terminal gear limited to one single hook. Release all fish other than whitefish.

From the mouth to the Rockport-Cascade Road Bridge: October 1 through last day in February season. Trout: Trout except Dolly Varden/Bull Trout, minimum length fourteen inches. Legal to retain Dolly Varden/Bull Trout as part of the trout daily limit, minimum length twenty inches. Wild steelhead may be retained December 1 through last day in February. Cedar River (King County), from mouth to Cedar Falls: Closed waters.

Chain Lake (Pend Orielle County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season. Release Kokanee.

Chambers Creek Estuary (downstream from markers 400 feet below the Boise-Cascade Dam to the Burlington Northern Railroad Bridge) (Pierce County): July 1 through November 15 season. Trout: Minimum length fourteen inches. Salmon: Open only July 1 through November 15. Daily limit 6 fish of which no more than 2 may be adult salmon.

Chambers Lake (within Ft. Lewis Military Reservation) (Pierce County): Selective gear rules, except electric motors allowed. Trout: Release all trout.

Chambers Lake (Thurston County): Bass: Release fish 12 to 17 inches in length. Only one fish over 17 inches in length may be retained.

Chaplain Lake (Snohomish County): Closed waters.

Chapman Lake (Spokane County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season. Chumming permitted. Trout:

Kokanee not counted in daily trout limit. Kokanee daily limit ten.

Chehalis River (Grays Harbor County), from Highway 101 Bridge in Aberdeen to high bridge on Weyerhaeuser 1000 line (approximately 400 yards downstream from Roger Creek): June 1 through April 15 season. Single point barbless hooks required September 1 through November 15 upstream from mouth to Porter Bridge and October 16 through November 15 from the Porter Bridge to the high bridge. Trout: Minimum length fourteen inches. Salmon: Open only May 1 through July 31 from mouth to high bridge, September 1 through November 15 from mouth to Porter Bridge, and October 16 through November 15 from Porter Bridge to high bridge. Daily limit 6 fish of which no more than 2 may be adult salmon. September 1 through November 15 the daily limit may contain no more than one wild adult coho and one adult chinook.

Cispus River (Lewis County), from mouth to North Fork: Trout: Additional season November 1 through May 31, steelhead only. Release all game fish other than steelhead. Salmon: Open year around. Daily limit 6 fish, of which no more than 2 fish may be adult salmon January 1 through September 30 and no more than 4 fish may be adult salmon October 1 through December 31. Salmon minimum size 8 inches. Release wild coho.

Cispus River, North Fork (Lewis County): Trout: No more than one over twelve inches in length.

Clallam River (Clallam County): June 1 through last day in February season. Trout: Minimum length fourteen inches.

Clara Lake (Mason County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season.

Clear Lake (Chelan County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season. From July 5 through October 31, selective gear rules and all species: Release all fish.

Clear Lake (Pierce County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season. Chumming permitted. Salmon: Landlocked salmon rules apply.

Clear Lake (Spokane County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season. Bass: Release fish 12 to 17 inches in length. Only one fish over 17 inches in length may be retained.

Clear Lake (Thurston County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season.

Clearwater River (Jefferson County):

From mouth to Snahapish River: June 1 through April 15 season. Single point barbless hooks required September 1 through November 30. Trout: Minimum length fourteen inches. December 1 through April 15, one wild steelhead per day may be retained. Salmon: Open only September 1 through November 30. Daily limit 6 fish of which no more than 2 may be adult salmon. Release wild adult coho and wild adult chinook.

From Snahapish River upstream: Trout, minimum length fourteen inches.

Cle Elum Lake (Reservoir) (Kittitas County): Trout except kokanee: Daily limit two, minimum length twelve inches. Kokanee not counted in daily trout limit. Kokanee daily limit sixteen, no minimum size. Burbot: Set line gear allowed.

Cle Elum River (Kittitas County), from mouth to Cle Elum Dam: Lawful to fish to base of Cle Elum Dam. Selective gear rules. Whitefish: Additional December 1 through March 31

season. Release all fish except whitefish. Terminal gear restricted to one single hook.

Cliff Lake (Grant County): March 1 through July 31 season.

Cloquallum Creek (Grays Harbor County):

From mouth to second bridge on Cloquallum Road: June 1 through last day in February season. Trout: Minimum length fourteen inches.

From mouth to Highway 8 Bridge: Additional March 1 through March 31 season. Trout: Minimum length fourteen inches.

Clough Creek (North Bend) (King County): Closed waters.

Clover Creek (Pierce County), within the boundaries of McChord Air Force Base: Selective gear rules. Trout: Daily limit two, minimum length twelve inches.

Coal Creek (Cowlitz County), from mouth to four hundred feet below falls: June 1 through last day in February season. Trout: Minimum length fourteen inches. Release wild cutthroat.

Coal Creek (tributary of Lake Washington) (King County): Closed waters.

Coal Creek (near Snoqualmie) (King County), from mouth to Highway I-90: Last Saturday in April through October 31 season. Juveniles only. Trout: No minimum length.

Coffee Pot Lake (Lincoln County): March 1 through August 31 season. Selective gear rules except motors allowed. Trout: Daily limit two. Bass: Daily limit two, maximum length fourteen inches. Crappie: Daily limit ten.

Coldwater Lake (Cowlitz County): Selective gear rules except use of electric motors allowed. Trout: Daily limit one, minimum length sixteen inches.

Coldwater Lake inlet and outlet streams (Cowlitz County): Closed waters.

Colville River (Stevens County):

From mouth to bridge at Town of Valley: Year around season. Trout: Daily limit five fish, not more than two of which may be brown trout October 1 through November 30. Walleye: No minimum size. Daily limit eight fish not more than one of which may be longer than 20 inches. Release walleye 16 to 20 inches in length.

From bridge at Valley upstream and tributaries: Selective gear rules.

Columbia Basin Hatchery Creek (Grant County): Hatchery outflow to confluence with mainstem Hatchery Creek: Juveniles and holders of disability licenses only. Mainstem Hatchery Creek: Juveniles and licensed adults accompanied by a juvenile only.

Columbia Park ((Lagoon)) Family Fishing Pond (Benton County): Juveniles and licensed adults accompanied by a juvenile only.

Columbia River, including impoundments and all connecting sloughs, except Wells Ponds: Year-round season unless otherwise provided. General species provisions (unless other-



wise provided for in this section): Bass: Daily limit five fish, not more than three of which may be over 15 inches. Trout: Daily limit two fish, minimum length 12 inches, except release all Dolly Varden/Bull Trout. Walleye: Daily limit five fish of which not more than one may be over 24 inches, minimum length 18 inches. Whitefish: Daily limit 15 fish. All other gamefish: No daily limit, except release all grass carp.

In the Columbia River between Washington and Oregon, the license of either state is valid. Anglers must comply with the fishing regulations of the state in which they are fishing. This provision does not allow an angler licensed in Oregon to fish on the Washington shore, or in the sloughs or tributaries in Washington.

Anglers fishing the Columbia River are restricted to one daily limit, as defined by the laws of the state in which they are fishing, even if they are licensed by both states.

From a true north-south line through Buoy 10 to a line between Rocky Point in Washington to Tongue Point in Oregon: Trout: Release wild cutthroat. Release all trout April 1 through July 31. Walleye: No minimum size. Daily limit ten, of which no more than five may be greater than eighteen inches in length and one greater than twenty-four inches in length. Fishing from the north jetty is allowed during salmon season openings. Salmon: Open only August 1 through March 31. August 1 through September 30 daily limit 2 salmon, except the daily limit may contain no more than 1 chinook. Release chum, sockeye, wild coho, and chinook less than 24 inches in length and coho salmon less than 16 inches in length. October 1 through March 31 daily limit 6 fish of which no more than 2 may be adult salmon. Release chum, sockeye, and wild coho. Fishing from the north jetty for salmon open during both Area 1 and Buoy 10 fishery openings.

From the Rocky Point - Tongue Point line to the I-5 Bridge: Closed waters: September 1 through September 30 at mouth of Abernathy Creek from the Washington shore to a line between Abernathy Point light and a boundary marker east of the mouth of Abernathy Creek. Trout: Release wild cutthroat. Release all trout April 1 through May 15. Walleye: No minimum size. Daily limit ten, of which no more than five may be greater than eighteen inches in length and one greater than twenty-four inches in length. Salmon: Open only August 1 through March 31. Daily limit 6 fish of which no more than 2 may be adult salmon. Release chum, sockeye, and wild coho. August 1 through December 31 release chinook within waters east of a line from the northern tip of Bachelor Island to the lighthouse at Warrior Rock to Sand Island to a navigation marker 1/2 mile off the northwest tip of Sand Island and then to marker No. 77 on the Washington shore.

From the I-5 Bridge to the Highway 395 Bridge at Pasco, including Drano Lake: Closed waters: (1) From the upstream line of Bonneville Dam to boundary markers located six hundred feet below the fish ladder. (2) Waters from the upstream side of the Interstate Bridge at The Dalles to upper line of The Dalles Dam except that bank fishing is permitted up to ~~((four hundred feet below the fishway entrance))~~ the downstream navigation lock wall on the Washington shore. (3) From John Day Dam downstream about

three thousand feet except that bank fishing is permitted up to four hundred feet below the fishway entrance on the Washington shore. (4) From McNary Dam downstream to a line across the river from the red and white marker on the Oregon shore on a line that intersects the downstream end of the wing wall of the boat lock near the Washington shore. Drano Lake: August 1 through December 31: Nonbuoyant lure restriction. September 1 through October 15: Nonbuoyant lure restriction and night closure from Bonneville Dam to The Dalles Dam. Trout: Release wild cutthroat from I-5 Bridge to Bonneville Dam and release all cutthroat in the waters of Drano Lake. Release all trout April 1 through June 15. Walleye: No minimum size. Daily limit ten, of which no more than five may be greater than eighteen inches in length and one greater than twenty-four inches in length. Salmon: Open only August 1 through December 31 except closed November 1 through December 31 from Beacon Rock to Bonneville Dam. Daily limit 6 fish of which no more than 2 may be adult salmon. Release chum, sockeye, and wild coho except wild coho may be retained in the daily limit from The Dalles Dam to McNary Dam.

From the Highway 395 Bridge at Pasco to the old Hanford townsite (wooden towers) powerline crossing, in Sec. 30, T13N, R28E except Ringold Hatchery waters: Closed waters: Ringold Springs Creek (Hatchery Creek). Trout: Release all trout. Salmon: Open only August 16 through December 31. Daily limit 6 fish of which no more than 2 may be adult salmon. Release wild coho. Ringold Hatchery waters (from WDFW markers 1/4 mile downstream from the Ringold wasteway outlet to WDFW markers 1/2 mile upstream from Spring Creek): Open only May 15 through July 31 to fishing from the bank on the hatchery side of the river. Trout: Release all fish except hatchery steelhead. Salmon: Daily limit 2 fish.

From the old Hanford townsite (wooden towers) powerline crossing in Sec. 30, T13N, R28E, to Vernita Bridge, (Highway 24): All species: February 1 through October 22 season. Trout: Release all trout. Salmon: Open only August 16 through October 22. Daily limit 6 fish of which no more than 2 fish may be adult salmon. Release wild coho.

From Vernita Bridge (Highway 24) to Priest Rapids Dam: Closed waters: (1) Priest Rapids Dam - waters between the upstream line of Priest Rapids Dam downstream to the boundary markers six hundred fifty feet below the fish ladders. Rimrock Lake (Reservoir) (Yakima County): Chumming permitted. Trout except kokanee: Daily limit five. Kokanee not counted in daily trout limit. Kokanee daily limit sixteen.

Ringold Springs Creek (Hatchery Creek) (Franklin County): Closed waters.

Robbins Lake (Mason County): Last Saturday in April through October 31 season.

Rock Creek (Adams/Whitman counties): Mouth to Endicott Road year-round season.

Endicott Road to bridge on George Knott Road at Revere: Selective gear rules. All species: Release all fish.

Upstream from bridge on George Knott Road: Year-round season.

Rock Creek (Cedar River tributary below Landsburg Dam) (King County): Closed waters.

Rock Creek (Skamania County): June 1 through March 15 season. Trout: Minimum length twelve inches. Release wild cutthroat.

Rocky Ford Creek and Ponds (Grant County): Fly fishing only. Fishing from bank only (no wading). All species: Release all fish.

Explanation of Rule, its Purpose, and Anticipated Effects: The rule being repealed allows for target fishing for octopus with shellfish pot gear. The purpose of the repeal is to remove targeted fishing effort on the octopus population. The primary effects of the action will eliminate a disorderly fishery that promotes a by-catch of depressed marine fish species as well as other shellfish species which are fully subscribed in other limited entry fisheries. It will have no significant effect on the commercial landing levels of octopus because most of these landings occur as a result of by-catch in other fisheries.

Proposal Changes the Following Existing Rules: Modifies WAC 220-52-063 and 220-52-075 to remove allowance for target octopus fishing and associated logbook requirements.

A small business economic impact statement has been prepared under chapter 19.85 RCW.

~~((4) It is unlawful to fish for octopus using more than 200 shellfish pots without first having obtained a permit authorized by the director.~~

**WAC 220-52-075 Shellfish harvest logs.** It is unlawful for any vessel operator engaged in commercial crawfish, sea cucumber, sea urchin, scallop, shrimp other than ocean pink shrimp, squid, ~~((octopus,))~~ or sand shrimp fishing or operator of mechanical clam digging device to fail to obtain and accurately maintain the appropriate harvest log available from the Washington department of fish and wildlife. The harvest log must be kept aboard the vessel while the vessel is engaged in harvest or has crawfish, sea cucumbers, sea urchins, shrimp other than ocean pink shrimp, squid, ~~((octopus,))~~ scallops, clams, or sand shrimp aboard. The vessel operator must submit the harvest logs for inspection upon request by authorized department of fish and wildlife representatives. The department's copies of the completed harvest log must be submitted to the department for each calendar month in which fishing activity occurs. State copies must be received within ten days following any calendar month in which fishing activity occurred, except that commercial sea cucumber harvest logs must be received for each month of the season provided for in WAC 220-52-072 regardless of whether harvest activity occurred during the month, and all shellfish harvesters must submit a log that must be received by the tenth day following the termination of commercial fishing activity showing that shellfish harvest has terminated for the year.

(1) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of shrimp other than Puget Sound shrimp or sand shrimp or crawfish with shellfish pot or ring net gear must record the vessel Washington department of fish and wildlife boat registration number, number of pots or ring nets pulled, date pulled, soak time, and gear location before leaving the catch

area where taken, and weights must be recorded upon landing or sale.

(2) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of shrimp other than ocean pink shrimp with beam trawl or shrimp trawl gear must record the vessel identity, date, location fished, trawl width, Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area, depth fished, latitude and longitude to the nearest tenth of a minute or to the nearest second at the beginning and end of each tow, tow speed, duration of tow and estimated weight of shrimp of each species caught for each tow before leaving the site where the catch was taken or before commencing a new tow, whichever occurs first.

It shall be unlawful to fail to permanently record this information into the department-supplied harvest log before leaving each catch site. Harvest logs must be maintained and submitted in ascending consecutive order of harvest log serial numbers. Harvest logs must be submitted for each month in which fishing activity occurs and must be received by the department within ten days following any month in which fishing occurs. The fish receiving ticket serial number must be recorded onto the harvest log at the time of sale, or before leaving the last catch site of the day if the vessel operator holds a wholesale dealer license and is the original receiver of the catch.

(3) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of sea urchins or sea cucumbers must record the vessel identity, date, location fished, depth fished, latitude and longitude to the nearest tenth of a minute or to the nearest second, and the approximate number of sea urchins or sea cucumbers taken before leaving the site where taken and the exact weight must be recorded upon landing or sale.

(4) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of clams with mechanical digging devices must record the vessel identity, location, and date of harvest before the end of each day's fishing and the weights by clam species must be recorded upon landing or sale.

(5) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of scallops must record the vessel identity, date, location, and duration of harvest and estimated weight of scallops caught for each tow or dive hour before leaving the catch area where taken.

(6) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of squid, except when taken incidental to any other lawful fishery, must record before leaving the Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area where taken, the vessel department of fish and wildlife boat registration number, gear type, catch area, starting and ending time of fishing, and numbers of other species caught and returned. Weights of squid must be recorded on landing or sale.

~~((7) ((Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of octopus, except when taken incidental to any other lawful fishery, must record before leaving the Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area where taken, the vessel department of fish and wildlife boat registration number, gear type and amount, catch area and hours fished. Weights of octopus must be recorded on landing or sale.~~

(8)) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of sand shrimp, except when taken incidental to any other lawful fishery, must record the location or identification number of the harvest tract, date of harvest, number of trenches

pumped, average length and width of trenches (yards), total number of sand shrimp retained (dozens), total number of sand shrimp sold (dozens), and the name of the sand shrimp buyer.

A separate weight for each species caught and retained must be recorded. When single pots are fished an entry is required for each pot site. It shall be unlawful to fail to permanently record this information into the department-supplied harvest log before leaving each catch site. Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of shrimp from Puget Sound with shellfish pot gear must report their daily catch by telephone before leaving the last catch site fished each day. For harvest in Crustacean Management Regions 1A, 1B, 1C, or 2, reports must be made to the voice recorder at the La Conner district office. For harvest in Crustacean Management Regions 3, 4, or 6, reports must be made to the voice recorder at the Point Whitney shellfish laboratory. All reports must specify the fisher's name, estimated total number of pounds of each shrimp species in possession, number of pots fished, number of pot pulls (pots multiplied by pulls), the Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area where shrimp were harvested, and the port or name of vessel where the catch will be landed or sold. Purpose: Amend Puget Sound crab rules to establish closed areas, reopen areas formerly closed, and set pot limits. Housekeeping changes for Puget Sound shrimp rules. Estab-

lish shrimp trawl fishery depth restriction. Amend Puget Sound shrimp reporting requirements.

Statutory Authority for Adoption: RCW 75.08.080.

Statute Being Implemented: RCW 75.08.080.

Summary: Puget Sound crab: Ten and twenty pot limits for Port Angeles Harbor and Dungeness Bay, respectively. New closed areas and opening of a formerly closed area. November through February season for an area formerly closed year round. Puget Sound shrimp: Housekeeping to replace dropped sections, 50 fathom minimum shrimp trawl depth for Gulf of Georgia, April-July. Shrimp pot fishers required to report number of pot pulls.

Reasons Supporting Proposal: Crab rule changes are needed to help meet WDFW Commission allocation policy. Advisory group input was used to help balance recreational and commercial needs. Shrimp rule changes are needed to reestablish sections dropped during transition to limited entry management and enhance protection for crab. Minor changes to commercial shrimp reporting rules are needed to provide more detailed information on harvest activity to help track resource abundance and prevent over harvest.

Rule is not necessitated by federal law, federal or state court decision.

Explanation of Rule, its Purpose, and Anticipated Effects: Puget Sound commercial crab rule proposals establish ten and twenty pot per fisher limits for Port Angeles Harbor and Dungeness Bay, respectively. Portions of Dungeness, Discovery, and Samish bays, and East Sound, and all waters of Comet Bay, Prevost Harbor would close year round to commercial crab harvest. The majority of Samish Bay would reopen to commercial crab harvest. The formerly closed waters of Deer Harbor would open to commercial crab harvest from November through February.

Puget Sound commercial shrimp rule proposals reestablish long standing critical management provisions inadvertently dropped during the 1999 transition from Emerging Fisheries Act management to limited entry. A seasonal (mid-April through mid-July) fifty fathom minimum depth restriction for the Gulf of Georgia (Area 20A) would be expanded to April 1 through July 31. Two new items (name of fisher and number of pot pulls) would be added to the list of information commercial shrimp pot fishers are currently required to report by telephone. Additionally, the requirement for Puget Sound commercial shrimp pot fishers to include actual weight on harvest log and telephone reports would be relaxed to allow reporting of estimated weights.

The Puget Sound commercial crab rule changes were developed in response to an evaluation of current harvest sharing between recreational and commercial fishers relative to WDFW commission crab allocation policy. Several of the proposed changes have been established by emergency rule during the last few seasons. WDFW staff met with the Puget



Sound Crab Advisory Group for guidance and developed proposals which include changes responsive to the needs of both recreational and commercial fishers.

The Puget Sound commercial shrimp housekeeping changes are needed to provide orderly fisheries which operate consistent with basic conservation principles. The missing sections are currently in place by emergency rule. An existing section describing management regions is deleted and moved to chapter 220-16 WAC in a separate housekeeping action. Shrimp beam trawl fishery restrictions in the Gulf of Georgia are needed to protect soft shell crab from trawl fishery impacts during molting periods. New information on crab molt timing in this area indicates a longer window of protection is needed. Telephone reports of fishing activity help shrimp managers and enforcement staff to enforce weekly trip limits, stay within allocations, and track resource abundance. Although not currently required by rule, most fishers provide their names when filing these reports and this information is needed to ensure accuracy of WDFW records. Pot pulls are defined as the total number of pots fished multiplied by the number of times those pots were pulled. This additional information on fishing effort will give shrimp managers an inseason measure of shrimp resource status which is needed to help prevent over harvest.

Proposal Changes the Following Existing Rules: Rules are being modified to delete provisions that are no longer applicable, amend existing sections, and add new sections.

A public hearing will be also be held and notification of the proposed change will be made in the Fish and Wildlife Commission published agenda.

8. A List of Industries That will be Required to Comply with the Rule: All Puget Sound limited entry shrimp pot fishers will be required to comply.

1. Description of the Reporting, Record-keeping, and Other Compliance Requirements of the Proposed Rule: None.

2. Kinds of Professional Services That a Small Business is Likely to Need in Order to Comply with Such Requirements: No additional services would be required.

3. Costs of Compliance for Businesses, Including Costs of Equipment, Supplies, Labor, and Increased Administrative Costs: No additional costs are expected.

4. Will Compliance with the Rule Cause Businesses to Lose Sales or Revenue? No.

5. Cost of Compliance for the 10% of Businesses That are the Largest Businesses Required to Comply with the Proposed Rules Using One or More of the Following as a Basis for Comparing Costs:

- a. Cost per employee;
  - b. Cost per hour of labor; or
  - c. Cost per one hundred dollars of sales.
- No compliance costs anticipated.

6. Steps Taken by the Agency to Reduce the Costs of the Rule on Small Businesses or Reasonable Justification for Not Doing So: No extra costs are anticipated.

7. A Description of How the Agency will Involve Small Businesses in the Development of the Rule: The proposed regulation was discussed with the Puget Sound Shrimp Advisory Group. One fisher who has an interest in shrimp beam trawl fishing in the Gulf of Georgia would like to see a modification of a depth restriction in this area. Staff agreed to evaluate his request based on results from onboard observations. The fisher's boat difficulties prevented completion of observations during the 2000 season. Staff remain willing to conduct observations and evaluate rule modifications during the 2001 season. A public hearing will be held and notification of the proposed change will be made in the Fish and Wildlife Commission published agenda.

8. A List of Industries That will be Required to Comply with the Rule: All Puget Sound state commercial shrimp fishers will be required to comply.

1. Description of the Reporting, Record-keeping, and Other Compliance Requirements of the Proposed Rule: Some Puget Sound commercial crab fishers would need to modify fishing practices to comply with new rules on closed areas and area specific pot limits.

2. Kinds of Professional Services That a Small Business is Likely to Need in Order to Comply with Such Requirements: No additional services would be required.

3. Costs of Compliance for Businesses, Including Costs of Equipment, Supplies, Labor, and Increased Administrative Costs: Some fishers might have higher fuel costs if they respond to new fishing restrictions by choosing new fishing locations which are farther from port.

4. Will Compliance with the Rule Cause Businesses to Lose Sales or Revenue? The proposed rule establishes new fishing restrictions and also provides new opportunities to harvest crab in areas currently closed to commercial fishing. Fishers who are unable or unwilling to fish in formerly closed areas may harvest less crab than in the past.

5. Cost of Compliance for the 10% of Businesses That are the Largest Businesses Required to Comply with the Proposed Rules Using One or More of the Following as a Basis for Comparing Costs:

- a. Cost per employee;
- b. Cost per hour of labor; or
- c. Cost per one hundred dollars of sales.

Compliance cost estimates are expected to be low, and are difficult to predict. The amount of fishing area subject to proposed closures or pot limits is less than 1% of the area open to commercial crab harvest. However, positive and negative financial impacts are possible for some fishers, depending which areas they currently harvest from.

6. Steps Taken by the Agency to Reduce the Costs of the Rule on Small Businesses or Reasonable Justification for Not Doing So: Areas formerly closed to commercial fishing are proposed to open.

7. A Description of How the Agency will Involve Small Businesses in the Development of the Rule: The proposed regulation was developed with assistance from the Puget Sound Crab Advisory Group. This group is comprised of six commercial and six recreational crab fishers. The rules were developed with the goal of balancing the interests of competing user groups. A public hearing will be held and notification of the proposed change will be made in the Fish and Wildlife Commission published agenda.

8. A List of Industries That will be Required to Comply with the Rule: Puget Sound commercial crab fishers.

WAC 220-16-260 ((Geographical definitions—~~Skagit Bay shrimp fishing area~~)) Puget Sound Crustacean Management Regions. (~~"Skagit Bay shrimp fishing area" shall include those waters of Puget Sound lying within the following lines. A line commencing at West Point on Whidbey Island projected True north to Fidalgo Island, and a line projected from Point Demoeck on Camano Island to Point Poinell on Whidbey Island.~~) The following areas are defined as Puget Sound Crustacean Management Regions:

(1) Crustacean Management Region 1A - (Western San Juan Islands). The portion of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 20B west of a line from Point Doughty on Orcas Island to the bell buoy at the international boundary due north of Waldron Island, and the portion of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 22A west of the following line: Beginning at Steep Point on Orcas Island to Neck Point on Shaw Island, then southerly following the west coast of Shaw Island to the southernmost point of Shaw Island, then to the western entrance to Fisherman's Bay on Lopez Island, then southerly and easterly following the west coast of Lopez Island to Point Colville.

(2) Crustacean Management Region 1B - (Eastern San Juan Islands). The portions of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Areas 20B and 22A to the east of Crustacean Management Region 1A and the portion of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 21A north and west of a line from the southern tip of Sinclair Island to Carter Point on Lummi Island.

(3) Crustacean Management Region 1C - (Gulf of Georgia/North Puget Sound Bays). All waters of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Areas 20A, 21B, and 22B, and the portion of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 21A outside of Crustacean Management Region 1B.

(4) Crustacean Management Region 2 - (Central Puget Sound). All waters of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Areas 24A, 24B, 24C, 24D, 25B, 25D, and 26A.

(5) Crustacean Management Region 3 - (Strait of Juan de Fuca). All waters of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Areas 23A, 23B, 23C, 23D, 25A, 25E, and 29.

(6) Crustacean Management Region 4 - (Southern Central Puget Sound). All waters of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Areas 26B, and 26C.

(7) Crustacean Management Region 5 - (Hood Canal). All waters of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Areas 25C, 27A, 27B, and 27C.

PROPOSED

(8) Crustacean Management Region 6 - (South Puget Sound). All waters of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Areas 26D, 28A, 28B, 28C, and 28D.

WAC 220-16-270 ((Geographical definitions—Skagit River:)) **Puget Sound Shrimp Districts.** ((The term "Skagit River" shall be construed to mean those waters of the Skagit River upstream and inside of a line projected from white monument on the easterly point of Ika Island, across the Skagit River, to the terminus of the jetty with McGlinn Island:)) **The following areas shall be defined as Puget Sound Shrimp Districts:**

(1) Discovery Bay Shrimp District - All waters south of a line from McCurdy Point on the Quimper Peninsula to the northern tip of Protection Island, then to Rocky Point on the Miller Peninsula, and including all waters of Discovery Bay.

(2) Port Angeles Shrimp District - All waters of Port Angeles Harbor west of a line from the eastern tip of Ediz Hook to the ITT-Rayonier dock.

(3) Sequim Bay Shrimp District - All waters of Sequim Bay south of a line projected west from Travis Spit on the Miller Peninsula.

(4) Hood Canal Shrimp District - All waters of Hood Canal south of the Hood Canal Floating Bridge.

(5) Carr Inlet Shrimp District - All waters of Carr Inlet north of a line from Penrose Point to Green Point.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 00-17, filed 2/14/00, effective 3/16/00)

**WAC 220-52-075 Shellfish harvest logs.** It is unlawful for any vessel operator engaged in commercial crawfish, sea cucumber, sea urchin, scallop, shrimp other than ocean pink shrimp, squid, ((~~oetopus~~)) or sand shrimp fishing or operator of mechanical clam digging device to fail to obtain and accurately maintain the appropriate harvest log available from the Washington department of fish and wildlife. The harvest log must be kept aboard the vessel while the vessel is engaged in harvest or has crawfish, sea cucumbers, sea urchins, shrimp other than ocean pink shrimp, squid, ((~~oetopus~~)) scallops, clams, or sand shrimp aboard. The vessel operator must submit the harvest logs for inspection upon request by authorized department of fish and wildlife representatives. The department's copies of the completed harvest log must be submitted to the department for each calendar month in which fishing activity occurs. State copies must be received within ten days following any calendar month in which fishing activity occurred, except that commercial sea cucumber harvest logs must be received for each month of the season provided for in WAC 220-52-072 regardless of whether harvest activity occurred during the month, and all shellfish harvesters must submit a log that must be received by the tenth day following the termination of commercial fishing activity showing that shellfish harvest has terminated for the year.

(1) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of shrimp other than Puget Sound shrimp or sand shrimp or crawfish with shellfish pot or ring net gear must record the

vessel Washington department of fish and wildlife boat registration number, number of pots or ring nets pulled, date pulled, soak time, and gear location before leaving the catch area where taken, and weights must be recorded upon landing or sale.

(2) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of shrimp other than ocean pink shrimp with beam trawl or shrimp trawl gear must record the vessel identity, date, location fished, trawl width, Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area, depth fished, latitude and longitude to the nearest tenth of a minute or to the nearest second at the beginning and end of each tow, tow speed, duration of tow and estimated weight of shrimp of each species caught for each tow before leaving the site where the catch was taken or before commencing a new tow, whichever occurs first.

It shall be unlawful to fail to permanently record this information into the department-supplied harvest log before leaving each catch site. Harvest logs must be maintained and submitted in ascending consecutive order of harvest log serial numbers. Harvest logs must be submitted for each month in which fishing activity occurs and must be received by the department within ten days following any month in which fishing occurs. The fish receiving ticket serial number must be recorded onto the harvest log at the time of sale, or before leaving the last catch site of the day if the vessel operator holds a wholesale dealer license and is the original receiver of the catch.

(3) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of sea urchins or sea cucumbers must record the vessel identity, date, location fished, depth fished, latitude and longitude to the nearest tenth of a minute or to the nearest second, and the approximate number of sea urchins or sea cucumbers taken before leaving the site where taken and the exact weight must be recorded upon landing or sale.

(4) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of clams with mechanical digging devices must record the vessel identity, location, and date of harvest before the end of each day's fishing and the weights by clam species must be recorded upon landing or sale.

(5) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of scallops must record the vessel identity, date, location, and duration of harvest and estimated weight of scallops caught for each tow or dive hour before leaving the catch area where taken.

(6) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of squid, except when taken incidental to any other lawful fishery, must record before leaving the Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area where taken, the vessel department of fish and wildlife boat registration number, gear type, catch area, starting and ending time of fishing, and numbers of other species caught and returned. Weights of squid must be recorded on landing or sale.

~~(7) ((Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of oetopus, except when taken incidental to any other lawful fishery, must record before leaving the Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area where taken, the vessel department of fish and wildlife boat registration number, gear type and amount, catch area and hours fished. Weights of oetopus must be recorded on landing or sale.~~

PROPOSED

(8)) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of sand shrimp, except when taken incidental to any other lawful fishery, must record the location or identification number of the harvest tract, date of harvest, number of trenches pumped, average length and width of trenches (yards), total number of sand shrimp retained (dozens), total number of sand shrimp sold (dozens), and the name of the sand shrimp buyer.

((9)) (8) Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of shrimp (other than sand shrimp) using shellfish pot gear in Puget Sound must record the vessel's Washington department of fish and wildlife boat registration number, number of pots pulled, soak time, gear location (including latitude and longitude to the nearest tenth of a minute), and weight(s) of catch before leaving the site where catch is taken. A separate weight for each species caught and retained must be recorded. When single pots are fished an entry is required for each pot site. When two or more pots are fished on a common ground line the catch site must be recorded at the location of the last pot on the ground line that is pulled. It shall be unlawful to fail to permanently record this information into the department-supplied harvest log before leaving each catch site. Harvest logs must be maintained and submitted in ascending consecutive order of harvest log serial numbers. Harvest logs must be submitted for each month in which fishing activity occurs and must be received by the department within ten days following any month in which fishing occurs. The fish receiving ticket serial number must be recorded onto the harvest log at the time of sale, or before leaving the last catch site of the day if the vessel operator holds a wholesale dealer license and is the original receiver of the catch. Vessel operators engaged in commercial harvest of shrimp from Puget Sound with shellfish pot gear must report their daily catch by telephone before leaving the last catch site fished each day. For harvest in Crustacean Management Regions 1A, 1B, 1C, or 2, reports must be made to the voice recorder at the La Conner district office. For harvest in Crustacean Management Regions 3, 4, or 6, reports must be made to the voice recorder at the Point Whitney shellfish laboratory. All reports must specify the fisher's name, estimated total number of pounds of each shrimp species in possession, number of pots fished, number of pot pulls (pots multiplied by pulls), the Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area where shrimp were harvested, and the port or name of vessel where the catch will be landed or sold. The fish receiving ticket reporting requirements of WAC 220-69-240 remain in effect.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending Order 00-164, filed 8/23/00, effective 9/23/00)

**WAC 220-52-040 Commercial crab fishery—Lawful and unlawful gear, methods, and other unlawful acts.** (1) **Net fishing boats shall not have crab aboard.** It is unlawful for any vessel geared or equipped with commercial net fishing gear to have aboard any quantity of crab while it is fishing with the net gear or when it has other food fish or shellfish aboard for commercial purposes.

(2) **Area must be open to commercial crabbing.** Unless otherwise provided, it is unlawful to set, maintain, or operate any baited or unbaited shellfish pots or ring nets for taking crabs for commercial purposes in any area or at any time when the location is not opened for taking crabs for commercial purposes by permanent rule or emergency rule of the department: Provided, That following the close of a commercial crab season, permission may be granted by the director or his or her designee on a case-by-case basis for crab fishers to recover shellfish pots that were irretrievable due to extreme weather conditions at the end of the lawful opening. Crab fishers must notify and apply to department enforcement for such permission within twenty-four hours prior to the close of season.

(3) **Crabs must be male and 6-1/4 inches.** It is unlawful for any person acting for commercial purposes to take, possess, deliver, or otherwise control:

(a) Any female Dungeness crabs; or

(b) Any male Dungeness crabs measuring less than 6-1/4 inches, caliper measurement, across the back immediately in front of the tips.

(4) **Each person and each Puget Sound license limited to 100 pots.** It is unlawful for any person to take or fish for crab for commercial purposes in the Puget Sound licensing district using, operating, or controlling any more than an aggregate total of 100 shellfish pots or ring nets. This limit shall apply to each license. However, this shall not preclude a person holding two Puget Sound crab licenses from designating and using the licenses from one vessel as authorized by RCW 75.28.048(4).

(5) ~~(Dungeness Bay Area Limit of 20 pots. No person, nor any group of persons using the same vessel, may take or fish for crabs for commercial purposes by setting, using, operating, or controlling more than 20 shellfish pots and/or ring nets within the waters of Dungeness Bay lying west of a line projected from the new Dungeness Light southward to the outermost end of the abandoned dock at the Three Crabs Restaurant on the southern shore of Dungeness Bay.~~

(6)) **Additional area gear limits.** The following Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Areas are restricted in the number of pots fished, operated, or used by a person or vessel and it is unlawful for any person to use, maintain, operate, or control pots in excess of the following limits:

(a) 10 pots in Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 25E.

(b) 10 pots in all waters of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 25A south of a line projected true west from Travis Spit on Miller Peninsula.

(c) ((30)) 20 pots in that portion of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 25A west of a line projected from the new Dungeness Light to the mouth of Cooper Creek and east of a line projected from the new Dungeness Light to the outermost end of the abandoned dock at the Three Crabs Restaurant on the southern shore of Dungeness Bay.

(d) 10 pots in that portion of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 23D west of a line from the eastern tip of Ediz Hook to the I77 Rayonier Dock.

~~((7))~~ **(6) Groundline gear is unlawful.** No crab pot or ring net may be attached or connected to other crab pot or ring net by a common groundline or any other means that connects crab pots together.

~~((8))~~ **(7) Puget Sound crab pots must be tagged.** In Puget Sound it is unlawful to place in the water, pull from the water, possess on the water, or transport on the water any crab pot without a pot tag that meets the requirements of WAC 220-52-043.

~~((9))~~ **(8) Puget Sound - No person can possess or use gear with other person's tag.** In Puget Sound no person may possess, use, control, or operate any crab pot not bearing a tag identifying the pot as that person's, except that an alternate operator designated on a primary license may possess and operate a crab pot bearing the tag of the license holder.

~~((10))~~ **(9) Cannot tamper with pot tags.** No person shall remove, damage, or otherwise tamper with crab pot tags except when lawfully applying or removing tags on the person's own pots.

~~((11))~~ **(10) Thirty-day period when it is unlawful to buy or land crab from ocean without crab vessel inspection.** It is unlawful for any fisher or wholesale dealer or buyer to land or purchase Dungeness crab taken from Grays Harbor, Willapa Bay, Columbia River, Washington coastal or adjacent waters of the Pacific Ocean during the first thirty days following the opening of a coastal crab season from any vessel which has not been issued a Washington crab vessel inspection certificate. The certificate will be issued to vessels made available for inspection in a Washington coastal port and properly licensed for commercial crab fishing if no Dungeness crabs are aboard. Inspections will be performed by authorized department personnel not earlier than twelve hours prior to the opening of the coastal crab season and during the following thirty-day period.

~~((12))~~ **(11) Grays Harbor pot limit of 200.** It is unlawful for any person to take or fish for crab for commercial purposes in Grays Harbor (catch area 60B) with more than 200 shellfish pots in the aggregate. It shall be unlawful for any group of persons using the same vessel to take or fish for crab for commercial purposes in Grays Harbor with more than 200 shellfish pots.

~~((13))~~ **(12) Coastal crab pot limit.**

(a) It is unlawful for a person to take or fish for Dungeness crab for commercial purposes in Grays Harbor, Willapa Bay, the Columbia River, or waters of the Pacific Ocean adjacent to the state of Washington unless a shellfish pot limit has been assigned to the Dungeness crab-coastal fishery license held by the person, or to the equivalent Oregon or California Dungeness crab fishery license held by the person.

(b) It is unlawful for a person to deploy or fish more shellfish pots than the number of shellfish pots assigned to the license held by that person, and it is unlawful to use any vessel other than the vessel designated on a license to operate or possess shellfish pots assigned to that license.

(c) It is unlawful for a person to take or fish for Dungeness crab or to deploy shellfish pots unless the person is in possession of valid documentation issued by the department that specifies the shellfish pot limit assigned to the license.

~~((14))~~ **(13) Determination of coastal crab pot limits.**

(a) The number of shellfish pots assigned to a Washington Dungeness crab-coastal fishery license, or to an equivalent Oregon or California Dungeness crab fishery license will be based on documented landings of Dungeness crab taken from waters of the Pacific Ocean south of the United States/Canada border and west of the Bonilla-Tatoosh line, and from coastal estuaries in the states of Washington, Oregon and California. Documented landings may be evidenced only by valid Washington state shellfish receiving tickets, or equivalent valid documents from the states of Oregon and California, that show Dungeness crab were taken between December 1, 1996, and September 16, 1999. Such documents must have been received by the respective states no later than October 15, 1999.

(b) The following criteria shall be used to determine and assign a shellfish pot limit to a Dungeness crab-coastal fishery license, or to an equivalent Oregon or California Dungeness crab fishery license:

(i) The three "qualifying coastal Dungeness crab seasons" are from December 1, 1996, through September 15, 1997, from December 1, 1997, through September 15, 1998, and from December 1, 1998, through September 15, 1999. Of the three qualifying seasons, the one with the most poundage of Dungeness crab landed on a license shall determine the crab pot limit for that license. A crab pot limit of 300 shall be assigned to a license with landings that total from zero to 35,999 pounds and a crab pot limit of 500 shall be assigned to a license with landings that total 36,000 pounds or more.

(ii) Landings of Dungeness crab made in the states of Oregon or California on valid Dungeness crab fisheries licenses during a qualifying season may be used for purposes of assigning a shellfish pot limit to a Dungeness crab fishery license, provided that documentation of the landings is provided to the department by the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife and/or the California Department of Fish and Game. Landings of Dungeness crab made in Washington, Oregon, and California on valid Dungeness crab fishery licenses during a qualifying season may be combined for purposes of assigning a shellfish pot limit, provided that the same vessel was named on the licenses, and the same person held the licenses. A shellfish pot limit assigned as a result of combined landings is invalidated by any subsequent split in ownership of the licenses. No vessel named on a Dungeness crab fishery license shall be assigned more than one shellfish pot limit.

~~((15))~~ **(14) Appeals of coastal crab pot limits.** An appeal of a shellfish pot limit by a coastal commercial license holder shall be filed with the department on or before the 30th day following the department's assignment of a shellfish pot limit under subsection ~~((14))~~ **(13)** of this section. The shellfish pot limit assigned to a license by the department shall remain in effect until such time as the appeal process is concluded.

~~((16))~~ **(15) Coastal - Barging of crab pots by undesignated vessels.** It is lawful for a vessel not designated on a Dungeness crab-coastal fishery license to be used to deploy shellfish pot gear provided that:

PROPOSED

(a) Such a vessel may not carry aboard more than 150 shellfish pots at any one time.

(b) Such a vessel may deploy shellfish pot gear only during the 64-hour period immediately preceding the season opening date and during the 48-hour period immediately following the season opening date.

(c) The lawful owner of the shellfish pot gear must be aboard the vessel when the gear is being deployed.

~~((17))~~ **(16) Coastal shellfish pot tags.** It is unlawful for a person to use a shellfish pot in the coastal Dungeness crab fishery unless the pot bears a tag that identifies either the name of the vessel being used to operate the pot or the Dungeness crab fishery license number of the owner of the pot, and the telephone number of a contact person. No person may operate or possess a pot that bears another person's tag, except that a person who is licensed as an alternate operator may operate or possess a pot that bears the tag of the primary license holder. It is unlawful for any person who is not the owner of Dungeness crab pot gear to remove, damage, or otherwise tamper with pot gear tags.

~~((18))~~ **(17) Coastal - Registration and use of buoy brands and colors.**

(a) It is unlawful for any coastal Dungeness crab fishery license holder to fish for crab unless the license holder has registered the buoy brand and buoy color(s) to be used with the license. A license holder shall be allowed to register with the department only one, unique buoy brand and one buoy color scheme per license. Persons holding more than one license state shall register buoy color(s) for each license that are distinctly different. The buoy color(s) shall be shown in a color photograph.

(b) It is unlawful for a coastal Dungeness crab fishery license holder to fish for crab using any other buoy brand or color(s) than those registered with and assigned to the license by the department.

**WAC 220-52-046 Crab fishery—Seasons and areas.** "Commercial crab fishing" means any taking, fishing, use, or operation of gear to fish for crabs for commercial purposes, and shall include the possession of crab on the water for commercial purposes, and the landing or initial delivery of crab for commercial purposes.

The lawful open times and areas for commercial crab fishing are as follows:

(1) All Puget Sound Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Areas are open for commercial crab fishing beginning 8:00 a.m. October 1st through the following April 15th ~~((and, after October 1, one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset,))~~ except:

(5) Coastal, Pacific Ocean, Grays Harbor, Willapa Bay and Columbia River waters are open to commercial crab fishing December 1 through September 15 except that it is lawful to set baited crab gear beginning at 8:00 a.m. November 28. However, the department may delay opening of the coastal



crab fishery due to softshell crab conditions, in which case the following provisions will apply:

(a) After consultation with the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, the director may, by emergency rule, establish a softshell crab demarcation line.

(b) For waters of the Pacific Ocean north of Point Arena, California, it is unlawful for a person to use a vessel to fish in any area for which the season opening has been delayed due to softshell crab for the first thirty days following the opening of such an area if the vessel was employed in the coastal crab fishery during the previous forty-five days.

(c) Fishers may not set crab gear in any area where the season opening has been delayed, except that gear may be set as allowed by emergency rule and shall allow setting sixty-four hours in advance of the delayed season opening time.

(d) It is unlawful to fish for or possess Dungeness crabs or to set crab gear in waters of the Pacific Ocean adjacent to the states of Oregon or California except during the lawful open seasons, areas and times specified by the individual states.

(6) The following areas (Special Management Area; SMA's) are closed to commercial crab fishing during the periods indicated, except for treaty Indian commercial crab fishing where the treaty Indian crab fisher is following tribal openings that are in accordance with provisions of court orders in *United States v. Washington*:

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending Order 99-217, filed 12/17/99, effective 1/17/00)

**WAC 220-52-051 Shrimp fishery—Puget Sound.** (1) A Puget Sound shrimp pot license or a Puget Sound shrimp trawl license will only be issued to an individual who is a natural person, and this person shall be the primary operator. The primary operator is required to operate the gear more than one-half of the season and make at least one-half of the landings, as established by valid fish receiving tickets. Holders of Puget Sound shrimp pot licenses and Puget Sound shrimp trawl licenses may designate a single alternate opera-



tor per license. The alternate operator may operate the gear up to but not equaling one-half of the fishing effort of the vessel per season, and may make up to but not equaling one-half of the landings, as established by valid fish receiving tickets, except that the director may allow operation of the gear and sale of the shrimp by an alternate operator in excess of one-half of the fishing effort in the case of a bona fide medical emergency for which the primary operator has presented a physician's statement which includes the medical condition and expected date of recovery of the primary operator. Notification of the medical emergency, presentation of the physician's statement, and obtaining a waiver from the director must be accomplished prior to the end of the season for which the license holder is seeking exception from the seasonal requirement that the primary operator perform more than one half of the fishing effort.

(3)) It is unlawful to fish for shrimp for commercial purposes in Puget Sound using shellfish pot gear except during seasons opened by emergency rule:

(a) Gear restrictions -

(i) In all areas, maximum 100 pots per fisher.

(ii) In all areas:

(A) Buoys must be orange in color and consist of durable material that will remain floating on the surface with five pounds attached; bleach or antifreeze bottles or other containers may not be used as floats.

(B) The line attaching the pot to the buoy must be weighted sufficiently to prevent the line from floating on the surface.

(C) The maximum perimeter of shrimp pots must not exceed ten feet and the maximum height must not exceed two feet.

(b) Spot shrimp size restriction: It is unlawful to retain spot shrimp taken by shellfish pot gear that have a carapace length less than 1 and 3/16 inches. Carapace length is defined as the length between the posterior mid-dorsal margin to the posterior-most part of the eye-stalk orbit.

~~((4))~~ (c) Area restrictions:

(i) Pot gear closed in all Puget Sound Shrimp Districts.

(ii) Pot gear closed in Lopez Sound south of a line projected true east-west from the northern tip of Trump Island from the season opening through July 9th.

(3) It is unlawful to fish for shrimp for commercial purposes in Puget Sound using trawl gear except during seasons opened by emergency rule:

(a) Gear restrictions - Beam trawl gear only. Otter trawl gear may not be used.

(i) Maximum beam width in Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Areas 20A, 20B, 21A, and 22A is 25 feet.

(ii) Maximum beam width in Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Areas 23A, 23B, 23C, 25A, 25B, and 29 is 60 feet.

(b) It is unlawful to retain spot shrimp.

(c) Area restrictions:

(i) Shrimp trawl fishing closed in all Puget Sound Shrimp Districts.

(ii) Shrimp trawl fishing closed in Lopez Sound south of a line projected true east-west from the northern tip of Trump Island from the season opening through July 9th.

(d) It is unlawful to fish for shrimp in Puget Sound with beam trawl gear in waters shallower than 100 feet.

(e) It is lawful to fish for shrimp in Puget Sound with beam trawl gear in Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 21A only in those waters north and west of a line from the southern tip of Sinclair Island to Carter Point on Lummi Island.

(f) The following restrictions apply to shrimp beam trawl harvest in Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 20A:

(i) Closed in waters east of a line from the southwest corner of Point Roberts to Sandy Point.

(ii) Closed in waters shallower than 20 fathoms.

(iii) Closed in waters shallower than 50 fathoms from March 16 through July 31.

(4) All shrimp taken in the Puget Sound commercial shrimp fishery must be landed and recorded on Washington state fish receiving tickets within 24 hours of harvest. No fisher may land shrimp without immediate delivery to a licensed wholesale dealer, or if transferred at sea, without transfer to a licensed wholesale dealer. A fisher who is a licensed wholesale dealer may complete and return a fish receiving ticket to satisfy the requirements of this subsection.

Title of Rule: Special hunting seasons.

Purpose: Amend WAC 232-28-260 Special hunting seasons.

Statutory Authority for Adoption: RCW 77.12.040.

Statute Being Implemented: RCW 77.12.040.

Summary: 1. Eliminates the hunting license requirement for applying for special hunting seasons for black bear.

2. Eliminates special hunting season language for cougar.

Reasons Supporting Proposal: 1. Since hunting licenses will not be available to purchase prior to the application deadline for the special spring black bear hunting season, the proposal eliminates the requirement to possess a valid hunting license to apply.

2. Currently, there are no special hunting seasons for cougar (except for public safety cougar removals, which are regulated by WAC 232-28-360). Therefore, the amendment discards language related to special hunting seasons for cougar.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 98-250, filed 12/22/98, effective 1/1/99)

**WAC 232-28-260 Special hunting seasons.** (1) The commission may establish special hunting seasons limited to species and/or weapon type.

(2) The commission establishes the following types of special hunting seasons, called permit hunts, for purposes of taking specified wildlife:

- (a) General permit hunts;
- (b) Persons of disability permit hunts;
- (c) Youth permit hunts;
- (d) Age 65 and older permit hunts;
- (e) Advanced hunter education permit hunts;
- (f) Raffle and auction permit hunts.

(3) In addition to the requirements for general permit hunts, the following are hunt requirements for:

(a) Persons of Disability Permit Hunts: Only applicants with a Washington disabled hunter permit are eligible to apply for any persons of disability permit hunts.

(b) Youth Permit and General Season Hunts: Only persons who have lawfully purchased a youth hunting license will be eligible to apply for the youth permit hunts, or to participate in youth general season hunts.

(c) Age 65 and older Permit and General Season Hunts: Only applicants sixty-five years of age or older on March 31 of the license year will be eligible to apply for age 65 and older permit hunts or participate in age 65 and older general season hunts.

(d) Advanced Hunter Education Permit Hunts: Only persons who have successfully completed the Washington department of fish and wildlife advanced hunter education (AHE) course will be eligible to apply for AHE permit hunts.

(4) Deer(;) ~~or elk((-cougar or black bear))~~ special hunting seasons permit hunt application:

(a) To apply for permit hunts for deer(;) ~~or elk((-cougar or black bear))~~ applicants must have a valid Washington big game hunting license and a valid transport tag for the appropriate species. Each applicant must have the proper transport tag as identified in the current deer(;) ~~or elk((-cougar or black bear))~~ hunting permit tables.

PROPOSED

(b) No exchanges for deer(~~(s)~~) or elk(~~(s), cougar or black bear~~) transport tags will be made for persons applying for permit hunts.

(c) Holders of deer(~~(s)~~) or elk(~~(s), cougar or black bear~~) special permit hunts may hunt only with a weapon in compliance with the permit hunts.

(5) Black bear special hunting seasons permit application:

(a) A valid Washington big game hunting license and black bear transport tag is not required to apply.

(b) Successful applicants under this section must purchase a valid big game hunting license with a black bear option prior to issuance of the permit.

(c) Successful applicants shall purchase a big game hunting license and black bear transport tag, within 15 days of being contacted by the Department. Failure to purchase the appropriate license results in forfeiting the permit.

(d) Successful applicants will be mailed a black bear special hunting season permit after the Department confirms that applicants' purchase of a valid big game hunting license and black bear transport tag.

~~((5))~~ (6) Mountain goat, moose and mountain sheep permit hunts applications:

(a) Persons who have previously drawn a Washington mountain goat, mountain sheep or moose permit are ineligible to apply for that species. This restriction on eligibility does not apply to permits awarded pursuant to a raffle or auction hunt.

(b) No refunds or exchanges for mountain goat, moose or mountain sheep permits will be made for persons drawing for permit hunts.

(c) Successful applicants under this section must purchase the permit within fifteen days of the department notification mailing. Failure to purchase forfeits the permit to an alternate.

(d) Permit hunting report: A hunter report will be sent to each mountain goat, moose or mountain sheep permit holder and must be returned to the department within ten days after the close of the permit hunt.

~~((6))~~ (7) General permit hunts application:

(a) Partnership applications will be accepted for ~~((any species))~~ deer, elk, black bear, mountain goat, moose, mountain sheep, or wild turkey. A partnership consists of two hunters. If a partnership application is drawn, both hunters will receive a permit and both hunters can take an animal.

(b) Application deadline: To qualify for a deer, elk, mountain goat, mountain sheep or moose drawing, all applications must be postmarked no later than the second Friday of June or received at a department office no later than 5:00 p.m. on the second Friday of June of the year of the drawing. To qualify for a ~~((cougar or))~~ black bear drawing, all applications must be postmarked no later than the second Friday of February or received at a department office no later than 5:00 p.m. on the second Friday of February of the year of the drawing.

(c) An applicant's name may appear on only one single special permit hunt application or one partnership application for each species. If an applicant's name appears on more than one application for a species, the application will be made

ineligible for the drawing and no points will be accrued for that year for that species.

(d) For partnership applications that are ineligible because one of the partners has his/her name on more than one application for that species, both applicants will be made ineligible for the drawing and no points will be accrued for that year for that species.

(e) Permits will be drawn by computer selection using a weighted point selection system.

(f) Incomplete applications:

(i) To be eligible for the deer(~~(s)~~) or elk(~~(s), cougar or black bear~~) permit hunts drawing, each application must include a valid hunt number, complete name, correct mailing address, date of birth, a marked species check box, a valid Washington hunting license number, and a valid species transport tag number for each applicant.

(ii) To be eligible for a black bear permit hunt drawing, each applicant must include a valid hunt number, complete name, correct mailing address, and date of birth.

~~((iii))~~ (iii) To be eligible for the special mountain goat, moose or mountain sheep permit hunts drawing, each application must include a valid hunt number, complete name, correct mailing address, date of birth, and a marked species check box.

~~((iii))~~ (iv) To be eligible to accrue points, each application must include either a valid social security number, driver's license number, or a state-issued identification number for each applicant. Applicants choosing not to submit one of the above-listed numbers will be eligible for the drawing, but will not accrue points. The same identification number must be used each year to accrue points. If a different number is used (i.e., driver's license number instead of social security number), point accrual will begin anew for the applicant while maintaining the point accrual under the former identification number.

(g) Inaccurate applications:

(i) If an applicant makes a mistake, applies for the wrong hunt, and is drawn, the permit can be returned to the department of fish and wildlife Olympia headquarters before the opening day of the hunt or the opening day of the general season, whichever comes first. The applicant's points will be restored to the condition they were in prior to the drawing.

(ii) If an applicant inaccurately submits his/her identification number on an application, no points will be accrued for that year for that species under the correct identification number.

~~((7))~~ (8) The commission establishes auction and raffle Private Lands Wildlife Management Areas (PLWMA) hunts:

(a) The commission may authorize, by agreement with PLWMA, the sale, auction, or raffle of hunts on PLWMAs.

(b) PLWMA auction/raffle hunts are awarded to hunt big game or wild turkey. The PLWMA manager will conduct the raffle drawing. Raffle tickets will be sold for not more than \$25.00 each.

(c) Any person may purchase PLWMA raffle tickets in addition to WDFW raffle tickets and participate in general permit hunt application drawing.

(d) An additional deer or elk transport tag will be issued upon payment for a deer or elk PLWMA raffle permit hunt.

(e) The PLWMA manager conducting an authorized big game auction or raffle will provide an annual report to the department of fish and wildlife prior to December 31. The report will include information on how the event was administered, where and when it occurred, who the winners are, the cost of tickets and numbers sold.

~~((8))~~ (9) The commission establishes auction and raffle hunts:

(a) The commission may establish big game and wild turkey auction and raffle permit hunts. The director may conduct the auction or raffle or may contract to a non-profit wildlife conservation organization (registered 5013c) for marketing. The organization may retain the vendor fee for each raffle ticket sold to cover expenses incurred or a percentage of the auction permit receipt.

(b) There is no limit on the number of raffle tickets a person may purchase. Raffle tickets cost no more than \$25.00 each with a 50 cent vendor fee included in the price.

(c) The organization interested in conducting an auction or raffle for an authorized permit hunt shall submit a proposal outlining its experience and plans to conduct an auction or raffle. The department of fish and wildlife shall solicit bids consistent with established state competitive bid rules. The proposal shall include:

(i) Name of the organization, articles of incorporation, and contact person.

(ii) The date, time and place of the proposed auction and raffle drawing.

(iii) The approximate number of people expected to attend the function.

(iv) Past experience in conducting auctions or raffles and special functions.

(v) Other marketing strategies to be used.

(vi) Portion of funds to be retained by the organization.

(d) The director will select an organization to conduct an auction or raffle.

(i) Revenue potential to the department will be a key criterion in applicant selection.

(ii) The department shall enter into a contract with the auctioning or raffling organization identifying specific terms of the contract.

(iii) The director may authorize a nonprofit wildlife conservation organization to sell raffle tickets for the department and retain a vending fee of 50 cents for each ticket sold.

(e) The department or organization conducting a raffle shall notify the public about the raffle hunt opportunity and offer raffle tickets for sale.

(i) The department or organization shall inform the public of date, time and place of the raffle and hold the drawing as specified.

(ii) Raffle tickets sales conducted through agency license vendors or the director authorized nonprofit wildlife conservation organization vendor must be received at the department's Olympia office headquarters on or before the last business day prior to the public drawing. Contracting organizations conducting hunting raffles must account for raffle tickets and funds received. A representative of the department will monitor the drawing.

(iii) Additional tickets may be purchased at the raffle site prior to the drawing.

(iv) One winner and two alternates shall be drawn at the drawing.

(v) The raffling organization shall notify the department of the name, address and phone number of the raffle permit winner and two alternates immediately (but no later than two business days) after the drawing. The department will notify the winner and two alternates by mail. The winner must claim the raffle permit during the regular business hours within 15 days of being notified or he/she shall be disqualified and the department will offer the raffle permit to the first alternate. The first alternate must claim the raffle permit within 10 business days of notification or he/she shall be disqualified and the department will notify the second alternate. The second alternate must claim the permit within 10 business days of notification or he/she shall be disqualified and the department will not offer the raffle permit.

(vi) The department's share of the auction or raffle revenue shall be returned to the department within 30 days of the drawing.

(f) Residents and nonresidents shall be eligible to purchase WDFW raffle tickets in addition to PLWMA raffle tickets and participate in the general permit hunt application drawing.

(g) There shall be no refunds for any raffle ticket purchases.

(h) The raffle winners must purchase a valid hunting license or permit prior to issuance of the raffle permit. An additional transport tag will be issued upon payment for a deer or elk auction or raffle permit hunt. Only one permit may be purchased for sheep or moose annually.

(i) The department will issue the permit to the person whose name appears on the winning raffle ticket. Raffle permits may not be resold or reassigned.

(j) All revenue to the department from a species permit auction or raffle shall be used for the management and benefit of that species.

~~((9))~~ (10) Citizen reward for reporting violations - bonus points:

A person who provides information which contributes substantially to the arrest of another person for illegally killing big game or an endangered species as defined by Title 77 RCW is eligible to receive ten bonus points toward the department drawing for deer and elk special permits.

(a) Ten bonus points may only be awarded to only one person providing information for each person charged regardless of the number of violations involved.

(b) Selection of bonus points is in lieu of application for a cash award which may be authorized by RCW 77.21.080.

Preproposal statement of inquiry was filed as WSR 00-18-076.

Title of Rule: Big game and wild turkey auction permits and raffles.

Purpose: Amend WAC 232-28-277 2001 Big game and wild turkey auction permits and raffles.

Statutory Authority for Adoption: RCW 77.12.040.

Statute Being Implemented: RCW 77.12.040.

Summary: The amendment sets the auction/raffle permits and seasons through 2003. Also, the amendment will increase auction/raffle opportunities for deer, elk, and mountain goat, and adds an area for bighorn sheep auction/raffle permit holders to hunt.

Reasons Supporting Proposal: The following changes are recommended for big game and wild turkey auction and raffle permits:

1. Set auction and raffle permit areas, seasons, and quotas now for 2001-2003 so conservation organizations who want to bid on the permits have a chance to submit proposals and advertise the hunts.

Currently, there are 2 big game and wild turkey auction and raffle WACs (232-28-274 and 232-28-277). Extending the dates of this WAC would allow the department to terminate the superfluous WAC (232-28-274).

2. Add a deer auction permit and increase season length.

The recommendations to add a deer auction permit and increase season length are to expand dedicated funding sources for deer management activities.

3. Add a second elk auction permit and raffle permit and increase season length.

The recommendations to add a second elk auction/raffle permit and increase season length are to expand dedicated funding sources for elk management activities and to provide a variety of hunting opportunities. The new auction/raffle permit set would be allocated to eastern Washington, while the existing set would be allocated to western Washington.

4. Add bighorn sheep unit(s) to auction/raffle hunt area.

Adding a unit to the open areas for auction/raffle permit holders, when consistent with herd status, increases hunter opportunity and likely will increase the revenue generated from auction/raffle sales.

5. Add mountain goat auction permit and raffle permit.

Mountain goat numbers have continued to decline over the past decade. Given the marginal status of goats, the department recommends closing any goat units that are not surveyed annually, regardless of suspected status. Currently, there are insufficient funds to survey each open goat unit annually. The recommendation for a goat auction and raffle permit will generate dedicated funds for surveying goats, and thereby help maintain recreational opportunity when consistent with the species biological status.

6. Change subspecies take regulation for wild turkey to one turkey in western Washington and two turkeys in eastern Washington.

This change will make auction and raffle regulations consistent with general season regulations.

Explanation of Rule, its Purpose, and Anticipated Effects: The recommended rule sets the big game auction/raffle permits and seasons through 2003; increases permit levels and season length for deer and elk; adds a mountain goat auction and raffle permit; increases the area open for bighorn sheep auction and raffle permit holders; and adjusts the bag limit for wild turkey for consistency with general season limits.

The purpose of the recommendation is to provide a variety of recreational opportunities to the public and generate dedicated funding for species-specific management.

Proposal Changes the Following Existing Rules: See above.

Reasons Supporting Proposal: The percent female in the fall harvest has been and currently is above the recommended level in the Blue Mountain Black Bear Management Unit (BBMU). In addition, the majority of the harvest (79%) is concentrated in three of the twelve game management units in the Blue Mountain BBMU. A spring black bear season, by permit only, allows managers to skew the harvest toward males (82% males in 2000 spring season) and distribute harvest more evenly.

six days. The purpose of the recommended rule is to skew harvest away from female bears and better distribute harvest through the area. Given the spring harvest trends, the proposed rule will result in 10-30 bears harvested.

- Streamline the process by which the agency handles administrative violation notices regarding alleged violations of liquor laws or regulations;
- Delete rules regarding practice and procedure for adjudicative hearings that are duplicative with the Administrative Procedure Act (chapter 34.05 RCW);
- Prohibit depositions by oral examination in contested cases (allowing written interrogatories by any part); and
- Adopt the Office of Financial Management's rules (chapter 82-05 WAC) on how a person can petition the

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 314-42-020 Appearance and practice before the board—Who may appear.** During an adjudicative proceeding, no person may appear in a representative capacity before the Washington state liquor control board or its designated hearing officer other than the following:

(1) Attorneys at law duly qualified and entitled to practice before the supreme court of the state of Washington;

(2) Attorneys at law duly qualified and entitled to practice before the highest court of record of any other state, if the attorneys at law of the state of Washington are permitted to appear in a representative capacity before administrative agencies of such other state, and if not otherwise prohibited by our state law; and/or

(3) A bona fide officer, authorized manager, partner, or full time employee of an individual firm, association, partnership, or corporation who appears for such individual firm, association, partnership, or corporation.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 314-42-025 Appearance in certain proceedings may be limited to attorneys.** In all hearings involving the taking of testimony and the formulation of a record subject to review by the courts, where the board or its designated hearing officer determines that representative activity in such hearing requires a high degree of legal training, experience, and skill, the board or its designated hearing officer may limit those who may appear in a representative capacity to attorneys at law.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 314-42-030 Appearance by former employee of board or former member of attorney general's staff.** No former employee of the board or member of the attorney general's staff may at any time after severing his/her employment with the board or the attorney general appear, except with the written permission of the board, in a representative capacity on behalf of other parties in a formal proceeding wherein he/she previously took an active part as a representative of the board.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 314-42-040 Practice and procedure.** The board hereby adopts the Model Rules of Procedure, found in chapter 10-08 WAC, promulgated by the office of administrative hearings insofar as they are not in conflict with a specific board procedure rule.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 314-42-045 Service of process—Filing with agency.** Papers required to be filed with the board are deemed filed upon actual receipt by the board at its headquarters office in Olympia.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 314-42-050 Subpoenas—Fees.** Per RCW 66.24.010(3), witnesses are allowed fees and mileage each way to and from any such inquiry, investigation, hearing, or proceeding at the rate authorized by RCW 34.04.105, as now or hereafter amended. Fees need not be paid in advance of appearance of witnesses to testify or to produce books, records, or other legal evidence. Witness fees and mileage shall be paid by the party who asked the witness to be present.

**WAC 314-42-060 Depositions upon interrogatories—Submission of interrogatories.** (1) When a deposition is taken upon written interrogatories, the party offering the testimony shall separately and consecutively number each interrogatory and file and serve them with a notice stating:

(a) the name and address of the person who is to answer them, and  
 (b) the name or descriptive title and address of the officer before whom they are to be taken.

(2) Within ten days thereafter a party so served may serve cross-interrogatories upon the party proposing to take the deposition. Within five days thereafter, the party proposing to take the deposition may serve redirect interrogatories upon the party who served cross-interrogatories.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 314-42-065 Official notice—Material facts.** In the absence of controverting evidence, the board and its hearing officers, upon request made before or during a hearing, may officially notice:

(1) **Agency proceedings.** The pendency of, the issues and position of the parties therein, and the disposition of any proceeding then pending before or theretofore concluded by the board;

(2) **Business customs.** General customs and practices followed in the transaction of business;

(3) **Notorious facts.** Facts so generally and widely known to all well informed persons as not to be subject to reasonable dispute, or specific facts which are capable of immediate and accurate demonstration by resort to accessible sources of generally accepted authority, including but not exclusively, facts stated in any publication authorized or permitted by law to be made by any federal or state officer, department, or agency;

(4) **Technical knowledge.** Matters within the technical knowledge of the board as a body of experts, within the scope or pertaining to the subject matter of its statutory duties, responsibilities or jurisdiction;

(5) **Request or suggestion.** Any party may request, or the hearing officer or the board may suggest, that official notice be taken of a material fact, which must be clearly and precisely stated, orally on the record, at any prehearing conference or oral hearing or argument, or may make such request or suggestion by written notice, any pleading, motion, memorandum, or brief served upon all parties, at any time prior to a final decision;

(6) **Statement.** Where an initial or final decision of the board rests in whole or in part upon official notice of a material fact, such fact must be clearly and precisely stated in such decision. In determining whether to take official notice of material facts, the hearing officer of the board may consult any source of pertinent information, whether or not furnished as it may be, by any party and whether or not admissible under the rules of evidence;

(7) **Controversion.** Any party may controvert a request or a suggestion that official notice of a material fact be taken

at the time the same is made if it be made orally, or by a pleading, reply or brief in response to the pleading or brief or notice in which the same is made or suggested. If any decision is stated to rest in whole or in part upon official notice of a material fact which the parties have not had a prior opportunity to controvert, any party may controvert such fact by appropriate exceptions if such notice be taken in an initial or intermediate decision or by a petition for reconsideration if notice of such fact be taken in a final report. Such controversion must be concisely and clearly set forth the sources, authority and other data relied upon to show the existence or nonexistence of the material fact assumed or denied in the decision;

(8) **Evaluation of evidence.** Nothing herein shall be construed to preclude the board or its authorized agents from utilizing their experience, technical competence, and specialized knowledge in the evaluation of the evidence presented to them.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 314-42-070 Presumptions.** Upon proof of the predicate facts specified in the following six subdivisions hereof without substantial dispute and by direct, clear, and convincing evidence, the board, with or without prior request or notice, may make the following presumptions, where consistent with all surrounding facts circumstances:

(1) **Continuity.** That a fact of a continuous nature, proved to exist at a particular time, continues to exist as of the date of the presumption, if the fact is one which usually exists for at least that period of time;

(2) **Identity.** That persons and objects of the same name and description are identical;

(3) **Delivery.** Except in a proceeding where the liability of the carrier for nondelivery is involved, that mail matter, communications, express or freight, properly addressed, marked, billed and delivered respectively to the post office, telegraph, cable or radio company, or authorized common carrier of property with all postage, tolls and charges properly prepaid, is or has been delivered to the addressee or consignee in the ordinary course of business;

(4) **Ordinary course.** That a fact exists or does not exist, upon proof of the existence or nonexistence of another fact which in the ordinary and usual course of affairs, usually and regularly coexists with the fact presumed;

(5) **Acceptance of benefit.** That a person for whom an act is done or to whom a transfer is made has, does or will accept same where it is clearly in his/her own self-interest to do so;

(6) **Interference with remedy.** That evidence, with respect to a material fact which in bad faith is destroyed, removed, suppressed or withheld by a party in control thereof, would if produced, corroborate the evidence of the adversary party with respect to such fact.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 314-42-075 Stipulations and admissions of record.** The existence or nonexistence of a material fact, as

made or agreed in a stipulation or in an admission of record, will be conclusively presumed against any party bound thereby, and no other evidence with respect thereto will be received upon behalf of such party, provided:

(1) **Upon whom binding.** Such a stipulation or admission is binding upon the parties by whom it is made, their privies and upon all other parties to the proceeding who do not expressly and unequivocally deny the existence or nonexistence of the material fact so admitted or stipulated, upon the making thereof, if made on the record at a prehearing conference, oral hearing, oral argument or by a writing filed and served upon all parties within five days after a copy of such stipulation or admission has been served upon them;

(2) **Withdrawal.** Any party bound by a stipulation or admission of record at any time prior to final decision may be permitted to withdraw the same in whole or in part by showing to the satisfaction of the hearing officer or the board that such stipulation or admission was made inadvertently or under a bona fide mistake of fact contrary to the true fact and that its withdrawal at the time proposed will not unjustly prejudice the rights of other parties to the proceeding.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 314-42-080 Form and content of decisions in contested cases and proposed orders.** Whenever the board considers that any matter or proceeding will be best handled by the issuance of a proposed order by the board or by the examiner conducting the hearing, the order shall be issued and the parties notified of the proposed order.

(1) Upon receipt of such notice and proposed order, any party may file exceptions to the proposed order within twenty days after the date of the service of the proposed order, unless a greater or less time for filing exceptions is designated by the board at the time of issuance of the proposed order.

(2) Exceptions must be filed in triplicate and a copy must be served upon all other parties who have appeared in the cause, or their attorneys of record, together with proof of such service in accordance with the rules governing service of process.

(3) Within ten days after service of the exceptions, any party may answer the filed exceptions. Briefs may accompany the exceptions or answers and must be filed and served in the same manner.

(4) After a full consideration of the proposed order, the exceptions and the answers to the exceptions filed, and briefs, the board may:

(a) affirm its proposed order by service of an order of affirmance upon the parties; or

(b) if the board deems the exceptions well taken, it may revise the proposed order and issue a final order differing from the proposed order: *Provided*, That the board may revise the proposed order and issue a final order differing from the proposed order notwithstanding the fact that neither its counsel nor the licensee or his/her counsel have filed exceptions in the case.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 314-42-085 Written arguments.** (1) At the conclusion of the evidentiary portion of a field hearing, the examiner may call for an oral legal argument on the record, after which the examiner shall render his/her oral proposals; or, the examiner may call for written arguments to be submitted to his/her office by the licensee or his/her attorney and the board's attorney. Such written arguments must be submitted in triplicate to the hearing examiner and may not be exchanged by opposing counsel.

(2) When both arguments have been received, the hearing examiner shall deliver one of the copies of the licensee's argument to the board's attorney, and one copy of the board's argument shall be forwarded to the licensee or his/her attorney.

(3) Unless a different time is fixed at the field hearing, written arguments must be filed within ten days after the conclusion of the taking of the testimony at the field hearing.

(2) After the receipt of both written arguments, the hearing examiner shall render his/her written proposals which will be served on the licensee or his/her attorney and the attorney for the board.

**WAC 314-42-100 How can a person petition the board for the adoption, amendment, or repeal of a rule?** (1) Petitions for the board to adopt, amend, or repeal a rule, as described in RCW 34.05.330, will follow the same format and be submitted in the same manner as outlined by the office of financial management in WAC 82-05-020 and 82-05-030, as now or hereafter amended.

(2) The board shall respond to such petitions in the manner outlined in WAC 82-05-040, as now or hereafter amended.

(3) The petitioner may appeal the board's denial of his/her petition as outlined in WAC 82.05.050, as now or hereafter amended.

**WAC 314-42-105 How can a person petition the board for a declaratory order?** (1) Following the provisions of RCW 34.05.240, any person may petition the board for a declaratory order with respect to the applicability to specified circumstances of a rule, order, or statute enforce-

able by the board. The board shall consider the petition, and within thirty days of the receipt of the petition will:

- (a) Enter an order declaring the applicability of the statute, rule, or order in question to the specific circumstances; or
- (b) Set a specified date no more than ninety days after receipt of the petition by which it will enter a declaratory order; or
- (c) Notify the petitioner of a time and place for hearing argument about the matter before the board makes a decision to enter a declaratory order or to decline to enter a declaratory order; or
- (d) Notify the person that the board declines to enter a declaratory and the reasons for this action.

**(2) What information should be included in the petition for declaratory order?** In addition to the information outlined in RCW 34.05.240(1), as now or hereafter amended, petitions for a declaratory rulings must include the following information:

- (a) the name and address of the petitioning party,
- (b) a list of all rules or statutes that may be brought into issue by the petition,
- (c) a statement of facts relied upon in the petition.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 314-29-005 What are the procedures for a licensee or a mandatory alcohol server training permit holder to be notified of an alleged violation of a board statute or regulation?** (1) When an enforcement agent believes that a licensee or a mandatory alcohol server training permit holder has violated a board statute or regulation, the agent will prepare an administrative violation notice (AVN). This notice will constitute the notice of initial board action, and the remaining steps in the prehearing procedure as outlined in WAC 314-17-010 will be followed.

(2) The AVN notice will include:

- (a) a brief narrative description of the violation(s) the agent is charging;
- (b) the dates of the violation(s);
- (c) a copy of the law(s) and/or regulation(s) allegedly violated;
- (d) an outline of the licensee's options as outlined in WAC 314-29-010; and
- (e) the recommended penalty as follows:
  - (i) For cases in which there are no aggravating circumstances as outlined in WAC 314-12-330 and 314-12-340 as now or hereafter amended, the recommended penalty will be the standard penalty as outlined in WAC 314-12-170 and 314-12-300 through WAC 314-12-320 for licensees, and in WAC 314-14-160 and WAC 314-14-165 for mandatory alcohol server training permit holders, as now or hereafter amended.

(ii) For cases in which there are aggravating circumstances as outlined in WAC 314-12-330 and 314-12-340 as now or hereafter amended, the agent will describe the circumstances in a report to the director of the enforcement and education division. Under the provisions of WAC 314-12-

330 and 314-12-340 as now or hereafter amended, the director of the education and enforcement division may recommend a penalty other than the standard penalty outlined in WAC 314-12-170 and 314-12-300 through WAC 314-12-320 for licensees, and in WAC 314-14-160 for mandatory alcohol server training permit holders, as now or hereafter amended.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 314-29-010 What options does a licensee or permit holder have once he/she receives a notice of initial board action?** (1) **When a licensee or a mandatory alcohol server training permit holder receives a notice of initial board action, the licensee or permit holder has twenty days from receipt of the notice to:**

- (a) accept the recommended penalty; or
- (b) request a settlement conference; or
- (c) request an administrative hearing in writing.

**(2) What are the procedures when a licensee or mandatory alcohol server training permit holder requests a settlement conference?**

(a) If the licensee or permit holder requests a settlement conference, the agent in charge or designee will schedule the conference.

(b) Both the licensee or permit holder and the agent in charge or designee will discuss the circumstances surrounding the charge, the recommended penalty, and any aggravating or mitigating factors.

(c) If a compromise is reached, the agent in charge or designee will prepare a proposed settlement agreement and will forward it to the board for approval.

(i) If the board approves the compromise, a copy of the signed settlement agreement will be sent to the licensee or permit holder, and will conclude the case.

(ii) If the board does not approve the compromise, the board will notify the licensee or permit holder of the decision. The licensee or permit holder will be given the option of agreeing to any changes the board has made in the agreement, or of requesting an administrative hearing on the charges in writing within twenty days of receipt of the notice of board action.

(d) If the licensee or permit holder and the agent in charge or designee cannot reach agreement on a settlement proposal, the licensee may accept the originally recommended penalty, or the agent in charge or designee will forward a request for an administrative hearing to the board's hearings coordinator.

**(3) What are the procedures when a licensee or mandatory alcohol server training permit holder requests an administrative hearing?**

(a) If the licensee or permit holder requests an administrative hearing in writing within twenty days, it is conducted pursuant to chapter 34.05 RCW (Washington Administrative Procedure Act).

(b) The board's hearing coordinator will notify the assistant attorney general of the licensee or permit holder's request for an administrative hearing.

PROPOSED

(c) The assistant attorney general will draft an administrative complaint and send it to the licensee or permit holder and to the office of administrative hearings.

(d) The office of administrative hearings will schedule the hearing date, and notify the licensee or permit holder and his/her attorney and the assistant attorney general in writing of the hearing date, time, and location.

(e) The hearing will be conducted by an administrative law judge assigned by the office of administrative hearings. Subpoenas may be issued by an attorney for any party, or by the assigned administrative law judge.

(f) At the hearing, the assistant attorney general or a designee will present witnesses and other evidence on behalf of the board's enforcement staff.

(g) At the hearing, the licensee or permit holder may be represented by an attorney or may choose to represent himself or herself. The licensee or permit holder or his/her attorney will be allowed to present witnesses or other relevant information.

**(5) What will happen after the administrative hearing?**

(a) Following the hearing, the administrative law judge will prepare an initial order and send it to the licensee or permit holder and the assistant attorney general.

(b) Either the licensee or permit holder or the assistant attorney general may file a petition for review of the initial order with the liquor control board within twenty days of the date of service of the initial order. The petition for review must:

(i) specify the portions of the initial order to which exception is taken;

(ii) refer to the evidence of record which is relied upon to support the petition; and

(iii) be filed with the liquor control board within twenty days of the date of service of the petition.

(iv) Copies of the reply must be mailed to all other parties or their representatives at the time the reply is filed.

(c) The administrative record, the initial order, and any exceptions filed by the parties will be circulated to the board members for review.

(d) Following this review, the board will enter a final order which is appealable under the provisions of RCW 34.05.510 through 34.05.598 (Washington Administrative Procedure Act).

**(6) What happens if a licensee or mandatory alcohol server training permit holder does not respond to the notice of initial board action within 20 days?** If a licensee or permit holder does not respond to the notice of initial board action within twenty days, the recommended penalty will go into effect.

Title of Rule: Chapter 314-13 WAC, Mandatory alcohol server training.

Purpose: The Liquor Control Board is currently undergoing a review of all of its rules to make them clear and usable, per Governor Locke's Executive Order 97-02. Proposed chapter 314-13 WAC would replace chapter 314-14 WAC, which outlines how a person receives a mandatory alcohol server training permit, and how a person can become certified to provide alcohol server training.

Statutory Authority for Adoption: RCW 66.08.030, 66.20.300, 66.20.310, 66.20.320, 66.20.330, 66.20.340, 66.20.350.

Statute Being Implemented: RCW 66.20.300, 66.20.310, 66.20.320, 66.20.330, 66.20.340, 66.20.350.

Summary: RCW 66.20.300 through 66.20.350 set up a mandatory alcohol server training program. These laws require persons who serve or supervise the service of alcohol for on-premises consumption to hold one of two permits, as outlined in this chapter. Proposed chapter 314-03 WAC outlines how a person receives these permits, and how a person can become certified to provide alcohol server training.

Proposed chapter 314-03 WAC would replace chapter 314-13 WAC. The WACs outline how a person receives these permits, and how a person can become certified to provide alcohol server training.

Proposal Changes the Following Existing Rules: The proposed rules would replace chapter 314-14 WAC, and would make the following changes:

- Proposes that a Class 13 permit holder can fill in for a Class 13 permit holder for up to thirty consecutive days. The current rules allow for up to two consecutive working days.
- Clarifies what it means to have "temporary certification" as a provider, and clarifies the requirements for temporary certification (deletes the requirement that, in order for a course to be considered for temporary certification, it must be a "nationally recognized" course).
- Clarifies the course standards for Class 12 mixologist and Class 13 server permit providers (some of the standards are currently set by policy).
- Clarifies that the video portion of an alcohol server training class that is allowed by law includes video-

tapes and video via computer (such as Internet applications or CD-ROMs). Reiterates that the test must be done in the presence of a trainer.

- Clarifies and adds to the standards for a person to become a certified alcohol server training provider. Adds a requirement that the applicant must be trained on the course material they are to present. Places the Enforcement and Education Division's current policy on criminal history background checks for applicant trainers into rule.
- States that a person whose application to become a trainer is denied by enforcement because of a criminal history can request a hearing for reconsideration.
- Clarifies the procedures for when a provider or trainer issues a permit in error (currently in policy).
- Clarifies what records providers and trainers have to provide to the board, as opposed to what records simply need to be kept on their premises and available to the board if requested.
- Doubles the monetary options for the standard penalty guidelines.
- Describes examples of aggravating and mitigating circumstances for proposed violations for permit holders (currently set by policy).

The rules originally proposed by WSR 00-17-182 proposed that a Class 12 mixologist course must be at least one-hour in length as required by statute, as opposed to the current three hour requirement. The rules proposed by this supplemental notice maintain the current three-hour requirement for the course for a Class 12 mixologist permit.

**WAC 314-13-010 Definitions.** The following definitions are to clarify the purpose and intent of the rules and laws governing mandatory alcohol server training. Additional definitions are in RCW 66.04.010 and 66.20.300.

(1) A "permit holder" is a person who holds either a Class 12 mixologist or a Class 13 server permit. The permit is the property of the permit holder, and can be used at any liquor licensed establishment.

(2) A "provider" is an individual, partnership, corporation, college, educational institute, or other bona fide legal entity that the board certifies to provide a board approved alcohol server education course (per RCW 66.20.300). The provider is a training entity.

(3) A "trainer" is an individual employed or authorized by a provider to conduct an alcohol server education course. Upon the successful completion of the course, the student will receive a Class 12 mixologist or Class 13 server permit from the trainer.

(3) Upon the temporary absence of a Class 12 mixologist permit holder, a Class 13 server permit holder who is at least twenty-one years of age may perform the functions of a Class 12 permit holder until a Class 12 permit holder can arrive to fulfill those duties, but in no event for more than thirty consecutive days.

**WAC 314-13-020 How long are the permits good for, and how does a permit holder renew?** (1) Class 12 mixologist and Class 13 server permits are valid for five years. (1) The permit must be in the same name and with the same identifying characteristics as indicated on the permit holder's identification (acceptable forms of identification are outlined in RCW 66.16.040).

(2) Per WAC 314-16-070(1), a person twenty-one years of age or older must be on the licensed premises to supervise the sale, service, and consumption of liquor.

- (d) a copy of all printed materials that will be provided to participants as part of the course; and
- (e) a copy of the examination(s) and explanation of the examination procedures necessary to pass the course.

(2) The board's enforcement and education division will respond to the request for certification within forty-five days of receipt of the material. The board will either:

- (a) issue a letter of certification which will be valid for five years, or
- (b) provide a letter outlining what additions or changes need to be made to the course to meet the requirements outlined in this title. If the additions or changes are not received by the enforcement and education division within thirty days, the application for course certification will be withdrawn.

(3) The board or its designee may attend any class provided by certified providers and their trainers at no charge, in order to evaluate the course for conformance with this title.

(4) The provider must receive prior approval from the board's enforcement and education division before making any changes to the course content or method of presentation which has been certified by the board.

(5) If permanent certification is not obtained during the six month temporary certification period, at the end of the temporary certification period, the provider must return the following materials to the board's enforcement and education division:

- (a) the original letter of board certification,
- (b) any Class 12 mixologist and/or Class 13 server permit forms, and
- (c) records of all permits issued during the temporary certification period.

(4) It is the responsibility of the approved provider to keep the board's enforcement and education division informed of all current trainers.

(a) The provider must notify the board's enforcement and education division within seventy-two hours of the termination of trainer, or within seventy-two hours of when the provider is notified that a trainer has terminated their employment.

(b) For the hiring of new trainers, the provider can either:

(i) notify the board's enforcement and education division in writing of any new trainers within thirty days of the date of hire; or

(ii) provide a list of all current trainers to the board's enforcement and education division monthly.

(2) If a case is pending for an alleged conviction that would earn eight or more points, the board's enforcement and education division will hold the trainer's application for the disposition of the case. If the disposition is not settled within ninety days, the board will withdraw the application.

(3) Persons whose applications to become an alcohol server education trainer are denied by the enforcement and education division to due a criminal history may request an adjudicative hearing under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (chapter 34.05 RCW). At the board's discretion it may elect to conduct the adjudicative hearing itself or it may assign the matter to the office of administrative hearings.

(1) Authorized providers and trainers of certified programs may order Class 12 mixologist and Class 13 server training permits from the board's enforcement and education division, to issue to students who successfully complete an approved course (see WAC 314-13-080(3) regarding eighteen, nineteen, and twenty year-old students who complete a Class 12 mixologist course).

(2) The permits must be ordered on a form provided by the board. The board will charge a nominal fee in order to cover its costs to produce the permits.

(b) obtain the original Class 12 mixologist permit from the permit holder; and

(c) issue the correct Class 13 server permit (only after receiving the original Class 12 mixologist permit that was issued in error).

(d) Within thirty days of the date the permit was issued in error, or of being notified by the board of the error, the provider or trainer must:

(i) provide the tear-off portion of the corrected Class 13 server permit to the board's enforcement and education division; or

(ii) if unable to contact the permit holder and issue a corrected permit, the provider or trainer can provide the board's enforcement and education division proof that a certified letter was sent to the trainee who received the Class 12 mixologist permit in error.

**Title of Rule:** Chapter 352-70 WAC, Boating accident and casualty reports, this chapter of administrative rules establishes the procedure for recreational boaters to report pertinent information regarding boating accidents to law enforcement agencies, which subsequently submit reports to the Parks and Recreation Commission.

**Purpose:** This proposed rule-making action is the result of the commission's pursuit of Executive Order 97-02 on Regulatory Improvement and the recodification of Title 79A RCW. This chapter was reviewed for clarity, grammar, efficiency, and effectiveness. The revisions are proposed to better meet the needs of recreational boaters and the statewide recreational boating safety program, administered by the commission pursuant to RCW 79A.05.310. The chapter was also updated to reflect the recodification of Title 79A RCW.

**Other Identifying Information:** The Code of Federal Regulations Title 33, Chapter I PART 174 - State Numbering and Casualty reporting system.

**Statutory Authority for Adoption:** RCW 79A.05.310(4).

**Statute Being Implemented:** RCW 79A.05.310(4).

**Summary:** This chapter is proposed for revision in order to improve the participation and compliance of the general public, affected local government law enforcement agencies, and all recreational boating interests. There are no substantive changes proposed.

**Reasons Supporting Proposal:** These amendments are proposed, because of the agency's desire to meet the expectations of regulatory improvement. Based on more than fifteen years experience administering the state recreational boating accident reporting program, the agency believes the proposed rules will improve public understanding and compliance.

**Explanation of Rule, its Purpose, and Anticipated Effects:** This chapter provides for the reporting of recreational boating accidents to a central state agency for collection of accident data and the development of accident prevention strategies. The chapter requires recreational boat operators to submit a written boating accident report to the law enforcement agency that has jurisdiction where the accident occurs. When the operator can not complete and submit the report the owner of the boat must complete the reporting requirements. When neither the operator nor the owner can complete the report the law enforcement agency having jurisdiction must complete and submit the report. The chapter specifies the content of a boating accident report and the manner of submitting the report.

The commission anticipates these amendments will clarify the rule and streamline the reporting process.

**Proposal Changes the Following Existing Rules:** The proposed amendments explain boating accident reporting requirements in clear, usable language. Recreational boat operators will have a better understanding of both their legal responsibilities for reporting boating accident information and the method of reporting a boating accident.

No small business economic impact statement has been prepared under chapter 19.85 RCW. This chapter of administrative rule does not regulate or have economic impact through regulations on small business. There are no compliance costs to small business.

Section 201, chapter 403, Laws of 1995, does not apply to this rule adoption. Significant legislative rule-making requirements are not imposed on the state Parks and Recreation Commission, nor has the commission voluntarily applied those requirements.

Through this program, all reports of boating accidents are forwarded to the Washington state parks and recreation commission for the confidential use of government agencies for analysis and development of accident prevention programs or as otherwise permitted by RCW 79A.60.210. The state boating accident reporting program is consistent with the regulations administered by the United States Coast Guard.~~

(1) "Commission" means the Washington state parks and recreation commission.

(3) "Owner" means a person who has a lawful right to possession of a vessel by purchase, exchange, gift, lease, inheritance, or legal action whether or not the vessel is subject to a security interest.

(5) "Vessel" means every watercraft used or capable of being used as a means of transportation on the water, other than a seaplane. However, it does not include inner tubes, air mattresses, and small rafts or flotation devices or toys customarily used by swimmers.

(6) "Waters of Washington state" means any waters within the territorial limits of Washington state.

(21) The type of vessel operation (cruising, drifting, fishing, hunting, skiing, racing, or other) and the type of accident (capsizing, sinking, fire, explosion, or other).

(22) The opinion of the person making the report as to the cause of the accident ~~((or casualty))~~ including whether or not alcohol or drugs, or both, was a cause or contributed to causing the ~~((casualty))~~ accident.

Name of Proponent: Deborah Senn, Insurance Commissioner, governmental.

Rule is necessary because of federal law, Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act (Public Law 102-106).

Explanation of Rule, its Purpose, and Anticipated Effects: The National Association of Insurance Commissioners spent many months working with states, industry, and the federal government to develop a model regulation to comply with federal law regarding consumer privacy protections. The proposed rules adapt that model and include additional consumer health protections authorized by the patient bill of rights. The rules will implement the federal law and provide for a uniform regulatory scheme regarding consumer finan-

cial information across the United States. The health sections will provide additional protections for the consumers of Washington. Washington consumers will be secure in the knowledge that the confidential financial information that they give to an insurer or carrier will not be used improperly and that their medical records and health information is protected.

Proposal does not change existing rules.

A small business economic impact statement has been prepared under chapter 19.85 RCW.

**Small Business Economic Impact Statement**

**Overview:** In November of 1999, the federal government passed the Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act (Public Law 102-106). Included in that legislation were provisions that required states to ensure the privacy of consumer financial and health information. The National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC) began a working group to develop a national model to implement the federal requirements uniformly. In September of 2000, that model was adopted by the NAIC. The NAIC model serves as the basis for these rules.

In March of 2000, the Washington legislature adopted and the governor signed E2SSB 6199, the "patient bill of rights." The legislation was codified at [as] chapter 5, Laws of 2000. One subject of the patient bill of rights is health information privacy. As noted, this subject is also addressed in the Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act.

Originally, the commissioner contemplated including the health information privacy rules in the patient bill of rights rule making (see R 2000-02) and having a separate rule making on the nonhealth privacy issues. After discussion, it was believed that it would be more efficient and useful to combine the patient bill of rights health information rules and the Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act.

On November 4 [1], the commissioner began this rule making, R 2000-08, to adopt integrated privacy rules.

**Is the rule required by federal law or federal regulation?** Many of the provisions of this rule are required by federal law or regulation. Health information privacy provisions are also authorized by RCW 48.43.505. That RCW section was enacted as a part of chapter 5, Laws of 2000, the "patient's bill of rights" (E2SSB 6199).

The federal legislation, the Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act, (Public Law 102-106), is included in the original CR-102 filing.

**What industry is affected by the proposed rule?** The entities regulated by the commissioner are affected by these rules, including all insurers and carriers. The industry codes that would be affected by the proposed rules include Life Insurers #6311, Accident and Health Insurers, industry code #6321, Hospital and Medical Service Plans #6324, Fire, Marine, and Casualty Insurers #6331, Surety Insurers, #6351, Title Insurers #6361.

**List the specific parts of the proposed rule which may impose a cost to business:** The great majority of any and all costs associated with the regulation of consumer financial and health privacy information is traceable back to the underlying federal law, not to these rules. There will be some costs

associated with establishing the necessary mechanism and systems to protect consumer personal financial and health information. Also disclosure provisions, such as the initial and annual consumer financial information privacy notices will incur some costs.

**What percentage of the industries in the four-digit standard industrial classification will be affected by the rule?** The proposed rule would affect 100% of the entities subject to regulation by the Insurance Commissioner and noted in the rules and federal law.

**Will the rule impose a disproportionately higher economic burden on small businesses within the four-digit classification?** No. The costs traceable to the rules and, to a greater degree, the underlying laws should be proportionate across industry.

**Can mitigation be used to reduce the economic impact of the rule on small businesses and still meet the objectives of the proposed rule?** The NAIC model was developed with the goal of mitigating costs while complying with the federal law. Many changes have been made in the discussions with industry and consumer groups to reduce the costs prior to the adoption of the NAIC model. Since that model was adopted in September of 2000, an additional mitigatory change has been made; as requested by industry the implementation of these rules will be delayed until July of 2001 to enable additional time to establish compliance mechanisms in a cost-effective manner. The commissioner is receptive to any suggestions that can accomplish the goals in a more cost-efficient manner and encourages dialogue with all carriers.

**What steps will the commissioner take to reduce the costs of the rule on small businesses?** The rule-drafting process will continue and all businesses, including small businesses, are invited to comment on any proposed section of the rule and offer suggestions or alternatives. The rule drafters will continue to discuss the proposed rules with industry representatives to discuss methods to reduce any potential costs on smaller carriers. Additionally, the commissioner will provide technical assistance to aid carriers in understanding and implementing the new rules. Finally, as requested by industry the implementation of these rules will be delayed until July of 2001 to enable additional time to establish compliance mechanisms in a cost-effective manner.

**Which mitigation techniques have been considered and incorporated into the proposed rule?** The NAIC model was developed with the goal of mitigating costs while complying with the federal law. Many changes have been made in the discussions with industry and consumer groups to reduce the costs prior to the adoption of the NAIC model. Since that model was adopted in September of 2000, an additional mitigatory change has been made; as requested by industry the implementation of these rules will be delayed until July of 2001 to enable additional time to establish compliance mechanisms in a cost-effective manner. The commissioner is receptive to any suggestions that can accomplish the goals in a more cost-efficient manner and encourages dialogue with all insurers and carriers.

**Which mitigation techniques were considered for incorporation into the proposed rule but were rejected, and why?** No mitigation techniques were considered for incorporation and then rejected. A comment was received from an association that objected to the scope of the rule making and suggested technical changes. The commissioner looks forward to discussing that issue with the association. Conceivably, if the commissioner agrees to the changes, some mitigation might occur.

**Briefly describe the reporting, record-keeping, and other compliance requirements of the proposed rule:** Consumers must be sent initial and annual opt-out notices regarding financial information privacy. Insurers and carriers must seek authorization on disclosure of personal financial and health information unless an exception is applicable.

**List the kinds of professional services that a small business is likely to need in order to comply with the reporting, record-keeping, and other compliance requirements of the proposed rule:** A small business is not likely to need any additional professional services because of the proposed rule. The commissioner will seek to provide whatever technical assistance is necessary to enable the smaller carriers to understand and implement the rule.

**Analyze the cost of compliance including, specifically:**

*Cost of equipment:* There is no anticipated additional cost of equipment.

*Cost of supplies:* There is no anticipated additional cost of equipment.

*Cost of labor:* It is not anticipated that the rule will be responsible for additional cost of labor. While costs may be incurred in establishing compliance mechanisms, those costs are generally derived from the underlying law not the rules.

*Cost of increased administration:* As stated above insurers and carriers may have to revamp existing systems to provide greater protection of information and to provide the opt-out consumer notices. These administrative costs are traced back to the federal law not the rules.

**Compare the cost of compliance for small business with the cost of compliance for the largest business in the same four-digit classification:** As noted, the majority of the costs associated with the regulation of consumer financial and health privacy information is traceable back to the underlying federal law, not to these rules. Nevertheless, it is believed that the cost of compliance with the rules for should be proportionate for all businesses.

The rules drafters will consider any alternatives that accomplish the goals of the rules while mitigating the costs of compliance, particularly those costs incurred by small businesses.

**Have businesses that will be affected been asked what the economic impact will be?** The NAIC model was developed in consultation with industry and with the goal of mitigating costs while complying with the federal law. Many changes have been made in the discussions with industry and consumer groups to reduce the costs prior to the adoption of the NAIC model. The commissioner is receptive to any suggestions that can accomplish the goals in a more cost-efficient manner.



cient manner and encourages dialogue with all insurers and carriers.

**How did the commissioner involve small business in the development of the proposed rule?** The CR-101 for this rule was filed on October 4, 2000. It was mailed to the commissioner's interested parties mailing list and posted on the commissioner's website.

## Chapter 284-04 WAC

### PRIVACY OF CONSUMER FINANCIAL AND HEALTH INFORMATION REGULATION

#### PART 1 GENERAL PROVISIONS

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-120 Definitions.** As used in this regulation, unless the context requires otherwise:

(1) "Affiliate" means any company that controls, is controlled by or is under common control with another company.

(2) "Clear and conspicuous" means that a notice is reasonably understandable and designed to call attention to the nature and significance of the information in the notice.

Examples.

(a) Reasonably understandable. A licensee makes its notice reasonably understandable if it:

(i) Presents the information in the notice in clear, concise sentences, paragraphs, and sections;

(ii) Uses short explanatory sentences or bullet lists whenever possible;

(iii) Uses definite, concrete, everyday words and active voice whenever possible;

(iv) Avoids multiple negatives;

(v) Avoids legal and highly technical business terminology whenever possible; and

(vi) Avoids explanations that are imprecise and readily subject to different interpretations.

(b) Designed to call attention. A licensee designs its notice to call attention to the nature and significance of the information in it if the licensee:

(i) Uses a plain-language heading to call attention to the notice;

(ii) Uses a typeface and type size that are easy to read;

(iii) Provides wide margins and ample line spacing;

(iv) Uses boldface or italics for key words; and

(v) In a form that combines the licensee's notice with other information, uses distinctive type size, style, and graphic devices, such as shading or sidebars.

(c) Notices on websites. If a licensee provides a notice on a web page, the licensee designs its notice to call attention to the nature and significance of the information in it if the licensee uses text or visual cues to encourage scrolling down the page if necessary to view the entire notice and ensure that other elements on the website (such as text, graphics, hyperlinks or sound) do not distract attention from the notice, and the licensee either:

(i) Places the notice on a screen that consumers frequently access, such as a page on which transactions are conducted; or

(ii) Places a link on a screen that consumers frequently access, such as a page on which transactions are conducted, that connects directly to the notice and is labeled appropriately to convey the importance, nature, and relevance of the notice.

(3) "Collect" means to obtain information that the licensee organizes or can retrieve by the name of an individual or by identifying number, symbol or other identifying particular assigned to the individual, irrespective of the source of the underlying information.

(4) "Commissioner" means the insurance commissioner of the state.

(5) "Company" means a corporation, limited liability company, business trust, general or limited partnership, association, sole proprietorship or similar organization.

(6) "Consumer" means an individual who seeks to obtain, obtains or has obtained an insurance product or service from a licensee that is to be used primarily for personal, family or household purposes, or that individual's legal representative.

Examples.

(a) An individual who provides nonpublic personal information to a licensee in connection with obtaining or seeking to obtain financial, investment or economic advisory services relating to an insurance product or service is a consumer regardless of whether the licensee establishes an ongoing advisory relationship.

(b) An applicant for insurance prior to the inception of insurance coverage is a licensee's consumer.

(c) An individual who is a consumer of another financial institution is not a licensee's consumer solely because the licensee is acting as agent for, or provides processing or other services to, that financial institution.

(d) An individual is a licensee's consumer if:

(i) The individual is a beneficiary of a life insurance policy underwritten by the licensee;

(ii) The individual is a claimant under an insurance policy issued by the licensee;

(iii) The individual is an insured or an annuitant under an insurance policy or an annuity, respectively, issued by the licensee; or

(iv) The individual is a mortgagor of a mortgage covered under a mortgage insurance policy; and

(v) The licensee discloses nonpublic personal financial information about the individual to a nonaffiliated third party other than as permitted under WAC 284-04-400, 284-04-405, and 284-04-410.

(e) Provided that the licensee provides the initial, annual and revised notices under WAC 284-04-200, 284-04-205, and 284-04-220 to the plan sponsor, group or blanket insurance policy holder or group annuity contract holder, workers' compensation plan participant and further provided that the licensee does not disclose to a nonaffiliated third party nonpublic personal financial information about such an individual other than as permitted under WAC 284-04-400, 284-04-405, and 284-04-410, an individual is not the consumer of such licensee solely because he or she is:

(i) A participant or a beneficiary of an employee benefit plan that the licensee administers or sponsors or for which the licensee acts as a trustee, insurer or fiduciary;

(ii) Covered under a group or blanket insurance policy or annuity contract issued by the licensee; or

(iii) A beneficiary in a workers' compensation plan.

(f) The individuals described in (e)(i) through (iii) of this subsection are consumers of a licensee if the licensee does not meet all the conditions of (e) of this subsection.

(g) In no event shall such individuals, solely by virtue of the status described in (e)(i) through (iii) of this subsection, be deemed to be customers for purposes of this regulation.

(i) An individual is not a licensee's consumer solely because he or she is a beneficiary of a trust for which the licensee is a trustee.

(ii) An individual is not a licensee's consumer solely because he or she has designated the licensee as trustee for a trust.

(7) "Consumer reporting agency" has the same meaning as in section 603(f) of the Federal Fair Credit Reporting Act (15 U.S.C. 1681a(f)).

(8) "Control" means:

(a) Ownership, control or power to vote twenty-five percent or more of the outstanding shares of any class of voting security of the company, directly or indirectly, or acting through one or more other persons;

(b) Control in any manner over the election of a majority of the directors, trustees or general partners (or individuals exercising similar functions) of the company; or

(c) The power to exercise, directly or indirectly, a controlling influence over the management or policies of the company, as the commissioner determines.

(9) "Customer" means a consumer who has a customer relationship with a licensee.

(10) "Customer relationship" means continuing relationship between a consumer and a licensee under which the licensee provides one or more insurance products or services to

the consumer that are to be used primarily for personal, family or household purposes.

Examples.

(a) A consumer has a continuing relationship with a licensee if:

(i) The consumer is a current policyholder of an insurance product issued by or through the licensee; or

(ii) The consumer obtains financial, investment or economic advisory services relating to an insurance product or service from the licensee for a fee.

(b) A consumer does not have a continuing relationship with a licensee if:

(i) The consumer applies for insurance but does not purchase the insurance;

(ii) The licensee sells the consumer airline travel insurance in an isolated transaction;

(iii) The individual no longer is a current policyholder of an insurance product or no longer obtains insurance services with or through the licensee;

(iv) The consumer is a beneficiary or claimant under a policy and has submitted a claim under a policy choosing a settlement option involving an ongoing relationship with the licensee;

(v) The consumer is a beneficiary or a claimant under a policy and has submitted a claim under that policy choosing a lump sum settlement option;

(vi) The customer's policy is lapsed, expired, paid up or otherwise inactive or dormant under the licensee's business practices, and the licensee has not communicated with the customer about the relationship for a period of twelve consecutive months, other than annual privacy notices, material required by law or regulation, communication at the direction of state or federal authority or promotional materials;

(vii) The individual is an insured or an annuitant under an insurance policy or annuity, respectively, but is not the policyholder or owner of the insurance policy or annuity; or

(viii) For the purposes of this regulation, if the individual's last known address according to the licensee's records is deemed invalid. An address of record is deemed invalid if mail sent to that address by the licensee has been returned by the postal authorities as undeliverable and if subsequent attempts by the licensee to obtain a current valid address for the individual have been unsuccessful.

(11) "Financial institution" means any institution the business of which is engaging in activities that are financial in nature or incidental to such financial activities as described in section 4(k) of the Bank Holding Company Act of 1956 (12 U.S.C. 1843(k)).

(a) Financial institution does not include:

(i) Any person or entity with respect to any financial activity that is subject to the jurisdiction of the Commodity Futures Trading Commission under the Commodity Exchange Act (7 U.S.C. 1 et seq.);

(ii) The Federal Agricultural Mortgage Corporation or any entity charged and operating under the Farm Credit Act of 1971 (12 U.S.C. 2001 et seq.); or

(iii) Institutions chartered by Congress specifically to engage in securitizations, secondary market sales (including sales of servicing rights) or similar transactions related to a transaction of a consumer, as long as such institutions do not

sell or transfer nonpublic personal information to a nonaffiliated third party.

(12) "Financial product or service" means any product or service that a financial holding company could offer by engaging in an activity that is financial in nature or incidental to such a financial activity under section 4(k) of the Bank Holding Company Act of 1956 (12 U.S.C. 1843(k)).

Financial service includes a financial institution's evaluation or brokerage of information that the financial institution collects in connection with a request or an application from a consumer for a financial product or service.

(13) "Health care" means: Preventive, diagnostic, therapeutic, rehabilitative, maintenance or palliative care, services, procedures, tests or counseling that:

(a) Relates to the physical, mental or behavioral condition of an individual; or

(b) Affects the structure or function of the human body or any part of the human body, including the banking of blood, sperm, organs or any other tissue; or

(c) Prescribing, dispensing or furnishing to an individual drugs or biologicals, or medical devices or health care equipment and supplies.

(14) "Health care provider" means a physician or other health care practitioner licensed, accredited or certified to perform specified health services consistent with state law or a health care facility.

(15) "Health information" means any information or data, whether oral or recorded in any form or medium, created by or derived from a health care provider or the consumer that relates to:

(a) The past, present or future physical, mental or behavioral health or condition of an individual;

(b) The provision of health care to an individual; or

(c) Payment for the provision of health care to an individual.

(16) "Insurance product or service" means any product or service that is offered by a licensee pursuant to the insurance laws of this state.

Insurance service includes a licensee's evaluation, brokerage or distribution of information that the licensee collects in connection with a request or an application from a consumer for an insurance product or service.

(17) "Licensee" means all licensed insurers, health care service contractors, HMO's, and fraternal benefit societies, producers and other persons licensed or required to be licensed, or authorized or required to be authorized, or registered or required to be registered pursuant to the insurance law of this state.

(a) A licensee is not subject to the notice and opt out requirements for nonpublic personal financial information set forth in WAC 284-04-100 through 284-04-400 if the licensee is an employee, agent or other representative of another licensee ("the principal") and:

(i) The principal otherwise complies with, and provides the notices required by, the provisions of this regulation; and

(ii) The licensee does not disclose any nonpublic personal information to any person other than the principal or its affiliates in a manner permitted by this regulation.

(b)(i) Subject to (b)(ii) of this subsection, "licensee" shall also include an unauthorized insurer that accepts busi-

ness placed through a licensed excess lines broker in this state, but only in regard to the excess lines placements placed pursuant to section [insert section] of this state's laws.

(ii) An excess lines broker or excess lines insurer shall be deemed to be in compliance with the notice and opt out requirements for nonpublic personal financial information set forth in WAC 284-04-100 through 284-04-400 provided:

(A) The broker or insurer does not disclose nonpublic personal information of a consumer or a customer to nonaffiliated third parties for any purpose, including joint servicing or marketing under WAC 284-04-405, except as permitted by WAC 284-04-410 and 284-04-415; and

(B) The broker or insurer delivers a notice to the consumer at the time a customer relationship is established on which the following is printed in 16-point type:

#### PRIVACY NOTICE

"NEITHER THE U.S. BROKERS THAT HANDLED THIS INSURANCE NOR THE INSURERS THAT HAVE UNDERWRITTEN THIS INSURANCE WILL DISCLOSE NONPUBLIC PERSONAL INFORMATION CONCERNING THE BUYER TO NONAFFILIATES OF THE BROKERS OR INSURERS EXCEPT AS PERMITTED BY LAW"

(18) "Licensee" shall also include an unauthorized insurer that places business through a licensed excess line broker in this state, but only in regard to the excess line placements placed pursuant to of this state's laws.

(19) "Nonaffiliated third party" means any person except:

(a) A licensee's affiliate; or

(b) A person employed jointly by a licensee and any company that is not the licensee's affiliate (but nonaffiliated third party includes the other company that jointly employs the person).

Nonaffiliated third party includes any company that is an affiliate solely by virtue of the direct or indirect ownership or control of the company by the licensee or its affiliate in conducting merchant banking or investment banking activities of the type described in section 4(k)(4)(H) or insurance company investment activities of the type described in section 4(k)(4)(I) of the Federal Bank Holding Company Act (12 U.S.C. 1843 (k)(4)(H) and (I.))

(20) "Nonpublic personal information" means nonpublic personal financial information and nonpublic personal health information.

(21)(a) "Nonpublic personal financial information" means:

(i) Personally identifiable financial information; and

(ii) Any list, description or other grouping of consumers (and publicly available information pertaining to them) that is derived using any personally identifiable financial information that is not publicly available.

(b) Nonpublic personal financial information does not include:

(i) Health information;

(ii) Publicly available information, except as included on a list described in (a)(i) of this subsection; or

PROPOSED

(iii) Any list, description or other grouping of consumers (and publicly available information pertaining to them) that is derived without using any personally identifiable financial information that is not publicly available.

Examples of lists.

Nonpublic personal financial information includes any list of individuals' names and street addresses that is derived in whole or in part using personally identifiable financial information that is not publicly available, such as account numbers.

Nonpublic personal financial information does not include any list of individuals' names and addresses that contains only publicly available information, is not derived in whole or in part using personally identifiable financial information that is not publicly available, and is not disclosed in a manner that indicates that any of the individuals on the list is a consumer of a financial institution.

(22) "Nonpublic personal health information" means health information:

(a) That identifies an individual who is the subject of the information; or

(b) With respect to which there is a reasonable basis to believe that the information could be used to identify an individual.

(23) "Personally identifiable financial information" means any information:

(a) A consumer provides to a licensee to obtain an insurance product or service from the licensee;

(b) About a consumer resulting from any transaction involving an insurance product or service between a licensee and a consumer; or

(c) The licensee otherwise obtains about a consumer in connection with providing an insurance product or service to that consumer.

Examples.

(i) Information included. Personally identifiable financial information includes:

(A) Information a consumer provides to a licensee on an application to obtain an insurance product or service;

(B) Account balance information and payment history;

(C) The fact that an individual is or has been one of the licensee's customers or has obtained an insurance product or service from the licensee;

(D) Any information about the licensee's consumer if it is disclosed in a manner that indicates that the individual is or has been the licensee's consumer;

(E) Any information that a consumer provides to a licensee or that the licensee or its agent otherwise obtains in connection with collecting on a loan or servicing a loan;

(F) Any information the licensee collects through an Internet "cookie" (an information collecting device from a web server); and

(G) Information from a consumer report.

(ii) Information not included. Personally identifiable financial information does not include:

(A) Health information;

(B) A list of names and addresses of customers of an entity that is not a financial institution; and

(C) Information that does not identify a consumer, such as aggregate information or blind data that does not contain

personal identifiers such as account numbers, names or addresses.

(24)(a) "Publicly available information" means any information that a licensee has a reasonable basis to believe is lawfully made available to the general public from:

(i) Federal, state or local government records;

(ii) Widely distributed media; or

(iii) Disclosures to the general public that are required to be made by federal, state or local law.

(b) Reasonable basis. A licensee has a reasonable basis to believe that information is lawfully made available to the general public if the licensee has taken steps to determine:

(i) That the information is of the type that is available to the general public; and

(ii) Whether an individual can direct that the information not be made available to the general public and, if so, that the licensee's consumer has not done so.

(c) Examples.

(i) Government records. Publicly available information in government records includes information in government real estate records and security interest filings.

(ii) Widely distributed media. Publicly available information from widely distributed media includes information from a telephone book, a television or radio program, a newspaper or a website that is available to the general public on an unrestricted basis. A website is not restricted merely because an Internet service provider or a site operator requires a fee or a password, so long as access is available to the general public.

(iii) Reasonable basis.

(A) A licensee has a reasonable basis to believe that mortgage information is lawfully made available to the general public if the licensee has determined that the information is of the type included on the public record in the jurisdiction where the mortgage would be recorded.

(B) A licensee has a reasonable basis to believe that an individual's telephone number is lawfully made available to the general public if the licensee has located the telephone number in the telephone book or the consumer has informed you that the telephone number is not unlisted.

## PART 2

### PRIVACY AND OPT OUT NOTICES FOR FINANCIAL INFORMATION

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-200 Initial privacy notice to consumers required.** (1) Initial notice requirement. A licensee shall provide a clear and conspicuous notice that accurately reflects its privacy policies and practices to:

(a) Customer. An individual who becomes the licensee's customer, not later than when the licensee establishes a customer relationship, except as provided in subsection (5) of this section; and

(b) Consumer. A consumer, before the licensee discloses any nonpublic personal financial information about the consumer to any nonaffiliated third party, if the licensee makes a disclosure other than as authorized by WAC 284-04-405 and 284-04-410;

(2) When initial notice to a consumer is not required. A licensee is not required to provide an initial notice to a consumer under subsection (1)(b) of this section if:

(a) The licensee does not disclose any nonpublic personal financial information about the consumer to any nonaffiliated third party, other than as authorized by WAC 284-04-405 and 284-04-410; and

The licensee does not have a customer relationship with the consumer; or

(b) A notice has been provided by an affiliated licensee, as long as the notice clearly identifies all licensees to whom the notice applies and is accurate with respect to the licensee and the other institutions.

(3) When the licensee establishes a customer relationship.

(a) General rule. A licensee establishes a customer relationship at the time the licensee and the consumer enter into a continuing relationship.

(b) Examples of establishing customer relationship. A licensee establishes a customer relationship when the consumer:

(i) Becomes a policyholder of a licensee that is an insurer when the insurer delivers an insurance policy or contract to the consumer, or in the case of a licensee that is an insurance producer or insurance broker, obtains insurance through that licensee; or

(ii) Agrees to obtain financial, economic or investment advisory services relating to insurance products or services for a fee from the licensee.

(4) Existing customers. When an existing customer obtains a new insurance product or service from a licensee that is to be used primarily for personal, family or household purposes, the licensee satisfies the initial notice requirements of subsection (1) of this section as follows:

(a) The licensee may provide a revised policy notice, under WAC 284-04-220, that covers the customer's new insurance product or service; or

(b) If the initial, revised or annual notice that the licensee most recently provided to that customer was accurate with respect to the new insurance product or service, the licensee does not need to provide a new privacy notice under subsection (1) of this section.

(5) Exceptions to allow subsequent delivery of notice.

(a) A licensee may provide the initial notice required by subsection (1)(a) of this section within a reasonable time after the licensee establishes a customer relationship if:

(i) Establishing the customer relationship is not at the customer's election; or

(ii) Providing notice not later than when the licensee establishes a customer relationship would substantially delay the customer's transaction and the customer agrees to receive the notice at a later time.

(b) Examples of exceptions.

(i) Not at customer's election. Establishing a customer relationship is not at the customer's election if a licensee

acquires or is assigned a customer's policy from another financial institution or residual market mechanism and the customer does not have a choice about the licensee's acquisition or assignment.

(ii) Substantial delay of customer's transaction. Providing notice not later than when a licensee establishes a customer relationship would substantially delay the customer's transaction when the licensee and the individual agree over the telephone to enter into a customer relationship involving prompt delivery of the insurance product or service.

(iii) No substantial delay of customer's transaction. Providing notice not later than when a licensee establishes a customer relationship would not substantially delay the customer's transaction when the relationship is initiated in person at the licensee's office or through other means by which the customer may view the notice, such as on a website.

(6) Delivery. When a licensee is required to deliver an initial privacy notice by this section, the licensee shall deliver it according to WAC 284-04-225. If the licensee uses a short-form initial notice for noncustomers according to WAC 284-04-210(4), the licensee may deliver its privacy notice according to WAC 284-04-210 (4)(c).

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-205 Annual privacy notice to customers required.** (1)(a) General rule. A licensee shall provide a clear and conspicuous notice to customers that accurately reflects its privacy policies and practices not less than annually during the continuation of the customer relationship. Annually means at least once in any period of twelve consecutive months during which that relationship exists. A licensee may define the twelve-consecutive-month period, but the licensee shall apply it to the customer on a consistent basis.

(b) Example. A licensee provides a notice annually if it defines the twelve-consecutive-month period as a calendar year and provides the annual notice to the customer once in each calendar year following the calendar year in which the licensee provided the initial notice. For example, if a customer opens an account on any day of year one, the licensee shall provide an annual notice to that customer by December 31 of year two.

(2)(a) Termination of customer relationship. A licensee is not required to provide an annual notice to a former customer. A former customer is an individual with whom a licensee no longer has a continuing relationship.

(b) Examples.

(i) A licensee no longer has a continuing relationship with an individual if the individual no longer is a current policyholder of an insurance product or obtains insurance services with or through the licensee.

(ii) A licensee no longer has a continuing relationship with an individual if the individual's policy is lapsed, expired, paid up or otherwise inactive or dormant under the licensee's business practices, and the licensee has not communicated with the customer about the relationship for a period of twelve consecutive months, other than to provide annual privacy notices, material required by law or regulation, or promotional materials.

(iii) For the purposes of this regulation, a licensee no longer has a continuing relationship with an individual if the individual's last known address according to the licensee's records is deemed invalid. An address of record is deemed invalid if mail sent to that address by the licensee has been returned by the postal authorities as undeliverable and if subsequent attempts by the licensee to obtain a current valid address for the individual have been unsuccessful.

(iv) A licensee no longer has a continuing relationship with a customer in the case of providing real estate settlement services, at the time the customer completes execution of all documents related to the real estate closing, payment for those services has been received, or the licensee has completed all of its responsibilities with respect to the settlement, including filing documents on the public record, whichever is later.

(3) Delivery. When a licensee is required by this section to deliver an annual privacy notice, the licensee shall deliver it according to WAC 284-04-225.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-210 Information to be included in privacy notices.** (1) General rule. The initial, annual and revised privacy notices that a licensee provides under WAC 284-04-200, 284-04-205, and 284-04-220 shall include each of the following items of information, in addition to any other information the licensee wishes to provide, that applies to the licensee and to the consumers to whom the licensee sends its privacy notice:

(a) The categories of nonpublic personal financial information that the licensee collects;

(b) The categories of nonpublic personal financial information that the licensee discloses;

(c) The categories of affiliates and nonaffiliated third parties to whom the licensee discloses nonpublic personal financial information, other than those parties to whom the licensee discloses information under WAC 284-04-405 and 284-04-410;

(d) The categories of nonpublic personal financial information about the licensee's former customers that the licensee discloses and the categories of affiliates and nonaffiliated third parties to whom the licensee discloses nonpublic personal financial information about the licensee's former customers, other than those parties to whom the licensee discloses information under WAC 284-04-405 and 284-04-410;

(e) If a licensee discloses nonpublic personal financial information to a nonaffiliated third party under WAC 284-04-400 (and no other exception in WAC 284-04-405 and 284-04-410 applies to that disclosure), a separate description of the categories of information the licensee discloses and the categories of third parties with whom the licensee has contracted;

(f) An explanation of the consumer's right under WAC 284-04-300(1) to opt out of the disclosure of nonpublic personal financial information to nonaffiliated third parties, including the methods by which the consumer may exercise that right at that time;

(g) Any disclosures that the licensee makes under section 603 (d)(2)(A)(iii) of the Federal Fair Credit Reporting Act

(15 U.S.C. 1681a (d)(2)(A)(iii)) (that is, notices regarding the ability to opt out of disclosures of information among affiliates);

(h) The licensee's policies and practices with respect to protecting the confidentiality and security of nonpublic personal information; and

(i) Any disclosure that the licensee makes under subsection (2) of this section.

(2) Description of parties subject to exceptions. If a licensee discloses nonpublic personal financial information as authorized under WAC 284-04-405 and 284-04-410, the licensee is not required to list those exceptions in the initial or annual privacy notices required by WAC 284-04-200 and 284-04-205. When describing the categories of parties to whom disclosure is made, the licensee is required to state only that it makes disclosures to other affiliated or nonaffiliated third parties, as applicable, as permitted by law.

(3) Examples.

(a) Categories of nonpublic personal financial information that the licensee collects. A licensee satisfies the requirement to categorize the nonpublic personal financial information it collects if the licensee categorizes it according to the source of the information, as applicable:

(i) Information from the consumer;

(ii) Information about the consumer's transactions with the licensee or its affiliates;

(iii) Information about the consumer's transactions with nonaffiliated third parties; and

(iv) Information from a consumer reporting agency.

(b) Categories of nonpublic personal financial information a licensee discloses.

(i) A licensee satisfies the requirement to categorize nonpublic personal financial information it discloses if the licensee categorizes the information according to source, as described in (a) of this subsection, as applicable, and provides a few examples to illustrate the types of information in each category. These might include:

(A) Information from the consumer, including application information, such as assets and income and identifying information, such as name, address, and social security number;

(B) Transaction information, such as information about balances, payment history, and parties to the transaction; and

(C) Information from consumer reports, such as a consumer's creditworthiness and credit history.

(ii) A licensee does not adequately categorize the information that it discloses if the licensee uses only general terms, such as transaction information about the consumer.

(iii) If a licensee reserves the right to disclose all of the nonpublic personal financial information about consumers that it collects, the licensee may simply state that fact without describing the categories or examples of nonpublic personal information that the licensee discloses.

(c) Categories of affiliates and nonaffiliated third parties to whom the licensee discloses.

(i) A licensee satisfies the requirement to categorize the affiliates and nonaffiliated third parties to whom the licensee discloses nonpublic personal financial information about consumers if the licensee identifies the types of businesses in which they engage.

(ii) Types of businesses may be described by general terms only if the licensee uses a few illustrative examples of significant lines of business. For example, a licensee may use the term financial products or services if it includes appropriate examples of significant lines of businesses, such as life insurer, automobile insurer, consumer banking or securities brokerage.

(iii) A licensee also may categorize the affiliates and nonaffiliated third parties to whom it discloses nonpublic personal financial information about consumers using more detailed categories.

(d) Disclosures under exception for service providers and joint marketers. If a licensee discloses nonpublic personal financial information under the exception in WAC 284-04-400 to a nonaffiliated third party to market products or services that it offers alone or jointly with another financial institution, the licensee satisfies the disclosure requirement of subsection (1)(e) of this section if it:

(i) Lists the categories of nonpublic personal financial information it discloses, using the same categories and examples the licensee used to meet the requirements of subsection (1)(b) of this section, as applicable; and

(ii) States whether the third party is:

(A) A service provider that performs marketing services on the licensee's behalf or on behalf of the licensee and another financial institution; or

(B) A financial institution with whom the licensee has a joint marketing agreement.

(e) Simplified notices. If a licensee does not disclose, and does not wish to reserve the right to disclose, nonpublic personal financial information about customers or former customers to affiliates or nonaffiliated third parties except as authorized under WAC 284-04-405 and 284-04-410, the licensee may simply state that fact, in addition to the information it shall provide under subsections (1)(h), (i) and (2) of this section.

(f) Confidentiality and security. A licensee describes its policies and practices with respect to protecting the confidentiality and security of nonpublic personal financial information if it does both of the following:

(i) Describes in general terms who is authorized to have access to the information; and

(ii) States whether the licensee has security practices and procedures in place to ensure the confidentiality of the information in accordance with the licensee's policy. The licensee is not required to describe technical information about the safeguards it uses.

(4) Short-form initial notice with opt out notice for non-customers.

(a) A licensee may satisfy the initial notice requirements in WAC 284-04-200 (1)(b) for a consumer who is not a customer by providing a short-form initial notice at the same time as the licensee delivers an opt out notice as required in WAC 284-04-215.

(b) A short-form initial notice shall:

(i) Be clear and conspicuous;

(ii) State that the licensee's privacy notice is available upon request; and

(iii) Explain a reasonable means by which the consumer may obtain that notice.

(c) The licensee shall deliver its short-form initial notice according to WAC 284-04-225. The licensee is not required to deliver its privacy notice with its short-form initial notice. The licensee instead may simply provide the consumer a reasonable means to obtain its privacy notice. If a consumer who receives the licensee's short-form notice requests the licensee's privacy notice, the licensee shall deliver its privacy notice according to WAC 284-04-225.

(d) Examples of obtaining privacy notice. The licensee provides a reasonable means by which a consumer may obtain a copy of its privacy notice if the licensee:

(i) Provides a toll-free telephone number that the consumer may call to request the notice; or

(ii) For a consumer who conducts business in person at the licensee's office, maintain copies of the notice on hand that the licensee provides to the consumer immediately upon request.

(5) Future disclosures. The licensee's notice may include:

(a) Categories of nonpublic personal financial information that the licensee reserves the right to disclose in the future, but do not currently disclose; and

(b) Categories of affiliates or nonaffiliated third parties to whom the licensee reserves the right in the future to disclose, but to whom the licensee does not currently disclose, nonpublic personal financial information.

(6) Sample clauses. Sample clauses illustrating some of the notice content required by this section are included in Appendix A of this regulation.

#### NEW SECTION

#### **WAC 284-04-215 Form of opt out notice to consumers and opt out methods.**

(1)(a) Form of opt out notice. If a licensee is required to provide an opt out notice under WAC 284-04-300(1), it shall provide a clear and conspicuous notice to each of its consumers that accurately explains the right to opt out under that section. The notice shall state:

(i) That the licensee discloses or reserves the right to disclose nonpublic personal financial information about its consumer to a nonaffiliated third party;

(ii) That the consumer has the right to opt out of that disclosure; and

(iii) A reasonable means by which the consumer may exercise the opt out right.

(b) Examples.

(i) Adequate opt out notice. A licensee provides adequate notice that the consumer can opt out of the disclosure of nonpublic personal financial information to a nonaffiliated third party if the licensee:

(A) Identifies all of the categories of nonpublic personal financial information that it discloses or reserves the right to disclose, and all of the categories of nonaffiliated third parties to which the licensee discloses the information, as described in WAC 284-04-210 (1)(b) and (c), and states that the consumer can opt out of the disclosure of that information; and

(B) Identifies the insurance products or services that the consumer obtains from the licensee, either singly or jointly, to which the opt out direction would apply.



(ii) Reasonable opt out means. A licensee provides a reasonable means to exercise an opt out right if it:

(A) Designates check-off boxes in a prominent position on the relevant forms with the opt out notice;

(B) Includes a reply form together with the opt out notice;

(C) Provides an electronic means to opt out, such as a form that can be sent via electronic mail or a process at the licensee's website, if the consumer agrees to the electronic delivery of information; or

(D) Provides a toll-free telephone number that consumers may call to opt out.

(iii) Unreasonable opt out means. A licensee does not provide a reasonable means of opting out if:

(A) The only means of opting out is for the consumer to write his or her own letter to exercise that opt out right; or

(B) The only means of opting out as described in any notice subsequent to the initial notice is to use a check-off box that the licensee provided with the initial notice but did not include with the subsequent notice.

(iv) Specific opt out means. A licensee may require each consumer to opt out through a specific means, as long as that means is reasonable for that consumer.

(2) Same form as initial notice permitted. A licensee may provide the opt out notice together with or on the same written or electronic form as the initial notice the licensee provides in accordance with WAC 284-04-200.

(3) Initial notice required when opt out notice delivered subsequent to initial notice. If a licensee provides the opt out notice later than required for the initial notice in accordance with 284-04-200, the licensee shall also include a copy of the initial notice with the opt out notice in writing or, if the consumer agrees, electronically.

(4) Joint relationships.

(a) If two or more consumers jointly obtain an insurance product or service from a licensee, the licensee may provide a single opt out notice. The licensee's opt out notice shall explain how the licensee will treat an opt out direction by a joint consumer (as explained in (e) of this subsection).

(b) Any of the joint consumers may exercise the right to opt out. The licensee may either:

(i) Treat an opt out direction by a joint consumer as applying to all of the associated joint consumers; or

(ii) Permit each joint consumer to opt out separately.

(c) If a licensee permits each joint consumer to opt out separately, the licensee shall permit one of the joint consumers to opt out on behalf of all of the joint consumers.

(d) A licensee may not require all joint consumers to opt out before it implements any opt out direction.

(e) Example. If John and Mary are both named policyholders on a homeowner's insurance policy issued by a licensee and the licensee sends policy statements to John's address, the licensee may do any of the following, but it shall explain in its opt out notice which opt out policy the licensee will follow:

(i) Send a single opt out notice to John's address, but the licensee shall accept an opt out direction from either John or Mary.

(ii) Treat an opt out direction by either John or Mary as applying to the entire policy. If the licensee does so and John

opts out, the licensee may not require Mary to opt out as well before implementing John's opt out direction.

(iii) Permit John and Mary to make different opt out directions. If the licensee does so:

(A) It shall permit John and Mary to opt out for each other;

(B) If both opt out, the licensee shall permit both of them to notify it in a single response (such as on a form or through a telephone call); and

(C) If John opts out and Mary does not, the licensee may only disclose nonpublic personal financial information about Mary, but not about John and not about John and Mary jointly.

(5) Time to comply with opt out. A licensee shall comply with a consumer's opt out direction as soon as reasonably practicable after the licensee receives it.

(6) Continuing right to opt out. A consumer may exercise the right to opt out at any time.

(7) Duration of consumer's opt out direction.

(a) A consumer's direction to opt out under this section is effective until the consumer revokes it in writing or, if the consumer agrees, electronically.

(b) When a customer relationship terminates, the customer's opt out direction continues to apply to the nonpublic personal financial information that the licensee collected during or related to that relationship. If the individual subsequently establishes a new customer relationship with the licensee, the opt out direction that applied to the former relationship does not apply to the new relationship.

(8) Delivery. When a licensee is required to deliver an opt out notice by this section, the licensee shall deliver it according to WAC 284-04-225.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-220 Revised privacy notices.** (1) General rule. Except as otherwise authorized in this regulation, a licensee shall not, directly or through an affiliate, disclose any nonpublic personal financial information about a consumer to a nonaffiliated third party other than as described in the initial notice that the licensee provided to that consumer under WAC 284-04-200, unless:

(a) The licensee has provided to the consumer a clear and conspicuous revised notice that accurately describes its policies and practices;

(b) The licensee has provided to the consumer a new opt out notice;

(c) The licensee has given the consumer a reasonable opportunity, before the licensee discloses the information to the nonaffiliated third party, to opt out of the disclosure; and

(d) The consumer does not opt out.

(2) Examples.

(a) Except as otherwise permitted by WAC 284-04-400, 284-04-405, and 284-04-410, a licensee shall provide a revised notice before it:

(i) Discloses a new category of nonpublic personal financial information to any nonaffiliated third party;

(ii) Discloses nonpublic personal financial information to a new category of nonaffiliated third party; or



(iii) Discloses nonpublic personal financial information about a former customer to a nonaffiliated third party, if that former customer has not had the opportunity to exercise an opt out right regarding that disclosure.

(b) A revised notice is not required if the licensee discloses nonpublic personal financial information to a new nonaffiliated third party that the licensee adequately described in its prior notice.

(3) Delivery. When a licensee is required to deliver a revised privacy notice by this section, the licensee shall deliver it according to WAC 284-04-225.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-225 Delivery.** (1) How to provide notices. A licensee shall provide any notices that this regulation requires so that each consumer can reasonably be expected to receive actual notice in writing or, if the consumer agrees, electronically.

(2)(a) Examples of reasonable expectation of actual notice. A licensee may reasonably expect that a consumer will receive actual notice if the licensee:

(i) Hand-delivers a printed copy of the notice to the consumer;

(ii) Mails a printed copy of the notice to the last known address of the consumer separately, or in a policy, billing or other written communication;

(iii) For a consumer who conducts transactions electronically, posts the notice on the electronic site and requires the consumer to acknowledge receipt of the notice as a necessary step to obtaining a particular insurance product or service;

(iv) For an isolated transaction with a consumer, such as the licensee providing an insurance quote or selling the consumer travel insurance, posts the notice and requires the consumer to acknowledge receipt of the notice as a necessary step to obtaining the particular insurance product or service.

(b) Examples of unreasonable expectation of actual notice. A licensee may not, however, reasonably expect that a consumer will receive actual notice of its privacy policies and practices if it:

(i) Only posts a sign in its office or generally publishes advertisements of its privacy policies and practices; or

(ii) Sends the notice via electronic mail to a consumer who does not obtain an insurance product or service from the licensee electronically.

(3) Annual notices only. A licensee may reasonably expect that a customer will receive actual notice of the licensee's annual privacy notice if:

(a) The customer uses the licensee's website to access insurance products and services electronically and agrees to receive notices at the website and the licensee posts its current privacy notice continuously in a clear and conspicuous manner on the website; or

(b) The customer has requested that the licensee refrain from sending any information regarding the customer relationship, and the licensee's current privacy notice remains available to the customer upon request.

(4) Oral description of notice insufficient. A licensee may not provide any notice required by this regulation solely

by orally explaining the notice, either in person or over the telephone.

(5) Retention or accessibility of notices for customers.

(a) For customers only, a licensee shall provide the initial notice required by WAC 284-04-200 (1)(a), the annual notice required by WAC 284-04-205(1), and the revised notice required by WAC 284-04-220 so that the customer can retain them or obtain them later in writing or, if the customer agrees, electronically.

(b) Examples of retention or accessibility. A licensee provides a privacy notice to the customer so that the customer can retain it or obtain it later if the licensee:

(i) Hand-delivers a printed copy of the notice to the customer;

(ii) Mails a printed copy of the notice to the last known address of the customer; or

(iii) Makes its current privacy notice available on a website (or a link to another website) for the customer who obtains an insurance product or service electronically and agrees to receive the notice at the website.

(6) Joint notice with other financial institutions. A licensee may provide a joint notice from the licensee and one or more of its affiliates or other financial institutions, as identified in the notice, as long as the notice is accurate with respect to the licensee and the other institutions. A licensee also may provide a notice on behalf of another financial institution.

(7) Joint relationships. If two or more consumers jointly obtain an insurance product or service from a licensee, the licensee may satisfy the initial, annual and revised notice requirements of WAC, respectively, by providing one notice to those consumers jointly.

### PART 3

#### LIMITS ON DISCLOSURES OF FINANCIAL INFORMATION

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-300 Limits on disclosure of nonpublic personal financial information to nonaffiliated third parties.** (1)(a) Conditions for disclosure. Except as otherwise authorized in this regulation, a licensee may not, directly or through any affiliate, disclose any nonpublic personal financial information about a consumer to a nonaffiliated third party unless:

(i) The licensee has provided to the consumer an initial notice as required under WAC 284-04-200;

(ii) The licensee has provided to the consumer an opt out notice as required in WAC 284-04-215;

(iii) The licensee has given the consumer a reasonable opportunity, before it discloses the information to the nonaffiliated third party, to opt out of the disclosure; and

(iv) The consumer does not opt out.

(b) Opt out definition. Opt out means a direction by the consumer that the licensee not disclose nonpublic personal financial information about that consumer to a nonaffiliated third party, other than as permitted by WAC 284-04-400, 284-04-405, and 284-04-410.

PROPOSED

(c) Examples of reasonable opportunity to opt out. A licensee provides a consumer with a reasonable opportunity to opt out if:

(i) By mail. The licensee mails the notices required in (a) of this subsection to the consumer and allows the consumer to opt out by mailing a form, calling a toll-free telephone number or any other reasonable means within thirty days from the date the licensee mailed the notices.

(ii) By electronic means. A customer opens an on-line account with a licensee and agrees to receive the notices required in (a) of this subsection electronically, and the licensee allows the customer to opt out by any reasonable means within thirty days after the date that the customer acknowledges receipt of the notices in conjunction with opening the account.

(iii) Isolated transaction with consumer. For an isolated transaction such as providing the consumer with an insurance quote, a licensee provides the consumer with a reasonable opportunity to opt out if the licensee provides the notices required in (a) of this subsection at the time of the transaction and requests that the consumer decide, as a necessary part of the transaction, whether to opt out before completing the transaction.

(2) Application of opt out to all consumers and all nonpublic personal financial information.

(a) A licensee shall comply with this section, regardless of whether the licensee and the consumer have established a customer relationship.

(b) Unless a licensee complies with this section, the licensee may not, directly or through any affiliate, disclose any nonpublic personal financial information about a consumer that the licensee has collected, regardless of whether the licensee collected it before or after receiving the direction to opt out from the consumer.

(3) Partial opt out. A licensee may allow a consumer to select certain nonpublic personal financial information or certain nonaffiliated third parties with respect to which the consumer wishes to opt out.

## NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-305 Limits on redisclosure and reuse of nonpublic personal financial information.** (1)(a) Information the licensee receives under an exception. If a licensee receives nonpublic personal financial information from a nonaffiliated financial institution under an exception in WAC 284-04-405 or 284-04-410, the licensee's disclosure and use of that information is limited as follows:

(i) The licensee may disclose the information to the affiliates of the financial institution from which the licensee received the information;

(ii) The licensee may disclose the information to its affiliates, but the licensee's affiliates may, in turn, disclose and use the information only to the extent that the licensee may disclose and use the information; and

(iii) The licensee may disclose and use the information pursuant to an exception in WAC 284-04-405 or 284-04-410, in the ordinary course of business to carry out the activity covered by the exception under which the licensee received the information.

(b) Example. If a licensee receives information from a nonaffiliated financial institution for claims settlement purposes, the licensee may disclose the information for fraud prevention, or in response to a properly authorized subpoena. The licensee may not disclose that information to a third party for marketing purposes or use that information for its own marketing purposes.

(2)(a) Information a licensee receives outside of an exception. If a licensee receives nonpublic personal financial information from a nonaffiliated financial institution other than under an exception in WAC 284-04-405 or 284-04-410, the licensee may disclose the information only:

(i) To the affiliates of the financial institution from which the licensee received the information;

(ii) To its affiliates, but its affiliates may, in turn, disclose the information only to the extent that the licensee may disclose the information; and

(iii) To any other person, if the disclosure would be lawful if made directly to that person by the financial institution from which the licensee received the information.

(b) Example. If a licensee obtains a customer list from a nonaffiliated financial institution outside of the exceptions in WAC 284-04-405 or 284-04-410:

(i) The licensee may use that list for its own purposes; and

(ii) The licensee may disclose that list to another nonaffiliated third party only if the financial institution from which the licensee purchased the list could have lawfully disclosed the list to that third party. That is, the licensee may disclose the list in accordance with the privacy policy of the financial institution from which the licensee received the list, as limited by the opt out direction of each consumer whose nonpublic personal financial information the licensee intends to disclose, and the licensee may disclose the list in accordance with an exception in WAC 284-04-405 or 284-04-410, such as to the licensee's attorneys or accountants.

(3) Information a licensee discloses under an exception. If a licensee discloses nonpublic personal financial information to a nonaffiliated third party under an exception in WAC 284-04-405 or 284-04-410 of this regulation, the third party may disclose and use that information only as follows:

(a) The third party may disclose the information to the licensee's affiliates;

(b) The third party may disclose the information to its affiliates, but its affiliates may, in turn, disclose and use the information only to the extent that the third party may disclose and use the information; and

(c) The third party may disclose and use the information pursuant to an exception in WAC 284-04-405 or 284-04-410 in the ordinary course of business to carry out the activity covered by the exception under which it received the information.

(4) Information a licensee discloses outside of an exception. If a licensee discloses nonpublic personal financial information to a nonaffiliated third party other than under an exception in WAC 284-04-405 or 284-04-410, the third party may disclose the information only:

(a) To the licensee's affiliates;

(b) To the third party's affiliates, but the third party's affiliates, in turn, may disclose the information only to the extent the third party can disclose the information; and

(c) To any other person, if the disclosure would be lawful if the licensee made it directly to that person.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-310 Limits on sharing account number information for marketing purposes.** (1) General prohibition on disclosure of account numbers. A licensee shall not, directly or through an affiliate, disclose, other than to a consumer reporting agency, a policy number or similar form of access number or access code for a consumer's policy or transaction account to any nonaffiliated third party for use in telemarketing, direct mail marketing or other marketing through electronic mail to the consumer.

(2) Exceptions. Subsection (1) of this section does not apply if a licensee discloses a policy number or similar form of access number or access code:

(a) To the licensee's service provider solely in order to perform marketing for the licensee's own products or services, as long as the service provider is not authorized to directly initiate charges to the account;

(b) To a licensee who is a producer solely in order to perform marketing for the licensee's own products or services; or

(c) To a participant in an affinity or similar program where the participants in the program are identified to the customer when the customer enters into the program.

(3) Examples.

(a) Policy number. A policy number, or similar form of access number or access code, does not include a number or code in an encrypted form, as long as the licensee does not provide the recipient with a means to decode the number or code.

(b) Policy or transaction account. For the purposes of this section, a policy or transaction account is an account other than a deposit account or a credit card account. A policy or transaction account does not include an account to which third parties cannot initiate charges.

#### **PART 4**

#### **EXCEPTIONS TO LIMITS ON DISCLOSURES OF FINANCIAL INFORMATION**

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-400 Exception to opt out requirements for disclosure of nonpublic personal financial information for service providers and joint marketing.** (1) General rule.

(a) The opt out requirements in WAC 284-04-215 and 284-04-300 do not apply when a licensee provides nonpublic personal financial information to a nonaffiliated third party to perform services for the licensee or functions on the licensee's behalf, if the licensee:

(i) Provides the initial notice in accordance with WAC 284-04-200; and

(ii) Enters into a contractual agreement with the third party that prohibits the third party from disclosing or using the information other than to carry out the purposes for which the licensee disclosed the information, including use under an exception in WAC 284-04-405 or 284-04-410 in the ordinary course of business to carry out those purposes.

(b) Example. If a licensee discloses nonpublic personal financial information under this section to a financial institution with which the licensee performs joint marketing, the licensee's contractual agreement with that institution meets the requirements of (a)(ii) of this subsection if it prohibits the institution from disclosing or using the nonpublic personal financial information except as necessary to carry out the joint marketing or under an exception in WAC 284-04-405 or 284-04-410 in the ordinary course of business to carry out that joint marketing.

(2) Service may include joint marketing. The services a nonaffiliated third party performs for a licensee under subsection (1) of this section may include marketing of the licensee's own products or services or marketing of financial products or services offered pursuant to joint agreements between the licensee and one or more financial institutions.

(3) Definition of joint agreement. For purposes of this section, joint agreement means a written contract pursuant to which a licensee and one or more financial institutions jointly offer, endorse or sponsor an insurance product or service.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-405 Exceptions to notice and opt out requirements for disclosure of nonpublic personal financial information for processing and servicing transactions.**

(1) Exceptions for processing transactions at consumer's request. The requirements for initial notice in WAC 284-04-200 (1)(b), the opt out in WAC 284-04-215 and 284-04-300 and service providers and joint marketing in WAC 284-04-400 do not apply if the licensee discloses nonpublic personal financial information as necessary to effect, administer or enforce a transaction that a consumer requests or authorizes, or in connection with:

(a) Servicing or processing an insurance product or service that a consumer requests or authorizes;

(b) Maintaining or servicing the consumer's account with a licensee, or with another entity as part of a private label credit card program or other extension of credit on behalf of such entity;

(c) A proposed or actual securitization, secondary market sale (including sales of servicing rights) or similar transaction related to a transaction of the consumer; or

(d) Reinsurance or stop loss or excess loss insurance.

(2) Necessary to effect, administer or enforce a transaction means that the disclosure is:

(a) Required, or is one of the lawful or appropriate methods, to enforce the licensee's rights or the rights of other persons engaged in carrying out the financial transaction or providing the product or service; or

(b) Required, or is a usual, appropriate or acceptable method:

PROPOSED

PROPOSED

(i) To carry out the transaction or the product or service business of which the transaction is a part, and record, service or maintain the consumer's account in the ordinary course of providing the insurance product or service;

(ii) To administer or service benefits or claims relating to the transaction or the product or service business of which it is a part;

(iii) To provide a confirmation, statement or other record of the transaction, or information on the status or value of the insurance product or service to the consumer or the consumer's agent or broker;

(iv) To accrue or recognize incentives or bonuses associated with the transaction that are provided by a licensee or any other party;

(v) To underwrite insurance at the consumer's request or for any of the following purposes as they relate to a consumer's insurance: Account administration, reporting, investigating or preventing fraud or material misrepresentation, processing premium payments, processing insurance claims, administering insurance benefits (including utilization review activities), participating in research projects or as otherwise required or specifically permitted by federal or state law;

(vi) In connection with:

(A) The authorization, settlement, billing, processing, clearing, transferring, reconciling or collection of amounts charged, debited or otherwise paid using a debit, credit or other payment card, check or account number, or by other payment means;

(B) The transfer of receivables, accounts or interests therein; or

(C) The audit of debit, credit or other payment information.

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 284-04-410 Other exceptions to notice and opt out requirements for disclosure of nonpublic personal financial information.** (1) Exceptions to opt out requirements. The requirements for initial notice to consumers in WAC 284-04-200 (1)(b), the opt out in WAC 284-04-215 and 284-04-300, and service providers and joint marketing in WAC 284-04-400 do not apply when a licensee discloses nonpublic personal financial information:

(a) With the consent or at the direction of the consumer, provided that the consumer has not revoked the consent or direction;

(b)(i) To protect the confidentiality or security of a licensee's records pertaining to the consumer, service, product or transaction;

(ii) To protect against or prevent actual or potential fraud or unauthorized transactions;

(iii) For required institutional risk control or for resolving consumer disputes or inquiries;

(iv) To persons holding a legal or beneficial interest relating to the consumer; or

(v) To persons acting in a fiduciary or representative capacity on behalf of the consumer;

(c) To provide information to insurance rate advisory organizations, guaranty funds or agencies, agencies that are rating a licensee, persons that are assessing the licensee's compliance with industry standards, and the licensee's attorneys, accountants and auditors;

(d) To the extent specifically permitted or required under other provisions of law and in accordance with the Federal Right to Financial Privacy Act of 1978 (12 U.S.C. 3401 et seq.), to law enforcement agencies (including the Federal Reserve Board, Office of the Comptroller of the Currency, Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, Office of Thrift Supervision, National Credit Union Administration, the Securities and Exchange Commission), the Secretary of the Treasury, with respect to 31 U.S.C. Chapter 53, Subchapter II (Records and Reports on Monetary Instruments and Transactions) and 12 U.S.C. Chapter 21 (Financial Recordkeeping), a state insurance authority, and the Federal Trade Commission), self-regulatory organizations or for an investigation on a matter related to public safety;

(e)(i) To a consumer reporting agency in accordance with the Federal Fair Credit Reporting Act (15 U.S.C. 1681 et seq.); or

(ii) From a consumer report reported by a consumer reporting agency;

(f) In connection with a proposed or actual sale, merger, transfer or exchange of all or a portion of a business or operating unit if the disclosure of nonpublic personal financial information concerns solely consumers of the business or unit; or

(g)(i) To comply with federal, state or local laws, rules and other applicable legal requirements;

(ii) To comply with a properly authorized civil, criminal or regulatory investigation, or subpoena or summons by federal, state or local authorities;

(iii) To respond to judicial process or government regulatory authorities having jurisdiction over a licensee for examination, compliance or other purposes as authorized by law; or

(h) For purposes related to the replacement of a group benefit plan, a group health plan, a group welfare plan or a workers' compensation plan.

(2) Example of revocation of consent. A consumer may revoke consent by subsequently exercising the right to opt out of future disclosures of nonpublic personal information as permitted under WAC 284-04-215(6).

**PART 5  
RULES FOR HEALTH INFORMATION**

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 284-04-500 Health information privacy policies and procedures.** All licensees shall develop and implement written policies, standards and procedures for the management of health information, including policies, standards and procedures to guard against the unauthorized collection, use or disclosure of nonpublic personal health information by the licensee which shall include:

(1) Limitation on access to health information by only those persons who need to use the health information in order to perform their jobs;

(2) Appropriate training for all employees;

(3) Disciplinary measures for violations of the health information policies, standards and procedures;

(4) Identification of the job titles and job descriptions of persons that are authorized to disclose nonpublic personal health information;

(5) Procedures for authorizing and restricting the collection, use or disclosure of nonpublic personal health information;

(6) Methods for exercising the right to access and amend incorrect nonpublic personal health information;

(7) Methods for handling, disclosing, storing and disposing of health information;

(8) Periodic monitoring of the employee's compliance with the licensee's policies, standards and procedures in a manner sufficient for the licensee to determine compliance with this act and to enforce its policies, standards and procedures; and

(9) Methods for informing and allowing an individual who is the subject of nonpublic personal health information to request specialized disclosure or nondisclosure of nonpublic personal health information as required in this chapter.

(10) A licensee shall make the health information policies, standards and procedures developed pursuant to this section available for review by the commissioner.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-505 Nonpublic personal health information—When authorization required.** (1) A licensee shall not disclose nonpublic personal health information about a consumer or customer unless an authorization is obtained from the consumer or customer whose nonpublic personal health information is sought to be disclosed.

(2) Nothing in this section shall prohibit, restrict or require an authorization for the disclosure of nonpublic personal health information by a licensee for the performance of insurance functions by or on behalf of the licensee.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-510 Right to limit disclosure of health information.** (1) A licensee shall limit disclosure of any information, including health information, about an individual who is the subject of the information if the individual clearly states in writing that disclosure to specified individuals of all or part of that information could jeopardize the safety of the individual. Disclosure of information under this subsection shall be limited consistent with the individual's request, such as a request for the licensee to not release any information to a spouse to prevent domestic violence.

(2) Notwithstanding any insurance law requiring the disclosure of information, a licensee shall not disclose nonpublic personal health information concerning health services related to reproductive health, sexually transmitted diseases, chemical dependency and mental health, including mailing appointment notices, calling the home to confirm appointments,

or mailing a bill or explanation of benefits to a policyholder or certificateholder, if the individual who is the subject of the information makes a written request. The written request shall include information as to how any amounts payable by the individual will be handled. In addition, a licensee shall not require the individual to obtain the policyholder's or other covered person's authorization to receive health care services or to submit a claim.

(3)(a) A licensee shall recognize the right of any minor who may obtain health care without the consent of a parent or legal guardian pursuant to state or federal law, to exclusively exercise rights granted under this section regarding health information; and

(b) Shall not disclose any nonpublic personal health information related to any health care service to which the minor has lawfully consented, including mailing appointment notices, calling the home to confirm appointments, or mailing a bill or explanation of benefits to a policyholder or other covered person, without the express authorization of the minor. In addition, a licensee shall not require the minor to obtain the policyholder's or other covered person's authorization to receive health care services or to submit a claim.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-515 Authorizations.** (1) A valid authorization to disclose nonpublic personal health information pursuant to this Article V shall be in written or electronic form and shall contain all of the following:

(a) The identity of the consumer or customer who is the subject of the nonpublic personal health information.

(b) A general description of the types of nonpublic personal health information to be disclosed.

(c) General descriptions of the parties to whom the licensee discloses nonpublic personal health information, the purpose of the disclosure and how the information will be used.

(d) The signature of the consumer or customer who is the subject of the nonpublic personal health information or the individual who is legally empowered to grant authority and the date signed.

(e) Notice of the length of time for which the authorization is valid and that the consumer or customer may revoke the authorization at any time and the procedure for making such a revocation.

(2) An authorization for the purposes of this Article V shall specify a length of time for which the authorization shall remain valid, which in no event shall be for more than twenty-four months.

(3) A consumer or customer who is the subject of nonpublic personal health information may revoke an authorization provided pursuant to this Article V at any time, subject to the rights of any individual who acted in reliance on the authorization prior to notice of the revocation.

(4) A licensee shall retain the authorization or a copy thereof in the record of the individual who is the subject of nonpublic personal health information.

PROPOSED

NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-520 Authorization request delivery.** A request for authorization and an authorization form may be delivered to a consumer or a customer as part of an opt-out notice pursuant to WAC 284-04-225, provided that the request and the authorization form are clear and conspicuous. An authorization form is not required to be delivered to the consumer or customer or included in any other notices unless the licensee intends to disclose protected health information pursuant to WAC 284-04-500(1).

NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-525 Relationship to state and federal laws.** In the event of a conflict between this chapter and the state or federal laws, licensees shall comply with the state and federal laws governing privacy, as such laws relate to the business of insurance, except as expressly required by this chapter.

**PART 6  
ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS**

NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-600 Protection of Fair Credit Reporting Act.** Nothing in this regulation shall be construed to modify, limit or supersede the operation of the Federal Fair Credit Reporting Act (15 U.S.C. 1681 et seq.), and no inference shall be drawn on the basis of the provisions of this regulation regarding whether information is transaction or experience information under section 603 of that act.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-605 Nondiscrimination.** (1) A licensee shall not discriminate against any consumer or customer because that consumer or customer has opted out from the disclosure of his or her nonpublic personal financial information pursuant to the provisions of this regulation.

(2) A licensee shall not discriminate against a consumer or customer because that consumer or customer has not granted authorization for the disclosure of his or her nonpublic personal health information pursuant to the provisions of this regulation.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-610 Violation.** A violation of this regulation shall be deemed to be an unfair method of competition or an unfair or deceptive act and practice in this state.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-615 Severability.** If any section or portion of a section of this regulation or the applicability thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid by a court, the remainder of the regulation or the applicability of the provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-620 Effective date; transition rule.** (1) Effective date. This regulation is effective November 13, 2000. In order to provide sufficient time for licensees to establish policies and systems to comply with the requirements of this regulation, the commissioner has extended the time for compliance with this regulation until July 1, 2001.

(2)(a) Notice requirement for consumers who are the licensee's customers on the compliance date. By July 1, 2001, a licensee shall provide an initial notice, as required by WAC 284-04-200, to consumers who are the licensee's customers on July 1, 2001.

(b) Example. A licensee provides an initial notice to consumers who are its customers on July 1, 2001, if, by that date, the licensee has established a system for providing an initial notice to all new customers and has mailed the initial notice to all the licensee's existing customers.

(3) Two-year grandfathering of service agreements. Until July 1, 2002, a contract that a licensee has entered into with a nonaffiliated third party to perform services for the licensee or functions on the licensee's behalf satisfies the provisions of WAC 284-04-400 (1)(a)(ii), even if the contract does not include a requirement that the third party maintain the confidentiality of nonpublic personal information, as long as the licensee entered into the agreement on or before July 1, 2000.

**APPENDIX A**NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-04-900 Sample clauses.** Licensees, including a group of financial holding company affiliates that use a common privacy notice, may use the following sample clauses, if the clause is accurate for each institution that uses the notice. (Note that disclosure of certain information, such as assets, income and information from a consumer reporting agency, may give rise to obligations under the Federal Fair Credit Reporting Act, such as a requirement to permit a consumer to opt out of disclosures to affiliates or designation as a consumer reporting agency if disclosures are made to non-affiliated third parties.)

**A-1—Categories of information a licensee collects (all institutions)**

A licensee may use this clause, as applicable, to meet the requirement of WAC 284-04-210 (1)(a) to describe the categories of nonpublic personal information the licensee collects.

**Sample Clause A-1:**

We collect nonpublic personal information about you from the following sources:

- Information we receive from you on applications or other forms;
- Information about your transactions with us, our affiliates or others; and
- Information we receive from a consumer reporting agency.

**A-2—Categories of information a licensee discloses (institutions that disclose outside of the exceptions)**

A licensee may use one of these clauses, as applicable, to meet the requirement of WAC 284-04-210 (1)(b) to describe the categories of nonpublic personal information the licensee discloses. The licensee may use these clauses if it discloses nonpublic personal information other than as permitted by the exceptions in WAC 284-04-400, 284-04-405, and 284-04-410.

Sample Clause A-2, Alternative 1:

We may disclose the following kinds of nonpublic personal information about you:

- Information we receive from you on applications or other forms, such as (provide illustrative examples, such as "your name, address, Social Security number, assets, income, and beneficiaries");

- Information about your transactions with us, our affiliates or others, such as (provide illustrative examples, such as "your policy coverage, premiums, and payment history"); and

- Information we receive from a consumer reporting agency, such as (provide illustrative examples, such as "your creditworthiness and credit history").

Sample Clause A-2, Alternative 2:

We may disclose all of the information that we collect, as described (describe location in the notice, such as "above" or "below").

**A-3—Categories of information a licensee discloses and parties to whom the licensee discloses (institutions that do not disclose outside of the exceptions)**

A licensee may use this clause, as applicable, to meet the requirements of WAC 284-04-210 (1)(b), (c), and (d) to describe the categories of nonpublic personal information about customers and former customers that the licensee discloses and the categories of affiliates and nonaffiliated third parties to whom the licensee discloses. A licensee may use this clause if the licensee does not disclose nonpublic personal information to any party, other than as permitted by the exceptions in WAC 284-04-405 and 284-04-410.

Sample Clause A-3:

We do not disclose any nonpublic personal information about our customers or former customers to anyone, except as permitted by law.

**A-4—Categories of parties to whom a licensee discloses (institutions that disclose outside of the exceptions)**

A licensee may use this clause, as applicable, to meet the requirement of WAC 284-04-210 (1)(c) to describe the categories of affiliates and nonaffiliated third parties to whom the licensee discloses nonpublic personal information. This clause may be used if the licensee discloses nonpublic personal information other than as permitted by the exceptions in WAC 284-04-400, 284-04-405, and 284-04-410, as well as when permitted by the exceptions in WAC 284-04-405 and 284-04-410.

Sample Clause A-4:

We may disclose nonpublic personal information about you to the following types of third parties:

- Financial service providers, such as (provide illustrative examples, such as "life insurers, automobile insurers, mortgage bankers, securities broker-dealers, and insurance agents");

- Nonfinancial companies, such as (provide illustrative examples, such as "retailers, direct marketers, airlines, and publishers"); and

- Others, such as (provide illustrative examples, such as "nonprofit organizations").

We may also disclose nonpublic personal information about you to nonaffiliated third parties as permitted by law.

**A-5—Service provider/joint marketing exception**

A licensee may use one of these clauses, as applicable, to meet the requirements of WAC 284-04-210 (1)(e) related to the exception for service providers and joint marketers in WAC 284-04-400. If a licensee discloses nonpublic personal information under this exception, the licensee shall describe the categories of nonpublic personal information the licensee discloses and the categories of third parties with whom the licensee has contracted.

Sample Clause A-5, Alternative 1:

We may disclose the following information to companies that perform marketing services on our behalf or to other financial institutions with whom we have joint marketing agreements:

- Information we receive from you on applications or other forms, such as (provide illustrative examples, such as "your name, address, Social Security number, assets, income, and beneficiaries");

- Information about your transactions with us, our affiliates or others, such as (provide illustrative examples, such as "your policy coverage, premium, and payment history"); and

- Information we receive from a consumer reporting agency, such as (provide illustrative examples, such as "your creditworthiness and credit history").

Sample Clause A-5, Alternative 2:

We may disclose all of the information we collect, as described (describe location in the notice, such as "above" or "below") to companies that perform marketing services on our behalf or to other financial institutions with whom we have joint marketing agreements.

**A-6—Explanation of opt out right (institutions that disclose outside of the exceptions)**

A licensee may use this clause, as applicable, to meet the requirement of WAC 284-04-210 (1)(f) to provide an explanation of the consumer's right to opt out of the disclosure of nonpublic personal information to nonaffiliated third parties, including the method(s) by which the consumer may exercise that right. The licensee may use this clause if the licensee discloses nonpublic personal information other than as permitted by the exceptions in WAC 284-04-400, 284-04-405, and 284-04-410.

Sample Clause A-6:

If you prefer that we not disclose nonpublic personal information about you to nonaffiliated third parties, you may opt out of those disclosures, that is, you may direct us not to make those disclosures (other than disclosures permitted by law). If you wish to opt out of disclosures to nonaffiliated

third parties, you may (describe a reasonable means of opting out, such as "call the following toll-free number: (insert number)).

#### A-7—Confidentiality and security (all institutions)

A licensee may use this clause, as applicable, to meet the requirement of WAC 284-04-210 (1)(h) to describe its policies and practices with respect to protecting the confidentiality and security of nonpublic personal information.

#### Sample Clause A-7:

We restrict access to nonpublic personal information about you to (provide an appropriate description, such as "those employees who need to know that information to provide products or services to you"). We maintain physical, electronic, and procedural safeguards that comply with federal regulations to guard your nonpublic personal information.

Statute Being Implemented: RCW 48.43.500, 48.43.505, 48.43.510, 48.43.515, 48.43.520, 48.43.525, 48.43.530, 48.43.535.

Summary: The commissioner is proposing new rules to implement the recently enacted "patient bill of rights," chapter 5, Laws of 2000 (E2SSB 6199). These rules address six of the seven areas of that [what] will be the subject of rules: Information disclosure; access to health care services; insurer review of health care (utilization review); grievance processes; and independent review organizations. Several of these subjects require the commissioner to adopt rules.

Reasons Supporting Proposal: RCW 48.43.500 states the intent of the legislature in requiring or allowing the commissioner to adopt rules. The reasons include improved access to information, improved access to and choice of providers, a quick and impartial process to appeal decisions, privacy protection, and secure health information. The proposed rules seek to achieve these goals and the other consumer protection goals stated in the "patient bill of rights."

Rule is not necessitated by federal law, federal or state court decision.

Explanation of Rule, its Purpose, and Anticipated Effects: The legislature granted rule-making authority or mandated rules to implement the patient bill of rights. Many of the subjects addressed by the new law cannot be implemented by their effective dates without rules. In each instance, the legislature expressly provided that the commissioner consider national and local standards to create more detailed guidance for insurers. Many of the provisions of the new law are general and leave to the commissioner the authority to establish comprehensive standards. The proposed rules provide for more detailed guidance, particularly in the areas of utilization review, and grievance processes in order to create uniform standards across all health plans.

Proposal Changes the Following Existing Rules: Proposed WAC 284-43-130 is amended to expand the definition of health plan to mirror the scope of the law.

Proposed WAC 284-43-200 is amended to clarify existing procedures and to provide criteria to assess the adequacy of access of providers.

Proposed WAC 284-43-610 is amended to delete the definition of "clinical review criteria" which is no longer necessary.

Proposed WAC 284-43-620 is amended to include the need for expeditious independent review if delay would jeopardize the covered person's life or materially jeopardize their health. An additional new subsection allows for carrier recovery of costs for services incurred during the time when services are provided while a denial decision of the carrier is appealed and the carrier decision is ultimately affirmed.

A small business economic impact statement has been prepared under chapter 19.85 RCW.

#### Small Business Economic Impact Statement

**Overview:** On March 15 of 2000, Governor Locke signed E2SSB 6199, the "patient bill of rights." The legislation was codified at chapter 5, Laws of 2000. The new law requires the commissioner to adopt rules on a wide variety of subjects and provides authority to adopt rules on additional subjects. On June 6 of 2000, the commissioner filed a CR-101 announcing her intention to begin the rule-making process to [no further information supplied by agency.]

This rule making is intended to begin the process of implementing E2SSB 6199 by addressing many of the subject areas. The legislature granted rule-making authority or mandated rules to implement the patient bill of rights. Many of the subjects addressed by the new law cannot be implemented by their effective dates without rules. In each instance, the legislature expressly provided that the commissioner consider national and local standards to create more detailed guidance for insurers. Many of the provisions of the new law are general and leave to the commissioner the authority to establish comprehensive standards. More detailed guidance is particularly necessary for privacy, utili-



zation review, and grievance processes in order to create uniform standards across all health plans.

**Is the rule required by federal law or federal regulation?** This rule is not required by federal law or regulation.

**What industry is affected by the proposed rule?** The industry codes that would be affected by the proposed rules include Hospital and Medical Service Plans, industry code #6324 and health plans offered by Accident and Health Insurers, industry code #6321. In Washington, hospital and medical service plans are called health care service contractors (HCSCs) and health maintenance organizations (HMOs). Public programs, including those under RCW 74.09.522, chapters 70.47 and 41.05 RCW are also impacted by many provisions of these rules, except to the extent otherwise provided in statute.

**List the specific parts of the proposed rule which may impose a cost to business:** Proposed WAC 284-43-130 is not expected to incur any costs traceable to the rules. It applies the scope set forth in E2SSB 6199, section 19 to the rule making. The amendment states that the provisions of chapter 284-43 WAC apply to plans of specified state programs except to the extent otherwise required by their governing statutes. Not every provision of the new rules or chapter 284-43 WAC apply to each specified program and plan.

Proposed WAC 284-43-200 elaborates the current network adequacy regulatory scheme and reiterates provisions of RCW 48.43.515. Criteria in proposed subsection (4) provide direction to carriers about adequacy but allow for flexibility in terms of geographic and provider availability. Proposed subsection (7) is designed to provide carriers with the most possible options to solve existing access problems with the Indian health care system. Carriers are encouraged to meet the current challenges with any system that works best for them within the framework of the rule, and other state and federal law.

Proposed WAC 284-43-251 restates RCW 48.43.515. It should not impose costs.

Proposed WAC 284-43-400 provides definitions for use in utilization review. Proposed WAC 284-43-410 states the general utilization review standards. Both sections apply, with few exceptions, national standards considered by the commissioner under RCW 48.43.520. The generally accepted national standards and best practices are standards that many of the health carriers state they already follow; the standards adopted by URAC (also known as the American Accreditation Health Care Commission). There may be little or no costs to the carriers currently using these standards. There may be some costs to carriers who are not currently meeting the threshold of these standards. Subsections (g), (h), and (i) vary slightly from URAC and attempt to address some areas of provider contract relationships that have troubled providers and carriers. These sections should not incur more than nominal costs. They seek to avoid penalizing providers based on information not available to the provider, new or changed protocols that are not communicated to the provider, or care that had prior authorization of the carrier (unless the authorization was based on intentional material misrepresentations that the intended by the provider to obtain coverage.)

Proposed WAC 284-43-610 deletes an existing subsection. No costs are expected.

Proposed WAC 284-43-615 establishes general grievance and complaint procedures. It restates statutory requirements of RCW 48.43.530. No costs are expected.

Proposed WAC 284-43-620 provides additional direction on the review and appeal of adverse determinations. The major amendment is subsection (7), which provides that carriers may recover costs incurred by the carrier for providing services while a review is pending when the review affirms the carrier's denial of services. This section provides for cost recovery and obviously should incur no net costs.

Proposed WAC 284-43-630 establishes a framework for the independent review of adverse determinations as required by RCW 48.43.535.

Proposed WAC 284-43-820 addresses new RCW 48.43.095. The statute is restated. No costs are expected.

**What percentage of the industries in the four-digit standard industrial classification will be affected by the rule?** The proposed rule would affect 100% of the health carriers that offer health plans subject to regulation by the insurance commissioner.

**Will the rule impose a disproportionately higher economic burden on small businesses within the four-digit classification?** The OIC does not believe that any of the regulated entities impacted by these rules are small businesses for the purposes of chapter 19.85 RCW. Nevertheless, the commissioner is committed to keeping costs proportionate for the smaller carriers. The proposed rules do not impose disproportionately higher costs on smaller carriers.

**Can mitigation be used to reduce the economic impact of the rule on small businesses and still meet the objectives of the proposed rule?** The rule does not include any mitigatory tactics to reduce the specific anticipated costs to small business. The mitigatory measures considered in this rule making apply equally to all carriers. The commissioner encourages any suggestions that can accomplish the goals in a more cost-efficient manner and encourages dialogue with all carriers.

**What steps will the commissioner take to reduce the costs of the rule on small businesses?** The rule-drafting process will continue and small businesses are invited to comment on any proposed section of the rule and offer suggestions or alternatives. The rule drafters will continue to discuss the proposed rules with industry representatives to discuss methods to reduce any potential costs on smaller carriers. Additionally, the commissioner will provide technical assistance to aid all carriers in understanding and implementing the new rules.

**Which mitigation techniques have been considered and incorporated into the proposed rule?** The rules are being proposed as early as possible and with a delayed effective date to enable industry to comment on the proposal and have adequate time to prepare any systemic changes necessary to comply with the rules and laws. The rule drafters will continue to discuss the proposed rules with industry representatives to discuss methods to reduce any potential costs.

**Which mitigation techniques were considered for incorporation into the proposed rule but were rejected, and why?** No mitigation techniques were considered for incorporation and then rejected.

**Briefly describe the reporting, record-keeping, and other compliance requirements of the proposed rule.** The reporting and record-keeping requirements in the rules are traceable back to the underlying statutes. For example, proposed WAC 284-43-820 restates RCW 48.43.510. The record-keeping and reporting requirements are not a product of the rule but of the statute. For example, RCW 48.43.510(5) requires the annual reports made available to enrollees. That law is restated at WAC 284-43-820(5). There are no substantive costs due to the rule.

**List the kinds of professional services that a small business is likely to need in order to comply with the reporting, record-keeping, and other compliance requirements of the proposed rule.** A small business is not likely to need any additional professional services because of the proposed rules. There may be some need for services directly traceable to the underlying statutes but it is not apparent that the rules will occasion the need for additional staffing or professional services. If carriers or small carriers believe that additional staffing or services are needed due to these rules (and not the underlying statutes), they are encouraged to cite the section that would require the staffing and recommend methods to ameliorate the need if at all possible.

The commissioner will seek to provide whatever technical assistance is necessary to enable the smaller carriers to understand and implement the rule.

**Analyze the cost of compliance including, specifically:** *Cost of equipment:* There is no anticipated additional cost of equipment.

*Cost of supplies:* There are no anticipated cost of supplies attributable to the rule. The disclosure provisions are required by statute.

*Cost of labor:* It is not anticipated that the rule will be responsible for additional cost of labor. There are always costs associated with reading and comprehending any rule changes but it is believed that these costs are nominal. The OIC does not expect that any additional staff will be required as a result of this rule.

*Cost of increased administration:* There is no significant anticipated increased cost of administration attributable to the rules. There are no additional filings required. As noted previously, proposed WAC 284-43-200 elaborates the current network adequacy regulatory scheme and reiterates provisions of RCW 48.43.515. However, new criteria in proposed subsection (4) provide direction to carriers about network adequacy. Meeting these standards may incur some costs but the rules are designed to allow for the flexibility in terms of geographic and provider availability. Proposed subsection (7) is designed to provide carriers with the most possible options to solve existing access problems with the Indian health care system. Carriers are encouraged to meet the current challenges with any system that works best for them within the framework of the rule, and other state and federal law. There are administration costs associated with proposed

WAC 284-43-400 and 284-43-410, the utilization review standards. As noted previously, the commissioner considered national standards as required by the underlying statute, RCW 48.43.520. The generally accepted national standards and best practices are standards that many of the health carriers state they already follow; the standards adopted by URAC (also known as the American Accreditation Health Care Commission). There may be little or no costs to carriers who currently utilize these standards. There may be some cost for the carriers who are not currently meeting the threshold of these standards. Subsections (g), (h), and (i) vary slightly from URAC and attempt to address some areas of provider contract relationships that have troubled providers and carriers. These sections should not incur more than nominal costs.

**Compare the cost of compliance for small business with the cost of compliance for the largest business in the same four-digit classification:** The cost of compliance for small business will be proportional for all carriers, large and small. As noted, many of the costs are traceable to the underlying laws, not these rules. The costs associated with the rules should be relative to the size of the carriers and their enrollee population. Examples are network adequacy and utilization review.

The rule drafters will consider any suggested alternatives that accomplish the goals of the rules while mitigating the costs of compliance, particularly those costs incurred by small businesses.

**Have businesses that will be affected been asked what the economic impact will be?** The rule drafters have been in on-going discussions with affected carriers regarding implementation of the "patient bill of rights" since the passage of the law. Since the laws were drafted with industry knowledge and participation and most of the costs are attributable to the rules, it is safe to say that the great majority of economic impacts have been known and discussed with carriers for close to a year. There may [be] some impacts that are new to some carriers in these rules but the majority are known and have been discussed. Comments were solicited in the CR-101 and subject areas of discussion were enumerated. The commissioner notified all affected carriers that she intended to hold informational hearings in July on the prospective rules in Seattle, Spokane, Yakima, and Vancouver. Carriers were encouraged to participate in the dialogue with the consumers, providers, and commissioner's staff.

The rule drafters will continue to discuss the proposed rules with industry representatives to ascertain methods to reduce any potential costs.

**How did the commissioner involve small business in the development of the proposed rule?** All affected carriers were notified of the beginning of formal rule making by the CR-101, which was mailed to impacted parties in June and posted on the commissioner's website. Comments were solicited in the CR-101 and subject areas of discussion were enumerated. The commissioner notified all affected carriers that she intended to hold informational hearings in July on the prospective rules in Seattle, Spokane, Yakima, and Vancouver. Carriers were encouraged to participate in the dialogue with the consumers, providers, and commissioner's staff.

**How and when were affected small businesses advised of the proposed rule?** As noted above, the CR-101 for this rule was filed on June 6, 2000. It was mailed to interested parties and posted on the commissioner's website. All affected carriers were informed of the time and location of informational hearings held by the commissioner in July and topic areas of discussion.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending Matter No. R 98-7, filed 9/8/99, effective 10/9/99)

**WAC 284-43-130 Definitions.** Except as defined in other subchapters and unless the context requires otherwise, the following definitions shall apply throughout this chapter.

(1) "Covered health condition" means any disease, illness, injury or condition of health risk covered according to the terms of any health plan.

(2) "Covered person" means an individual covered by a health plan including an enrollee, subscriber, policyholder, or beneficiary of a group plan.

(3) "Emergency medical condition" means the emergent and acute onset of a symptom or symptoms, including severe pain, that would lead a prudent layperson acting reasonably to believe that a health condition exists that requires immediate medical attention, if failure to provide medical attention would result in serious impairment to bodily functions or serious dysfunction of a bodily organ or part, or would place the person's health in serious jeopardy.

(4) "Emergency services" means otherwise covered health care services medically necessary to evaluate and treat an emergency medical condition, provided in a hospital emergency department.

(5) "Enrollee point-of-service cost-sharing" or "cost-sharing" means amounts paid to health carriers directly providing services, health care providers, or health care facilities by enrollees and may include copayments, coinsurance, or deductibles.

(6) "Facility" means an institution providing health care services, including but not limited to hospitals and other licensed inpatient centers, ambulatory surgical or treatment centers, skilled nursing centers, residential treatment centers, diagnostic, laboratory, and imaging centers, and rehabilitation and other therapeutic settings.

(7) "Grievance" means a written complaint submitted by or on behalf of a covered person regarding:

(a) Denial of health care services or payment for health care services; or

(b) Issues other than health care services or payment for health care services including dissatisfaction with health care services, delays in obtaining health care services, conflicts with carrier staff or providers, and dissatisfaction with carrier practices or actions unrelated to health care services.

(8) "Health care provider" or "provider" means:

(a) A person regulated under Title 18 RCW or chapter 70.127 RCW, to practice health or health-related services or otherwise practicing health care services in this state consistent with state law; or

(b) An employee or agent of a person described in (a) of this subsection, acting in the course and scope of his or her employment.

(9) "Health care service" or "health service" means that service offered or provided by health care facilities and health care providers relating to the prevention, cure, or treatment of illness, injury, or disease.

(10) "Health carrier" or "carrier" means a disability insurance company regulated under chapter 48.20 or 48.21 RCW, a health care service contractor as defined in RCW 48.44.010, and a health maintenance organization as defined in RCW 48.46.020.

(11) "Health plan" or "plan" means any individual or group policy, contract, or agreement offered by a health carrier to provide, arrange, reimburse, or pay for health care service including any policy, contract, or agreement under RCW 74.09.522; the basic health plan offered under chapter 70.47 RCW; and health benefits provided under chapter 41.05 RCW except to the extent otherwise required under the specific governing statutes except the following:

(a) Long-term care insurance governed by chapter 48.84 RCW;

(b) Medicare supplemental health insurance governed by chapter 48.66 RCW;

(c) Limited health care service offered by limited health care service contractors in accordance with RCW 48.44.035;

(d) Disability income;

(e) Coverage incidental to a property/casualty liability insurance policy such as automobile personal injury protection coverage and homeowner guest medical;

(f) Workers' compensation coverage;

(g) Accident only coverage;

(h) Specified disease and hospital confinement indemnity when marketed solely as a supplement to a health plan;

(i) Employer-sponsored self-funded health plans;

(j) Dental only and vision only coverage; and

(k) Plans deemed by the insurance commissioner to have a short-term limited purpose or duration, or to be a student-only plan that is guaranteed renewable while the covered person is enrolled as a regular full-time undergraduate or gradu-

ate student at an accredited higher education institution, after a written request for such classification by the carrier and subsequent written approval by the insurance commissioner.

(12) "Managed care plan" means a health plan that coordinates the provision of covered health care services to a covered person through the use of a primary care provider and a network.

(13) "Medically necessary" or "medical necessity" in regard to mental health services is a carrier determination as to whether a health service is a covered benefit if the service is consistent with generally recognized standards within a relevant health profession.

(14) "Mental health provider" means a health care provider or a health care facility authorized by state law to provide mental health services.

(15) "Mental health services" means in-patient or out-patient treatment, partial hospitalization or out-patient treatment to manage or ameliorate the effects of a mental disorder listed in the *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual (DSM) IV* published by the American Psychiatric Association, excluding diagnoses and treatments for substance abuse, 291.0 through 292.9 and 303.0 through 305.9.

(16) "Network" means the group of participating providers and facilities providing health care services to a particular health plan. A health plan network for carriers offering more than one health plan may be smaller in number than the total number of participating providers and facilities for all plans offered by the carrier.

(17) "Out-patient therapeutic visit" or "out-patient visit" means a clinical treatment session with a mental health provider of a duration consistent with relevant professional standards used by the carrier to determine medical necessity for the particular service being rendered, as defined in *Physicians Current Procedural Terminology*, published by the American Medical Association.

(18) "Participating provider" and "participating facility" means a facility or provider who, under a contract with the health carrier or with the carrier's contractor or subcontractor, has agreed to provide health care services to covered persons with an expectation of receiving payment, other than coinsurance, copayments, or deductibles, from the health carrier rather than from the covered person.

(19) "Person" means an individual, a corporation, a partnership, an association, a joint venture, a joint stock company, a trust, an unincorporated organization, any similar entity, or any combination of the foregoing.

(20) "Primary care provider" means a participating provider who supervises, coordinates, or provides initial care or continuing care to a covered person, and who may be required by the health carrier to initiate a referral for specialty care and maintain supervision of health care services rendered to the covered person.

(21) "Preexisting condition" means any medical condition, illness, or injury that existed any time prior to the effective date of coverage.

(22) "Premium" means all sums charged, received, or deposited by a health carrier as consideration for a health plan or the continuance of a health plan. Any assessment or any "membership," "policy," "contract," "service," or similar fee

or charge made by a health carrier in consideration for a health plan is deemed part of the premium. "Premium" shall not include amounts paid as enrollee point-of-service cost-sharing.

(23) "Small group" means a health plan issued to a small employer as defined under RCW 48.43.005(24) comprising from one to fifty eligible employees.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending Matter No. R 99-2, filed 1/24/00, effective 3/1/00)

**WAC 284-43-200 Network adequacy.** (1) A health carrier shall maintain each plan network in a manner that is sufficient in numbers and types of providers and facilities to assure that all health plan services to covered persons will be accessible without unreasonable delay. Each covered person shall have adequate choice among each type of health care provider. Adequate choice is determined in relation to the number of covered persons who might be expected to seek care from the type of provider whose services are covered by the plan including those types of providers who must be included under WAC 284-43-205. In the case of emergency services, covered persons shall have access twenty-four hours per day, seven days per week. The carrier's service area shall not be created in a manner designed to discriminate against persons because of age, sex, family structure, ethnicity, race, health condition, employment status, or socioeconomic status. Each carrier shall ensure that its networks will meet these requirements by the end of the first year of initial operation (~~(; or, for those plans already in existence, by August 22, 1998)~~) of the network and at all times thereafter.

(2) Sufficiency may be established by the carrier with reference to any reasonable criteria used by the carrier, including but not limited to: Provider-covered person ratios by specialty, primary care provider-covered person ratios, geographic accessibility, waiting times for appointments with participating providers, hours of operation, and the volume of technological and specialty services available to serve the needs of covered persons requiring technologically advanced or specialty care. Evidence of carrier compliance with network adequacy standards that are substantially similar to those standards established by state agency health care purchasers (e.g., the state health care authority and the department of social and health services) and by private managed care accreditation organizations may be used to demonstrate sufficiency. At a minimum, a carrier will be held accountable for meeting those standards described under WAC 284-43-220.

(3) In any case where the health carrier has an absence of or an insufficient number or type of participating providers or facilities or an absence of a choice of participating specialists to provide a particular covered health care service, the carrier shall ensure through referral by the primary care provider or otherwise that the covered person obtains the covered service from a provider or facility within reasonable proximity of the covered person at no greater cost to the covered person than if the service were obtained from network providers and facilities, or shall make other arrangements acceptable to the commissioner.

(4) The health carrier shall establish and maintain adequate arrangements to ensure reasonable proximity of network providers and facilities to the business or personal residence of covered persons. The network shall be established in a manner that does not require a covered person to travel more than thirty minutes by ground transportation to seek the services of a participating provider or facility unless such travel is necessitated by the unique circumstances of the covered person's condition and such travel would both benefit the health of the covered person and would be considered reasonable medical practice within the relevant medical community. In determining whether a health carrier has complied with this provision, the commissioner will give due consideration to the relative availability of health care providers or facilities in the service area under consideration and to the standards established by state agency health care purchasers. Relative availability includes the willingness of providers or facilities in the service area to contract with the carrier under reasonable terms and conditions.

Whenever a carrier and provider or facility are unable to come to agreement as to the terms and conditions for participation of a provider or facility within a network, either party may demand and obtain mediation to resolve the dispute.

(5) A health carrier shall monitor, on an ongoing basis, the ability and clinical capacity of its network providers and facilities to furnish health plan services to covered persons.

(6) Beginning July 1, 2000, the health carrier shall disclose to covered persons that limitations or restrictions on access to participating providers and facilities may arise from the health service referral and authorization practices of participating providers and facilities. The carrier shall provide instructions to covered persons as to how they can receive details about such practices from their primary care provider or through other formally established processes. For example, a covered person relying on such instructions or processes could discover if the choice of a particular primary care provider would result in the covered person's inability to obtain a referral to certain other participating providers.

(7) Each health carrier shall maintain adequate arrangements to ensure that American Indians who are covered persons have access to Indian health care services and facilities that are part of the Indian health system. Carriers shall ensure that such covered persons may obtain covered services from the Indian health system at no greater cost to the covered person than if the service were obtained from network providers and facilities. Carriers are not responsible for credentialing providers and facilities that are part of the Indian health system. Nothing in this subsection prohibits a carrier from limiting coverage to those health services that meet carrier standards for medical necessity, care management, and claims administration.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-43-251 Covered person's access to providers.** (1) Each carrier must allow a covered person to choose a primary care provider who is accepting new patients from a list of participating providers. Covered persons also must be permitted to change primary care providers at any time with the change becoming effective no later than the beginning of

the month following the covered person's request for the change.

(2) Each carrier must have a process whereby a covered person with a complex or serious medical or psychiatric condition may receive a standing referral to a participating specialist for an extended period of time of not less than six months.

(3) Each carrier shall provide covered persons with direct access to the participating chiropractor of the covered person's choice for covered chiropractic health care without the necessity of prior referral. Nothing in this subsection shall prevent carriers from restricting covered persons to seeing only chiropractors who have signed participating provider agreements or from utilizing other managed care and cost containment techniques and processes. For purposes of this subsection, "covered chiropractic health care" means covered benefits and limitations related to chiropractic health services as stated in the plan's medical coverage agreement, with the exception of any provisions related to prior referral for services.

(4) Each carrier must provide, upon the request of a covered person, access by the covered person to a second opinion regarding any medical diagnosis or treatment plan from a qualified participating provider of the covered person's choice. The carrier may not impose any charge or cost upon the covered person for such second opinion other than a charge or cost imposed for similar, routine access to care such as an office visit copayment.

(5) Each carrier must cover services of a primary care provider whose contract with the plan or whose contract with a subcontractor is being terminated by the plan or subcontractor without cause under the terms of that contract for at least sixty days following notice of termination to the covered persons or, in group coverage arrangements involving periods of open enrollment, only until the end of the next open enrollment period. Notice to covered persons shall include information of the covered person's right of access to the terminating provider for an additional sixty days. The provider's relationship with the carrier or subcontractor must be continued on the same terms and conditions as those of the contract the plan or subcontractor is terminating, except for any provision requiring that the carrier assign new covered persons to the terminated provider. A health carrier and participating provider and facility shall provide at least sixty days' written notice to each other before terminating the contract without cause.

(6) Each carrier shall make a good faith effort to assure that written notice of a termination within fifteen working days of receipt or issuance of a notice of termination is provided to all covered persons who are patients seen on a regular basis by the provider whose contract is terminating, irrespective of whether the termination was for cause or without cause.

## SUBCHAPTER D UTILIZATION REVIEW

### NEW SECTION

#### WAC 284-43-400 Utilizations review—Definitions.

As used in this subchapter:

(1) "Adverse determination and noncertification" means a decision by a health carrier to deny, modify, reduce, or terminate payment, coverage, authorization, or provision of health care services or benefits including the admission to or continued stay in a facility. Such term does not include a decision affecting payment or coverage after the service or benefit has been provided.

(2) "Certification" means a determination by the carrier that an admission, extension of stay, or other health care service has been reviewed and, based on the information provided, meets the clinical requirements for medical necessity, appropriateness, level of care, or effectiveness under the auspices of the applicable health plan.

(3) "Clinical peer" means a physician or other health professional who holds an unrestricted license or certification and is in the same or similar specialty as typically manages the medical condition, procedures, or treatment under review. Generally, as a peer in a similar specialty, the individual must be in the same profession, i.e., the same licensure as the ordering provider.

(4) "Clinical rationale" means a statement which provides additional clarification of the clinical basis for a noncertification determination. The clinical rationale should relate the noncertification determination to the patient's condition or treatment plan, and should supply a sufficient basis for a decision to pursue an appeal.

(5) "Clinical review criteria" means the written screens, decision rules, medical protocols, or guidelines used by the carrier as an element in the evaluation of medical necessity and appropriateness of requested admissions, procedures, and services under the auspices of the applicable health plan.

(6) "Initial clinical review" means a clinical review conducted by appropriate licensed or certified health professionals. Initial clinical review staff may approve requests for admissions, procedures, and services that meet clinical review criteria, but must refer requests that do not meet clinical review criteria to peer clinical review for certification or noncertification.

(7) "Review of service request" means the review of information submitted to the carrier for health care services that do not need medical necessity certification nor result in a noncertification decision.

(8) "Scripted clinical screening" means screening that may include:

(a) Accepting structured clinical data (including diagnosis, diagnosis codes, procedures, procedure codes);

(b) Asking scripted clinical questions;

(c) Accepting responses to scripted clinical questions; and

(d) Taking specific action (certification and assignment of length of stay explicitly linked to each of the possible responses). It excludes:

(i) Applying clinical judgment or interpretation;

(ii) Accepting unstructured clinical information;

(iii) Deviating from script;

(iv) Engaging in unscripted clinical dialogue;

(v) Asking clinical follow-up questions; and

(vi) Issuing noncertifications.

(9) "Structured clinical data" means clinical information that is precise and permits exact matching against explicit medical terms, diagnoses or procedure codes, or other explicit choices, without the need for interpretation.

### NEW SECTION

#### WAC 284-43-410 Utilization review—Generally. (1)

Each carrier shall maintain a documented utilization review program description and written clinical review criteria based on reasonable medical evidence. The program must include a method for reviewing and updating criteria. Carriers shall make clinical review criteria available upon request to participating providers. A carrier need not use medical evidence or standards in its utilization review of religious nonmedical treatment or religious nonmedical nursing care.

(2) The utilization review program shall have staff who are properly qualified, trained, supervised, and supported by explicit written clinical review criteria and review procedures.

(a) For data collection, intake screening, and "scripted clinical screening," use of nonclinical administrative staff shall be limited to:

(i) Performance of "review of service requests";

(ii) Collection and transfer of nonclinical data;

(iii) Acquisition of structured clinical data; and

(iv) Scripted clinical screening that does not require evaluation or interpretation of clinical information.

(b) Nonclinical administrative staff performing the functions of section (a) of this subsection shall:

(i) Be qualified and fully trained to perform;

(ii) Be supported by explicit instructions and scripts;

(iii) Be trained to promptly transfer through an established process, a telephone call for review of services to a clinical reviewer if the review cannot be completed based upon a formal script; and

(iv) Be monitored by a licensed health professional while performing administrative review.

(3) Each carrier shall designate a medical director who is licensed under chapter 18.57 or 18.71 RCW. However, a naturopathic or complementary alternative health plan, which provides solely complementary alternative health care to individuals, groups, or health plans, may have a medical director licensed under chapter 18.36A RCW. A health plan or self-insured health plan that offers only religious nonmedical treatment or religious nonmedical nursing care shall not be required to have a medical director.

(4) Every carrier when conducting an initial clinical review, shall:

(a) Refer review of services that do not meet initial review criteria to a clinical peer;

(b) Restrict performance of initial clinical review to individuals who meet both of the following requirements:

(i) Individuals who are health professionals; and

(ii) Who possess a current and valid professional license or certificate in Washington state.

(c) Require initial clinical reviewers to be supported by a physician who has an unrestricted license to practice medicine in Washington state.

(5) Each carrier shall conduct peer clinical reviews for all cases where a clinical determination to certify cannot be made by initial clinical review. Review shall be conducted by health professionals who are qualified to render a clinical opinion about the medical condition, procedures, and treatment under review and who hold a current unrestricted license in the same licensure or certification category as the ordering provider.

(6) Health professionals that conduct peer clinical review shall be available within one business day, by telephone or in person, to discuss the determination with the attending physician or order providers.

(7) Each carrier when conducting routine prospective review, concurrent review, or retrospective review shall:

(a) Accept information from any reasonably reliable source that will assist in the certification process;

(b) Collect only the information necessary to certify the admission, procedure or treatment, length of stay, or frequency or duration of services;

(c) Not routinely require providers or facilities to numerically code diagnoses or procedures to be considered for certification, but may request such codes, if available;

(d) Not routinely request copies of medical records on all patients reviewed;

(e) Require only the section(s) of the medical record during prospective review or concurrent review necessary in that specific case to certify medical necessity or appropriateness of the admission or extension of stay, frequency or duration of service;

(f) For prospective and concurrent review, base review determinations solely on the medical information obtained by the carrier at the time of the review determination;

(g) For retrospective review, base review determinations solely on the medical information available to the attending physician or order provider at the time the health service was provided;

(h) Not retrospectively deny coverage for emergency and nonemergency care that had prior authorization under the plan's written policies at the time the care was rendered unless the prior authorization was based upon a material misrepresentation by the provider intended for the purpose of obtaining approval;

(i) Not retrospectively deny coverage or payment for care based upon standards or protocols not communicated to the provider or facility within a sufficient time period for the provider or facility to modify care in accordance with such standard or protocol; and

(j) Reverse its certification determination only when information provided to the carrier is materially different from that which was reasonably available at the time of the original determination.

(8) Each carrier shall reimburse reasonable costs of medical record duplication for reviews.

(9) Each carrier shall have written procedures to assure that reviews and second opinions are conducted in a timely manner.

(a) Review determinations must be made within two business days of receipt of the necessary information on a proposed admission or service requiring a review determination.

(b) The frequency of reviews for the extension of initial determinations must be based upon the severity or complexity of the patient's condition or on necessary treatment and discharge planning activity.

(c) Retrospective review determinations must be completed within thirty days of receipt of the necessary information.

(d) Notification of the determination shall be provided to the attending physician or ordering provider or facility and to the covered person within two days of the determination and shall be provided within one day of concurrent review determination. Notification shall include the number of extended days, the next anticipated review point, the new total number of days or services approved, and the date of admission or onset of services.

(10) No carrier may penalize or threaten a provider or facility with a reduction in future payment or termination of participating provider or participating facility status because the provider or facility disputes the carrier's determination with respect to coverage or payment for health care service.

## SUBCHAPTER F

### GRIEVANCE AND COMPLAINT PROCEDURES

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Matter No. R 98-17, filed 11/29/99, effective 12/30/99)

**WAC 284-43-610 Definitions.** For the purposes of this subchapter:

((1)) "Adverse determination" means a decision by a health carrier to deny, modify, reduce, or terminate payment, coverage, authorization, or provision of health care services or benefits including the admission to or continued stay in a facility. Such term does not include a decision affecting payment or coverage after the service or benefit has been provided.

((2)) "~~Clinical review criteria~~" means the ~~written screening procedures, decision abstracts, clinical protocols, health care service management computer software, and practice guidelines used by the health carrier to determine the necessity and appropriateness of health care services;~~

### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-43-615 Grievance and complaint procedures—Generally.** (1) Each carrier must adopt and implement a comprehensive process for the resolution of covered persons' complaints and appeals of adverse determinations.

(2) This process must conform to the provisions of this chapter and each carrier must:

PROPOSED



(a) Provide a clear explanation of the grievance process upon request, upon enrollment to new covered persons, and annually to covered person and subcontractors of the carrier.

(b) Ensure that the grievance process is accessible to enrollees who are limited-English speakers, who have literacy problems, or who have physical or mental disabilities that impede their ability to file a grievance.

(c) Process as a complaint a covered person's expression of dissatisfaction about customer service or the quality or availability of a health service.

(d) Implement procedures for registering and responding to oral and written complaints in a timely and thorough manner including the notification of a covered person that a complaint or appeal has been received.

(e) Assist the covered person with all complaint and appeal processes.

(f) Cooperate with any representative authorized in writing by the covered person.

(g) Consider all information submitted by the covered person or representative.

(h) Investigate and resolve all complaints and appeals.

(i) Provide information on the covered person's right to obtain second opinions.

(j) Track each appeal until final resolution; maintain, and make accessible to the commissioner for a period of three years, a log of all appeals; and identify and evaluate trends in appeals.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending Matter No. R 98-17, filed 11/29/99, effective 12/30/99)

**WAC 284-43-620 Procedures for (~~health care service review decisions~~) review and appeal of adverse determinations.**

(1) A covered person or the covered person's representative, including the treating provider (regardless of whether the provider is affiliated with the carrier) acting on behalf of the covered person may appeal an adverse determination in writing. The carrier must reconsider the adverse determination and notify the covered person of its decision within fourteen days of receipt of the appeal unless the carrier notifies the covered person that an extension is necessary to complete the appeal; however, the extension cannot delay the decision beyond thirty days of the request for appeal, without the informed, written consent of the coverage person.

(2) Whenever a health carrier makes an adverse determination and delay would jeopardize the covered person's life or materially jeopardize the covered person's health, the carrier shall expedite and process either a written or an oral appeal and issue a decision no later than seventy-two hours after receipt of the appeal. If the treating health care provider determines that delay would jeopardize the covered person's life or materially jeopardize the person's health, the carrier shall presume the need for expeditious review, including the need for an expeditious determination in any independent review.

(3) A carrier may not take or threaten to take any punitive action against a provider acting on behalf or in support of a covered person appealing an adverse determination.

(4) Appeals of adverse determinations shall be evaluated by health care providers who were not involved in the initial decision and who have appropriate expertise in the field of medicine that encompasses the covered person's condition or disease.

(5) All appeals must include a review of all relevant information submitted by the covered person or a provider acting on behalf of the covered person.

(6) The carrier shall issue to affected parties and to any provider acting on behalf of the covered person a written notification of the adverse determination that includes the actual reasons for the determination, the instructions for obtaining an independent appeal of the carrier's decision, a written statement of the clinical rationale for the decision, and instructions for obtaining the clinical review criteria used to make the determination.

(7) When a covered person requests that the carrier reconsider its decision to modify, reduce, or terminate an otherwise covered health service that an enrollee is receiving through the health plan and the carrier's decision is based upon a finding that the health service, or level of health service, is no longer medically necessary or appropriate, the carrier must continue to provide that health service until the appeal is resolved. If the resolution of the appeal or any review sought by the enrollee affirms the carrier's decision, the enrollee may be responsible for the cost of this continued health service. If the carrier elects to recover the costs of such services, the carrier shall accept repayment arrangements consistent with the financial needs and circumstances of the covered person.

#### **NEW SECTION**

**WAC 284-43-630 Independent review of adverse determinations.** (1) A covered person may seek review by a certified independent review organization of an adverse decision after exhausting the carrier's grievance process and receiving a decision that is unfavorable to the covered person, or after the carrier has exceeded the timelines for grievances provided in this chapter, without good cause and without reaching a decision. A carrier may establish a process to bypass the carrier's internal grievance process and allow for the direct appeal to a certified independent review organization for certain classes of adverse determinations upon prior written approval by the commissioner.

(2) Carriers must provide to the appropriate independent review organization certified by the department of health and designated by the commissioner's rotational registry, not later than the third business day after the date the carrier receives a request for review, a copy of:

(a) Any medical records of the covered person that are relevant to the review;

(b) Any documents used by the carrier in making the determination to be reviewed by the certified independent review organization; including relevant clinical review criteria used by the carrier and other relevant medical, scientific, and cost-effectiveness evidence;

(c) Any documentation and written information submitted to the carrier in support of the appeal;



(d) A list of each physician or health care provider who has provided care to the covered person and who may have medical records relevant to the appeal. Health information or other confidential or proprietary information in the custody of a carrier may be provided to an independent review organization, subject to the privacy provisions of Title 284 WAC;

(e) The attending or ordering provider's recommendations; and

(f) The terms and conditions of coverage under the relevant health plan.

The carrier shall also make available to affected parties and to any provider acting on behalf of the covered person all materials provided to an independent review organization reviewing the carrier's determination. The carrier may also require affected parties and any provider acting on behalf of a covered person to make available to the carrier information provided to an independent review organization in support of an appeal.

(3) The medical reviewers from a certified independent review organization shall make determinations regarding the medical necessity or appropriateness of, and the application of health plan coverage provisions to, health care services for a covered person. The medical reviewers' determinations must be based upon their expert medical judgment, after consideration of relevant medical, scientific, and cost-effectiveness evidence, and medical standards of practice in the state of Washington. Except as provided in this subsection, the certified independent review organization must ensure that determinations are consistent with the scope of covered benefits as outlined in the medical coverage agreement. Medical reviewers may override the health plan's medical necessity or appropriateness standards if the standards are determined upon review to be unreasonable or inconsistent with sound, evidence-based medical practice.

(4) Once a request for an independent review determination has been made, the independent review organization must proceed to a final determination, unless requested otherwise by both the carrier and the covered person or covered person's representative.

(5) Carriers must implement the certified independent review organization's determination promptly, and must pay the certified independent review organization's charges.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 284-43-820 Health plan disclosures—Prescription drugs, preventive care, generally.** (1) A carrier that offers a health plan may not offer to sell a health plan to an enrollee or to any group representative, agent, employer, or enrollee representative without first offering to provide, and providing upon request, the following information using a standardized summary format approved by the commissioner before purchase or selection:

(a) A listing of covered benefits, including prescription drug benefits, if any, and how consumers may be involved in decisions about benefits;

(b) A listing of exclusions, reductions, and limitations to covered benefits, including definitions of terms such as formulary, generic versus brand name, medical necessity or other coverage criteria and policies regarding coverage of

drugs, including how drugs are added or removed from the formulary;

(c) A statement of the carrier's policies for protecting the confidentiality of health information;

(d) A statement of the cost of premiums and any enrollee cost-sharing requirements;

(e) A summary explanation of the carrier's grievance process;

(f) A statement regarding the availability of a point-of-service option, if any, and how the option operates; and

(g) A convenient means of obtaining a complete and detailed list of covered benefits including a copy of the current formulary, if any is used, a list of participating primary care and specialty care providers, including disclosure of network arrangements that restrict access to providers within any plan network. The offer to provide the information referenced in this subsection (1) must be clearly and prominently displayed on any information provided to any prospective enrollee or to any prospective group representative, agent, employer, or enrollee representative.

(2) Upon the request of any person, including a current enrollee, prospective enrollee, or the insurance commissioner, a carrier must provide written information regarding any health care plan it offers, that includes the following written information:

(a) Any documents, instruments, or other information referred to in the medical coverage agreement;

(b) A full description of the procedures to be followed by an enrollee for consulting a provider other than the primary care provider and whether the enrollee's primary care provider, the carrier's medical director, or another entity must authorize the referral;

(c) Procedures, if any, that an enrollee must first follow for obtaining prior authorization for health care services;

(d) A written description of any reimbursement or payment arrangements, including, but not limited to, capitation provisions, fee-for-service provisions, and health care delivery efficiency provisions, between a carrier and a provider or network;

(e) Descriptions and justifications for provider compensation programs, including any incentives or penalties that are intended to encourage providers to withhold services or minimize or avoid referrals to specialists;

(f) An annual accounting of all payments made by the carrier which have been counted against any payment limitations, visit limitations, or other overall limitations on a person's coverage under a plan;

(g) A copy of the carrier's grievance process for claim or service denial and for dissatisfaction with care; and

(h) Accreditation status with one or more national managed care accreditation organizations, and whether the carrier tracks its health care effectiveness performance using the health employer data information set (HEDIS); whether it publicly reports its HEDIS data, and how interested persons can access its HEDIS data.

(3) Each carrier shall provide to all enrollees and prospective enrollees a list of available disclosure items.

(4) Nothing in this section requires a carrier or a health care provider to divulge proprietary information to an

PROPOSED

enrollee, including the specific contractual terms and conditions between a carrier and a particular provider.

(5) No carrier may advertise or market any health plan to the public, including to any employer as a plan that covers services that help prevent illness or promote the health of enrollees unless it:

(a) Provides all clinical preventive health services provided by the basic health plan, authorized by chapter 70.47 RCW;

(b) Monitors and reports annually to enrollees on standardized measures of health care and satisfaction of all enrollees in the health plan. Standardized measures for this purpose, include HEDIS, consumer assessment of health plans (CAHP) or other national standardized measurement systems adopted by national managed care accreditation organizations or state agencies that purchase managed health care services and approved by the commissioner; and

(c) Makes available upon request to enrollees its integrated plan to identify and manage the most prevalent diseases within its enrolled population, including cancer, heart disease, and stroke. Such plans must include means to identify enrollees with these diseases, implement evidence based screening, education, monitoring and treatment protocols, track patient and provider adherence to these protocols, measure health outcomes, and regularly report results to enrollees.

(6) No carrier may preclude or discourage its providers from informing an enrollee of the care he or she requires, including various treatment options, and whether in the providers' view such care is consistent with the plan's health coverage criteria, or otherwise covered by the enrollee's medical coverage agreement with the carrier. No carrier may prohibit, discourage, or penalize a provider otherwise practicing in compliance with the law from advocating on behalf of an enrollee with a carrier. Nothing in this section shall be construed to authorize a provider to bind a carrier to pay for any service.

(7) No carrier may preclude or discourage enrollees or those paying for their coverage from discussing the comparative merits of different carriers with their providers. This prohibition specifically includes prohibiting or limiting providers participating in those discussions even if critical of a carrier.

(8) Each carrier must communicate enrollee information required in this act by means that ensure that a substantial portion of the enrollee population can make use of the information.

Title of Rule: New chapter 246-30 WAC, AWARDS prescription drug discount program.

**Purpose:** The rules establish a new program which will enable individuals aged fifty-five years or older to participate in a prescription drug discount program.

**Other Identifying Information:** The rule is in response to Governor's Executive Order 00-04 which requires the department to work with the Health Care Authority to establish a Washington senior discount prescription drug project.

**Statutory Authority for Adoption:** RCW 43.70.040 (1) and (5), 43.70.020(5).

**Statute Being Implemented:** RCW 43.70.130, 43.70.060.

**Summary:** The rules describe the AWARDS program, explains how the program operates, identifies who is eligible for membership, and details program limitations.

Rule is not necessitated by federal law, federal or state court decision.

**Explanation of Rule, its Purpose, and Anticipated Effects:** This proposed rule describes the AWARDS program, explains how the program will operate, identifies who is eligible for membership, and details program limitations. The purpose of the rule is to enable individuals who are fifty-five years of age and older to obtain a membership in the AWARDS discount prescription drug project. It is anticipated that the rules will assist individuals who currently do not have prescription drug coverage to obtain prescription drugs at discounted prices through their membership in this program.

Proposal does not change existing rules.

A small business economic impact statement has been prepared under chapter 19.85 RCW.

**Small Business Economic Impact Statement**

**Background:** The state of Washington is committed to protecting the health and well-being of its senior citizens. Recently, the state and national governments have noted that rapidly rising prescription drug costs have created a crisis among Washington's senior citizens that is jeopardizing their health. Prices of prescription drugs commonly used by seniors have soared 30% on average since 1994. Seniors age sixty-five and older pay an average of \$1,205 a year for prescriptions, up from \$559 in 1992. Moreover, prescriptions are anticipated to cost the average senior approximately \$2,810 by 2010. Although they account for just 13% of the population, Americans age sixty-five and older pay forty-two cents of every dollar spent by the entire population on prescription drugs.

The governor of Washington state is committed to help seniors obtain the prescriptions they need. The governor determined that the federal Medicare program does not provide prescription drug coverage to seniors and is unlikely to address this unmet need in the near future. Given the rapidly rising cost of prescription drugs and lack of movement at the

PROPOSED

federal level to redress this problem, the governor determined that there is a need for an immediate short-term solution to protect the health of Washington's senior citizens. On August 29, 2000, the governor issued Executive Order No. 00-04 to establish a mechanism by which Washington seniors can obtain prescription drugs at a reduced cost.

This program will allow seniors age fifty-five and older who do not have prescription drug coverage to purchase prescription drugs at discounts comparable to those negotiated by the state's uniform medical plan. The Washington State Health Care Authority oversees the uniform medical plan and negotiates with providers to obtain discount prices for prescription drugs (and other health care services). The Department of Health expects that participants in the AWARDS program will typically receive about a 25% discount off the usual and customary prices.<sup>1</sup> These discount prices will be available to qualifying seniors for a modest enrollment fee.

The governor included several directives in his executive order:

1. The Department of Health and the Health Care Authority, in coordination with each other, are directed to "take all administrative actions necessary or advisable to implement a program to provide prescription drug price discounts negotiated through the Health Care Authority to Washington senior citizens aged fifty-five and older."
2. The program be implemented by January 2001.
3. The program be self-supporting and without cost to the state.
4. The program be called A Washington State Alliance to Reduce Prescription Drug Spending ("AWARDS") program.

**Overview of the Proposed Regulation:** To implement the governor's directive, the Washington State Department of Health (henceforth DOH or department) worked collaboratively with the Washington State Health Care Authority to develop proposed regulations. The proposal would allow persons fifty-five and older who do not have prescription drug coverage to purchase prescription drugs at prices similar to those paid by individuals participating in the state's uniform medical plan. To receive the discount price, qualifying individuals will have to pay a nominal annual application fee and make their purchases at a participating pharmacy. A pharmacy benefit manager through a contract negotiated by the Health Care Authority would administer the proposed program. Finally, individual pharmacies will have a choice of whether or not to participate in the proposed program.

**Is an SBEIS necessary?** Under the Regulatory Fairness Act, an SBEIS is required whenever a regulation imposes "more than minor" costs on a regulated business. The "more than minor" threshold varies by industry. It is \$111 for the businesses falling under the "miscellaneous shopping goods stores" standard industrial code classification.<sup>2</sup> To estimate the cost to pharmacies required determining the number of persons eligible for the program, the proportion that would enroll, the number of prescriptions affected, the average savings per prescription, the overall savings, and the distribution of that savings across pharmacies.<sup>3</sup>

**Number of Eligible Persons:** The department projects that about 265,000 persons in Washington state would currently qualify for the proposed program: 207,023 persons

fifty-five and older have Medicare but no pharmacy coverage; and 57,085 persons fifty-five and older are uninsured.

**Estimated Proportion of Eligible Persons Enrolling:** The incentive to participate in the AWARDS program varies with the use of prescription drugs among the eligible population, the specific medication, and the difference in cash and AWARDS program prices. The department assumed that 40% of eligible persons would not participate due to their low drug use and consequent lack of savings.

Of the remaining 60%, the department could not find good information indicating the number that would enroll. Similar programs currently operating in Washington have seen limited participation (e.g., Save-Rx, AARP, YouRx-Plan, Washington Health Card). A variety of reasons have been offered for this limited participation: Being unaware of the program, finding program procedures too complicated, not take the time to enroll, not have the financial ability to purchase prescription medicine even with the discount prices. The AWARDS program adds another potential reason for not participating "not trusting a government run program." The lack of good data led the department to develop three estimates of participation: 10% or 27,000 persons; 20% or 53,000 persons; and 30% or 80,000 persons.

A final complication was the proportion of enrollees that would choose the mail order option to purchase their prescriptions. The department assumed 20% would choose the mail order approach.

**Estimated Pharmacy Cost:** To project the cost to pharmacies, the department first had to estimate the number of prescriptions that would be purchased under the AWARDS program. According to data for state employees who are at least fifty-five and enrolled in the state's Uniform Medical Plan, these persons are given, on average, eleven prescriptions over the course of a year. The department assumed that eight of these prescriptions be given for acute conditions and that the prescription would run for one month. The department assumed that the other three were written to treat a chronic condition and would be taken for twelve months. Overall, this results in an estimated forty-four prescription-months per enrollee each year.

The department next estimated the per prescription savings. To do this the department calculated the expected price differential for eighty-three drugs representing several therapeutic classes. The predicted average monthly discount for a single prescription is \$10.77 for in-pharmacy purchased prescriptions and \$15.48 for prescriptions purchased by mail order. Based upon these figures, the department estimated that with an enrollment of 53,000 persons, the total annual cost to pharmacies would approximate \$27,000,000<sup>4</sup> (see Table 1).

**Other Administrative Costs:** The department also considered whether the AWARDS program would impose extra administrative costs. The department expects that purchases made under the AWARDS would be filed and tracked using computer equipment currently operated by pharmacies. Therefore, specific purchases are not anticipated to impose additional administrative costs. However, the initial purchase is anticipated to require some data entry into the computer system.<sup>5</sup> The department assumed that this data entry would take no more than five minutes and would be required once each year.<sup>6</sup> Assuming a pharmacist's hourly wage of \$62,<sup>7</sup> this data entry will add about \$110,000 to the cost if 27,000 people enroll, \$220,000 with 53,000, and \$330,000 with 80,000.

**The average cost per pharmacy:** Depending on the number of persons that enroll, the department estimates that average cost per pharmacy will range from \$12,300 to \$36,400.

It is clear from the above assessment that the proposed rule will significantly exceed the more than minor cost threshold so the department must prepare an SBEIS.

**Does the proposed rule affect both large and small businesses?** The Regulatory Fairness Act defines a business as "...[any] entity, including a sole proprietorship, corporation, partnership, or other legal entity, that is owned and operated independently from all other businesses, that has the purpose of making a profit..." The act defines a small business as one that employs less than fifty individuals.

The proposed AWARDS program would clearly affect both large and small businesses. While specific figures are not available for individual pharmacies, the department knows of pharmacies with more than fifty employees and pharmacies with less than fifty employees. Independent pharmacies generally average fewer than fifty employees while many traditional, food service and mass merchandising pharmacies have more than fifty employees. Table 2 shows average employment at independent and nonindependent pharmacies.

In contrast to these large pharmacies, approximately 400 independent, owner operated pharmacies operate in Washington state. Because the AWARDS program would affect both large and small businesses there is a clear potential for disproportionate costs.

**Does the proposed rule impose disproportionate cost on small businesses?** To determine whether the proposed rule imposes disproportionate costs on small businesses, the department calculated the "per employee" cost of the AWARDS program at a large, chain pharmacy and at a small independent, owner operated pharmacy. Assumed that 53,000 persons enroll in the AWARDS program (the middle estimate), the average annual per pharmacy cost of the proposed program is about \$23,900. The typical nonindependent pharmacy has eighty-five employees while an independent, owner operated pharmacy has twelve, the per employee cost of the small pharmacy (\$1,992) will be about seven times more than that of the large pharmacy (\$281). The department expects that the actual difference in "per employee" costs will be less than estimated here. Large pharmacies typically see a higher proportion of pharmacy customers than their smaller counterparts. As such, the overall AWARDS program cost is likely to be higher than \$23,900 at large pharmacies and less than \$23,900 at small pharmacies. Nevertheless, the department concludes that the AWARDS program would impose disproportionately higher costs on small businesses.

**Is mitigation legal or feasible?** As described above, the proposed design of the AWARDS program has the potential to adversely affect the profit of pharmacies, especially small pharmacies. As a result the next question for the department is over whether mitigation for small businesses is legal and feasible. The department has considered three alternatives to this proposal. One alternative would be to wait for federal or state legislative action. However, the governor determined that waiting is unacceptable. The legislative process is unlikely to provide relief that seniors need now in order to make life-sustaining drugs affordable. Even if legislation occurs on a state or federal level, the time necessary to fully implement legislation would result in further delay. The high and rising price of prescription drugs has put them out of reach of many seniors in Washington state. This has resulted in a crisis among Washington's seniors that jeopardizes their health. A second alternative would be to establish a program that includes direct financial assistance for seniors to purchase prescription drugs. This could help mitigate the financial cost to pharmacies. However, any program providing financial assistance would require legislative action and is beyond the current authority of the secretary of health. The final alternative would be to solely offer a mail order program. The department determined that a mail order only program would more severely affect pharmacies and, therefore, be counter to the intent of the Regulatory Fairness Act. The department expects that allowing pharmacies to participate in the AWARDS program, would to some extent mitigate the cost on small businesses.

Based on these considerations, the department determined that a program to assist seniors in Washington without prescription drug insurance to purchase prescription drugs is currently needed to promote the appropriate use of health care resources among Washington's seniors and protect their health. The department also determined that available alternatives to this program either would not meet the objectives of the authorizing statutes or are beyond the current authority of the secretary. Therefore, the department concluded that it would not be feasible to provide additional mitigation to small pharmacies and still meet the "stated objectives of the statutes upon which the proposed rule is based."

**Other Regulatory Fairness Act Mandates: *State efforts to involve businesses when developing the proposed rule.*** In order to meet the mandates of the governor's executive order, the department had to engage an unusually rapid rule development process. Nevertheless, the department worked to inform the public of the rule-making effort and to provide opportunities for public input. The department mailed the CR-101 statement of inquiry to over 2400 individuals and organizations. The interested parties list includes state agencies, pharmacies, pharmaceutical manufacturers, pharmacy professional associations and advocacy groups, as well as senior citizen centers, associations, and advocacy groups.

Representatives of the Department of Health, Health Care Authority and Governor's Office appeared before the Pharmacy Board in a joint briefing about the governor's executive order, the rules process and how the program may work once it is implemented.

The department expects to file the proposed rules with the code reviser November 1. The department also expects to make the significant legislative rule analysis available for public review and comment prior to the public hearing on this rule. The department will mail and e-mail the notice to persons on the interested parties list. The department will mail a notice the same week as the filing to allow as much time for comment as possible. The department plans to hold a public hearing on December 5, for those individuals who wish to testify in person.

**What are the reporting, record-keeping, and other compliance requirements?** The proposed rule would not impose any additional record-keeping or reporting requirements. However, as described above a small amount of additional data entry may be required as a result of this rule. Any such compliance requirements would be part of the contract that HCA negotiates with the PBM.

**List the types of businesses affected by the proposed rule:** Pharmacies are the principal type of business affected by the proposed rule.

**Will the proposed rule cause affected industries to lose business?** The effect of the AWARDS program on pharmacy business depends on specific circumstances and decisions of the pharmacy owner. The department assumes that pharmacies that currently participate in the CCN2 program will gain business. They should gain customers who formerly went to another pharmacy who is not participating in the AWARDS program. They will gain a few customers who previously did not take their prescribed medication due to its

cost. They should also gain some customers who previously went to another pharmacy that closed down due to decreased revenues.

The department assumes that some of the pharmacies that currently do not participate in the CCN2 but decide to join the AWARDS program will gain business. They should gain customers who formerly went to another pharmacy who is not participating in the AWARDS program. They will gain a few customers of people who previously did not take their prescribed medication due to its cost. They should also gain some customers who previously went to another pharmacy that closed down due to decreased revenues. On the other hand, some of these pharmacies will likely close down due to decreased revenues and these, obviously, will lose business.

Finally, the department assumed that the AWARDS program would minimally affect pharmacies that choose not to participate in the AWARDS program and are relatively far away from their closest rival (more than 5 miles).

## Chapter 246-30 WAC

### THE AWARDS PROGRAM

#### NEW SECTION

#### **WAC 246-30-010 What is the AWARDS program?**

(1) **Purpose.** The AWARDS program is a statewide public health initiative. The AWARDS program makes prescription drugs more affordable for Washington residents who are age fifty-five or older and have no prescription drug coverage. The program is a state-sponsored purchasing alliance for AWARDS members to buy prescription drugs at a reduced cost.

(2) **Goals.** The program's goals are:

(a) To promote public health by making prescription drugs more affordable for AWARDS members; and

(b) To assess the program's effectiveness in making prescription drugs more affordable for AWARDS members.

(3) **Definitions.**

(a) "AWARDS (A Washington Alliance to Reduce Prescription Drug Spending)" is a purchasing alliance sponsored by the state of Washington. AWARDS members are charged a discounted rate for prescription drugs.

(b) An "individual membership" is available for a Washington resident fifty-five years of age or older who has no prescription drug coverage and pays an annual individual membership fee to participate in the AWARDS program.

(c) A "family membership" is available for two or more Washington residents fifty-five years of age or older who have no prescription drug coverage, who are living in the same household, and who, on behalf of the family, pay an annual family membership fee to participate in the AWARDS program.

(d) "Pharmacy benefits manager" means the entity responsible for pharmacy benefits management services, member enrollment, the AWARDS pharmacy network, provision of assessment data, and administrative duties through a contract with the state of Washington.

(e) "Participating pharmacy" means a pharmacy that agrees to serve AWARDS members as part of a pharmacy network on terms set by the pharmacy benefits manager.

(f) "AWARDS discount price" means the reduced cost for prescription drugs set by contract between the state and the pharmacy benefits manager. Participating pharmacies accept the AWARDS discount price as full payment when AWARDS members buy prescription drugs.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 246-30-020 How does the AWARDS program work?** The AWARDS program will only operate if the state

can enter into a contract with a pharmacy benefits manager providing that:

(1) The AWARDS program operates at no cost to the state. AWARDS members pay the AWARDS discount price when buying prescription drugs from a participating pharmacy and show a valid membership card. AWARDS members can also buy prescriptions by mail through the pharmacy benefits manager.

(2) AWARDS is administered in cooperation with the Washington state health care authority through a contract with a pharmacy benefits manager.

(3) Any Washington resident who is fifty-five years of age or older and has no prescription drug coverage is eligible to apply for an individual or family membership in the AWARDS program.

(4) Applicants for AWARDS membership must send an AWARDS membership application to the pharmacy benefits manager. Applicants must certify that they are fifty-five years of age or older and have no prescription drug coverage. Applicants must also pay for an individual or family membership. The pharmacy benefits manager will send a membership card to approved applicants. When presenting a membership card at any participating pharmacy, AWARDS members will be charged the AWARDS discount price for prescription drugs. AWARDS members can also order prescription drugs by mail through the pharmacy benefits manager.

(5) An AWARDS membership may be canceled when a member:

(a) Is not eligible;

(b) Fails to pay the membership fee when due;

(c) Violates the terms and conditions of membership;

(d) Misuses or permits unauthorized use of the membership card; or

(e) Engages in misconduct in connection with the AWARDS program.

If a membership is canceled due to (c) through (e) of this subsection, the membership fee may be forfeited and the member may be subject to other penalties under applicable laws. The AWARDS pharmacy benefits manager is responsible for enrollment decisions, for maintaining records, and for administering all member services. Any disputes arising between an applicant for AWARDS membership or an AWARDS member and the pharmacy benefits manager is a private contractual dispute. Disputes are resolved according to the terms and conditions of AWARDS enrollment. The state of Washington, its agencies and employees, are not parties to any such dispute.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 246-30-030 Are there any limits on the AWARDS program?** (1) The AWARDS program is not insurance coverage. The pharmacy benefits manager is solely responsible to AWARDS members for the services it provides. By establishing the AWARDS program, the state of Washington does not assume financial responsibility for the services provided to AWARDS members by the pharmacy benefits manager. AWARDS membership is subject to the additional terms and conditions contained in the

AWARDS application and any subsequent changes in those terms and conditions or in benefits announced by the pharmacy benefits manager.

(2) On thirty days' notice, program enrollment may be limited or suspended, or the AWARDS program may be canceled in its entirety, for any reason at the discretion of the department of health.

Preproposal statement of inquiry was filed as WSR 94-12-088.

Title of Rule: Chapter 246-282 WAC, Sanitary control of shellfish.

Purpose: To adopt by reference the 1999 National Shellfish Sanitation Program (NSSP) Model Ordinance, make revisions in this chapter to be consistent with the 1999 NSSP Model Ordinance, adopt Department of Health (DOH) shellfish operation licensing policies into WAC, and adopt recommendations of the department's Shellfish Advisory Committee into WAC.

Statutory Authority for Adoption: RCW 69.30.030.

Summary: The proposed amendments include referencing the current 1999 NSSP Model Ordinance; clarifying applicability; adopting licensing procedures from policy into rule; interpreting model ordinance requirements on aquaculture, handling of shellfish in areas with temporary closures, reuse of tags, and relay; adding definitions, wild seed permits, bait harvest permits, wet storage permits for on-shore tanks, and DOH review of construction plans; establishing a standard penalty schedule.

Reasons Supporting Proposal: State rules must be consistent with the current NSSP Model Ordinance in order for Washington shellfish to be shipped interstate.

Name of Agency Personnel Responsible for Drafting: Ned Therien, Tumwater, (360) 236-3012; Implementation and Enforcement: Judy Dowell, Tumwater, (360) 236-3313.

Name of Proponent: Washington State Department of Health, governmental.

Rule is not necessitated by federal law, federal or state court decision.

Explanation of Rule, its Purpose, and Anticipated Effects: The NSSP Model Ordinance contains specific requirements for safe production, processing, and distribution of molluscan shellfish. The model ordinance is updated every two years based on decisions of the Interstate Shellfish Sanitation Conference and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). The FDA reviews each state's commercial shellfish sanitation program for compliance with the model ordinance. If the state's program is not consistent with the model ordinance, the FDA will not allow interstate shipment of raw molluscan shellfish from that state. Most of the specific procedures for licensing shellfish operations are left to the states to formulate in rule. Also, the model ordinance gives the

states some options for implementing specific sanitation standards. However, many sanitation standards are strictly prescribed by the model ordinance. The State Board of Health (SBOH) last made major revisions to chapter 246-282 WAC in 1978. Periodic updates to the state rules have been made since then, including adopting updates of the NSSP standards and the, new in 1997, FDA Hazard Analysis Critical Control Point rules for seafood by reference. A shellfish advisory committee formed by DOH made recommendations in 1997 that DOH make some rule revisions to allow some new harvesting opportunities and to assure that DOH resources are used efficiently. Recent state statutory changes require adoption of some policies into rule. This major rule revision updates many parts of the rule to be consistent with the model ordinance, adopt recommendations of the advisory committee, and adopt DOH policy into rule.

Proposal Changes the Following Existing Rules: The proposed amendments include referencing the current 1999 NSSP Model Ordinance; clarifying applicability; adopting licensing procedures from policy into rule; interpreting model ordinance requirements on aquaculture, handling of shellfish in areas with temporary closures, and reuse of tags; revising relay permit requirements to be consistent with the model ordinance; adding definitions, wild seed permits, bait harvest permits, wet storage permits for on-shore tanks, and DOH review of construction plans; establishing a standard penalty schedule.

A small business economic impact statement has been prepared under chapter 19.85 RCW.

#### Small Business Economic Impact Statement

**Background:** The Department of Health, Office of Food Safety and Shellfish Programs regulates the commercial shellfish industry in order to prevent illness or death from consumption of contaminated molluscan shellfish. The program classifies and monitors shellfish growing waters and licenses commercial operations that harvest and process shellfish. The United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) oversees a cooperative program between the shellfish producing states and the shellfish industry for the production and processing of shellfish using the National Shellfish Sanitation Program's (NSSP) 1997 Model Ordinance (MO) as a basis. The MO, a consensus code, contains requirements for both the shellfish industry and state shellfish control agencies (e.g., the department) that must be followed in order for shellfish to be shipped interstate and abroad.

Chapter 246-282 WAC, Sanitary control of shellfish, is the primary mechanism used by the department for ensuring that the industry meets the requirements of the National Shellfish Sanitation Program and for fulfilling its statutory direction to regulate the commercial shellfish industry for the protection of public health. This WAC chapter is primarily a rule of the State Board of Health. Although piecemeal changes have been adopted over the past ten years, the chapter has not been comprehensively reviewed and revised since 1978. In 1996, the department convened the Shellfish Advisory Committee, comprised of industry members; citizen action groups; and representatives of local, state, federal and tribal governments, to aid the department in review of the

rules and to provide input for revisions. Many of their recommendations have been incorporated into this chapter revision. Another reason for revising the chapter at this time is the recent adoption of the NSSP MO by reference into the rule. The requirements of the MO have been regularly updated and are now incorporated by reference as rule. However, this has left some portions of chapter 246-282 WAC outdated or redundant. And, while the MO provides a framework and many requirements for shellfish regulation, there are many areas that are not specific enough or are left to the shellfish control agency to decide. The focus of this chapter revision is to delete obsolete portions of the rule and make sure that the rule and the MO work together to provide a complete and consistent regulation of commercial shellfish activities in Washington state.

**Small Business Economic Impact Statements:** Pursuant to requirements of the Regulatory Fairness Act (act), state agencies must prepare a small business economic impact statement (SBEIS) prior to proposing a new regulation. The impetus for this legislation was a concern that regulatory mandates could "...threaten the very existence of some small businesses" (RCW 19.85.011). The act defines a small business as "any business entity, including a sole proprietorship, corporation, partnership, or other legal entity, that is owned and operated independently from all other businesses, that has the purpose of making a profit, and that has fifty or fewer employees" (RCW 19.85.020).

The Department of Health prepared this SBEIS on behalf of the SBOH as required by the Regulatory Fairness Act. The department used the following process to determine whether the act mandates that the proposed rule include regulatory relief for small businesses.

- Step I Determine the categories of businesses affected by the proposed regulations
- Step II Determine the employment profile for each business category
- Step III Determine the "more than minor" cost threshold
- Step IV Determine whether the estimated cost exceeds the "more than minor" cost threshold for each category of business
- Step V Determine whether the proposed regulation imposes a disproportionate cost burden on small businesses
- Step VI Determine whether regulatory relief is legal and feasible
- Step VII Describe the regulatory relief provided to small businesses
- Step VIII Miscellaneous SBEIS requirements

This process need not result in the provision of regulatory relief. At several steps along this process the department could determine that regulatory relief is not warranted or even that an SBEIS is not necessary. For example, if in Step II all businesses found within an industrial category had more (or less) than fifty employees, the regulation could not, by definition, disproportionately affect small businesses. Such a

finding would obviate the need to provide regulatory relief. Or, if the cost to businesses determined in Step IV were below the "more than minor" cost threshold, then, by law, a SBEIS is not required. Similarly, the department could determine that it could not legally provide regulatory relief in Step VI.

**Step I: What businesses are affected by the proposed regulation?** The businesses affected by the proposed regulation are commercial shellfish operations licensed by the department. These include businesses that grow, harvest, process and sell commercial quantities of shellfish for human consumption. The regulations do not apply to retail food establishments or people engaged in recreational shellfish activities. The department currently licenses about 350 operations that likely fall into two standard industrial classification (SIC) codes. They are:

2092 - Establishments primarily engaged in preparing fresh and raw or cooked frozen fish and other seafoods including shucking and packing fresh oysters.

0913 - Establishments primarily engaged in the catching or taking of shellfish.

**Step II: What is the employment profile of businesses affected by the proposed regulation?** The vast majority of commercial shellfish operations licensed by DOH meet the definition of small businesses (under fifty) employees. There are six businesses with more than fifty employees. However, two of those are huge national food distributors who have sales of molluscan shellfish that are less than one percent of total product sales and are not considered in this analysis. For the purposes of this analysis the department will consider the costs to two categories of shellfish operations: Zero to 49 employees (small) and over fifty (large).

**Step III: What are the "more than minor" cost thresholds for businesses affected by the proposed regulation?** A SBEIS is required whenever a regulation imposes "more than minor" costs on a regulated business. The "more than minor" thresholds were developed by the Washington State Business Assistance Center (Department of Community, Trade and Economic Development) and range from \$50 to \$300 depending on a businesses' SIC code. The threshold for SIC codes in the three digit 091 category is \$50 so the department will use this as the basis for determining if an SBEIS needs to be completed.

**Step IV: Do the costs imposed by the proposed rule exceed the "more than minor" cost thresholds?** The proposed regulations potentially impose new costs in several areas. The regulations create new permits for specialized activities requested by the industry. It is unlikely that any one business would incur all the potential costs because most businesses will engage in one or two activities, but not all. Some of the changes would require an additional cost only in the rarest of circumstances. The following table describes the potential costs from changes to the regulations.

**Step V: Does the proposed regulation impose a disproportionate cost burden on small businesses?** To determine whether the proposed rule will disproportionately affect small businesses, the act requires a comparison of "the cost of compliance for small business with the cost of compliance for the ten percent of (the largest) businesses... using one or more of the following as a basis for comparing costs:

- (a) Cost per employee;
- (b) Cost per hour of labor; or
- (c) Cost per \$100 of sales." (RCW 19.85.040)

The department conducted a telephone survey of twenty licensees in the category of small businesses and the four licensees in the category of large businesses. The average annual total sales for the small businesses was \$500,000 per firm and \$56,000 per employee. The average annual total sales for the large businesses was \$20,000,000 per firm and \$125,000 per employee.

**-012 Certificates of Approval:** The cost to complete an application for the department to approve a new harvest site will be about \$50 for a licensee. A licensee must only submit an application for new harvest sites not already approved for harvesting by that licensee. No new requirement would be imposed on operations that have only established harvest sites. Some small companies apply for harvest site approvals as frequently as large, well-established companies. The cost will be the same, no matter the size of the operation. The burden would be disproportionately greatest for new operations and those that rely on short-term harvesting of leased properties, which are small businesses, rather than for large operations that have established aquaculture practices at long-worked shellfish beds. The new cost burden will be disproportionately greatest for small businesses because the cost for a harvest site application would be about \$0.01 per \$100 of sales for a small business vs. \$0.00025 per \$100 sales for a large business.

**-032 Relay Permit:** The cost to complete a relay permit application and plan of operations; prepare and conduct required validation studies; have samples analyzed by an approved laboratory; and to stake a grow-out site will range from about \$1560-2060 for a half-year period to about \$2580-3580 for a full-year period. A licensee who relays for a minimum grow-out period of six months will not be required to conduct a validation study and, therefore, will have new costs of only about \$140. Some small companies apply for relay permits as frequently as large, well-established companies. The cost will be the same, no matter the size of the operation. The new cost burden will be disproportionately greatest for small businesses because the cost for a relay permit would be about \$0.03 - 0.72 per \$100 of sales for a small business vs. \$0.0007 - 0.018 per \$100 sales for a large business.

**-034 Wild Seed Permit:** The cost to complete a wild seed permit application and plan of operations will range from about \$140 to \$1140. The cost will be the same, no matter the size of the operation. The new cost burden will be disproportionately greatest for small businesses because the cost for a wild seed permit would be about \$0.03 - 0.23 per \$100 of sales for a small business vs. \$0.0007 - 0.0057 per \$100 sales for a large business.

**-036 Bait Permit:** The cost to complete a bait permit application and plan of operations will range from about \$75 to \$1075. The cost will be the same, no matter the size of the operation. The new cost burden will be disproportionately greatest for small businesses because the cost for a wild seed permit would be about \$0.015 - 0.215 per \$100 of sales for a small business vs. \$0.0004 - 0.0054 per \$100 sales for a large business.

**-080 Identification and Records:** Current requirements are that harvesters must keep records for six months and dealers (shellstock shippers and shucker packers) must keep them for twelve months. The cost to store records an additional twenty-four to thirty months is estimated to be, at maximum, the cost of a file cabinet - about \$300. However, a licensee could keep records in cardboard boxes or on computer disk for an additional cost of less than [than] \$50. The department has determined that the provision will not commonly result in an extra expense to licensees. Of twenty-four licensees surveyed by telephone, only two said that they were not currently storing most of the required records for three or more years. The general business practice of the licensees is to keep records three to seven years for income tax purposes and for analysis of business trends. Based on these factors, the department finds that this provision will not impose a disproportionate cost burden on small businesses.

**Step VI: Is regulatory relief for small businesses necessary, legal and feasible?** The department has determined that some of the rule changes proposed would impose a disproportionate cost on small businesses vs. large businesses. However, the department has identified only four large businesses to exist that would potentially be significantly affected by the rule revision. There are three hundred thirty-five small businesses that would potentially be significantly affected by the rule. The department developed the new provisions specifically to the level of control required for small businesses.

The control of small shellfish businesses actually requires more public health provisions than of large shellfish businesses because the small operations are less able to have an employee who is knowledgeable about quality assurance and the principles of food safety.

In order to mitigate the disproportionate impact of the rules on small businesses, the department will provide assistance to small shellfish business licensees for preparation of the first application of any new type required by the rule revision. Large shellfish businesses have one or more employees who are knowledgeable about how to complete such applications and should need little assistance.

#### **Step VII: Miscellaneous SBEIS requirements.**

**How did the department involve affected businesses and other interested parties in the development of the rule?** The department began soliciting stakeholder input in 1994 on issues that needed to be addressed in a major revision of chapter 246-282 WAC. National shellfish standards were changing rapidly and the state regulations were becoming inconsistent. The department formed a shellfish advisory committee in 1996 to review many aspects of shellfish safety. During 1997, the committee developed recommendations that included some changes to the regulations. The findings of the committee were summarized in a report dated September 30, 1997. Many of the recommendations were incorporated into the current proposed rule revision.

Drafts of the proposed rule revision have been circulating amongst stakeholders since the spring of 1999. The shellfish program scheduled special workshops to solicit comments on the proposal at approximately monthly intervals beginning June 23, 1999, and concluding December 3, 1999. The program received extensive comments during the workshops, resulting in extensive changes to the proposed rule revision.

The department announced the workshops by special letter and newsletter sent to all shellfish operation licensees. Twenty-eight members of the shellfish industry attended the various workshops. The 1999 workshop schedule and principal issues discussed at each were as follows:

**June 23;** relay permits.

**July 8;** bait, wild seed, and wet storage permits.

**August 5;** harvest site certificates, permit and reinspection fees (restricted by I-695).

**September 1;** emergency contact, gloves for packers (removed), and construction plan review.

**October 18;** all issues listed above (held in South Bend).

**November 9;** complete proposed revision.

**December 3;** complete proposed revision.

RCW 34.05.328 applies to this rule adoption. This is a significant rule. The provisions must be met in order to obtain a commercial shellfish harvester or wholesale dealer license. Violation of the provisions may result in suspension or revocation of a license.

**WAC 246-282-001 Scope and purpose.** These requirements, as authorized under chapter 69.30 RCW (~~chapter 144, Laws of 1955~~), establish minimum performance standards for the growing, harvesting, processing, packing, storage, transporting, and selling of shellfish for human consumption. These requirements do not apply to persons who conduct activities limited to:

(1) Retail food service, in compliance with the requirements of chapter 246-215 WAC, Food service;

(2) Personal use, in compliance with requirements of chapters 75.25 RCW, Recreational licenses, and 77.15 RCW, Fish and wildlife enforcement code; and

(3) Transporting as a common carrier of freight.

**WAC 246-282-005 Minimum performance standards.** (1) ~~(Every)~~ Any person engaged in a shellfish operation ~~(shall)~~ or possessing a commercial quantity of shellfish or any quantity of shellfish for sale for human consumption must comply with and ~~(shall be)~~ is subject to:

(f) Fifty pounds of scallops.

~~(5) "Food contact surfaces" means those surfaces of equipment and utensils with which the shellfish meat normally comes in contact, and those surfaces that drain onto surfaces that may come into contact with said food being processed.)~~

(6) "Export certificate" means a certificate issued by the department to a licensed shucker-packer or shellstock shipper for use in the foreign export of a lot or shipment of shellfish.

(7) "Harvest" means the act of removing shellstock from a harvest site and its placement on or in a container for transport.

(8) "Harvester" means a shellfish operation with activities limited to growing shellstock, placing shellstock in a container, harvesting shellstock, transporting shellstock within Washington state, and delivering shellstock to a shellfish dealer licensed by the department within four hours of landing it. A harvester does not process shellfish, ship shellfish outside of Washington state, sell shellfish outside of Washington state, sell shellfish to retail outlets, shuck shellfish, repack shellfish, or store shellfish in any location outside of the approved growing area from where the shellfish is harvested.

(9) "Harvest site" means an area of intertidal or subtidal property within a commercial shellfish growing area, that is described by a unique county parcel number, department of natural resources tract number, department of fish and wildlife catch area number, tribal identification number, or other government identification.

(10) "Harvest site certificate" means a type of certificate of approval that designates one or more harvest sites approved for the harvesting of shellfish.

(11) "Hatchery" means an operation where shellfish larvae are produced and grown to the first sessile stage of life.

(12) "Notice of correction" means a document issued by the department that describes a condition or conduct that is not in compliance with chapter 69.30 RCW, this chapter, or the NSSP Model Ordinance and is not subject to civil penalties as provided for in RCW 43.05.110. It is not a formal enforcement action and is not subject to appeal. It is a public record.

(13) "Nursery" means an operation where shellfish are grown from an early sessile stage of life up to a maximum size meeting the definition of shellfish seed.

(14) "Number of previous violations" means the number of prior violations of the same or a similar nature for which the department has taken a license action or assessed a civil penalty.

(15) "Person" means any individual, firm, corporation, partnership, company, association, or joint stock association, and the legal successor thereof.

~~((7))~~ (16) "Person in charge" means an individual responsible for the supervision of employees and the management of any shellfish operation ((as defined in subsection (12) of this section)).

~~((8))~~ "Sanitized" means the treatment of clean surfaces of equipment and utensils by an approved process which is effective in destroying microorganisms, including pathogens.

(9)) (17) "Public health threat" is either:

(a) "Low," which means a violation that poses a minor possibility of direct or indirect hazard to public health;

(b) "Intermediate," which means a violation that poses a moderate possibility of direct or indirect hazard to public health; or

(c) "High," which means a violation that poses a known significant hazard or possibility of significant direct or indirect hazard to public health.

(18) "Sale" means to sell; offer for sale; barter; trade; deliver; consign; hold for sale, consignment, barter, trade, or delivery; and/or possess with intent to sell or dispose of in a commercial manner.

(19) "Secretary" means the secretary of the department of health or the secretary's authorized representative.

~~((10))~~ (20) "Seed" means shellfish that are less than market size for human consumption and have a maximum shell length of:

(a) Thirteen millimeters (1/2 inch) for mussels;

(b) Twenty-five millimeters (1 inch) for scallops;

(c) Nineteen millimeters (3/4 inch) for Olympia oysters;

(d) Nineteen millimeters (3/4 inch) for Kumamoto oysters;

(e) Fifty-one millimeters (2 inches) for other oyster species;

(f) Thirty-eight millimeters (1 and 1/2 inch) for geoducks; and

(21) "Shellfish" means all varieties of fresh or fresh-frozen oysters, clams, scallops or mussels, either shucked or in the shell, and all fresh or fresh-frozen edible products thereof.

~~((11))~~ (22) "Shellfish dealer" means a person with a shellstock shipper or shucker-packer license.

(23) "Shellfish growing area((s))" means the lands and waters in and upon which shellfish are grown for harvesting in commercial quantities or for sale for human consumption.

~~((12))~~ (24) "Shellfish operation" means ((any activity in the)) growing, placing in a container, harvesting, transporting, processing, ~~((to include, but not limited to))~~ culling, shucking, packing, and repacking ~~((or))~~, storing, shipping, or reshipping of shellfish in commercial quantities or for sale for human consumption.

(25) "Shellfish operation license" means a type of certificate of approval applying to the overall activities of a shellfish operation.

(26) "Shellstock shipper" means a shellfish operation that does not shuck shellfish or repack shucked shellfish.

(27) "Shucker-packer" means a shellfish operation that may shuck and pack shellfish.

(28) "Technical assistance" means information provided by the department to a person regarding chapter 69.30 RCW; this chapter; technologies or other methods to achieve compliance with these rules; assistance in applying for a departmental license or permit required by these rules; or the goals and objectives of these rules. This is not intended to modify the definition of "technical assistance" as provided in RCW 43.05.010(3).

(29) "Violation" means the commission of an act or acts prohibited by the provisions of chapter 69.30 RCW, these rules, or the NSSP Model Ordinance.

(30) "Wild seed" means naturally set seed shellfish.

## NEW SECTION

**WAC 246-282-012 Certificates of approval—Operation licenses, harvest site certificates.** (1) The department issues two types of certificates of approval to persons who conduct shellfish operations. They are shellfish operation licenses and harvest site certificates.

(2) Any person who possesses a commercial quantity of shellfish or any quantity of shellfish for sale for human consumption must possess, or act on behalf of a person who possesses, a valid shellfish operation license. To obtain a shellfish operation license, a person must:

(a) Submit to the department a completed application on a form developed by the department;

(b) Submit to the department an acceptable written plan of operations that completely describes the shellfish operation;

(c) Pass a preoperational inspection demonstrating compliance with chapter 69.30 RCW, this chapter, and the NSSP Model Ordinance; and

(d) Pay the department any shellfish operation license fee required by this chapter.

(3) Any person who harvests a commercial quantity of shellfish or any quantity of shellfish for sale for human consumption must possess, or act on behalf of a person who possesses, a valid harvest site certificate. In order for a person to obtain a harvest site certificate, all of the following requirements must be met.

(a) The person possesses a valid shellfish operation license.

(b) The person submits to the department a completed application that describes the following characteristics of the site:

(i) Geographic location;

(ii) Map showing legal boundaries;

(iii) Unique government identification number, such as county parcel number, department of natural resources tract number, department of fish and wildlife catch area number, or tribal identification number; and

(iv) Documentation of legal ownership or lease for shellfish harvesting.

(c) The harvest site is in a growing area that meets the requirements of chapter 69.30 RCW, this chapter, and the NSSP Model Ordinance for a commercial shellfish growing area.

(d) The harvest site is not impacted by any actual or potential sources of pollution.

(e) The harvest site passes a pollution assessment inspection conducted by the department if necessary to determine if the site is impacted by any actual or potential sources of pollution.

(f) The person signs the current conditionally approved area management plan, if applicable.

(g) The person pays the department any harvest site application fee required by this chapter.

(4) All shellfish operation licenses and harvest site certificates for shellfish dealers expire on the thirtieth day of September each year. All shellfish operation licenses and harvest site certificates for harvesters expire on the thirty-first day of March each year, beginning in 2002.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 246-282-014 Operating provisions.** (1) Any person who possesses a commercial quantity of shellfish or any quantity of shellfish for sale for human consumption must display a photocopy or original of a valid shellfish operation license, upon request, to any authorized representative of the department, a fish and wildlife patrol officer, or an ex officio patrol officer. Failure to do so subjects the person to the penalty provisions of this chapter, as well as immediate seizure of the shellfish by the representative or officer.

(2) Any person who harvests a commercial quantity of shellfish or any quantity of shellfish for sale for human consumption must display a photocopy or original of a valid harvest site certificate, upon request, to any authorized representative of the department, a fish and wildlife patrol officer, or an ex officio patrol officer. Failure to do so subjects the person to the penalty provisions of this chapter, as well as immediate seizure of the shellfish by the representative or officer.

(3) Any person who places a commercial quantity of shellfish or any quantity of shellfish for sale for human consumption

in containers at a harvest site must do so only at a site for which the person possesses a valid harvest site certificate.

(4) The owner(s) of a shellfish operation must designate an individual as the person in charge of the operation. The owner(s) of a shellfish operation that includes one or more harvest sites may designate a different individual as the person in charge of the operation's harvest site(s) than the individual designated as the person in charge of all other phases of the shellfish operation.

(5) The owner(s) and the designated person in charge of a shellfish operation must:

(a) Ensure that at least one individual harvesting shellfish on behalf of the operation at each harvest site carry a copy of both the operation license and the harvest site certificate designating that the site is approved by the department for harvesting by that operation;

(b) Furnish shellfish tags meeting the requirements of chapter 69.30 RCW, these rules, and the NSSP Model Ordinance to those individuals harvesting on behalf of the operation;

(c) Ensure, by supervision at harvest sites or other adequate means, that those individuals working on behalf of the operation harvest only from harvest sites approved by the department for the operation; and

(d) Notify the department if an owner or person in charge has reason to believe that any individual is using the operation's tags, shellfish operation license, or harvest site certificate for any purpose other than one approved by the department.

(6) The designated person in charge of a shellfish operation must have a functioning telephone message device or service issued by a telephone service provider to the owner(s) or person in charge. The person in charge must:

(a) Monitor the device or service each day that the shellfish operation is active, regarding messages from the department about emergency closure of harvest areas or recall of shellfish products; and

(b) Notify the department whenever the telephone number used for this purpose changes; or

(c) Maintain another equivalent method of contact with the department approved in the plan of operations.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 246-282-016 Aquaculture.** Any person who conducts an aquaculture operation and is in possession of a commercial quantity of shellfish or any quantity of shellfish for sale for human consumption must meet all requirements of this chapter, except such person is exempt from all requirements of this chapter for the purpose of conducting aquaculture activities limited to the following:

(1) A hatchery operation; or

(2) A nursery operation handling only seed that is obtained from a hatchery.

Provided, That permission may be granted by the director for the removal of shellfish from nonapproved growing areas for relaying to approved growing areas under the following conditions:~~

(a) ~~Shellfish shall be relayed to a designated, approved growing area for a minimum of two weeks or for a longer time period as prescribed by the director.~~

(b) ~~Relaying and subsequent removal from the approved area for sale or shipment shall be under the supervision of the director.~~

(c) ~~Records shall be kept showing growing areas from which the shellfish were taken, where relayed, dates of relaying, and dates of harvesting.~~

(4) ~~All boats, oyster harvesters, and floats used for harvesting or transporting shellfish shall be so constructed, operated, and maintained as to prevent contamination or deterioration of the shellfish. Approved facilities shall be provided for the disposal of human waste.)) Any person who harvests a commercial quantity of shellfish or any quantity of shellfish for sale for human consumption must do so only from a harvest site that meets one or more of the following conditions:~~

(a) The department has classified the growing area as "approved" or "conditionally approved," according to provisions of the NSSP Model Ordinance and the harvest site is in open status at the time of harvest;

(b) The department has approved the harvest site according to provisions of a permit for relay, wild seed, or bait;

(c) The harvest site is used for shellfish activities limited to a hatchery or a nursery operation handling only seed obtained from a hatchery; or

(d) The harvest site is used for shellfish activities limited to the initial harvest of seed attached to containerized empty shellfish shells.

(2) The department classifies a shellfish growing area as "restricted" or "prohibited" according to provisions of the NSSP Model Ordinance. However, the department considers classifying a harvest site as "restricted" only when the department has received a valid application for a permit for relay or wild seed harvest from the site.

(3) While a harvest site is in closed status, no person may move shellfish from it to a location outside of the harvest site

or above the mean low tide line of the harvest site, unless the department has approved:

(a) Harvesting shellfish by that person from the site according to provisions of a permit for relay, wild seed harvest, or bait harvest; or

(b) Moving shellfish by that person from the site to another site in a natural body of water within the same "conditionally approved" growing area under a written plan of operations.

(4) Harvesting is prohibited from all growing areas unclassified by the department.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 246-282-032 Relay permit.** (1) The department will issue a relay permit to a person to move shellfish from a harvest site in a growing area classified as "restricted" or "conditionally approved" in closed status meeting the criteria for "restricted" classification, if all of the following conditions are met.

(a) The person possesses a valid shellfish operation license.

(b) The person possesses a valid harvest site certificate listing both the initial harvest site and the grow-out site.

(c) The initial harvest site and grow-out site meet the requirements for relay specified in this chapter and the NSSP Model Ordinance.

(d) The person submits a completed written application and plan of operations approved by the department completely describing the procedures and conditions of the relay operation.

(e) The person conducts and documents a separate validation study approved by the department for each of the following periods of time when shellfish will be relayed:

(i) May 1 through October 31; and

(ii) November 1 through April 30.

(f) The person pays the department a relay permit application fee or renewal fee as required by this chapter.

(2) Each validation study for a relay permit must demonstrate that shellfish harvested from a specified initial site do not contain excessive levels of fecal coliform bacteria and when relayed to a specified grow-out site for a specified time period consistently purge themselves of bacteria to approved levels. Each validation study must meet all of the following conditions.

(a) It must document that the geometric mean fecal coliform bacteria level in a minimum of five 100-gram tissue samples, representative of shellfish of the same species in the entire initial harvest site, is equal to or less than 1300, with no sample having more than 2300.

(b) It must document that specified relay procedures, times, and environmental conditions reduce fecal coliform bacteria in a minimum of five 100-gram tissue samples, representative of the entire lot of shellfish relayed, to levels that are equal to or less than:

(i) 330, with no more than two samples having greater than 230; or

(ii) Ten percent greater than the geometric mean of a minimum of five 100-gram tissue samples representative of

PROPOSED

the same shellfish species grown continuously for a minimum of six months at the grow-out site.

(c) It must be repeated a minimum of every twelve years for a continuing operation and whenever relay conditions change.

(d) All samples must be analyzed by an approved laboratory.

(3) A person operating under a relay permit must follow all procedures in the plan of operations approved by the department.

(a) The person must stake or mark the grow-out site to be easily identified by the person until the minimum relay period of time is passed.

(b) The person must consider the beginning of the minimum relay time period for a lot to be the moment that the last part of the lot is added to the grow-out site.

(c) The person must relay shellfish to a designated grow-out site for a minimum of seven days, or longer period of time as approved by the department. For each lot of shellfish relayed to a site for a grow-out period of less than fourteen days, the person must:

(i) Collect at least one sample from the shellfish lot at the initial harvest site and have it analyzed by an approved laboratory to demonstrate that the lot contains no more than 2300 fecal coliform bacteria per 100 grams of shellfish tissue;

(ii) Collect at least one sample from the shellfish lot at the grow-out site at the end of the relay period and have it analyzed by an approved laboratory to demonstrate that the lot contains fecal coliform bacteria within the maximum limits determined by a validation study, as described in subsection (2)(b) of this section, before releasing control of the shellfish lot;

(iii) Monitor environmental parameters of water temperature and salinity at the grow-out site at least once during the relay period; and

(iv) Send results of lot sample analyses and environmental parameter monitoring to the department monthly.

(d) The person must keep records for each relayed lot of shellfish that show a lot identification number; the species, location, date, and quantity moved from the initial harvest site; the grow-out location; and the date of first harvest of any of those shellfish from the grow-out site.

(4) A person is exempt from any fees for an initial application and a validation study conducted by the department for a relay permit for the purpose of relaying shellfish from a growing area that the department downgraded from a classification of "approved" or "conditionally approved" to "restricted" within the previous twenty-four months.

(5) A person's relay permit expires on the same date as the person's shellfish operation license.

(6) A person is exempt from the provisions of subsection (1) (e) of this section for the purpose of relaying shellfish to an approved grow-out site for a minimum of six months.

(7) A person possessing a valid shellfish operation license may act as an agent for another person possessing a valid shellfish relay permit for the purpose of harvesting shellfish from the initial harvest site specified in the permit, provided that the agent conducting the harvest is:

(a) Documented in the permit;

(b) In possession of a copy of the permit at the time of harvest; and

(c) Conducting activities described in the written plan of operations approved by the department for the agent's shellfish operation.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 246-282-034 Wild seed permit.** (1) The department will issue a wild seed permit to a person to move shellfish from a harvest site in a growing area classified by the department as "conditionally approved" in closed status, "restricted," or "prohibited," if all of the following conditions are met.

(a) The person possesses a valid shellfish operation license.

(b) The person possesses a harvest site certificate listing both the initial harvest site for the seed and the grow-out site.

(c) The original harvest site has acceptable levels of poisonous chemicals, is not in an area known to be a hazardous chemical disposal site, and is not in a closure zone of a wastewater treatment plant or marina.

(d) The grow-out site is in a natural body of water classified by the department as "approved" or "conditionally approved."

(e) The person submits a completed written application and plan of operations approved by the department completely describing the procedures of the wild seed operation, including the size distribution of the seed.

(f) The person pays the department a wild seed permit application fee or renewal fee as required by this chapter.

(2) A person operating under a wild seed permit must:

(a) Follow all procedures in the plan of operations approved by the department;

(b) Harvest seed from an area classified as "prohibited" only during daylight hours;

(c) Harvest seed from an area classified as "prohibited" only under direct monitoring by a person approved by the department;

(d) Leave seed in a grow-out site for a minimum of six months before final harvest;

(e) Limit harvest of live shellfish larger than seed size attached to, or commingled with, the seed to less than five percent of the total number of the shellfish harvested from the site;

(f) Place any live shellfish larger than seed size attached to, or commingled with, the seed in the grow-out site for a minimum of six months after initial harvest;

(g) Stake or mark the grow-out site to be easily identified by the person for a minimum of six months from the time of moving to the site any seed attached to, or commingled with, shellfish larger than seed size; and

(h) Keep records for each lot of seed harvested that show a lot identification number; the species, location, date, and quantity moved from the initial harvest site; the grow-out location; and the date of first harvest of any of those shellfish from the grow-out site.

(3) A person's wild seed permit expires on the same date as the person's shellfish operation license.

(4) A person is exempt from the requirements of this section for the activity of harvesting seed attached to containerized empty shellfish shells, provided that the person:

(a) Meets the conditions of subsection (1)(a) through (d) of this section;

(b) Leaves the seed in the grow-out site for a minimum of six months before final harvest; and

(c) Fully describes the seed harvest and grow-out activities in a written plan of operations approved by the department for the person's shellfish operation license.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 246-282-036 Bait permit.** (1) The department will approve and issue a bait permit to a person to harvest shellfish from a harvest site in a growing area classified by the department as "prohibited," "restricted," or "conditionally approved" in closed status if all of the following conditions are met.

(a) The person possesses a valid shellfish operation license.

(b) The person possesses a valid harvest site certificate for the site.

(c) The harvest site is not impacted by biotoxin levels that would cause the department to close it for harvest for human consumption.

(d) The person submits a completed written application and plan of operations approved by the department completely describing the procedures of the bait operation.

(e) The person pays the department a bait permit application fee or renewal fee as required by this chapter.

(2) A person operating under a bait permit must:

(a) Follow all procedures in the plan of operations approved by the department;

(b) Harvest bait from an area classified as "prohibited" only during daylight hours;

(c) Harvest bait from an area classified as "prohibited" only under direct monitoring by a person approved by the department;

(d) Completely immerse the shellfish in an approved dye that imparts an easily noticeable permanent color to the tissue immediately upon landing the shellfish;

(e) Label each container of shellfish "NOT FOR HUMAN CONSUMPTION - BAIT USE ONLY" prior to removal from the harvest site;

(f) Store the shellfish physically separated from any shellfish intended for human consumption; and

(g) Keep records for each lot of shellfish harvested for use as bait showing a lot identification number, the species, the harvest site, the harvest date, the quantity harvested, the names of all buyers, and the quantity sold to each buyer.

(3) A person's bait permit expires on the same date as the person's shellfish operation license.

(4) Any person possessing a commercial quantity of bait shellfish is exempt from the requirement to obtain a bait permit provided that the person:

(a) Obtains the shellfish from a person with a valid bait permit;

(b) Possesses a sales invoice for the shellfish from a person with a valid bait permit; and

(c) Maintains each container of shellfish prominently labeled "NOT FOR HUMAN CONSUMPTION - BAIT USE ONLY."

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 246-282-042 Wet storage permit.** (1) Any person who wet stores a commercial quantity of shellfish or any quantity of shellfish for sale for human consumption must have a written plan of operations, approved by the department, completely describing the activity.

(2) A person licensed as a harvester may wet store only in a natural body of water that is part of the same growing area as the harvest site of the shellfish.

(3) Any person who operates a recirculating or flow-through wet storage system must possess a wet storage permit issued by the department. A wet storage permit will be issued to a person for a recirculating or flow-through wet storage system if the person:

(a) Possesses a valid shellfish operation license;

(b) Submits a completed written application and plan of operations to the department completely describing the procedures of the wet storage operation;

(c) Documents that the water used for the operation meets the requirements of the NSSP Model Ordinance;

(d) Passes an inspection by the department; and

(e) Pays the department a wet storage application fee or renewal fee as required by this chapter.

(4) If a person uses a natural body of water for a wet storage operation, the person must possess a valid harvest site certificate listing the body of water.

(5) If a person uses artificial seawater for a wet storage operation, the chemicals used to make the seawater must be approved food grade.

(6) A person operating under a wet storage permit must follow all procedures in the plan of operations approved by the department.

(7) A person's wet storage permit expires on the same date as the person's shellfish operation license.

(~~(Both))~~ The owner, the person in charge, and the employee (~~(shall be))~~ are all responsible for compliance with the requirements of this section.

(2) (~~(Persons who shuck or handle shucked shellfish shall wear clean, waterproof aprons or coats and clean clothing that can be easily cleaned and shall practice good personal cleanliness during all periods of duty. They shall wash their hands thoroughly with soap and warm water before starting to work and as often thereafter as may be necessary to remove soil and contamination. Gloves or other protective gear worn on the hands shall be made of waterproof, easily cleanable material and shall be clean. When manual handling of shucked shellfish becomes necessary, sanitized rubber gloves shall be worn or the hands shall be thoroughly cleaned immediately before such handling. Effective means shall be taken to keep hair from shellfish (shucked meats) and from food contact surfaces.)~~) Any person who is an owner, a person in charge, or an employee of a shellfish operation must practice good personal cleanliness while handling shellfish. These persons must wash their hands thoroughly with soap and water before starting to handle shellfish and as often as is necessary to remove filth and soil that might contaminate shellfish.

(3) If the department determines by investigation that an owner or employee of a shellfish operation might be the source of a foodborne illness transmitted through shellfish, then the secretary may require medical examination of that person and laboratory examination of clinical specimens from that person to determine presence of infection. Any person failing to obtain an examination required by the secretary may not work for a shellfish operation, for a period of time the department determines that person could be infectious, in any capacity that could result in contamination of shellfish with pathogenic organisms.

(2)) All owners and persons in charge of shellfish operations must arrange their physical facilities (~~(- The plant shall be so arranged))~~ to (~~(facilitate))~~ aid in the flow of (~~(the))~~ shellfish products through all handling, processing, and storage areas in a manner that will (~~(preclude))~~ minimize contamination of the shellfish. (~~(Shucking and packing operations shall be conducted in separate rooms. Only authorized persons shall be allowed in the packing room during periods of operation.~~)

Interior surfaces of rooms or areas where shellfish are stored, processed or utensils or hands are washed, and in walk-in refrigerators and freezers shall be easily cleanable, clean and in an approved condition of repair.

Rooms for utensil and packaging material storage shall be provided, and separate from areas which shall be provided for employee clothing storage. These areas shall be separate and apart from the shucking and packing rooms.

Approved lighting, heating and ventilation shall be provided. Approved measures for control of rodents and flies, roaches, and other insects on the premises shall be utilized. Live animals shall be excluded from all areas of the plant.

(3) Sanitary facilities: Hot and cold water adequate in quality and quantity, and under pressure shall be provided or easily accessible to all rooms in which shellfish are processed or utensils are washed. The water supply, plumbing, sewage, garbage and rubbish disposal, handwashing, toilet and other facilities shall be installed, operated, and maintained in an approved manner.

Ice shall be from an approved source and shall be stored and handled in a manner as to be protected from contamination.

Handwashing facilities consisting of a lavatory or lavatories and equipped with hot and cold or tempered running water, hand-cleansing soap or detergent, single service towels or approved hand drying devices shall be located and maintained to permit convenient use by all employees in shellfish processing areas, utensil washing areas, and toilet rooms or vestibules. Such facilities shall be kept clean and in an approved condition of repair.)

(2) Any owner of a shellfish operation must submit to the department for consultation properly prepared plans and specifications of physical facilities for shellfish processing or sanitation activities at least thirty days before the facilities are:

(a) Originally constructed;

(b) Converted from another use; or

(c) Extensively remodeled to the extent that a plan for a building permit is required by the city or county where located.

(3) The department will review properly prepared plans and specifications of physical facilities for shellfish processing or sanitation activities required by subsection (2) of this section within thirty days of receipt and provide technical assistance to the owner of the shellfish operation regarding whether the proposed physical facilities would meet the requirements of this chapter.

~~(6) Shucker packers and repackers shall record the following information: (a) Location of harvesting area(s) by name or code, or name of harvester, (b) name and quantity of shellfish, (c) date of harvest or date received, and (d) packing date.)~~

(1) Any person who possesses a commercial quantity of shellfish or any quantity of shellfish for sale for human consumption must possess a written record documenting that the shellfish came from one or more of the following sources:

(a) Harvest site(s) for which the person possesses a valid harvest site certificate;

(b) Another shellfish operation licensed by the department; or

(c) A shellfish dealer located outside of the state who is in compliance with the requirements of the NSSP Model Ordinance and is eligible for inclusion on the current Interstate Certified Shellfish Shippers List, published by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

(2) Any person who possesses a commercial quantity of shellstock or any quantity of shellstock for sale for human consumption must identify the shellstock by an approved tag

with permanent marking, according to requirements of the NSSP Model Ordinance, upon removal from the harvest site.

(3) Any person who packs a commercial quantity of shucked shellfish or any quantity of shucked shellfish for sale for human consumption must do so in approved containers that are legibly labeled by permanent marking, in accordance with the requirements of the NSSP Model Ordinance and with:

(a) Wording equivalent to "keep refrigerated" on containers of fresh shellfish; and

(b) Wording equivalent to "keep frozen" on containers of frozen shellfish.

(4) The owner or person in charge of a shellfish operation must keep accurate records of all lots of shellfish harvested, received, wet stored, shucked, packed, shipped, or sold by the shellfish operation for a minimum of three years.

(5) All tags for shellstock and labels for containers of shucked shellfish required by this section must be used only for the original lot of shellfish for which they were intended and must not be reused.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 246-282-082 Export certificate.** The department will issue an export certificate to a shellfish dealer for a specific lot of shellfish if the dealer:

(1) Is exporting the lot to an Asian country that requires a production certificate from a governmental health authority;

(2) Possesses a shellfish operation license issued by the secretary;

(3) Is in compliance with the requirements of chapter 69.30 RCW, this chapter, and the NSSP Model Ordinance;

(4) Completes an application specified by the department;

(5) Documents use of each export certificate as specified by the department; and

(a) A minimum of once per year;

(b) Before issuing a new shellfish operation license to a person;

(c) Before a shellfish operation uses any physical facility for the first time; and

(d) Before the shellfish operation uses any extensively remodeled physical facility.

(3) If the department determines by inspection that an owner, person in charge, or any person working on behalf of the shellfish operation is in violation of any of the requirements of chapter 69.30 RCW, this chapter, or the NSSP Model Ordinance, then the department may conduct a rein-

spection of the shellfish operation. If the same violation is identified by the department during the reinspection, then another reinspection may be conducted by the department within one month. The department may charge the owner of a shellfish operation a fee for a second or subsequent reinspection.

(4) If necessary to conduct an inspection, then the department may apply to a court of competent jurisdiction for an administrative warrant in accordance with RCW 69.30.120.

(5) During inspections, the department has free and unimpeded access to any of the following in order to determine whether the operation is in compliance with chapter 69.30 RCW, this chapter, and the NSSP Model Ordinance:

(a) Buildings, yards, warehouses, storage facilities, transportation facilities, vehicles, vessels and other places reasonably considered to be or to have been used in connection with the shellfish operation;

(b) Ledgers, books, accounts, memorandums, or records reasonably believed to be or to have been used in connection with the shellfish operation;

(c) Shellfish, shellfish products, components, or other materials reasonably believed to be or to have been used, processed or produced by or in connection with the shellfish operation;

(d) Copies of any documents reasonably believed to be or to have been used in connection with the shellfish operation; and

(e) Samples of shellfish to determine whether they are safe for human consumption.

(6) The department may inspect shellfish growing areas at any time of day and will inspect any other aspect of a shellfish operation:

(a) Between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on any weekday that is not a legal holiday;

(b) During any time the shellfish operation has established as its business hours;

(c) During any time the shellfish operation is open for business or is otherwise in operation; and

(d) During any other time with the consent of the owner or the person in charge of the shellfish operation.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 246-282-102 Denial, revocation, suspension of license, certificate, or permit—Civil penalties.** (1) The department may deny, revoke, or suspend a shellfish operation license, harvest site certificate, or permit and may assess a civil penalty if a person:

(a) Fails to comply with any of the provisions of chapter 69.30 RCW, these rules, and the NSSP Model Ordinance;

(b) Refuses an inspection by the department;

(c) Harvests shellfish from any harvest site for which the secretary has not issued a harvest site certificate to the person;

(d) Knowingly obtains shellfish from a person who is not in compliance with any requirements of chapter 69.30 RCW, this chapter, or the NSSP Model Ordinance;

(e) Makes false statements or misrepresentations to the department during any investigation, inspection, or application for a shellfish operation license or any permit required by these rules;

(f) Makes false statements or misrepresentations to the department during any investigation, inspection, or application for a shellfish harvest site certificate;

(g) Fails to cooperate with the department or the department of fish and wildlife during an investigation;

(h) Aids another person in violating any requirement of chapter 69.30 RCW, these rules, or the NSSP Model Ordinance;

(i) Provides the department with false or fraudulent records of the shellfish operation;

(j) Transfers or reassigns a shellfish operation license to another person without the written approval of the department; or

(k) Fails to comply with the terms of a conditional area management plan, shellfish operation license, harvest site certificate, or any permit required by this chapter.

(2) Violations of chapter 69.30 RCW, these rules, or the NSSP Model Ordinance committed by a person in charge, employee, or agent of a person issued a shellfish operation license may be treated by the department as a violation committed by the licensee.

**WAC 246-282-104 Penalty assignment—Calculation of penalty and proportionate adjustment—Aggravating and mitigating factors.** (1) The department calculates an appropriate penalty based on the following factors:

(a) The level of threat to public health;

(b) The number of previous violations attributed to the violator; and

(c) The presence of aggravating or mitigating factors.

(2) The department determines administrative penalties from the range in the following penalty schedule. The standard penalty is assessed unless a proportionate adjustment is warranted and/or there are aggravating or mitigating factors present.

(3) The department reserves the right to proportionately increase the civil penalty and decrease the license action under certain circumstances. These circumstances include situations where license actions as a deterrent are ineffective and include, but are not limited to, violations by persons who are not licensed.

(4) The department reserves the right to proportionately decrease the civil penalty and increase the license action when circumstances in a particular case demonstrate the ineffectiveness of a civil penalty as a deterrent.

(5)(a) When assessing a civil penalty or license action, the department considers any previous violation(s) for the following period of time, depending on the severity of the previous violation(s):

- (i) Three years for low public health threat;
- (ii) Five years for intermediate public health threat; or
- (iii) No limit for high public health threat.

(b) The time period will begin on the date of adjudication or settlement of the previous violation(s), rather than the date on which the incident or conduct occurred.

(6) The department considers circumstances that increase the seriousness of a violation, including, but not limited to, the following aggravating factors:

- (a) The extent to which the violation is part of a pattern of the same or substantially similar conduct;
- (b) The extent to which previous education, technical assistance, or notice of correction has been provided for the same or substantially similar conduct; and

(c) The extent to which the violation caused serious and actual injury or death to a person or persons.

(7) If the department determines that one or more aggravating factors are present, then the department may assess the aggravated penalty or may increase the penalty to a level greater than listed in the penalty schedule, including, but not limited to, revocation of the license.

(8) The department will consider circumstances that decrease the seriousness of a violation, including, but not limited to, the following mitigating factors:

- (a) Voluntary disclosure of the violation;
- (b) Complete cooperation and voluntary disclosure during the investigation of the violation; and
- (c) Voluntary taking of remedial measures that will result in increased public health protection and that will result in a decreased likelihood that the violation will be repeated and that other violations will occur.

(9) If the department determines that one or more mitigating factors are present, then the department may assess the mitigated penalty or may decrease the penalty to a level less than listed in the penalty schedule.

(10) The maximum civil penalty that may be imposed by the department is five hundred dollars per day for each violation.

(11) The department considers each violation to be a separate and distinct event. Each day a violation is continued is a separate and distinct violation. When a person has committed multiple violations, the violations are cumulative for pur-

poses of calculating the appropriate penalty. Penalties are added together, rather than served concurrently.

(12) Nothing in this section prevents the department from responding to a violation by:

(a) Declining to pursue an administrative penalty;

(b) Issuing a notice of correction instead of pursuing an administrative penalty; or

(c) Negotiating settlement of a case on such terms and for such reason as the department deems appropriate. Violations covered by a prior settlement agreement may be used for the purpose of determining the appropriate penalty for the current alleged violation(s), unless prohibited by the prior settlement agreement.

The person in charge shall periodically inspect the shellfish operations to determine compliance with these regulations, and shall take measures to correct any deficiencies thereby revealed.

(2) The director shall have access to and be permitted to inspect any and all areas comprising the shellfish operation for the purpose of determining compliance with these regulations and chapter 69.30 RCW, or for the purpose of determining whether any person, shellfish, or condition in the shellfish operation constitutes a nuisance or a threat to the public health.

(a) In the course of such inspection, the director may, among other things, examine or sample the shellfish in the shellfish operation as often as necessary to determine its safety for human consumption, and he or she may also examine any and all pertinent records pertaining to shellstock, shellfish, or operational supplies purchased, received, or used, and records pertaining to persons employed.

(b) If, after the inspection of a shellfish operation, the director finds such operation fails to comply with the requirements of the law, rules and regulations, he or she shall issue to the person in charge of the shellfish operation a written order specifying the manner in which the operation fails to comply with the law, rules and regulations and which sets out a specific and reasonable period of time for correction of the violations.

(c) In the event the person in charge of the shellfish operation fails to correct the violations as required by the order of the director, the director may revoke the certificate of compliance and/or license of such person and/or initiate such legal enforcement proceeding as authorized by law.

(d) During or after an investigation or inspection of a shellfish operation, the director may, if he or she suspects the shellfish are unsafe for human consumption, give to the owner or person in charge of the shellfish operation a written hold order prohibiting the disposition or sale of the shellfish pending the director's further investigation of the shellfish's safety. The person in charge shall thereafter cease from offering such shellfish for human consumption and shall store

such shellfish in a suitable place as prescribed by the director until the hold order is lifted or modified by the director or by a court of competent jurisdiction. Shellfish placed under a hold order shall not be destroyed for at least two days and shall not be held longer than fifteen days; however, upon a finding that the shellfish are safe for human consumption, the director may release them immediately.

(e) If, during an inspection of a shellfish harvesting operation, the owner or person in charge of the operation fails to immediately display his or her certificate of approval upon request from an authorized representative of the department, a fisheries patrol officer, or an ex officio patrol officer, a written hold order may be issued prohibiting the disposition or sale of the shellfish or the shellfish may immediately be seized. If a hold order is issued, the person in charge shall thereafter cease from offering such shellfish for human consumption and shall store such shellfish in a suitable place as prescribed by the director until the hold order is lifted or modified by the director or by a court of competent jurisdiction. Shellfish placed under a hold order or seizure shall not be destroyed for at least two days and shall not be held longer than fifteen days; however, upon a finding that the shellfish are safe for human consumption, the director shall determine disposition. If the director determines that the operation is certified, the shellfish shall be released to the owner or person in charge of the operation. If the director determines that the operation is not certified, the director may release the shellfish according to his or her discretion.

(f) If after investigation the director determines the shellfish are unsafe for human consumption, he or she shall give the owner or person in charge of the shellfish operation a written abatement order, which abatement order may require any or all of the following measures:

(1) A) If the department finds during an inspection that any owner or person working on behalf of a shellfish operation fails to comply with any requirements of chapter 69.30 RCW, this chapter, or the NSSP Model Ordinance, then the department may issue a written statement of deficiencies or notice of correction to the owner, person in charge, or other employee of the operation who is present.

(a) The statement of deficiencies or notice of correction specifies the manner in which the operation fails to comply with chapter 69.30 RCW and these rules. It specifies a reasonable period of time for the owner or person in charge to correct the violation(s).

(b) In the event the owner or person in charge fails to correct the violation(s) specified in the statement of deficiencies, the department may revoke the license and certificate of compliance for that shellfish operation or may initiate any other enforcement proceeding authorized by law.

(2) Any authorized representative of the department, fish and wildlife patrol officer or ex officio patrol officer may, without previously providing a statement of deficiencies, immediately seize shellfish or issue written hold orders prohibiting the disposition or sale of shellfish whenever a commercial quantity of shellfish or any amount of shellfish for sale for human consumption is on the premises of, or in the possession of, any person who:

(a) Fails to display an original or photocopy of a valid shellfish operation license;

(b) Is reasonably expected to have harvested the shellfish and fails to display an original or photocopy of a valid shellfish operation license and a valid harvest site certificate; or

(c) Fails to maintain each container of shellfish properly tagged or labeled as required by chapter 69.30 RCW, these rules, and the NSSP Model Ordinance.

(3) If the department determines during an inspection or investigation that there is reasonable cause to believe that shellfish is potentially unsafe for human consumption, then the department may issue a hold order prohibiting the disposition or sale of the shellfish pending further investigation by the department of the safety of the shellfish.

(a) The department must complete its further investigation within ten days.

(b) At the conclusion of the investigation, the department may release the shellfish for sale or issue a written abatement order regarding the shellfish.

(c) Any person in possession of shellfish for which the department has issued a hold order must store the shellfish in a suitable place prescribed by the department and prevent the shellfish from being offered for human consumption or other use until:

(i) The hold order is lifted by the department or by a court of competent jurisdiction; or

(ii) The person disposes of the shellfish in accordance with an abatement order issued by the department.

(4) Shellfish that the department seizes or places under a hold order and determines are unsafe for human consumption are subject to such abatement as the department considers appropriate. (4) "District FTE K-4 better schools certificated instructional staff" means the sum of:

(a) The district's full-time equivalent better schools certificated instructional employees in grades kindergarten through four (K-4) determined in the same manner as basic education staff in WAC 392-140-903 (9) and (10) substituting the better schools program for basic education programs; plus

(b) One FTE for each 900 hours of supplemental contracts for extended learning opportunities for students in grades K-6 in the better schools program.

(5) "Better schools classified instructional assistant" means a person employed to provide additional student contact for the purposes of the better schools program as described in the state Operating Appropriations Act and assigned in whole or in part to:

(a) Program 62 - better schools—Staff—State;

(b) Activity 27 - teaching; and

(c) Duty 910 - aide.

(6) "Better schools classified instructional assistant FTE" means the number determined for a better schools classified instructional assistant as follows:

(a) Determine the hours per year that the employee is assigned as a better schools classified instructional assistant; and

(b) Divide by 2080.

(7) "District FTE better schools classified instructional assistants" means the sum of a school district's better schools classified instructional assistant FTE staff.

(8) "Certificated FTE equivalent of better schools classified instructional assistants" means the number determined for a school district as follows:

(a) Sum the district's FTE better schools classified instructional assistants from Report S-275 and any net change in FTE classified instructional assistants after October 1 as reported on Form SPI 1158;

(b) Multiply the result of subsection (8)(a) of this section by the ratio of the district's actual average salary for basic

education classified instructional assistants to the district's average basic education certificated instructional staff salary for the purpose of general apportionment.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 392-140-924 Better schools—Staff—School district reporting.** (1) Districts shall report better schools staff on Report S-275.

(a) Supplemental contracts for extended learning opportunities shall identify the number of hours of student contact for the school year.

(b) Changes in supplemental contracts for extended learning opportunities after October 1 as updates to Report S-275.

(c) Contracted staff shall be reported to the extent feasible using duty codes provided for contracted staff.

(2) Districts may report net changes in better schools staff after October 1 on optional Form SPI 1158 as follows:

(a) Determine the better schools FTE that would be reported for each employee for the school year on Report S-275 if the current date were substituted for the October 1 snapshot date as required in S-275 instructions and subtract the better schools FTE as of October 1 actually reported for the employee on the school district's most current Report S-275.

(b) Include decreases as well as increases in staff after October 1 not reflected in Report S-275. Decreases include terminations, retirements, unpaid leave, and reassignment of staff.

(c) Identify changes by grade group when appropriate.

(3) Districts may select an alternate month for the K-4 basic education enrollment used in calculating better schools staff ratios by filing optional Form SPI 1160. The month selected shall be used for both basic education and better schools staff ratio calculations.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 392-140-925 Better schools—Staff—Calculation of district K-4 better schools staff ratio.** A school district's K-4 better schools staff ratio is calculated as follows:

(1) Sum the district's FTE K-4 better schools certificated instructional staff from Report S-275 and Form SPI 1158;

(2) Divide the result of subsection (1) of this section by the district's K-4 basic education enrollment; and

(3) Multiply the result of subsection (2) of this section by 1000.

(c) The certificated FTE equivalent of better schools classified instructional assistants determined pursuant to WAC 392-140-922(8).

NEW SECTION

**WAC 392-140-928 Better schools—Staff—Request for adjustment of the district state-funded better schools staff ratio.** A school district may request an adjustment to the state-funded better schools staff ratio by submitting a letter to the superintendent of public instruction. The superintendent shall allow adjustments to districts demonstrating that the district has appropriately expended the better schools staff allocation but has not reached the 2.2 staff ratio for one or more of the following reasons:

(1) Contracted services for students are not reflected on Report S-275.

(2) The district's better schools staff ratio is adversely affected by participation in a consortium or interdistrict cooperative.

(3) The mix factor of better schools staff significantly exceeded the district's basic education mix factor used for better schools funding.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 392-140-929 Better schools—Staff—Calculation of the better schools staff allocation.** A school district's better schools staff allocation for a school year shall be calculated as follows:

(1) Determine the number of funded certificated instruction staff units by multiplying the district's state-funded better schools staff ratio by the district's annual average K-4 FTE students for purpose of general apportionment and divide by 1000; and

(2) Calculate the value of these funded staff units using the district's general apportionment funding factors including the district's basic education mix factor, LEAP certificated instructional base salary, learning improvement days, and

state-funded health insurance, mandatory benefit, nonemployee related cost, and substitute teacher rates.

(3) Allocations for the months of September through December shall be based on the district's budgeted funding variables use for general apportionment including K-4 FTE students, basic education mix factor, learning improvement days and state-funded better schools staff ratio. Beginning in January, allocations shall be based on funding variables calculated by the superintendent of public instruction using the most current enrollment data and personnel data reported by the district received by the superintendent of public instruction by the 15th of the month.

(4) Better schools staff allocations shall be paid out on the apportionment payment schedule in RCW 28A.510.250.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 392-140-930 Better schools—Staff—Reporting by the superintendent of public instruction.** Beginning in January of each school year, the superintendent of public instruction will provide to each school district monthly reports showing the calculation of the district's state-funded better schools staff ratio and state allocation for better schools staff.

**BETTER SCHOOLS—PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT**NEW SECTION

MAA determines whether the providers are complying with the rules and regulations of the program(s) and providing appropriate quality of care, and recovers any identified overpayments. Examples of provider reviews are:

(a) A review of all billing/medical/dental/service records for medical assistance clients;

(b) A statistical sampling of billing/medical/dental/service records for medical assistance clients, extrapolated per WAC 388-502-0240 (9), (10), and (11); and

(c) A review focused on selected billing/medical/dental/service records for medical assistance clients.

(2) The Washington State Health Professions Quality Assurance Commissions serve in an advisory capacity to MAA in conducting provider reviews and monitoring.

(3) MAA may determine that a provider's billing does not comply with program regulations or the provider is not meeting quality of care practices. MAA may do, but is not limited to, any of the following:

(a) Conduct pre-pay reviews of all claims the provider submits to MAA;

(b) Refer the provider to MAA's auditors (see WAC 388-502-0240);

(c) Refer the provider to Medicaid's Fraud Control Unit;

(d) Refer the provider to the appropriate state health professions quality assurance commission;

(e) Impose provisional stipulations for the provider to continue participation in medical assistance programs;

(f) Terminate the provider's participation in medical assistance programs;

(g) Assess a civil penalty against the provider, per RCW 74.09.210; and

(h) Recover any monies that the provider received as a result of inappropriate payments.

(4) When any part of the time period that is reviewed or monitored falls on or before June 30, 1998, the following process applies. A provider who disagrees with a department action regarding overpayment recovery may request an administrative review hearing to dispute the action(s).

(a) The request for an administrative review hearing must be in writing and:

(2) You are eligible for nursing facility care if the department:

(a) Assesses you and determines that you meet the functional criteria for nursing facility level of care as defined in WAC 388-71-0435(4); and

(b) Determines that you meet the eligibility requirements set through WAC 388-513-1315.

(3) If you are Medicaid eligible and the nursing facility admits you without a request for assessment from the department, the nursing facility will not:

(a) Be reimbursed by the department; or

(b) Allowed to collect payment, including a deposit or minimum stay fee, from you or your family/representative for any care provided before the date of request for assessment.

(4) If you are eligible for Medicaid-funding nursing facility care, the department pays for your services beginning on the date:

(a) Of the request for a department assessment; or

(b) Nursing facility care actually begins, whichever is later.

(5) If you become financially eligible for Medicaid after you have been admitted, the department pays for your nursing facility care beginning on the date of:

(a) Request for assessment or financial application, whichever is earlier; or

(b) Nursing facility placement; or

(c) When you are determined financially eligible, whichever is later.

(d) Exception: Payment back to the request date is limited to three months prior to the month that the financial application is received.

**WAC 275-46-060 Minimum security.** (1) The provisions of WAC ((275-46-050)) 388-730-0050 also apply to a juvenile classified as minimum security, except the juvenile must reside in a community facility or a community commitment program facility (CCP) rather than in an institution.

(2) Juveniles must not be placed in a community facility until:

(a) Ten percent of the juvenile's sentence, and in no case less than thirty days, has been served in a secure facility; and

(b) All placement assessment requirements have been met.

(3) In addition to the provisions of WAC ((275-46-050 ~~(3)(b)(iii))~~) 388-730-0050 (3)(b)(iii), minimum security juveniles may be permitted unescorted participation in treatment programs in the community that do not involve the family for up to twelve hours per day.

**WAC 275-46-070 Residential disciplinary standards.**

(1) Serious violations by a juvenile include:

(a) Escape or attempted escape;

(b) Violence toward others with intent to harm and/or resulting in significant bodily injury;



- (c) Involvement in or conviction of a criminal offense under investigation by law enforcement or awaiting adjudication for behavior that occurred during current placement;
  - (d) Extortion or blackmail that threatens the safety or security of the facility or community;
  - (e) Setting or causing an unauthorized fire with intent to harm self, others, or property, or with reckless disregard for the safety of others;
  - (f) Possession or manufacture of weapons or explosives, or tools intended to assist in escape;
  - (g) Interfering with staff in performing duties relating to the security and/or safety of the facility or community;
  - (h) Intentional property damage in excess of one thousand five hundred dollars;
  - (i) Possession, use, or distribution of drugs or alcohol, or use of inhalants;
  - (j) Rioting or inciting others to riot;
  - (k) Refusal of urinalysis or search; or
  - (l) Other behaviors which threaten the safety or security of the facility, its staff, or residents or the community.
- (2) Other violations by a juvenile placed in a community facility include:
- (a) Unaccounted for time when a juvenile is away from the community facility;
  - (b) Violation of conditions of authorized leave;
  - (c) Intimidation or coercion against any person;
  - (d) Misuse of medication such as hoarding medication or taking another person's medication;
  - (e) Self-mutilation, self tattooing, body piercing, or assisting others to do the same;
  - (f) Intentional destruction of property valued at less than fifteen hundred dollars;
  - (g) Fighting;
  - (h) Unauthorized withdrawal of funds with intent to commit other violations;
  - (i) Suspensions or expulsions from school or work;
  - (j) Violations of school, employment or volunteer work agreements related to custody and security concerns;
  - (k) Escape talk;
  - (l) Sexual contact or any other behavior, not defined as a serious violation, resulting in a referral to the department of licensing, child protective services, or law enforcement; or
  - (m) Lewd or disruptive behavior in the community.
- (3) Juveniles must be held accountable when there is reasonable cause to believe they have committed a violation.
- (a) Whenever a juvenile placed in a community facility commits a serious violation, the juvenile must be returned to an institution. The JRA program administrator who receives a service provider report of a serious violation must make arrangements to transfer the juvenile to an institution as soon as possible. Juveniles may be placed in a secure JRA or contracted facility pending transportation to an institution.
- (b) Sanctions for serious violations committed by juveniles in an institution, and additional sanctions for serious violations committed by juveniles returned to an institution, must include one or more of the following:
- (i) Loss of privileges for up to thirty days;
  - (ii) Loss of program level; or
  - (iii) Room confinement up to seventy-two hours.

(c) Sanctions for serious violations may also include, but are not limited to, one or more of the following:

- (i) Change in release date;
  - (ii) Referral for prosecution;
  - (iii) Transfer to an intensive management unit;
  - (iv) Increase in security classification;
  - (v) Reprimand and loss of points;
  - (vi) Restitution; or
  - (vii) Community service.
- (d) Sanctions for violations listed in WAC ((275-46-070(2))) 388-730-0070(2) may include transfer to a higher security facility and must include one or more of the following:
- (i) Loss or privileges;
  - (ii) Loss of program level;
  - (iii) Room confinement up to seventy-two hours;
  - (iv) Change in release date;
  - (v) Reprimand and/or loss of points;
  - (vi) Additional restitution; or
  - (vii) Community service.
- (4) When a sanction is imposed, the juvenile must also receive a counseling intervention to address the violation.
- (5) If the proposed sanctions for any violation includes extending the juvenile's established release date, the juvenile must be entitled to:
- (a) Notice of an administrative review to consider extension of the release date and a written statement of the incident;
  - (b) An opportunity to be heard before a neutral review chairperson;
  - (c) Present oral or written statements, and call witnesses unless testimony of a witness would be irrelevant, repetitive, unnecessary, or would disrupt the orderly administration of the facility;
  - (d) Imposition of the sanction only if the administrative review chairperson finds by a preponderance of the evidence that the serious violation did occur; and
  - (e) A written decision, stating the reasons for the decision, by the administrative review chairperson.
- (6) Each superintendent and service provider must clearly post the list of serious violations and possible sanctions in all living units.
- (7) Each program administrator must adopt procedures for implementing the requirements of this section.

**WAC 275-46-080 Documenting and reporting violations committed by juveniles in residential facilities.** (1) All serious violations and violations listed in WAC ((275-46-070(2))) 388-730-0070(2) must be documented in an incident report. The incident report must include:

- (a) Circumstances leading up to the violation(s);
- (b) A description of the violation;
- (c) Response by staff;
- (d) Response by the juvenile(s) involved in the incident; and
- (e) Sanctions imposed or recommended for the violation(s).

(2) Service providers must:

(a) Forward all incident reports to the JRA program administrator no later than twenty-four hours after the behavior is discovered; and

(b) Verbally report serious violations to the JRA program administrator immediately.

**WAC 275-46-090 Service provider penalty schedule.**

(1) Whenever a service provider contracts with the JRA to operate a community facility, the contracted service provider must report any known violation as required in WAC ((275-46-080)) 388-730-0080.

(2) If the contracted service provider fails to report violations within the prescribed time frames, the JRA must impose one or more of the following remedies:

(a) Imposition of a corrective action plan to be completed as determined by the program administrator.

(b) Imposition of the following monetary penalties:

(i) The first time fines are imposed on a service provider, the penalty must be at the rate of fifty dollars per day for each juvenile involved in a violation that was not reported as required. The penalty must be assessed for each day the report was late, and may continue until a corrective action plan is approved by the program administrator.

(ii) Subsequent fines imposed on the service provider during the same calendar year must be at the rate of seventy-five dollars per day for each juvenile involved in a violation that was not reported as required. The penalty must be assessed for each day the report was late, and may continue until a corrective action plan is approved by the program administrator.

(c) Order to stop placement until a corrective action plan is submitted, approved by the program administrator, and implemented.

(d) Termination of the contract for convenience if it is determined such termination is in the best interests of the department.

Date of Adoption: October 23, 2000.

Purpose: Amendments to the organic crop production standards are being adopted for a number of reasons. One, they clarify the standards regarding genetic engineering, transplants, seeds, sprouts, and transitional requirements. Two, they more closely align Washington's organic standards with national and international organic standards. Three, the proposed amendments enhance organic integrity through the requirements for notification and nonchemical vegetation management. Fourth, the list of approved and prohibited materials are clarified and updated.

Citation of Existing Rules Affected by this Order: Chapter 16-154 WAC, amending WAC 16-154-030, and 16-154-050 through 16-154-110.

Statutory Authority for Adoption: Chapter 15.86 RCW. Adopted under notice filed as WSR 00-17-115 on August 17, 2000.

Changes Other than Editing from Proposed to Adopted Version: Based on consideration of the comments received the adopted version is changed from the proposed version in the following areas: WAC 16-154-030(5) Definition of compost, the definition of compost has been changed to be consistent with the definition under RCW 15.54.270.

WAC 16-154-030(17) Definition of fertilizer, the definition of fertilizer has been changed to be consistent with the definition under RCW 15.54.270.

WAC 16-154-030(18) Genetic engineering, the definition of genetic engineering has been changed to improve the clarity and specificity of the definition. The adopted rule is consistent with the prohibition of genetic engineering in the proposed National Organic Program.

WAC 16-154-030(19) Genetically engineered organisms, a definition of genetically engineered organisms has been added to improve the clarity of the rule.

WAC 16-154-030(35) Addition of a definition for synthetic, a definition of synthetic has been included that is identical to the definition in the Federal Organic Food Production Act.

WAC 16-154-070 (1)(l) Allowance of waxed cardboard as compost feedstock, the adopted rule clarifies that waxed cardboard may be used as a compost feedstock as long as it does not exceed 0.75% by weight of the total feedstock amount. This is consistent with the Organic Trade Association's American Organic Standards and the Organic Materials Review Institute's organic standards.

(1) "Active ingredient" means any ingredient which will prevent, destroy, repel, control, or mitigate pests, or which will act as a plant regulator, defoliant, desiccant, or spray adjuvant.

(2) "Aged manure" means manure that has been piled or held for six months or more but which has not been composted.

(3) "Approved" means any material or practice which meets the required criteria or standards for use in organic food production.

((3)) (4) "Commercially unavailable" means the documented inability to obtain a production input or ingredient in an appropriate form, quality, quantity or variety to be feasibly used to fulfill an essential function in a system of organic farming, processing or handling.

(5) "Compost" means a material produced from the controlled aerobic degradation of organic waste materials. Natural decay of organic waste under uncontrolled conditions is not composting.

(6) "Composting" means a process in which organic materials are digested by microbial action.

(7) "Crop production aid" means any substance, material, structure or device that is used to aid a producer of an agricultural product except for fertilizers and pesticides.

(8) "Defoliant" means any substance or mixture of substances intended to cause the leaves or foliage to drop from a plant with or without causing abscission.

~~((4))~~ (9) "Department" means the department of agriculture of the state of Washington.

~~((5))~~ (10) "Desiccant" means any substance or mixture of substances intended to artificially accelerate the drying of plant tissues.

~~((6))~~ (11) "Director" means the director of the department of agriculture or his or her duly authorized representative.

~~((7))~~ (12) "EPA" means the United States Environmental Protection Agency.

(13) "EPA's List 1" means the United States Environmental Protection Agency's List 1 of other (inert) pesticide ingredients of toxicological concern. This list is available at EPA's website [www.epa.gov/oppr001/inerts/lists.html](http://www.epa.gov/oppr001/inerts/lists.html).

(14) "EPA's List 2" means the United States Environmental Protection Agency's List 2 of other (inert) pesticide ingredients of suspected toxicological concern. This list is available at EPA's website [www.epa.gov/oppr001/inerts/lists.html](http://www.epa.gov/oppr001/inerts/lists.html).

(15) "EPA's List 4A" means the United States Environmental Protection Agency's List 4A of other (inert) pesticide ingredients that are generally regarded as safe. This list is available at EPA's website [www.epa.gov/oppr001/inerts/lists.html](http://www.epa.gov/oppr001/inerts/lists.html).

(16) "EPA's List 4B" means the United States Environmental Protection Agency's List 4B of other (inert) pesticide ingredients that have sufficient data to substantiate they can be used safely in pesticide products. This list is available at EPA's website [www.epa.gov/oppr001/inerts/lists.html](http://www.epa.gov/oppr001/inerts/lists.html).

(17) "Fertilizer" means a substance containing one or more recognized plant nutrients and that is used for its plant nutrient content or that is designated for use or claimed to have value in promoting plant growth, and shall include limes, gypsum, and manipulated animal and vegetable manures. It does not include unmanipulated animal and vegetable manures, organic waste-derived material, and other products exempted by the department by rule.

(18) "Genetic engineering" means techniques that alter the molecular or cell biology of an organism by means that are not possible under natural conditions or processes. Genetic engineering includes, but is not limited to, the intentional use of recombinant DNA technology, cell fusion, micro- and macro-encapsulation, gene deletion, introducing a foreign gene, and changing the positions of genes. It does not include breeding, conjugation, fermentation, hybridization, in-vitro fertilization and tissue culture.

(19) "Genetically engineered organisms" are those organisms produced through the intentional use of genetic engineering.

(20) "Growing medium" means any material that fungi may grow in.

(21) "Growing medium amendment" means a nutritional supplement added to the growing medium to enhance vigor and yields.

(22) "Inert ingredient" means an ingredient (~~which~~) in a pesticide formulation that is not an active ingredient.

~~((8))~~ (23) "Manure" means feces, urine, bedding, and other waste incidental to an animal. It does not include sewage sludge, biosolids or human waste products.

(24) "Material" means any pesticide, (~~plant regulator, defoliant, desiccant,~~) spray adjuvant, fertilizer, soil amendment, growth regulator, crop production aid, post-harvest material or other substance or mixture of substances which is intended to be used in agricultural production or post-harvest use.

~~((9))~~ (25) "Organic food" means any agricultural product including meat, dairy and beverage, that (a) is marketed using the term organic or any derivative of organic in its labeling or advertising; (b) has had no applications of prohibited substances within three years prior to the harvest of the crop; and (c) is produced in compliance with standards defined in chapter 15.86 RCW and rules adopted thereunder.

(26) "Pesticide" means, but is not limited to:

(a) Any substance or mixture of substances intended to prevent, destroy, control, repel, or mitigate any insect, rodent, nematode, mollusk, fungus, weed, and any other form of plant or animal life or virus (except virus on or in living man or other animal) which is normally considered to be a pest or which the director may declare to be a pest;

(b) Any substance or mixture of substances intended to be used as a plant regulator, defoliant, or desiccant;

(c) Any substance or mixture of substances intended to be used as a spray adjuvant; and

(d) Any other substances intended for such use as may be named by the director by regulation.

~~((10))~~ (27) "Plant regulator" means any substance or mixture of substances intended through physiological action, to accelerate or retard the rate of growth or maturation, or to otherwise alter the behavior of ornamental or crop plants but shall not include substances insofar as they are intended to be used as plant nutrients, trace elements, nutritional chemicals, plant inoculant, or soil amendments.

~~((11))~~ (28) "Practice" means the physical action of doing something.

(29) "Prohibited" means any material or practice which is disallowed in organic food production, handling, or processing.

~~((12))~~ (30) "Raw manure" means manure that is less than six months old and has not been composted.

(31) "Site" means a designated farm, field, orchard, block, pasture, paddock, garden, circle, plot or other contiguous area under the same management (e.g., organic or transitional). A site may contain multiple crops.

(32) "Soil amendment" means any substance that is intended to improve the quality of the soil.

(33) "Spawn" means a medium that has been colonized with the desired fungal mycelia. It is used to inoculate growing medium.

(34) "Spray adjuvant" means any wetting agent, spreading agent, deposit builder, adhesive, emulsifying agent, deflocculating agent, water modifier, or similar agent with or without toxic properties of its own intended to be used with any other pesticide as an aid to the application or to the effect thereof, and which is in a package or container separate from that of the pesticide with which it is to be used.

(35) "Synthetic" means a substance that is formulated or manufactured by a chemical process or by a process that chemically changes a substance extracted from naturally occurring plant, animal, or mineral sources, except that such term shall not apply to substances created by naturally occurring biological processes.

(36) "Transition to organic food" means any agricultural product that:

(a) Is marketed using the term transition to organic or transitional in its labeling and advertising; and

(b) Satisfies all of the requirements of organic food except that it has had no applications of prohibited substances within one year prior to the harvest of the crop.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending WSR 91-09-028, filed 4/11/91, effective 5/12/91)

**WAC 16-154-050 Organic crop production standards.** (1) Buffer zones. Crops harvested and marketed as "organic," "organically grown," or "transition to organic" shall be grown, raised, or produced within the meaning of RCW 15.86.030 at least twenty-five feet from the nearest application of prohibited materials. Crops grown in the buffer zone may not be marketed as "organic" or "transition to organic."

(2) (Soil building.

(a) In order for a crop to be considered "organically grown" a soil building program must be in place for at least three years, except for those crops grown hydroponically. In order for a crop to be considered "transition to organic" a soil building program must be in place for at least one year, except for those crops grown hydroponically.

(b) Upon request by the department producers of organic crops shall demonstrate their soil building programs and the department shall restrict producers from using the terms "organic," "organically grown," or "transition to organic" on crops grown without adequate soil building programs. An adequate soil building program includes using humic building materials such as manure, compost, cover crops, and rock minerals which build or maintain soil organic matter. Demonstration of soil building programs shall entail documentation of soil inputs and soil testing.

(3) Transplants.

(a) Annuals must be grown in an organic environment from seed through harvest. Annual transplants must be organically grown in order to meet the organic crop production standards.

(b) Nonorganically grown perennial transplants will be considered "organic" after they have been grown in organic soil for one year.

(4) Seeds. Untreated seeds and/or seeds treated with materials approved for organic food production are permitted for organic food production. The use of synthetic insecticides on or in seeds is prohibited. Seeds treated with fungicides may be used if the grower can demonstrate through written documentation that untreated seeds are unavailable. Strawberry crowns and potatoes are considered seeds for the purpose of this section.) Boundaries of site: The boundaries of each site in organic or transition to organic production must be clearly and unambiguously identified along all borders. Identification may consist of flagging, fences, posts, signs, roads or other markers.

(3) Borders at risk: Organic and transition to organic crops produced in proximity to the aerial or airblast application of prohibited materials are considered borders at risk. The department may periodically sample crops grown in borders at risk to assure that pesticide drift does not affect the integrity of the organic crops.

(4) Roadside and right of way vegetation management: Nonchemical vegetation management agreements must be established with road departments, railroads, irrigation districts, and other rights of way that are in proximity to organic and transition to organic food production, or, where no agreement is possible, adequate buffer zones must be established.

(5) Notification: Producers of organic and transition to organic crops must notify owners and/or managers of adjoining land that they are producing organic and/or transition to organic crops. The notification must state the location of the sites in organic and transition to organic food production. Notification must be made on an annual basis.

(6) Transitional requirements: Organic crops must have had no applications of prohibited materials to the crops or land for three years prior to the harvest of the organic crop. Transition to organic crops must have had no applications of prohibited materials to the crops or land for one year prior to the harvest of the transition to organic crop.

(7) Transplants and seedlings:

(a) Annual and biennial seedlings and transplants must be organically produced from seed.

(b) Perennial transplants must be grown on a certified organic site for at least twelve months prior to the harvest of an organic crop except for: Strawberries and fall bearing raspberries may be from a nonorganic source provided that organically grown transplants are commercially unavailable.

(8) Seeds: Seeds treated with prohibited materials are prohibited except for seeds treated with fungicides provided that untreated seeds are commercially unavailable. Garlic cloves, potatoes and crops with similar life cycles are considered seeds for the purpose of this section.

(9) Sprouts produced for human consumption must be produced from certified organic seeds.

(10) Genetic engineering: Genetically engineered organisms and their products are prohibited from being considered organic or transition to organic. Genetically engineered organisms must not be used as seeds or plant stock of any crops used in organic or transition to organic food production.

(11) Treated wood: Lumber treated with pentachlorophenol, creosote, and copper chromium arsenate is prohibited in raised beds and in greenhouses where there is contact

with soil used to produce organic crops, except for: Raised beds and greenhouses that were installed three years prior to the harvest of organic crops.

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 16-154-053 Organic farm plan.** Producers of organic and/or transition to organic food products must have an organic plan that consists of the following elements:

(1) Soil quality - The organic plan must contain provisions designed to foster soil quality, primarily through the management of the organic matter of the soil. The producer must conduct a baseline assessment of soil quality. The baseline assessment must include measurement of percent organic matter, cation exchange capacity, pH, nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, and copper. Each producer must conduct an assessment of soil quality at least once every three years.

(2) Pest management - The organic plan must contain provisions that include an integrated approach to pest management that stresses biointensive pest control and limits the use of botanical insecticides and copper compounds.

The principles of biointensive pest control are:

(a) Building prevention into pest management systems to lessen need for treatments.

(b) Identify and enhance the ability of beneficial organisms to directly control pest populations, compete with them for habitat, food and water, or repel them.

(c) Alter the pests' ability to reproduce or progress through its normal life cycle.

(d) Strengthen plant or tree defense mechanisms, and ability to overcome stress caused by pests and other environmental factors, through good cultural practices.

The department shall require producers to complete an organic plan and the plans shall be updated annually. The department shall restrict producers from selling, offering for sale or representing food products as organic and/or transition to organic food products when an organic plan is not implemented.

All materials must be applied with awareness and care for the environment and in compliance with all state and federal laws.

(a) Antibiotics: Naturally derived antibiotics including streptomycin and terramycin are permitted for disease control. May not contain EPA List 1 or 2 Inert Ingredients.

(b) Bordeaux mixes: Use with caution. Excessive use (~~((of bordeaux))~~) may cause buildup of copper in the soil (~~((and limit its continued use))~~). May not contain EPA List 1 or 2 Inert Ingredients.

(c) Calcium hydroxide (hydrated lime). Foliar application only. Must not be used as a liming material. Must not contain EPA List 1 or 2 Inert Ingredients.

(d) Compost tea. The materials (feedstocks) used to produce compost tea must consist of approved materials. Approved feedstocks include materials approved under WAC 16-154-070(1) and any uncontaminated natural materials including animal manure, food processing waste and crop residue. Prohibited feedstocks include materials prohibited under WAC 16-154-070(2), mixed municipal solid waste,

sewage sludge, biosolids, waxed cardboard, glossy paper, and gypsum by-product.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 16-154-180 Mushroom standards.** Green plants create tissue from sunlight, carbon dioxide and the soil in which they are grown. In contrast, fungi produce tissue directly and exclusively from the medium on which they are grown since they do not have the ability to manufacture food through photosynthesis. The organic requirements for the growth media for the products of fungi should reflect their complete reliance on their growth media for sustenance.

(1) **Materials and production methods.**

(a) Agar medium: The agar medium does not have to contain certified organic ingredients and can contain antibiotics (see "antibiotics" below in (c) of this subsection).

(b) Growing medium amendments: **All amendments must be certified organic.**

(c) Antibiotics: The agar medium may contain antibiotics not to exceed 1/25th of a gram per liter of agar mix.

(d) Chlorine compounds include calcium hypochlorite, sodium hypochlorite and chlorine dioxide. Chlorine compounds are allowed to sanitize mushroom and growing medium contact surfaces. Chlorine compounds must not be applied to mushrooms or growing medium.

(e) Growing medium: If grain, straw or hay is used, it must be certified organic. If wood is used, see (h) of this subsection.

(f) Hay or straw: Must be certified organic.

(g) Spawn: Grain used for making spawn must be certified organic and must not have any synthetic amendments.

(h) Wood used as a growing medium must be obtained from a source that has had no prohibited materials applied to the trees for at least three years before harvest. Logs and sawdust treated with prohibited materials during the milling process are prohibited for use in organic mushroom production.

(i) Any pest control materials used in the organic production areas or storage areas must be approved for use in organic food production under this chapter. Outside production areas cannot have any prohibited materials applied to the land on which logs, wood chips or other such approved growing medium will lie, for at least three years.

(2) **Mixed operations** - Organic and nonorganic production may exist in the same indoor growing area if:

(a) The organic and nonorganic products are clearly identified at all stages of the growth cycle on all containers or areas that contain spawn, growing medium, substrate or fungi.

(b) No prohibited materials are applied to the organic or nonorganic fungi, spawn or growing medium.

Organic and nonorganic production must be in separate facilities and have separate ventilation systems if prohibited materials are applied to the fungi, spawn or growing medium during any stage of the growth cycle.

(3) **Growth cycle** - For a mushroom product to be sold as certified organic, the operation must comply with these mushroom standards throughout the entire growing cycle of the fungus.

WAC 458-20-135 addresses the taxability of natural resources that are sold severed or in place.

WAC 458-20-213, rule 213 explains that persons operating oil company bulk stations under commission agency arrangements are subject to the B&O tax at the service rate. The rule also explains that such persons billing in their own names are taxable as sellers and are making retail or wholesale sales. This rule provides limited and incomplete tax-reporting information. RCW 82.04.360 Exemptions—Employees—Independent contractors—Booth renters, 458-20-105 Employees distinguished from persons engaging in business, and 458-20-159 Consignees, bailees, factors, agents and auctioneers, provide more useful information.

WAC 458-20-237, this rule identifies some local sales/use taxes imposed by local governments, explains how to obtain a sales tax schedule from the department, and provides the addresses of the department's local district offices. The information in this rule is either incomplete (e.g. identification of the statutory local sales taxes), incorrect (e.g., many of the district office addresses), or provided in other documents published by the department (e.g., the local sales tax flier mailed with the excise tax returns).

RCW 82.04.260 provides sufficient information regarding this tax rate.

The rules recognize that credit unions may enter into prudent commercial arrangements with third parties in order for the third party to directly or indirectly offer products and services to the credit union's members. The rules also place the burden on credit union boards and management to evaluate and manage the risk involved, through policies, and through devices such as insurance and indemnification.

WAC 208-440-010 ~~((Credit union financial interest in commercial enterprise.))~~ Commercial arrangements with third parties. ~~((No credit union shall have any direct financial interest in a commercial enterprise by way of stock or other ownership interest in a commercial corporation, by way of partnership interest or participation in a joint venture in a general business enterprise or by way of exchanging money or services for a share of the proceeds of any commercial business enterprise except as provided below:~~

(1) ~~Any credit union may make loans to commercial enterprises and investments in commercial enterprises to the extent permitted by statute;~~

(2) ~~Any credit union may engage in the business of renting, leasing or subleasing portions of the land and building(s), in which the credit union carries on its business, to the extent that such land and buildings are not needed for credit union operations;~~

~~((3) The director may upon written application grant permission to a credit union to participate in a business enterprise not otherwise authorized by law or by this section, where the director is satisfied that the business enterprise is appropriate and adjunct to ordinary credit union operations and would not be contrary to law.))~~ (1) Credit unions may enter into arrangements with third parties in order for the third party or credit union to offer the third party's products and services to the credit union's members. These arrangements are referred to in this rule as commercial arrangements.

In connection with commercial arrangements, credit unions may:

(a) Allow third parties to offer products and services to members through the credit union;

(b) Endorse, directly or indirectly, products and services of a third party;

(c) Enter into group purchasing arrangements with third parties;

(d) Receive payment from third parties for participation in commercial arrangements; and

(e) Rent, lease or sublease portions of their land and buildings to third parties to offer products and services to members.

This list is not intended to be exhaustive.

As used in this rule, the term "third party" includes, but is not limited to, credit union service organizations.

(2) Before entering into any commercial arrangements, a credit union's board must adopt a written policy regarding such arrangements. At a minimum, the policy should provide for the:

(a) Evaluation of potential risk of liability; and

(b) Approval of each arrangement, whether by the board or management pursuant to established guidelines.

(3) Before entering into or renewing each commercial arrangement, a credit union must:

(a) Ensure that the arrangement is a prudent one and that it does not present safety and soundness risks to the credit union;

(b) Evaluate the potential risk of liability and ensure that the credit union takes appropriate precautions to reduce or offset such risk, including, but not limited to, the use of such devices as disclaimers/disclosures to members and bond or insurance coverage; and

(c) Ensure that the contract evidencing the arrangement includes provision for indemnification of the credit union by the third party.

(4) Credit unions must comply with applicable laws in entering into and carrying out commercial arrangements, including, but not limited to, any applicable federal or state law on privacy of member information.

(5) This section does not apply to situations where a credit union provides its own products or services to members.

the date of payment and the projected date of retirement. Generally, the longer the gap between date of payment and date of retirement the lower the factor.

(3) "Factor 2" is the actuarial factor calculated by the state actuary based upon demographic differences between the membership of the different retirement systems. Those factors are: .00788 (PERS ((F)) 1); .00698 (TRS ((F)) 1); and .00908 (WSPRS).

(4) "Factor 3" means the interest factor calculated by the state actuary and adopted by the department. This factor is used only when the service credit purchase lowers the projected retirement age and is based upon the higher cost to the system of the earlier retirement.

(5) "LEOFF" means the law enforcement officers' and fire fighters' retirement system established under chapter 41.26 RCW.

(6) "PERS" means the public employees' retirement system established under chapter 41.40 RCW.

(7) "Plan ((F)) 1" means the retirement system plan that includes persons who established membership before October 1, 1977. PERS(~~(-TRS)~~) and LEOFF are divided into Plan ((F)) 1 and Plan ((H)) 2. TRS is divided into Plan 1, Plan 2 and Plan 3. WSPRS has only one plan.

(8) "Plan ((H)) 2" means the retirement system plan that includes persons who established membership on or after October 1, 1977. PERS(~~(-TRS)~~) and LEOFF are divided into Plan ((F)) 1 and Plan ((H)) 2. TRS is divided into Plan 1, Plan 2 and Plan 3. SERS is divided into Plan 2 and Plan 3. WSPRS has only one plan.

(9) "Plan ((H)) 3" means the teachers' retirement system Plan ((H)) 3 established by RCW 41.32.831 and the school employees' retirement system Plan 3 established by RCW 41.35.600.

(10) "Service credit being purchased" means the number of service credit months or service credit years you are purchasing.

(11) "TRS" means the teachers' retirement system established under chapters 41.32 and 41.34 RCW.

(12) "WSPRS" means the Washington state patrol retirement system established under chapter 43.43 RCW.

(13) "Years of earlier retirement" equals the number of years or fractions of years you will be able to retire earlier as a result of your purchase of service credit.

(14) "Years of service" equals the total anticipated years of service you will have accrued at retirement, including the additional service credit you purchase under this section.

(15) "SERS" means the school employees' retirement system established under chapters 41.34 and 41.35 RCW.

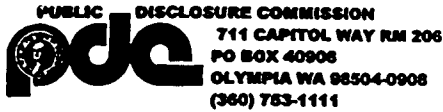

**WAC 390-18-010 Political advertising—Identification of sponsor.** (1) For the purposes of RCW 42.17.510 and this rule, "sponsor" means the candidate, political committee or other person paying for the advertising. If a person acts as an agent for another or is reimbursed by another for the payment, the original source of the payment is the sponsor.

(2) With advertising for which no payment is demanded or for which a cost is not readily ascertainable, the sponsor is the candidate, political committee or person who solicits or arranges for the advertising to be displayed or broadcast.

(3) If more than one person sponsors specific advertising, the identity of each sponsor must be shown. However, if a person contributes in cash or in-kind to a candidate or political committee to assist in paying the cost of advertising, it is unnecessary to include that contributor's name as a sponsor provided the contribution is reported in accordance with applicable provisions of chapter 42.17 RCW.

(4) Printed advertising shall clearly state (~~in a printed or drawn box~~), set apart from any other printed matter, that it has been paid for by the sponsor (Example: (1) Paid for by the XYZ Committee, mailing address, city, state, zip code; (2) Vote for John Doe, paid for by John Doe, mailing address, city, state, zip code). Broadcast advertising shall conform to the requirements of the Federal Communications Commission.

(5)(a) Political advertising consisting of more than one page but intended to be presented as a single item (i.e. 3-page letter with return envelope) must identify the sponsor on (~~each page~~) the first page or fold of the advertising. Identification on an enclosed return envelope or the envelope in which the advertising is sent is not sufficient.

(b) Political advertising which is a collection of several items relating to more than one candidate or committee and distributed simultaneously must show the respective sponsor on the respective items.

**WAC 390-16-226 Loans.** (1) Only loans which are recorded in a written loan agreement executed at the time of the loan and properly reported may be repaid by a candidate or political committee. Surplus campaign funds under RCW 42.17.020 and 42.17.095 may only be used to return a contribution to the candidate if the contribution was properly reported as a loan from the candidate, as described in subsections (2) and (3).

(2) If any person gives or loans the candidate funds in connection with his or her campaign, the funds are not considered personal funds of the candidate. See WAC 390-17-305. Such funds are considered a contribution from the original source of the contribution under chapter 42.17 RCW and, unless the loan meets the exemption provided in RCW 42.17.720(3) and this subsection, the contribution is subject to the contribution limits provided in chapter 42.17 RCW.

(a) If a candidate or candidate's own political committee or campaign or authorized committee receives a loan from a commercial lending institution, the loan is exempt from the contribution limits of RCW 42.17.640 and WAC 390-16-310 only if all the following criteria are met:

(i) the loan is not guaranteed by any other person;

(ii) the loan is made in the regular course of business; and.

(iii) the loan is made on the same terms ordinarily available to the public.

(b) A commercial loan to a candidate's own committee or campaign or authorized committee is presumed to be guaranteed by the candidate. The presumption is rebuttable by clear, cogent and convincing evidence.

(3) The amount of campaign contributions which may be used to repay a loan made by the candidate to the candidate's own political committee or campaign, or to repay a commercial loan to a candidate's own political committee or campaign where the candidate is the borrower or guarantor, is limited to the loan repayment limit in RCW 42.17.125(3) as adjusted by WAC 390-05-400. For purposes of the ((~~\$3,000~~)) loan repayment limit ((~~imposed by RCW 42.17.125(3)~~)), these loans ((by a candidate)) are aggregated for each primary, general, special or recall election and must be designated accordingly by the candidate at the time the loan is made.

(4) If a candidate makes documented out-of-pocket campaign expenditures on behalf of his or her campaign expecting repayment (not intending to make an in-kind contribution), the campaign committee must repay the candidate within 21 days of the expenditure or the candidate will be deemed to have made a loan to his or her campaign committee which must qualify for repayment under subsections (1) and (2) in order for the candidate to be repaid. Undocumented out-of-pocket campaign expenditures by the candidate are in-kind contributions not eligible for repayment.

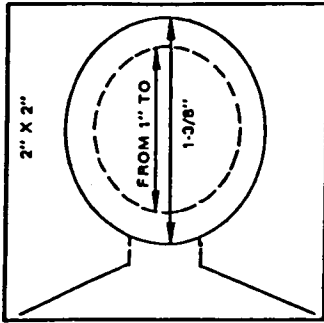

**WAC 388-436-0002** If my family has an emergency, can I get help from DSHS (~~((provides a cash benefit called additional requirements for emergent needs (AREN) to help families pay for short term expenses caused by an emergency.))~~) to get or keep our housing or utilities? DSHS has a program called additional requirements for emergent needs (AREN). If your family has an emergency and you need a one-time cash payment to get or keep safe housing or utilities, you may be eligible. The special AREN payment is in addition to the regular monthly cash grant your family may already get.

(1) (~~Who can receive additional requirements for emergent needs (AREN) benefits?~~)

~~A family may request AREN benefits if they have applied for or already get cash assistance from the temporary~~

PERMANENT



assistance for needy families (TANF), state family assistance (SFA) or refugee cash assistance (RCA) program. The family must meet the eligibility conditions for TANF, SFA or RCA to receive AREN benefits:

**(2) Will AREN change the amount of our assistance?**

When the department approves AREN benefits, the amount used to figure how much assistance the family can receive is increased for one month. This is called an 'increased payment standard.' The department uses the increased standard to:

- (a) Determine initial eligibility and calculate the payment amount for families who are new applicants; or
- (b) Calculate the monthly payment amount for families already receiving assistance.

**(3) What kinds of things are considered AREN emergencies?**

(a) The family experienced a disaster such as a theft, house fire, flood, severe weather, accident or medical emergency;

(b) The family has extra short term expenses caused by homelessness, domestic violence, or situations that jeopardize the family's health and safety.

(c) The family's funds were used to pay for necessary expenses such as:

- (i) Basic health and safety needs for shelter, food and clothing;
- (ii) Medical care;
- (iii) Dental care need to obtain employment or because of pain;
- (iv) Emergency child care;
- (v) Other reasonable and necessary expenses.

(d) The family's cash grant has been reduced or terminated in anticipation of income that will not be available to pay for the need when the payment is due.

**(4) Do I need to provide proof that I have an emergency?**

Families must show proof that there is a good reason they do not have sufficient funds to meet their short term need. The proof must show:

- (a) Why funds are insufficient to pay for the need; and
- (b) The amount of money necessary to meet the need; and
- (c) How the family will pay for the need in the future; and
- (d) The expense is for a need listed in subsection (5) of this rule.

**(5) What kind of expenses does the AREN benefit cover?**

The department may approve AREN benefits to pay for the following kinds of expenses:

(a) Rent, security deposits, mortgage payments, taxes or fees:

(i) To prevent an eviction or foreclosure from causing the loss of housing that the family will be able to afford in the future.

(ii) To obtain housing subsidies or permanent housing the family will be able to afford in the future when:

- (A) Eviction or foreclosure is not preventable.

~~(B) The family has no housing or has only temporary housing;~~

~~(C) The current housing puts the family's health or safety in danger due to a condition the property owner is unable or unwilling to fix;~~

~~(D) Moving is necessary to escape a domestic violence situation;~~

~~(b) Repairs, deposits, fees and services to assure the household has electricity, water, sewer or fuel for heating and cooking;~~

~~(c) Bedding, clothing, cooking utensils, and personal hygiene items when the family has lost these items due to a disaster, domestic violence, or homelessness;~~

~~(d) Food when the family has no other way to get food;~~

~~(e) Other goods and services necessary to protect the health and safety of the family.~~

**(6) Are there any limits on the amount of AREN benefits I can get?**

(a) When AREN benefits are approved, the department pays the least amount necessary to get the family through the emergency. Funds from other sources affect the amount of AREN the department pays. A representative from the department will work with your family to figure out the amount.

(b) There is no limit on how frequently a family may request or receive AREN benefits. The department makes the eligibility decision based on whether or not there is a reasonable cause for the emergent need and the lack of funds available to the family.

**(7) How does the department pay the AREN benefit?**

(a) The department pays the approved AREN benefit as part of the family's TANF, SFA or RCA cash grant using the income rules found in chapter 388-450 WAC.

(b) When possible, the department pays AREN benefits directly to a third party under the provisions in WAC 388-460-0001.) To get AREN, you must:

(a) Be eligible for temporary assistance for needy families (TANF), state family assistance (SFA), or refugee cash assistance (RCA);

(b) Have an emergency housing or utility need; and

(c) Have a good reason that you do not have enough money to pay your housing or utility costs.

(2) To get AREN, you must be eligible for TANF, SFA, or RCA. This means you must:

(a) Get benefits through TANF, SFA, or RCA. For RCA you must also be pregnant or have an eligible child; or

(b) Apply for TANF, SFA, and RCA, and meet all eligibility criteria including:

(i) The maximum earned income limit under WAC 388-478-0035;

(ii) The requirement that your unearned income not exceed the grant payment standard;

(iii) The requirement that your countable income as defined under WAC 388-450-0162 must be below the payment standard in WAC 388-478-0020 when you have both earned income and unearned income;

(iv) The resource limits under chapter 388-470 WAC;

(v) The program summary rules for either TANF (WAC 388-400-0005); SFA (WAC 388-400-0010); or RCA (WAC 388-400-0030); and

(vi) The requirement that you must be pregnant or have an eligible child.

(3) If you do not get or do not want to get TANF, SFA or RCA, you cannot get AREN to help with one-time housing or utility costs. We will look to see if you are eligible for diversion cash assistance (DCA) under WAC 388-432-0005.

(4) To get AREN, you must have an emergency housing or utility need. You may get AREN to help pay to:

(a) Prevent eviction or foreclosure;

(b) Get housing if you are homeless or need to leave your home because of domestic violence;

(c) Hook up or prevent a shut off of utilities related to your health and safety. We consider the following utilities to be needed for health and safety:

(i) Electricity or fuel for heating, lighting, or cooking;

(ii) Water;

(iii) Sewer; and

(iv) Basic local telephone service if it is necessary for your basic health and safety.

(d) Repair damage or defect to your home when it causes a risk to your health or safety:

(i) If you own the home, we may approve AREN for the least expensive method of ending the risk to your health or safety;

(ii) If you do not own the home, you must ask the landlord in writing to fix the damage according to the Residential Landlord-Tenant Act at chapter 59.18 RCW. If the landlord refuses to fix the damage or defect, we may pay for the repair or pay to move you to a different place whichever cost is lower.

(e) If you receive TANF or SFA, WorkFirst support services under WAC 388-310-0800 may be used to help you relocate to new housing to get a job, keep a job, or participate in WorkFirst activities. Nonhousing expenses, that are not covered under AREN, may be paid under WorkFirst support services. This includes expenses such as car repair, diapers, or clothing.

(5) To get AREN, you must have a good reason for not having enough money to pay for your housing or utility costs. You must prove that you:

(a) Did not have money available that you normally use to pay your rent and utilities due to an emergency situation that reduced your income (such as a long-term illness or injury);

(b) Had to use your money to pay for necessary or emergency expenses. Examples of necessary or emergency expenses include:

(i) Basic health and safety needs for shelter, food and clothing;

(ii) Medical care;

(iii) Dental care needed to get a job or because of pain;

(iv) Emergency child care;

(v) Emergency expenses due to a natural disaster, accident, or injury; and

(vi) Other reasonable and necessary expenses.

(c) Are currently homeless; or

(d) Had your family's cash grant reduced or suspended when we budgeted your expected income for the month, but the income will not be available to pay for the need when the payment is due. You must make attempts to negotiate later payments with your landlord or utility company before you can get AREN.

(6) In addition to having a good reason for not having enough money to pay for your costs, you must also explain how you will afford to pay for the on-going need in the future. We may deny AREN if your expenses exceed your income (if you are living beyond your means). We may approve AREN to help you get into housing you can afford.

(7) If you meet the above requirements, we decide the amount we will pay based on the following criteria.

(a) AREN payments may be made up to a maximum of fifteen hundred dollars.

(b) We can make the payment all at once or as separate payments over a thirty-day period. The thirty-day period starts with the date of the first payment.

(c) The amount of AREN is in addition to the amount of your monthly TANF, SFA, or RCA cash grant.

(d) We will decide the lowest amount we must pay to end your housing or utility emergency. We will contact your landlord, utility company, or other vendor for information to make this decision. We may take any of the following steps when deciding the lowest amount to pay:

(i) We may ask you to arrange a payment plan with your landlord or utility company. This could include us making a partial payment, and you setting up a plan for you to repay the remaining amount you owe over a period of time.

(ii) We may have you use some of the money you have available in cash, checking, or savings to help pay for the expense. We will look at the money you have available as well as your bills when we decide how much we will pay.

(iii) We may consider income that is excluded or disregarded for cash assistance benefit calculations, such as SSI, as available to meet your emergency housing need.

(iv) We may consider money other individuals such as family or friends voluntarily give you. We will not count loans of money that you must repay to friends or family members.

(v) We may consider money from a nonneedy caretaker relative that lives in the home.

(vi) We may look at what other community resources you currently have to help you with your need.

(8) Starting August 1, 2000, your family can get AREN for your emergency housing or utility needs for one thirty-day period every twelve months:

(a) The thirty-day period starts on the date we issue your first AREN payment and lasts thirty consecutive days.

(b) The twelve-month period starts the month we issued your first AREN payment. The next time you could be eligible for AREN is the first day of the twelfth month after we issued the first AREN payment. For example, if we issued you AREN on January 15th, you could be eligible again on the first of January the next year.

(c) The limit of one thirty-day period every twelve months applies to the following people even if they leave the assistance unit:

(i) Adults; and

(ii) Minor parents that get AREN when no adults are in the assistance unit.

(d) We do not look at AREN benefits you received before August 1, 2000 when we look to see if you received AREN in the last twelve months.

(9) We pay AREN:

(a) Directly to the landlord, mortgage company, utility, or other vendor whenever we can.

(b) If we cannot pay AREN directly to the landlord or other vendor, we will issue the AREN as a part of your TANF, SFA, or RCA cash grant. If we issue the AREN as a part of your grant, you must use it for your emergency need.

(10) We may assign you a protective payee for your monthly grant under WAC 388-265-1250.

**WAC 308-93-241 Confidential and undercover vessel registration—Application procedures.** (1) ((A government agency requesting confidential vessel registration shall:

(a) Write to the department on their letterhead requesting one or more vessels be included in the confidential vessel program;

(b) Complete an application form approved by the department;

(c) Provide a copy of the current certificate of ownership or registration certificate showing the vessel is registered to the government agency.

(2) The letter of request and application shall be signed by the government agency head or designated contact person.)) **What are confidential and undercover vessel registrations as referred to in RCW 88.02.035?** Confidential and undercover registrations are nonexempt registrations assigned to vessels owned by government agencies identified in RCW 88.02.035.

**(2) What are my registration options under RCW 88.02.035?** You may choose to register government owned or operated vessels in the confidential/undercover registration program in one of the following ways:

(a) Selecting the confidential vessel registration option shows the government agency's name and address on the registration certificates and other department records subject to public disclosure; or

(b) Selecting the undercover vessel registration option shows a fictitious name and address on the registration certifi-

icates and other department records subject to public disclosure.

**(3) Is a government agency responsible for ensuring safeguards to select a fictitious name and address for undercover vessel registrations?** Government agency's must certify on the application that precautions (i.e., checking phone book, Internet, etc.) have been taken to ensure that the use of citizens' names and legitimate licensed Washington businesses have not been used.

**(4) How does a government agency apply for confidential or undercover vessel registration?** A government agency requesting confidential/undercover vessel registration must provide to the department of licensing:

(a) A completed application form approved by the department and signed by the government agency head or designated contact person. The agency must indicate on the application form which type of registration is needed;

(b) A copy of the current certificate of ownership, registration certificate or other documents approved by the department showing the vessel is owned or operated by the government agency.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending WSR 98-16-001, filed 7/22/98, effective 8/22/98)

**WAC 308-93-242 Confidential/undercover vessel program—Agency contact.** (1) ((A government agency head or designee may apply for confidential vessel registrations or sign correspondence pertaining to confidential vessel registrations.

(2) The government agency head may designate a maximum of two agency employees to represent the agency regarding confidential vessel registrations. The government agency head shall provide the name, title, address, and telephone number of each designee.

(3) A government agency head or designee shall notify the department in writing within five days of any change in the agency head or designee.)) **Who may represent a government agency regarding confidential or undercover registration?** The government agency head must designate two employees to represent the agency regarding confidential/undercover registration. The name, signature, title, address, telephone number, and if applicable, fax number and e-mail address of each designee must be provided.

**(2) How often does the government agency contact information need to be updated?** The government agency contact information must be updated, in writing, annually or within thirty days of any change in the agency head or designee. The government agency is responsible for initiating the update when a change occurs.

**WAC 308-93-243 Confidential or undercover vessel registrations—((Inventory)) Annual list.** (1) ((The department shall provide an inventory listing of vessels to each agency participating in the confidential vessel registration

program. Each government agency shall verify the accuracy of the information by:

- (a) Correcting any erroneous information;
- (b) Delete vessels no longer in the program;
- (c) Adding vessels in the program, but not shown on the inventory listing;
- (d) Signing the inventory listing certifying that all confidential vessel registrations shown on the listing are being utilized under RCW 88.02.035(3); and
- (e) Returning the inventory listing to the department.

(2) The department shall not renew a vessel shown on the inventory listing until the government agency has complied with the requirements of subsection (1) of this section.)

**How does the department maintain the annual list of vessels with confidential or undercover registrations?**

(a) The department provides the annual list of vessels to each government agency participating in the confidential/undercover registration program to verify the accuracy of the information by:

- (i) Correcting any incorrect information;
- (ii) Deleting vessels no longer in the program by clearly indicating which vessels need to be deleted;
- (iii) Adding vessels to the list by submitting the original application (or a copy if already submitted);
- (iv) Signing and returning the list by the date requested to verify compliance with RCW 88.02.035(3).

(b) The department updates the annual list of vessels based on information submitted by the government agencies.

(2) **What action does the department take if annual lists are not returned?** The department may refuse to renew a vessel shown on the annual list until the government agency has complied with the requirements of subsection (1) of this section.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending WSR 98-16-001, filed 7/22/98, effective 8/22/98)

**WAC 308-93-244 Confidential or undercover vessel registrations—((Refusal and removal)) Cancellation.** (1) ((The department may cancel or refuse to issue or renew a confidential vessel registration when the department or chief of the Washington state patrol has reasonable cause to believe the registration is not being used for purposes authorized in RCW 88.02.035.

(2) When a government agency no longer requires a confidential vessel registration or the registration is cancelled:

(a) The government agency shall remove and destroy the validation decal and return the confidential vessel registration to the department; and

(b) The department shall delete the confidential vessel registration record from the confidential vessel program.)

**Who may cancel confidential or undercover vessel registrations?**

The department may cancel or refuse to renew confidential or undercover registrations when the department has reasonable cause to believe the registrations are being used for purposes other than those authorized in RCW 88.02.035. A government agency may request cancellation of their confi-

dential or undercover registrations when the vessel is no longer used for this purpose.

**(2) How are confidential or undercover registrations canceled?** Confidential or undercover registrations are canceled when the government agency notifies the department in writing via mail, fax, or e-mail that they are no longer required, and indicate whether the registrations:

- (a) Are being returned to the department; or
- (b) Have been destroyed.

The department will then delete the confidential or undercover registration record from the program and from other department records.

**(3) Can the vessel decal issued by the department to the confidential or undercover vessel remain on the vessel when it is removed from the program?** No. The decal must be removed from the vessel and returned to the department or destroyed by the agency.

Chapter 16-623 WAC

COMMISSION MERCHANT ACT—LICENSING FEES, PROOF OF PAYMENT, CARGO MANIFESTS AND REGISTRATION OF ACREAGE COMMITMENTS

NEW SECTION

WAC 16-623-001 Purpose. The department of agriculture has written this chapter to implement or clarify selected portions of chapter 20.01 RCW. This administrative rule addresses four topics.

- (1) Licensing fees for commission merchants, dealers, brokers, cash buyers or agents.
(2) Recordkeeping and proof of payment requirements for licensees.
(3) Manifests of cargo and shipping documents that accompany hay and straw during transportation.
(4) Rules governing the registration of acreage commitments made by processors to producers of annual crops.

NEW SECTION

WAC 16-623-010 License fees, expirations, renewals and late renewal penalties. (1) The license fee to act as a commission merchant, dealer, broker, cash buyer, or agent is:

Table with 2 columns: LICENSE CLASS and FEE. Rows include Commission merchant (\$357), Dealer (\$357), Limited dealer (\$198), Broker (\$249), Cash buyer (\$ 79), Agent (\$ 28), and Additional licenses (see subsection (2) of this section) (\$ 25).

- (2) A licensee can be licensed in more than one class for an additional fee of twenty-five dollars per class. The principal license must be in the class requiring the greatest fee and all requirements must be met for each class in which a license is being requested.
(3) All licenses expire December 31st of each year.
(4) License renewals must be renewed before January 1st of each year.

(5) Licenses not renewed by January 1st will be assessed a penalty of twenty-five percent of the total fees. Fees and penalties must be paid before the licenses will be issued.

NEW SECTION

WAC 16-623-020 Recordkeeping and proof of payment. (1) Every commission merchant, dealer, and cash buyer taking possession of or purchasing agricultural products must make and keep for three years accurate records showing the following:

- (a) The name and address of the consignor.
(b) The date received.
(c) The quality and quantity delivered by the consignor and where applicable the dockage, tare, grade, size, net weight or quantity.
(d) An itemized statement of the charges to be paid by the consignor, dealer or cash buyer to be paid by the consignor in connection with the sale.
(e) These records must be made available to the director and the consignor or their authorized representatives.
(2) In addition to subsection (1) of this section, the commission merchant's records must include:
(a) An accounting of all sales, including dates, terms of sales, quality and quantity of agricultural products sold and proof of payments received on behalf of the consignor.
(b) The terms of payment to the producer.
(c) The names and addresses of all purchasers if the commission merchant has any financial interest in the business of the purchaser or if the purchaser has any financial interest in the business of the commission merchant. The business interest may be direct or indirect such as holders of the other's corporate stock, as a copartner or as a lender or borrower of money. The interest must be noted in the records following the name of the purchaser.
(d) A lot number or identifying mark for each consignment which will appear on all sales tags and other records showing the price for which the agricultural products actually sold.

(e) If there is a pooling arrangement, the consignor must have agreed in writing to the pooling arrangement before the commission merchant may handle the agricultural product.
(f) In cases where a pooling arrangement is in place, the requirements of subsections (1)(c) and (d) and (2)(b) and (d) of this section apply.

(g) Keep and make available to the director or consignor or their representative claims filed by the commission merchant against any person for overcharges or damages resulting from the injury or deterioration of agricultural products.

- (3) In addition to subsection (1) of this section, dealers and cash buyers must include:
(a) Terms of the sale.
(b) Name and address of the purchaser. The name and address of the purchaser may be deleted from the record furnished to the consignor.
(4) Commission merchants will furnish consignors with proof of payment. Proof of payment will be a listing of payments received by the commission merchant on behalf of any consignor whether through an individual accounting or pool arrangement.

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 16-623-030 Manifest of cargo for hay and straw—Forms and exceptions.** (1) Commission merchants, dealers, their employees or licensed agents transporting hay or straw on equipment owned or under their control must have a copy of the manifest of cargo with each load.

(2) The manifest must be on a form prescribed by the director. The form is available from the department. Exceptions to the manifest form are outlined in subsections (3) and (4) of this section. The form, as a minimum, will state the following:

- (a) Purchaser's name and address.
- (b) Hauler's name and address.
- (c) Business or person the products were received from and their address.
- (d) The commodity, unit count, unit price, total price, total weight, tare weight and weight of the commodity.
- (e) Terms of the settlement.
- (f) Date.

(3) Any common carrier transporting hay or straw for a commission merchant or dealer may use shipping documents required by the Washington public utilities and transportation commission, or interstate commerce commission.

(4) Any common carriers, commission merchants, dealers, their employees or licensed agents transporting hay or straw may use other shipping documents that have been reviewed and authorized by the department of agriculture. The alternate shipping documents must be authorized by the department prior to their use.

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 16-623-040 Processor plant capacity reporting.** When reporting plant capacity as provided for under RCW 20.01.510, a processor must report the daily total capacity in tons, cases or other legal and customary measure for each crop for all plants that process any Washington agricultural product. The report must include the name, site address, business address and name of the person(s) who may receive legal service for each processing plant reported.

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 16-623-050 Grower notification of commitments by processor(s).** (1) Any grower may notify the director that he has an oral commitment with a processor for a specified amount of product within ten days after the commitment was made. The notification will be in writing and sent by certified mail.

(2) When the director receives the notification, he shall notify the processor within five days by certified mail.

(3) The processor will simultaneously notify the director and the grower within ten days by certified mail of receipt of the director's notice whether or not he confirms the notice.

(4) The processor may accept all, none, or any portion of the acreage and/or tonnage stated.

(5) Once the oral commitment is confirmed for all or for a portion of the acreage and/or tonnage, the processor is committed to receive the acreage or tonnage specified. If the con-

tract is that processor's standard contract and the terms of the contract, price or other conditions later offered to the grower are unacceptable to the grower, then the agreement is not binding upon the processor.

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 16-623-060 Basis for establishing contract volume.** In contracts for the purchase of the production of a specific number of acres, the amount contracted for will be based on the crop yield for the comparable area for the most recent five-year average. The crop yield will be determined by using data from the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service.

**Chapter 16-663 WAC**

**SERVICE AGENTS—REPORTING, TEST PROCEDURES ((AND)), STANDARDS ((BY PERSONS SERVING AND CALIBRATING)) AND CALIBRATION OF WEIGHING AND MEASURING DEVICES**

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 16-663-100 Purpose.** The following regulation addresses the mandatory registration, rights and responsibilities of service agents involved in installing, servicing and calibrating weighing and measuring devices. The rule addresses reporting devices placed in service, test procedures, reporting forms and submission of test standards by persons servicing and calibrating weighing and measuring devices.

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 16-663-110 Definitions.** (1) Installation - setting up for use, connecting or adjusting any new, used or remanufactured commercial weighing or measuring device being placed into service.

(2) Placed in service - to cause or permit the commercial usage of any commercial weighing or measuring device.

(3) Returned to service - the instance where servicepersons or service agencies are called upon to service, repair, or recondition a commercial weighing or measuring device that has been "rejected," ordered "out of service," or "condemned" by weights and measures officials with the intent of placing such a device back into service.

(4) Registered serviceperson - any individual who for hire, award, commission, or any other payment of any kind, installs, services, repairs, or reconditions a commercial weighing or measuring device, and who registers himself as such with the director.

(5) Registered service agent - any agent, firm, partnership, company, or corporation, which, for hire, award, commission, or any other payment of any kind, installs, services, repairs, or reconditions a commercial weighing or measuring device, and which registers with the director.

(6) Commercial weighing and measuring device - any weight or measure or weighing or measuring device commercially used or employed in establishing the size, quantity, extent, area, or measurement of quantities, things, produce, or articles for distribution or consumption, purchased, offered or submitted for sale, hire, or award, or in computing any basic

charge or payment for services rendered on the basis of weight, measure or count. It shall include any accessory attached to or used in connection with a commercial weighing or measuring device when the accessory is designed or installed so that its operation affects, or may affect, the accuracy, correctness, or indication of the device.

(7) Reciprocity - the mutual cooperative interchange of rights and agreements between any other state or states that have similar rules and laws concerning registered service agents and recognition of standards.

(8) Laboratory - the metrology laboratory of any state, agency, or any recognized private industry metrology laboratory as determined by the director. All such laboratories must possess current appropriate National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) certifications.

(9) Accuracy - commercial weighing or measuring devices are considered accurate when the performance or value - that is, its indications, its deliveries, its recorded representations, or its capacity or actual value, etc., as determined by tests made with suitable standards - conforms to the standards, tolerances and other performance requirements set forth in the edition of National Institute of Standards and Technology Handbook 44 currently adopted by the director.

(10) Correct - a weighing or measuring device is considered correct when in addition to being accurate, it meets all applicable specifications and requirements as set forth in the edition of National Institute of Standards and Technology Handbook 44 currently adopted by the director.

(11) Certification - a document provided by the director to service agents registered with the department.

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 16-663-120 Registration, certification and standards.** (1) Service agents and servicepersons who intend to provide service that permits a weighing or measuring device to be placed back into commercial service must register with the department annually. Service agents and servicepersons must register on a form provided by the department annually. The fee for registration is eighty dollars per service person. This registration requirement does not apply to city sealers.

(2) Service agents and servicepersons registering with the department will specifically state the types of devices they will be placing in service. Such a statement is the agent's or person's certification that they are knowledgeable of the requirements of the state and possess proper and certified equipment and standards to perform the services.

(3) The registered service agent or serviceperson shall submit a copy of their tag or label, seal or seal press identification mark to the department at time of registration.

(4) The department will issue an official registration certification for each service agent and serviceperson whose application is approved. Official registration certificates are valid for a period of one year from date of registration.

(5) For requests that are denied the department will provide reasons, in writing, for the denial and refund payment.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 16-663-130 Adequacy of standards and submission of standards for certification.** (1) All service agents and servicepersons shall use standards of adequate quantity and design to place commercial weighing and measuring devices in service.

(2) Submission of standards for inspection. All standards used for servicing, repairing and/or calibrating commercial weighing and measuring devices must be submitted at least every two years for examination and certification. The standards will be submitted to the state's metrology laboratory or a laboratory of any state in which a reciprocity agreement has been entered. The state metrology laboratory examines and certifies standards using the current version of National Institute of Standards and Technology Handbook 105.

(3) Recognition of out-of-state certification any standard that has been inspected and examined by any state or agency in which the director has entered a reciprocity agreement will be considered correct if said examination is within the previous two-year period. Proof of inspection must be submitted to the department with the registration application.

(4) Proof of certification shall be maintained by the owner of the standards and be kept with the standards during normal usage for the purpose of inspection by the director or authorized representative.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 16-663-140 Identification of work—Labels and seals.** (1) Each registered service agent and serviceperson shall identify his/her work on commercially used weighing and measuring devices by:

(a) Applying an adhesive tag or label in a conspicuous location on the device; or

(b) Using a distinctive security seal or seal press impression.

(2) The adhesive tag or label shall legibly show at least the serviceperson registration number, business telephone number and date of service.

(3) Any security seal or seal press used to comply with subsection (1) of this section shall identify the individual registered serviceperson applying the seal.

(4) The registered service agent or serviceperson shall submit a copy of the tag or label, seal or seal press identification mark to the department at time of registration.

(5) The above requirements will be effective May 1, 2001.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 16-663-150 Reports and responsibilities of service agents and servicepersons.** (1) Any person installing a new or used weighing or measuring device that is being put in use for the first time at that location must provide a notice of installation to the department. The notice shall state the date placed in service, type of device, capacity, business' name and site address, and name and address of the service com-

pany installing the device. The report shall also indicate whether the device is new or used.

(2) After correcting a rejected device, registered service agents or servicepersons must return the reject report issued by the weights and measures official to the address indicated on the form within seven days from completion of work. All discrepancies noted on the department's rejection report must be corrected before returning the device to service. The form must be signed and dated by the registered serviceperson returning the device to service. The form must also legibly indicate his/her registration number and show the number or identifying mark of security seals that were removed and applied to affect the correction.

(3) A registered service agent or serviceperson will submit a copy of his/her test report showing the as-found and as-corrected readings with the reject report when putting a rejected device back into service.

(4) Commercially used weighing or measuring devices put into service or returned to service must be correct and meet all applicable specifications and requirements set forth in the edition of National Institute of Standards and Technology Handbook 44 currently adopted by the director. The device must also meet current (NTEP) requirements in effect for the device.

(5) Devices must be installed in accordance with manufacturer's instructions.

(6) A device installed in a fixed location must be installed so that its operation or performance will not be adversely affected by any characteristic of the foundation, supports, or any other detail of the installation.

(7) Equipment must be installed in such a manner that all required markings are readily observable.

(8) A device must be installed so that it will be correct and it meets all performance requirements when associated or nonassociated equipment is operated in its usual and customary manner.

(9) Faulty installation conditions must be corrected, and any defective parts must be renewed or suitably repaired, before adjustments are made.

(10) When equipment is adjusted, the adjustment must be made so that performance errors are as close as practicable to zero value.

(11) Equipment put into service, repaired, adjusted, calibrated or refurbished must be sealed with an appropriate security seal and the seal number recorded on the inspection test report. Any security seal removed prior to servicing the device will be noted on the test report and will include the number or identifying mark of the security seal.

(12) Equipment must be assembled and installed so that it does not facilitate the perpetration of fraud.

NEW SECTION

**WAC 16-663-160 Registration certificate—Revocation, suspension, refusal to renew—Appeal.** (1) The department has the authority to revoke, suspend, or refuse to renew the official registration certificate of any service agent or serviceperson for any of the following reasons:

(a) Fraud or deceit in obtaining an official registration certificate;

(b) A finding by the department of a pattern of intentional fraudulent or negligent activities in the installation, inspection, testing, checking, adjusting, or systematically standardizing and approving the graduations of any weighing or measuring instrument or device;

(c) Knowingly placing back into commercial service any weighing or measuring instrument or device that is incorrect or inaccurate;

(d) A violation of any provision of this chapter; or

(e) Conviction of a crime or an act constituting a crime under the laws of this state, the laws of another state, or federal law.

(2) If the department revokes, suspends, or refuses to renew an official registration certificate, an individual will have the right to appeal the decision in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, chapter 34.05 RCW, and RCW 19.94.2584.

**NEW SECTION**

**WAC 16-663-170 Unlawful practices—Penalties.**

Any person who, by himself or herself, by his or her agent or employee, or as the agent or employee of another person, violates the provisions of this rule is subject to a civil penalty of up to five thousand dollars as specified in RCW 19.94.510.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending WSR 99-22-002, filed 10/20/99, effective 11/20/99)

**WAC 16-228-1010 Definitions.** The definitions set forth in this section shall apply throughout this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:

(1) "Agricultural commodity" means any plant, or part of a plant, or animal, or animal product, produced by a person (including farmers, ranchers, vineyardists, plant propagators, Christmas tree growers, aquaculturists, floriculturists, orchardists, foresters, or other comparable persons) primarily for sale, consumption, propagation, or other use by people or animals.

(2) "Agricultural emergency" means a sudden occurrence or set of circumstances which the agricultural employer could not have anticipated and over which the agricultural

PERMANENT

employer has no control, and which requires entry into a pesticide treated area during a restricted-entry interval, when no alternative practices would prevent or mitigate a substantial economic loss.

(3) "Authorized agent" is any person who is authorized to act on behalf of a certified applicator for the purpose of purchasing pesticides.

(4) "Bait box" for rodenticides is a box constructed of durable metal, wood, plastic, or other treated synthetic material. It shall be designed to hold rodent bait securely, allow rodents to enter and leave, and prevent unauthorized persons and domestic animals from gaining access to the bait. The cover shall be provided with a lock that can be unlocked only by a combination, key, special tool, or forced entry. Fragile materials are unacceptable.

(5) "Bait station" may be any location where baits are placed to allow target pests to gain access to the bait.

(6) "Blossoming plants" means

(a) when there are five or more open blooms per square yard on average in a given field; or

(b) when there are one or more open blooms per tree or vine in an orchard or vineyard; or

(c) when there are five or more open weed blooms per square yard on average for the area being measured for groundcover in orchards or vineyards, fence lines, ditch banks, or field, vineyard or orchard edges: PROVIDED that this definition shall not apply to plants that are not attractive to bees (e.g. lentils, white blossomed peas, second bloom of pears and potatoes and hops). For the purposes of this definition, "bloom" means a flower head, raceme or spike with one or more open flowers.

((6)) (7) "Bulk fertilizer" is a commercial fertilizer, agricultural mineral, or lime, distributed in nonpackaged form.

((7)) (8) "Certified applicator" means any individual who is licensed as a commercial pesticide applicator, commercial pesticide operator, public operator, private-commercial applicator, demonstration and research applicator, or certified private applicator, or any other individual who is certified by the director to use or supervise the use of any pesticide which is classified by the EPA as a restricted use pesticide or by the state as restricted to use by certified applicators only.

(9) "Chemigation" means the application of any substance or combination of substances intended as a pesticide, plant or crop protectant or a system maintenance compound applied with irrigation water.

((8)) (10) A "complainant" is defined as a person who has requested an inspection of an area in which a pesticide violation is believed to have occurred.

((9)) (11) "Complete wood destroying organism inspection" means (a) an inspection of a structure for the purpose of determining (i) evidence of infestation(s), and (ii) damage, and (iii) conducive conditions; or (b) any wood destroying organism inspection which is conducted as the result of a telephone solicitation by an inspection firm or pest control business, even if the inspection would otherwise fall within the definition of a limited wood destroying organism inspection.

((10)) (12) "Conducive conditions" means those conditions which may lead to or enhance an infestation of wood destroying organisms.

((11)) (13) "Controlled disposal site" means any place where solid or liquid waste is disposed: Provided, That the area has been designated as a disposal site for waste materials by the appropriate jurisdictional agency: Provided further, That the site is fenced, barricaded or otherwise enclosed or attended by some person in charge to facilitate control-access of domestic animals, pets, and unauthorized persons.

((12)) (14) "Department" means the Washington state department of agriculture.

((13)) (15) "Diluent" means a material, liquid or solid, serving to dilute the pesticide product to field strength for adequate coverage (such as water).

((14)) (16) "Director" means the director of the department or a duly authorized representative.

((15)) (17) "Dry pesticide" is any granular, pelleted, dust or wettable powder pesticide.

((16)) (18) "EPA" means the United States Environmental Protection Agency.

((17)) (19) "EPA restricted use pesticide" means any pesticide with restricted uses as classified for restricted use by the administrator, EPA.

((18)) (20) "Fertilizer" as included in this order means any liquid or dry mixed fertilizer, fertilizer material, specialty fertilizer, agricultural mineral, or lime.

((19)) (21) "FIFRA" means the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act as amended (61 stat. 163, 7 U.S.C. Sec. 136 et seq.).

((20)) (22) "Floor level" is considered to be the floor upon which people normally walk—not shelves, ledges, overhead beams, tops of stacked materials, surfaces of equipment, or similar places.

((21)) (23) "Food service establishment" means any fixed or mobile restaurant; coffee shop; cafeteria; short order cafe; luncheonette; grill; tearoom; sandwich shop; soda fountain; tavern; bar; cocktail lounge; nightclub; roadside stand; industrial-feeding establishment; retail grocery; retail food market; retail meat market; retail bakery; private, public, or nonprofit organization routinely serving food; catering kitchen; commissary or similar place in which food or drink is prepared for sale or for service on the premises or elsewhere; and any other eating or drinking establishment or operation where food is served or provided for the public with or without charge.

((22)) (24) "Fumigant" means any substance or combination of substances that produce gas, fumes, vapors, or smoke, and is used to kill pests in some kind of enclosure.

((23)) (25) "Highly toxic pesticide" for the purpose of this chapter, means any pesticide that conforms to the criteria in 40 C.F.R. Sec. 156.10 for toxicity Category I due to oral inhalation or dermal toxicity.

((24)) (26) "Landscape application" means an application by a certified applicator of any EPA registered pesticide to any exterior landscape plants found around residential property, commercial properties such as apartments or shopping centers, parks, golf courses, schools including nursery schools and licensed day cares, or cemeteries or similar areas. This definition shall not apply to: (a) Applications made by

certified private applicators; (b) mosquito abatement, gypsy moth eradication, or similar wide-area pest control programs sponsored by governmental entities; and (c) commercial pesticide applicators making structural applications.

~~((25))~~ (27) "Limited wood destroying organism inspection" means the inspection of a structure for purposes of identifying or verifying evidence of an infestation of wood destroying organisms.

~~((26))~~ (28) "Person" is defined as any individual, partnership, association, corporation, or organized group of persons whether or not incorporated.

~~((27))~~ (29) A "person aggrieved" by a violation is defined as a person who has reasonable grounds to believe that he or she has been subjected to harm or an unreasonable risk by such violation.

(30) "Pollen shedding corn" means that stage of growth when ten percent or more of the corn plants in any one quarter portion of the field are showing spike anthers.

~~((28))~~ (31) "Private applicator" means a certified applicator who uses or is in direct supervision of the use of (a) any EPA restricted use pesticide; or (b) any state restricted use pesticide restricted to use only by certified applicators by the director for the purposes of producing any agricultural commodity and for any associated noncrop application on land owned or rented by the private applicator or the applicator's employer or if applied without compensation other than trading of personal services between producers of agricultural commodities on the land of another person.

~~((29))~~ (32) "Private-commercial applicator" means a certified applicator who uses or supervises the use of (a) any EPA restricted use pesticide; or (b) any restricted use pesticide restricted to use only by certified applicators for purposes other than the production of any agricultural commodity on lands owned or rented by the applicator or the applicator's employer.

~~((30))~~ (33) "State restricted use pesticide" means any pesticide determined to be a restricted use pesticide by the director under the authority of chapters 17.21 and 15.58 RCW that are restricted to use only by certified applicators.

~~((31))~~ (34) "Substantial economic loss" means a loss in profitability greater than that which would be expected based on the experience and fluctuations of crop yields in previous years. Only losses caused by the agricultural emergency specific to the affected site and geographic area are considered. The contribution of mismanagement cannot be considered in determining the loss.

~~((32))~~ (35) "Unreasonable adverse effects on the environment" means any unreasonable risk to people or the environment taking into account the economic, social and environmental costs and benefits of the use of any pesticide, or as otherwise determined by the director.

~~((33))~~ (36) "Waste pesticide" is any pesticide formulation which cannot be used according to label directions in Washington state because of cancellation or suspension of its federal or state registration, or deterioration of the product or its label, and any pesticide formulation whose active ingredients are not clearly identifiable because of label deterioration or because the pesticide is not stored in its original container.

~~((34))~~ (37) "Wood destroying organisms" means those organisms including, but not limited to, subterranean ter-

mites, dampwood termites, carpenter ants, wood boring beetles of the family anobiidae (deathwatch beetle), and wood decay fungus (rot). Wood destroying organisms shall not include such organisms which occurred prior to the manufacturing or processing of the lumber, e.g., pocket rot.

~~((35))~~ (38) "Wood destroying organism inspection" means the service of inspecting a building for the presence of wood destroying organism pests destructive to its structural components, and/or their damage, and/or conducive conditions. For purposes of these rules a wood destroying organism inspection shall be either a "complete wood destroying organism inspection" or a "limited wood destroying organism inspection."

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 99-22-022 [99-22-002], filed 10/20/99, effective 11/20/99)

**WAC 16-228-1040 Investigative response time.** Upon receipt of a verified report of loss as set forth in RCW 17.21.190 or alleged violation of Chapters 17.21 or 15.58 RCW or the accompanying rules, the department shall initiate an investigation. Investigation of a complaint concerning immediate acute pesticide exposure to humans or animals shall be initiated immediately. Other complaint investigations shall be initiated no later than forty-eight hours after receipt of the verified report of loss.

**WAC 16-228-1150 Other dispositions of alleged violations.** Nothing herein shall prevent the department from:

- (1) Choosing not to pursue a case administratively.
- (2) Issuing a warning letter or notice of correction in lieu of pursuing administrative action.
- (3) Negotiating settlement(s) of cases on such terms and for such reasons as it deems appropriate. Prior violation(s) covered by a prior settlement agreement may be used by the department for the purpose of determining the appropriate penalty for the current alleged violation(s) if not prohibited by the agreement.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 99-22-002, filed 10/20/99, effective 11/20/99)

**WAC 16-228-1200 Restrictions on pesticide distribution, transportation, application, storage and disposal.** (1) No person shall handle, transport, store, display, apply, dispose of or distribute pesticides in such a manner as to endanger humans and their environment or to endanger food, feed, or any other product that may be transported, stored, displayed, or distributed with such pesticides. Toxicities of pesticides shall be considered in distribution, storage, handling, and merchandising practices.

(2) Highly toxic pesticides shall not be transported in the same compartment of the vehicle or other equipment together with clothes, food, feed, or any other material intended for consumption by humans or animals. Any vehicle or other

equipment shall be inspected by the owner or authorized agent for contamination before reuse. In instances where leakage or spillage has occurred, the shipper of the pesticides shall be immediately notified for instructions concerning the best method to be employed for the removal of the contamination. Vehicles or other equipment which have been contaminated shall not be returned to service until the contamination has been removed.

(3) Pesticide containers shall be secured during transit by use of side or end racks, bracing, chocks, tiedowns, or other means to prevent their sliding, falling, tipping, rolling, or falling off the vehicle with normal vehicle acceleration, deceleration, or change in direction.

(4) Valves shall be tightly closed and manhole covers shall be secured on cargo or portable tanks used for transporting pesticides, whether tanks are full or empty.

(5) Portable tanks shall be secured to prevent their sliding, falling, tipping, or rolling with normal vehicle acceleration, deceleration, or change in direction. Ends, sidewalls, or doors of van bodies shall not be relied upon for securement.

(6) Pesticides shall not be delivered to a pesticide consignee unless the consignee or authorized agent is present to accept delivery of the pesticides and signs a delivery slip and the pesticides are secured in a proper storage.

(7) Pesticides shall not be stored and/or displayed over or adjacent to meat or vegetable cases, other human foods, animal feeds, or drugs, or in any manner that may result in contamination of food, feed, or clothing. Pesticides intended for sale or distribution shall only be stored and displayed within an enclosed area of a building or fence and shall not be displayed on sidewalks.

(8) Pesticide dealers shall not sell, offer for sale, or hold for sale highly toxic pesticides in the same department where food for human consumption is displayed or sold. The use of the same "checkstand" or food packaging area is prohibited for the distribution of highly toxic pesticides.

(9) All pesticide incidents involving undesirable impacts on human health shall be reported to the Washington state department of (~~social and~~) health (~~services~~).

(10) Pesticides in leaking, broken, corroded, or otherwise damaged containers shall not be displayed, offered for sale, or transported and shall be handled or disposed of in a manner that would not contaminate the environment or cause injury to humans and/or animals. Pesticides with obscured, illegible or damaged labels shall not be displayed or offered for sale.

(11) No person shall distribute or sell any pesticide unless it is in the registrant's or the manufacturer's unbroken, immediate container and there is affixed to the container its registered pesticide label.

(12) A user of a pesticide may distribute a properly labelled pesticide to another user who is legally entitled to use that pesticide without obtaining a pesticide dealer's license if the exclusive purpose of distributing the pesticide is keeping it from becoming a hazardous waste as defined in chapter 70.105 RCW.

(13) The distribution and use of DDT and DDD shall be prohibited in this state except for uses allowed by the Environmental Protection Agency or the Center for Disease Con-

trol of the United States Department of Health and Human Services.

#### NEW SECTION

**WAC 16-228-1231 State restricted use pesticides for distribution by licensed pesticide dealers and for use by certified applicators only.** (1) Pesticides defined by the following categories or active ingredients are hereby declared state restricted use pesticides and shall be distributed only by licensed pesticide dealers to certified applicators or to their duly authorized agents. The certified applicator must have a valid certification, license or permit to use or purchase the kind and quantity of such pesticide sold or delivered. These pesticides shall be used or applied only by certified applicators or persons under the direct supervision of a certified applicator, and only for those uses covered by the certified applicator's license category.

(a) Any EPA restricted use pesticide.

(b) 2, 4-D - all dry formulations and all liquid amine or salt formulations distributed in quantities larger than one gallon, that are used in counties located east of the crest of the Cascade Mountains.

(c) Strychnine and its salts

(d) Aquatic pesticides. All pesticides formulations labeled for application onto or into water to control pests on or in water.

(e) Pesticides containing the following active ingredients and their isomers are hereby declared state restricted use pesticides for the protection of groundwater.

atrazine

bromacil

dcpa

disulfoton

diuron

hexazinone

metolachlor

metribuzin

picloram

prometon

simazine

tebuthiuron

(2) Pesticides which are not classified as EPA restricted use pesticides and which are labeled and intended only for the following uses shall be exempt from the requirements of this section:

(a) Swimming pools

(b) Wholly impounded ornamental pools or fountains

(c) Aquariums

(d) Closed plumbing and sewage systems

(e) Enclosed food processing systems

(f) Air conditioners, humidifiers, and cooling towers

(g) Industrial heat exchange, air washing and similar industrial systems

(h) Disinfectants

(i) Aquatic environments in states other than Washington

(j) Animal pets

PERMANENT

(k) Use within wholly enclosed structures (with floors) or fumigation chambers.

Greenhouses are not considered as wholly enclosed structures for the purposes of this section.

(3) Products listed in WAC 16-228-1230(e) and dry formulations of 2, 4-D which are labeled and intended only for Home & Garden use are exempt from the requirements of this section.

(4) Distribution of pesticides bearing combined labeling of uses onto or into water plus non-aquatic general uses, may be made by licensed pesticide dealers to noncertified applicators if the dealer indicates on the sales slip or invoice that the purchaser of the pesticide agrees that it will not be applied into or onto water. If requested by the department, dealers shall furnish record on the sales of pesticides labeled for application onto or into water, whether sold for that use or not. Records shall include the name and address of the purchaser, the complete product name and/or EPA registration number of the pesticide and the amount purchased. Records shall be kept for seven years from the date of distribution.

(5) Licensed pesticide dealers shall keep records of distribution of state restricted use pesticides for a period of seven years from the date of distribution. Records shall be furnished to the director immediately upon request. The records shall contain the following information:

- (a) Name and address of certified applicator;
- (b) Name of authorized agent (if applicable);
- (c) Product name and EPA registration number;
- (d) Quantity in pounds or gallons of the pesticide distributed;
- (e) Date of distribution;
- (f) Certified applicator's license number;
- (g) Crop or site to which the pesticide will be applied.

(6) Certified applicators may designate authorized agent(s) for the purpose of purchasing or receiving restricted use pesticides by making previous arrangements with the pesticide dealer, or the authorized agent may provide written authorization by the certified applicator to the dealer at the time of purchase. At the time of purchase by an authorized agent the pesticide dealer shall require the certified applicator's name and license number.

**WAC 16-228-1270 Use of pesticides on small seeded vegetable seed crops and seed alfalfa.** (1) For purposes of pesticide registration, the following crops, when grown to produce seed specifically for crop reproduction purposes, are considered nonfood and nonfeed sites of pesticide use:

(2) For the seed crops listed in subsection (1) of this section, the following conditions shall be met:

(a) All seed screenings shall be disposed of in such a way that they cannot be distributed or used for food or feed. The seed conditioner shall keep records of screening disposal for three years from the date of disposal and shall furnish the records to the director forthwith upon request. Disposal records shall consist of documentation from a controlled dump site, incinerator, or other equivalent disposal site and shall show the lot numbers, amount of material disposed of, its grower(s), and the date of disposal.

(b) No portion of the seed plant, including but not limited to green chop, hay, pellets, meal, whole seed, cracked seed, roots, bulbs, leaves and seed screenings may be used or distributed for food or feed purposes.

(c) All seed from the crops listed in subsection (1) of this section grown or conditioned in this state shall bear a tag or container label which forbids use of the seed for human consumption or animal feed.

PERMANENT

(d) No seed from the crops listed in subsection (1) of this section grown or conditioned in this state may be distributed for human consumption or animal feed.

(3) Violation of any condition listed in subsection (2) of this section is declared to be a violation of chapters 17.21 and 15.58 RCW.

(4) Any seed crop certified under provisions of RCW 15.86.070, the Organic Food Products Act, shall be exempt from the requirements of this section.

**WAC 16-228-1380 Regulation of application of vertebrate control pesticides.** Vertebrate control pesticides shall be used only under the following conditions:

(1) Vertebrate control pesticides shall be placed only in locations that are not readily accessible to nonpest animals, children, and unauthorized persons, and in a manner that shall preclude contamination of food, feed, drugs, and other consumer commodities. Exposure of rodenticides baits within buildings shall not be above floor levels.

(2) Baits shall be colored or otherwise formulated so that they will be identifiable from foods common to the establishment in which the bait is placed.

(3) When the use of bait boxes is necessary to ensure that baits are not readily accessible to nonpest animals, children, and unauthorized persons, the bait boxes shall be of sturdy construction and ~~((designed to accomplish that purpose, and))~~ tamper resistant. Baits placed in industrial, commercial or other areas that are accessible to the public shall be contained in tamper resistant bait boxes and such bait boxes shall be secured in such a way that nonpest animals, children and unauthorized persons cannot displace or remove the baits out of such bait boxes. Bait boxes shall be labeled clearly with letters on contrasting background showing the following information:

(a) Any information required by the EPA or Washington state registered label for the bait or the concentrate from which it was formulated.

(b) The name of the active ingredient(s).

(c) The name of the firm and/or certified applicator, address, and the telephone number.

(4) Containers used for exposing vertebrate control baits to pests shall be composed of tough, nonabsorbent, corrosion resistant materials and designed so they cannot be readily overturned or carried off by pest animals. Those containers that are used for exposing vertebrate control pesticides outside of bait boxes shall bear a legible warning label with wording not less restrictive than requirements on bait boxes being used as per WAC 16-228-1380(3), (except for the size of lettering). Food containers, such as "meat boats" and "souffle cups" are unacceptable. Containers used for liquid bait exposure shall be water and/or liquid impervious.

(5) All vertebrate control pesticide stocks, when not in use or when unattended, shall be kept in locked storage or locked service vehicles.

(6) All containers used for storing or transporting vertebrate control pesticides shall bear an EPA or department registered label.

(7) Servicemen's kits which contain vertebrate control pesticides shall be handled with extra caution and shall not be left where children or other unauthorized persons or nontarget animals might remove contents.

(8) Upon completion of a baiting operation, all bait boxes, containers, and/or throw bags, if they may become readily accessible to the public, shall be recovered for disposal in an approved manner.

(9) Wherever poisoned carcasses jeopardize public sanitation, or create a health hazard to wildlife, domestic animals, or the public, they shall be recovered and disposed of by burning, burying not less than three feet below the soil surface, or placed in proper waste containers and delivered to an approved disposal site.

(10) Thallium-containing compounds shall not be used for vertebrate control.

**WAC 16-228-1540 Examination requirements.** (1) An examination fee of ten dollars shall be paid prior to administration of any pesticide license examination at other than a regularly scheduled examination session. Scheduled exam sessions occur every Tuesday at the Olympia and Yakima pesticide management division offices and at other offices as scheduled. The department reserves the right to restrict the number of applicants examining at any given time.

(2) Any individual who fails any pesticide licensing examination twice shall be required to wait at least fourteen days before retaking that examination a third time. Subsequent testing shall be at the director's discretion.

**WAC 16-228-1220 Restrictions applying to any person holding, handling, using, or disposing of pesticides and their containers.** (1) Any person handling, applying, or disposing of pesticides or pesticide containers shall do so in such a manner to minimize hazard to commercially important pollinating insect species. Due care shall be taken to regulate the timing and technique of pesticide applications to or around blossoming plants.

(2) No person shall transport, handle, store, load, apply, or dispose of any pesticide, pesticide container or apparatus in such a manner as to pollute water supplies or waterways, or cause damage or injury to land, including humans, desirable plants and animals, or wildlife: Provided, That a pesticide labeled for aquatic use and used as directed shall not be considered a violation of this subsection: Provided further, That disposing of pesticides at disposal sites approved by the appropriate agency complies with the requirements of this subsection. Toxicity, volatility, and mobility of pesticides shall be considered in complying with this subsection.

(3) No person shall pollute streams, lakes, and other water supplies in pesticide loading, mixing, and application. Adequate, functioning devices and procedures to prevent backsiphoning shall be used.

(4) None of the following pesticides shall be applied by aircraft or airblast sprayers immediately adjacent to occupied schools in session, hospitals, nursing homes or other similar establishments under conditions that may result in contamination of these establishments or their premises:

(a) Disulfoton (DiSyston)-Liquid

(b) Parathion

(c) Phorate (Thimet)-Liquid

(5) No person shall apply pesticides if weather conditions are such that physical drift or volatilization may cause damage to adjacent land, including humans, desirable plants or animals.

(6) Requirements for unattended pesticides and their containers:

(a) Good generally accepted housekeeping practices shall be maintained for all pesticides and their containers.

(b) The provisions of (d) and (e) of this subsection and subsection (7) of this section shall not apply to empty pesticide containers when adequately decontaminated (e.g., three successive rinsings); shall not apply to categories 2, 3, and 4 pesticide formulations labeled for home and garden use only.

(c) For the purposes of (d) and (e) of this subsection and subsection (7) of this section, pesticides and their containers at the loading area shall not be considered unattended during the spraying operation if the operator maintains either visual control or repeatedly returns at closely spaced intervals.

(d) (~~Category 1~~) Pesticides labeled with the signal word "danger/poison" and their containers shall be stored in one of the following enclosures which, when unattended, shall be so constructed and locked (except (v) below) to prevent children, unauthorized persons, livestock, or other animals from gaining entry.

(i) Closed vehicle.

(ii) Closed trailer.

(iii) Building or room or fenced area with a fence at least six feet high.

(iv) Foot locker or other container which can be locked.

(v) Unattended trucks or trailers which have solid sideracks and secured tailgate at least six feet above ground, ramp or platform level.

(vi) Bulk storage containers fifty gallons and larger with tight screw-type bungs and/or secured or locked valves.

(e) (~~Category 2~~) Pesticides labeled with the signal word "danger when not accompanied by the signal word poison," pesticides labeled with the signal word "warning" and (~~categories 3 and 4~~) pesticides labeled with the signal word "caution" and their containers shall be stored in secured storage out of the reach of children in one of the enclosures listed in (d) of this subsection: Provided, That metal containers, twenty-eight gallons and larger, with tight screw-type bungs and/or secured or locked valves and sealed five gallon containers (requiring tool to unseal) shall be considered secured storage.

(7) Requirements for posting of storage area for (~~category 1~~) pesticides and their containers labeled with the signal words "danger/poison":

(a) For purposes of this subsection, warning signs shall show the skull and crossbones symbol and the words: "Danger/Poison (or Pesticide or Chemical) Storage Area/Keep



Out" in letters large enough to be legible at a distance of thirty feet.

(b) Warning signs shall be posted:

(i) On enclosures specified in subsection (6)(d) of this section, when such enclosures are unattended;

(ii) At each entrance or exit from a storage area and on each exterior wall, so that a sign is visible from any direction;

(iii) If the pesticide storage area is contained in a larger, multipurpose structure, warning signs shall be clearly visible on each exterior wall of the structure within thirty feet of the pesticide storage area and from the main entrance to the larger structure: Provided, That posting of the main entrance shall not be required, if a sign is visible from the entrance which clearly identifies the possibility that pesticides may be stored on the premises, (i.e., XYZ Pest Control or XYZ Wood Treatment, Inc.);

(8) No person shall disperse a pesticide or pesticide rinse from any aircraft while in flight except over the target field and at the customary application height for that crop: Provided, That emergency dumping shall not be considered a violation of this section.

These requests shall be limited to records necessary for investigations of suspected violations, damage complaints, monitoring distribution and use under provisions of special local needs registrations, emergency exemptions from federal registration and experimental use permits, and monitoring of any pesticide suspected of unreasonable adverse effects on the environment. The records shall contain the following information:

(a) Full Name and address of purchaser;

(b) Full Name and address of certified applicator (if different from (a) above if applicable);

(c) Full Name of authorized agent (if applicable);

(d) Brand and specific pesticide name and/or EPA registration number;

(e) Number of pounds or gallons of the pesticide distributed;

(f) Date of distribution;

(g) Certified applicator number (if applicable)(-);

(h) Crop and/or site to which pesticide will be applied (if known).

~~((2) Certified applicators may designate authorized agent(s) for the purpose of purchasing or receiving restricted use pesticides by making previous arrangements with the pesticide dealer, or the authorized agent may provide written authorization to the dealer at the time of purchase. At the time of purchase by an authorized agent the pesticide dealer shall require the certified applicator's name and license or certification number.~~

~~(3) Pesticide dealers shall keep records of distribution of state restricted use pesticides for a period of seven years from the date of distribution.)~~

**WAC 16-228-1320 Applicator requirements.** (1) Certified applicators and all persons applying pesticides to more than one acre of agricultural land in a calendar year including public entities engaged in roadside spraying, and all persons making landscape applications of pesticides to types of property listed in RCW 17.21.410 (1), (b), (c), (d) and (e) shall keep records ((on a form prescribed by the director)) for each application which shall include the following:

(a) The name and address of the person for whom the pesticide was applied.

(b) The address or exact location of the land where the pesticide was applied. If the application is made to one acre or more of agricultural land, the field must be located on the map on the ~~((prescribed))~~ adopted form. Location of agricultural land shall be made using section, township and range or by irrigation block and farm unit numbers.

(c) The year, month, day and start and stop time the pesticide was applied.

(d) The product name used on the registered label and the United States Environmental Protection Agency registration number, if applicable, of the pesticide which was applied.

(e) The direction from which the wind is blowing and estimated velocity of the wind in miles per hour (mph) and the temperature in degrees Fahrenheit at the time the pesticide was applied: *Provided*, That this subsection (e) shall not apply to applications of baits in bait stations and pesticide applications within structures.

(f) The total amount of pesticide applied such as pounds, gallons, ounces, etc.

(g) The amount of pesticide applied per acre or one thousand square feet or other appropriate measure.

(i) For PCO classification or residential ornamental applications, the amount shall be recorded to the nearest ounce of product or to the nearest gallon of liquid spray per site.

(ii) Fumigation records shall include the pounds of gas released per one thousand cubic feet of space, the temperature, and the duration of the exposure period.

(h) The concentration of pesticide that was applied. Liquid applications may be recorded as amount of product per one hundred gallons of liquid spray or other appropriate measure. (Examples include, but are not limited to, the amount of formulation per one hundred gallons of water, percent formulation in the tank mix (i.e.) 1%, or gallons per acre of output volume.)

(i) The pests to be controlled (for PCO classification only).

(j) Specific crop or site to which pesticide was applied.

(k) Apparatus license plate number.

(l) The licensed applicator's name, certified pesticide applicator license number, address, telephone number, and

the name and license number(s) if applicable of the individual or individuals making the application.

(m) The number of acres or other appropriate measure to which the pesticide was applied.

(2) Application records shall be completed and available to the department the same day the pesticides were applied.

(3) Application records shall be kept for a period of seven years from the date of the application of the pesticide to which such records refer. The director shall, upon request in writing, be furnished with a copy of such records forthwith by the licensee.

(4) Upon written request, the applicator shall provide the customer with a record of each application of pesticides to his/her land, for the current season, which shall contain the information listed in WAC 16-228-~~(+330)~~1320(1).

(5) Except as stated in subsection (6) of this section, the information required in subsection (1) of this section shall be ~~((kept))~~ provided upon request on the appropriate page of the pesticide record form (figures 1-8): Provided, That computerized records may be maintained as long as the records can be produced in the form and format prescribed by the department.

(6) The department may allow by written permit the information required in subsection (1) of this section to be kept in a different form and format than that described in figures 1-8: *Provided*, That the following criteria are met:

(a) The pesticide application record keeping system is computerized;

~~(b) ((The pesticide application record keeping system was in place and operational prior to July 23, 1989;~~

~~(e)))~~ The pesticide application record keeping system contains all the information required by subsection (1) of this section, and can be produced in a form and format acceptable to the department.

(7) All apparatus shall be kept in good repair and only that apparatus capable of performing all functions necessary to ensure proper and thorough application of pesticides shall be used. Apparatus shall be cleaned so that no residue remains which may cause injury to land, including humans, desirable plants and animals, from subsequent applications.

(8) On demand of the director, the applicator shall make immediately available for inspection the pesticides being applied and the apparatus used for the application: *Provided*, That this inspection is made at the site of application or where the apparatus is located.

(9) The applicator shall make available necessary safety equipment in proper working order and advise employees on its use to meet the safety requirements of the pesticide label.

(10) Maintain a uniform mixture at all times in operating apparatus when applying pesticides.

(11) All containers used for prepared mixtures, other than those in an apparatus, shall have a label identifying the contents as a pesticide, the active ingredient, and appropriate cautions.

**WAC 16-228-1322 Landscape marker removal schedule** (1) The marker shall remain in place for a minimum of twenty-four hours from the time the landscape application is originally posted as required by RCW 17.21.410.

(2) In the event the pesticide label requires a restricted entry interval greater than twenty-four hours, the certified applicator shall provide the property owner or tenant with the restricted entry interval times consistent with the label requirements. Markers shall remain in place consistent with the restricted entry interval times as required by the label.

(3) The property owner or tenant shall remove the marker of any landscape posted under the requirements of RCW 17.21.410 consistent with this schedule.

**WAC 16-228-1400 Pesticide labeling requirements.** (1) In addition to the requirements set forth in (2) through (5) below, pesticide labeling shall meet the standards or criteria of ~~((the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act))~~ FIFRA.

(2) Any pesticide exempted from registration under the provisions of section 18 of FIFRA must be labeled as follows:

(a) Pesticides distributed under section 18 of FIFRA must be accompanied by a label approved by the department prior to distribution. All conditions set forth in the document granting the emergency exemption and all other requirements determined to be necessary by the department must be included on the label.

(b) In situations where a label cannot be developed and approved prior to the intended use period, the department may allow the use of the document granting the emergency exemption in lieu of labeling. Conditions set forth as part of ((an exemption from registration under provisions of section 18 of FIFRA)) the granting document, and any attached or associated documentation from the department shall be considered labeling for purposes of enforcement.

(3) Labels for spray adjuvants must include the following:

(a) The product brand name.

(b) The type or function of principal functioning agents. Terms used to describe adjuvant functions must be consistent with American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) Standard E 1519, unless ASTM has not defined a term. In the absence of an ASTM definition, the department will determine the appropriate term(s). Functions claimed must be consistent with the principal functioning agents. If two or more functions are claimed, then the functions must be listed in descending order (starting with the primary function).

(c) An ingredient statement that shall include the following:

(i) "Principal functioning agents." The principal functioning agents must be listed by chemical name in descending order of composition with either individual or total percentage(s). If more than 3 functioning agents are present, only the 3 principal agents need to be listed;

(ii) The percentage of "Constituents ineffective as spray adjuvants," and

(iii) The total percentage of all ingredients which must equal 100%.

(d) Directions for use that must include a description of intended uses and recommended use rates.

(e) Precautionary statements adequate to protect people and the environment that shall include the following:

(i) The statement "Keep Out Of Reach Of Children."

(ii) A signal word (danger, warning or caution) and precautionary statements (including requirements for personal protective equipment, if applicable) consistent with product toxicity data; and

(iii) A statement prohibiting aquatic use, unless the registrant provides data to demonstrate that the proposed use will not cause unreasonable adverse effects to fish and aquatic invertebrates.

(f) An appropriate storage and disposal statement.

(g) The name and address of the registrant or manufacturer. If the registrant's name appears on the label and the registrant is not the manufacturer, then the name must be qualified by appropriate wording such as "Packaged for" or "Distributed by."

(h) The weight or measure of the contents.

(i) Optional information: The spray adjuvant label may also include an exemption from tolerance statement (if applicable), an unsulfonated residue (UR) value (if applicable), the Washington registration number and a label identification code (such as the revision date).

(4) Special local need (SLN) labels issued under section 24c of FIFRA must include the following:

(a) A federal or state Restricted Use Pesticide (RUP) designation statement (when applicable).

(b) The statement "FOR DISTRIBUTION AND USE ONLY WITHIN THE STATE OF WASHINGTON."

(c) The product brand name.

(d) The EPA and SLN registration numbers of the product.

(e) The statement: "It is a violation of federal law to use this product in a manner inconsistent with its labeling."

(f) The statement: "This labeling must be in the possession of the user at the time of application."

(g) One of the following statements:

(i) For agricultural use SLN labels the statement: "Follow all applicable directions, restrictions, worker protection standard requirements, and precautions on the EPA registered label"; or

(ii) For non-agricultural use SLN labels the statement: "Follow all applicable directions, restrictions, and precautions on the EPA registered label."

(h) Directions for use that must include the following: crop or site to be treated, pest(s) to be controlled, application rate and concentration, method of application, frequency and timing of application, and pre-harvest interval.

(i) All restriction or precaution statements (e.g. pollinator protection, herbicide drift, aquatic toxicity, chemigation, seed crop requirements) applicable to the use.

(j) The statement: "This label for (Product name) expires and must not be distributed or used in accordance with this

SLN registration after December 31, Fifth year." Fifth year means the fifth year after issuance of the SLN label.

(k) The name and address of the SLN registrant.

(l) A label identification code (such as the revision date).

(m) Any other applicable information required by the EPA or the department.

(n) In situations where the department deems it appropriate, the use of alternative language and/or statements may be allowed or required.

(o) Optional information: The SLN label may also include a waiver of liability statement (if applicable). The waiver of liability statement must be consistent with EPA requirements.

(5) Labels for minimum risk pesticides exempted from federal registration under section 25(b) of FIFRA must include the following:

(a) The product brand name.

(b) The product function. The function(s) claimed must be consistent with product ingredients.

(c) An ingredient statement that shall include the following:

(i) "Active ingredients." These ingredients must be listed by name (in descending order of composition) with individual percentage(s). Only active ingredients listed in 40CFR152.25(g) are permitted;

(ii) "Inert ingredients" or "Other ingredients." These ingredients must be listed by name with the cumulative percentage of all inert ingredients stated on the label. Only inert ingredients on EPA Inerts List 4A are permitted; and

(iii) The total percentage of all ingredients which must equal 100%.

(d) Directions for use that must include a description of intended uses and use rates. The label must not bear claims either to control or mitigate microorganisms that pose a threat to human health.

(e) Precautionary statements adequate to protect people and the environment that shall include the following:

(i) The statement "Keep Out Of Reach Of Children," and

(ii) A signal word (danger, warning or caution) and precautionary statements (including requirements for personal protective equipment, if applicable) consistent with product toxicity data.

(f) An appropriate storage and disposal statement.

(g) The name and address of the registrant or manufacturer. If the registrant's name appears on the label and the registrant is not the manufacturer, then the name must be qualified by appropriate wording such as "Packaged for" or "Distributed by."

(h) The weight or measure of the contents.

(i) Optional information: The minimum risk pesticide label may also include the Washington registration number and a label identification code (such as the revision date).

**WAC 16-228-1420 Complete pesticide formula.** The complete pesticide formula shall include a listing of each active and inert ingredient and the percentage of each ingredient. This information will be kept confidential and is

**WAC 388-466-0150 Refugee employment and training services. (1) What are refugee employment and training services?**

Refugee employment and training services provided to eligible refugees may include information and referral, employment oriented case management, job development, job placement, job retention, wage progression, skills training, on-the-job training, counseling and orientation, English as a second language, and vocational English training.

**(2) Am I required to participate in refugee employment and training services?**

If you are receiving refugee cash assistance (RCA) you are required to participate in refugee employment and training services, unless you are exempt.

**(3) How do I know if I am exempt from mandatory employment and training requirements?**

(a) You may be exempt from participation in employment and training requirements if:

(i) You are needed in the home to personally provide care for your child under three months of age (see WAC 388-310-0300);

(ii) You are sixty years of age or older.

(b) You can not be exempt from work and training requirements solely because of an inability to communicate in English.

**(4) If I am required to participate, what do I have to do?**

You are required to:

(a) Register with your employment service provider;

(b) Accept and participate in all employment opportunities, training or referrals, determined appropriate by the department.

**(5) What happens if I do not follow these requirements?**

If you refuse without good reason to cooperate with the requirements, you are subject to the following penalties:

(a) If you are applying for refugee cash and medical assistance, you will be ineligible for thirty days from the date of your refusal to accept work or training opportunity; or

(b) If you are already receiving refugee cash and medical assistance, your cash benefits will be subject to financial penalties.

(c) The department will notify your voluntary agency (VOLAG) if financial penalties take place.

**(6) What are the penalties to my grant?**

The penalties to your grant are:

(a) If the assistance unit includes other individuals as well as yourself, the cash grant is reduced by the sanctioned refugee's amount for three months after the first occurrence. For the second occurrence the financial penalty continues for the remainder of the sanctioned refugee's eight-month eligibility period.

(b) If you are the only person in the assistance unit your cash grant is terminated for three months after the first occurrence. For the second occurrence, your grant is terminated for the remainder of your eight-month eligibility period.

**(7) How can I avoid the penalties?**

You can avoid the penalties, if you accept employment or training before the last day of the month in which your cash grant is closed.

**(8) What is considered a good reason for not being able to follow the requirements?**

You have a good reason for not following the requirements if it was not possible for you to stay on the job or to follow through on a required activity due to an event outside of your control. See WAC 388-310-1600(3) for examples.

**WAC 246-976-320 Air ambulance services.** (1) Air ambulance services must:

(a) Comply with all regulations in this chapter pertaining to ambulance services and vehicles, except that WAC 246-976-290 and 246-976-300 are replaced for air ambulance services by subsection ~~((2))~~ (4)(b) and (c) of this section;

(b) Comply with the standards in this section for all types of transports, including inter-facility and prehospital transports;

(c) Be in current compliance with all state and Federal Aviation Administration statutes and regulations that apply to air carriers, including, but not limited to, those regulations that apply to certification requirements, operations, equipment, crew members, and maintenance, and any specific regulations that apply to air ambulance services;

(d) Air ambulance services must provide a physician director who is practicing medicine in the response area of the aircraft, as identified in the state EMS/TC plan.

(2) Air ambulance services currently licensed or seeking relicensure after July 31, 2001, must have and maintain accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation of Medical Transport Services or another accrediting organization approved by the department as having equivalent require-

ments as CAMTS for aeromedical transport. Until August 1, 2001, subsections (4) and (5) of this section apply to air ambulance services currently licensed or seeking relicensure.

(3) Air ambulance services requesting initial licensure that are ineligible to attain accreditation because they lack a history of operation at the site, must meet the criteria of subsections (4) and (5) of this section and within four months of licensure must have completed an initial consultation with CAMTS or another accrediting organization approved by the department as having equivalent requirements as CAMTS for aeromedical transport. A provisional license will be granted for no longer than two years at which time the service must provide documentation that it is accredited by CAMTS or another accrediting organization approved by the department as having equivalent requirements as CAMTS for aeromedical transport.

(4) Air ambulance services must provide:

(a) A physician director who is:

(i) Practicing medicine in the response area of the aircraft, as identified in the state EMS/TC plan;

(ii) Trained and experienced in emergency, trauma, and critical care;

(iii) Knowledgeable of the operation of air medical services; and

(iv) Responsible for supervising and evaluating the quality of patient care provided by the air medical flight personnel;

(b) Sufficient air medical personnel on each response to provide adequate patient care, specific to the mission, including:

(i) One specially trained, experienced registered nurse or paramedic; and

(ii) One other person who must be a physician, nurse, physician's assistant, respiratory therapist, paramedic, EMT, or other appropriate specialist appointed by the physician director. If an air ambulance responds directly to the scene of an incident, at least one of the air medical personnel must be trained in prehospital emergency care;

(c) Aircraft that, when operated as air ambulances:

(i) Are configured so that the medical attendants can access the patient to begin and maintain advanced life support and other treatment;

(ii) Allow loading and unloading the patient without excessive maneuvering or tilting of the stretcher;

(iii) Have appropriate communication equipment to insure internal crew and air-to-ground exchange of information between flight personnel and hospitals, medical control, the flight operations center, and air traffic control facilities;

(iv) Are equipped with:

(A) Appropriate navigational aids;

(B) Airway management equipment, including:

(I) Oxygen;

(II) Suction;

(III) Ventilation and intubation equipment, adult and pediatric;

(C) Cardiac monitor/defibrillator;

(D) Supplies, equipment, and medication as required by the program physician director, for emergency, cardiac, trauma, pediatric care, and other missions; and

(E) The ability to maintain appropriate patient temperature; and

(v) Have adequate interior lighting for patient care arranged so as not to interfere with the pilot's vision;

(d) If using fixed-wing aircraft, pressurized, multi-engine aircraft when appropriate to the mission;

(e) If using helicopter aircraft:

(i) A protective barrier sufficiently isolating the cockpit, to minimize in-flight distraction or interference;

(ii) Appropriate communication equipment to communicate with ground EMS/TC services and public safety vehicles, in addition to the communication equipment specified in (c)(iii) of this subsection.

~~((3))~~ (5) All air medical personnel must:

(a) Be certified in ACLS;

(b) Be trained in:

(i) Emergency, trauma, and critical care;

(ii) Altitude physiology;

(iii) EMS communications;

(iv) Aircraft and flight safety; and

(v) The use of all patient care equipment on board the aircraft;

(c) Be familiar with survival techniques appropriate to the terrain;

(d) Perform under protocols.

~~((4))~~ (6) Exceptions:

(a) If aeromedical evacuation of a patient is necessary because of a life threatening condition and a licensed air ambulance is not available, the nearest available aircraft that can accommodate the patient may transport. The physician ordering the transport must justify the need for air transport of the patient in writing to the department within thirty days after the incident.

(b) Excluded from licensure requirements those services operating aircraft for primary purposes other than civilian air medical transport, but which may be called into service to initiate an emergency air medical transport of a patient to the nearest available treatment facility or rendezvous point with other means of transportation. Examples are: United States Army Military Assistance to Safety and Traffic, United States Navy, United States Coast Guard, Search and Rescue, and the United States Department of Transportation.

**AMENDATORY SECTION** (Amending WSR 00-08-102, filed 4/5/00, effective 5/6/00)

**WAC 246-976-390 Verification of trauma care services.** (1) The department will:

(a) Publish procedures for verification. Verification will expire with the period of licensure. The application for verification will be incorporated in the application for licensure;

(b) Verify prehospital trauma care services in the following categories:

(i) Aid service: Basic, intermediate and advanced (paramedic) life support;

(ii) Ground ambulance service: Basic, intermediate and advanced (paramedic) life support;

(iii) Air ambulance service: After July 31, 2001, the department will consider that an air ambulance service has met the requirements of subsections (4), (6), and (9) of this



section if it has been accredited by CAMTS or another accrediting organization approved by the department as having equivalent requirements as CAMTS for aeromedical transport:

(c) Review the minimum response times for verified pre-hospital trauma services at least biennially, considering data available from the trauma registry and with the advice of the steering committee;

(d) Forward applications for verification for aid and ground ambulance services to the appropriate regional council for review and comment;

(e) Approve an applicant to provide verified prehospital trauma care, based on satisfactory evaluations as described in this section;

(f) Notify the regional council and the MPD in writing of the name, location, and level of verified services;

(g) Renew approval of a verified service upon reapplication, if the service continues to meet standards established in this chapter and verification remains consistent with the regional plan.

(2) The department will identify minimum and maximum numbers of prehospital services, based on the approved regional and state plans. The department will:

(a) Establish and review biennially the minimum and maximum number of prehospital services based upon distribution and level of service identified for each response area in the approved regional plan.

(b) Evaluate an applicant for trauma verification based upon demonstrated ability of the provider to meet standards defined in this section 24-hours every day.

(c) Verify the trauma capabilities of a licensed prehospital service if it determines that the applicant:

(i) Proposes services that are identified in the regional plan for ground services, or the state plan for air ambulance services, in the proposed response areas.

(ii) Agrees to operate under approved regional patient care procedures and prehospital patient care protocols.

(3) Regional council responsibilities regarding verification are described in WAC 246-976-960.

(4) To apply for verification, a licensed ambulance or aid service must submit application on forms provided by the department, including:

(a) Documentation required for licensure specified by WAC 246-976-260(2);

(b) A policy that a trauma training program is required for all personnel responding to trauma incidents. The program must meet learning objectives established by the department and be approved by the MPD;

(c) Documentation that the provider has the ability twenty-four hours every day to deliver personnel and equipment required for verification to the scene of a trauma within the agency response times identified in this section; and

(d) Documentation that the provider will participate in an approved regional quality assurance program.

(5) Verified aid services must provide personnel on each trauma response including:

(a) Basic life support: At least one individual, first responder or above;

(b) Intermediate life support:

(i) At least one ILS technician; or

(ii) At least one IV/airway technician; or

(iii) At least two individuals, one IV technician and one airway technician.

(c) Advanced life support - Paramedic: At least one paramedic.

(6) Verified ambulance services must provide personnel on each trauma response including:

(a) Basic life support: At least two certified individuals — one EMT plus one first responder;

(b) Intermediate life support:

(i) One ILS technician, plus one EMT; or

(ii) One IV/airway technician, plus one EMT; or

(iii) One IV technician and one airway technician;

(c) Advanced life support - Paramedic: At least two certified individuals — one paramedic and one EMT.

(7) Verified BLS vehicles must carry equipment identified in WAC 246-976-300, Table C.

(8) Verified ILS and paramedic vehicles must provide equipment identified in Table D, in addition to meeting the requirements of WAC 246-976-300:

Those agreements were drafted into regulatory format and filed with the Code Reviser's Office under the expedited rule-making process. An exception to the package agreed to at Portland is the reduction of the Hood Canal (Areas 12 and 12B) from two open days of fishing to one day of fishing. This adjustment in the fishing schedule has been made in response to the very low catches observed to date in Hood Canal. The catch to date in the canal is running behind the level observed in 1999 when the run size came in at only 146,000 chum.

NMFS consultation resulted in an opinion that these fishery openings are consistent with the year 2000 fishery opinion of "no jeopardy." All other rules are consistent with agreements reached at the PFMC meeting. There is insufficient time to promulgate permanent rules.

Sea Urchin Districts 3, 4, and Marine Fish/Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Areas 24A, 24B, 24C, and 24D, 26B, 26C, 26D, and 28A are open only on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Wednesdays of each week. The minimum size for green sea urchins is 2.25 inches in diameter exclusive of the spines.

(2) Red sea urchins: Sea Urchin Districts 1 and 2 are open only on November 20, 21, 27, 28, 29, and December 4, 5, 6, 11, 12, 13, 14, 18, 19, 20, and 21, 2000. Sea Urchin Districts 3 and 4 are open only on December 11, 12, 13, 14, 18, 19, 20, and 21. It is unlawful to harvest red sea urchins larger

or smaller than the following size (size in diameter exclusive of the spines):

(a) Districts 1 and 2 - 4.0 minimum to 5.5 maximum inches.

(b) Districts 3 and 4 - 3.25 minimum to 5.0 maximum inches.

(3) It is unlawful to dive for any purpose from a commercially-licensed fishing vessel, except vessels actively fishing geoducks under contract with the Washington Department of Natural Resources on Saturdays and Sundays of each week.

(4) Sea Urchin Districts:

(a) Sea Urchin District 1 (Northern San Juan Islands) is defined as Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Areas 20A, 20B, and those waters of Area 22A north of a line projected east-west one-quarter mile north of Lime Kiln Light on San Juan Island and west of a line projected true north from Limestone Point on San Juan Island.

(b) Sea Urchin District 2 (Southern San Juans and Port Townsend) is defined as those waters of Marine Fish/Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 22A south of a line projected east-west one-quarter mile north of Lime Kiln Light on San Juan Island and east of a line projected true north from Limestone Point on San Juan Island, and Areas 21A, 21B, 22B, 23A, 23B, 25A, and 25B. The following areas within Sea Urchin District 2 are closed to the harvest of sea urchins at all times.

(i) Those waters of Haro Strait north of a line projected east-west one-half mile south of Eagle Point on San Juan Island and south of a line projected east-west one-quarter mile north of Lime Kiln Light on San Juan Island.

(ii) Those waters of San Juan Channel and Upright Channel within the following lines: south of a line from Steep Point on Orcas Island to Limestone Point on San Juan Island, west of a line from Neck Point on Shaw Island to Steep Point on Orcas Island, south of a line projected from Flat Point on Lopez Island true west to Shaw Island, and north of a line projected from Flat Point on Lopez Island to the northernmost point of Turn Island and thence projected true west to San Juan Island.

The Department of Fish and Wildlife and the District and Municipal Court Judges' Association having recommended the adoption of the proposed amendments to CrRLJ 3.2 (o) and (p), and the Court having determined that the proposed amendments will aid in the prompt and orderly administration of justice and further determined that an emergency exists which necessitates an early adoption;

Now, therefore, it is hereby

ORDERED:

- (a) That the amendments as attached hereto are adopted.
(b) That pursuant to the emergency provisions of GR 9(i), the amendments will be published expeditiously and become effective upon publication.

## Policy and Interpretive Statements

In accordance with RCW 34.05.230(12), the department recently issued the following policies and interpretive statements:

## Specialty Compliance Services Division:

**Electrical Program Inspection Policy #00-18, "Temporary Telecommunications Administrator,"** is a new policy that is to be followed when a telecommunications contractor applicant is not a registered contractor prior to June 8, 2000. The department will allow a telecommunications contractor to assign a temporary administrator. To be designated as a temporary telecommunications administrator, the applicant must submit a completed telecommunications administrator application. Temporary telecommunications administrator certificates will be issued and will be valid until July 1, 2001. The person designated as the temporary telecommunications administrator must successfully complete the telecommunications administrator examination prior to the expiration date of the temporary certificate. Failure to successfully complete the examination within the required time frame will result in the automatic revocation of the temporary telecommunications administrator certificate and the suspension of the telecommunications contractor's license. The suspended telecommunications contractor must designate a qualified telecommunications administrator before the telecommunications license will be reinstated (effective August 1, 2000).

## Insurance Services Division:

**Provider Bulletin #00-09, "Recent Coverage Decisions on Intradiscal Heating (IDET) and Vertebral Axial Decompression Therapy,"** is a new policy that notifies providers about recent medical coverage decisions pertaining to intradiscal heating (IDET) and vertebral axial decompression therapy (Vax-D). These coverage decisions apply to both state fund and self-insured worker's compensation claims and

to crime victim's compensation claims. IDET is not a covered service because there is not enough substantial scientific evidence documenting the long term safety and efficacy of intradiscal heating. When traction is a proper and necessary treatment for a worker, the department or self-insured employer may pay for traction therapy administered by a licensed physical therapist or physiatrist using Vax-D only to the same extent it would pay for traction therapy using other approved traction devices. The department will not pay an additional cost when this device is used. (Issued October 2000)

#### University of Washington Rule Review Progress Report 2000 (Per EO 97-02)

**1. Accomplishments Resulting from the University of Washington's Regulatory Review and Improvement Program:** Since the effective date of Executive Order (EO) 97-02, the University of Washington has first reviewed and then proceeded with rule-making activity for 89% of the Washington Administrative Code (WAC) rules that were defined in the university's original rule review plan and schedule created in 1997. The final 11% of rules pending review are now scheduled under the university's ongoing rule review plan. This ongoing process will schedule Title 478 WAC rules for review whenever a WAC chapter has gone without rule-making activity during the previous ten years. Additionally, the University of Washington will continue to implement a complete review of any WAC chapter whenever any specific section within that chapter requires rule-making activity. In this way, the University of Washington will continue to bring all interested parties (i.e., University of Washington faculty, staff, and students; pertinent community members and local governmental bodies; and the general public) to the table for WAC rule review and rule-making discussions.

Also during this review period, the University of Washington started an internal review of policy and interpretive statements, along with similar administrative information, unlike that of previous reviews. This review looked at the methods for accessing and maintaining the information as well as a review of the content. The results of that review are detailed further in Section 4 of this report.

**2. Total Number of Rule Sections Reviewed, Amended, and Repealed, and the Number of Pages Eliminated in the WAC:** Since the effective date of Executive Order 97-02, the University of Washington has:

- Reviewed a total of 255 WAC sections.
- Amended a total of 80 WAC sections.
- Repealed a total of 63 WAC sections.
- Not eliminated any pages of the WAC, since 98 new WAC sections were also adopted during this same period.

**3. Percent of Rule Sections Reviewed to Date:** The University of Washington reviewed 89% of the rule sections intended for review. The final 11% of the rule sections to be reviewed are now scheduled under the University of Washington's ongoing rule review plan. This ongoing plan seeks to review any Title 478 WAC rules that have not been reviewed or seen rule-making activity during the past ten-year period.

**4. Results of the Review of Policy and Interpretive Statements and Similar Documents:** During this past year, the University of Washington took a detailed look at its policy and interpretive statements and similar documents. Heretofore these documents had received equal treatment with institution-wide administrative information and procedures insofar as all materials were published through a small number of central offices primarily in paper format. However, with the university's decision to move more administrative information to its Web site (due to the ease and cost-effectiveness of accessing and maintaining Web information), a total review of all these types of materials was initiated.

In the case of basic administrative information and procedures, it was found that the university's day-to-day managers of that information could update and manage their materials more effectively on the Web with less central review and often without requiring paper publication. Rapid changes in administrative functions and processes require accurate, up-to-date information, easily provided through the Web, to maintain an informed, efficient University of Washington workforce. Additionally, administrative procedures and information are increasingly being interwoven into the university's administrative systems with Web interfaces for quick interaction between procedures and administrative action.

Statements of policy and the interpretation of rules and policy, however, continue to require more deliberation and review throughout the university's community with more formal methods of final codification.

While these basic differences in the scope of review were established between the various types of documents, the University of Washington was nevertheless committed to publishing all of the above types of materials primarily on its Web site and only secondarily through a printed medium. In this way, the University of Washington can link both its policy matter and procedural information on the same topic seamlessly for the user, although the various components of the final version of these Web documents will often see different levels of internal review prior to publication.

At the time of this report, the review and sorting of responsibility for various types of University of Washington



administrative documents continues. More policy statements and procedural information will be successfully linked and appear on the university's Web site in the coming year.

**5. Other Regulatory Reform Factors:**

a. During the past year, the University of Washington received no petitions for adoption, amendment, or repeal of rules under RCW 34.05.330.

b. University of Washington rules reviewed, created, amended, and repealed under chapter 34.05 RCW have not imposed reporting requirements on businesses.

**6. A Summary of Recommendations Developed for Statutory or Administrative Changes Resulting from Regulatory Review:** In order to further the goals of EO 97-02, wherein agencies are encouraged to create and utilize ongoing procedures to review their rules after the mandated rule review of EO 97-02 is complete, it will be critical to continue providing state agencies with access to the expedited adoption process. Unlike the expedited repeal process (per RCW 34.05.354), the current expedited adoption process (per RCW 34.05.356) is scheduled to expire on December 31, 2000.

The expedited adoption process, unlike full rule making, allows state agencies to quickly update necessary organizational information (such as departmental name changes; phone and fax numbers; e-mail, Web, and building address changes), reflect changes by reference to state and federal law, correct typographical errors, and clarify language without holding costly and time-consuming public hearings that lack substance. The public has a right to expect accurate agency rules, and these small yet critical housekeeping changes can make the difference between rules that function correctly and rules that slowly become outdated while awaiting a substantive change that warrants full rule making.

Therefore, in keeping with the goals of regulatory reform, the University of Washington recommends passing a permanent expedited adoption process that provides agencies continued access to this timely and cost-cutting tool for maintaining accurate agency rules.

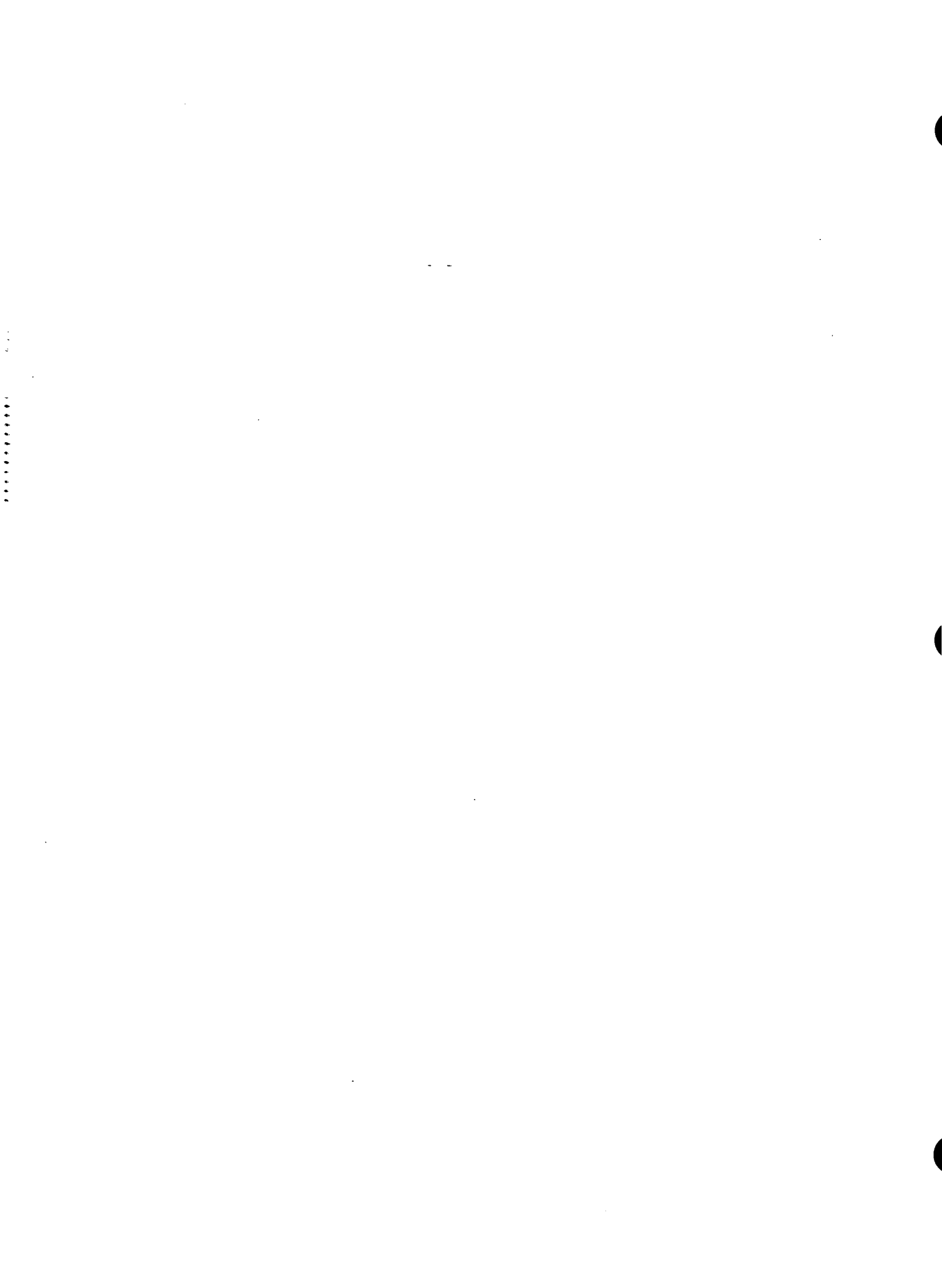

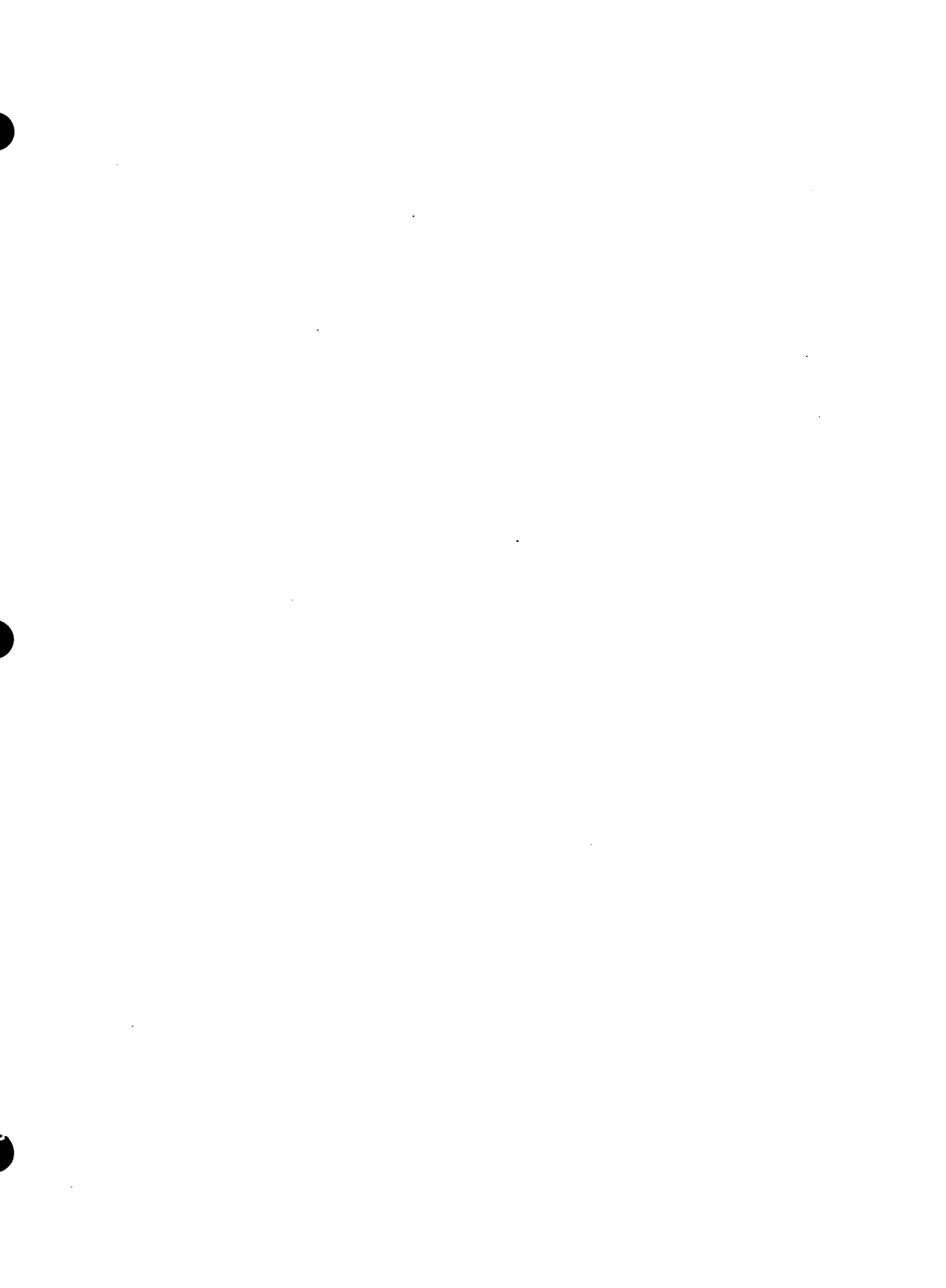
